According to Naval Safety Center data, 16 Sailors and 11 Marines have died in off-duty drownings in the last five

One Sailor and two Marines were seriously injured in offduty water-related incidents as well.

"From 2005-2014, there were an average of 3,536 fatal unintentional drownings (non-boating related) annually in the United States — about 10 deaths per day," according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) website. "An additional 332 people died each year from drowning in boating-related incidents."

The CDC contributes the following factors to unintentional drowning: lack of swimming ability and supervision, lack of barriers and location, failure to wear a life jacket, seizures,

According to Naval Safety Center data, most of the Sailors and Marines who died in off-duty drownings did so while swimming, kayaking, boating or fishing.

Those who are not strong swimmers should consider taking swimming lessons to reduce the risk of drowning. Lessons are available for both adults and children, and learning how to swim can greatly reduce risks.

Everyone should pay attention to their surroundings and water conditions, and make sure to watch children at all times, whether at the beach or swimming pool. Also, swimming at pools and beaches where life guards are on duty provides less of a risk than swimming alone.

"About one in five people who die from drowning are children 14 and younger," according to the CDC. "For every child who dies from drowning, another five receive emergency department care for nonfatal submersion injuries."

Personnel should also take precautions at home when it comes to pool safety. Placing a barrier fence around the pool and getting a pool alarm help mitigate risks. A fence can help prevent small children from falling into the pool, and an alarm sounds an alert when the pool water is in motion. Both safety features aid in reducing drowning accidents.

If anyone is at risk of seizures, the CDC recommends

supervision whether at the beach or a pool, wearing a life jacket while boating, and taking a shower instead of a bath to prevent accidental drowning in the event of a seizure.

"Potentially, half of all boating deaths might be prevented with the use of life jackets," according to the CDC.

Alcohol should not be consumed before or while swimming. If supervising children at the beach or pool, no one should consume alcohol at all, as it slows reflexes and interferes with judgment.

"Among adolescents and adults, alcohol use is involved in up to 70 percent of deaths associated with water recreation, almost a quarter of emergency room visits for drowning, and about one in five reported boating deaths," according to the CDC website. "Alcohol influences balance, coordination, and judgment, and its effects are heightened by sun exposure and heat."

NMCP celebrates **LGBT Pride** Month

Naval Medical Center Portsmouth's diversity committee hosted a Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) Pride Month celebration in the chapel, June 27.

Master of ceremonies, Hospital Corpsman 3rd Class Maila Rain Stark, began the pride celebration by speaking about the LGBT community's history within the military. He asked that a part of the LGBT rainbow flag be held in front of the group in order to explain what each color of the flag repre-

The first portion of the flag ranged from pink at one end to red at the other, and Hospitalman Gabriela Murillo spoke about being a lesbian and her personal experiences during her nearly four years in the Navy.

"I can tell you as a lesbian Sailor for me my biggest priority is the Navy, first of all, I wear the uniform. Secondly, it's my family," said Murillo. "I'm married, and I'm very happy with the progress that's been made in the Navy where my wife can actually get a DoD (Department of Defense Identification) card."

Murillo explained the importance of her wife having a DoD card is when she is deployed, her wife can receive the same access to the resources that the Navy offers all heterosexual couple's non-military spouses.

The remaining sections of the flag were addressed by Yeoman 1st Class L. A. Sanders, representing the gay community, and Stark for the bi-sexual and transgender communities. Each Sailor gave their personal experiences being gay, bi-sexual and transgender before and after joining the Navy.

The guest speaker for the event was Sonar Technician (Surface) 2nd Class Patrick Damon, and he was introduced

as one of the first military members to march, while in uniform, in New York's LGBT Pride Parade in 2017.

"I'm gay, but I'm a Sailor," said Damon. "Pride is a celebration of community. No matter what we do, it's honor, courage and commitment." He explained that to have honor is to treat all persons with respect, to have courage is to speak up in the face of discrimination, and to have commitment to keep the U.S. Navy the best navy in the world.

"Change doesn't come to the comfortable — it's never easy," said Damon. "I ask for the last minute of my speech time to reflect on our brothers and sisters who have served and died in silence."

The celebration concluded with comments from Capt. Christopher Culp, NMCP's commanding officer.

"One hundred years ago, the Navy didn't look like how it looks today," said Culp. "These celebrations, regardless of which one, try to get rid of ignorance. The bring familiarity and knowledge, and they encourage conversations among all shipmates who go to war together."

"Each of you told a compelling story and you did it with

bravery — and I commend you for it," added Culp. "I thank you for sharing your stories and educating us and doing your part to end the ignorance that feeds discrimination."

The celebration attendees were invited to enjoy a piece of rainbow-colored cake provided by the diversity committee in honor of pride month.

val Operations Adm. Bill Moran led a discussion about the future path of the Navy, providing an opportunity for Sailors of all ranks to stand up and ask questions.



He was working for a food company in the Dominican Republic when the doctors told him a tumor had been discovered in his daughter's left eye.

Faced with the toughest decision of his life, Culinary Specialist 2nd Class Carlos Trejo had a choice to make.

"The doctors told us our daughter had an 85 percent chance of losing the vision in her affected eye if we agreed to go through with the operation in the Dominican Republic," Trejo said. "We didn't like those odds, so I moved my family to the United States. When we got here, the doctors told us that they could remove the tumor with a 15 percent chance of my daughter losing her vision; as opposed to 85."

Even though the surgery was being performed in the U.S. and the odds were in his family's favor, the procedure was nerve-wrecking for Trejo.

"I remember being very nervous and praying a lot to God," Trejo said. "I asked God for the doctors to do an amazing job and thankfully they did."

Trejo then took it upon himself to give back to the U.S. for saving his daughter.

"I joined the Navy," Trejo said. "It's been a win-win for me because the military life really fits me and TRICARE makes it easier for me to not worry about my family's medical needs." Moreover, Trejo has grown as a person by embracing the Navy way of life and learning from other Sailors.

"The most important thing the Navy has taught me is leadership," said Trejo. "I've learned to lead by reflecting the Navy core values." Trejo posts quotes around his kitchen to remind himself and his Sailors of the ingredients

they need to achieve success. "My favorite quote is 'without commitment you cannot start accomplishing your goals, but

more importantly, without consistency you won't be able to finish them," said Trejo.

Trejo said he uses the nuggets of wisdom he's been given throughout his Navy career and lets them marinate in his mind in order to improve himself as a person.

"I'm trying to give this recipe to success to everyone I meet," Trejo said. "I'm not just doing my job and giving 100%. I'm giving more than 100% so I can be an example and make a change in other people's lives."

Governor Northam makes the Military **Medics** and **Corpsmen Program** permanent

NORFOLK

At a special ceremony, June 26, at the Hampton Roads Veterans Employment Center in Norfolk, Governor Ralph Northam signed legislation making the Virginia Department of Veterans Services' Military Medics and Corpsmen (MMAC) Program permanent. He also charged the MMAC team with hiring 300 qualified veterans through the Program by the end of his administration.

Established by the Virginia General Assembly as a pilot program in 2016, MMAC provides a path to careers in the civilian healthcare industry for recently discharged Army Medics, Navy and Coast Guard Corpsmen, and Air Force Medical Technicians. MMAC collaborates with major healthcare systems across the Commonwealth to provide employment for former medics, corpsmen, and technicians, allowing veterans to maintain their clinical skills while obtaining the required civilian medical credentials. Since the program's inception, 76 veterans have been hired in civilian healthcare, and 43 of those veterans met the qualifications to practice specific advanced skills learned in the military.

"I want to express my appreciation to my fellow physician, Delegate Christopher Stolle for patroning this legislation in the House, to Senator George Barker for his leadership in patroning this bill in the Senate. I also want to thank all of our members of the General Assembly who supported this program that again shows why Virginia is the most veteranfriendly state in America," the Governor added.

MMAC was modeled after the highly successful Veterans Health Administration Intermediate Care Technician Pilot Program, which operated in 15 federal Veterans Affairs Medical Centers. Virginia was the first state in the country to create a program of this nature, with other states now beginning to implement similar programs.

"As a former Army doctor, I worked alongside military medics while treating soldiers injured during Desert Storm," said Governor Northam. "Our medics and corpsmen have extensive training and valuable experience, but unfortunately until Virginia took the lead in establishing the MMAC Program that recognizes this service, it was difficult for them to

"The MMAC Program is a true example of our innovative initiatives and public-private partnerships that help our service members transition to the civilian workforce and contribute to the economic well-being of the Common-

"As a retired Naval Officer and physician myself, I can personally attest to the relevant, real-world experience military medics and corpsmen hold from their extensive military education and training," said Delegate Christopher Stolle. "They are outstanding candidates to fill gaps in Virginia's healthcare workforce. I am pleased to see so many health systems making moves towards capturing the clinical skills and overall talent and experience that our veterans bring to the healthcare industry."

commanders, recruiters, brig duty, instructors and special warfare operators will not be considered for SERTS. Nuclear-trained Sailors will continue to be detailed according to the Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program.

In addition to filling billets at their current pay grade, SERTS candidates may be selected to fill vacant requirements within their pay band:

supervisor (E7-E9), journeyman (E5-E6), and apprentice (E1-E4). For example, E8s and E9s may be chosen to fill vacant E7 and E8 requirements.

Upon selection, the Navy Personnel Command will notify the Sailor and the Sailor's current command of the possible transfer. Sailors and their command may submit an adverse impact statement within 15 days of notification.

Alexander announced today the start of the world's largest international maritime exercise, the biennial Rim of the Pacific (RIMPAC), scheduled through Aug. 2 in and around the Hawaiian Islands and Southern California.

Twenty-five nations, more than 45 surface ships and submarines, 17 national land forces, and more than 200 aircraft and 25,000 personnel are taking part in a unique training opportunity designed to foster and sustain cooperative relationships that are critical to ensuring the safety of sea lanes and security on the world's interconnected oceans. RIM-

PAC 2018 is the 26th exercise in a series that began in 1971.

"RIMPAC is not only the world's largest international maritime exercise, it also shows that like-minded nations who value a free and open Indo-Pacific want this opportunity to improve our cooperation with each other," said Aquilino.

The theme of RIMPAC 2018 is "Capable, Adaptive, Partners." Participating nations and forces will exercise a wide range of capabilities and demonstrate the inherent flexibility of maritime forces. These capabilities range from disaster relief and maritime security operations to sea control and complex warfighting. The relevant, realistic training program includes gunnery, missile, anti-submarine, and air defense exercises, as well as amphibious, counter-piracy, mine

clearance, explosive ordnance disposal, diving, and salvage operations.

Alexander emphasized the importance of building relationships among international maritime partners by conducting exercises such as RIMPAC.

"We are all maritime nations," said Alexander. "We all prosper through trade and the majority of the trade goes through the Indo-Pacific region."

This is an opportunity to build relationships ahead of a crisis, he said. This enables us to call our friends, partners and allies to work together to provide disaster relief. combat piracy, or a wide range of maritime contingency operations.

This year's exercise includes forces from Australia, Brunei, Canada, Chile, Colombia, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Israel,

Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, Netherlands, New Zealand, Peru, the Republic of Korea, the Republic of the Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Tonga, the United Kingdom, the United States, and Vietnam.

"There are different uniforms, different faces, and different cultures, but we share a common purpose here at RIMPAC," Aquilino said. "I want to thank all the participating nations for sending forces to be a part of RIMPAC. The ships, aircraft and personnel have come a long way, and they represent a significant investment by their countries. Those countries are investing in the security and stability in this maritime region that has allowed all nations to enjoy unprecedented prosperity for decades."

The vacation was over. After a week of roasting in the Carolina sun and indulging shamelessly in happy hour beverages and nightly feasts, we packed our sand-sprinkled suitcases, a gluttonous stockpile of leftover food, and our elephant-skinned bodies into our minivan for the brutal twelve-hour drive back to Rhode Island. As I zoned out, munching cleansing carrots from a baggie and half-listening to the humorous prattle of my college-aged kids, I had no idea that I would soon become a common criminal.



USMC veteran designs National **Native American Veterans Memorial** for National Mall

The National Museum of the American Indian (NMAI) announced its selection, June 26, of a winning design for the National Native American Veterans Memorial.

Harvey P. Pratt's Warriors' Circle of Honor design was selected to be constructed next to the Smithsonian NMAI.

Pratt, a U.S. Marine Corps veteran, is a Southern Cheyenne chief for the Southern Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes of Oklahoma.

"I can't believe it will be one of the 12 national memorials in Washington, D.C.," said Pratt.

Pratt's design incorporates many different traditions and beliefs of the Native Peoples, to promote inclusivity among

"The sacred circle represents heaven, earth and the pathway followed by honor-bound Native People," said Pratt. "Wind spirits can pass through the stainless-steel sacred circle. Water, fire and the drum are the central design elements within the circle. Water represents purity, prayer, cleansing and reflection, flowing over the drum; water softly



pulses over circular ridges, suggesting vibrations of voice and drumbeat in a Kasota limestone basin. Fire symbolizes strength, courage, endurance and comfort. The drum is the heartbeat of the memorial and connects all the elements.

"The outer wall is comprised of four sections. It provides an outer perimeter and allows private meditation space on


the outer walkway and represent warriors of the past, present and future; white (beginning), red (power of the Creator), yellow (Mother Earth), black (ancestors). The warriors traditional red road, made of red stone surrounding the outer wall, represents the way of life leading to harmony. Visitors and guests can tie prayer cloths at the base of the four lances for their loved ones. The wind will send the prayers to the

According to the NMAI website, Congress passed legislation to allow NMAI to create a National Native American Veterans memorial in 1994. The memorial had to be located inside the museum, no federal funds could be used, and only the National Congress of American Indians was allowed to raise funds. In 2013, Congress amended the legislation to allow the memorial to be located on the NMAI grounds and allow the museum to raise funds for the memorial.

The NMAI formed an advisory committee for the memorial, and from 2015 to 2017, the committee sought input and support for the memorial from tribal leaders, Native veterans and Native community members. From these inputs, the committee created a design competition in November of 2017 with these guiding principles: "... the memorial should honor the interrelated elements of culture, spirituality, sacrifice, place, valor, healing, future service members, and the legacy of veterans past. Design concepts should address balance, inclusivity, respect, sustainability, endurance, accessibility, and interpretation of memorial elements."


There are currently more than 25 Native American Veteran memorials located throughout the United States. Groundbreaking is slated for Sept. 21, 2019 and the dedication of the National Native American Veterans Memorial is scheduled for Veterans Day, Nov. 11, 2020.



USS Mustin aids Filipino fishermen in distress

The Arleigh Burke-class guided missile destroyer USS Mustin (DDG 89) rendered assistance to two distressed mariners, June 26, whose fishing boat had suffered an engine malfunction, rendering the vessel inoperable.

Mustin was conducting a routine patrol June 26 in the vicinity of the Philippines when watch standers sighted a fishing vessel with two Filipino fishermen onboard frantically

After pulling alongside and communicating with the fishermen in Tagalog, it was determined the fishing vessel had engine trouble and was unable to stay with their fellow fishermen or return to shore. The two fishermen had water onboard, but no food, and were unable to communicate with local coast

The Mustin crew provided immediate assistance. They first contacted one of the nearby fishing vessels to relay the mariners' situation. They then deployed their rigid hull inflatable boat and towed the adrift fishing vessel to rejoin their fellow fishermen.

"The Mustin nation feels very fortunate to have been at the right place at the right time in order to provide assistance to fellow mariners while underway conducting routine operations in the South China Sea. I couldn't be prouder of my Sailors' ability to safely and professionally assist our fellow cal fishing vessel, was spotted. They were grateful to be able mariners at sea," said Cmdr. 

Building the future, one RoboBoat at a time

Teams of students representing 13 schools from six different countries tested their engineering skills by developing autonomous boats during the 11th annual International RoboBoat Competition, June 18-24, in Daytona Beach, Florida.

Sponsored by the Office of Naval Research and the Association for Unmanned Vehicle Systems International Foundation, RoboBoat is an annual robotics contest where the next generation of engineers puts autonomous surface vehicles (ASVs) through a series of advanced, water-based challenges that mirror real-world maritime operations.

"The challenges might seem simplistic, but before the boats even make it to the water to try and complete the course, there's a lot complex engineering that goes into the ASVs' development," said Kelly Cooper, a program officer in ONR's Ship Systems and Engineering Research Division and a RoboBoat judge. "This competition really showcases the technical ingenuity of the students."

That ingenuity will be needed as the desire for autonomous systems continues to grow — not only for the naval service, but across the commercial sector — as companies like Dominos, Amazon and Uber all want to use autonomous vehicles for deliveries.

And while these companies are making strides toward autonomous services for the average consumer, the Department of the Navy (DoN) is looking to use the technology to "create fundamental shifts" in the way the Navy and Marine Corps conduct future naval operations.

According to the recently-released DoN Strategic Roadmap for Unmanned Systems (short version), the goal is to "transform modern warfare" by seamlessly integrating un-

manned systems into the naval services and across all domains.

This is something ONR is already doing — pushing the path forward for autonomous technologies like swarming boats, aerial vehicles and unmanned surface ships and helicopters

"RoboBoat showcases the talents of future engineers and serves as a basic introduction to some of what the Navy needs its autonomous systems to do," said Cooper. "We know there will be a strong pull from the commercial sector to have these kids come work for them, but we want the participants to know that the future is bright with the naval services as well. We have the jobs and we need their talent, too."

As in the past, this year's teams were largely composed of university students and were evaluated on their vessel design and performance. The design component focused on innovation, quality of engineering and craftsmanship. The performance component tested a vehicle's ability to execute specific missions on the water without any human interaction.

As part of the performance challenge, the ASVs had to demonstrate their speed and navigation capabilities by passing through a set of gates before competing for any mission challenge points.

The mission tasks demonstrated the maritime systems' autonomous behavior in different scenarios, including: speed;


automated docking, which demonstrated the ability to launch and communicate with an aerial drone; finding a path in a crowded area; target identification; precise navigation; and, finally, return to dock.

Institut Teknologi Sepuluh Nopember (Indonesia) was this year's biggest winner, bringing home the top prize of \$6,000. Georgia Institute of Technology won second prize and \$5,000; Hagerty High School (Florida) took third and \$3,000; and Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University (Florida) came in fourth, earning \$2,000.

Smaller awards of \$500 and \$1,000 in various special award categories went to Nathan Hale High School (Washington State), Tecnologico de Monterrey (Mexico), Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, SRM Institute of Science and Technology (India), Delft University of Technology (Netherlands) and Hagerty High School.

The other participating institutions were Florida Atlantic University, Universitas Diponegoro (Indonesia), University of Iowa, University of Michigan and University of Ottawa.

CNR forum leverages history to focus the future

Vice Adm. John Totushek, CNR from 98-03, Vice Adm. Dirk Debbink, CNR from 08-12, and Vice Adm. Robin Braun, CNR from 12-16, met with McCollum at the Navy Yard's Visiting Flag Quarters to provide a historical perspective as McCollum works to shape the future of the Reserve Force.

Being the spokesman for the Navy Reserve within in the DoD and in front of Congress as well as traveling extensively to meet with Sailors on their drill weekends, has given the CNR office a reputation as being one of the busiest 3-star jobs at the Pentagon. McCollum says it is a tough job, but it is also a team

"Being CNR is about building relationships and trust and also being collaborative and gathering as many approaches to problem solving as we can," McCollum said.

The forum provided a way to discuss how previous CNR's handled the job and the lessons they learned.

"It was an absolute benefit," McCollum

said. "I've always believed it's important to be a student of history to help inform the future and it's been very valuable to hear

the history spoken through the words and experiences of those who have had my

Each of CNR's were given time to provide a snapshot of their time in office, creating a discussion that was a living timeline of the history of the Reserves.

"It really was an endeavor in culture," McCollum said. "As we each discussed our own snapshot, we talked about different leaders of the nation and elected officials, different Chief of Naval Operations and all the tides and currents of the issues that have come and gone."

One discussion topic for the forum was about what they weren't able to accomplish during their time in the office. Each CNR confirmed that a large part of the position is continuing the long-term Reserve strategy.

"Don't look for immediate effects," Debbink said, "This is supposed to be long term strategy. This is about continuing on the path we've been on for over a decade making the Reserve component that much more valuable

to the active component through integra-

Integration was also a common thread for each CNR as they worked

to best employ the Reserve Force. "It's been a year-and-a-half since I retired."

"And I continue to look forward to the day when we have an integrated personnel system for the active and reserve component to make it easier for Sailors to go between active and

reserve orders." Braun's work is still coming to fruition as McCollum says his office is right now working on how to create systematic funding lines to integrate Reserve Sailors and their hard-

"Navy Reserve Sailors bring skills, competencies and maturity," McCollum said. "And in that regard, when our Sailors go and serve, the active duty loves them. But they are the consumers of the Navy Reserve, and we have to get that integrated funding in place."

Advocating for Sailors was the central theme of the forum.

"The common thread was service to our Sailors," Debbink said. "When I was active duty I would always say, I get to go to work every morning for 64,000 Sailors, and I know McCollum feels the same way. It was fun to share our dedication and our enthusiasm for doing what's right for Sailors."

Braun said, besides the comradery the whole purpose of getting together is about the Sailors and making things better for them. "Our goal, really, was to help Vice Adm. Mc-Collum in his quest to make a better Reserve Force," she said.

The stresses and challenges that come with the office, according to Debbink are the complicated parts of the job. But he says meetings like this are important to be able to see the big picture.

"To the degree you can pull up and provide some clarity has always been my favorite

US/UK NAVY CHIEFS STRENGTHEN PARTNERSHIP

LONDON

Chief of Naval Operations (CNO) Adm. John Richardson visited London to highlight the importance of the U.S. and Royal Navy partnership June 27-28.

During the visit, Richardson met with U.K. Secretary of State for Defense Gavin Williamson, Chief of Defense Staff Gen. Sir Nick Carter, and First Sea Lord Adm. Sir Philip Jones.

Richardson and Jones also participated in a roundtable discussion at the International Institute for Security Studies, where they discussed strengthening the partnership between their two navies during a time of increasing global maritime competition.

"The US has lots of partners, but when we really want to go to the high end of naval warfare, I know that the Royal Navy stands by our side," said Richardson. "Our relationship starts at the top. The First Sea Lord and I are in constant dialogue, exchanging ideas about how to enhance maritime security as we sail alongside each other in all corners of the globe."

"As much as the Royal Navy must retain the sovereign capability to act on its own in defence of the realm if necessary, even the most cursory analysis of our history shows that we are better off working in partnership with our allies whenever our interests align," Jones said. "Of all our partners around the globe, the most significant is our collaboration with the US. Ours is a truly strategic partnership, underpinned by our shared commitment to the development of world-class 21st century seapower."

Richardson said the U.S. and U.K. naval partnership is a priority and a relationship he eeks to strengthen through information sharing, interoperability initiatives, and combined operations.

The survey takes approximately two minutes to complete, is voluntary and the responses are anonymous. Information collected is analyzed and maintained by NPC's career management department.


"It's designed to be short and effective; it's one page with a 'submit' button at the bottom," said Pawlowski.

Not all responses are positive, but both positive and negative inform the detailer community, Pawlowski said.

"Having access to direct feedback from the fleet has helped me as a detailer. It allows me to better mold how I approach an interaction with a Sailor who is up for orders," Pawlowski added.


NPC's career management department is currently using email distribution to make the fleet aware of the Sailor Experience Survey and has a proposal to develop an app for mobile phones, for additional access.

The dangers of fireworks, potential for devastating injuries

From Prevent Blindness

While many Americans spend the Fourth of July holiday with friends and family, some actually spend their time being medically treated for a fireworks injury. The latest report from the U.S. Consumer Products Safety Commission found an estimated 7,600 fireworks-related injuries were treated in U.S. hospital emergency departments during the Independence Day period.

There were an estimated 11,100 fireworks-related injuries for the year. Unfortunately, many injuries are to children. In fact, children younger than 15 years of age accounted for 31 percent of the estimated injuries.

Although most injuries result in burns, firework-related injuries to the eye include contusions, lacerations, and foreign bodies. Injuries may be so severe that permanent vision loss or blindness may occur. And, in 2016, four people died from direct impacts from fireworks.

ple died from direct impacts from fireworks.

Prevent Blindness, the nation's oldest eye health and safety non-profit organization, and a member of the National Fire Protection Association's "Alliance to Stop Consumer Fireworks," supports the development and enforcement of bans on the importation, sale and use of all fireworks and sparklers, except those used in authorized public displays by competent licensed operators. However, the group also warns that even professional displays can be dangerous, due to the erratic or unpredictable na-

In the event of an eye emergency, Prevent Blindness rec-

- Seek help from a medical professional immediately.
- Do not rub the eye. Rubbing the eye may increase bleeding or make the injury worse.
- Do not attempt to rinse out the eye. This can be even more damaging than rubbing.
- Do not apply pressure to the eye itself. Holding or taping a foam cup or the bottom of a juice carton to the eye are just two tips. Protecting the eye from further contact with any item is the goal.
- Do not stop for medicine! Over-the-counter pain relievers will not do much to relieve pain. Aspirin (should never be given to children) and ibuprofen can thin the blood, increasing bleeding. Take the injured person to the emergency room at once.
- emergency room at once.Do not apply ointment. Ointment, which may not be sterile, makes the area around the eye slippery and harder

for the doctor to examine.

Williamsburg native serves aboard a floating airport at sea

A Williamsburg, Virginia, native and 2014 Lafette High School graduate is serving in the U.S. Navy aboard the aircraft carrier USS Theodore Roosevelt, which recently returned from a 7-month deployment.

Petty Officer 3rd Class Malcolm Farmer is an aviation boatswain's mate (handling) aboard the carrier operating out of San Diego. A Navy aviation boatswain's mate (handling) is responsible for flight deck firefighting and rescue opera-

Farmer credits success in the Navy to many of the lessons learned growing up in Williamsburg.

"You have to stay humble," said Farmer. "It's important to work as a team and having a humble personality helps you fit into that team."

The crew spent the deployment supporting Operations Inherent Resolve and Freedom's Sentinel, as well as maritime security cooperation efforts in the Arabian Gulf and Pacific Ocean.

The ship transited more than 56,000 miles, and made five port calls in four different countries, to include the United Arab Emirates, the Kingdom of Bahrain, the Republic of Singapore, and the Republic of the Philippines, as well as port calls in Hawaii and Guam.


Named in honor of former President Theodore Roosevelt, the carrier is longer than three football fields, measuring nearly 1,100 feet. The ship, a true floating city, weighs more than 100,000 tons and has a flight deck that is 252 feet wide.

Powerful catapults slingshot the aircraft off the bow of the ship. The planes land aboard the carrier by snagging a steel cable with an arresting hook that protrudes from the rear of the aircraft.

Sailors' jobs are highly varied aboard the carrier. Approximately 3,200 men and women make up the ship's crew, which keeps all parts of the aircraft carrier running smoothly — this includes everything from washing dishes and preparing meals to handling weaponry and maintaining the nuclear reactors. Another 2,500 men and women form the air wing responsible for flying and maintaining the aircraft aboard the






