#### NAVY ANNOUNCES UNIVERSAL TRAINING PRECAUTIONS FOR PHYSICAL EXERCISE

#### WASHINGTON

Navy released NAVADMIN 108/19, May 10, alerting Sailors and command leadership of the importance of universal training precautions (UTP) to reduce the risk of exercise-related collapse and death during physical exercise, to include the Physical Readiness Test (PRT) and command physical training.

As part of military readiness, Sailors are expected to maintain a high level of fitness. With PRT season ongoing throughout the

Navy, this guidance is especially critical to ensure the safety of all Sailors.

It is imperative for commanders and key leadership personnel, including command fitness leaders (CFL), to foster an exercise culture that promotes UTP, recognizes the early signs of distress and promptly terminates exertional activity when individuals display clear signs of distress. All personnel present during a training evolution or PRT can encourage good performance, but should be on guard for signs that a participant is struggling and be ready to terminate the

evolution.

The Navy's PRT portion of the Physical Fitness Assessment is intended as a measure of long-term health and wellness – not of individual athletic prowess. No one should risk their life by pushing through life-threatening conditions during a PRT.

Some highlights from the NAVADMIN are listed below, but every Sailor should read the full message.

#### Personal risk factors for exercise-related collapse include:

 Lack of appropriate environmental or exercise acclimatization

- Recent or current illness, accumulated fatigue or dehydration
- Poor baseline conditioning or excess body fat
- A predisposing or underlying cardiac condition
- Exercise-induced asthma
- Sickle cell trait (SCT)
- Prior poor performance on the PRT

#### Environmental/external risk factors include:

- Exercise at altitude
- High ambient temperature and humidity
- Use of dietary supplements containing stimulants to include energy shots and drinks

If you don't know if you have SCT, find out. SCT disproportionately affects African-Americans.

Commanders are encouraged to exercise a liberal Bad Day PRT policy for those Sailors displaying clear signs of distress during the PRT, allowing Sailors to pri-

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Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders of various nationalities and ancestry—Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Filipino, Southeast Asian, Asian Indian, and Polynesian—have a rich legacy of service and sacrifice in the United States Navy dating back to the 19th century. The U.S. Navy had maintained a presence in East Asia since the 1830s to safeguard American interests during the Chinese civil unrest. Ships whose crews counted men of Asian descent on the Asiatic Station protected U.S. commerce, missionaries, and diplomats in the region. During the American Civil War, Chinese men served on dozens of Union vessels. The U.S. gunboat Ashuelot, part of the Asiatic Fleet, operated along the cost of China, up the Yangtze River, and among the Japanese treaty ports and carried a crew in 1883 that was four-fifths Asian-born from Thailand, Japan, or China.

In 1898, the battleship Maine exploded and sank in Havana Harbor. The blast, which killed 266 men, including those of Japanese and Chinese extraction, provided the catalyst for a war with Spain that spread to its colonies in the Far East where the U.S. Asiatic Squadron, commanded by Commodore George Dewey, defeated the Spanish fleet in the Battle of Manila Bay. As a result of the war, the United States gained the Philippines as a territory as well as other island possessions in the Pacific and the Caribbean. These events enabled large numbers of Filipinos and other Pacific islanders to join the U.S. Navy.

Asian Americans continued to turn up on the rolls of U.S. warships. Navy Fireman First Class Telesforo de la Cruze Trinidad, a Filipino, received the Congressional Medal of Honor for rescuing two men after a boiler exploded on board San Diego on 21 January 1915. The destroyer USS Rizal, newly commissioned in 1919, was donated to the U.S. Navy by the Philippine legislature and named in honor of the martyred Philippine patriot Dr. Jose Rizal (1861-1996). Her crew was predominantly Filipino Ameri-

During World War II, Chinese and Japanese American men and women enlisted for military service in great numbers. More than 20,000 Chinese Americans, or one out of every five in the United States, served in the U.S. Armed Forces. Although barred from the naval service and interned by the U.S. government following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Japanese Americans fought in some of the Army's most decorated units. Filipino Americans and Korean Americans also participated in the nation's war effort. Asian Americans served as nurses and as linguists in the Navy's female reserve program. Chinese American Hazel Ying Lee was one of the 38 Women Air Force Service Pilots who died in the line of duty. Maggie Gee gave pilots their qualifying flights and flew planes for artillery training exercises. The three Ahn siblings, Ralph,

Philip and Susan, from one of California's first Korean immigrant families, enlisted in the U.S. military in 1942. Lieutenant Susan Ahn Cuddy was the first Korean American woman in the U.S. military and the first female Navy gunnery officer.

Among the many Asian Pacific Americans who distinguished themselves during World War II was Daniel K. Inouye, a Hawaiian native, who was planning to become a medical doctor when the War Department reversed its decision to exclude Japanese American volunteers. Inouye was assigned to Company E, 442nd Regimental Combat Team, fighting in France's Rhone valley when he received a battlefield commission as a second lieutenant. Injured and under enemy fire, he destroyed three German bunkers that allowed his unit to seize the ridge guarding a critical road near San Terenzo, Italy. His right arm had to be amputated. After a reevaluation of the military accomplishments of Asian Americans in World War II, President Bill Clinton presented Senator Inouye with the Medal of Honor for his heroism in Italy. After extensive recuperation, he studied law. In 1954, he was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives from Hawaii, further distinguishing himself as the first Asian American member of Congress. Eight years later he continued representing his state as a Senator and held that position until his death in 2012.

Commander Gordon Chung-Hoon, of Chinese-Hawaiian parentage and a 1934 U.S. Naval Academy graduate, commanded the destroyer USS Sigsbee (DD-502) in the Pacific Theater, which earned him the Silver Star, the third highest combat award. On 14 April 1945, when kamikazes attacked Sigsbee and five other destroyers off Okinawa, one plane crashed Sigsbee's stern. Chung-Hoon received the Navy Cross, the Navy's highest medal and the nation's second highest combat decoration for his actions. He retired in 1959 as a two-star admiral and the nation's first Asian Pacific American flag officer. The Navy honored him in 2009 by naming a guided missile destroyer USS

Chung-Hoon (DDG-93). Asian Pacific Americans continued their honorable service throughout the Cold War. In 1948, President Harry S. Truman issued Executive Order 9981 mandating that "there shall be equality of treatment and opportunity for all persons in the armed services without regard to race, color, religion, or national origin." The watershed 1965 Immigration Act lifted the heavy restrictions on Asian immigration that prevailed throughout most of the 20th cen-

Commander Gordon Ross Nakagawa flew 185 combat missions in the A-6 intruder during four combat deployments to Vietnam. He was the Executive Officer of Attack Squadron 196 flying from USS Enterprise (CVAN-65) when his AGA intruder was shot down during a single plan low level night strike against Haiphong. He was a Prisoner of War at the infamous Hanoi Hilton from 21 December 1972 to 29 March 1973. Nakagawa continued his service until his retirement in the rank of captain. He remained active in his community until his death on 24 August 2011. His son, Navy Captain Steven Nakagawa, also flew the A-6. On 1 June 2012, he took command of the Naval Air Warfare Center Training Systems Di-

Jim Huen's father enlisted in the Navy in 1932 and retired as a Chief Petty Officer. After Congress passed an act allowing veterans with honorable discharges to get their American citizenship, his father became a U.S. citizen. Jim Huen, like his father, experienced racism in the Navy. While completing supply officer school in Athens, Georgia in 1965, he encountered prejudice from locals and off base. He completed a seven month Western Pacific deployment aboard USS Delta (AR-9) as the dispersing and food service officer. One of the crewmembers on the ship wore his cover with the words "Go Home Chink" printed on it. The ship had 520 crew members. Huen was one of five supply corps offices and the only Chinese American on his ship. The commanding officer and executive officer were Naval Academy graduates and half the officers were former enlisted. There were at least twelve African Americans on the

Carolyn Hisako Tanaka, a California native, witnessed the government evicting her family from their home and relocating them in an internment camp in Poston, Arizona, following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. This memory did not deter her family from joining the military. Her older brother was a Korean War veteran and her two youngest brothers enlisted in the Army. She was an emergency room nurse when she decided to join them. She served as the Head Nurse at the 24th Evacuation Hospital in Long Bin in 1967. She received the Bronze Star for meritorious service.

Robert K. U. Kihune, a 1959 Naval Academy graduate, had an outstanding 35-year career. He commanded two carrier battle groups, participated in the Navy's response to the Lebanon crisis, the capture of terrorists in the Achille Lauro hijacking, and the antiterrorism air strikes against Libya. His promotion to Vice Admiral in 1988 made him the first Asian American to reach that rank. As the Commander of the Pacific Fleet Naval Surface Forces, he provided half of the naval forces in support of the First Gulf War. Captain Tem E. Bugarin, the son of a retired senior chief radioman, was the first Filipino to command a surface combatant ship, USS Saginaw (LST-1188) in August 1989. Rear Admiral Eleanor Concepcion Mariano continued her family's legacy of naval service, which dates back to 1920. Her father, a Filipino master chief petty officer, served 29 years in the Navy's steward's branch. Rear Admiral Mariano was the attending physician to the President at

the White House for President Clinton and President George W. Bush. President Clinton promoted her to flag rank in 2000, making her the first Filipino American to reach flag rank.

Asian American and Pacific Islander Sailors continue to excel in the 21st century. Captain David Yoshihara commanded Destroyer Squadron 9 in 2003. His father, retired Navy Captain Takeshi Yoshihara, was the first Japanese American to attend the Naval Academy. Lieutenant junior grade Jeanette Gracie Shin, the first Buddhist chaplain in the Armed Forces, signed her oath of office in the Pentagon in July 2004. Admiral Harry B. Harris Jr. was assigned as the assistant to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff in 2011. His former commands include the Sixth Fleet. In May 2015 he assumed command of the U.S. Pacific Command. Vice Admiral Raquel C. Bono, Medical Corps, of Asian American and Hispanic Heritage, served as the command surgeon, U.S. Pacific Command, from November 2011 to June 2013 and was then selected as Director. Defense Health Agency.

Asian American and Pacific Islander Sailors also participated in Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom. Mass Communication Specialist First Class Kenneth Takada, a Japanese-American, completed four deployments in the Fifth Fleet Area of Responsibility and earned five Navy Achievement Medals, the Iraqi Campaign Medal, and the Combat Action Ribbon. He was the combat photographer for a special operations unit for one of his tours. Rear Admiral Jonathan A. Yuen was the Commander, Joint Theater Support, Contracting Command, United States Central Command, Kabul Afghanistan. Lieutenant Manuel Querido, the chaplain with the 3rd Battalion, 11th Marine Regiment, conducted counterinsurgency operations with the Afghan national security forces in 2009. In the same year, Captain Enrique Sadsad, a Philippine-born American citizen, became the commanding officer of Naval Support Activity Bahrain, which supports naval forces in the Middle East. Marcos Sibal served as fleet master chief for Commander, U.S. Seventh Fleet. He retired from his final active duty assignment as Navy Region Hawaii Command Master

Chief in 2013. Navy Captain and astronaut Sunita L. Williams epitomizes the wide range of opportunities for all minorities in the Navy. Of Asian Indian parentage, Williams graduated from the Naval Academy in 1987 and became a Navy helicopter pilot and test pilot. Selected as an astronaut, she traveled on the space shuttle in late 2006 to serve as flight engineer and science officer on the International Space Station. Her four spacewalks as an Expedition-14 crew member established a record for women at the time. She also set a record for women by spending more than six months in Earth Orbit.



U.S. Navy Photos Connie Mariano was not only the first Filipino-American to become a Rear Admiral in the US Navy, she also was the first female director of the White House Medical Unit, as well as the first military woman to be appointed as the White House Physician.



Gordon Pai'a Chung-Hoon became the first Asian American, U.S. citizen, to graduate from the academy on May 1934. He served during World War II and was the first Asian American flag officer.



Ming Chang served 34 years in the U.S. Navy and became the first naturalized Asian American naval officer to reach flag rank in the United States Military.



Robert Kihune commanded a guided missile destroyer that conducted nightly strikes against North Vietnam while successfully dodging hundreds of rounds of enemy fire without sustaining damage.



Capt., USN, Sunita Lyn "Suni" Williams is an American astronaut and United States Navy officer of Indian-Slovenian descent.



Susan Ahn Cuddy joined the Navy in 1942 after Japan bombed Pearl Harbor. She was the first Asian-American woman to join the U.S. Navy and became the first female to operate flexible-mount or turret-mounted machine guns on an aircraft in the Navy.



Dr. Tem E. Bugarin, became the first Philippine to command a Navy warship, USS Saginaw (LST 1188), in August 1989.

## Sailors participate in Seatack Elementary School field day

#### VIRGINIA BEACH, VA.

The beautiful, late spring of Virginia Beach provides the perfect opportunity to take the children outside. Giving them an opportunity to exercise, build friendships and learn the importance of teamwork is part of the recipe for a healthy, happy child.

Those three things are part of the curriculum at Seatack Elementary School, an Achievable Dream Academy, which held a field day May 3. Unlike most other elementary schools, students weren't the only ones invited for outdoor games and competition.

An Achievable Dream is a nonprofit organization designed to offer children a quality education in a nurturing environment, an opportunity to develop meaningful relationships with caring adults and a chance to take part in engaging enrichment activities during the academic day and outside of school hours.

Located three miles from

the main gate of Naval Air Station Oceana, it isn't uncommon for Sailors to volunteer at the school. On a typical day, Navy volunteers shake hands with the students as they arrive for school and provide mentorship inside the classroom.

However, May 3 was no ordinary day for the students and volunteering Sailors as they gathered in the school's field to learn valuable lessons, play games and make memories.

Hudson Crabb, physical education specialist at Seat-ack Elementary School, organized the field day and planned 11 different stations manned by over 60 Sailors, which included horseshoes, tug-of-war, and jump rope.

"We have a partnership with the Navy, and it was great for our kids to see them at this event," said Crabb. "They ran the stations for us and were involved with the kids. It was a win-win for everybody."

Seatack Elementary partners and organizes many events with Hampton Roads military and first respond-

Vincent Darby, principal of Seatack Elementary

School, said the school's partnership with Naval Air Station Oceana made it possible for them to hold the field day.

"Our Sailors are a part of what we do with the Achievable Dream program," said Darby. "We have Sailors who come to school every morning to shake the students' hands. We have Sailors who show up for staff appreciation events. They've helped us cook and serve breakfast at the school. It was only natural for us to say, 'in order for this event to happen, we have to have enough people to man the stations, and what better resource do we have than our Sailors?"

Aviation Boatswain's Mate (Handling) 1st Class Elgin Sanders, air field facilities maintenance leading petty officer, was the liaison between Naval Air Station Oceana and Seatack Elementary School tasked with organizing a team of volunteers for the field day event.

"As soon as we posted fliers and sent emails, the response was overwhelming," said Sanders. "The school had asked for 60 volunteers, and we had over 100 Sailors wanting to sign up."

Sanders said he hopes the event strengthens the bond between Naval Air Station Oceana and Seatack Elementary School.


"We want to let Seatack

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#### **NATO PARTNERS VISIT ABRAHAM LINCOLN CARRIER STRIKE GROUP**

#### **IONIAN SEA**

North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) military representatives from the European theater visited the Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72), flagship of the Abraham Lincoln Carrier Strike Group (CSG), May 7.

Rear Adm. Roy Kitchener, U.S. Deputy Military

Representative for NATO, and representatives from Finland, Germany, Greece, Kingdom of Denmark, Poland, Republic of Bulgaria, Spain, and the United Kingdom landed aboard Abraham Lincoln in a C-2A Greyhound, attached to the "Rawhides" of Fleet Logistics Support Squadron (VRC) 40.

The purpose of the visit was to familiarize senior officials with U.S. Navy carrier operations and en-

hance partnerships among NATO allies. The guests toured the ship, visiting spaces such as the hangar bay, bridge and primary flight control, in addition to observing flight operations on the flight deck.

Enhancing interoperability among allies to enhance maritime security and deter threats is an essential focus of the Abraham Lincoln CSG deployment in the re-

lies is very important," Rear Adm. John Wade, commander, Carrier Strike Group 12, said. "We all have interests in peace and stability in this critical and important region. Working together gives us increased capacity and is a deterrent in and of itself."

The Abraham Lincoln CSG is deployed in support of maritime security cooperation efforts in the U.S. 6th Fleet area of operations. With Abraham Lincoln as

the flagship, deployed strike group assets include staffs, ships and aircraft of Carrier Strike Group 12, Destroyer Squadron 2, the Ticonderoguided-missile ga-class cruiser USS Leyte Gulf (CG 55) and Carrier Air Wing (CVW) 7; as well as the Àlvaro de Bazàn-class frigate ESPS Méndez Núñez (F 104).

As Hutchison toured the ship, she saw the progress being made during the final stages of a planned maintenance availability. Hutchison has followed LPD 17 closely since its christening and brought a few mugs she furnished in 2006 for the christening as gifts for some of the crew.

"I invited a few of my colleagues from NATO who all got up at 4 a.m. to come see this wonderful ship. I am so impressed. I am touched by the hospitality," said Hutchison.

San Antonio is currently at BAE Systems conducting a scheduled maintenance availability period. San Antonio is the first ship named for the city in Texas, and the first amphibious transport dock ship in the San Antonio-class. Her motto is "Never Retreat, Never Surrender."



#### Resourcing a ready surface force

From Navy Live

Since the establishment of the Readiness Reform and Oversight Council (RROC), the Navy made significant progress in its reform efforts to deliver a more ready and more capable Surface Force. With the support of Congress, the Navy invested in meaningful Surface Force reform, and remains committed to doing everything necessary to create a culture of excellence. The Fiscal Year 2020 budget reflects that commitment by allocating \$345.8M for readiness reform efforts, with a total \$1.1B projected across Future Years Defense Program (FYDP) for RROC initiatives.

Here, we explain some of the investments in the FY20 budget that will make our fleet safer and more effective, categorized into four functional areas:

Personnel The FY20 budget request includes \$14.9M for readiness efforts that impact personnel issues. In order to maximize shipboard experience, the Navy examined changes to the Surface Warfare Officer (SWO) career path, Division Officer (DO), and Department Head (DH) billet bases and tour lengths. These new billets will facilitate the addition of a Plans and Tactics Officer (PTO) aboard more ship classes, and will increase the opportunities for single, longer tour assignments in which first-tour Department Heads can "Fleet-up" to secondtour Department Head positions aboard the same ship. This change not only maximizes at-sea experience for the DH, but also positively influences the safety and operational competence of the ship through leadership continuity.

The FY20 budget also allocates funds for Human Performance Expertise on Type Commander (TYCOM) staffs. These experts, with extensive backgrounds in psychology and organizational management, advise TYCOM leadership and implement safety and training process improvements while also assessing human-centric requirements for proposed equipment acquisition projects aboard surface ships.


The FY20 budget request also enhances Fleet services by funding additional Embedded Mental Health (EMH) provider billets within each Fleet Concentration Area (FCA). This initiative will increase the timeliness of care provided to our Sailors, thereby improving the readiness of afloat units Navy-wide.

#### **Operations**

The \$39.1M allocated for operational efforts in the FY20 budget funds the reestablishment of Second Fleet, as well as the procurement and installation of an additional Automatic Identification System (AIS) laptop for all surface ships.

The reestablishment of Second Fleet will optimize force generation and force employment processes, helping to balance operational requirements among the numbered fleets in a time of increasing great power competition. Vice Adm. Andrew "Woody" Lewis assumed command as Commander, U.S. Second Fleet in August 2018, and Second Fleet will reach initial operating capability this summer.

To promote safe and effective



that will provide more robust mariner skills training capabilities for individual watchstander training, as well as team and unit level instruction.

Shiphandling Trainers (NSSTs)

all surface ships will receive an additional AIS laptop, which will also include the latest Electronic Chart Display and Information System (ECDIS). This additional navigational tool will give our watchstanders the latest navigation technology to accurately monitor underway ship positions and movements. Pending successful testing, distribution of the AIS laptops will begin in May 2019.

Modernization A total of \$81.5M is included in the FY20 budget for surface ship modernization and upgrades. The Navy will continue its effort to install Next Generation Surface Search RADAR (NGSSR) across the Fleet. The NGSSR will ultimately replace the Navy's current radar systems, and will help Sailors safely navigate when transiting through congested waters. Additionally, the Navy continues to procure more Commercial Offthe-Shelf (COTS) radars for ships in order to ensure our Sailors have the most up-to-date and effective radar systems, thereby enhancing navigational equipment redundancy. Fleet delivery and installa-

#### **Training**


Of the \$210.3M allocated for readiness training initiatives in the FY20 budget, a significant portion is for the Mariner Skills Training Program (MSTP). This program is designed to enhance overall mariner skills training for our Sailors and Junior Officers. It includes standing up an initial four-week Junior Officer of the Deck (JOOD) course in the spring of 2019 in San Diego, Norfolk and Newport, as well as the establishment of facilities in various Fleet Concentration Areas for the new Integrated-Navigation Seamanship and Shiphandling Trainers (I-NSSTs). These trainers will be invaluable tools to better train our watchteams on shiphandling and navigation, especially since the I-NSSTs will integrate multiple watch stations and command centers with the ship's bridge – such as the Combat Information Center (CIC), bearing-takers, and lookouts. The Mariner Skills Training Program also includes curriculum development and instructors for comprehensive individual, team, and unit-level training to include:

a new six-week Officer of the Deck (OOD) Phase One and a three-week OOD Phase Two course; expanding the Basic Division Officer Course (BDOC); and the fielding of a number of standalone Standards of Training, Certification, and Watchkeeping (STCW) certified mariner skills

The largest and most important component of MSTP is the design and construction of Mariner Skills Training Centers (MSTCs) in Norfolk and San Diego. These centers will consolidate critical navigation, shiphandling and leadership training efforts for our

Sailors into one location. Each facility will house 30 COVE III / NSST-2 simulators for individual training during the Surface Warfare Officer School courses, as well as a number of I-NSSTs to support both individual, team and unit training. MSTCs will also provide a wide variety of instructional courses, including the OOD courses; Radar Observer, Automated Radar Plotting Aid (ARPA) and ECDIS-N radar training; and Bridge Resources Management (BRM) mentoring workshops.

The Way Ahead Every recommendation stemming from the RROC process is designed to give our Sailors and ships the resources they need for safe and effective operations in order to build a culture of excellence. We've made progress on many of the RROC recommendations, but there is certainly more hard work ahead. We recognize that we must remain dedicated and vigilant in pursuit of meaningful and enduring Surface Force reforms. With Congress' continued support, we will fund and execute every effort that keeps our number one asset – our Sailors – safe as they defend our country in a competitive and dangerous world.

processes has been set," he said. "And now we're building on that foundation with a disciplined focus on people, process and capabilities."

The task of shifting into a more sustainable force is one that will require an increase in velocity for the DON, Spencer explained.

"We want to be capable to dominate future conflicts from the seafloor to space - blue water, the littorals, mountains and desert - and also throughout the information and data domain," he said.

"And we must execute this vision with truly a sense of urgency. We have the money; we do not have the ability to buy time. We must continually think how we should improve and improve at the speed of relevance so that our Sailors and Marines are always prepared to deliver the fight tonight and win

Spencer additionally emphasized how learning and risk-taking play key roles in achieving such a vision.

"At every level, the Navy-Marine Corps team must be a continual learning organization, constantly challenging assumptions to find ways to increase readiness and lethality," he said. "We're migrating from a culture of risk eradication to one of understanding and managing risk while dynamically changing the way that we will meet the demands of the force."

Prior to Spencer's remarks, other military and civilian defense leadership conducted panels on expeditionary warfare, artificial intelligence and the modernization of military training.

During the expeditionary warfare panel, Rear Adm. Jim Kilby, director of warfare integration (N9I) explained that littoral combat ships (LCS), small surface vessels, unmanned surface and undersea vessels are all important pro-

curements expeditionary forces need to shift the battle lines away from shore and align with the national defense strategy.

"In the Pentagon, as we talk about expeditionary operations, we don't view these amphibious platforms as just a transport ship or a truck," said Kilby. "They're much more than that. They provide access, maneuver, sustainment - with an airport, seaport, hospital - and a very capable combat systems suite. So those, in conjunction with things like the Joint Strike Fighter, are really changing the way we view those assets and how they would help us in this great power competition."

Kilby noted expeditionary advanced basing operations (EABO) are an important key to sustaining maritime superiority in the future.

"When you think about expeditionary advanced basing operations and the ability to use that exquisite sensor and weapons from remote land platforms, connected with the Navy, there's a powerful ability to sustain our forces in a contested environment." said Kilby.

"We should think of things in that advanced, integrated, connected mode of the ability to get to integrated fires across [the Navy and Marine Corps]. And those are the kinds of conversations I've had ... as we've advanced this thinking collectively as a Naval fight vice a Navy fight."

Panelists also discussed the evolving process of modernizing the Navy's training and its efforts to improve the reliability, accessibility, usability and convenience of personnel services for Sailors.

"When it comes to modernization, we know that Sailors do not learn better through PowerPoint slides," said Rear Adm. John Nowell, Jr., director of military personnel plans and policy (N13).

"It's more about: "Can they learn better on a device? Can they learn better digitally? Can they learn better virtually, or with an avatar?"

Part of that process includes transforming the Navy's human resource experience through consolidation, bringing a host of sites together under services like MyNavy Portal, MyNavy Career Center, the Advancement Dashboard and the Detailing Marketplace.

"We are taking a suite of systems that are not interoperable, and we are collapsing them into one family and then moving them to the cloud," said Nowell. "We are going to move [these systems] from behind a [common access card], allowing Sailors to access their records, negotiate their orders and do training from their own mobile device. It is about modernizing our personnel system to improve our training and career readiness where the Sailor is resilient, tough and has the support as we develop them as leaders."

oritize personal safety over a PRT score. Sailors who fail to complete any portion of the PRT or demonstrate any early signs of exercise distress are authorized a Bad Day PRT and are required to be examined by medical professionals before attempting the PRT again.

Additionally, Sailors must complete the followon PRT within seven days following medical clearance, within 45 days of the body composition assessment date and within the current Navy Physical Fitness Assessment cycle. Any Sailors who fail to complete the Bad Day PRT for a second time must be screened by medical professionals for the possibility of a medical waiver or enrollment in the Fitness Enhancement Program (FEP).

When Sailors observe an emergency during physical training, rapid recognition of symptoms with a timely and accurate response is critical. Some syndromes result in rapid collapse while others may slowly evolve to an initial conscious collapse.

Understanding the syndromes that can lead to exercise-related collapse can assist in guiding treatment. Three syndromes to be aware of are Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA), Exertional Collapse Associated with SCT (ECAST) and Exertional Heat Stroke (EHS). Read more about the specifics of these syndromes in the NAVADMIN.

Additionally, after participating in the PRT, participants should be observed for no less than 10 minutes after the test, during an active cool-down period.

All PRT evolutions shall be monitored by cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) trained personnel with an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) readily available. All physical training evolutions (e.g., command physical training, fitness enhancement program (FEP) or Sailor 360) involving moderate exercise shall occur within the Emergency Medical Service (base or 911) response area of an ambulance equipped with a defibrillator, oxygen and hydration.

Finally, all CFLs, first responders, corpsmen and supervisors are strongly recommended to view the videos and other training resources available on the Uniformed Services University's Consortium for Health and Military Performance (CHAMP) website:

Greg Wright, Commander, Navy Installations Command housing director. "Sailors and families should report deficiencies to the property managers immediately. If the issue is not resolved, they need to notify the Navy Housing Service Center or their command, who will advocate on their behalf."

For PPV housing, the first step is to report any issue to the local PPV property manager. If the issue is not resolved in a timely manner or of quality standards, residents are asked to contact their local Navy Housing Service Center (HSC), which directly reports to the installation commanding officer, or the service member's chain of command.

For service members or families renting a home in the community, you are urged to first contact your landlord to address your maintenance issue or other concerns with the home. If you believe your concerns have not been properly addressed, then take the next step and contact your local Navy HSC or inform your chain of command

For government-owned or leased housing, residents with suggestions, concerns or complaints can first contact their local maintenance trouble desk. If your housing issues remain unresolved, contact your Navy HSC or chain of command.

For Sailors living in unaccompanied housing units, the first step to have your concerns addressed is to follow local guidance and contact Navy housing staff. If the issues are not fixed, then contact your unaccompanied housing manager or report your concerns to your chain of command.

"While we work to better understand the extent of the problem, we are moving forward with some immediate actions to help our Sailors and their families address their unresolved issues," Wright said. "When problems are reported, they will be resolved as quickly as possible."

## Seabees help preserve a portion of USS Arizona history

PEARL HARBOR

In the aftermath, and from the ashes of December 7, 1941, which propelled the United States into World War II, rose a new call and opportunity to serve in the Navy, the Naval Construction Battalions. Today, they are known as Seabees.

At the time of the attack on Pearl Harbor, the Navy used civilian contractors to construct and support bases and other locations. However, with an increasing need to be able to defend and resist against military attacks, civilians could no longer be used. According to the Seabee Museum and Memorial Park, under international law it was illegal to arm civilians and have them resist

the enemy. "If they did they could be executed as guerrillas." On January 5, 1942, Rear Adm. Ben Moreell received approval to organize the Naval Construction Force. In a matter of days, the first naval construction unit deployed.

Today, with seven rates ranging from Builder (BU) to Engineering Aide (EA) to Utilitiesman (UT), Seabees are a fully-functioning construction crew. They are strategically placed, ready to deploy at a moment's notice, and able to build, erect and salvage in various types of environments. Construction Battalion Maintenance Unit (CBMU) 303 Detachment Pearl Harbor is one such unit.

CBMU 303 Detachment Pearl Harbor has the unique opportunity to assist and service the land from which they were birthed. One of their current projects is assisting Jim Neuman, History and Heritage Outreach Manager at Commander Navy Region Hawaii, and his team with the USS Arizona Relics Program.

"The USS Arizona Relics Program was born in 1995 when Congress authorized the Navy to move pieces of the wreckage out to educational institutions and not-for-profit organizations," said Neuman

The program is currently focusing on a part of the Arizona that was removed in the 1950's due to corrosion and safety concerns. Before its removal it acted as a foundation for a makeshift platform where visitors to the Arizona could stand and where ceremonies could be conducted. It was a precursor to the white memorial structure known and visited today.

The Seabees and Neuman have taken on the responsibility to cut sections of the previously removed portion of the Arizona and ship them to various approved locations.

"Mostly people come to us. We have a lot of Pearl Harbor survivors that know about this [effort]," said Neuman. "They will reach out to local museums and share what they would like to see. As long as you are a legitimate educational institution or not-for-profit and the piece will be on public display, you can acquire a piece."

A sentiment both the Seabees and Neuman have in common is the need to share a piece of history with others.

"Because of the amount of time [the section] has been out here, we want to make sure we get as much of it out to the public as possible," said Neuman. "It doesn't help for it to sit here and no one get a chance to see it."

Builder 1st Class Christian Guzman, attached to CBMU 303 Detachment Pearl Harbor, who has helped lead the Seabees in this

## USS Rhode Island successfully tests Trident II D5 Missile

The Ohio-class ballistic-missile submarine USS Rhode Island (SSBN 740) along with the U.S. Navy's Strategic Systems Programs (SSP) conducted a successful test flight of one unarmed Trident II D5 missile, May 9.

This launch marked the 172nd successful test flight of the Trident II D5 missile since its introduction to the fleet in 1989.

This test flight was part of a Demonstration and Shakedown Operation, designated DASO 29. The primary objective of a DASO is to evaluate and demonstrate the readiness of the SSBN's strategic weapon system and crew before operational deployment following its engineered refueling overhaul (ERO).

"I'm incredibly proud of Team King's Bay and the Rhode Island crew. They've spent the last nine months preparing for this test and the patrols that will follow. Because of their hard work and dedication, our sea based deterrent remains the most survivable and reliable in the world," said Rear Adm. Michael Bernacchi, Commander, Submarine Group 10.

Rhode Island completed its ERO in August 2018. An ERO is a com-

#### EXERCISE NORTHERN EDGE 2019 KICKS OFF IN ALASKA

Approximately 10,000 U.S. military personnel are participating in exercise Northern Edge 2019 (NE19), a joint training exercise hosted by U.S. Pacific Air Forces, on and above central Alaska ranges and the Gulf of Alaska, May 13-24.

NE19 is one in a series of U.S. Indo-Pacific Command exercises in 2019 that prepares joint forces to respond to crises in the Indo-Pacific. 

"Hey, Mom, what's up?" Lilly appeared on my smartphone screen after I clicked the video call icon. Now that she was a freshman in college, we tried to talk at least once a week.

"Oh, not much," I said, hearing a jumble of voices in the background. "Where are you, anyway?"

"At the library," she said. A very good sign, I thought.

"My friends and I came here before class." Lilly showed the girls piled onto the couch beside her. She wasn't studying. She was eating a salad, hanging out with friends, and printing her Spanish paper. Oh well, good enough.

We chatted about the usual things — how exams were going, boys, her plans for summer, this and that. Knowing that I was meeting a friend for coffee in an hour, I carried the phone with me while I multitasked, throwing the ball for our dog Moby, folding clothes, emptying the dishwasher, picking an outfit to wear.

"Well, Lil, I'd better go get in

the shower," I said after we'd talked for thirty minutes.

"No, Mom! Can't you take the phone with you?" she said.

"In the shower? The phone will get wet!"

"Please! Just put it on the ledge outside the shower, I've done it before."

Lilly didn't have anything specific to talk about, but I wasn't about to shut her down. Since Lilly had left for college, we'd been worried about her. Our modest home was most definitely loving, but we didn't talk much about thoughts, feelings, fears, or dreams.

Strangely, now that I am an adult, my mother and I talk frequently about everything. I once remembered that she had never discussed the "birds and the bees" with me, and I asked her

"Well, I, I," she stuttered, trying to remember her state of mind so long ago, "back then, experts said wait for children to ask questions, and be prepared. So, I went out and bought the Life Cycle books, and waited for you to ask. But you never did."

I felt compassion for my mother, trying her best using her stoic German butcher's upbringing tempered by her sincere intentions. She was right. I never approached her with questions about life. I'd learned the technical stuff in awkward middle school classes. But I was missing the rest — the this and that.

The subtle exchange of seemingly mundane thoughts that somehow provides answers to the

questions that swirl through adolescent minds. Why do I feel bad about myself all the time? Are you proud of me? Is it normal to be afraid to go to college? Do I need a boyfriend? Can I trust my friends? What if I fail? Am I good

When Lilly begged me to continue our call during my shower, how could I refuse?

Our chat continued from my shower, to my closet, to my car, where Lilly described her project poster, her friend Molly, and her salad in minute detail.

"You're making me hungry," I said, pulling up to the coffee shop where my friend waited in the parking lot. Scanning for the right combination of words to not make her feel insignificant, I began, "Uh, Lilly, I'm really sorry, but I have to ..."

"Mom, I gotta go! Love you!" Lilly blurted, and I heard a cacophony of laughter before the video blinked out.

In our hour-and-a-half conversation, no crucial questions were asked or answered, no deep philosophies were discussed. But, like mortar between the bricks, the mundane this and that would help Lilly build a strong founda-

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## Recruiting mission centralization

#### MILLINGTON, TENN.

In support of its growing recruiting mission, Navy Recruiting Command has adjusted their tactics for bringing Sailors into the Navy Reserve. Specifically, this adjustment led to the centralization of the prior service mission, which focuses on transitioning active duty Sailors directly into Reserve Component without a break in service. This means focusing more recruiting assets into the fleet concentrated areas of Norfolk, San Diego, Seattle and Jacksonville, Florida, and putting elements in Hawaii and Japan.

The recruiters participating in the mission in these areas work with command career counselors at the active duty units, providing training and information sessions with Sailors who are getting close to separating from the active-duty Navy. The purpose of the prior service recruiters, known as reserve benefits advisors, is to expose active duty Sailors to the possibilities and advantages of joining the Navy Reserve straight from active duty without a break in service. Over the course of their time on active duty, it is possible that a Sailor may have little to no interaction with Navy Reservists, so this could be the first time they start to think about it as an option.

For the Navy Reserve, the purpose behind this move lies in the advantages of accessing Sailors directly from active duty without any break in service. With this seamless transition, Sailors' qualifications, job knowledge, and medical records will not become outdated, saving time and money that would have otherwise been devoted to retraining and requalifying the person.

"By taking someone straight from active duty to the reserve, we're able to immediately employ a fully trained and qualified Sailor," said Lt. Cmdr. John Poissant, the deputy director for prior service accessions. "Also, if the Sailor has critical Navy Enlisted Classifications (NECs), or special qualifications, we can plug them right into our higher demand, critical billets and they'll perform at the level we need them."

Engineman 2nd Class Natalia Cummings-Duckie is one of the Sailors in the Northeast Detachment of the prior service mission, located in Norfolk. This was the first detachment created for this initiative; it was started on October 1, 2018.

"What I try to instill in the Sailors that are thinking about getting out [of the Navy] is that life happens," said Cummings-Duckie, "Sometimes the great job you had set up on the outside might not pan out, or you may not like it after sixmonths, so it never hurts to use this as an option through your transition."

She says for these reasons, she wants to make sure Sailors at least see the reserve as an option, rather than throwing away all the time they spent building themselves up in the Navy

and starting over in the civilian sector.

The second detachment created was Navy Reserve Prior Service Detachment Southwest, based in San Diego. This detachment began operations on January 1, 2019.

"Most of these Sailors we talk to have never really gotten a lot of information about the Navy Reserve," said Builder 1st Class Justin Gomez, a member of the Prior Service Detachment Southwest, "So when we go in there and do our presentations, it's kind of a mind blower for a lot of people, and they tend to have a lot of questions."

As someone who has been on active duty, worked in the civilian world, returned to the reserve and now back on active duty orders, Gomez says he wants to help make the transition as smooth as possible for

these other Sailors. He routinely works through the process with the command career counselors and the Sailors themselves.

Gomez says, one of the best advantages he has while working in the Prior Service Detachment Southwest is that he spent his entire career in the Navy in the San Diego area, so he can connect with the Sailors, and they can see someone like himself who went into the reserve and benefited from it.

He also is excited about this new method of spreading awareness through these detachments, and he believes it's very effective.

"When a recruiter can focus fully on talking to Sailors who are already in the Navy, rather than also having to go to high schools and job fairs in addition to it looking for people to bring into the reserve, it makes the job a lot more efficient, and it lets you give more time to people who are already in [the Navy]," said Gomez. "It helps make the whole transition smoother, and it helps with Navy retention as well."

Poissant says this new method of educating and training Sailors has been very effective so far, and he is optimistic about the effects it will have on the Navy Reserve end strength. "I think overall we've had

a really positive effect on the number of Sailors coming into the Navy Reserve," said Poissant," and we've been a force multiplier for the career transition office by spending more time training and educating career counselors and the Sailors on the benefits of the Navy Reserve."

This initiative will certainly help ease the transition out of active duty for many Sailors, and it's another step in the right direction for Navy Recruiting Command to continue to support the requirements of the Navy Reserve.

Navy Recruiting Command consists of a command headquarters, three Navy Recruiting Regions, 18 Navy Recruiting Districts and eight Navy Talent Acquisition Groups that serve more than 1,330 recruiting stations across the world. Their combined goal is to attract the highest quality candidates to assure the ongoing success of America's Navy.

#### UCT-2 concludes maritime infrastructure assessment in FSM

#### **KOLONIA, POHNPEI**

Sailors assigned to Underwater Construction Team (UCT) 2, Construction Dive Det. Alpha, completed a recompression chamber inspection and maritime infrastructure assessment of the Pohnpei Harbor and Kapingamarangi Atoll, May 7, as part of Pacific Partnership 2019.

The assessment, which began April 16, will help maintain and expand the harbor port in Pohnpei and improve navigation safety in both Pohnpei and Kapingamarangi Atoll.

We came to Pohnpei for Pacific Partnership 2019 to inspect the faces of the wharf in the Pohnpei Harbor and do multiple hydrographic surveys, including surveying both the harbor in Pohnpei and Kapingamarangi Atoll," said Construction Electrician 1st Class Daniel Lehne, the project supervisor.

Capt. Randy Van Rossum, mission commander for Pacific Partnership 2019, spoke to the PP19 common goal of creating a safer environment for future disaster prepared-

"I am confident that the planning and hard work we've invested thus far will show in our successful collaborative efforts for a longlasting impact here in Micronesia," he said.

The UCT 2 Sailors used a single-beam hydrographic survey to create a map of the different water depths along the Pohnpei Harbor and the channel in Kapingamarangi At-

Lehne mentioned that the channel in Kapingamarangi Atoll is currently not only very narrow, but also has a very difficult 90degree turn. The hard turn and the narrowness prevent larger vessels from transiting during increased sea states.

"The surveys we completed will allow us to formulate a calculated plan using [precision placement of] explosives and other dredging techniques to widen the channel, making it a much safer passage for local ferries and the boats bringing supplies to the

The UCT 2 team also performed a wharf inspection at Pohnpei Harbor using specialized equipment to test the current thickness of the metal wall in the wharf face. The measurements taken will be used as a baseline measurement for future inspections to help track the deterioration of the metal on the face over time.

"We first began by training the Pohnpei port security divers on how to inspect their wharf because it has not been inspected since the 70s," said Construction Electrician 2nd Class Philip Wall. "We were able to show them underwater testing techniques using an ultrasonic thickness tester and a bathycorrometer to test metal thickness and cathodic protection."

Wall further explained that learning how to perform the wharf inspections would allow the port security members to maintain a safe wharf and eliminate the need of outside assistance to perform such crucial inspec-

This subject matter expert exchange is a cornerstone of Pacific Partnership, which aims to empower nations to improve their infrastructure and ability to respond to disas-

The UCT 2 team also inspected a local

recompression chamber at the Pohnpei State Hospital that has been nonoperational since

"We went to the hospital and did a walkthrough of the chamber," said Hospital Corpsman 1st Class Ryan Kitchens. "We had a checklist and discovered all the deficiencies. We developed a plan alongside the hospital manager to get the chamber operational and help save lives."

"We put a lot of effort into everything we did working with the locals," affirmed Lehne. "Instead of just completing another job, we became friends with a lot of the people here – we showed them how we do things so that they can continue doing those operations to make this a safer, more resilient place."

# Congressman John Lewis attends keel laying of namesake ship

Employees of Military Sealift Command, General Dynamics NASSCO of San Diego and dignitaries from across the country celebrated the keel laying of MSC's newest ship, USNS John Lewis at the NASSCO shipyard San Diego today.

Kevin Graney, NASSCO president welcomed ship namesake, Rep. John Lewis (D Ga.), and ship's sponsor, actress Alfre Woodard who attended the ceremony.

"I am absolutely thrilled to be here today in the capacity of sponsor to this great ship," said Woodard in her remarks. "As a leader, John Lewis is a bright light in the service of our country. May this ship be a beacon in times of darkness."

The time honored tradition of the keel laying, marks the official start of construction of the ship. Part of the tradition is for the sponsor to weld their initials into the keel plate of the new ship. After a few minutes' instruction, both Woodard and Lewis, dressed in protective equipment, took torches in hand and stepped into the ship's history. The steel plate with their initials will be permanently affixed to the ship's keel, remaining with the vessel through its time in service.

"I tried to promise myself that I would not be overcome, but this is too much," said Lewis.

USNS John Lewis will serve the United States Navy as a replenishment oiler under the control of MSC. The ship is the and the lead ship of her class of 20 perspective ships that will all be in the Lewis class. The ship honors Lewis, a 17 term congressman and a well-known civil rights activist, known for his courage during the civil rights movement of the 1960s. He organized voter registration drives and community action programs during the Mississippi Freedom Summer. He led over 600 peaceful, orderly protestors across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama on March 7, 1965, where the group was attacked by Alabama state troopers in a brutal confrontation that became known as "Bloody Sunday." Throughout his life, Lewis has remained a devoted advocate of the philosophy of nonviolence, and continues to advocate for peace throughout the world.

"We need great ships, like this one, to carry our men and women in our continued work for peace, because we are one world," said Lewis.

project, appreciates the opportunity for he and his team to recover sections for the public worldwide.

"We have a special tie to Pearl Harbor and World War II because that's how we began. It is of historical significance that we, as Seabees, are able to work on the USS Arizona," said

Neuman explained that the Seabees were the obvious choice when considering how to satisfy the different request through the program.

"It is Navy history, Navy legacy, so it made sense that if we were going to have somebody actually cutting pieces of the [Arizona] wreckage we should have the Seabees do it," said Neuman. "Because of their legacy, what they do historically and their mission, they have enthusiastically embraced it, which I really appreci-

To date, the Seabees of CBMU 303 Detachment Pearl Harbor have completed three phases of the project. Those phases consisted of cutting and shipping out various sized pieces to: Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community in Arizona, the Panhandle War Memorial in Texas, and the World War II Foundation in Rhode

They are currently working on phase four which will be shipped to the Imperial War Museum in London, England.

"Britain was an ally in World War II. When the Empire of Japan surrendered on September 2, 1945, on the USS Missouri, they didn't only sur-

render to the U.S. they surrendered to the allies as well. They all signed the document so I'm thrilled that the museum sees the significance," said Neuman. "They want to tell the whole story of World War II, not just the part they played. Visitors to the museum will be able to see part of the USS Arizona, and I think that's great."

The Seabees and Neuman will continue to partner together, work on the removed section of the Arizona and ship pieces out until there is nothing

The Seabees are proud to be a part of this undertaking as well as other jobs they execute around the island of Oahu.

"We have a whole spectrum of skill sets. This project only showcases a snippet of our diverse capabilities," stated Guzman.

day demonstrates not only that this ship's crew and shipboard weapons system are ready to return to service, but also that the sea-based leg of our nuclear deterrent remains ready, reliable and credible," said Capt. Mark Behning, deputy director, SSP.

"While we've demonstrated today that our efforts to extend the life of our existing D5 missiles and SSBNs are successful, it is imperative that we remain focused on the Navy's number one priority: on-time delivery of the first Colombia-class submarine," said Behning.

SSP, along with Naval Ordnance Test Unit, oversees the DASO certification process and provides integrated testing and evaluation capabilities, while various other

organizations provide support. Ohio-class SSBNs carry up to 20 submarinelaunched ballistic missiles, and provide the United States with its most survivable and enduring nuclear strike capability. The design allows the submarines to operate for 15 years or more between major overhauls. The Columbia-class submarine will not need to be refueled during its lifetime.

Rhode Island is the fourth U.S. Navy ship to bear the name and was commissioned July 9, 1994. Assigned to Submarine Group 10, Rhode Island is one of five ballistic-missile submarines homeported at Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay, Georgia.



## SUFFOLK NATIVE SERVES WITH NAVY STRIKE FIGHTER SQUADRON

VIRGINIA BEACH, VA.

A 2009 Kingsfork High School graduate and Suffolk, Virginia, native is currently serving with a U.S. Navy strike fighter squadron which flies one of the world's most advanced warplanes.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Nathan LeGrand is an aviation ordnanceman with the Gladiators of VFA-106, which operates out of Naval Air Station Oceana. A Navy aviation ordnanceman is responsible for loading the aircraft with missiles and bombs, and handling ordnance when not attached to planes.

LeGrand credits success in the Navy to many of the lessons learned growing up in Suffolk.

"Me, I've always just taken it day-by-day, rolling with whatever comes your way," said LeGrand.

Members of VFA 106 fly and maintain the F/A 18 Super Hornet, one of the most advanced aircraft in the world. The Super Hornet takes off from and lands on Navy aircraft carriers at sea and is capable of conducting air-to-air combat as well as striking targets on land. It is approximately 61 feet long, has a loaded weight of 51,000 pounds, and a max speed of 1,190 miles per


Operating from sea aboard aircraft

carriers, the Super Hornet gives the Navy the power to protect America's interests anywhere, at any time. The versatile jet has the ability to destroy targets located hundreds of miles inland. Super Hornets are an all-weather aircraft used as an attack aircraft as well as a fighter. In its fighter mode, the F/A-18 is used primarily as a fighter escort and for fleet air defense; in its attack mode, it is used for interdiction and air support.

A key element of the Navy the nation needs is tied to the fact that America is a maritime nation, according to Navy officials, and that the nation's prosperity is tied to the ability to operate freely on the world's oceans. More than 70 percent of the Earth's surface is covered by water; 80 percent of the world's population lives close to a coast; and 90 percent of all global trade by volume travels by sea.

LeGrand is playing an important part in America's focus on rebuilding military readiness, strengthening alliances and reforming business practices in support of National Defense Strategy.

"Our priorities center on people, capabilities and processes, and will be achieved by our focus on speed, value, results and partnerships," said Secretary of the Navy Richard V. Spencer. "Readiness, lethality and modernization are the requirements

driving these priorities."

Though there are many ways for sailors to earn distinction in their command, community and career, LeGrand is most proud of qualifying to supervise for safety when an ordnance team loads weapons.

"I'm responsible for the safety of the evolution. You need to be a petty officer second class or above," said LeGrand. "I also have three Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medals. One was for an inspection that we scored really well. It all means something."

Serving in the Navy is a continuing tradition of military service for LeGrand, who

has military ties with family members who have previously served. LeGrand is honored to carry on the family tradition.

"My father and older brother served," said LeGrand. "They gave me advice and affected my decision."

As a member of one of the U.S. Navy's most relied-upon assets, LeGrand and other sailors know they are part of a legacy that will last beyond their lifetimes providing the Navy the nation needs.

"The Navy lets me present myself as a role model to my kids," added LeGrand.



Her performance credits with DTH include Giselle, Firebird, Footprints Dressed in Red, The River, Toccata E Due Canzoni, Etosha, Serenade, The Four Temperaments, Agon, Allegro Brillante, and the role of the siren in George Balanchine's The Prodigal Son. 




