

On 10 May 1816, a detachment of troops from the U.S. 8th Infantry landed on Arsenal Island and immediately began building. Upon completion the fort at Rock Island was named Fort Armstrong after John Armstrong, who had served in the Revolutionary War. Part of a larger chain of forts to protect the frontier, and built on top the 25' to 30' high bluffs on the northwest portion of the island, the fort was strategically placed to control both channels of the Mississippi River. In 1817, the army assigned Major Stephen H. Long, a topographical engineer, the task of charting the river. On 2 August 1817, Major Long wrote in his journal probably the best description of Fort Armstrong. After providing a technical overview of the fort, he wrote: "the whole combines a degree of taste and elegance worthy of imitation at all other military posts in this part of the country". The replica Blockhouse 1 was erected in 1916 and sits about 40 feet off the original site.

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
