SUFFOLK DOD **COMPLEX CELEBRATES WOMEN'S HISTORY** MONTH

Sailors and DOD civilians assigned to Naval Information Forces (NAVIFOR), Joint Staff-Hampton Roads (JS-HR), Naval Network Warfare Command (NNWC), U.S. Fleet Cyber Command (FCC) South and Navy Cyber Defense Operations Command gathered to observe Women's History month during a ceremony March 13.

Commander of NAVIFOR Vice Adm. Matthew J. Kohler kicked off the event and thanked the guest speakers, multi-cultural committee and attendees for supporting the event.

"Women have long been underrepresented, underpaid, underserved, and underappreciated in our society, and in much of our world remain second-class citizens or even without status," Kohler said. "From the Navy's perspective, we have no shortage of examples of women who overcame institutional barriers to make an impact and to pursue their ambitions. It doesn't take much imagination to realize that fact when you take a look at history."

After Kohler finished his opening remarks he introduced Headquarters, U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command Deputy Chief of Staff, G-8, Ellen Helmerson.

In her position, Helmerson serves as the Chief Financial Officer and Comptroller administering resources supporting 37 Army schools organized under eight Centers of Excellence, each focused on a separate area of expertise within the Army. She plans, develops, directs and ensures stewardship of the command across a diverse portfolio that includes: accounting, audit readiness, budgeting, programming, manpower analysis, force management, and acquisition oversight.

"As I think about myself as a woman and a leader, I would ask you to think about women leaders in your life, and who comes to mind first; leaders, professors, teachers, coaches, wives, friends, sisters, aunts, grandmothers and mothers," Helmerson said. "Those are the leaders we grew up with, learned from and helped shape ourselves."

During the ceremony, one guest speaker and special guest who were in the Navy during Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service (WAVES) shared their experiences of what it was like to be in the Navy under WAVES.

Former President and founder of WAVES Hampton Roads Unit 152, Dassa Carvey, enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1963 and advanced to Petty Officer Second Class, as a journalist.

After her discharge from the Navy, she volunteered as an Ombudsman for two commands while being a military wife and pursued a career, working for more than 30 years as a budget analyst for the Department of the Navy, retiring with nearly 35 years of service to include active duty.

After attending her first WAVES National (WN) convention, she was so impressed with the organization that she started a unit in the Tidewater area and subsequently chartered Unit 152, Tidewater Tidal WAVES in January 2002, serving as the president of the unit until 2004, when she assumed the duties of WN 2nd Vice President.

Carvey was installed as WN president in September 2008, and again for a second term, in August 2010. When WN opened membership to all service women in 2014, she again ran for president and was elected for a third term, overseeing the transition of all units and membership from WN to Military Women Across the Nation.

"I was discharged at the end of my enlistment because I was pregnant. I received an honorable discharge but not recommended for reenlistment. If I had not been married, I would have been taken to the gate and stripped of military insignias, but still receive the honorable discharge," Carvey said. "Women today are being afforded many more opportunities — serving aboard combatant ships, submarines, moving up in rank. Being able to raise a family and still serve."

Carvey noted that we still have work to do to continue to pave the way for future generations, and given the opportunity if she were younger, she would gladly take on the challenge again under the same circumstances.

Special guest retired Master Chief Petty Officer Kathy Montgomery, a Storekeeper (SK), spoke with attendees following the official observation ceremony about overcoming challenges in the Navy from the moment she first joined until her retirement as a Master Chief Petty Officer.

She left boot camp undesignated, and reported to her first command, the Naval Amphibious School, Little Creek, where she worked in the supply office as the coffee mess clerk. Each day, it was her job to keep the 55 gallon containers of coffee full and to sell donuts to students and faculty of the school. Her civilian supervisor saw potential in her, and within 4 months, she was sent to Storekeeper "A" school in San Diego, where she was the only female in the class.

Montgomery was discharged from the Navy six years later because of a family hardship,

but soon realized after she got home that she had made a mistake in leaving the Navy. Within three years, she reenlisted and retained her rank and rate of Petty Officer Second Class. Fast forward 16 years, she retired as a Master Chief Petty Officer.

During her time in the Navy, she saw the first enlisted women assigned to the Hospital Ships, then tug boats, and finally to tenders. Ratings became less restricted. Women changed from being WAVES to WINS (Women in the Naval Service), and finally, Sailors.

"This is my story, and all the firsts I saw firsthand. What will your story be like? How will you solve your dilemmas? What will your firsts be? Enjoy your time in the Navy; it's the best purposed life you can live," Montgomery

The celebration as a whole had two guest speakers, a special guest, a multimedia presentation, static displays, a potluck and a cake cutting ceremony.

Through the last century, women have served aboard auxiliary ships beginning in 1978 and on combatant ships beginning in 1994. In 2016, the Department of Defense opened all military occupations and positions

Female Sailors and civilians play an integral role in the success of the Navy as part of the One Navy Team. Women serve in every rank from seamen to admiral and hold nearly every

job from naval aviator to deepsea diver. Twenty percent of the Navy's enlisted force is women, including eight percent of all Senior and Master Chief Petty Officers. Nineteen percent of the officer force

FCC/C10F Commander provides testimony to Senate **Armed Services** Subcommittee on cybersecurity

WASHINGTON

Vice Adm. Mike Gilday, commander, U.S. Fleet Cyber Command/U.S. 10th Fleet (FCC/C10F), provided testimony on the cyber posture of the Navy in review of the Defense Authorization Request for Fiscal Year 2019 and the Future Years Defense Program before the Senate Armed Services subcommittee on cybersecurity, March 13.

During the hearing, Gilday answered questions from the chairman of the subcommittee, Sen. Mike Rounds (R-South Dakota), the ranking member, Sen. Ben Nelson (D-Florida) and the other members of the subcommittee on the Navy's approach to cyber defense and what he has observed in this environment since

assuming command.

"I have continued to observe an upward trend in the capacity, capabilities, sophistication, and persistence of cyber threats against our networks," he said during his opening statement. "Cyberspace intersects every one of our Navy's missions, requiring an adaptive approach to counter the threat."

Gilday emphasized how the Navy intends to meet these threats in the coming years and how our cyber posture will ensure that we maintain an advantage over our adversaries.

networks by implementing our Cyber Resilience Strategy, focused on hardening our network infrastructure and reducing its attack surface. We are in the 5th year of this ongoing effort. Further, we have extended our defensive posture to include deploying defensive cyber teams with the Navy's carrier strike groups and amphibious ready groups," he said.

"Lastly, I still believe we have much room to grow. In particular, we will continue to seek improvements in how we recruit, train, retain and reward our cyber workforce — while ensuring they adversary."

The hearing also featured testimony

from Lt. Gen. Paul M. Nakasone, commanding general, U.S. Army Cyber Command; Maj. Gen. Loretta E. Reynolds, commander, Marine Forces Cyberspace Command; Maj. Gen. Christopher P. Weggeman, commander, 24th Air Force and commander, Air Forces Cyber.

Since its establishment, FCC/C10F has grown into an operational force composed of more than 15,000 Active and Reserve Sailors and civilians organized into 29 active commands, 40 Cyber Mission Force units, and 29 reserve commands around the globe. FCC serves "We are modernizing & defending our as the Navy component command to U.S. Strategic Command and U.S. Cyber Command, and the Navy's Service Cryptologic Component commander under the National Security Agency/Central Security Service. C10F, the operational arm of FCC, executes its mission through a task force structure similar to other warfare commanders. In this role, C10F provides support of Navy and joint missions in cyber/networks, cryptologic/ signals intelligence and space.





The name change also provides a "common, aligned understanding of the name change across the NSWC enterprise," added Hoffman. "We remain an echelon five command under NSWC Dahlgren Division with the same organizational alignment and our mission areas and work remain the same."

The command has had several name changes since it began as Fleet Computer Programming Center in 1963. The name was changed to Fleet Combat Direction Systems Support Activity in 1971, but based upon software support of the Combat Direction System, the command was renamed CDSA in 2000.

NSWCDD Dam Neck Activity hosts NSWC Dahlgren Division's Readiness and Training Department which maintains most of its workforce at Dam Neck, including the department head, Dr. Marty Irvine. Several branches from other departments at Dahlgren are also hosted at NSWCDD Dam Neck Activity.

"We are the only waterfront research and development, test and engineering command in the Navy's largest fleet concentration area," said Hoffman. "No matter the name, we will continue to provide the same great support that we always have to the Navy and nation."


I wish it was inexpensive to fly from across the world on short notice, but it is not. I had to make it home as soon as I could. Search-



Kohler introduced U.S. Army retired Brig. Gen. Arnold N. Gordon-Bray who completed over three decades of service.

Gordon Bray has extensive experience in commanding various levels of military forces from a platoon of 40 soldiers to a Brigade Combat Team (BCT) in Iraq. Before Brigade Command, he commanded the 1st Battalion of the 508th Airborne Combat Team in Vicenza, Italy, becoming the first African American commander of the then largest infantry battalion in the Army. He also commanded 2nd Brigade of the 82nd Airborne Division — Falcons. His unit spearheaded the 2003 attack into Iraq, where he was the only African American Brigade Commander. He was featured in the book, "Boots on the Ground," detailing the early days of the 82nd Airborne's participation in the deployment.

"If you believe that our nation has always been great, stand, if you believe that our nation has the capacity to be the best, stand, if you believe that best days are before us, stand, if you believe we are the greatest fighting force that the world has

ever seen because of our depth and our strength, stand, if you are still sitting then in the words of Martin Luther King Jr., 'If you don't stand for something, you'll fall easily'," said

During the ceremony, everyone also took a moment to remember U.S. Navy retired Master Chief Petty Officer Sherman Byrd, a Boatswain's Mate; the first African American explosive ordnance disposal (EOD) technician. He was born in Carrollton, Mississippi, Sept. 7, 1930, the youngest of five children of Lloyd and Annie Lloyd Byrd and joined the Navy at age 17 in 1947 while it was still segregated.

Byrd graduated from the Naval School Explosive Ordnance Disposal (NAVSCOLEAOD) at Indian Head, Maryland in 1958. Six years later, he became an instructor. Byrd "It is the strength of our nation that allows us to bring routinely worked with the United States Secret Service helping to protect four Presidents of the U.S. to include former president Dwight D. Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy, Lyndon B. Johnson and Richard Nixon. He was only 40 years old when he passed away from a heart attack following a physical training exercise April 9, 1971.

NRL celebrates 60 years in space with Vanguard

Sixty years ago, March 17, 1958, the Navy launched Vanguard I, the Navy's first Earth-orbiting satellite and the oldest remaining man-made object in space.

Vanguard I, a component of the Vanguard Project, is a small aluminum sphere (16.5 cm in diameter) that was designed to partake in the International Geophysical Year (IGY) — a series of coordinated observations of various geophysical phenomena during solar maximum, spanning July 1957 through December 1958.

The basic objectives of the Vanguard Project were to build a satellite launching vehicle, get one satellite in orbit, track and verify orbital path, and accomplish one scientific experiment all before the end of the IGY. Homer E. Newell Jr., then acting superintendent of NRL's Atwrote, "To be useful, an artificial satellite must be observed. To launch an unworthwhile scientific endeavor."

Dry Dock 4 to get a modernization conversion for its 100th birthday

After servicing and repairing hundreds of ships for almost 100 years, one of Norfolk Naval Shipyard's oldest dry docks, Dry Dock 4, will soon get a major overhaul and top-of-the-line upgrades.

Age, deterioration, leaks, and broken parts played a critical role in the decision to rebuild the dry dock. "It all started in 2010 when the caisson seat (locked gate) cracked and 3,000 gallons of water were flowing into the dry dock every minute," Code 984 General Engineer Brian Gray

After de-watering and in order to save the dry dock, personnel drove multiple large rods into the ground. Three feet of concrete was poured over the rods and bolted down for a second time.

"We did an immediate fix, but it was only temporary," Gray explained. "With rising sea levels, hurricanes, nor'easter storms, and water pressure building behind the caisson, there is still a good chance it could leak again and cause more damage or shut down operations. That is why it is so important to design a dry dock that is protected from catastrophic flooding," Gray said.

Storms and tidal flooding are the shipyard's biggest threats when it comes

to operations. It can cause a work stoppage which affects availability, getting the ships out on time, and costs a lot of

After analyzing permanent repairs for Planning and the Naval Facilities (NAV- 4 pump well. FAC) team discovered there was an op-

After being briefed on the situation, Naval Sea Systems Command Logistics, Maintenance and Industrial Operations (NAVSEA) 04 and Commander, Navy Installations Command (CNIC) granted a \$120 million, 33-month renovation project, and a temporary certification waiver to keep Dry Dock 4 operational until the USS Wyoming (SSBN 742) undocks.

Upon the submarine's departure, the Dry Dock 4 project will begin. "It is going to be a lot of work, and after a few Planned Incremental Availability (PIA) stays, the new dry dock will pay for itself. It proves to be a good return on investment that is both valuable to the shipyard and the Navy upon completion," ex-

The Dry Dock 4 project will be done in two phases. The first phase will begin in Aug. 2019 with a scheduled completion date of Jan. 2020. The new construction will have a state-of-the-art caisson that allows water to flow through it during docking operations and a cofferdam that will hold back the Elizabeth River during dry dock reconstruction.

The second phase will begin Jan. 2020 2022. It includes construction of new caisson seat, removal and replacement of 30 inches of concrete from the dry dock



'We are ready to get underway' Navy recruits train for life at sea

GREAT LAKES

A Sailor belongs at sea, and the foundation of life at sea depends on seamanship skills. Recruit Training Command (RTC), the Navy's only boot camp, builds the foundation of seamanship skills for all enlisted Sailors.

During their eight weeks of basic training, recruits conduct more than 30 hours of seamanship training.

"Seamanship is a warfighting skill that all Sailors rely on to accomplish our mission," Aviation Ordnanceman 1st Class Matthew Timour said, one of the RTC instructors responsible for seamanship training. "We develop that skill through deliberate and repetitive practice."

Part of the new hands-on learning curriculum, designed by RTC's senior enlisted instructors to develop tough, more qualified Sailors through realistic training, recruits receive familiarization with equipment used in each seamanship evolution, then practice in applied labs and on the USS Marlinspike dedicated practical seaman-

Recruits train in line handling, sea and anchor details, and basic underway operations. They are drilled, timed, and tested to ensure they report to their first ship with a strong foundation

of seamanship skills and ready for service.

With no notice, at any time of day or night, recruits also experience man-overboard drills, a timed evolution, where recruits must account for each one of their shipmates and report an accurate muster to the bridge. The goal time for man overboard drills starts at 10-minutes for new recruit divisions, and becomes increasingly more difficult as they progress in training. By their final week at RTC, recruits must complete the drill within five minutes.

On board USS Trayer, where recruits experience their final exam called "Battle Stations-21," recruits are graded on their seamanship proficiency among other critical skills. During a series of stressful overnight scenarios, recruits must properly and safely demonstrate ship replenishment, sea and anchor detail, operations at sea, and emergency procedures before completing basic training and becoming a United States Sailor.

"We believe in practicing skills exactly how you are supposed to in the Fleet," Machinery Repairman 1st Class Jeffrey Tumacder said. "Our training provides recruits with a lot of practical experience. They handle real mooring lines and practice with real chocks and bitts, conduct surprise man-overboard drills, and learn to properly employ these skills under stressful conditions."

Recruit Training Command is approximately eight weeks and all enlistees into the U.S. Navy begin their careers at the command. Training includes physical fitness, seamanship, firearms, firefighting and shipboard damage control along with lessons in Navy heritage and core values, teamwork and discipline. About 40,000 recruits graduate annually from RTC and begin their



Colorado is the first submarine to bear the name and third vessel to be named for the state and was brought to life by her sponsor, Annie Maybus Mabus, daughter of the 75th Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus.

"To the crew of USS Colorado, this is your day" Mabus said, addressing the crowd and ship's company during the ceremony. "The commissioning crew truly does bring life to the boat. The pride I feel for the crew of this boat knows no bounds."

As the most modern and sophisticated attack submarine in the world, the submarine can operate in both littoral and deep ocean environments and presents combatant commanders with a broad and unique range of operational capabilities.

"This is an amazing group of Sailors that are outfitted here. Every day we are doing something new for the first time. Just in the time that I've been here, I've watch the team transform into a high performance team that is able to operate the Navy's newest and most capable war fighting ship at sea, in the harsh ocean environments, ready to carry out our mission," Commanding Officer of Colorado Cmdr. Reed Koepp II said, as he underscored the boat's most important asset: the crew. "I have seen them achieve greatness in qualifications and I have seen them build to a level of experience and expertise, ready to start executing the nation's missions and get through our initial tactical certifications and engineering readiness."

Colorado is a flexible, multi-mission platform designed to carry out the seven core competencies of the submarine force: anti-submarine warfare, anti-surface warfare, delivery of Special Operations Forces (SOF), strike warfare, irregular warfare, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance and mine warfare.

Colorado is a part of the Virginia-class' third, or Block III, contract, in which the Navy redesigned approximately 20 percent of the ship to reduce acquisition costs. Colorado features a redesigned bow, which replaces 12 individual Vertical Launch System (VLS) tubes with two large-diameter Virginia Payload Tubes (VPTs) each capable of launching six Tomahawk cruise missiles, among other design changes that reduced the submarines' acquisition cost while maintaining their outstanding warfighting capabilities.

After the ceremony, Colorado was opened up for tours to the general public, to include the crew's mess, the wardroom, control, and the torpedo room.

"Our submarines are in high demand today and the expectations for Colorado are a mile high," Director of Naval Reactors, Adm. J. Franklin Caldwell, Jr. said as he addressing the attendees. "In her lifetime, Colorado will travel thousands of miles undetected to protect our nation and our interests around the globe. We cannot begin to imagine all the missions that she will do and all of the places she will sail, but we do know that Colorado's stealth, her endurance, her combat power, and her speed will ensure that our Navy remains in control of the undersea domain."

Colorado also has special features to support Special Forces, including a reconfigurable torpedo room which can accommodate a large number of personnel and all their equipment for prolonged deployments and future off-board

"We are very proud to represent the great state of Colorado and we are very excited for the future of the ship," Executive Officer of Colorado Lt. Cmdr. Stephen Col said. "I can honestly say I have the greatest job in the Navy."

Also, in Virginia-class SSNs, traditional periscopes have been replaced by two photonics masts that host visible and infrared digital cameras atop telescoping arms, which are

maneuvered by a Xbox controller. Through the extensive use of modular construction, open architecture, and commercial off-the-shelf components, the Virginia class is designed to remain at the cutting edge for its entire operational life through the rapid introduction of new systems and payloads.


"I couldn't be more proud and honored to serve with and for the crew," Koepp said. "The Colorado is a gem of an assignment for any submariner, whether you are a first-term, junior Sailor or you are the commanding officer. I couldn't be more proud to lead and serve with the crew.

SSN 788 was built at Electric Boat in Groton, Conn and is 7,800 tons and 377 feet in length, has a beam of 34 feet and operates at more than 25 knots submerged. It is designed with a nuclear reactor plant that does not require refueling during the planned life of the ship, reducing lifecycle costs while increasing underway time.

National Brain Injury Awareness Month is a time to recognize the millions of Americans living with traumatic brain injury (TBI)-related disabilities.

TBI is caused by a bump, blow or jolt to the head, or penetrating head injury that disrupts the normal function of the brain. However not all blows or jolts to the head result in a TBI. It's a major cause of death and disability in the U.S., contributing to about 30 percent of all injury deaths each year, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"Everyone is at risk for a TBI, especially children and older adults," TBI Program Director Kirsten Pollick, Ph.D. said. "Know the signs and symptoms of TBI and seek proper care"

Physical signs and symptoms of TBI include headache, fuzzy or blurry vision, nausea or vomiting (early on), dizziness, sensitivity to noise or light, balance problems, or feeling tired or having no energy.

Some symptoms might appear right away, while others might not be noticed for days or months after injury. Children with a brain injury can have the same symptoms as adults, but it's often harder for them to let others know.

According to the CDC, about 75 percent of TBIs that occur each year are concussions or other forms of mild TBI. Repeated mild TBIs occurring over an extended period of time

can result in cumulative neurological and cognitive deficits. Repeated mild TBIs occurring within short periods of time (hours, days, or weeks) can be catastrophic or fatal.

Leading causes of TBI include falls, being hit by an object, and motor vehicle crashes. According to the Defense and Vet-

erans Brain Injury Center, active duty and reservists are at increased risk of sustaining a TBI compared to their civilian peers, as a result of several factors: demographics (age), operational and training activities, and deployment to areas that

put service members at risk for experiencing blast exposures

(such as improvised explosive devices, suicide bombers, and grenades).

TBI is a serious condition. Individuals with suspected brain injuries should seek medical care immediately by contacting their Medical Home Port team to schedule an urgent care appointment, or for emergencies going to the emergency room or calling 911.

NH Jacksonville patients can be evaluated by the hospital's TBI screening program after receiving a consultation or referral from their Medical Home Port team, Deployment Health Center, Neurology, or Behavioral Health.

The fast-attack submarines USS Hartford (SSN 768) and USS Connecticut (SSN 22) both surfaced in the Arctic Circle March 10 during the multinational maritime Ice Exercise (ICEX) 2018 in the Arctic Circle north of Alaska.

Both fast-attack submarines as well the UK Royal navy submarine HMS Trenchant (S91), are participating in the biennial exercise in the Arctic to train and validate the warfighting capabilities of submarines in extreme cold-water condi-

"From a military, geographic and scientific perspective, the Arctic Ocean is truly unique and remains one of the most challenging ocean environments on earth," said Commander of Undersea Warfighting Development Center (UWDC)Rear Admiral James Pitts.

ICEX provides the U.S. Submarine Force and partners from the Royal navy an opportunity to test combat and weapons systems, sonar systems, communications and navigation systems in a challenging operational environment. The unique acoustic undersea environment is further compounded by the presence of a contoured, reflective ice canopy when Submarine Laboratory (ASL), is a remote Arctic drifting ice

cate and navigate.

"We must constantly train together with our submarine units and partners to remain proficient in this hemisphere," Pitts said. "Having both submarines on the surface is a clear demonstration of our proficiency in the Arctic."

In recent years, the Arctic has been used as a transit route for submarines. The most recent ICEX was conducted in 2016 with USS Hampton (SSN 767) and USS Hartford (SSN

The first Arctic under-ice operations by submarines were done in 1947–49. On August 1, 1947, the diesel submarine USS Boarfish (SS-327), with Arctic Submarine Laboratory's founder Dr. Waldo Lyon onboard serving as an Ice Pilot, conducted the first under-ice transit of an ice floe in the Chukchi

In 1958, the nuclear-powered USS NAUTILUS made the first crossing of the Arctic Ocean beneath the pack ice. The first Arctic surfacing was done by USS Skate (SSN 578) in March 1959. USS Sargo was the first submarine to conduct a winter Bering Strait transit in 1960.

The units participating in the exercise are supported by a temporary ice camp on a moving ice floe approximately 150 miles off the coast of the northern slope of Alaska in international waters. 

FUTURE USS TULSA (LCS 16) COMPLETES **ACCEPTANCE TRIALS**

Littoral Combat Ship (LCS) Tulsa (LCS 16) successfully completed acceptance trials, March 9, after a series of in-port and underway demonstrations for the Navy's Board of Inspection and Survey.

Acceptance trials are the last significant milestone before delivery of the ship to the Navy. During trials, the Navy conducted comprehensive tests of the future USS Tulsa, intended to demonstrate the performance of the propulsion plant, ship handling abilities and auxiliary systems.

"The Navy and industry trials team in Mobile executed another solid Acceptance Trials. The performance of the ship demonstrated incorporation of lessons learned and continual ship-over-ship improvements which will ultimately result in a decreased cost to the Navy," LCS Program Manager Capt. Mike Taylor said. "Tulsa is well on track to provide needed LCS warfighting capability to the fleet and the nation."

While underway, the ship successfully demonstrated her bow thruster, twin-boom extensible crane operations with the 11-meter rigid-hull inflatable boat, completed surface and air self-defense detect-to-engage exercises and demonstrated the ship's handling and maneuverability through high-speed steering and operation of her anchor.

Tulsa will be commissioned into service following delivery, an industrial post-delivery availability, and a post-delivery availability that is focused on crew training, certifications and familiarization exercises in Mobile. USS Marlinspike is RTC's dedicated practical seamanship trainer, where recruits conduct timed drills in shipboard and pier line handling, sea and anchor detail and at-sea watch stations.

USS Chief is a controlled training environment, where recruits fight real fires in shipboard compartments. Drilling with various fire suppression agents, lifesaving equipment and safety gear; teamwork and communications are critical elements recruits must embrace to advance in training.

Recruits also maintain an around-the-clock





The Norfolk Admirals have signed forward T.J. Moore the team announced last week.



Stemming the leak: 4 ways to encourage STEM in your middle schooler

Even though many Americans understand the importance of STEM education, children in the U.S. continue to lose interest in science, technology, engineering and math subjects

Not surprisingly, 44 percent of U.S. adults say they felt more excited about science when they were kids, reports the State of Science Index, a global study commissioned by 3M examining the general population's attitudes toward science. Maintaining students' interest in science during the middle school years is crucial to increasing the likelihood they'll pursue STEM careers. That's important, since studies show our nation will need to produce an additional one million STEM workers between 2012 and 2022 alone.

That said, we're still not on track to meet demand, partly because students continue to lose interest.

What's the answer? Creating a rich culture of STEM edu-Cindy Moss, vice president of global STEM initiatives for curriculum developer Discovery Education. She points to reprofessional development before effectively teaching STEMpromoting classes.

"Many educators in our country believe we need to accelare three to four million STEM job openings in the U.S. right now, and companies can't find American workers with the skills they need. Fifty percent of everybody's jobs right now are STEM, and they're predicting that in the next 10 years about 75 percent of all jobs will involve STEM."

What can parents and educators do to foster more interest? Consider the following:

■ Find role models. If a child doesn't know anyone working in STEM, he or she may be unable to imagine a career in such roles. Introduce him or her to people actively working in such fields, then encourage discussion and/or job shadowing. Teachers might bring in speakers who can answer candid questions about the rewards and challenges in their fields including significant demand and attractive pay scales.

■ Seek achievement opportunities. Introducing children






