### **USS Hue City rescues** distressed mariners

#### ATLANTIC OCEAN

Guided-missile cruiser USS Hue City (CG 66) rescued three fishermen March 27 off the coast of Georgia.

At approximately 4 a.m. Hue City was notified by the U.S. Coast Guard and guided-missile destroyer USS Mitscher (DDG 57) that a small craft in their vicinity had issued a distress signal and needed assistance.

Hue City Commanding Officer, Capt. Jake Douglas, and the ship's crew turned to the last known position of the distressed vessel, fishing vessel Barbara Lynn, and began the search. Approximately 20 minutes later, the cruiser's lookout spotted the flashing strobe light of the life raft and its three

#### WASHINGTON

The Naval History and Heritage Command held a commemoration ceremony in honor of Vietnam War Veterans Day at the National Museum of the U.S. Navy's Cold War Gallery located on the Washington Navy Yard, March 29.

The Vietnam War Veterans Recognition Act of 2017, designates March 29 of each year as Vietnam War Veterans Day. The ceremony honored and recognized the heroism of the Sailors, Marines, Airmen and Soldiers who served during the Vietnam War.

"I think this commemoration is particularly important because when they came home Vietnam War veterans did not get the recognition for their courage and valor that they deserved," said retired Rear Adm. Sam Cox, director of the Naval History and Heritage Command. "Hosting this event is an opportunity to do the right thing even though it's well overdue."

The ceremony began with colors presented by the United States Navy Ceremonial Guard while the national anthem was sung by a member of the U.S. Navy Band.

"He came to me one day and asked me what I liked and disliked about the Navy," said Chief Machinist's Mate (Nuclear) Kaleem Burke, when speaking about his younger brother's decision to join the Navy. "I was totally honest with him, and told him about all my experiences in the Navy and allowed

him to absorb that information without telling him to join or not."

The younger brother, Machinist's Mate (Nuclear) 3rd Class Sean Burke, completed several semesters of college and considered joining the Air Force before becoming a Sailor.

"Joining the Navy was a last resort for me because I was going to school and working, but I had no idea what I wanted to do," said Sean. "I asked him what he did on a daily basis and was

interested about being a machinist's mate because I like working on cars and other mechanical things."

Upon entering boot camp with a nuclear contract, re-

cruits are told which nuclear job they will eventually study in "A" school. Electrician's mates, electronics technicians, and machinist's mates (MMN) are available nuclear. Sean, coincidentally, was selected to be an MMN like his older brother.

The elder Burke's path to the Navy was similar to that of his younger brother, only six years earlier. Before joining the Navy, Kaleem was a 19-year-old college student from Bronx, N.Y., lacking career direction.

"I wasn't focusing in school, but I was interested in hav-

ing a career in the medical field and knew I needed some discipline," said Kaleem. "After researching all the branches, learning about hospital corpsman, and taking the ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery), the recruiter presented me with the option of the Navy nuclear program."

After completing boot camp, Kaleem completed the same schools his brother would go on to complete six years later. He went to Nuclear Power School in Charleston, South Carolina, then Prototype School in Saratoga Springs, New York, and was eventually stationed on USS Harry S. Truman (CVN 75) for four years.

Kaleem says his success in the Navy is definitely the result of hard work, but more importantly having a chain of command that supported his development, molded him to be a successful Sailor, and recognized his work.

Kaleem's chain of command wasn't the only one to recognize his success. His mother who had seen him transform from a struggling college student to a successful Sailor knew

> the benefits the Navy could have on Sean.

"My mom saw my progress firsthand and absolutely loved it, so she supported my brother when he decided to join," said Kaleem. "The Navy gave my brother and me the opportunity to be adults and stand on our own two feet, which was a huge benefit to our growth."

After making chief in seven years, Kaleem, who recently hit his nine-year mark is certain

he will make a career out of the Navy. Kaleem said he enjoys being an MMN, but more importantly, mentoring junior Sailors to be technically and socially successful in the Navy.

Sean says he enjoys what he does, but isn't certain if he's going to stay in after his first contract.

"I do find a lot of enjoyment in the maintenance and qualifications associated with being an MMN," said Sean, who has been in the Navy for three years. "But the Navy was a big transition for me that I'm still adjusting to, and I'm still not sure if I want to reenlist."

Sean says since his brother's arrival in January 2018 the transition to Navy life in Norfolk has been much easier.

"Some days I don't see him at work, and sometimes I see him several times," said Sean. "Having a family member in Norfolk, let alone my older brother on the same ship, makes life a lot better."

While the future is unknown for the Burke brothers, coincidences definitely follow the two. Six years apart, the two brothers completed the same boot camp, nuke school, and have ended up on GHWB serving together as MMNs.

# HSC-28 supports Obangame Express 2018

Helicopter Sea Combat Squadron (HSC) 28, stationed at Naval Station Norfolk, is conducting flight operations from the USS Mount Whitney (LCC 20) in support of exercise Obangame Express 2018, the largest regional maritime exercise in West Africa.

The eight-day exercise, sponsored by U.S. Africa Command, focuses on countering the trafficking of illegal arms and drugs, human trafficking, illegal migration, piracy, and illegal fishing. Additionally, maritime interdiction operations and search and rescue training are incorporated as part of the everyise.

HSC-28, known as the "Dragon Whales," actively deploy with the Second, Fifth and Sixth Fleets to provide critical mission support. Their capabilities include search and rescue operations, cargo and passenger transport, and fleet support to Navy, Air Force, and Army units along the Gulf and Atlantic coasts. The squadron consists of 14 aircraft, 267 enlisted Sailors, and 51 officers.

"We are very excited to be here with the crew of the Mount Whitney supporting OE 18," said Lt. Cmdr. Richard Shiels, officer in charge, HSC-28, Detachment 1. "This is an opportunity for us to showcase the seamless integration of our flight operations with the ship and offer our support. We know that this is an incredibly important exercise for the Navy and our friends in the Gulf of Guinea. Our presence here in West Africa demonstrates our commitment to the region and improving maritime security on a long-term basis."

Mount Whitney operates with a combined crew of more than 300 Sailors and Military Sealift Command civil service mariners. The ship's forward operating presence in the Gulf of Guinea represents the U.S. Navy's commitment to support West African nations in countering illegal activities at sea while expanding training opportunities and cooperation among regional maritime forces.



The Nightdippers of Helicopter Sea Combat Squadron (HSC) 5 played a major role ensuring the Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) gets the supplies it needs during the extensive underway replenishment (UNREP) and ammunition onload, March 25-28.

HSC-5 is a squadron of MH-60S Seahawk helicopters, whose missions typically include naval special warfare support, search and rescue, anti-surface warfare and vertical replenishments at sea (VERTREP). This underway, they conducted one with the fast combat support ship USNS Supply (T-AOE 6) and the Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS George H.W. Bush (CVN 77).

"VERTREP is probably one of the most exciting things we do as aircrewman," Naval Aircrewman (Helicopter) 2nd Class Jason Bazell said, a rescue swimmer assigned to the Nightdippers. "It's super dynamic. We need to always keep a lot of communication between the aircrew in the back and the pilots up front."

While pilots sit in the front of the helicopter, cargo hooks in the middle of the aircraft connect to the supply loads,

roughly 15 feet behind them. As the pilots concentrate on operating the aircraft, the aircrewmen provide constant updates on what is going on with the supplies being carried.

"The Navy wins wars, deters aggression, and maintains the freedom of the seas," O'Loughlin said. "Abraham Lincoln has a major role in that, along with the other key players who

"The pilots depend heavily on us; we are their eyes in the back," Naval Aircrewman (Helicopter) 2nd Class Timothy Cox said, an HSC-5 rescue swimmer who has flown 60 hours of VERTREPs over the last four years. "We are the only crew members with eyes on the load below. On long-haul VERTREPs, the loads will often start oscillating and swinging; we tell the pilots, and they put in corrective inputs to control the load."

During Abraham Lincoln's VERTREP, HSC-5 contributed 38 flight hours and provided 1,569 tons of ammunition including missiles, small arms, and general-purpose bombs.


While not a part of ship's company, HSC-5 folded into the crew to bring Abraham Lincoln one step closer to being fully equipped and capable of conducting combat operations around the globe.

"The Navy wins wars, deters aggression, and maintains the freedom of the seas," O'Loughlin said. "Abraham Lincoln has a major role in that, along with the other key players who make up Carrier Strike Group 12. Through underways such as this, and those to come over the next year, we will continue to sharpen our skills needed to execute those key missions."

Commissioned in 1956, then HS-5 flew HSS-1N Sikosky helicopters with a primary mission to deny the enemy's use of submarines against surface and air targets. Later, the squadron proved that over-water, night operations without any visual reference, were viable for 24-hour, all-weather operations. Due to this trailblazing effort, HS-5 attained the name "Nightdippers."

For the aircrew members and pilots attached to the "World Famous" Nightdippers, mission success for the Navy is a first priority. According to O'Loughlin, they are enthusiastic to put their skills and expertise to the test. "The squadron is eagerly awaiting our upcoming deployment, it's been a while for us; we are hungry to serve and to execute the mission."



### **Abraham Lincoln tests ATARI**

#### ATLANTIC OCEAN

USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) was the first kid on the block to get a new ATARI. No, not the iconic gaming system from the 80s, but a system designed to remotely land aircraft on a carrier. Abraham Lincoln's friends, the other carriers,

### Jean de Vienne, in support of CTF 150, siezes more than 1,160 pounds of heroin

#### **5TH FLEET**

French Marine Nationale destroyer, Jean de Vienne, secured their second drug seizure this year in support of Combined Task Force (CTF) 150, March 25.

A total of 1,160 pounds of heroin was seized during an operation in the international waters of the Arabian Sea. Jean de Vienne's seizure is the tenth for CTF150 since January this year; which together with Her Majesty's Australian Ship Warramunga and Pakistani Naval Ship Aslat totals in excess of 22 tons of narcotics seized.

The Jean de Vienne's Lynx helicopter was conducting routine surveillance in the international waters of the Arabian Sea as part of Combined Maritime Forces (CMF). Detecting a vessel of interest, the Jean de Vienne tracked the dhow to investigate further and determined the vessel was suspicious. Boarding teams from Jean de Vienne then conducted a non-destructive search of the vessel and found 20 bags of heroin weighing a total of 1,160 pounds, a street value of over \$120 million. After a thorough search, the illegal narcotics were recorded and transferred to Jean de Vienne for safe destruction at sea.

Commander of CTF 150, Commodore Mal Wise, Royal Australian Navy, said the remarkable success of CTF 150 is due to the teamwork between partner nations within the task force and stated that: "Providing security and stability in the international waters of the Middle East is essential to ensure the free flow of commerce in the region. CMF accomplishes this through a flexible mix of nations and ships committed to working together in a common purpose. Successful operations, like the recent heroin seizure by Jean de Vienne, are a testament to the important effect strong, multinational partnerships can have in this challenging maritime environment. "

In 2018, multinational assets in support of CTF150 have seized over 22 tons of hashish and over 2 tons of heroin, valued street value in excess of \$1.6 billion. This is the tenth confiscation of drugs in 2018 by CTF 150, currently under Australian leadership, with a combined Australian and Canadian staff and supported by assets from a crosssection of the 32 partner nations that form CMF.

#### LINCOLN COMPLETES 3MA

#### ATLANTIC OCEAN

The Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) completed Material Maintenance Management Assessment (3MA), March 19–21.

"Overall Abe did really well," said Senior Chief Aviation Boatswain's Mate Sean Roberts, air department 3M inspector from Commander, Naval Air Force Atlantic. "We saw a lot of really good maintenance men and women out there. I think if everyone keeps up the good work that the 3MI will go just as well."

3MA inspectors observe Abraham Lincoln's 3M program as a whole and the assessment is also training for Sailors to improve their overall knowledge of maintenance. It is designed to help prepare Abraham Lincoln Sailors for the 3M Inspection (3MI) this September.

"This assessment has put us in a really good place to enhance our maintenance skills," said Senior Chief Aviation Boatswain's Mate (Handling) Dennis Parker, Abraham Lincoln's 3M coordinator, "not only for our 3M inspection in a few months, but also for maintaining our equipment and for the overall preservation of the ship as a whole."

CNAL inspected many of the functions Sailors perform while doing their maintenance. They looked at everything from how Sailors performed their assigned maintenance, such as damage control firefighting equipment all the way to the chairs in medical, to the system that is used to track it, SKED 3.2

3M has existed in the Navy for more than 26 years, and the importance of maintenance is paramount to the survivability of Abraham Lincoln.

"A lot of Sailors don't realize the importance of the maintenance that they are doing," said Lt. John Tatro, Abraham Lincoln's 3M officer. "Think about a car. People typically don't wait for their oil light to pop up before they get an oil change; they know that they need to get maintenance done regularly to preserve the life of their vehicles. The same exact thing goes for this ship. The maintenance that Sailors are performing aboard this ship is what keeps her operational throughout her expected lifetime."

Tatro said Sailors should always be performing at the same level they did during this assessment. The assessment tested the crew's ability to maintain the serviceability of the ship at all times, and it is the standard that the Navy requires you

maintain.

"It's like taking your drivers-ed test," said Parker. "If you have been driving and practicing all of the time, then the actual test should just be business as usual. That is how we need to continue to treat these inspections."

It takes Sailors at every rank and rate to perform at the top of their game to make assessments like these run smoothly, and it is an all-hands effort to make sure they take 3M seriously.

"It comes down to a strong work-ethic and ownership," said Parker. "The triad uses that term a lot, and it's because it is important. If everyone on the ship takes responsibility for their spaces and their assigned maintenance, then we will continue to move forward and progress as a command."

While challenging and sometimes demanding, maintenance is something that is not going away. Senior Chief Hull Technician Mike Smith, a 3M inspector from CNAL, said it is best to embrace it and put care into what is done.

"There are two things that are going to happen every single day in the Navy," said Smith. "Periodic maintenance checks and muster reports."

Spot checks can be tedious but can also be beneficial, not only for the Sailor completing the spot check, but also for the leadership conducting it. Smith had some advice for senior leadership and for Abraham Lincoln to continue to do well in the future.

"When you are doing a spot check with one of your junior Sailors and they get lost or don't know what to do that's the perfect time for some mentorship," said Smith. "Sit down with them, study that MRC, and show them that you care about what you are doing. That's the money right there. It's going to show them that they should care about their maintenance. There are not many Sailor-to-Sailor mentorship opportunities that pass on knowledge and work ethic like this."

This is the only 3MA that Abraham Lincoln will have until its 3MI scheduled in September.

vironmental.

"In order to close the gap between the Navy's warfighting mission and available resources, we must consistently review and modernize business processes," Jackson said. "This new organizational relationship demonstrates our intent to find creative and innovative solutions to meet the readiness requirements of the warfighters and the fleet both now and into the future."

The NAVFAC commander's additional duty responsibilities will improve transparency, prioritization, and accountability of NAVFAC-wide performance in execution of CNIC requirements. Additionally, installation public works officers will now be assigned and accountable to CNIC installation commanding officers. They will also have additional duty responsibilities to the NAVFAC Facilities Engineering Command commanding officer for their technical authority.

NAVFAC remains the Shore Facilities Systems Command with the technical and acquisition authorities for facilities lifecycle services to the Navy and Marine Corps, as well as providing many other installation procurement, and engineering

services to non-CNIC commands.

CNIC will remain responsible for operating the Navy's shore installations; providing policy, standards. The new roles and organizational relationship between CNIC and NAVFAC will provide more effective customer service to the fleet and warfighter enterprise while establishing the commander of NAVFAC as the CNIC deputy commander for Facilities and Environmental.

The new shore command and control enterprise construct, along with the Navy Shore Enterprise Framework, which is currently in development, eliminates confusion regarding responsibility and accountability, and maximizes shore installation readiness through a clear understanding of CNIC's and NAVFAC's distinct roles and authorities.

NAVFAC and the Marine Corps Installations Command leadership are coordinating a similar C2 construct which will codify their relationship.

This new organizational collaboration first transpired in June 2017 when the CNO tasked the deputy CNO for Fleet Logistics and Readiness, Vice Adm. Dixon Smith, to lead a study in examining organizational relationships with CNIC and NAVFAC and their roles and responsibilities within the shore domain. The findings resulted in the newly established organizational changes.

### Soul of the mission: Chaplains changing lives

On every humanitarian mission there are essential roles without which success wouldn't be possible. Operations is the brains, Seabees are the brawn, Medical is the heart, but the soul is the chaplain.

It's hard to overestimate the contribution of chaplains. They coordinate community relations events, donation opportunities and church services as well as provide pastoral counseling to service members.

Chaplains join for many reasons. Each of them has a unique story about their "calling." Lt. Cmdr. Michael Vitcavich of Bank, New Jersey is no different.

"It's hard to think about it and not get emotional," Vitcavich said, a Reservist chaplain assigned to Destroyer Squadron (DESRON) 40. "I became a true believer in 2000 and prior to that I was a successful entrepreneur in construction and contracting. Once the Lord changed my heart, I wanted to break away, I wanted to be a pastor. The bible says we can plan our steps, but it's the Lord that plans our directions, and this is the direction He led me."

As it happens, he was also led to the Continuing Promise 2018 team after accepting the billet at DESRON 40.

"The Lord has been leading me here for a long time," Vitcavich said. "I got the welcome aboard call from DES-RON 40 in January and a few days later they told me about the mission. I had 24 hours to accept. So, I called my job, got the O.K. and joined the team the next day."

Vitcavich explained that while he loves helping people in any capacity, his greatest passion is in meeting people

For those with less specific needs, or those with non-medical needs, Victavich planned a number of community service projects.

San Diego-based Mine Countermeasures Division (MC-MDIV) 31, the tactical planning staff attached to Commander, Mine Countermeasures Squadron (COMCMRON) 3, successfully completed the annual multinational exercise Dynamic Move March 29.

The annual two-week long exercise is held at Ecole de Guerre des Mines (EGUERMIN), the Belgium-Netherlands Naval Mine Warfare School. The school provides education and training in sea mine-warfare tactics, techniques, and procedures to Belgium and Dutch navies, along with NATO allies.

MCMDIV 31 staff travels frequently to provide forward-deployed mine countermeasures tactical expertise and to plan and coordinate exercises worldwide. Representatives from 14 NATO and two partner nations assembled for this year's exercise. Participants used a mine warfare computer simulation intended to foster interoperability, coordination, and innovative tactics through various defensive MCM scenarios.

EGUERMIN uses the Naval Mine Warfare Gaming System. This is the only program in the world that can simulate a complex mine countermeasures scenario allowing multiple staffs to work together on the tactical and strategic level.

MCMDIV 31 Commanding Officer Cmdr. John Laney said, "Dynamic Move is one of our premier annual exercises. We are able to spend the two weeks solely focused on the tactics and doctrine of mine warfare. In addition, we were able to train our 20-person staff and interact with NATO partners in order to prepare for mine countermeasures worldwide."

Other U.S. units involved were Naval Surface and Mine Warfare Development Center (SMWDC), Commander Task Group 68.3, and Commander Mine Countermeasures Squadron Five.

#### BUDGET FOR SUCCESS

"Winning at money is 80 percent behavior and 20 percent head knowledge," said financial advisor Dave Ramsey in his book The Total Money Makeover. "What to do isn't the problem; doing it is. Most of us know what to do, but we just don't do it. If I can control the guy in the mirror, I can be skinny and

Budgeting can be hard for Sailors who do not have training with handling finances. The Navy provides resources to teach them how to handle their money and avoid going into debt.

"Sailors come to me if they are recommended by their immediate chain of command if they have a problem, or they are just working on a goal," said Chief Aviation Electronics Technician Michael Tagg, the command financial specialist (CFS) aboard the aircraft carrier USS Nimitz (CVN 68). "I basically see if I am working damage control or working to-

Tagg said that the biggest issues that Sailors come to him with are bad auto loans and credit card debt. A lot of junior

Sailors aren't aware of the dangers of high-interest rates and how they impact paying off debt.

"Sailors get caught up in a bad situation, like their car breaks down or they need a repair and think that they may not have a choice," said Tagg. "In those situations, they end up putting a lot of money on credit cards and struggle to make minimum payments. Paying minimums on credit cards means that it will take a long time to pay them off."

Navy commands offer CFS training courses to senior Sailors to teach them skills that will help junior Sailors.

"I thought I was very knowledgeable when it came to personal finance, but then I went to the command financial specialist course and it opened my eyes," said Logistics Specialist 1st Class Mario Garciacantu, from Houston, the CFS for training department aboard Nimitz. "I learned about resources that I did not know that Sailors have. I also learned about financial techniques that helped me budget and save money. I applied these techniques, and they have helped me in my life."

Garciacantu said that one technique that he learned was to be more self-aware when making financial decisions. Sailors may know how much money they have, or they may make a purchase they can't afford because of peer pressure.

"It can be hard to make the right decision when you haven't budgeted," said Garciacantu. "Budgeting allows you to see where your money is, where it is going, and what you can do

Tracking money flow is an important part of budgeting, but so is sticking to it.

Tagg said that the small choices that Sailors make each day can snowball into big problems. It takes a lot of self-control to make the right choices every day.

"Young Sailors have difficulty living within their means and looking past the choice right in front of them," said Tagg. "They think they will handle tomorrow's problems when they get there."

After Sailors create a budget, they should revisit and update it regularly. They should also choose someone they trust as an accountability partner.

"My wife and I help keep each other on track," said Garciacantu. "We have regular meetings and update our financial planning worksheet. As we plan for the future, it helps me to feel free. I have a lot of peace of mind because of the work that we do in regards to finances."

"It is a great feeling to get out of debt and work towards a point where you can start saving or investing money," said Tagg. "It makes me feel better about the future and safer today. I love having options. It makes me feel free."

"Home economics is particularly important in Honduras," Vitcavich said. "A lot of these kids don't even have parents. You know, 13 and 14-year olds living on their own." Chaplains are not in it alone. They use an expansive network of contacts and resources to

help them change lives for the better. "The Embassy helped out, too. They donated 1300 school kits to the same students at FDR.

We were able to pass them out and raise morale tremendously." Students were not the only beneficiaries, one of the support staff members who does missionary work told Vitcavich about a number of families with children who live in and off of a

"It was definitely an eye opener," Vitcavich said. "We don't even realize how much we have and how much we take for granted. Those little things we don't always appreciate are considered great blessings to them. I told them that I wish I could do more, but they said just our presence and prayers were enough. They said they felt like they'd been discarded by society."

Chaplains are far more than religious leaders; their concern is for people. They are a bit of levity in an often heavy profession. They come from different places and join for different reasons, but they all share the same calling, to help their fellow man.

Vitcavich said, "We all join the military to make a difference in the world, and this mission is at the core of that belief."

Chaplain Vitcavich and the Continuing Promise team are slated to depart Honduras soon. They are scheduled to visit Guatemala and Colombia in the coming months.



The biggest sports entertainment event of the year is set to take place on Sunday, April 8, as World Wrestling Entertainment (WWE) presents WrestleMania 34 on the WWE Network. WrestleMania, along with the supporting events that weekend, are highly anticipated each year. There are potentially fourteen matches that will take place on this evening over the course of six hours between the pre-show that begins at 5 p.m. Eastern and the main event card that begins at a special start time of 7 p.m. Eastern from New Orleans, Louisiana.

Every title within WWE will be defended on April 8. For Monday Night Raw, WWE Universal Champion Brock Lesnar will defend his title against Roman Reigns. In recent weeks, Lesnar has been selective on when he makes television appearances. Reigns took offense to the Champion not being consistently present, even being temporarily suspended when airing his grievances with Chairman Vince McMahon on an episode of Monday Night Raw. Raw Women's Champion Alexa Bliss will defend her title against former ally Nia Jax. In a conversation that was not intended for public air, Bliss and Mickie James unapologetically disparaged Jax and revealed that the Champion was only using Jax for Bliss' personal gain.

Former Ultimate Fighting Championship star "Rowdy" Ronda Rousey will compete in her first WWE match at WrestleMania when she teams with Raw General Manager Kurt Angle against The Authority (Stephanie McMahon and Triple H). Rousey has gotten the upper-hand against all members of the Raw Women's Division that have attempted to make a statement at her expense. Speaking of the Women's Division, the first-ever WrestleMania Women's Battle Royal will take place at the event and feature Women Superstars from Raw, SmackDown, and potentially NXT. The Male Superstars of all WWE brands will have another incarnation of their annual Andre the Giant Memorial Battle Royal this evening as well.

For the SmackDown brand, both winners of the 2018 Royal Rumble matches will compete for the brand's top titles. In a dream match never before witnessed in the company, Shinsuke Nakamura will vie for AJ Styles' WWE Championship. The undefeated Asuka has handpicked SmackDown Women's Champion Charlotte for a title match at WrestleMania after her historic victory in January's Rumble.

Other matches scheduled for the evening for the brands include: Cedric Alexander vs Mustafa Ali to determine a new Cruiserweight Champion, Randy Orton defending his United States Championship against Bobby Roode, Jinder Mahal, and Rusev, Intercontinental Champion The Miz defending against Seth Rollins and Finn Bálor, The New Day and Bludgeon Brothers competing in a triple threat match for The Uso's SmackDown Tag Team Championships, and Braun Strowman choosing a mystery partner to accompany him in his quest for the The Bar's Raw Tag Team Championships.

There have been exciting developments for the career of SmackDown General Manager Daniel Bryan. Just over two years ago, Bryan was forced to retire due to his history of concussions, per doctor's rulings. Thanks to treatments he has received and being evaluated by the top neurological experts in the country, Bryan has officially been cleared to compete in a WWE ring again. After attacks by Sami Zayn and Kevin Owens to both Shane McMahon and Daniel Bryan, Zayn and Owens have been fired. However, Zayn and Owens have the opportunity to reinstate their SmackDown contracts should they be victorious in a tag team match against McMahon/Bryan at WrestleMania.

John Cena's story this year has been finding his path to WrestleMania. Cena was unsuccessful in winning the Royal Rumble and Elimination Chamber matches and, at time of this article going to press, is left without a match at WWE's biggest event of the year. Cena has made multiple challenges on Monday Night Raw to The Undertaker, trying to coax him in to a match fans have wanted to see again for many years. It was believed at WrestleMania 33 that, after his loss to Roman Reigns, Undertaker would be retiring from active competition. In keeping with the guarded nature of Undertaker's persona, those rumors have never been publically confirmed nor denied. Will the "Deadman" Undertaker show up at WrestleMania, or will it be the mortal motorcycle-riding Undertaker that addresses Cena's challenge?

### Get a job in the film industry

Virginia Film Office announces production assistant training seminar: April 7 & 8 course teaches how to get a job in the film industry

#### From Virginia Film Office

The Virginia Film Office, in association with the Community College Workforce Alliance and the Virginia Production Alliance, will present a two-day film industry training seminar for those interested in learning how to get an entrylevel position as a production assistant in the film and television industry.

The course will be held at the Workforce Development & Conference Center, 1651 Parham Road in Richmond on April 7 & 8. Participants will learn the essential responsibilities of an effective production assistant including on-set etiquette and protocol. The course will also contain information about how the film and TV industry operates, who's who on a film set, on-set language, and how to create an effective resume and look for a job.

The class is taught by experienced professionals in the film industry. The course leader is Gloriana Wills (Turn: Washington's Spies, For the Love of Bob) who is currently a senior producer and instructor at the George Mason University film and video studies program. Other instructors include Gary Romolo Fiorelli (Pirates of the Caribbean, Mistresses) who created the original course materials for the class; documentary filmmaker and assistant director Caroline Ste-

phenson (Turn: Washington's Spies, Killing Kennedy) and Thomas Sanchez Prunier (Homeland, Mercy Street).

Film Office Director Andy Edmunds commented, "Recently Virginia has been the filming location of important television series such as Homeland and Turn: Washington's Spies, in addition to numerous feature films, documentaries, commercials and educational videos. This means that we are constantly on the lookout for trained and enthusiastic individuals who have a serious interest in a career in the field. This training course is the perfect place to start."

Thomas Sanchez Prunier, one of the course instructors, was a graduate from a 2013 class and commented, "You get an understanding of what goes on between 'cut' and 'action,' how to do a good job, and how to advance in your career in the industry. There are few jobs with this degree of stress – and reward, if you can run the gauntlet and make it to the wrap party. This class is the reason I've been able to do just that."

Tracia Austin, a 2014 graduate said, "The training seminar literally changed my life within a week, when I found myself on set working as an extras casting coordinator. This eventually led to my current job in casting."

#### **READY PLAYER ONE (PG-13)**

From filmmaker Steven Spielberg comes the science fiction action adventure Ready Player One, based on Ernest Cline's bestseller of the same name, which has become a worldwide phenomenon. The film is set in 2045, with the world on the brink of chaos and collapse. But the people have found salvation in the OASIS, an expansive virtual reality universe created by the brilliant and eccentric James Halliday (Mark Rylance). 


