# Wing reservists return from deployment

Air Force Reserve Citizen Airmen and several C-130J Super Hercules aircraft from the 403rd Wing have returned from a deployment to Southwest Asia in support of Operations Freedom Sentinel and Inherent Resolve.

Aircrew from the 815th Airlift Squadron, maintainers from the 803rd Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, and support personnel from the 403rd Wing were assigned to the 379th Air Expeditionary Wing, Al Udeid Air Base, Qatar.

The 815th AS, better known as the Flying Jennies, provided combat airdrop and airlift and aeromedical evacuation support to operations throughout the U.S. Central Command's area of responsibility.

"In all the deployments I've been on with the 815th, we went more places in the area of responsibility than we ever have before," said Lt. Col. Keith Gibson, who commanded the 746th Air Expeditionary Squadron there. "It was good for our young Airmen to see such a variety of airfields and different tactical situations. They did an outstanding job."

The 746th AES made Air Force history during the event when they did a two-ship formation airdrop with the 774th EAS, an active duty squadron at Bagram Air Field, Afghanistan, providing supplies to a Resolute Support Expeditionary Advisory Package in Afghanistan earlier this month.

This was the first time two separate units in two countries came together for a single combat airdrop mission, said Gibson.

The return from this deployment was vastly different from when the Flying Jennies returned from their deployment in 2014. The unit was scheduled to close at the end of that year. However, the Secretary of the Air Force reversed that recommendation in 2015.

"From the time we got the news that the 815th was staying open to declaring fully operational capable in November of 2017 was only 18 months," said Gibson.

"Rebuilding the 815th in such a short time was a Herculean effort by the entire squadron, and is simply amazing," he added. "These guys have absolutely rocked it and done a terrific job. We have shown that the 815th is back in business."

# **Command chief concludes 30-year career**

After 30 years of taking care of Airmen and serving his country, Chief Master Sgt. Christopher Barnby said farewell to the 403rd Wing and Air Force Reserve during a retirement ceremony today at 9 a.m. in the Fuel Cell at Keesler Air Force Base.

The command chief has served as the advisor to the 403rd Wing commander on matters of welfare, readiness, morale, proper utilization and professional development of the wing's 1,400 enlisted members since 2014.

"He has had an impact," said retired Col. Michael Manion, former 403rd Wing commander and vice commander who presided over the retirement ceremony.

The chief served as his command chief here and as his first sergeant at the 908th Operational Support Squadron commander at Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama.

"He is a tremendous person who is very humble," said Manion. "I have the deepest respect for all you have done. It is a sad day. We are losing a great one, but I know he has worked hard to mentor the next generation."

The chief joined the Air Force Reserve a year after graduating high school in 1988.

He was an F-15 crew chief with the 402nd Combat Logistics Support Squadron, at Robins AFB, Georgia. Three years later he deployed in support of Operation Desert Storm as an aircraft battle damage repairman. He returned to his unit where he then served as an ABDR instructor and evaluator, an assistant team chief, and later as a quality assurance assistant superintendent with the 622nd CLSS until 2005. town's hospitals. It was here that he found his focus, discovering how much he liked the medical career field.

"At that point I started look-

ing into options to take my education forward into the Army. They offered the option of using the G.I. Bill after your initial enlistment," said Hansen. He enlisted in the Army in 1975, just shortly after the end of the Vietnam War, and served as a company-grade medic at Walter Reid National Military Medical Center, Maryland, until his separation in 1978. He noted how much he enjoyed serving and helping people there.

"I really just enjoyed taking care of people. It was very rewarding," said Hansen. "I've always been very comfortable with what we do in the medical career field, take caring of our wounded and injured warriors."

### **AIR FORCE FIRST FOR FLYING JENNIES**

In the mountainous terrain of Afghanistan two U.S. C-130J Hercules aircraft airdropped over 30 Container Delivery System bundles to a Resolute Support Expeditionary Advisory Package, May 4.

Unlike previous combat airdrop missions, this dual-formation airdrop was executed by two geographically separated units, the 774th Expeditionary Airlift Squadron an active-duty squadron, located at Bagram Air-



field, Afghanistan, and the 746th Expeditionary Airlift Squadron, the U.S. Air Force Reserve's 815th Airlift Squadron deployed to Al Udeid Air Base, Qatar.

"The uniqueness about this mission is that it's two separate units, stationed in two separate countries, coming together for a single airdrop, which to my knowledge has never been done before in combat in this country," said U.S. Air Force Lt. To promote this message, an Air Force Reserve Hurricane Hunter aircrew with their WC-130J Super Hercules and a team of National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration hurricane experts visited five Gulf Coast cities as part of this year's Hurricane Awareness Tour May 7-11.

"We enjoy taking part in the Hurricane Awareness Tour each year because it highlights the vital role the squadron has in gathering data for NHC forecasts," said Col. Brian May, 403rd Operations Group commander. "What the Hurricane Hunters do strengthens relationships with our meteorological services, civil protection agencies, elected officials, and media partners that all work in a collaborative effort to enhance public awareness during hurricane season."

However, even with a perfect forecast, the storms still come, said Ken Graham, the new NHC director who was the meteorologist in charge at the National Weather Service in Slidell, Louisiana for years.

"That is why we are here," Graham said. "It's all about preparedness; it's about being ready for the next storm. Whether it's a busy season or not a busy season it only takes one storm." Click here to read more.

# Air Force transitions to single combat uniform

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Air Force leaders announced the service will move to a single combat utility uniform, adopting the Operational Camouflage Pattern, or OCP, already in use by the Army and Airmen in combat zones and in certain jobs across the Air Force.

Starting Oct. 1, 2018, Airmen who have serviceable OCPs may wear the uniform, and Airmen can purchase OCPs at Army and Air Force Exchange Services at the following unstore locations: Aviano Air Base, Italy; Charleston Air Force Base, South Carolina; Shaw Air Force Base, South Carolina; and MacDill Air Force Base, Florida. These initial locations will allow uniform manufacturers to produce additional stocks for other locations, eventually outfitting the total force in the coming months.

A 403rd Wing policy is in coordination. The Wing will not be purchasing any replacement or additional items if members have an unserviceable set until they become available through the Kentucky Logistics Operations Center.

# Retired AF rated officers can return to active duty

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RANDOLPH, Texas (AFNS) -- Retired Air Force rated officers with Air Force Specialty Codes 11X-pilot, 12X-combat systems officer or 13B-air battle manager are encouraged to apply for the Voluntary Retired Return to Active Duty Program to help alleviate manning shortages within the Air Force rated community.

Also eligible to apply are current Air Force rated officers in those AFSCs with an approved retirement order. Officers serving on active duty under the 2017 VRRAD program whose tour lengths are limited to 12 months may apply for tour extensions. Click here to read more.

# CAREER ASSISTANCE? CAA CAN HELP

The 403rd Wing received an inquiry, courtesy of the Wing Suggestion Box, about enlistment bonuses being backlogged due to 403rd Force Support Squadron manning. The suggestion was to have a dedicated person authorized to process enlistment bonuses.

The wing hired Master Sgt. Tracey Riley, as the fulltime Wing career assistance advisor. She is the focal point of the career retention program for the wing and principal advisor to commanders and supervisors on force management and professional enhancement. The wing career assistance advisor is the base-level office of primary responsibility for the reenlistment and extension process, selective retention process, enlisted/officer incentive program, participation, trend analysis, and career enhancing programs.
