Naval Station Norfolk and Naval Support Activity Hampton Roads, Headquarters Complex (NSN & NSA HR HQ Complex) are committed to providing you drinking water that is safe and reliable. NSN & NSA HR HQ Complex believe that providing you with accurate information about your water is the best way to assure that your water is safe. There were no drinking water violations to report for 2017.

Each year, the Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) is required to be distributed by July 1st of the current year. This CCR is a snapshot of the quality of your drinking water in 2017. The purpose of this annual report is to advise consumers of where their water comes from, provide water quality data, advance greater understanding of drinking water, and heighten awareness to conserve water resources.

NSN & NSA HR HQ COMPLEX SOURCE WATER

NSN & NSA HR HQ Complex purchase drinking water from the City of Norfolk. Norfolk's primary water supply comes from eight reservoirs located in Norfolk as well as Suffolk/Isle of Wight County. Additionally water sources include the Blackwater, and Nottoway Rivers and four deep wells located in Suffolk. From the reservoirs, water is pumped through pipes to the 37th Street Treatment Plant which is located in Norfolk. Water treatment chemicals are added to the

water, causing small solid particles to clump together and sink to the bottom of a settling basin. The water is then filtered to remove bacteria, algae, and other impurities. Finally, the water is disinfected with chloramines to kill any remaining bacteria. The 37th Street Water Treatment Plant provides state of the art treatment technology and surpasses all state and federal water quality standards and regulations. In addition to the over 230 substances that are tested at the 37th Street Treatment Plant, Naval Station staff routinely monitors for bacteriological pathogens, disinfection byproducts, lead, and copper in order to meet federal and state regulations and to ensure the highest water quality possible.

ABOUT DRINKING WATER

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Substances (referred to as contaminants) in source water may come from septic systems, discharges from domestic or industrial wastewater treatment facilities, agricultural and farming activities, urban storm water runoff, residential uses, and many other types of activities. Water from surface sources is treated while groundwater may or may not receive any treatment.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which may be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and may come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which may be naturally occurring, or the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In addition to these contaminants, all lakes and streams contain algae, which are microscopic plants that can cause taste and odor problems in drinking water.

All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) establishes limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

WHO NEEDS TO TAKE SPECIAL PRE-CAUTIONS?

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Kidney dialysis patients should consult with their health care providers or dialysis centers in order to take special precautions when using chloraminated water. Fish owners should be sure chloramines are removed from the water before it is used in aquariums or ponds. Many pet stores sell water conditioners for chloraminated water.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. The primary source of Lead in drinking water is materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. NSN & NSA HR HQ Complex are responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components in buildings. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes or until it becomes cold or reaches a steady temperature before using water for drinking or cooking. DEFINITIONS AND ABBREVIATIONS

Contaminants in your drinking water are routinely monitored according to Federal and State regulations. The table on the following pages shows the results of monitoring for 2017. In the tables and elsewhere in this report you may find many terms and abbreviations which you are not familiar. The following definitions are provided to help you better understand these terms:

- Action Level (AL) The concentration of a contaminant that, if exceeded in more than 10 percent of samples collected during any monitoring period, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow. For lead and copper monitoring, compliance is based on the 90th percentile value.
- Level 1 Assessment A Level 1 assessment is a study of the waterworks to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why total coliform bacteria have been found in our waterworks.
- Level 2 Assessment A level 2 assessment is a very detailed study of the waterworks to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why an E. Coli PMCL violation has occurred and why total coliform bacteria have been found in our waterworks on multiple occasions.
- Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water based on running annual average. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants. For chlorine and chloramines, a waterworks is in compliance with the MRDL when the running annual average of monthly averages of samples taken in the distribution system, computed quarterly, is less than or equal to the MRDL.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contamination.
 - NA Not applicable
- Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) A measure of the clarity, or cloudiness, of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person. Turbidity is monitored because it is a good indicator of the effectiveness of the filtration system.
 - Non-detection (ND) Laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.
 - **Picocuries per liter (pCi/L)** A measure of the radioactivity in water.
- Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/L) A measurement of the amount of contaminant per unit of water. A part per million is one cent in \$10,000 or one minute in two years.
- Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (ug/L) A measurement of the amount of contaminant per unit of water. A part per billion is like one cent in \$10,000,000 or one minute in 2,000 years.
- Secondary Maximum Contaminant Level (SMCL) Non-enforceable standard that is established for aesthetic considerations
 - **Treatment Technique** (**TT**) A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.



INSPIRING SUCCESS AROUND THE CLOCK

Coaching and mentoring Sailors and football players is something that Major Alonzo Johnson enjoys doing each and every day.

Johnson, Naval Support Activity Hampton Roads' Security Precinct Operations Officer, spends more than 10 hours each week coaching the 35 players on the Bennett's Creek Warriors football team, with the kids ranging in age from nine to 11 years old.

Johnson helps the players balance academics and sports, mentoring them both on and off the field. As the head coach and offensive coordinator, he is in charge of teaching the players during practice, developing the offensive game plan, and calling offensive plays during games.

"The players contact me and let me know about their accomplishments, their grades, and how they're doing in school," he said. "Their parents contact me for advice as well, sometimes they even ask me to talk to my players when they are having issues."

Johnson inspires his Sailors the same way that he inspires his football players. Every day, he ensures his Sailors are prepared for work in the same way he ensures his players are ready for school and football games.

THE HEAT IS ON, STAY COOL

In the last five years the U.S. Navy has recorded 698 instances of heat stress, two of which were fatal. Working or playing in hot weather can lead to illness or death if you're not prepared.

"To minimize the likelihood of heat-related illness, Sailors and civilians should familiarize themselves with the Heat Stress Index and avoid strenuous activity or the heaviest work during the hottest times of the day," said Capt. Paul J. DeMieri, M.D., the Naval Safety Center's Flight Surgeon. "They should hydrate frequently, about a cup of water every 15-to-20 minutes in extreme heat, and avoid consuming liquids with any caffeine or alcohol."

According to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), the heat index takes into account both humidity and air temperature. The higher the heat index, the hotter the air temperature feels, since sweat does not evaporate and cool the skin. OSHA and the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) report that most common heat-related illnesses are heat stroke, heat exhaustion, heat rash, and heat cramps.

"It's important to become familiar with signs of heat illness and know the basics of how to start treatment," DeMieri said.

Heat Exhaustion is a serious heat-related illness. Symptoms include elevated body temperature, decreased urine output, headache, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, weakness, irritability, thirst, and excessive sweating. If you notice these signs in a shipmate, take them to a medical clinic or dial 911. While you are waiting for medical personnel to arrive, move the person to a cooler area and give them liquids to drink, remove all unnecessary clothing, place a cool compress on their head, neck and face or have them wash their head, neck and face with cold water.

Heat Stroke is the most dangerous heat illness and can lead to death if not treated immediately. Symptoms of a heat stroke are elevated body temperature, confusion, seizures, hot, dry skin or excessive sweating, or loss of consciousness. If you notice these symptoms in a shipmate, dial 911 immediately. Also, move the person to a cool area, wet them with cool water, place cold wet clothes, or ice on their body and stay with the person until help arrives.

DeMieri said it's important to take all heat illnesses seriously.

"Heat cramps are usually caused by exercise or heavy exertion in warm weather and most commonly affect localized muscle groups," he said. "They can be a precursor to more severe heat-related injury and can usually be managed with rest, decreased activity, and increased fluid intake."

Take the following steps to keep cool when working outdoors: drink water or sports drinks frequently, make sure to eat regular meals throughout the day, schedule frequent rest periods and create a buddy system so you and your shipmates can check on one another.

HOW TO PREVENT

- Hydrate. Drink 8 to 16 cups of water a day.
- Keep a lookout for shipmates and watch for symptoms.
- Eat a well-balanced diet. Salt food to taste.
- Limit how much coffee and sodas you drink.
- Get plenty of rest, at least 6 hours every 24 hour period.

Navy Warfare Development Command updates Defense Support to Civil Authorities Handbook

Navy Warfare Development Command (NWDC) has incorporated lessons learned from the Navy-Marine Corps response to last year's series of devastating storms in a substantial update to NWDC's Defense Support for Civil Authorities (DSCA) Handbook / Quick Reference Guide.

The DSCA Handbook provides key elements from Joint and Navy doctrine, as well as contact information and other useful references for commanders and units.

NWDC's Focused Collection and Analysis Team (FCAT) actively collected data and operational level lessons from DSCA operations in response to Hurricanes Harvey, Irma, and Maria. FCAT members embedded at the United States Fleet Forces / Commander, Task Force 80 (CTF-80) Maritime Operations Center (MOC) to observe, gather information, and interview personnel.

In addition, the FCAT deployed a team to embark with the Expeditionary Strike Group 2 (ESG-2) in USS Kearsarge (LHD-3) off the coast of Puerto Rico. The team interviewed key personnel, including the commanders and commanding officers of the staffs, ships, and aircraft squadrons providing relief to Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands. The FCAT also met with the Commanders, Carrier Strike Group 10 (CSG-10) and CSG-12, and their key staff to capture lessons from their DSCA operations off the coast of Florida.

Throughout more than nine weeks of naval support to the victims of the 2017 hurricanes, observers found Sailors and Marines displayed exceptional ingenuity in order to meet the Joint Force Maritime Component Command Commander's Intent safely and effectively. Despite the catastrophic damage to infrastructure, first responding units issued, coordinated, and tracked mission tasks, managed airspace, and worked with other services and agencies in the area. Sailors and Marines exercised effective risk management under extremely challenging circumstances to save lives, mitigate human suffering, and restore critical infrastructure to enable civil authorities in affected

"The most rewarding part of the trip was opportunity to be face-to-face with our customers, both the shipboard customers and Commander, Navy Region Mid-Atlantic and Carrier Strike Group 10 representatives," she added. "Due to working in the same space, we were able to maximize working relationships to ensure faster, more efficient trouble-shooting as well as make some great connections for future support."

The HSP team helps ships procure a wide variety of services from trash removal, sewage removal, pilots and tugs, fresh water, bus service, vehicle rental and more, depending on the needs of the individual ship. Paben explained that by being on site for an event of this size, they were able to accompany the contracting officer representative from U.S Fleet Forces on his daily visits to the ships to observe daily reconciliation between the ship Supply Officer and husbanding service provider agent.

"These daily reconciliations are key to ensuring the government is only paying for services we receive as well as monitoring contractor performance," Paben added.

She concluded by saying that the opportunity to be onsite will greatly assist the HSP contracting team in the future in anticipating requirements for this annual event and will allow the team to help guide fleet customers in ensuring all requirements are considered, from hotels for watch standers to ATFP requirements across New York City.





Future USS Sioux City (LCS 11) completes acceptance trial

USS Columbia Sailors return home from deployment

Family members and friends gathered on the historic submarine piers to welcome home the crew of the Los Angeles-class fast-attack submarine USS Columbia (SSN 771) at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawaii, June 6.

Columbia successfully completed a six-month deployment to the Western Pacific conducting operations and exercises in support of national security.

Cmdr. David L. Edgerton, commanding officer of Columbia, attributed their successful and rigorous deployment to his professional crew.

"Their resourceful tenacity allowed us to remain operational anytime we faced a challenge," Edgerton said. "I admire their positive attitudes, resiliency and tight-knit camaraderie, even while deployed from friends and family. It was a privilege to spend the past six months with them."

Throughout the deployment, 10 Columbia Sailors ad-

vanced to the next pay grade, and seven officers were promoted to the next higher rank. Twenty Sailors also earned their submarine warfare qualification symbolically known within the submarine community as "earning your dolphins."

Intrepid later conducted submarine surveillance in the North Atlantic during the Cold War and served three tours of duty off Vietnam. It was also one of the primary recovery vessels for NASA during the Mercury and Gemini missions, and retrieved astronauts Scott Carpenter, Gus Grissom and John Young after their respective orbits and splashdowns in the

"One of my first roles with the team was trying to figure out how to take the complex systems engineering and acquisition process from DoD Instruction 5000.02 and tailor that so it was more appropriate for smaller-scale mobile applications," DiSalvo said. "We quickly found that these mobile apps do not need the same level of rigor that a larger acquisition program or tactical system would require."

Using a six-phase tailored mobile engineering process that includes three systems engineering technical reviews, DiSalvo and her team streamline large requirements into simpler, the Navy and proceed directly to commercial app stores via in-depth processes to quickly and effectively move apps to trusted download links. The site, available at www.applocker. production.

"It was important to us to have a process that still maintains the systems engineering rigor, but keep that rigor at the appropriate level so it aids and guides us, rather than slow the development of the mobile apps," DiSalvo said.

The Department of Defense (DOD) Acquisition process for larger acquisition systems typically has lifecycles of three to run with it, and the result is this repeatable process."

to five years or more, but the mobility team can develop a mobile app in just a few months using the tailored mobile engineering process. As a result, the Sea Warrior Program has fielded two dozen mobile applications that have been downloaded more than 345,000 times in the last three years.

"Emily and the Sea Warrior Program mobility team take the most critical parts of the systems engineering lifecycle and apply it to Navy mobile app development in a very efficient manner," said Paul Walter, SSC Atlantic ashore systems engineering competency lead. "They are combining the best aspects of systems engineering and agile software development processes to deliver timely app solutions to our Sailors."

The mobility team delivers apps that allow the Navy to take advantage of mobile devices for Sailor self-service functions by increasing the reach of training and information. Ranging from general military training resources and financial literacy information to uniform regulations and professional development career tools, the apps are available to Sailors on their

In April 2016, DiSalvo used the tailored mobile engineering process to assist the mobility team with the launch of the Navy App Locker, a mobile app and accompanying website that allows Sailors to identify official apps developed by navy.mil, currently hosts more than 70 Navy mobile apps, including 24 Sea Warrior Program-developed apps.

"Mobile work, in general, is so different from anything else Sea Warrior Program or the Navy does, so there's really no precedent in terms of what to do from a systems engineering perspective," DiSalvo said. "We were given the opportunity

Naval War College's joint maritime operations' students participate in annual capstone event

More than 200 students assigned to U.S. Naval War College (NWC) participated in an intense, two-week long Capstone exercise which culminated experience gained throughout the Joint Military Operations (JMO) course.

The JMO course, one of three core courses required by students in NWC's Graduate Degree Program, prepares future military and civilian leaders for high-level policy, command, and staff positions in various operational environments by building strategic and cul-

Participating students included officers from various U.S. military branches and civilians from numerous U.S. government agencies, as well as, international officers from over 60 countries.



"Stay encouraged and keep a positive mindset because it's easy to become stressed having to be away from your child," Carroll said. "As long as you have support from your friends and family you can still be a mother in the Navy."

Carroll and Miller are counting down the minutes until they are with their children again.

"I will call him and he will say, 'Mommy, when are you coming to pick me up?" Carroll said. "And, I'll say, 'As soon as I get back home — as soon as we pull in — I am coming

5 Cautionary Tips for College Grads Itching to Become Entrepreneurs

As the college Class of 2018 ventures out into the working world, many of them will choose to work for themselves, or at least entertain the thought.

A variety of factors – less security in the traditional job market, more innovation (especially through social media), a desire for more fulfilling work and independence – has led to a steady trend toward entrepreneurship among graduates in the past 10 years.

Recent surveys of graduating classes found nearly half want to become entrepreneurs post-graduation. The Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania, for example, saw a quintuple increase in its graduates starting their own company during a seven-year study period, according to Business In-

Slightly over 50 percent of small businesses fail in their first four years, according to Small Business Trends, but those startup-failure rates apparently don't deter grads.

"I am amazed at the dramatic increase in interest among students across all disciplines in starting a busi-(www.AveGroup.com).

"At the same time, while it's won-

derful to have that dream, it's daunting. Most don't make it. Most have no idea what they're getting into. Those who do have to embrace the whole challenge, from learning every step of the way to taking action."

But Greenberg says there are plenty of cautionary tales they can learn from, and he offers five factors college graduates should seriously consider before taking the leap:

- You can't do it all. Young entrepreneurs quickly get in over their heads when they wear too many hats or aren't sure which hats fit. "This is especially common among inventors and technologists with superb ideas but no business-building skills," Greenberg says. "Very few people are both inventors and operators. Most successful entrepreneurs must determine early on which category they fall into and find a complementary partner/company to provide the skills they lack."
- Indecisiveness is crippling. Entrepreneurs cannot be stagnant. "Working long hours isn't enough. It's the development of new habits that drives lasting behavioral changes," Greenberg says. "There's a brief period of motivation required early on when improving our work habits. However, once we make a change in our behavior - be it ever so small - and it becomes a habit, it overrides the need for motiva-

• College debt may slow you way down. This can snuff out start-out hopes. "Getting access to capital is a challenge many small-business owners face, but it can be particularly difficult when you're saddled with student loans," Greenberg says. "Being in debt makes self-financing that much tougher and taking on the entrepreneurial dream much harder. Sometimes, having a 'normal job' while experimenting with a new company is a good way to mitigate this burden.

· Being overly optimistic is dangerous. "It's easier to believe in your business when you're growing it, but there will always be setbacks and you have to be prepared, starting with adding a cushion to your budget," Greenberg says. "It's amazing, all the costs associated with starting a business. The only thing you know for sure about a planned budget is that it's wrong - and 99 percent of the time it's wrong in a negative way for the business."
