Defense Secretary James N. Mattis called the chemical attack "beyond the pale" when he testified before the House Armed Services Committee yesterday. The attack, he said, was in "the worst interest of civilization itself."

#### Not a Widening of U.S. Involvement

The action does not indicate a widening of U.S. involvement in Syria, the president said. But the Syrian dictator did not learn the lesson, and the regime again launched poison gas U.S. troops are in eastern Syria to advise Syrian Democratic Forces in actions to eliminate the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria.

Chemical attacks, however, are a different and horrendous exception. The use of such weapons on civilians is particularly heinous. Each year, it is celebrated on the Wednesday of National Library Week. This year National Bookmobile Day was Wednesday, April 11.

National Library Week and National Bookmobile Day, Naval Station Norfolk welcomed the return of the Norfolk Bookmobile after a nine-month renovation.

"We are very excited for the return of our bookmobile," said Kelly Straub, the Norfolk Public relations specialist. "The bus is 20 years old, it really needed new flooring, lighting and mechanical work but it looks great now and we are ready to con-

tinue to provide books, audiobooks and movies to those who

need us." What is a bookmobile? A bookmobile is essentially a library on wheels. If you have never visited a Norfolk Public library and would like to check out a book from the bookmobile they provide applications and for active duty personnel, a copy of your orders will suffice if you are not a Virginia state resident. After all your paperwork is complete, you are free to check out books for two weeks, if you finish your checkouts before the return of the bookmobile, can either wait for the return of the bus or drop off your checkouts at any of the Norfolk Public Libraries. They also provide online holds and constant circulation of new book arrivals. The Bookmobile has been making around 20 stops a week to child development centers, assisted living communities, youth centers and many other locations.

The bookmobile has a long history dating back to the 19th century as horse-drawn buggies and has greatly improved to bookmobile trolley cars in Switzerland and The Epos, a floating library in Norway.

"The Bookmobile makes around 20 stops a week to child development centers, assisted living communities, youth centers and many other locations," said Monique Lucas, Library Assistant One. "We also provide online holds and a constant circulation of new book arrivals. When our books are no longer

# Above and beyond the call of duty: The 2018 **Virginia International Tattoo returns to** Norfolk April 26–29!

One of the greatest shows on earth is coming to Hampton Roads this month!

The Virginia International Tattoo brings 1,000 performers from eight countries, in an awe-inspiring display of military music, show-stopping drill teams, colorful dancers, bagpipers, drummers and more. American Bus Association has put this annual celebration of patriotism and international goodwill on their must-see list of the most exciting events in the world. Located downtown in the heart of Norfolk, Virginia International Tattoo is in its 22nd year at the Scope Arena.

This year, the Virginia International Tattoo is partnering with the Congressional Medal of Honor Foundation to present this year's theme: Above and Beyond the Call of Duty, which will pay homage to Medal of Honor Recipients, with nine living recipients featured in a touching celebration.

Historically, these grand shows called "Tattoos" stem from a 17th-century European tradition of military drummers alerting soldiers it was time to return to their barracks for the evening. After hearing the call of the local regiments' fifes and drums, the Dutch Low Country innkeepers would call "Doe den tap toe!" — "Turn off the taps!" The "tap too" evolved over time, and the word "tattoo" now refers to a ceremonial performance of military music by massed bands.

Here are some of the highlights of the 2018 Virginia International Tattoo:

-The Changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier has never been demonstrated outside of Arlington National Cemetery — until now. At this year's Tattoo, the Sentinels of Arlington National Cemetery will perform the

Changing of the Guard Ceremony right here in Norfolk's vendors and a beer tent with tasty craft beers. There's even Scope Arena.

-For the first time ever at Tattoo there will be appearances of bands from Italy and the Republic of Ireland. The New Ross & District Pipe Band of Ireland is a Grade 3A band that won second prize at the World Pipe Band Championships in Glasgow in August. The Italian 11th Bersaglieri Regiment Fanfare Band is unique, as they play while running, their plumed hats streaming behind.

-Returning to the Tattoo will be the Republic of South Korea Traditional Army Band, with its brilliantly colored traditional costumes, massive drums, beautiful dancers, and a top-notch team of tae kwon do athletes.

-Pipes and drums. The spectacle of row after row of kiltclad pipers and drummers is mesmerizing, as the harmonies of the bagpipes fill the air.

Before every Tattoo performance, there will be a free "Tattoo Hullabaloo" on Scope Plaza which will showcase pipers, dancers, drill teams and drum line battles, along with food

a commemorative Tattoo brew, collaboratively created by Young Veterans Brewing and Rip Rap Brewing that will be making its debut this year. A cross between a tailgate party and a patriotic carnival, the Hullabaloo is lively entertainment — plus a perfect opportunity to shake hands with an active duty member of the Armed Forces and take a selfie with a highland dancer.

Virginia International Tattoo performances are Thursday, April 26 through Saturday, April 28 at 7:30 p.m., and 2:30 p.m. on Sunday, April 29 in the Scope Arena located at 201 E. Brambleton Avenue in Norfolk, Virginia.

Naval Facilities Engineering Command (NAVFAC) Atlantic awarded HKS WSP JV, Dallas, Texas, a \$33.4M modification to increase the maximum dollar value of a previously

awarded indefinite-delivery/indefinite-quantity contract.

The contract is for architect-engineering services for medical design projects located throughout the NAVFAC area of responsibility (AOR) worldwide.

After award of this modification, the total cumulative contract value will be \$83.4M.

Critical projects are planned to be performed in the NAV-FAC AOR worldwide including, but not limited to, Hawaii (22 percent); California (20 percent); Maryland (16 percent); Japan (8 percent); Texas (8 percent); North Carolina (6 percent); Connecticut (5 percent); Florida (5 percent); Cuba (4 percent); Tennessee (2 percent); Virginia (2 percent); Italy (1 percent); and South Carolina (1 percent).

The term of the contract is not to exceed 60 months with an expected completion date of March 2022. No funds will be obligated at time of award; funds will be obligated on individual task orders as they are issued. Task orders will be

primarily funded by operations and maintenance (Navy).

The Naval Facilities Engineering Command, Atlantic, Norfolk, Virginia, is the contracting activity.



# **NAS Oceana** joins VBCPS blue-ribbon panel on school safety

#### **VIRGINIA BEACH**

The Virginia Beach City Public Schools (VCBPS) superintendent Dr. Aaron Spence announced that VCBPS will bring together community leaders and security experts to form a 'blue ribbon panel' on school safety and security during a press conference at Princess Anne Elementary school, April 10.

A blue-ribbon panel (or blue ribbon commission) is a group of people or organizations appointed to investigate study or analyze a given question. Their value comes from their ability to use their expertise to issue findings or recommendations which can then be used by those with decision-making power to act.

This spring, the panel will analyze VBCPS' current security practices and procedures and provide recommendations on how to best enhance the division's work.

"To be clear, our schools are safe. We have dedicated staff members in this division who ensure that our schools are secure and welcoming places for our students and families each and every day," said Spence. "However, with student safety and well-being as our top priority, we have an obligation to leave no stone unturned in our efforts to provide the safest school environments possible. I have full confidence in this panel's collective ability to bring forward innovative recommendations and practices to implement in our schools."

(NAS) Oceana, representatives from the Virginia Beach Police Department, and staff members from the City of Virginia Beach's Child and Youth Services Division will be on the panel. They will work with principals and staff members from the school division's offices of Safety and Loss Control and Student Support Services to review security practices.

"NAS Ocean has built an amazing relationship with VB-CPS, starting with the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) field trip we host every year, inviting over five thousand fifth graders to come out during the annual NAS Oceana Air Show, and of course a big part of that event is ensuring the safety and security of those students, so we have gotten to know the school system staff very well because of that," said NAS Oceana commanding officer, Capt. Chad Vincelette. "For us as a part of the local community, thirty percent of the students in the VBCPS are military children, so we have a vested interest in school safety."

"I am thankful we have such capable and willing commu-Leadership and security experts from Naval Air Station nity partners to aid in this work and share their expertise. I have full confidence in this panel's collective ability to bring forward innovative recommendations and practices to implement in our schools," said Spence.

Panel members will work to answer three main questions:

• What are the division's current best practices? • What division and community resources can be deployed

in other ways to strengthen this work?

• What gaps exist that need to be addressed, either in processes or assets (e.g., personnel, security equipment)?

"I was honored to be asked by Dr. Spence to join this panel," said Vincelette. "Security is always an evolving thing, always changing ... what my security team is going to do is come in and assist the VBCPS in evaluating and assessing the schools safety program, providing valuable insight and recommendations."

The panel will meet and work through June, with the tentative goal of providing a report of findings and recommendations for the School Board at its annual retreat in July.

School administrators already made strides in upgrading security for the 2018–2019 academic year. Funds have been identified that will allow a buzz-in locking system at every school and center beginning this year.



# The best kept secret in the **Navy: SPAWAR Systems Center Atlantic's cyber** forensics capabilities

Critical data that could prove a suspect is defrauding the government is located on a hard drive that has been submerged in water. Naval Criminal Investigative Service (NCIS) agents need access to information on a suspect's cell phone, which was intentionally

Two challenges, one solution: Space and Naval Warfare Systems Center (SSC) Atlantic's Digital Media Criminal Forensics Investigations (CFIX) Laboratory. The lab, the Navy's first and only of its kind to earn the prestigious American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors (ASCLD/LAB) International accreditation, serves as a base of operations from which SSC Atlantic's cyber forensics team performs its mission of helping the Navy and other federal agencies recover data and solve criminal cases using its unique operational cyber forensics capabilities. Their customers include NCIS, the Department of Justice, Department of Veterans Affairs, Department of Homeland Security and the Marine Corps.

Making full use of the CFIX Lab capabilities, the team conducts data recovery, responds to cyber forensics incidents, performs malware analysis and reverse engineering of malware and helps protect the Navy's network infrastructure.

The CFIX Laboratory also contains a Data Recovery Laboratory with physical rebuilding and submerged hard drive recovery capabilities, which the team uses to perform Redundant Array of Independent Disks reconstruction, mobile device data extraction, chip-off, Joint Test Action Group and bad sector recovery. They can also perform advanced memory analysis, extract hidden data with steganography and other processes, analyze firmware, and recover data from solidstate drives and Flash media.

SSC Atlantic's cyber forensics capability started in 2008 with one machine and two people - Robin Corkill, now cyber forensics competency lead, and Bill Littleton, cyber forensics integrated product team lead. From these meager beginnings the team has grown to 15 computer engineers, computer scientists, forensics analysts and IT specialists, more equipment, a new building on the SSC Atlantic campus, and greatly increased capabilities. The demand for the work they do has increased over the past 10 years and continues to grow as customers learn of SSC Atlantic's cyber forensics capabilities.

More Department of Defense (DOD) and Navy emphasis on cybersecurity, incident response and data recovery has led to the growth and recognition of the team, according to Corkill. "We can grow as needed to respond to our caseload," he said, adding that the data recovery lab averages more than 100 hard drive recoveries a year for SSC Atlantic employees, and has served multiple DOD organizations with a more than 95 percent suc-

Two members of the team have master's degrees in digital forensic science, six others have masters in computer science, cyber or math, and many have advanced certifications. All told there are more than 20 certifications, some in specialized areas like smartphones and mobile apps, Windows, Mac, Linux or memory forensics, and even vehicle foren-

"We also do lots of research, and go to advanced schools to stay current on data recovery, malware analysis and digital forensics criminal lab processes," added Littleton. The research they do while solving casework often spawns into new research areas with dif-

"With technology growing exponentially, there is constant learning," Corkill added.

When not helping to solve crimes, recovering data and responding to cyber incidents, the team provides cyber training to SSC Atlantic and other commands on how to prevent breaches minimize system failure and prevent catastrophic loss of data. That training includes cyber defense tracks in response, forensics, intrusion and detection to show how to prepare for attacks and how to respond to an incident and secure evidence. The team also covers how criminals get access, hide data on a system and cover their tracks to help students better understand, prepare for, respond to, and even prevent cyber attacks."

"The fact that we are an all-government team, all Sensitive Compartmented Information -cleared, with strict standards on how we handle data helps us maintain trust with our DOD customers and other agencies," Corkill said. "Our Air Force, Navy and other DOD customers have specifically mentioned the value of working with an all-government team," he added. The SSC Atlantic team's technical and analytical expertise, problemsolving and out-of-the-box-thinking are also often lauded. Both local and federal law enforcement agencies have consistently provided positive feedback about the CFIX laboratory capabilities, and have commented

provided, and the outstanding quality of the bring to the team."

That praise is the result of a team effort, Corkill emphasized. Having the drive to dig deeper and look at a problem from a number of angles, to use an analytical approach and follow the "cyber breadcrumbs" makes for a sharp and effective cyber forensics team.

"It's easy to wake up every day and be excited about what we're doing here," Corkill said. "You never know what you might be facing. Finding information, solving a problem ... it's always a challenge," he added.

"That's probably why most of us on the team enjoy participating in STEM outreach events such as the Palmetto Cyber Defense Challenge (PCDC) and Cyber Summer Camps," Littleton said. "It stretches us to be creative and generate scenarios, then analyze and develop solutions for them."

The lab's outreach activities not only increase interest and proficiency in the cyber forensics domain for the next generation, but their hugely successful Cyber Summer Camp is being used as a model by the Office of the and exciting ways to respond to these ever-Secretary of Defense.

The team's outreach has also attracted students who want to work alongside Corkill and Littleton as career cyber forensics professionals. Sage Glidewell was a PCDC and cyber camp participant, then a mentor, and now an intern with Corkill's team as she pursues a degree in computer science at the College of Charleston. Two interns who will be hired this summer were hand-picked by Corkill and Littleton through SSC Atlantic's involvement in the Office of Naval Research's cybersecurity outreach with Historically Black Colleges and Universities. "They jors with a focus on forensics," Littleton said, on the team's efficiency, depth of information "and we are excited about what they will

"What we offer DOD and other federal agencies is a full service and advanced digital forensics capability that has matured over the past 10 years into a cutting-edge answer to the most critical cyber defense needs of today. Our customer feedback is that our quality is unmatched," Corkill said.

"World-class data recovery, advanced digital forensics, a top quality criminal media forensics laboratory, a highly skilled malware analysis and incident response team arguably provide one of the most advanced overall cyber forensics capabilities in the DOD," he said. "Customers often identify us as the 'Best kept secret in the Navy,' "he added.

SSC Atlantic Commanding Officer Capt. Scott Heller praised the team as a valuable asset to the Navy's cyber defense capabilities. "We all know too well that the threat is real. The urgency to answer these threats is real," he said. "I'm excited and proud that we have been able to apply the intellect, energy and ideas found here at SSC Atlantic in new evolving threats."

#### TIS THE **'SEASON OF CHANGE' FOR MILITARY KIDS**

"When we were leaving Guam, Devon isolated himself from his friends as they were isolating him. We dealt with it by spending more time with one friend and her family that didn't isolate him and we all became fast friends. Unfortunately, she is PCSing in a few months and her mother is telling us that she is now being isolated by her friends," says Navy spouse Jay of his son, age 10.

"My son decided not to play baseball this spring, his sophomore year," says Army wife Kimberly. "We're moving to Rhode Island, and here in Alaska the season is just starting, snow is still covering the fields. He didn't want to train on a team when he wouldn't get to be there for part of the season. He felt he'd be letting the team down."

Marine child Gabby, age nine, describes her most stressful move as leaving Okinawa, Japan in fourth grade, "because we had an entire life there with friends away from all family," and, "it was one of the longest duty stations I've been alive for."

"While I was excited to start middle school in Virginia, I quickly figured out that these kids had gone to school with each other since kindergarten," recalls Navy dependent Adrienne D., now age 20. "This was a new concept that these kids have known each other their whole lives. I found it very difficult to find friends within the first year of moving."

"It was stressful just knowing everything was happening at once. Moving away from my comfortable place and having to start fresh. Knowing that the friends I do make will only be for a short time," says Navy child Aliyah, age 8.

ently to change: "I have an extrovert who wants to spend more time with spective, something only military kids have." friends and an introvert who wants to pull away. To meet the needs of both kids, we're staying in one state. The Navy can survive without us for a while."

According to the Department of Defense, there are 1.7 million American force-dependent children across the globe, about 80 percent of which attend public schools. Since over half of all military moves take place at the end of the school year, there are roughly a million military kids currently facing an impending move. That makes April, the Month of the Military Child, pretty stressful.

According to the authors of a new book available June 1, The Seasons of My Military Child: Practical Ideas for Parents and Teachers, parents and educators should use a team-approach to help military kids through transitions. Authors Amanda Trimillos, Air Force spouse, teacher, and

> mother of four, and Stacy Allsbrook-Huisman, Air Force spouse, military advocate, and mother of two, advise parents to build an "army of awareness." Together, parents, teachers, administrators, and counselors can guide the child through the "seasons of transition."

The team should watch for signs of struggle, which include isolation, low grades, eating alone at lunch, and lack of involvement. Trimillos and Allsbrook-Huisman recommend that parents listen. "Let them lead the conversation, especially tweens and teens. Ask open-ended questions. Kids are watching the way we handle moves, so remember not to project your feelings onto them," says Allsbrook-Huisman.

Through networking, communication, and more specific tools described in the book such as creating an "Education Binder" that follows your child to each school — the authors say military children can thrive.

Even social media can be an effective tool in easing transition stress, according to Trimillos, whose daughter still plays Barbies with her best friend from three stations ago via FaceTime. "She sets her screen inside her Barbie house while her friend does the same in Oklahoma."

Our own daughters developed a way to turn fear into positive excitement after our move to Germany in 2008. Anna would point out forests, playgrounds, sidewalks ... anything, and proclaim conspiratorially to her little sister, Lilly, "Adventure awaits!"

> Decommissioning a submarine is a major undertaking that relies on teamwork. Puget Sound Naval Shipyard and Intermediate Maintenance facility led the team.

"Professional warfighters come together with a huge organization of exceptional technical Cmdr. Brian Freck, deputy commodore, Submarine Squadron 19, was the guest speaker for expertise and capabilities to shut down, dismantle and render safe all the systems and equipment which gave that vessel its lethality," said Cmdr. David Kaiser, Dallas' final commanding officer. "We built a critical, questioning, proactive team that has met or exceeded all expecta-

> The Navy is committed to preserving the readiness of the forces deploying. As the aging Los Angeles-class boats are stricken from the Naval Vessel Registry, the way is made for newer, more advanced submarines.

> "Today, we have reached that point in the inactivation where the benefit of retaining the active duty Dallas Sailors no longer justifies the cost and burden on the operational fleet from where we came," said Kaiser. "Today marks the end of ship's force involvement. It is time for us, the crew, to return to the fleet as the Dallas legacy in order to help ensure that our submarine force is ready to be first in harm's way."

> Dallas carried out missions vital to national security, deployed 14 times, steamed over one million miles and visited over 30 countries. Dallas completed their most recent deployment November 22, 2016. During their final extended 7-month deployment to the U.S. 5th and 6th Fleet Areas of Operation, the submarine traveled 37,000 nautical miles and made port calls to Brest, France, Al Hidd, Bahrain, and Duqm, Oman.

> Dallas was the second ship of the United States Navy to be named for Dallas, Texas. The keel was laid by the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics in Groton, Conn., October 9, 1976. The boat was launched April 28, 1979, and commissioned July 18, 1981.

> Dallas received two Meritorious Unit Commendations, two Navy Unit Commendations and was awarded the Battle Efficiency "E" in 1986, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1999, 2000 and 2013.

> Measuring more than 360 feet long and displacing more than 6,900 tons, Dallas had a crew of approximately 140 Sailors. Dallas was capable of supporting various missions, including anti-submarine warfare, anti-surface ship warfare, strike warfare and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance.

# **2018 Sea-Air-Space Exposition: Day one**

#### NATIONAL HARBOR, MD.

The Navy League's 2018 Sea-Air-Space Exposition began with a Sea Services Update and Global Pacific Panel, April 9, at the Gaylord National Resort and Convention Center in National Harbor, Maryland.

Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Warfare Systems, Vice Adm. William R. Merz; Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps, Gen. Glenn M. Walters; Vice Commandant of the Coast Guard, Adm. Charles D. Michel; and Administrator of the United States Maritime Administration, Retired Navy Rear Adm. Mark H. Buzby served as panelists for the update.

Merz's remarks focused primarily on how the Navy is working to improve readiness, increase overall capability across multiple warfare domains and build capacity fleet-wide, while not sacrificing the quality of training and equipment Sailors receive.

"The vice chief [of naval operations] sat here last year and said, 'Going forward, we need to address the readiness and decline, we need to stabilize our accounts and we need to improve our accelerated acquisition," said Merz. "I think we have set a strong trajectory on that. It's been galvanized through our battle cry through the last budget cycle — readiness first, then capability, and then capacity. We just dedicated a large sum of money into readiness over the last two cycles — 2017 and 2018, and we're going to continue that through 2019. Capability is where we would really like to put most of our energy ... and then there's the capacity piece, the 355-ship Navy."

Merz also spoke about how the fleet is addressing necessary repairs to its ships, submarines and aircraft, how Sailors are adapting to physical changes around the world and across

the cyber domain, and how the Navy is working to improve upon its strategic deterrents in the future.

"Learning, competing, and winning; I think those are entrenched into the American DNA," he said. "Our efforts to recapitalize the Ohioclass submarine, and the Columbia class ... [are] fundamental to our homeland defense. Although we're focusing on capability, we'll make sure we have the right lethality now for the size Navy we have. This size Navy is still too small, [but] we'll fix that to be in all the places we have to be to have that visual deter-

rence in the enforcement of international law."

During the Global Pacific Panel, Joint Interagency Task Force (JIATF) West Director of Operations and Intelligence, Capt. Grant Jackson, served as a panelist alongside Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps Pacific Division Director, Gayle von Eckartsberg.

Jackson highlighted ongoing efforts to stop the movement of narcotics across the U.S. Pacific Command (PACOM) area of responsibility. He also spoke about JIATF West's missions, which fall under two major categories — to defend the homeland and to support the rebalancing and restabilization of the region — and how the U.S. is working not only to keep drugs from reaching North America, but from being produced and trafficked to other Indo-Asia-Pacific countries as well.

"The U.S. PACOM Commander, Admiral [Harry B.] Harris, sees us as an important tool," Jackson said. "We run operations spanning more than half the world. We run operations off the coast of Vancouver, Canada, all the way to Sri Lanka and the Maldives. Covering half the world's surface is a logistical challenge, but we embrace and overcome the geographic challenges."


By having such a large area of responsibility to track surface vessels, Jackson finds an advantage in being able to have more time to monitor ships and boats potentially carrying illicit cargo. He spoke of how JIATF West can better coordinate and share information with partners in the Indo-Asia-Pacific because of how long it takes to cross the Pacific Ocean to the U.S, Canada and Mexico.

"We deal directly with governments that we generally don't have strong military-to-military relations with, but because we have that law enforcement flavor to us, we're able to get into places generally the military can't," Jackson added. "Building some of those combined, joint and interagency relations ... helps us to coordinate, cooperate and share with our partners — [particularly] our law enforcement partners"

the warfighter."

The final SDD flight occurred April 11, at Naval Air Station Patuxent River, Maryland, when Navy test aircraft CF-2 completed a mission to collect loads data while carrying external 2,000-pound GBU-31 Joint Direct Attack Munitions (JDAM) and AIM-9X Sidewinder heat-seeking missiles.

From flight sciences to mission systems testing, the critical work completed by F-35 test teams cleared the way for the Block 3F capability to be delivered to the operational warfighter. More than a thousand SDD flight test engineers, maintainers, pilots and support personnel took the three variants of the F-35 to their full flight envelope to test aircraft performance and flying qualities.

The test team conducted 6 at-sea detachments and performed more than 1,500 vertical landing tests on the F-35B variant. The developmental flight test team completed 183 Weapon Separation Tests; 46 Weapons Delivery Accuracy tests; 33 Mission Effectiveness tests, which included numerous multi-ship missions of up to eight F-35s against advanced threats.

"The F-35 flight test program represents the most comprehensive, rigorous and the safest developmental flight test program in aviation history," said Greg Ulmer, Lockheed Martin's vice president and general manager of the F-35 program. "The joint government and industry team demonstrated exceptional collaboration and expertise, and the results have

given the men and women who fly the F-35 great confidence in its transformational capability."

Developmental test is a key component of the F-35 program's SDD phase, which will formally be completed following an Operational Test and Evaluation and a Department of Defense decision to go into full-rate aircraft production.

While SDD required flight test is now complete, F-35 flight testing continues in support of phased capability improvements and modernization of the F-35 air system. This effort is part of the Joint Program Office's Continuous Capability Development and Delivery (C2D2) framework, which will provide timely, affordable incremental warfighting capability improve-

ments to maintain joint air dominance against evolving threats to the United States and its allies.

With stealth technology, advanced sensors, weapons capacity and range, the F-35 is the most lethal, survivable and connected fighter aircraft ever built. More than a fighter jet, the F-35's ability to collect, analyze and share data is a powerful force multiplier that enhances all airborne, surface and ground-based assets in

the battlespace and enables men and women in uniform to execute their mission and return home safely.



# Virginia Zoo's critically endangered orangutans are expecting a baby this summer

The Virginia Zoo is thrilled to announce that one of its critically endangered female orangutans is pregnant. This will be the first offspring for Dara, the 18-year-old Bornean orangutan, who is expected to deliver the baby in mid-June to early July.

"This is an unbelievable opportunity for the Zoo to play a vital role in the future of this species," said Greg Bockheim, Executive Director of the Virginia Zoo. "Bornean orangutan populations have declined by more than 50 percent in the past 60 years due to poaching, the illegal pet trade, human-animal conflict and habitat loss. Plus, orangutans have one of the slowest reproductive rates of all mammals, making this birth tremendously significant," Bockheim added.

Zoo Keepers observed breeding behavior between Dara and 14-year-old male Solaris last fall. Within a couple of weeks, the physical characteristics of pregnancy became apparent to trained animal care staff. A human pregnancy test confirmed her status. An orangutan's gestation period is approximately 245 days, and then the infant is completely dependent on the mother until they are at least two years old, typically nursing for several more years beyond Manager. "Zoo Keepers have been training Dara using positive reinforcement to prepare her that age. Offspring tend to stay close to their mothers for up to 10 years or more.



Orangutans are genetically managed by an international committee and consortium of zoos. This program helps to ensure the long-term survivability of the orangutan population in human care.

"Since Dara's pregnancy was confirmed, we have been working with the Orangutan Species Survival Plan through the Association of Zoos & Aquariums to prepare staff and Dara herself for the infant's arrival," said

Dara and Solaris will remain on exhibit — weather depending — until the last few weeks of her pregnancy, at which time she will have access to both her exhibit and off-exhibit dens. Visitors may notice some behavioral changes in Dara, such as nesting, over the next couple of months, but her outward appearance will not noticeably change as it does with humans.

Tune into the Zoo's social media accounts for behind-the-scenes footage, weekly updates and to follow Dara's pregnancy journey.

#### **About Orangutans**

The Virginia Zoo is home to four orangutans. The species originates in tropical and swamp forests in Asia, specifically on the Southeast Asian islands of Borneo and the Indonesian island of Sumatra. The origin of the word "Orangutan" is from Malay and Indonesian words, meaning "Person of the Forest." These arboreal primates are relatively large and stand between 3 and 4.5 feet tall, and can weigh up to 220 pounds. They are widely known for their vi-Lisa Thompson, Zoological brant, orange-colored hair. Both Bornean and Sumatran orangutans are critically endangered.

# Virginia Film Office announces 30th annual screenwriting competitions

RICHMOND, VA.

The Virginia Film Office today announced that the 2018 Virginia Screenwriting Competition will accept screenplay sub-

missions beginning April 13th, 2018. The film office established the competition, now in its 30th year, to provide Virginia screenwriters with a forum for their work and an opportunity to present their scripts to professionals in the motion picture and television industry. The deadline for submission is Tuesday, May 29, 2018.

The competition is one of the few in the nation that does not require an entrance fee, and in which all entrants receive a free written evaluation from the first round judges. Distinguished past winners include Breaking Bad creator Vince Gilligan, who won in 1989 for his screenplayHome Fries, and Megan Holley, who won in 2003 for her screenplay Sunshine Cleaning.

The competition is open exclusively to Virginia residents or students currently enrolled in Virginia schools. Each script submitted must take place in Virginia, or at locations that can reasonably be filmed in Virginia.

Feature film scripts must be approximately 90-120 pages in length. For the third consecutive year, the competition will also accept scripts made for one-hour series pilots, a reflection of the high-caliber of writing found in today's television and new media programming. Series pilots must be approximately 45-65 pages in length.

All scripts must be typed and submitted in a standard screenplay format, with numbered pages and a title page without any personal information. All scripts must be saved in a noneditable format such as a PDF. All screenplays must be e-mailed to screenplay@virginia. orgno later than midnight on Tuesday, May 29, 2018. An accompanying application must also be filled out on the film office website.

Screenplays are first read by Virginia judges, and finalists are selected and submitted to a second panel of judges who are currently working professionally in the entertainment industry. Three winning screenplays are then selected, and notifications of results are made in October 2018. The three winning writers are each recognized before a spotlight screening at the Virginia Film Festival in Charlottesville and awarded a prize of \$1,000 per winner. This year's Virginia Film Festival will take place November 1-4, 2018.

#### **Joining the Playoff Run:**

Christian Horn returned to the Peoria Rivermen (SPHL) for the SPHL playoffs. Horn, who was signed from Peoria in December, will rejoin the SPHL's top ranked team as they begin their first-round playoff series against Roanoke Despite early season struggles at home the Admirals fin- on Wednesday evening. In 44 games with the Admirals this

season Horn finished seventh on the team in points (30) and fifth in goals (14). Prior to joining the Admirals in December Horn had appeared in 12 games with the Rivermen notching seven points (2g, 5a).

#### Strength of the Kill:

The Admirals finished the season with the league's sixth best penalty kill, killing 85.7% of penalties. The 85.7% mark is a drastic improvement from last season when the Admirals finished the season 22nd on the penalty kill (80.0%).

Over the course of the season the Admirals were the fourth least penalized team in the ECHL, taking an average of 11.15 penalty minutes per game. Only Kalamazoo, Quad City, and Reading were less penalized than the Admirals. The Admirals took 803 penalty minutes this season, which is down from 868 a year ago.

The Admirals led the league in hat tricks in the regular season totaling seven. Darik Angeli and Christian Horn led the way for the Admirals with a pair of hat tricks each. Angeli and Horn were joined by Trevor Mingoia, TJ Melancon, and Brady Vail in the hat trick club this season. In each of the last two seasons the Admirals only recorded a pair of tricks, and no player had more than one.





#### CHILDHOOD VACCINE **RATES INCREASE BUT MORE PARENTS ALSO ARE REFUSING**

#### From Brandpoint

Childhood and adolescent vaccination is considered by many to be one of the greatest public health accomplishments of the 20th century, but based on the results of a new study by the Blue Cross Blue Shield Association (BCBSA), there is still more work to do to ensure children and teens are protected against the diseases vaccines were developed to eradicate.

The Blue Cross Blue Shield: Health of America Report shows childhood vaccination rates climbed 12 percent among young commercially insured members. Data shows 69 percent of young BCBS members born in 2010 were up-to-date on their CDC-recommended vaccinations by the age of 2 years and 3 months compared to 77 percent of children born in 2013.

The study also found that the rate of documented vaccine refusal — in other words, doctors charting parental refusal of vaccines for their children — went up by nearly 70 percent for children born in 2013 compared to those born in 2010 (4.2 percent versus 2.5 percent, respectively). only 29 percent of adolescents received a first dose of the human papilloma virus (HPV) vaccine

The result of vaccine refusal can be dangerous, not only for the child who is vulnerable to before their 13th birthday. diseases like measles and diphtheria, but for the community at large.

It played itself out in Minnesota last year, when a measles outbreak in the Twin Cities exceeded the total number of cases reported in the entire U.S. the year before. Health officials didn't have to look far for the cause. Spread of the highly infectious disease started in the state's Somali-American community.

ican children dropped from the high 80s to a low of 42 percent last year in response to the antivaccine movement's targeting efforts, fueling the outbreak. But the disease wasn't confined to the Somali community. It spread throughout the Minnesota public school system as well, infecting non-vaccinated children.

The disease is nothing to take lightly. At the low end, it causes fever, runny nose, cough, sore throat and a rash, but it can be deadly, spawning pneumonia, blindness and even encephalitis. One especially alarming complication lurks in the brain for years after a person has recovered and mysteriously reawakens, causing seizures, coma and death. No one who has contracted that (IPV), and Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR). complication has survived.

#### Low uptake of HPV vaccine

It's not just childhood vaccines that parents are refusing. According to the BCBSA report, healthofamerica.



The HPV vaccine rates lag far behind other adolescent vaccines, meningococcal and Tdap, which have rates of 72 percent and 82 percent, respectively.

And that's a problem. According to estimates from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 31,500 people die every year from cancers caused by HPV.

It's a heartbreaking statistic, especially because the American Cancer Institute estimates that, According to the Minnesota Department of Health, the vaccination rate among Somali-Amerial lteens were vaccinated against HPV, cervical cancer would be eliminated within one genera-

#### What parents can do

The key to protecting children and teens from diseases like measles, rubella and HPV is vaccination, according to the CDC.

Talk to your child's doctor about the safety and benefits of vaccination, if you have any doubt. Vaccinate your children according to the CDC-recommended Seven-Vaccine series: Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (DTaP), Heamophilus Influenza (Hib), Hepatitis B (Hep B) Polio

#### Vaccinate your adolescent against HPV, Meningitis and DTaP.
