# RED JERSEYS BUILD WARHEADS TO STAY LETHAL

Deep in the magazines of the aircraft carrier USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69), where stacks of ordnance line reinforced bulkheads, a group of Sailors clad in red jerseys can be found hard at work long after taps.

Each night during Tailored Ship's Training Availability and Final Evaluation Problem (TSTA/ FEP), the Sailors of weapons department's G-3 division have built the ordnance the squadrons need to train and stay lethal.

Until Ike's ammunition onload Aug. 12-15, the magazines were empty for nearly two years as the ship underwent its Planned Incremental Availability (PIA). As a result, weapons department is training up what Senior Chief Aviation Ordnanceman Angel Berrios described as a pretty green crew.

"It's been a while since many of us have seen ordnance, and it's many Sailors' first time," said Berrios. "But this is the perfect chance to knock out the kinks as we find our battle rhythm."



Each night, G-3 receives a load plan based on the flight plan for the following day; so a busy day on the flight deck means a busy night below decks.

"It's a lot of work," said Berrios. "But it allows the squadrons to train to operate with a payload; and weapons department is here to support that mission."

With each bomb built, Ike becomes more capable and prepared to answer the nation's call. Working side-by-side with the ship's crew, Carrier Air Wing (CVW) 3 and Destroyer Squadron (DESRON) 26, weapons department has assured Ike's lethality and is more than ready to meet the demands of the mission.



Sailors, like Airman Casey Sinclair, are enjoying the change of pace as they transition from maintaining empty magazines to building bombs.

"It's been great for me because I'm a hands-on learner," said Sinclair. "When all you're doing is looking at books, it can be tough to connect the dots, but the second you get your hands on it, it all makes sense."

Bombs don't come pre-assembled because of the risks posed by highly-explosive ordnance, according to Berrios. Because of this, they must be assembled by well-trained technicians in a controlled environment.

"Night check provides the ideal time for that because there's less movement throughout the ship," said Berrios. "So, we man it with people we trust. People with a mature, positive attitude who we know will do it right."

That very attitude is what Airman Sinclair strives for. He said he takes a great deal of pride in participating in the nightly bomb builds. As an undesignated Airman, he found it an honor to be trusted with such a sensitive and important task.

Berrios said that trust is built over time as Sailors train and study their craft before they ever get their hands on the bombs.

## **IKE: RESTOCKED AND LOADED**

Sailors aboard the aircraft carrier USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69) line the edges of the flight deck and peer out from the hangar bay as the fleet replenishment oiler USNS Leroy Grumman (T-AO 195) pulls alongside Ike, Sept. 23.

Lines are shot between the two ships and soon fuel begins to flow as supplies are flown over. Once the transfer of supplies begins, Sailors all over the ship go into action, doing everything from testing JP-5 fuel samples to moving cargo. By the end of the replenishmentat-sea (RAS), just over one million gallons of fuel and 92 pallets of supplies have been transferred to Ike.

"Every department plays a role during a RAS," said Chief Culinary Specialist

Lonnell Neely, food production chief aboard Ike. "To complete a RAS the ship as a whole has to come together as a team and focus on operating safely and efficiently."

Ike has been conducting various exercises and test in preparation for its upcoming deployment. With Ike operating at full strength, the need for more supplies increases.

"Being able to complete a RAS is an essential part of Ike being ready to deploy," said Neely. "We need to be able to get the materials needed around the ship while at sea. Today's successful RAS was just another example of Ike showing it's ready to deploy." Ike's flight deck has been constantly

busy with the launching and recovering

of aircraft while the Sailors below decks have been doing their part to keep Ike at peak performance.

"Today we brought on approximately a million gallons of fuel," said Aviation Boatswain's Mate (Fuels) 3rd Class Christian Cruz, V-4 training petty officer. "It's important that we have and are able to receive fuel while at sea in order to complete our overall mission of launching and recovering aircraft. With all the equipment being used around the ship while out to sea, fuel is one of the most important things we can have as an aircraft carrier."

With Ike receiving these supplies and operating efficiently the crew and ship appear ready to answer the nation's call.

## **INTEL PREPARES FID DC SAILORS FOR A FUTURE AT SEA**

Intelligence department Sailors gather every piece of data they can on potential enemy contacts. The vast amount of intelligence collected aboard the aircraft carrier USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69) and Carrier Strike Group (CSG) 10 is used to inform warfare commanders to make educated decisions on how to act.

Now that Ike is in its final stages of tuning up before deployment, intelligence specialists from Fleet Intelligence Detachment Washington, D.C. (FID DC) have come aboard to receive training from the Sailors of Ike's intel department.

FID DC sends intelligence specialists to carriers for training and to collaborate with different facets of shipboard intel departments to create a more defined intelligence picture.

"Their role is to help us exploit imagery and create a strong intelligence assessment," said Intelligence Specialist 2nd Class Eric Ragland, intel department's leading petty officer. "They do this by being a part of our teams and receiving training they can only get at sea."

One job that FID DC does is multi-sensory interpretation (MSI), where they analyze satellite imagery as well as ship-level imagery of foreign foes to provide indications and warnings of possible maritime threats to the fleet.

"While underway, those of us from MSI have actually been able to train and see our job in action," said Intelligence Specialist 2nd Class Makenzie Trometer, a watch supervisor for the MSI Sailors. "In port, we mainly go over our careers what we should be doing but out here we are actually troubleshooting our systems and equipment, analyzing real imagery and working with real scenarios."

Doing work related to their primary navy enlisted classification (NEC), FID DC Sailors will also work with other aspects related to shipboard intelligence collection.

"We receive training on shipboard aspects that we don't have on shore training

equivalents, such as the ship's nautical or otherwise photographic interpretation and exploitation (SNOOPIE) team, where we help visualize, identify and track any suspicious vessel or aircraft and report on their actions," said Intelligence Specialist 3rd Class Joshua Sarette. "It's working with these teams that allows us to learn more about our job and improve our ability to get the information needed to keep us two steps ahead of the adversary."

While they are receiving training in their job field, the Sailors from FID DC must also learn to live aboard a ship, adjusting their schedules and routines. They also have been able to excel in certain aspects such as getting shipboard qualifications.

"This is the first ship I have been on," said Sarette. "Life here took some getting used to, but once I got into a routine, it got easier. It helped that I also have great coworkers that make these underways just a little bit more fun."

With their outside knowledge, the FID DC Sailors have made an impression on Ike's Intel department.

"I think that this program where these outside intelligence specialists come to us is great," said Ragland. "Without their knowledge I feel like we couldn't do our jobs at the highest level and vice versa. All of us need one another to thrive and support our community."

With the conclusion of Tailored Ships Training Availability and Final Evaluation Problem (TSTA/FEP), the FID DC Sailors will be leaving while Ike goes through a planned maintenance period. However, they will return for future underways and deployment, as they play an important role to Ike's intelligence community by collecting and analyzing valuable intelligence data, and by supporting the various intel department-led teams.




