

Navy announces 2019 Stockdale Award recipients

WASHINGTON

Navy announced Cmdr. Patrick O'Loughlin of U.S. Fleet Forces Command and Cmdr. Carl Trask of Pacific Fleet Command as recipients of the 2019 Vice Admiral James Bond Stockdale Leadership Award in NAVADMIN 208/19, Sept. 9.

O'Loughlin is commanding officer of USS Forrest Sherman (DDG 98) and Trask is the former commanding officer of USS Connecticut (SSN 22).

The award is named for Vice Adm. James Bond Stockdale, a Naval Academy graduate and pilot. In September 1965, Stockdale ejected from his A-4E Skyhawk over North Vietnam and was captured. While prisoner, Stockdale served as an inspiring leader to

Leaders pledge to eliminate sexual assault, harassment on campuses, military bases

NEW YORK

Top military leaders joined East Coast university presidents and administrators at a conference here Thursday to pledge their steadfast commitment to eradicating sexual violence and harassment on campuses and military bases.

The Department of the Navy (DoN) cohosted its first Regional Discussion on Sexual Assault and Sexual Harassment at America's Colleges, Universities and Service Academies with the State University of New York (SUNY) at the NYC Marriott East Side and the SUNY Global Center. More than 280 attendees included regional experts at providing safe learning and working environments for students and Soldiers, Sailors, Marines and Airmen.

Secretary of the Navy Richard V. Spencer, who opened the conference with SUNY Chancellor Kristina Johnson, said sharing military assault and harassment data with colleges and universities is the first salvo in finding a solution to eliminate these destructive behaviors.

"This is an issue that I am passionate about, and I have made a commitment that I will do everything that we can on my watch to start the eradication of this," he said. "This is a huge co-generational issue that we should not expect to be solved overnight; we should expect to go after this with great expedition, great trepidation, courage, ener-

NAS OCEANA CHIEF SELECTS HOLD HEROES BREAKFAST

Chief petty officer selects stationed on board Naval Air Station Oceana held a "Heroes Breakfast" Sept. 10 at the Center for Naval Aviation Technical Training Unit Oceana to recognize Naval Air Station Oceana's chiefs who have passed away.

The Heroes Breakfast was attended by Naval Air Station Oceana leadership, chief selectees, and current and retired chief petty officers.

MA1 Mario A. Osman, a chief select assigned to the Naval Air Station Oceana security department, said a ceremony such as the Heroes Breakfast is inspiring to him.

"As a chief select, this tells me that I'm joining something that is not about me," said Osman. "There's a bigger picture when it comes to the chief's mess. We are joining a legacy; something we are charged with passing on to the next chiefs."

The Heroes Breakfast is not only a way to remember the fallen chief petty officers and bring former, current and future chiefs together. It served as an opportunity for the chief selects to practice organizing events; something Senior Chief Master-At-Arms Mike Hausmann, one of the leaders for "Chief Season" on board Naval Air Station Oceana, says is an important part of the selects' training.

"The Heroes Breakfast is held precisely at this time of year for a reason," said Hausmann. "It gives us a training opportunity for the selects to put on an event, and the sense of heritage, history, patriotism, and remembrance exhibited here are things we are bringing to the forefronts of their minds."

Hausmann said the training that the chief selects undergo is meant to instill in them a new mindset, and to teach them to look at problems from the perspective of a chief.

"E-7 in the navy means something a lot different than any other service," said Hausmann. "We start training our chiefs when they're still first class petty officers. The last 6 weeks is for us to test them mentally, challenge them to perform under pressure, and change their mindsets from an E-6

mentality into a chief's mentality. We use these 6 weeks to frame them for success."


Senior Chief Aviation Machinist's Mate Theresa Munet, another "Chief Season" lead, said an event like the Heroes Breakfast is meant to help shape their new mindset as they prepare to enter the Chief's Mess.

"Most of the time, as first class petty officers, they're thinking about their own 'little box' of themselves and their work centers," said Munet. "When we do things like this, we have to bring them out of that mindset and have them start thinking about the 'greater than."

Munet said she hopes the chief selects are instilled with a sense of heritage and humility, and begin seeing the "bigger picture" by the end of "Chief Season."

"Most of the time we talk about the chief season, we talk about making chiefs in 7 to 8 weeks, which is unrealistic," said Munet. "Our goal is really to get them start and prepared for what is to come."

The Naval Air Station Oceana chief selects will be pinned with their gold fouled

anchors on Sept. 13 at the Aerotheater on board the installation.

Osman said he's excited to finally become a chief petty officer, humbled and instilled with a new sense of pride within the United States Navy.

"Tradition is how we make it to the future," said Osman. "But to make it to the future, we must always remember our his-

A girl lies unresponsive and face-down in a parking garage. A group begins to gather around her, and though the call for emergency services is made, no one steps up to help the girl. Soon, a Sailor steps out of her car, turns the girl over and begins to perform first aid; she finds the girl has an injury to her head, but is breathing. Because of her training and quick response, the Sailor is able to provide the girl with necessary care until first responders arrive.

This is the scenario Information Systems Technician 2nd Class Marisol Zamudio, a stretcher bearer aboard the aircraft carrier USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69), found herself in while off-duty, Sept. 2.

"I'm not somebody who is just going to pass by someone on the ground like that," said Zamudio. "If it were me, I would want someone to respond. Once the bystanders told me they didn't know any first aid, I knew it was up to me to assist in any way I can."

Though Zamudio was among strangers at the time, word of her actions spread fast. She began to receive recognition from her peers and chain of command and soon found herself standing on a tractor during an all-hands call shaking the commanding officer's hand.

"She didn't have to respond," said Hospital Corpsman 2nd Class Amos Hodnett, the medical representative in charge of the battle dressing station Zamudio is assigned to. "She took the initiative and got involved. Her actions say that she not only received the proper training, but she's picked up on it and is able to respond both off ship and onboard Ike."

Though it was Zamudio's desire to help others that pushed her to respond, she wanted to give credit to Ike's medical department for training she received as a stretcher bearer.

"They train us way beyond the required level of knowledge for a stretcher bearer," said Zamudio. "Medical makes our training as real as possible with all of the moulage and curveballs they throw our way. I take my training very seriously because helping others is something I really want to do."


Sailors aboard Ike received a plethora of training focused on fighting for the ship and their shipmates, including general quarters and mass casualty drills. Taking these simulations seriously can mean the difference between life and death.

"She's been one of our stretcher bearers for a while," said Hodnett. "She's good at what she does and soon she's going to be a part of our medical training team. Taking your training seriously is important; responding the right way could save a life, but responding the wrong way could cause further damage."

Zamudio said that though she was glad to help, she didn't expect all the recognition she was given. She said she loves helping others and hopes to one day become a first responder herself.

"I didn't think this was a big deal," said Zamudio. "I'm a stretcher bearer. If you see someone who needs help, even if you don't know how to help them, stand by them. Don't walk away. I'm just happy I got to help."

NMCP hosts 2nd annual Cancer Research Rodeo

PORTSMOUTH, VA.

August is Cancer Research Awareness Month, and the Warriors of Hope Cancer Awareness Committee hosted the 2nd annual Cancer Research Rodeo on Aug. 29 to promote cancer research and resources at Naval Medical Center Portsmouth (NMCP).

"I think with the transient population in the military, people don't know that some of these oncology programs exist," said Melvina Queen, a member of NMCP's Radiation Oncology Warriors of Hope Cancer Awareness Committee. "Some don't know that we treat children for cancer and specifically that we have Children Oncology protocols for clinical research here. Same thing for Radiation Oncology. When people think of these things, they think of Sentara, they

think of Children's Hospital of the King's Daughters (CHKD). They are not thinking that innovative research is happening or available at NMCP."

The committee's goal for the rodeo was not only to inform NMCP patients about the research, but also to inform staff about how important research is and for them to support. Research at NMCP is made possible through the support of patients who volunteer to participate, and by the physicians presenting the opportunity for enrollment to their patients.

"This is about awareness," Queen said. "Sometimes doctors, residents and other physician's first reaction is to refer patients across the water and don't realize that we can actually do some of this stuff here. So this is not just for our patients and ourselves, it's also for our colleagues and our shipmates."

Now in their 2nd year, the rodeo has expanded, involving not only different departments within the medical center, but also different commands that share the same roof with NMCP. The research clinics and commands that participated were Cancer Screening / Population Health Department, Gynecology Oncology, Murtha Cancer Center Biobank, Pediatric Oncology, Tumor Registry/ NMCP Cancer Committee, Radiation Oncology, and Navy and Marine Corps Public Health Center (NM-CPHC) EpiData Center DOD Cancer Task

"We have actually expanded," Queen said. "This year, instead of just focusing on the research coordinators we had last year that involved targeted areas for treatment, we are focusing on the bigger picture by adding our investigative partners; knowing how our incidence numbers fit nationally, knowing what we are seeing in the number of cases and incidence of cancer at the hospital. We are able to provide cancer research because we know some of these answers from data already out there; we know what to expect."

Queen believes it is important to host this event every year due to annotating any development in recent cancer research as well as presenting to mostly a new audience every year due to constant shuffling in military ranks.

"We are a military population, everybody is rotating every few years," Queen said. "Cancer is not going away. It's something that we still need to be concerned about. When we think about 'Centers of Excellence', we need to recognize NMCP for being a 'Center of Excellence' for cancer research and cancer treatment as a whole."

Navy awards largest IT contract to date in support of MyNavy HR transformation

The Navy awarded CACI Enterprise Solutions, Inc., based in Chantilly, VA., a \$385 million task order Sept. 6 in support of My-Navy HR Transformation, the Navy's Manpower, Personnel, Training and Education (MPT&E) efforts to modernize human resource systems.

The Program Executive Office for Enterprise Information Systems Sea Warrior Program (PMW 240) will execute the task order.

"This task order will provide PMW 240 the technical support resources to transform the Navy's existing human resources systems into a modern, cloud-based infrastructure that will deliver 21st century services and capabilities to our Sailors," said Kenneth Johnson, acting program manager for the Sea Warrior

Program.

The Transformation Portfolio Coordinator and Production task order was awarded utilizing an accelerated acquisition process, reducing the time from solicitation to award by 16 months. The accelerated process reduced government risk and saved the government significant time and money.

"The accelerated acquisition approach had a ripple effect in manpower savings to include time, personnel and acquisition costs, but more importantly, it allows us to continue uninterrupted our upgrading of personnel systems for our Sailors," Johnson said.

CACI Enterprise Solutions, Inc..will be a strategic partner with Sea Warrior Program to transform how human resources services are offered that will directly and positively impact the entire Navy Hire-to-Retire lifecycle. 
Sailors over the next several years.



his fellow prisoners until his release in February 1973. He received the Medal of Honor in 1976 and served as president of the Naval War College from October 1977 until August 1979. Stockdale articulated five roles for a leader: moralist, jurist, teacher, steward and philosopher.

Today, the Stockdale Award recognizes those who demonstrate inspirational leadership both professionally and personally, and contribute to the improvement of leadership in the Navy.

Active duty Navy commanders and below who are serving in command of a single ship, submarine, aviation squadron, Sea, Air, Land (SEAL) team, naval special warfare squadron, SEAL delivery vehicle team, special boat team, explosive ordnance disposal mobile unit, mobile diving and salvage unit, or Navy special clearance team may be nominated by their peers. Officers who wish to make a nomination must themselves be eligible for the award.

A selection board meets and selects two winners from a group of six finalists. These finalists deserve special mention:

gy and thinking outside the box."

Johnson said the exchange of ideas among institutions of higher education and subject-matter experts is necessary to drive down incidents of sexual assault and sexual harassment. "At SUNY we have developed a comprehensive policy agenda that includes providing cutting-edge training to enhance the knowledge and skills of our students, faculty and staff," she said.

The four superintendents of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Coast Guard military academies joined Rear Adm. Michael Alfultis, president of the SUNY Maritime College, in a special panel discussion on their views on preventing sexual assault and harassment and the effectiveness of current programs.

Vice Adm. Sean Buck, superintendent of the Naval Academy, said current efforts such as midshipmen surveys must be enhanced by commitments from top academy leaders as well as from their peers. "As we show our students that we have a very inclusive and safe environment where they're treated with dignity and respect, which they may not have been treated [with] before, they begin to feel like they can open up and trust their leadership," said Buck

University and military students also provided feedback to the leaders. Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy Russell L. Smith moderated a panel of students who answered audience questions and discussed their perspectives and role in effective assault-prevention programs.

Midshipman 1st Class Kody Rulofson said the educational side of sexual assault and harassment is crucial to his generation, in particular the way information is disseminated through the ranks. More transparency in not only the results of surveys and data but also in the processes cadets or midshipmen can use to get through these difficult situations will create greater trust in leadership, he said.

leadership, he said.

The regional discussion concluded with

closing remarks by Vice Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Robert Burke.

"This is a serious subject, but talking about it helps. There is an undercurrent of hope and confidence here," he said. "I am inspired by a sense of purpose as we come together to learn from one another, to take new ideas toward our shared goal of eliminating sexual assault. Changing culture takes time and commitment, so we must stay with it."

The conference follows the inaugural National Discussion, held at the U.S. Naval Academy in April. The U.S. Army will host the second annual National Discussion on Sexual Assault and Sexual Harassment at West Point April 1-2, 2020. The Department of the Navy plans to host discussions at other locations in the next year, including in the Southwest and the Midwest.

Dept. of Navy transforms Naval education, hires first Chief Learning Officer

WASHINGTON

Secretary of the Navy Richard V. Spencer on Sept. 10 announced John R. Kroger as the Department of the Navy's first-ever chief learning officer (CLO), who will lead and unify all Navy and Marine Corps formal education programs.

Kroger comes to the Department from Harvard University, where he served as a visiting professor at Harvard Law School and leader in residence at the Kennedy School of Government. He was president of Reed College in Portland, Oregon, from 2012 to 2018. He previously served as attorney general for the State of Oregon and as a federal prosecutor.

As the secretary of the Navy's staff assistant for naval education, Kroger will be responsible for implementing sweeping educational changes, directed by Spencer earlier this year, to better prepare the Navy and Marine Corps for a new era of great power competition and massive technological change. This was one of the key recommendations of the Education for Seapower (E4S) study completed late last year, chaired by Under Secretary of the Navy Thomas B. Modly, the first such review of naval education in more than 100 years.

As the leader of naval education, Kroger will align the efforts of the Department's academic institutions to improve officers-

'critical and strategic thinking. Those institutions include the United States Naval Academy, Naval War College, Marine Corps University and the Naval Postgraduate School.

Any eligible full-time student who has a B-grade point average equivalent or better, as determined by their school system, may enter the drawing. Homeschooled students can also qualify with acknowledgement that the student has a "B" average or equivalent record of accomplishment.

Eligible students include dependent children of active duty members, reservists and military retirees as well as U.S. civilian Department of Defense employees stationed outside the continental United States and U.S. civilian employees of firms under contract to the Department of Defense outside the continental United States. Students must be enrolled in 1st through 12th grade. Dependent children without an individual Dependent Identification Card must be accompanied by their sponsor to submit their entry. Each student may enter only once each grading period and must re-enter with each qualifying report card.

SCHOLARS PROGRAM

To enter the drawing, students will need to stop by any NEX with their current report card or other performance document and fill out an entry card that will be validated by an NEX associate. Once students fill out an entry card they will be given coupon good for \$10 off a one-time purchase of \$20 or more.

Comfort provides medical assistance in Colombia

The hospital ship USNS Comfort (T-AH 20) arrived in Colombia for its fifth medical mission in Central America, South America and the Caribbean.

While in port, a joint team of U.S. and partner nation service members and non-governmental organization civilians will work alongside host nation specialists to provide medical assistance to help relieve pressure on the health system strained by the Venezuelan migration crisis.

"Delivering medical care to a large number of people in such a short amount of time is an enormous undertaking," said Lt. Cmdr. Daniel Dean, one of the two temporary medical treatment site officers-in-charge. "Hav-

ing the support of our partner nation counterparts makes the experience both possible and rewarding."

The Comfort team consists of more than 900 personnel including military, non-governmental organization volunteers and personnel from partner nations.

"We have worked closely with the U.S. embassy and Santa Marta's Ministry of Health to bring the very best in humanitarian and civic assistance to the people of Santa Marta," said Capt. Patrick Amersbach, commanding officer, USNS Comfort. "We're doing something really important here, and I'm excited be a part of bringing this opportunity to Santa Marta on this next leg of our mission."

This marks the sixth Comfort visit to Colombia and the seventh to the region since 2007. The embarked medical teams will pro-





Joint Staff Leader welcomes newest top tacticians to the Fleet

Ten surface warfare officers joined a growing base of top tacticians in the Surface Fleet by earning the qualification as Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD) Warfare Tactics Instructors (WTI) from Naval Surface and Mine Warfighting Development Center (SMWDC) during a ceremony at the Aegis Training and Readiness Center.

"In the maritime profession of arms, WTIs are key strategic enablers operating at the tactical level," said Deputy Director for Resources and Acquisition on the Joint Staff Rear Adm. James Aiken, who was the guest speaker at the event. "You should be proud of what you have accomplished; know that we are placing special trust and confidence in each of you to be warriors, thinkers, teachers, and learners who are not only developing your own knowledge and expertise, but more importantly, developing battle-minded, well-prepared warfighters alongside you on ships going into harm's way. You have an important mission through SMWDC's lines of operation and in your follow on assignments."

The Navy established SMWDC in 2015 along with four other Warfighting Development Centers (WDC) in other warfight-



ing communities - to increase the lethality and proficiency of the Surface Force across all domains. The WTI program is a central element of SMWDC's efforts, and it is developing a new generation of highly trained surface warfare tacticians who are returning to the fleet as force-multipliers for their watch teams. After earning qualification in either Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD), Amphibious Warfare (AMW), Anti-Submarine/Surface Warfare (ASW/ SUW), and Mine Warfare (MIW), Warfare Tactics Instructors complete a production tour, where they bring their skills to bear by providing advanced tactical training, developing tactics and doctrine, providing operational support and crafting capability as-

SMWDC's Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD) Division in Dahlgren, Virginia is focused on training top junior officer talent within the surface force, specific to the field of Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD). The IAMD Division executes the rigorous 15-week program that includes classroom instruction with the Aegis Training and Readiness Center (ATRC), and tactical training, mission planning, and on-site visits with the Naval Aviation Warfighting Development Center (NAWDC) and various Army and Air Force commands. The program focuses on the Navy's most innovative tactics and technologies. Further, WTI candidates each have a specific research focus area to start them on the path to becoming a subject matter expert on that particular topic.

Additionally, select IAMD WTIs play an important role in the development of Live Fire With a Purpose (LFWAP) events – an enhanced missile exercise program designed to increase Fleet lethality and tactical proficiency. SMWDC is Commander, U.S. Fleet Force's and U.S. Pacific Fleet's executive agent (EA) for the LFWAP program, and plays a supporting role in the execution of the Strike Group-led events. Since program inception, more than 100 surface combatants - including aircraft carriers - have completed a LFWAP event.

Warfare commanders, commanding officers and leaders throughout the Fleet are highly encouraged to identify top talent to enter the WTI program. Commanding officers who wish to leverage WTI training for their top talent and keep them aboard their ship for a follow-on tour, should review the Accelerated Warfare or Division Officer Sequencing Plan programs available through SMWDC.

Renovated barracks reopens in Yokosuka

Capt. Rich Jarrett, Commander, Fleet Activities Yokosuka (CFAY) commanding officer, cut the ribbon to officially reopen newly renovated barracks for Sailors transitioning between commands on Sept. 6.

The building, completed in 1991, has been under renovation by Naval Facilities Engineering Command (NAVFAC) and the Japanese company Ogura for the past 18 months, at a cost of around \$14.2 million.

"This was a lot of hard work by NAVFAC and everyone else who worked together ... to create a better environment for Sailors transiting into the area," Jarrett said.

The two-person rooms in the Transient

Personnel Unit (TPU) feature a "Jack and Jill" setup, where two rooms are connected by a bathroom. Each room has brand-new furniture, and a gym and recreation room were included in the renovation.

"I love it because I helped design it," said Culinary Spec. 1st Class Dennis Evans, TPU's leading petty officer. "The best thing about the renovation is the rec room."

The 60,000 square feet of living space, across four floors, can accommodate 260 unaccompanied Sailors as they move from one command to another.

"I think it's great, it's very welcoming to the new people who come in," said Lt. Ryan Bowers, TPU officer in charge. "It's a great facility with nice amenities while they wait for their transition in or out of the 7th Fleet.

"This is the best TPU on the planet," Jarrett added.

CFAY provides, maintains, and operates base facilities and services in support of the U.S. 7th Fleet's forward-deployed naval forces, 71 tenant commands, and more than 27,000 military and civilian personnel and their families.

Navy offers reimbursement details for those returning post Dorian

JACKSONVILLE, FLA.

As personnel in Navy Region Southeast return after Hurricane Dorian, the command offers details on reimbursement of expenses for those who were evacuated as authorized by Rear Adm. Gary Mayes, commander of Navy Region Southeast.

Per Diem – the money authorized to cover lodging, food and incidentals - is authorized to be paid to evacuees at the rate of the approved safe-haven location. Navy Region Southeast established safe haven locations around Tallahassee, Fla.; Atlanta, Ga.; Columbia, S.C.,; and Tampa, Fla.. As an example, the daily rates for Tallahassee are \$102 for lodging, \$56 for food, and \$5 for inciden-

tals. Anyone who evacuated to locations, outside of the approved safe haven location for their command, will only be reimbursed at the safe haven per diem rates.

Reimbursement for meals is based on the number of authorized travelers and paid out at the approved rate. However, there are calculations to determine maximum amounts for families. Receipts for meals are not required however; we strongly recommend you keep them.

Travel expenses to evacuate are similar and are only reimbursed up to the safe-haven location. Travel to the safe haven in a personal vehicle is reimbursed at \$0.58 cents per

Once the military evacuee receives notification from their appropriate Routing/Reviewing Official, they may access Defense Travel System to complete their travel authorization and voucher for reimbursement. Military evacuees will need a copy of your NAVPERS 1070/602 (Dependency Application/Record of Emergency Data), itemized lodging receipts in the traveler's name, Evacuation Lodging Reimbursement Certification Form (if claiming lodging), and receipts for claimed expenses of \$75 or more.

Civilians will need: DD Form 1351-2 (Travel Voucher), DD Form 1610 (TDY Orders), bank routing and account information for direct deposit, Evacuation Lodging Reimbursement Certification form (if claiming lodging), itemized lodging receipts in the traveler's name, and receipts for claimed expenses of \$75 or more. Commands may establish a schedule to create and issue the evacuation orders for travel claims, so evacuees are urged to maintain contact with the parent command.

Personnel are reminded that evacuation

entitlements will end upon return to home station or at 11:59 p.m. Sept. 8 – whichever is earlier. If authorized to evacuate, military and civilian employees should maintain all travel and lodging receipts to ensure proper reimbursement.

For help understanding how to submit for reimbursement, applicable rates or eligibility; go to your local Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) or call 1-866-293-2776 to be directed to the appropriate FFSC. Command administrative offices are also a vital resource to help clarify evacuation and reimbursement issues, and will be the primary authority for review and approval of claims.

The Navy Family Accountability and Assistance System (NFAAS) has established a needs assessment module on the NFAAS website to enable hurricane-affected personnel to document their status and request assistance if needed. Aboard the USS Midway Museum in San Diego, California, the Office of Naval Research Global (ONRG) TechSolutions held a demonstration of Topside Drone, a corrosion/anomaly detection sensor payload and processing scheme outfitted to a commercial-off-theshelf unmanned aerial vehicle.

Corrosion control: Topside drone keeps vessels ship-shape

ARLINGTON, VA.

The unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) launches straight up from the deck of the USS Midway, its operator carefully maneuvering the UAV in front of the ship's air traffic control tower. Along the UAV's predetermined flight path, the camera mounted beneath the UAV captures ship imagery for a few minutes, and then zooms back down to its landing pad.

The sounds and the action on board the USS Midway are much different today from decades ago. The legendary aircraft carrier that once launched aircraft from its deck during the Vietnam War and Operation Desert Storm is now a museum in San Diego, Calif. Although decommissioned, the U.S. Navy in partnership with the Midway Museum's leadership team still discover opportunities to utilize the ship to benefit America's Sailors and Marines.

"Topside Drone" is a development of a corrosion/anomaly detection sensor payload and processing scheme, outfitted to a commercial-off-the-shelf (COTS) UAV. The technology will inspect and detect material defects, corrosion, warping and other conditions plaguing naval vessels. The drone flies around the area of inspection and takes photographs and measurements for evaluation to determine if corrosion exists—and the severity.

TechSolutions—the Office of Naval Research (ONR) Global's rapid-response

science and technology prototyping initiative—is the sponsor for this developing technology.

"Corrosion is there all the time; elements like rain and seawater are constantly corroding a ship," said Lt. Rouben Azad, a student at the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California, who attended the demonstration. "I have been on ships where it is difficult for the human eye to identify corrosion. Through infrared imagery, the Topside Drone inspection technology can identify corrosion from 80 feet away."

Topside Drone features complementary payloads for data collection. A LiDAR (Light Detection and Ranging) payload uses light in the form of a pulsed laser to measure distances to an object. A LiDAR scan accurately captures the geometry of everything in line of sight and is used to create a digital model of the ship.

A second payload of visible/infrared camera captures images that orient geometrically to the digital model. The images are then algorithmically inspected for corrosion using computer vision.

In addition to enhanced identification capabilities, Topside Drone will reduce the maintenance demand for Sailors.

"Sailors spend a lot of their time looking at different things on the ship, from corrosion to other equipment," said Dr. Mark Bilinski, Naval Information Warfare Center, Pacific and the integrated project team lead for topside drone. "A UAV can go around and take photos of the topside of a ship, collect that data quickly and autonomously, and then the data can be evaluated to identify if corrosion exists without tying up a Sailor's time."

During the demo, the computer vision algorithm analyzed the collected data and revealed significant corrosion all over the USS Midway—as a museum ship, it was a target-rich environment.

TechSolutions accepts requests directly from Sailors on the deck plates and Marines on the front lines and delivers prototype solutions within approximately 12 months.

"ONR TechSolutions is doing a lot of good for Sailors and Marines," said Azad. "They're taking our feedback and delivering the tools we need to accomplish our mission. Topside Drone will save the Navy money and free up Sailors to apply their skills to their primary duties."

Force for U.S. Pacific Fleet. "Submarine crews, like Olympia, train and operate every day to guarantee we are ready to fight tonight."

During the deployment, 35 Sailors earned their submarine warfare qualification, and 29 achieved advanced supervisory qualifications.

"The Navy ensures the safety of the seas and the security of the world's oceans to provide safe-global commerce, and I got to be part of that," said Machinist's Mate (Nuclear) 3rd Class William Christmas, from Warner Robins, Georgia. "It was an amazing experience passing the equator and being able to participate in a Shellback ceremony with the crew."

This Western Pacific deployment is scheduled to be Olympia's last before it heads to Bremerton, Wash., for inactivation.

"Olympia has completed her final deployment after 35 years of service, circumnavigating the globe in seven months starting from Oahu, Hawaii, transiting through the Panama Canal, Strait of Gibraltar and Suez Canal," Selph said. "Sailing around the world in our country's oldest serving nuclear-powered Los Angeles-class fast-attack submarine is a testament to the durability and design of the submarine, but also

the tenacity and 'fighton' spirit of the crew."

Olympia holds a piece of Navy submarine history: Cmdr. Richard O'Kane's lucky cribbage board. In 1943, O'Kane, executive officer for the Gato-class submarine USS Wahoo (SS 283), was dealt the highest possible hand. That night, Wahoo sank two Japanese freighters, and the luck continued.

Years later, the cribbage board moved to USS Tang (SS 306) and has been passed on to submarines ever since. Next it went to USS Kamehameha (SSN 642), then to USS Parche (SSN 683)), USS Los Angeles (SSN 688) and USS Bremerton (SSN 698) before going to Olympia. The crew will turn the cribbage board over to the next-oldest fastattack submarine in the Pacific before Ollympia decommissions.

Olympia is the second ship of the Navy to be named after Olympia, Washington. The boat is the 29th of the Los Angeles-class fast-attack submarines. Its keel was laid by Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company March 31, 1981. Olympia was commissioned Nov. 17, 1984.

cise Cutlass Fury 2019," said Rear Adm. Edward Cashman, commander of SNMG1.

"SNMG1's primary mission is to deter conflict and preserve security by serving as the core maritime contribution to NATO's Very High Readiness Joint Task Force (VJTF)," Cashman said. "The group provides NATO with maritime capability to quickly respond to crisis or contingency where needed.

"Our participation in Cutlass Fury supports that mission by enabling us to build and maintain readiness across the spectrum of operations and giving us the opportunity to integrate with the RCN, so that we could quickly respond and operate together if needed," Cashman continued. "We appreciate the warm welcome we received from the people of Halifax; we only wish that our visit could have been longer."

To avoid potential rough weather in Halifax Harbor resulting from Hurricane Dorian, most ships participating in Cutlass Fury 2019 departed port two days earlier than planned. Going to sea and maneuvering to avoid bad weather generally reduces the risk of damage to ships and equipment.

SNMG1 participated in several events during the group's short time in Halifax, including a reception hosted by the Royal Canadian Navy aboard the Royal Canadian Navy frigate HMCS Ville De Quebec (FFH 332) on Thursday, Sept. 5, and planning meetings for the exercise held prior to the

"Failure to adapt to all aspects of how we prepare our naval leaders for the future creates an unacceptable risk for American citizens, who have long relied on the Navy and Marine Corps to be at the intellectual forefront of national-security concerns."

Kroger will also be charged with implementing education reforms such as the establishment of a Naval Community College (NCC) for enlisted personnel. The forthcoming blue-green institution of higher learning will be a fully accredited online system allowing Marines and Sailors to earn an associate's degree while on active duty and to transfer their credits to bachelor's degree programs at civilian universities.

"Bringing in a CLO is one of our first steps in investing in our people and preparing them to not only know what to think, but how to think, as it relates to the current and future threat environment," Modly said. "Investing in their education in the naval profession is our institutional and their personal responsibility. Future threats will be fast and unpredictable. We need people at all ranks and levels that can think through the problems we'll face."

Kroger served as an enlisted Marine from 1983 to 1986. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from Yale and his law degree from Harvard.





drifted more than 3,400 miles across ocean

Upon investigating, Noel and the rest of the Doolin Express crew found the boat covered in goose barnacles — it had clearly been in the water for awhile — and along with a local fishing boat, towed the boat to the beach at Inis Oirr, where many islanders helped pull it ashore.

A day later, Doolin Ferry Co., which is based near Ireland's famed Cliffs of Moher, posted the account on Facebook. At that point they guessed the boat was a U.S. Coast Guard rescue boat, but were hoping for any details on what brought it so far. The post blew up online.

"We couldn't have predicted the interest from the public that there has been in this boat," Liam O'Brien, the ferry company's owner, later said in a news release. "There was a lot of growth on it, it had clearly been there for a long time. We already have a shipwreck on the island, so everyone's saying this is the

new one. This is definitely the most unusual thing we have discovered and it's drawing in lots of tourists to the

News outlets across Ireland picked up the mystery. Thousands of people shared their theories on social media. Was it a drug-running boat masqueraded as law enforcement? Was it an American military vessel used to spy on the Irish?

Within a day the answer came. A representative for Silver Ships Inc., an Alabama-based shipbuilding company, confirmed it had manufactured the boat in 2015 for the U.S. Navy, the ferry company's Siobhan Nolan said in an email.

It's a High Speed Maneuverable Sur-

"We believe the boat originated in Norfolk, Virginia," Doolin Ferry Co. wrote on its website. "It's likely that it was lost during a training exercise and it remained in the water drifting until it ended up in the water close to Inis Oirr. ... How cool is that?!"

That's more than 3,400 miles of drifting

Turns out, it's true. Timothy Boulay, a spokesman for the Naval Air Warfare Center Aircraft Division, said Thursday that the vessel was lost during a missile test and evaluation event about 75 miles off the coast of Norfolk last September.

After realizing the target was lost, the Atlantic Target and Maritime Operations team searched for five hours but couldn't find it and notified the Coast Guard of the potential navigation hazard.

Is it shocking the boat made it across the Atlantic? Not very, Boulay said, because the test vessels are foam-filled so that they don't sink. Navy folks hadn't heard of the recent discovery until coming across a story on Facebook Wednes-




