CCAD completes 10,000 engine overhaul

Corpus Christi Army Depot leaders, staff and industry partners took part in a ceremony celebrating CCAD's engine milestone completion, here, March 14.

The ceremony marked CCAD's success in servicing 10,000 T700 engines, which were first inducted into the depot in 2001 after partnering with General Electric Aviation in 2000. The milestone is based on the Army's 2004 single-fleet plan initiative to have the T700 in all of its UH-60 Black Hawk and AH-64 Apache helicopters, according to a GE Aviation press release.

From the beginning, GE Aviation has worked tirelessly in support of CCAD to help complete their goals by providing onsite technical, engineering and logistics services, and monitoring and supplying T700 spare parts to ensure adequate inventory, according to the same press release.

"We work closely with the CCAD artisans as (the engines) are opened up by engineering teams to figure out what materials are needed to perform the overhaul quickly... to get it back out into the field to the warfighter," said Cristina Seda-Hoelle, vice president and general manager, GE Aviation.

Army warfighters' success are dependent on the quality and excellence of each engine produced at CCAD.

"I tell you every day that we align ourselves to the warfighter. Because if we are not doing it for him and we're not doing it for her, I would ask, why are you (at CCAD)? You have to reflect on this," said Col. Gail Atkins, commander, CCAD.

Atkins recounted an experience from one of her mentors, Steve, who is an Army pilot, to CCAD employees during the

ceremony, giving them an understanding of how the work they do and the engines they produce impact the warfighter.

An Army attack weapons team, flying in Apache helicopters, had to react to enemy contact outside of Baghdad. None of the pilots knew how bad the situation was, said Atkins, and never questioned for a second the weapons system they were jumping inside of.

Throughout more than 12 hours of fighting, one of the Apaches sustained bullet damage to one of its engines, she added. Even with the damage, the engine continued to provide enough power for the pilot to keep fighting.

The mission was a success and what the pilot remembered most from it was "the confidence in that weapons system that he was flying and fighting with that day," said Atkins.

Atkins said it's the depot employees' commitment to excellence and the relationship with our industry partners that allow CCAD to celebrate rolling out 10,000 engines in support of the warfighter.

CCAD test pilots judge school competition

Representatives from the Corpus Christi Army Depot had a unique opportunity to participate in the Kolda Elementary School Entrepreneur Quest competition at Kolda, March 28.

Three CCAD pilots were guests as part of a five-judge panel for the annual competition where 5th-grade students present a creative and new product concept they have created, said Josie Alvarez, Kolda principal. The competition resembles the entrepreneurial-themed reality show, Shark Tank®.

This year, 11 students presented brand ideas from fishing tackle jewelry to custom-created hats with built in sunglasses in hopes of winning the grand prize of a \$100 donation to help start their business, said Alvarez. Each project was vetted for age level and appropriateness.

Alvarez said the competition is more than just winning the grand prize, but a learning tool for the students to incorporate school subjects they have been taught for the past 4 years.

"Each design encompassed how (the student) integrated subjects such as math, science, writing, and reading," said Alvarez.

Another benefit of the competition is a creative outlet for students to learn how to work with others, learn authentic business practices and put themselves into their product.

"I enjoy being creative, and I wanted to see how far I could go with my ideas," said Talen Silvas, 11, who won the competition with his product – individual, homemade peanut butter and jelly slices.

Silvas said Alvarez, his teacher and others students were very supportive of his idea, which he calls "The Good Stuff."

"Other students have been very encouraging, my teacher is supportive and my principle even gave me a few ideas on packaging the product," said Silvas.

Silvas said he was most thankful to the judges and to all the members from CCAD who help support Kolda at different events.

Army Chief Warrant Officer 4 Andrew Gardner, test pilot, CCAD, and frequent Kolda volunteer, said he enjoys being able to support the school and see how creative students can be.

"I was honored to be here and help the children out," said Gardner. "The (projects) were crazy. The 'Good Stuff' idea blew my mind."

Gardner said he was there to encourage the students, but ended up finding himself encouraged as most of the products developed where about giving back to campaigns such as anti-bullying, cleaning up state parks and donating to wounded warriors.

"I'm glad these children think about others," said Gardner. "I think it is great schools are teaching our children about giving back and charitable organizations."

Each student was encouraged to continue their pursuit of marketing and selling their products, even if they didn't place in the competition. This includes expanding their brand or creating new ideas.

"Don't ever give up... run with your ideas and keep expanding," said Gardner.









CCAD visits career fair, seeks prospects

Some current hard-to-fill positions at the depot include financial management, engineers, chemists, flight test pilots, information technology, and welders.

San Antonio resident, Nelson Brenner, said he came to the career fair looking for a position as a budget analyst and was able to be interviewed for one.

With such results, Brenner said career fairs like this are a great opportunity for job seekers and hopes to visit others in the future. I think the Career Fair was very efficient and well organized, if they have more in the future I will come," said Brenner.

Like Brenner, Reyes said the fair was a success and that CCAD had received a lot of interest from good, prospective candidates. The depot is scheduled to take part in multiple fairs throughout the year.
