Be prepared to stay safe and healthy in winter

Winter storms and cold temperatures can be dangerous. Stay safe and healthy by planning ahead. Prepare your home and cars. Prepare for power outages and outdoor activity. Check on older adults.

Although winter comes as no surprise, many of us are not ready for its arrival. If you are prepared for the hazards of winter, you will be more likely to stay safe and healthy when temperatures start to fall.

Take These Steps for Your Home

Many people prefer to remain indoors during winter, but staying inside is no guarantee of safety. Take these steps to keep your home safe and warm during the winter months.

Winterize your home.

- Install weather stripping, insulation, and storm windows.
- Insulate water lines that run along exterior
- Clean out gutters and repair roof leaks.
- Check your heating systems.
- Have your heating system serviced professionally to make sure that it is clean, working properly, and ventilated to the outside.
- Inspect and clean fireplaces and chimneys. ■ Install a smoke detector. Test batteries
- monthly and replace them twice a year. ■ Have a safe alternate heating source and
- alternate fuels available.
- Prevent carbon monoxide (CO) emergencies. Install a CO detector to alert you of the presence of the deadly, odorless, colorless gas. Check batteries when you change your clocks in the fall and spring.

Learn symptoms of CO poisoning: headache, dizziness, weakness, upset stomach, vomiting, chest pain, and confusion.

Don't Forget to Prepare Your Car

Get your car ready for cold weather use before winter arrives:

- Service the radiator and maintain antifreeze level; check tire tread or, if necessary, replace tires with all-weather or snow tires.
- Keep gas tank full to avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines.
- Use a wintertime formula in your wind-

Prepare a winter emergency kit to keep in your car in case you become stranded. The kit should include:

- cell phone, portable charger, and extra batteries;
- blankets:



- food and water;
- booster cables, flares, tire pump, and a bag of sand or cat litter (for traction);
 - compass and maps;
- flashlight, battery-powered radio, and extra batteries:
 - first-aid kit; and
 - plastic bags (for sanitation).

Equip in Advance for Emergencies

Be prepared for weather-related emergencies, including power outages.

- Stock food that needs no cooking or re-
- frigeration and water stored in clean containers. ■ Ensure that your cell phone is fully
- When planning travel, be aware of current and forecast weather conditions.

Keep an up-to-date emergency kit, including:

- Battery-operated devices, such as a flashlight, a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio, and
 - extra batteries;
 - first-aid kit and extra medicine;
 - baby items; and
 - cat litter or sand for icy walkways.
- Protect your family from carbon monoxide. ■ Keep grills, camp stoves, and generators
- out of the house, basement and garage. ■ Locate generators at least 20 feet from the
- - Leave your home immediately if the CO

detector sounds, and call 911.

Take These Precautions Outdoors

Many people spend time outdoors in the winter working, traveling, or enjoying winter sports. Outdoor activities can expose you to several safety hazards, but you can take these steps to prepare for them:

- Wear appropriate outdoor clothing: wear a tightly woven, preferably wind-resistant coat or jacket; inner layers of light, warm clothing; mittens; hats; scarves; and waterproof boots.
- Sprinkle cat litter or sand on icy patches.
- Learn safety precautions to follow when ■ Work slowly when doing outside chores.
- Take a buddy and an emergency kit when
- you are participating in outdoor recreation.
 - Carry a cell phone.

Do This When You Plan to Travel

When planning travel, be aware of current and forecast weather conditions.

- Avoid traveling when the weather service has issued advisories. ■ If you must travel, inform a friend or rela-
- tive of your proposed route and expected time
- Follow these safety rules if you become stranded in your car.
- Make your car visible to rescuers. Tie a brightly colored cloth to the antenna, raise the hood of the car (if it is not snowing), and turn on the inside overhead lights (when your en-

- Move anything you need from the trunk into the passenger area. Stay with your car unless safety is no more than 100 yards away.
- Keep your body warm. Wrap your entire body, including your head, in extra clothing, blankets, or newspapers. Huddle with other people if you can.
- Stay awake and stay moving. You will be less vulnerable to cold-related health problems. As you sit, keep moving your arms and legs to improve circulation and stay warmer.
- Run the motor (and heater) for about 10 minutes per hour, opening one window slightly to let in air. Make sure that snow is not blocking the exhaust pipe—this will reduce the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Above all, be ready to check on family and neighbors who are especially at risk from cold weather hazards: young children, older adults, and the chronically ill. If you have pets, bring them inside. If you cannot bring them inside, provide adequate, warm shelter and unfrozen water to drink.

No one can stop the onset of winter. However, if you follow these suggestions, you will be ready for it when it comes.

Suicide prevention, eliminating the stigma

Behavioral health specialists report depression and suicide ideation rates increase during the holiday season and into the post-holiday period in the Marine Corps, according to the Headquarters Marine Corps Force Preservation Directorate. Marines may feel lonelier during these times as a result of being away from their families and supporters, said Shannon Hutchinson, the 3rd Marine Division behavioral health specialist. Marines then question their belonging and wonder if people would care if they weren't around.

One of the 14 Marine Corps leadership principles states, "know your Marines and look out for their welfare." Hutchinson said leaders should make it a regular practice to talk about taking care of yourselves and each other when it comes to managing stress and everyday issues. She also advised that regular counseling sessions should include discussions about issues other than work, like family, finance and mental health. In order to be "ready to fight tonight" and achieve the Marine Corps mission, Marines must be mentally

and spiritually ready, said Hutchinson.

"The truth is it's your responsibility and part of the commitment you made to the Marine Corps to be ready to handle whatever the Marine Corps needs of you at any time," said Hutchinson. "We perform corrective and preventative maintenance on equipment so why wouldn't we do that for ourselves and our fellow Marines?"

As military members, we're required to attend suicide prevention training to recognize the signs amongst peers and lead them to the appropriate resources, but even then it's difficult to know if someone is actually contemplating suicide unless we truly know that person. According to Commander Salee Oboza, the operational stress control and readiness training clinical provider, the best way to recognize the signs is to get to know your peers and care about their well-being.

"People don't hesitate to help when someone is limping, but people tend to hesitate and turn the other way when someone is having a difficult time with their emotions," said Oboza. "Emotional pain is the same as physical pain, it needs treatment for it to be better."

To defeat the stigma surrounding uti-

lizing mental health resources, Oboza advises Marines to take every suicidal comment seriously and never make fun of the topic. She also encourages commands to invite the providers into work spaces to introduce themselves and their capabilities. Some resources found on base are the Behavioral Health Community Counseling Program and Family Advocacy Program, military and family life counselors, the Families Overcoming Under Stress team, the operational stress control and readiness team, the U.S. Naval Hospital mental health department, the substance abuse control officer and the command chaplain.

"Asking for help will not make you appear weak and/or less of a Marine," said Hutchinson. "You have a role in enhancing overall readiness. Protect yourself and others against behavioral health issues and take action to prevent incidents."

Pioneering oceanographer honored by Navy, American **Geophysical Union**

For his work in the establishment of a new scientific field, Dr. Nicklas Pisias received the Maurice Ewing Medal, sponsored jointly by the U.S. Navy and the American Geophysical Union (AGU).

Pisias, a professor emeritus at Oregon State University, accepted the award at the AGU Fall Meeting in December 2018. Named after Dr. Maurice Ewing, a trailblazing geophysicist and oceanographer, the medal is given yearly to one honoree in recognition of "significant original contributions to the ocean sciences."

In the late 1970s, and for the next two decades, Pisias helped establish the field of paleoceanography—the study of the ocean's history through sediment analysis, geochemistry, isotopic dating and time-series analysis of ocean processes and dynamics.

The Office of Naval Research (ONR) sponsored some of Pisias' early research, including analysis of sediment cores during the Deep-Sea Drilling Project and Ocean Drilling Program, which lasted from 1968 to 2004. Both international drilling initiatives studied the history of the ocean and the nature of the crust beneath the seafloor. Pisias' research established some of the first continuous, high-resolution records of climate shifts over the past five million years.

"Dr. Pisias combined a deep, broad understanding of both paleoceanography and climate dynamics with nonlinear, statisticalanalysis techniques that he pioneered," said Dr. Tom Drake, head of ONR's Ocean Battlespace Sensing Department and presenter of the award.

"He demonstrated that time-series analysis could date layers of seafloor sediment in absolute terms and reveal changes in the Earth's climate," Drake continued. "Dr. Pisias' groundbreaking work underlies, and has had a strong influence on, current climate research."

Knowledge of seafloor properties is of great interest to the Navy. ONR-sponsored studies of marine geology and geophysical phenomena have had a number of surprising and unexpected outcomes in diverse fields, illustrating the value of basic research.

Since the Maurice Ewing Medal's creation in 1974, multiple ONR-sponsored researchers have won the prize. These include Dr. Walter Munk, who invented the concept of surf forecasting; geophysicist John I. Ewing; and marine seismologist Dr. John Orcutt.

AGU is a not-for-profit, scientific organization with nearly 60,000 members in 139 coun-



USS Gravely assumes Flagship of SNMG1

The Norfolk based Arleigh Burkeclass guided-missile destroyer USS Gravely (DDG 107) became the flagship for Standing NATO Maritime Group (SNMG) 1 during a ceremony in Copenhagen, Denmark, Jan. 14.

Rear Adm. Edward Cashman as-Royal Danish Navy Commodore Anders Friis and will command the group from the new flagship, Gravely.

"My staff and I are honored to become part of Standing NATO Maritime Group 1 as we begin the 70th anniversary year of the alliance," said Cashman. These vessels provide a continuous maritime capability for NATO to accomplish different tasks ranging from partnership building and enhancing NATO relationships to being able to complete high intensity warfare. Porter Sailor honored as Navy Missile **Defender of the Year**

Lt. j.g. McKenzie Anderson, USS Porter (DDG 78) training officer, was honored as the Navy's Missile Defender of the Year (MDOY) at the annual Missile Defense Advocacy Alliance (MDAA) awards banquet held in Alexandria, Va., Jan. 11. The annual MDAA-sponsored event honors the best missile defense Soldier, Sailor, Airman and National Guard member for their outstanding efforts.

Anderson was recognized along with Army Chief Warrant Officer Lucas Watterson, Air Force Capt. Rex Villa, and Army National Guard Chief Warrant Officer Jacob Moore - recipients of the same honor within their respective branches of service.

When Anderson was notified of his selection he said, "It's an honor to be selected as the 2018 Navy Missile Defender of the Year.

It's important to remember that [Ballistic Missile Defense (BMD)] is fundamentally a team effort, and I could not have asked for a better team than was onboard USS Porter. The men and women manning Porter's combat systems are dedicated to meet mission requirements and execute BMD tasking at any time."

Vice Adm. Dixon Smith, deputy Chief of Naval Operations for fleet readiness and logistics, and Riki Ellison, Chairman and Founder of MDAA presented the Navy MDOY award to Cmdr. John Tobin, Porter's former commanding officer, who accepted the award on behalf of Anderson because of Porter operational commitments.

"[Anderson] is not here, he is standing the watch," Smith said as he highlighted Anderson's key role in the Eastern Mediterranean Sea during the past two years. "Anderson became one of the Ballistic Missile Defense watchstanders when Porter along with [USS] Ross launched 56 Tomahawk missiles in 2017. As a Lt. j.g., Anderson trained all six tactical action officers on Porter, and led them through 32 training missions in the area of responsibility. I haven't met [Anderson] but I want him working for me."

Through Anderson's relentless drive to maintain critical manning and readiness aboard Por-

ter in 2018, he ensured maximum operational readiness during two FDNF-Europe BMD patrols. Anderson's critical feedback after training scenarios produced positive changes to fleet BMD training, including improved stationing geometry for Sixth Fleet BMD missions.

"The Sixth Fleet area of operations is dynamic and is at the center of the renewed Great Power Competition" said Anderson. "Mission accomplishment would not be possible without the dedication and amazing team of Forward Deployed Naval Forces (FDNF) in Rota, I am proud to serve with them."

Nominees are active duty or reserve officers and enlisted personnel from each branch of service who work within the missile defense and are nominated by their peers and commanding officers. Naval Surface and Mine Warfighting Development Center's (SMWDC) Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD) Division reviews Navy nomination packages and selects the recipient of the award each year. Information about the award nomination details and deadlines for submission are distributed annually by naval message.

Accepting the award on behalf of Anderson, Tobin said, "As commanding officer we have autonomy to choose our people, and Anderson is the guy you want on your team. I am privi-

Carrying the message that the Indo-Pacific region should be about building communities, not about confrontation, the commander of U.S. Indo-Pacific Command participated in a panel discussion in New Delhi today as part of the Raisina Dialogue, an annual multinational conference geared toward issues facing the global community.

The United States recognizes the changing dynamics in the region, Davidson told panel moderator Yalda Hakim, and that is why the name of its regional command changed from U.S. Pacific Command to U.S. Indo-Pacific Command. The name change "articulates much of what President [Donald J.] Trump put out in 2017, that the future for prosperity — not only for the United States, but all

Indo-Pacific, and the name change is to help support that vision and certainly describes what responsibilities the headquarters has,"

Davidson said the greatest capability the United States brings to the region is the unmatched network of allies developed since the end of World War II.

"Most importantly, the capability set that I think must be displayed and put in the battlespace is the alliances and partnerships that we are all capable of," he said. "As we look back ... it has been allies and partners that have come together in times of crisis, not to conquer others, but to liberate them. We have proved time and time again that a strategic partnership and set of alliances will triumph for the good of global stability."

The allies do work together, Davidson said, noting that the United States has worked with Japan, France, New Zealand, Canada, the United Kingdom and others in the South China Sea to assert the rights of all nations to access these crucial sea lines of communication.



EMERGENCY VS. URGENT CARE: DO YOU KNOW THE DIFFERENCE?

You feel lousy and know you need medical care. But you aren't sure if your symptoms require urgent or emergency care. Sometimes it's difficult to know what level of care you need. Especially when you're hurt or sick. Learn the difference between emergency and urgent care, and the rules for your TRICARE plan now. That way, you'll be able to make informed decisions should the need arise.

What is Emergency Care?

An emergency threatens life, limb, or eyesight. Examples include severe bleeding, spinal cord or back injury, chest pain, broken bones, or difficulty breathing. Other types of emergencies include maternity and psychiatric. If you have an emergency, go to the nearest emergency roomClick to closeThe hospital department that provides emergency services to patients who need immediate medical attention. or call 911. If overseas, call the emergency medical service for your area. You want to get in touch with your primary care manager or regional contractor within 24 hours or the next business day after you receive care.

What is Urgent Care?

Urgent care is care you need within 24 hours for a non-emergency illness or injury that requires treatment. Examples include a rising fever or sprained ankle. You should get urgent care before your condition becomes an emergency. Most TRICARE beneficiaries can visit an urgent care center whenever needed, but you should check the urgent care rules for your plan. When possible, visit a TRICARE network provider or a TRICARE-authorized (network or non-network) urgent care center to avoid additional out-of-pocket costs. If you're a family member or retiree and get urgent care from a non-network provider outside of a TRICAREauthorized urgent care center, you'll have to pay point-of-service cost-shares.

You can find TRICARE-authorized urgent care centers by searching your region's provider directory. Active duty service members enrolled in TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Overseas Program Prime must continue to visit military hospitals and clinics for urgent care. A referral would be required for civilian urgent

Not Sure Where to Go After Hours? Call Military Health System Nurse Advice Line

If you're not sure whether to seek urgent care, emergency care, or routine care, contact the Military Health System (MHS) Nurse Advice Line. You can call, chat online, or video chat with a registered nurse 24/7. The nurse can answer questions and give you medical advice. You can also get help with scheduling an appointment within 24 hours at a military hospital or clinic, if available. In the U.S., call the MHS Nurse Advice Line at 1-800-TRICARE (1-800-874-2273) and choose option 1. For all country-specific numbers, visit the MHS Nurse Advice Line website. The MHS Nurse Advice Line is available to TRICARE beneficiaries living or traveling in the U.S. or a country with an established military hospital or clinic. However, if you have the US Family Health Plan,

there's a different resource for you to use. Take command of your health in 2019 by learning more about your emergency and urgent care coverage. And how to get care based on your TRICARE plan. Remember costs differ based on who you are and your plan, so visit

CIAT trains its first ship

Over forty crew members of USS Rafael Peralta (DDG 115) were the first to pilot the updated Advance Warfare Training (AWT) curriculum inside the Navy's newest combat systems trainer, Combined Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD) / Anti-Submarine Warfare (ASW) Trainer (CIAT), onboard Naval Base San Diego (NBSD), Jan. 8 – 11.

The Center for Surface Combat Systems (CSCS) officially opened the CIAT during a ribbon cutting ceremony this past December and is planned to deliver tactical training to all San Diego based Baseline 9 warships.

"The overall purpose of CIAT is to capitalize on advances in virtual technology to deliver a warfighting laboratory that is realistic, relevant, and just as complex as the threat environment our deployed ships are sailing into," said Lt. Cmdr. Reisheid Dixon, CSCS Det San Diego's officer in charge.

The CIAT facility currently provides Navy watchstanders a state-of-the art training environment to detect and engage the entire spectrum of naval combatants. With an emphasis on realism, it is engineered in every detail to replicate a naval warship's actual combat suite. The feedback from Rafael Peralta is overwhelmingly positive.

"We are honored and thrilled to be the first warship through CIAT," said Cmdr. Aaron DeMeyer, commanding officer. "It's clear that even this first iteration of the CIAT curriculum is far better than any training we could develop on the ship."

Moving away from pre-packaged training scenarios, the virtualization of the trainer is completely customizable by CSCS instructors. Evaluators can now employ advanced enemy tactics, reduce visibility, degrade weapons systems, overwhelm the radars with clutter returns, and in the end, force every single watchstander in the combat information center to adapt. The first CIAT stu-

dents were able to experience these advanced training capabilities.

"This is by far the most realistic level of complexity and integration that our ship's training team has faced," said Lt. j.g. Anthony Pronchilo, fire control officer.

Chief Operations Specialist Anna Penrod, anti-air warfare coordinator, has been through the AWT curriculum in the past, but not like this.

"The CIAT has so many features," she explained. "This was our team's first opportunity to combat a reactive threat or fight through an electronic attack. I know full well the next time we see this challenged battlespace may be on deployment."

"There is a steep learning curve for every training event in CIAT," said Lt. Aaron Van Driessche, CSCS Det San Diego's course supervisor for AWT. "Many of our students are seeing complex enemy tactics for the first time but it's critical that they face these combat challenges now. We need to begin training ships for the worst case scenarios because when a ship leaves the pier, its mis-

sion could depend on it."

The CIAT is also equipped with a full debrief room capable of replaying all scenarios. CSCS instructors can break-down, in exact detail, every choice made by a ship's combat team.

"The debrief room allowed us to articulate the full PBED process — plan, brief, execute, and debrief," said Lt. Wayne Badstuebner, tactical action officer evaluator. "With the ability to relive every scenario in the debrief, the feedback loop was instantaneous and their team was maturing with every run."

This multi-mission and shore-based trainer also executes training at a lower cost compared to training live on shipboard systems.

"CSCS' CIAT is a game changer," said Capt. David Fowler, commodore, Destroyer Squadron 23. "It provides the most realistic combat systems training of any system to date. The full potential of CIAT's capabilities are yet to be experienced."

CSCS' mission is to develop and deliver surface ship combat systems training to achieve surface warfare superiority. CSCS

headquarters' staff oversees 14 learning sites and detachments, including CSCS Det San Diego, located throughout the continental United States, Hawaii, and Japan and manages and operates a Naval Education and Training Command (NETC) training division in Rota, Spain. CSCS provides over 538 courses, awards 114 different Navy Enlisted Classifications (NECs), and trains over 38,000 Sailors a year. CSCS delivers specialized training for Officer and Enlisted Sailors to tactically operate, maintain, and employ shipboard and shore-based weapons, sensors, and command and control systems utilized in today's Navy.

NAS Fallon Longhorns rescue lost snowshoer

NAVAL AIR STATION FALLON, NEV.

An 80-year-old snowshoer was found and rescued by a Navy helicopter after spending the night in the snowy Sierra Mountains southeast of Lake Tahoe.

The Longhorn Helicopter Search and Rescue (SAR) team from Naval Air Station (NAS) Fallon accomplished the rescue at Kingsbury Grade on Monday, 7 January.

The crew consisted of mission commander Lieutenant Cary Lawson, from Loma Linda, Calif., copilot Lieutenant Commander Joshua Haggard, from Fairview, Tenn., crew chief Petty Officer 2nd Class Jacob Glende, from Spencerport, New York, and Helicopter Inland Rescue Aircrewman (HIRA), Petty Officer 2nd Class Michael Dragan-Gosselin, from Hartville, Ohio.

On the evening of 6 January, the Douglas County Sheriff's Office (DCSO) received a 911 call from an 80-year-old snowshoer who was lost and running out of daylight. The snowshoer had 1 percent battery left on his cell phone, but law enforcement was able to obtain a search box before the call was lost.

Ground search and rescue efforts were hampered by nightfall and deteriorating weather.

The SAR team received the request for immediate life-saving response with military aircraft from the DCSO via the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center (ARFCC).

The plan was to launch at sunrise, but weather in the mountains continued to be a limiting factor.

The crew of four departed NAS Fallon at 8 a.m. for the 70-mile transit to Kingsbury

Grade near Lake Tahoe. After arriving on scene, the crew searched for an hour before spotting the survivor standing and waving his arms at the bottom of a canyon.

"What struck me most was how difficult it was to spot the survivor in that terrain and the fact that he spent the whole night in the snow storm," Glende said.

No landing site was available due to steep, mountainous terrain and vegetation, so the crew had Dragan-Gosselin rappel down to the survivor.

"I rappelled 10 feet away from him and immediately sank into waist-deep snow," Dragan-Gosselin said. "He had been walking in that almost all night without sleeping."

Once on the ground, Dragan-Gosselin performed a medical assessment of the survivor and prepared him to be hoisted before they were taken up into the aircraft together.

With both men safely onboard, the crew

provided in-flight care during the 5-minute transit to South Lake Tahoe Airport. The survivor was turned over to ambulance paramedics at 10 a.m. after almost 24 hours in inclement conditions.

NAS Fallon operates three MH-60S Night-hawk helicopters as search and rescue/medical evacuation (SAR/MEDEVAC) platforms for the Fallon Range Training Complex. The rescue, which required expert skill in helicopter mountain rescue techniques, was the first 2019 rescue for NAS Fallon SAR as well as Glende's first flight as the mission crew chief.

Pursuant to the National SAR Plan of the United States, the unit may also be used for civil SAR/MEDEVAC needs to the fullest extent practicable on a non-interference basis, with primary military duties according to applicable national directives, plans, guidelines and agreements. Archbishop of Military Services Timothy Broglio visits NSA Bahrain

Archbishop of Military Services Timothy Broglio stopped by Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain Jan. 9 to visit with Sailors on ships, hold religious services, including the Holy Sacrament of Confirmation, and to speak with the public affairs office about his role in the wider Navy community.

As Archbishop, Broglio is charged with the pastoral care for Catholics in all five branches of the military, their families, as well as all Catholics in the veterans' hospitals throughout United States and its territories.

Additionally, Broglio is charged with the pastoral care of any Catholic who works for the U.S. federal government outside of the United States.

When asked what the overarching goals of the Chaplain Corps were, Broglio emphasized that support and confidentiality were key.

"One goal is to assure the first amendment rights of the men and women and the families in the military. And then secondly, and also very important, is to ensure the health and spiritual welfare of those who serve our country and to be there in situations, not only in crisis, but also in the everyday activities to be a part of the military family and to ensure that the people know that there is someone there that they can go to and in that regard, confidentiality is extremely important," he said. "And that's one of the things that's guaranteed to a chaplain. He or she never has to reveal who comes to see them or why and that's something that's very precious, I think, in our military installations;

especially so far away from home."

Broglio also discussed how NSA Bahrain specifically works to support Sailors.

"At least from my impression, and I've visited Bahrain probably at least eight, if not more times in the 11 years that I've been the Archbishop for Military Services, I think the Chaplain Corps is particularly important in a place like this because it is remote," he said. "Some of the years that I was here, families were not with the Sailors and so that creates an additional tension, an additional burden and the chaplain doesn't substitute for the family, but he is someone who is there and someone that you can talk to in a situation where you are removed from your everyday contacts and your normal possibility to react. So I think the chaplain is very important in that situation because there isn't that much in the same realm outside the gates as there would be say, in an installation on CONUS."

Lt. Cmdr. Joseph Reardon, NSA Bahrain's command chaplain, was delighted to have Broglio on base and described the visit as a gift.

"It's always a special gift when you have a shepherd of the church come to visit his congregation, especially to dispense a beautiful sacrament; in this case, the sacrament of confirmation. Just having that fullness of the Holy Spirit come into the souls, the hearts and the minds of these young people who are on this journey with Christ," Reardon said.

While the game ended in a draw, Martin said everyone who played won.


"Sharing this experience with the other team built a bond, a friendship and an experience, that I will remember for a long time, and I hope the other team will too."

USS Wichita (LCS 13), the Navy's seventh Freedom-variant littoral combat ship, was brought to life during a commissioning ceremony at Naval Station Mayport on Jan.

"The LCS, like your favorite mobile device, offers more portability and maneuverability, while being much less conspicuous," said Cmdr. Nathan Rowan, commanding officer of Wichita. "And, like a smartphone, the LCS packs quite a hefty punch for such a small package."

Wichita has a crew of approximately 70 Sailors, and is designed to work close to shore and in the open ocean. This provides cost-effective force flexibility and allows the Navy to strengthen allied part-

"It's good to be part of a

crew that's small," said Damage Controlman Fireman Brandon O'Connell, assigned to Wichita. "I can talk to everyone. We're close to each other. Overall, I like it."

Apprenticeship program roaring to life with 97 openings at Fleet **Readiness Center Southeast**

Seniors and recent graduates at Orange Park High School listened Tuesday as Fleet Readiness Center Southeast's Career Division Director Vince Elston rattled off the benefits of the Navy command's civilian apprenticeship program.

The program, which is now accepting applicants for 97 positions through the USAjobs.gov website, offers paid training, beginning at \$15.60 per hour, and a guaranteed federal job in the field once the three-to-four-year program is successfully completed.

"We're looking for a new generation of employees who are seeking a stable, profitable career," said FRCSE Commanding Officer Capt. Trent DeMoss. "This is a chance for people to learn a skilled trade, contribute to the defense of our country and get paid while they do it."

The 97 vacancies include apprenticeships for trades such as electronics mechanic, machinist, sheet metal mechanic, painting and aircraft mechanic. These skills will be learned through a combination of on-the-job training and classroom

In a partnership with St. Johns River State College, those selected for the program will receive 18 credit hours of college courses at the school – at no cost to the student.

Elston has been on a whirlwind tour of sorts through high schools in Clay, Duval, Putnam and St. Johns County in re-

"You should see their eyes when we tell them we're going to bring them onboard at \$15.60 an hour, pay them to learn a valuable trade and give them a \$1.05 raise every six months they successfully complete," Elston said. "Once they finish the course, they've got a job waiting on them with no student loans to pay back."

However, the benefits are mutual for the apprentices and the military aviation maintenance, repair and overhaul facil-

"The average age of our artisans is between 48 and 50 years old," Elston said. "We need to get new employees in

here, and get them trained, before we start to lose the experienced artisans we have now."

Along with being paid to learn a skilled trade, free college courses and a guaranteed job after successfully completing the course, apprentices will also start off earning 13 days of annual leave and 13 days of sick leave per year.

Department of the Navy civilian employees also earn a pension and have their contributions to their 401(k)-style retirement account matched up to five percent.

With a combined workforce of more than 5,500 employees, FRCSE is the largest industrial employer in Northeast Florida and Southeast Georgia.

"These are the types of opportunities people say no longer exist," DeMoss said. "They do, and they're right here in

relief are in our hierarchy of priorities, so it is something we have all trained and volunteered for."

NMCB-1, along with other INDOPA-COM units, conducted route clearance of 64 miles of road, built more than 150 FEMAprovided tents for families whose homes became unlivable, and produced more than 54,000 gallons of potable water during the relief efforts. Following the debris cleanup, the unit focused on roof repairs in which they assessed over 300 households and executed 122 repairs.

"Thank you so much for coming this distance to be America's force that was able to help this community bring its services back online," said Rear Adm. Shoshana Chatfield, commander of Joint Region Marianas and Task Force West. "Your efforts here and the work that you did, the equipment that you brought, and the spirit that you gave to this community was appreciated deeply by the mayor. I want to thank you for approaching your work as though these were your own families."

In delivering his remarks, Ralph Torres, governor of the CNMI, thanked the task force for delivering aid to those in need.

"Folks, thank you from the bottom of our hearts for all the hard work and dedication and leaving your family to come here and providing a normalcy for other families you

don't even know or never even met," said Torres. "Your work is definitely appreci-

NMCB-3, Detachment Tinian will take over the recovery and roof repair mission in an effort to restore many of the resident's homes to habitable conditions.

"Many of the people in Tinian can't live in their homes right now," said Burkart. "The roofs have either been completely or mostly destroyed, and with the frequent rain storms that this island gets, the residents are having an extremely tough time rebuilding their lives. We hope that putting roofs over their heads will give them the foundation they need to help return to life as they knew it."

Not every single destroyed roof on the island can be repaired. If the support structures vital to stability are not present, a roof cannot be placed. The Seabees will identify structures that are safe to repair, and in a structural condition that will be able to house residents following a repair. The Seabees plan to conduct expedient, high quality construction to return the identified structures to a state that can sufficiently shelter the residents.

"Our mission is two-fold," said Lt. Cmdr. Christian Auger, NMCB-3's operations officer. "First, and most importantly, we must provide the necessary structures and accommodations to relieve the suffering that was caused by Super Typhoon Yutu. The second part is to continue to develop and demon-

strate the skills necessary to respond to any type of emergency, whether it be a humanitarian mission or a major combat operation, and this mission helps us demonstrate those skills."

NMCBs are part of the Naval Construction Force and specialize in providing contingency construction, disaster preparation and recovery support, humanitarian assistance, and combat operations support.

"As Seabees, we pride ourselves on the fact that we can build and fight," said Auger. "Tinian is an opportunity to provide relief and demonstrate our expeditionary construction abilities at the right time, at the right place."

The DoD mission is expected to continue until the critical needs are met or FEMA officials have implemented the appropriate mix of civil and contracted solutions to allow

them to continue to lead federal government relief and recovery efforts without DoD

The effort is a joint force endeavor that makes up the newly created Task Group Engineer, which employs units from the Navy, Army, and Air Force, and is operationally led by the Army's 84th Engineer Battalion, 130th Engineer Brigade, based out of Hawaii. Task Group Engineer replaces Task Group Tinian and Task Group Saipan.

NMCB-3 is forward deployed throughout the Indo-Pacific region and United States ready to support major combat operations, theater security, humanitarian assistance and disaster relief operations. Seabees provide general engineering and civil support to Navy, Marine Corps and joint operational forces globally.

The panelists were repeatedly asked about military aspects of the so-called "Quad Alliance." An outgrowth of the Quadrilateral Security Dialogue, it features India, Japan, Australia and the United States. "The multilateral nature of alliances and partnerships enables much more combat power," Davidson said. "The United States has a strategic partnership with India that advanced greatly

The United States is a treaty ally of Japan and Australia.

There is no formal military partnership, the panelists said, and it is not an Indo-Pacific NATO. "It's a growing relationship, which is robust," Lanba said. "It will only grow as time goes by." The Quad is "a burgeoning relationship rooted in some 25 years now," Davidson added, "and we look forward to building it in the future."

Some see the free and open Indo-Pacific strategy as a containment strategy for China. "It is advocacy for free nations in terms of security, values, political systems and the freedom to choose their own partners," Davidson said. "As we look back on the rules-based order over the past 70 years, it has delivered a level of peace and security that has lifted billions out of poverty in all our nations. It is an important part of the international order. And it has been underwritten in many respects, by the combat credibility of not only the United States forces, but the forces represented here on the panel. I think that's incredibly important to sustain as we move forward."

Yiorgo: Where were you born and can you tell us a little about your early life?

Lencia Kebede: I was born in Los Angeles, California. I grew up singing a lot in church. As I got older I realized I was kind a good at it and got involved in school doing plays and also participated in three sports. In high school I found my dual passions: politics as well as theatre and between the two. I realized how they both could influence my life. My family supported all of my shows and that solidified for me to pursue it professionally.

Y: Yet you decided to pursue a

LK: I went to Occidental College in LA. What drew me specifically was that it had a United Nations internship program which I did my senior year. I moved to New York and at the United Nations.

I was able to live so fully in the political realm while still singing in the glee club, singing in the musicals, dancing, and taking acting classes. Yiorgo: With us today is our very own Randy Brown, who is the driver for Grave Digger®. Where are you from Randy and how did you get into this

Randy Brown: I was born and raised in Currituck County in North Carolina. I actually started with my dad. He was into the sport of truck and tractor pulling for many years. I grew up around it and back then monster trucks were kind like a sideshow for the tractor pulls. I met a lot of people through the years with the monster trucks, decided it was something I wanted to do for myself so I built my own team up, the 'Pure Adrenaline' team and ran it for three years. I got an offer from the Grave Digger® team to come drive one of their trucks and it was an offer I couldn't turn down to be with an iconic team like that, to have the support that they have, it was a dream job come true. I embraced it with everything I had and never looked back and been there ever sense.

Y: Can you explain to a layman like me the premise of Monster Jam®? How competition works, world Finals, etc.

RB: We basically have four competitions in each Monster Jam® show. We do a racing competition witch is either side-by-side racing or a timed racing event. Then we do a two-wheel competition witch is basically go out there and do any trick you can on two-wheels weather it will be riding like on a bicycle on two wheels on the side of it or doing a wheelie, or a stopie or a moonwalk on the front two tires, there's all kinds of things that drivers are doing now. We also have a donut competition where you go out there and see who could spin the fastest and longest donut. Our fourth and final of the night is the free-style competition witch is basically go out there and show off. You put all your best tricks together in 75 seconds. That is all we have to put it all in and wow the crowd.

Y: So who judges these events?

RB: Well what is so unique about our sport is that the fans are interactive in providing the winner. Anyone in attendance that night from the paying fan to the people working concessions can participate and vote. Every person inside the arena that has a cell phone can vote from a scale of 1-10 on how they feel that truck did in that competition. They give you a code to put in your phone and you set your score. At the end of the night we have a champion. Points are awarded just like any other racing event and our points are ac-

cumulated to have a champion at the end of the series and all of those champions and other invited teams get to go to the world finals down in Orlando, FL in May. So everybody is fighting for those hard-earned points so they can get invited to the world finals, our biggest event of our season!!!!

Y: When did the season begin and when will it

RB: We have 14-15 events on our tour that we will be collecting points on our way to the world finals. The season began last week in Albany, New York and it will end the first of May, the weekend right before Orlando in New Hampshire.

Y: So how or where do you get your time in to perfect your skills when you're not competing or per-

RB: Well we actually have a couple of test tracks that we do a lot of research and development for our trucks and we can practice on. There is Monster Jam® University witch is out in Illinois that we can send a team out there and do some driving. If we have a new driver who needs some seat time to perfect a trick or where he needs to be for his performance level the tracks are set up just like the ones we run on Monster

Y: Where have been some of your favorite places to compete?

RB: Probably being the first sporting event to go into Saudi Arabia for the first time ever. That happened in 2017. I've been to China, the Mongolian desert, Beijing, Singapore, Australia, Europe and just got back from a three-week tour of South America. We did Chile, Argentina and Brazil. Monster Jam® has taken hold all over the world. For the first time ever, they are planning to head to South Africa some time this year.

Y: Any wow moments?

RB: I've met a lot of famous people and got a lot of opportunities I would not normally had. There are so many things. Probably one of the biggest is we did the very last event inside the Minneapolis Metro dome. Me and another Grave Digger truck, we did simultaneously backflips for the grand finally of this dome. They were imploding it the very next week so to be a part of all of that was pretty amazing. Also any anniversary that the Grave Digger has, our last one was our 35th, the opportunity to be a part of something that has withstood the test of time is always an honor.

Y: What should people expect to see at the show?

RB: It's going to be a non-stop, high horse power, adrenaline pumping, and family fun action. From start to finish people will be on the edge of their seats, having a good time, screaming and yelling, getting away from their everyday normal jobs watching us take their frustrations on those big Monster Jam® trucks.

PA native has totaled 19 points (5g, 14a) in 52 career ECHL games.


