

As many of you are aware, the agreement between the governments of the United States and Iraq require combat forces to withdraw from Iraqi cities by 01 July, and in response our construction missions are further and further out of the city as we prepare life support and force protection for expanding bases. #### Tension Headaches

This is the most common type of headache and is caused by stress. It is located at the base of the skull/top of the neck.

#### Here are some things that help:

- If possible, stop what you are doing and try to relax.
- Massage shoulders, neck, jaw and scalp.
- Take a hot bath or shower. Lie down.
- Place a warm or cold cloth, whichever feels better, over the aching area.

Biofeedback training or counseling for chronic headaches is available. For jobs requiring long hours of sitting, be sure to get up and move around at least once an hour. OTC Tylenol, ibuprofen, or aspirin are acceptable medications to relieve the pain of these headaches. The most important factor is to limit the sources of stress.

#### JOINT CONCRETE TRAINING WITH IRAQI ARMY



Sgt. James Jones, concrete squad leader, 46th Engineer Combat Battalion (Heavy), a native of Columbia, S.C., and his squad spent the morning of 15 May training the 6th Iraqi Army Engineers on how to conduct concrete missions and use the concrete module. The concrete module is a mobile concrete factory, and the training gave the IA engineers the necessary skills to conduct concrete construction missions and make road repairs.

The Iraqi Soldiers were quick to step up when the opportunity arose to get hands-on experience. They took turns operating the controls, getting on top of the concrete module to push the sand and gravel, and smoothing out the concrete in the holes.

"The Iraqis were really motivated to learn how we do things," stated Pvt. Ryan Doak, concrete and asphalt specialist, 46th ECB (H), from Eugene, Ore. "After the first couple holes they were pretty much running the show."

Once the initial training was completed, the Equipment Platoon of Headquarters and Support Company, 46th ECB (H), worked alongside the Iraqi Army Engineers to set twenty-four bases for solar light poles. They worked in the blazing heat, and managed to finish them all in one day.

After completing the training and solar light mission, the Iraqi Soldiers invited the Army Engineers to lunch to enjoy fellowship with their new comrades. The Iraqi engineers prepared a curry chicken and rice dish that was a new experience for many of the American Soldiers.

Working with the Iraqis Engineers, known as Jundi, has been both challenging and rewarding and our Soldiers have pioneered the best practices to make the training effective.






