

Field feeding academy helps combat cooks sustain Soldiers

Soldiers with the 287th Quartermaster Field Feeding Company, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, attended a Field Feeding Academy Oct. 28 to Nov. 1 on Fort Stewart.

“We are taking this thing to a new level, proving that we are more than just 92 Golfs (Culinary Specialist), but that we are combat cooks and we are here to stay,” said 1st. Sgt. Fenecia Council, first sergeant of 287th QM FFC.

The five-day training was broken down with two days of training on equipment and two days of non-commissioned officer-led, hands-on training and certifications.

“We’re working on platoon level leadership and for sergeants and below to build confidence and knowledge with field feeding equipment,” said Council. “The reason we train is to increase Soldier’s confidence in their job and to become more proficient in field feeding.”

For Soldiers new to the culinary specialist field the academy was also a chance to receive training in a non-demanding environment on equipment and procedures they may not be familiar with.

“Going over the AK, better known as the assault kitchen, was refreshing,” said Pfc. Ryan T. Smith with 287th QM FFC. “I’m glad that we are going over these pieces of equipment some of my battles never knew how they operated.”

Soldiers that usually work in the Marne

Bistro dining facility were also able to experience different aspects of their job.

“I liked the different equipment, I have never worked on a combat kitchen or assault kitchen before and I enjoyed the experience,” said Spc. Dania J. Castro, a culinary specialist with 287th QM FFC.

The last day of the academy finished with a wing cook off competition among six squads judged by the Sustainment Brigade’s senior leaders.

The teams were tasked to create a wing dish using a small range of components cooked on an M59 field range in under an hour and a half. At the end, only one team could prove victorious with team six finishing ahead of the others and winning a three-day pass from the brigade commander.

The runners up were awarded Certificates of Achievement.

In the end, the five days of training will better prepare the 287th Soldiers for their upcoming role to ‘Feed the Rock’ during the upcoming Marne Focus training exercise.

Raider Soldiers work together, stay ready to fight

Soldiers and leaders from across the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, continue to work together to support one another through Company Situation Training Exercises on Fort Stewart, Oct. 12-29.

The mechanized infantry and tank companies have been hard at work, conducting STX lanes and prepar-

ing for Marne Focus, which is a brigade wide training event here on Fort Stewart.

With the help and support from neighboring units within in the brigade, each battalion is able to train their companies, and enhance the overall training value.

Capt. Ryan McCullough, the commander of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 3rd Battalion, 69th Armored Regiment, 1ABCT, is serving as the defense lane's observer coach trainer for the

other battalions. He said the companies are evaluated on three different lanes, movement to contact, deliberate attack and the defense lane.

"It's my job to evaluate commanders in the maneuver companies. I am tasked with the defense lane, and what is different about this lane is we have engineer support for survivability positions," McCullough said. "Each company is given one blade team with two D7 dozers for eight hours, and that team can construct battle positions and obstacles for the defense lane."

The D7 dozer team consisted of engineers from the 10th Brigade Engineer Battalion, 1ABCT. These teams constructed turret defilade battle positions for 1st Battalion, 64th Armored Regiment, 1ABCT, so the tanks can be completely hidden from the enemy, and protected from direct and indirect fire. The term defilade refers to the depth at which the battle position was dug.

As the companies of 1ABCT continue to work and train hard, consistent support is an absolute necessity.

"The most challenging part in terms of the overall mission is logistics, maintenance and getting what we need without impeding on our planning and execution," said Capt. Benjamin Novak, the commander of Company A, 1-64 Armor, 1ABCT. "Our slant has held up well, I have a really good maintenance team, they have been getting after it and keeping the fleet going."

The Soldiers and leaders of 1ABCT will continue to push and train hard in the upcoming weeks here at Fort Stewart. These exercises will play a large role in the preparation and execution of operations in 1ABCT's upcoming rotation through the National Training Center on Fort Irwin, California.

Education benefits transferability change

All actively serving members of the armed forces who have 16 or more years of service will no longer be able to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits to their dependents. This new restriction was put in place per change 1 to DoDI 1341.13, Post-9/11 GI Bill, dated Friday. As a result of this change, Army National Guard Soldiers are highly encouraged to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits as soon as they become eligible (not flagged, have six or more years of service, and at least one eligible dependent in DEERS) to avoid missing out on this extremely generous family benefit. Military training saves lives

The U.S. Army teaches and certifies Soldiers how to perform basic life support skills through the Combat Lifesaver course. Though the course is intended to give intermediate medical attention to casualties until a skilled combat medic arrives, these skills obtained can also be used outside the battlefield.

Providers with the Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, attend courses to master the basics by conducting Combat

Lifesaver Training in conjunction to other field exercises to ensure they are proficient.

As a Sustainment Brigade, rotational deployments to hostile environments are common so, Providers learn the importance of obtaining and maintaining lifesaving skills.

“This is important because it allows Soldiers to perform immediate lifesaving intervention to better a casualty’s chances of survival,” said Pfc. Brennan J. Johnson, a healthcare specialist, with Headquarters and Headquarters Company, STB, 3IDSB.

The combat lifesaver course provided real-world benefit for Staff Sgt. Daniel Blanchard, a petroleum

supply specialist and section sergeant with 135th Quartermaster Company, 87th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 3IDSB.

Blanchard witnessed the aftermath of a car accident with victims in a vehicle that was on fire. Upon arriving at the intersection with the burning vehicle, Blanchard saw many people standing around filming the incident, but nobody acting to save the victims.

“The thing that helped me is with the military we are trained to react not to wait,” said Blanchard. “I had guests from Germany and Denmark in my car and they said ‘they turned to see what should we do and you were already running to the truck.’ So, of

course you don’t think about that at the time. You just worry about getting people out.”

Blanchard rendered medical aid to those involved in the accident using the skills he obtained before and during the military.

“It’s all basic first aid training concerning with bleeding wounds, but primarily concerns with head injuries due to the accident,” said Blanchard. “It’s a matter of ensuring the bleeding is under control, and then treating secondary injuries like concussions and treating for shock.”

Blanchard stayed on the scene rendering aid until emergency medical services arrived and took over. His actions may have made the difference for the people involved in the accident.

“These are lifesaving skills that can be performed before a medic arrives, making time needed for the medic to stabilize the patient drastically shorter if they are performed correctly,” said Spc. Andrew B. Hester, a healthcare specialist and former EMT, with HHC, STB, 3IDSB.

Combat lifesaver courses and refresher courses offered may be used to save a battle buddy on the battlefield, or like Blanchard, the skills learned in the military can become useful off the battlefield.

Georgia declares drought response

On Oct. 18, the Director of the Georgia Environmental Protection Division, Richard E. Dunn, declared a Level 1 drought response for 103 Georgia counties, which includes Liberty and Chatham counties.

The EPD has been monitoring climatic indicators and water supply conditions to assess drought severity throughout Georgia.

It was determined that Liberty, Chatham, and 101 other counties in Georgia are facing severe to extreme drought conditions.

As a result, all Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield activities and residents are asked to be mindful of water use both indoors and outdoors and be good stewards of water resources.

General outdoor watering is only allowed between the hours of 4 p.m. and 10 a.m. Furthermore, all installation water users are asked to be good stewards of our water resources. Please check for leaks, inside and outside, and place service orders when needed. Please do

not leave the tap running and only wash full loads of laundry/dishes.

Everyone at Stewart-Hunter must continue to do their part by conserving water which, in turn, conserves energy.

Did you know, only 1% of water on earth can be used for drinking?

So, changing our water use habits in ways that will help the resource sustain itself is important not only for ourselves and for the animals and plants upon which we depend for food, but also for future generations.

The outlook continues to brighten for our water supply but we need to continue conserving to help eliminate drought conditions for the state and to help us all in the future.

DoDEA schools best in the U.S.

ALEXANDRIA, Virginia -- Fourth and eighth-grade students attending Department of Defense Education Activity schools led the nation in scoring on the 2019 National Assessment of Educational Progress Reading Assessment and fourth-grade Mathematics Assessment.

DoDEA ranked second in the 2019 NAEP 8th Grade Mathematics Assessment. This year's fourth and eighth-grade student performance builds on DoDEA's strong showing in 2017 on the NAEP Reading and Mathematics Assessments.

DoDEA students' average scale scores ranged from 10 to 18 percentage points higher than corresponding national average scores, and mostly increased while national average scores mostly decreased.

"I am extremely proud of our students' performance on the 2019 NAEP Reading and Mathematics Assessments,"

said DoDEA Director, Thomas M. Brady. "The dedication and hard work of our teachers and administrators, along with the implementation of a rigorous College and Career Ready Curriculum, improved on the already impressive performance by DoDEA students on the 2017 NAEP."

"In 2019, DoDEA had the highest performance among black and Hispanic students of any state or jurisdiction. This resulted in us having the smallest statistical gaps in average score between white and black or white and Hispanic students on the NAEP. Given this continuing success, we believe that our commitment to providing a world class education to military-connected students, along with the DoD commitment to families, will allow us to continue to focus our emphasis on equity in our strategic plan and eventually eliminate achievement gaps in our system," said Brady.

Winn cessation program intervenes nicotine usage

With increased concern regarding nicotine use, U.S. Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield, Winn Army Community Hospital Commander, Col. Michelle Munroe, supported the use of the Lean Six Sigma black belt process to improve the frequency of nicotine cessation interventions provided to patients using a nicotine product.

A nicotine cessation intervention is considered advice provided in the primary care setting, nicotine cessation medication being prescribed, or a referral to a nicotine cessation program.

The LSS-BB team, was led by Winn ACH psychologist, Maj. Michel Celestin, and Warrior Transition Battalion's, Dr. Heather Saari, a clinical pharmacist. The team also included substance abuse counselor, Vernon Harris, Diane Carlton and Marilyn Johns, tobacco cessation counselors from Army Public Health Nursing and Dr. Marjorie Freeze, 3rd Infantry Division, with facilitation of the project by Anita Sachs, LSS-BB.

As the team gathered data, they found when a nicotine user was identified, only 26% of the time, was the user provided a nicotine cessation intervention. The team also discovered, in addition to Army Public Health Nursing's 12-week nicotine cessation program, there were two other nicotine cessation programs of

varying lengths being provided. Therefore, the two main goals of the project were to standardize the nicotine cessation program and to increase the percent of nicotine users receiving an intervention.

The team focused on the research which revealed that although nicotine cessation counseling and nicotine cessation medication are effective, the combination is more effective than either alone. Thereby using well established evidence based guidelines, the team recommended a standardized four-week program that includes both counseling and medication for nicotine users who want nicotine cessation medication. Once the four-week program is completed, a former user is able to attend any nicotine cessation session for continued support and maintenance of the success of quitting.

To further improve the efficiency and the success of the project, the team reached out to subject matter experts in the medical record coding, information management, central appointing and primary care departments at MEDDAC on Stewart-Hunter. Those involved in the project are said to be excited about the prospect of being able to develop an efficient and effective process to help nicotine users quit for good.

Sachs said, one of the most exciting aspects about the program is participants are not required to attend a cessation session at a specific location. If the days

and times at one location are more convenient for a particular program participant, they can attend their four sessions at that location. The next program starts at Winn ACH on Wednesday, Nov. 20 at 3 p.m.

Beginning early January, three additional program options will be offered. One addition day at Winn (Tuesdays at 10 a.m.) and at Tuttle Army Health Clinic or Richmond Hill Medical Home on Thursdays at 10 a.m. To help make access to a nicotine cessation program as easy as possible, there is no referral required and to book an appointment call 435-6633.

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MHS Nurse Advice Line is a call or click away

Services include reach, web chat, video chat

Late on a cold night in January, a worried mother picked up her phone and made a call. Her 5-year-old child had been vomiting on and off for three hours, she told the registered nurse.

The nurse was reassuring, and thorough. After asking the mother several questions, the nurse determined the child didn't need immediate medical attention. The mother felt relieved, and followed the nurse's directions to keep the child comfortable and hydrated while also looking for worsening symptoms or lack of improvement.

This is the MHS Nurse Advice Line in action. Approximately 44 mothers and fathers of infants reach out each day, with 40 percent of all inquiries pediatric-related. Typical concerns relate to colds, rashes, fever, and stomach ailments. The free, 24/7 advice line helps ensure the health and well-being of beneficiaries while reducing unnecessary emergency room and urgent care visits that can strain resources and cause longer wait times for all patients.

As of April 1, 2018 the MHS Nurse Advice Line expand-

ed to include additional health care support services. The advice line is available by phone, web chat or video chat to beneficiaries who are anywhere in the world with a military treatment facility – including Guam, Puerto Rico, Cuba, South Korea, and Japan. Previously, availability was limited to phone calls in fewer locations. Since expanded services began, web chat has been a popular option.

Along with getting answers to questions and receiving health care advice, beneficiaries can use the service to: find a doctor in a particular area; schedule appointments within 24 hours at military hospitals and clinics; get information about self-care; and, learn about symptoms to watch. If deemed appropriate, and their command approves, beneficiaries may also receive sick slips for school or work. For those who are enrolled to a military hospital or clinic, the MHS Nurse Advice Line will also notify the patient's medical home team.

Notice: TRICARE open season is two days away

TRICARE open season is the annual period when you can enroll in or change your health plan for the next year. The 2019 TRICARE open season begins Nov. 11 and ends Dec. 9, where you can:

Do nothing. If you want to stay in your current TRICARE health care plan, you don't have to take any action. You'll continue your current health plan through 2020 or as long as you're eligible.

Enroll in a plan. If you're eligible for a TRICARE Prime option or TRICARE Select but not enrolled, you can enroll in a plan now.

Change plans. If you're enrolled in a TRICARE Prime option, or TRICARE Select, you can switch plans, individual and family enrollment.

What happens if I don't take any action? If you aren't already in a plan and don't enroll in a plan, you'll only be eligible for care at a military hospital or clinic if space is available.

Outside of TRICARE open season, you can enroll in or change enrollment to TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select following a qualifying life event.

A QLE is a certain change in your life, such as marriage, birth of a child, or retirement from active duty, which may mean different TRICARE options are available to you. A TRICARE QLE opens a 90-day

period for you to make eligible enrollment changes. A QLE for one Family member means all family members may make enrollment changes. For more, visit www.tricare.mil/lifeevents.

You may be eligible to enroll in a dental or vision plan through the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program. The FEDVIP open season is separate from TRICARE's, but occurs at the same time, Nov. 11 through Dec. 9.

You can enroll in, change, or cancel a FEDVIP dental and/or vision plan during the open season or after experiencing FEDVIP QLE. Remember, FEDVIP QLEs may be different from the TRICARE QLEs. For a complete list of FEDVIP QLEs, visit www.benefeds.com.

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CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Living up to the Army Values

The fear of the Lord teaches a man wisdom, and humility comes before honor. Proverbs 15:33

The word honor is difficult to concisely define. The Army defines it “live up to the Army Values.”

At first that glance that seems somewhat redundant, but it reminds me of the big, fat yellow highlighter I used on my college textbooks. I would mark the portions of the text I deemed most critical to remember so that when I reviewed the material in preparation for a test, I could easily identify the most important points. Honor, in relation to the other core values, means saying, “Underline, highlight, and increase the font size – this is what you need to know (and to be) in order to make the grade.” A logical progression would place honor as the concluding Army value. But, let’s face it; acronym aesthetics prefers LDRSHIP over LDRSIPH.

Perhaps the closest synonym for “honor” as we use it is “reputation”. The latter term is somewhat neutral though, while honor almost always speaks of something positive. Honor is, however, somewhat relative to the set of values by which one is evaluated. In the Proverb cited above, the writer assumes God as the source of true honor. Our proper attitude toward God is reverence (that which is meant by fear). That which hinders our reverence for and understanding of God is our own human arrogance. Hence, the prerequisite for honor is given – humility. In other words, if one desires an excellent reputation in the sight of God that which

is most needed is to acknowledge ones dependence upon God. James wrote, “Humble yourselves in the presence of the Lord, and He will exalt you.”

As Soldiers, we accept the Army values as the standard by which our characters should be measured. We acknowledge that our values differ from our larger culture, and we say to our fellow Soldiers, “Judge my reputation according our values.” This is what we mean when we refer to honor.

Honor is the concluding word in one of America’s most important documents. Having asserted what a legitimate government should be, outlined grievances against the King of Great Britain, documented his tyrannical responses to previous petitions, and finally declared independence, the Declaration of Independence concludes:

And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor.

The 56 signers of the declaration realized their potential sacrifices were huge. If it didn’t work out, they could be dead or broke, and perhaps even worse, remembered forever as foolish rebels. But they were committed to the values of liberty, and they personified what French philosopher Michel de Montaigne wrote about two centuries earlier, “Any person of honor chooses rather to lose his honor than to lose his conscience.” One of them, lacking a fat yellow highlighter, even emphasized it by signing his name in really, really big script. Maybe that is how we should define honor – it means putting our “John Hancock” to all the Army Values.

Community members return home to Pleasant Grove

Members of Hinesville's Pleasant Grove African Methodist Episcopal Church gathered on the grounds their ancestors settled in the 1800s on what is now Fort Stewart for the biennial camp meeting, Nov. 2.

Pleasant Grove was part of the overall Taylors Creek Community and was home to a wooden church and a one-room school house. Residents made their living harvesting the hardwood of the live oak trees, and producing pine resin and turpentine to export for shipbuilding.

Residents were had to leave their homes in 1941 when the government purchased the land to create Camp Stewart - an anti-aircraft training center prior to entering World War II. Most moved to nearby Liberty County, Hinesville and Allenhurst where they rebuilt their community's and churches.

Fort Stewart-Hunter Garrison Commander Col. Bryan Logan participated in the ceremony and wreath laying and was received warmly by those gathered.

He said a few words remarking 'that it's always good to have a place to come home, and once we stop that [coming home] it's lost.'

Installation Chaplain Lt. Col. David Beavers also participated and remarked 'we must never forget those who came before us and to remember their lives and their stories, and what they faced and overcame.'

Following the ceremony participants laid a wreath at the headstone of the church founder Rev. Piner Martin.

Pleasant Grove members gather once every other year to reconnect with one another and to remember where their ancestors came from. This year they are celebrating the 150th year anniversary of the church founding in 1869.

Soldiers hit the mat with combatives tournament at Johnson Fitness Center, Nov. 19 to 21. The tournament is a single elimination tournament with weigh-in and screening starting Nov. 18.

The east side of Donovan Field becomes the flag football gridiron Nov. 18 and 20 in a single elimination tournament played in two 20-minute halves.

In an event where Soldiers are sure to get dirty, the Marne Mudder requires teams to safely and successfully maneuver their members in heats of five teams every 30 minutes. The start and finish line is at the Cottrell Field Quick Track parking lot. Each team needs to report 30 minutes prior to their heat.

The Functional Fitness event is a three-day competition Nov. 19-21 at Thunder Field; which includes the Army Combat Fitness Test on day 1, an endurance challenge on day 2 and Soldiers skills assessments on day 3.

A single elimination basketball tournament is scheduled at Newman Fitness Center Nov. 19-20 where teams of no less than five players face off in standard bracket competition.

The annual golf tournament has four-person teams playing best ball. Teams can register at Taylors Creek, but the competition is at the Hunter Golf Course, 9 a.m. Nov. 19. The cost is \$30 per team; which includes cart, green fees and range balls. Check-in is 7:30 a.m. Walk-ons will fill team cancellations or no shows.

Dodgeball is also featured at Newman Fitness Center at the tennis courts, Nov. 19. The event is single elimination with 15 minute matches – best two of three matches. Teams can consist of Soldiers and spouses.

A bowling tournament with up to 30 four-person teams will be held at Marne Lanes Nov. 19 and 20. The game cost \$2 per game. The first round is covered by the bowlers, subsequent rounds will be covered by the USO. Shoes and bowling balls are available at no charge.

The softball tournament is scheduled to take place 8 a.m. Nov. 20 and 21 at the Bennett Softball Complex. The event is a seven-inning, single elimination. The eight-run rule is in effect. Games will not exceed 60 minutes each.

Soccer is Nov. 20-21 at the Hunter soccer field off Duncan Drive, near Tominac Fitness Center. The games will have two 20-minute halves.

A 200-meter swimming relay is at Newman Fitness Center, Nov. 20. It features teams of four, racing four legs - back, breast, fly and free style. Each team member is required to swim one leg.

A 5K race is Nov. 20 with three-person teams to run 5K starting in the vicinity of 15th Street and McFarland Avenue. A safety brief will be held at 8:15 a.m.

A 10K race starts in the vicinity of 15th Street and Tilton Avenue at 6 a.m. Nov. 21. Three members from each battalion will complete the 10K and have their times added to determine ranking.

Soccer-Tennis is Nov. 20-21 at Newman Fitness Center with six person teams in a best of three matches for normal play to 13 points; best of five for the finals.

The 3rd ID Family Day starts at noon Nov. 21 at Cottrell Field. The day includes interactive displays with games, food, music, fellowship and a movie on the lawn at 6 p.m. – Spiderman: Far from Home.

A spouse kick-ball tournament is on the field behind the IHG Army Hotels on Fort Stewart. The event is single elimination, three outs per inning. Including an eight-run rule. Games last no longer than 45 minutes each. Family members 16 and older can play.

Ultimate Frisbee is Nov. 20-21 on the west-end of Donovan Field, near the Winn Parking lot. The event is single elimination with two 15-minute halves.

The tug-o-war is Nov. 21 at the Quick Track, across from Newman Fitness Center. The event includes teams of six persons each.

A color run for Soldiers and Family members starts at the Quick Track at 4 p.m. Nov. 21. Colored chalk will be blown at the runners at various points along the run.
