# fault of their own. This means if a Sailor fails to fulfill their service obligation because of a "force shaping" event (such as officers involuntarily separated as a result of being twice passed over for promotion, or enlisted personnel involuntarily separated as a result of failure to meet minimum retention standards, such as high-year tenure) the transfer of benefits

to a family member would not be impacted.

Exceptions that permitted service members with at least ten years of service to obligate less than four years if prevented by statute or policy from doing so, such as enlisted high year tenure, have been cancelled. All approvals for transferability of Post-9/11 GI bill require a four-year commitment in the Armed Forces and, more importantly, the member must be eligible to be retained for four years from

## CHANGES ANNOUNCED TO POST-9/11 GI BILL TRANSFERABILITY

#### WASHINGTON

Department of Defense released changes to department policy on the transfer by service members in the Uniformed Services of "Post-9/11 GI Bill" education benefits to eligible family member, July 12.

Effective July 12, 2019, eligibility to transfer those benefits will be limited to service members with less than 16 years of total service, active duty service and/or selected Reserves as applicable.

Previously, there were no restrictions on when service members could transfer education benefits to their family members. The provision for a Sailor to have at least six years of service to apply to transfer benefits remains unchanged.

"After a thorough review of the policy, we saw a need to focus on retention in a time of increased growth of the Armed Forces," said Stephanie Miller, Director of Accessions Policy, Office of the Secretary of Defense. "This change continues to allow career service members that earned this benefit to share it with their family members while they continue to serve." She added "this change is an important step to preserve the distinction of transferability as a retention incentive."

What does this mean for our Sailors?

The change will allow Sailors to retain their eligibility to transfer education benefits even if they have not served the entirety of their obligated service commitment through no

# Navy uniform update released

#### WASHINGTON

The Navy announced the expansion of hair styles for women along with several other uniform policy changes and updates in NAVADMIN 163/18, July 11.

Among the several hair style changes is the authorization for women to wear locks. The NAV-ADMIN provides specific and detailed regulation on how locks can be worn.

Women are also authorized to wear their hair in a single braid, French braid, or single ponytail in service, working and physical training uniforms. The ponytail may extend up to three inches below the bottom edge of the of the shirt, jacket or coat collar. The accessory holding the ponytail must not be visible when facing forward, and be consistent with the color of the hair. The hair cannot be worn below the bottom of the uniform collar

where there are hazards such as rotating gear.

Women may now wear a hair bun that does not exceed or extend beyond the width of the back of the head

Other uniform changes include the approval of the Navy Optional Physical Training Uniform (OPTU) that consists of a navy blue high performance shirt and five-inch running shorts. The uniform is expected to be available at Navy Exchange Uniform and Customer Care Centers starting October 2018.

Navy is also developing a standard navy blue Physical Training Uniform (PTU) that will be phased into the seabag issue at Recruit Training Command in the next 12-18 months.

The Black Relax-Fit Jacket (Eisenhower Jacket) has been designated a unisex item and Sailors can wear the men or women's jacket sizing that best suits their uniform requirements.

To allow for greater visibility female Sailors have the option to wear identification badges on the right side above the pocket of their uniforms.

Wear testing of the improved female officer and chief Service uniform skirts and slacks will be

# MILITARY SPOUSE: MYCAA

For many military spouses completing education and career goals are a major concern as they balance life with a loved one in the military. A Defense Manpower Data Center study revealed that 27.1% of military spouses listed furthering their education or training as an important milestone. While military life may present unique challenges for spouses like frequent moves and funding issues, the Department of Defense (DoD) has taken steps to address those concerns.

With help from the Military Spouse Career Advancement Accounts (MyCAA) program, spouses like Leilani McNurlan have reached that goal.

A career development and employment assistance program sponsored by the DoD, MyCAA helps military spouses pursue licenses, certificates, certifications, or associates degree necessary for gainful employment in high demand, flexible career fields.

"MyCAA has helped me so much financially. Being able to finish my nursing degree without having to create debt while I did it feels great." said McNurlan, who recently graduated from Florida State College at Jacksonville.

The mother of four completed her associate's degree in practical nursing just months after giving birth and while her husband Culinary Specialist Second Class Matthew McNurlan, assigned to amphibious transport dock, USS New York (LPD-21) deployed. With her spouse gone she no longer had a partner to help at home while she attended study groups and turned to family and friends for support. Although the feat of juggling parenting and school was difficult McNurlan says it was worth it.

"Working on a degree is hard by itself but having my spouse working up to deployment and leaving while I was in school made

it extra hard," said Leilani. "I'm glad that when Matthew gets home from deployment I'll be able to say that I've accomplished something I've always wanted to do."

MyCAA provides a maximum education benefit of up to \$4,000 with an annual fiscal year cap of \$2,000 to assist eligible military spouses in obtaining a professional credential needed to pursue their career goals. Annual cap waivers are also available if there is an upfront tuition cost that exceeds \$2,000 (up to the maximum education benefit of

Spouses of service members on active duty in pay grades E-1 to E-5, W-1 to W-2, and O-1 to O-2 who can start and complete their coursework while their military sponsor is on Title 10 military orders, including spouses married to members of the National Guard and Reserve Components in these same pay grades qualify for assistance as

Regardless of their eligibility to receive MyCAA assistance counseling services are provided to military spouses of all ranks. Counseling services help spouses identify additional sources of federal, state, and local financial assistance, scholarships, career opportunities, and necessary support resources (e.g., child care, transportation, books, computers, equipment, supplies, etc.).

Despite the various sources of assistance offered through MyCAA many spouses are unaware they are eligible for the program. According to analysis from RAND Corporation, among military spouses who knew about MyCAA, the main reasons they didn't use the program were busy schedules and the misconception they were ineligible. Leilani credits her fellow military spouses with helping her learn about the program and learning who was qualified to receive

command after they put out a newsletter and a few friends shared info about it through word of mouth, which is why I think it's really good to have friends who are military spouses because they are great resources when you need information," she said. "I think if more spouses knew they didn't have to worry about student loans while they were in school it would be a huge burden lifted. I'm thankful I learned about the program when I did." McNurlan said.

Although pursuing her nursing degree full time with a deployed spouse made for a busy lifestyle Leilani says school also offered a way to focus on self-improvement while taking her mind off deployment.

"I think that's kind of the reason I decided

to be in school while Matthew is gone, having something to look forward to like school and making sure I passed my tests really made time go by faster," she said.

"After all the long nights of studying, tears of joy and sadness, it feels amazing to be able to graduate and say that I did it with four kids and while my husband was deployed." Leilani said. It's nice because by the time he gets home I can tell him 'I did it', and now not only is my husband a role model for our kids, but I am too."

## **VOICES HEARD: NEW HAIR REGULATIONS MAKE POSITIVE** IMPACT ON **SAILORS**

VIRGINIA BEACH, VA.

Aviation Maintenance Administrationman 1st Class Jacqualynn Leak, assigned to "The Gladiators" of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 106, said that since she's joined the Navy in 2009, she has faced many struggles when it came to her hairstyle.

"I started mostly wearing braids or using different hair relaxers to make it easier to maintain and be in standards," said Leak, referring to the Navy's female grooming standards. "I found that to be very damaging to my hair."

Leak said she started researching and trying to find a different way to style her hair.

"I just wanted my hair to flourish and be happy and healthy," said Leak.

In November 2014, Leak made the decision to have her hair locked, though the style was not yet authorized by the Navy. A chief petty officer assigned to VFA-106 told her she would not be able to wear her hair the way it was styled, so Leak decided to wear a wig to work every day.

In January 2017, Leak made it her mission to make a change in the Navy's female hair regulations because of the struggles she experienced, and in April 2018, she submitted her final written proposal for these changes.

On July 11, 2018, NAVADMIN 163/18 was released, announcing an expansion of approved hairstyles for women that includes locks, ponytails and single braids.

The Navy's continued effort to promote inclusiveness allows female service members to be more comfortable in uniform, allows for a wider range of personal expression and promotes a greater sense of pride for their service.

Culinary Specialist 3rd Class Nija Devries, stationed on Naval Air Station Oceana, said she really likes the changes to the Navy's new changes to the hair regulations.

"My hair is naturally curly and keeping it tied up in a bun 24/7 over the five years I've been in the Navy ruined my natural curl pattern," said Devries. "When I would take it down, I had hair that was breaking. It's too much strain on your hair after a while."

Devries, who can now be seen wearing her hair in a ponytail, said she feels much more comfortable while in uniform.

"This ponytail is definitely letting my hair breathe more and letting it do what it does naturally, as opposed to it being constrained," said Devries.

Not only does the newly approved hairstyles allow female service members to feel more comfortable in uniform, Leak said it allows other people to express themselves more freely.

"I feel like I can really be who I am," said Leak. "I love the Navy and I love me. My hair is a part of me and when I was wearing a wig, I felt like I was hiding that part of me from everyone."

Similarly, Devries said the updated regulations are more realistic concerning the fe-

male body and how it acts.

"The Navy is starting to realize that we're not all cookie-cutter people, or people don't all fit into the same category," said Devries. "Everyone, including their hair, is different shapes, sizes and styles."

Devries also said she feels that the new regulations will cause a boost in morale among female service members.

Likewise, Leak said changes such as the ones in NAVADMIN 163/18 will make people happier about their service in the Navy.

"With the Navy trying to be more diverse, inclusive and accepting people for who they are, it makes me happy to serve," said Leak. "I'm so ecstatic to come to work because I know that everyone is going to accept me for who I am."

On July 10, 2018, Leak participated in a Facebook Live All-Hands Call with Chief of Naval Operations Adm. John Richardson and Chief of Naval Personnel Vice Adm. Robert Burke where the changes to the Navy's female hair regulations were announced.

In the Facebook Live All-Hands Call, Richardson said they demonstrated that the Navy listens to its members' recommenda-

Leak said the whole process of making these changes was humbling and inspiring for her.

"I've gotten so many Facebook messages and emails from people thanking me," said Leak. "I didn't realize how many women were living my same struggle."

Leak said Sailors can look to these changes as inspiration for their daily lives. "If you get people to understand that even an airman can make a change in the Navy that can impact the whole fleet, that inspires people to want to do great things," said Leak.

"It makes people even prouder to serve in a branch of service that is so inclusive and really wants to get the job done. It's very humbling to know that even at our level, we can affect change."

The Navy's newest aircraft carrier, USS Gerald R. Ford (CVN 78), departed Naval Station Norfolk on Sunday, July 15, 2018 to begin a post-shakedown availability (PSA) period at Newport News Shipbuilding in Newport News, Virginia.

As the ship closes in on one year since its commissioning, the first-in-class aircraft carrier has seen many 'firsts,' with the ship and crew exceeding expectations in some cases. Since first getting underway on her own power April 8, 2017, Ford has safely conducted 10 underway evolutions and completed all of the testing required prior to beginning the PSA.

"My team has completed a very important phase in Ford's lifecycle," said Ford's Commanding Officer, Capt. Richard McCormack. "The shakedown period was an opportunity for the Navy to run the ship through a rigorous set of operational tasks and assess her performance. My team of talented Sailors, shipyard workers, and program engineers have learned a great deal from our time at sea and provided critical feedback on performance to Navy and industry leaders. We now

Following her delivery on May 31, 2017, the ship has operated for 81 days at sea during seven independent steaming events (ISE), supported by in-port Windows of Opportunity (WOO). "Daily, our extraordinary team of Sailors brings engineering concepts to life aboard this amazing warship," said Gaut. "Time and again, our Sailors have demonstrated their excellence and subject matter expertise, some in areas unique to all of naval aviation, in support of Ford-class development and enhancement. Our Sailors represent the best of the best, and we could not be more proud of what they have accomplished individually, and more importantly as a team."

Overall, the ship's crew identified and corrected numerous system challenges that will be implemented in follow-on Ford-class CVNs. 

# Iwo Jima, 26th MEU complete MDVR

MDVRs are scheduled availabilities to complete repairs and maintenance, allowing a ship to continue to be fully mission capable throughout the remainder of its deployment.

"The MDVR gave us the opportunity to take seven days to focus on getting maintenance done and make sure that we remain ready to respond as required," said Capt. Joseph R. O'Brien, Iwo Jima's commanding officer. "It also gives us the opportunity to prepare the ship to come back home by doing an agricultural wash-down of all the vehicles and all the equipment that was brought on

Contractors came aboard the ship from locations such as Forward Deployed Regional Maintenance Center Bahrain and Southeast of their team leader course, which trains the Regional Maintenance Center Mayport, Floridaa., to assist the crew with repairs.

Marines and Sailors spent the week washing down vehicles, equipment and containers in wash racks aboard the Royal Jordanian Naval Base for agricultural inspections. They

washed approximately 300 major end-items and cleaned, inventoried and inspected thousands of additional items.

# Middle school students brief Congressman on STEM technologies to solve simulated Navy challenges

It's not often that middle school students have an opportunity to brief the Chairman of the House Armed Services Subcommittee on Seapower and Projection Forces about technologies they developed to solve Navy challenges.

Students from schools located in several Virginia counties can tell their teachers and classmates they did just that, when asked the inevitable question, "what did you do over the summer break?"

Their technological efforts took place during the 2018 STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) Summer Academy sponsored by Naval Surface Warfare Center Dahlgren Division (NSWCDD).

Along the way, the students briefed their mentors, teachers, and visitors – including Rep. Rob Wittman (R-Va.) – on how they overcame a variety of Navy focused problems by designing, building, and programming LEGO Mindstorm

The problems could not be solved, however, with STEM skills alone. The successful completion of 10 simulated missions required continuous communication, coordination, teamwork, and lots of creativity.

As Wittman, school teachers, and NSWCDD scientist and engineer mentors observed, the students used STEM to rescue swimmers, rotate troops, recover ships, create a warning signal structure, recover an infrared beacon at sea, map an underwater surface, move an amphibious vehicle to a dry dock, deliver crates of humanitarian aid; build a minesweeper to locate and mark mines so that ships can avoid them, and transport an electromagnetic railgun to the deck of a Navy

The STEM camp didn't end there. The Robotics and Automation Engineering activity with its 10 missions was just one of 10 activities that students were immersed in from

As Wittman toured the summer academy – also known as STEM summer camp - he saw 'campers' fire water rockets they constructed and calibrated in conjunction with an aerospace engineering activity. The goal for all teams was to discover the optimal amount of fuel (water in this case) required to launch the ball the highest.

As students engaged in a civil engineering activity that involved building a balsa wood tower to meet the goal of the highest strength to weight ratio, Wittman encouraged the students to continue pursuing STEM education and career paths. The congressman told students that even if they decide on other careers, they will still benefit from their STEM education since there are STEM related issues in other fields. He added that by the time the students reach the workforce, 80-85 percent of jobs will involve STEM.

"The STEM camp has a variety of activities that engage students in different ways," said Page Wessel, a former school teacher, currently an NSWCDD mathematician supporting the Submarine Launched Ballistic Missile Program. "Some students prefer robotics, others prefer more hands on like the boat activity. We have enough activities to get the kids interested in STEM careers and they have lots of questions for us as teachers and mentors. They're really enjoying the activities designed to enforce their STEM instruction."


In all, 103 students – from middle schools located in Virginia's Stafford, Spotsylvania, and King George Counties in addition to Fredericksburg and Dahlgren - partnered with one of 17 middle school teachers and one of 17 NSWCDD scientist and engineer mentors. The teachers and mentors encouraged students to develop their teamwork and problemsolving skills in math and science throughout the camp.

"This summer program is a great extension and opportunity for those kids who may have some STEM interest but can't stay after school to take advantage of STEM programs because they are not able to get rides or can't take an elective class," said Lisa Jones, a Freedom Middle School gifted resource teacher who teaches STEM elective classes. "It's also the perfect opportunity for those kids in schools that don't have STEM elective classes."

In addition to their STEM activities, students were briefed each morning by NSWCDD leaders, scientists and engineers. NSWCDD Commanding Officer Capt. Godfrey 'Gus' Weekes discussed his STEM background and experience in the Navy. Kevin Cogley spoke to the students about the chemical, biological, and radiological (CBR) Defense work at Dahlgren. He also demonstrated equipment used for CBR Defense, including a gas mark and gas detector. Dr. Patrick Mead discussed how virtual reality and augmented reality helps the warfighter and reduces costs of programs. What's more, several students experienced augmented reality while wearing a headset and virtually touring a room inside of a

NSWCDD High Energy Laser Controls and Integration Branch Head Matt Ketner - speaking about the Navy's future challenges from threat and operational perspectives called upon the students to help the Navy in the future. His overview included the technical skills required for work in directed energy technology as well as the various missions and applications for directed energy systems.

Sarah Wessel – a college senior interning at Dahlgren through the STEM Student Employment Program (SSEP) - recounted how she was inspired to pursue STEM while

engaged in the summer academy.

"I worked with a small team of students to design, build, program, and race a PVC Pipe boat," said Wessel. "We programmed the boat to complete the course at the Dahlgren boat ramp, then competed against the other teams' boats at the end of the week. What is most memorable about the experience was how the NSWC Dahlgren engineers challenged us, believed in our potential, and encouraged us to overcome challenges."

In 2017, Wessel - via the Naval Research Enterprise Internship Program (NREIP) at Dahlgren - converted the Advanced Beam Control Locating and Engaging — Enhanced Tracking System (ABLE-ETS) gimbal's pointing controller Simulink code into C++ code. ABLE-ETS is a test bed for maturing directed energy and high-energy laser technologies, including tracking, sensors, and lasers.

NREIP provides an opportunity for college students to participate in research at a Navy laboratory during the summer. The goals of NREIP are to encourage participating college students to pursue science and engineering careers, to further education through mentoring and their participation in research, and to make them aware of Navy research and technology efforts, which can lead to employment within the Department of the Navy.

This year, Wessel picked up an internship with the STEM Student Employment Program, applying her experience from the previous summer to convert the control system of ODIN — a laser dazzler.

SSEP provides direct hire authority for undergraduate and graduate degree seeking students enrolled in STEM majors. The program was established to provide interns with exposure to public service, enhance educational experience, and possibly provide financial aid to support educational goals. Additionally, this program will provide a streamlined and accelerated hiring process to compete successfully with private industry for high-quality scientific, technical, engineering, or mathematics students for filling scientific and engineering positions.

In conjunction with their academy activities – and the inspirational morning briefings – the STEM campers saw the real-world applications during their NSWCDD tour, that featured technologies and facilities, including the electromagnetic railgun, laser lethality laboratory, the Potomac River Test Range, vehicle integration technologies, and the F-14 ground plane used for testing and evaluating hazards of electromagnetic radiation to ordnance.

"It is amazing how the campers engineered their way through these various tasks," said STEM Summer Academy director Robert Taft. "They responded to Capt. Weekes charge to grab this opportunity. They worked hard, failed quickly and productively but in the end, the students saw many successes. The NSWCDD tours and science demonstrations tied it all together in a vision of what is possible when STEM teams work together."



# TOTALLY TUBULAR: MEMORIES OF SUMMER

You can call me Parent of the Year. I just gave my 17-year-old daughter permission to go "cliff diving" with her friends at a rocky outcrop overlooking the bay.

Cmdr. Jay Bijeau, West Virginia gold crew's commanding officer, was very proud of the crew's achievements and success.



"My staff and I hope you that you have been stretched professionally by this course, and I know each and every one of you have grown in your level of competency, and you are ready for the challenges ahead," said Robertson.

The graduates will report to their assigned ships within the coming weeks to begin their 18 or 36-month tours.

Watchstanders at the Command Duty Officer, Satellite Analyst, Typhoon Duty Officer, Geophysical Technician and Forecast Duty Officer positions explained their responsibilities and contribution to tropical cyclone forecasting and tsunami response, another mission that JTWC performs for Department of Defense assets worldwide. Shieh and Price discussed the physics and thermodynamics that drive tropical cyclones, the tropical cyclone forecasting process, and which variables and data sources are considered when estimating current and future track and intensity for tropical cyclones.

At the end of his visit, command leadership presented Connor with command coins, a command T-shirt, a book entitled "The Ultimate Guide to America's Weather" and an honorary Information Warfare Officer pin to welcome Connor into the Naval Oceanography community as an honorary meteorologist.

Connor's father, a retired Navy veteran, expressed his and his son's gratitude for the visit, saying he and Connor, "can't thank you and the command team enough [for an] amazing day."

While on Oahu, the Woods family also toured the National Weather Service's Honolulu Weather Forecast Office and Central Pacific Hurricane Center, located on the campus of the University of Hawaii at Manoa, to experience forecasting for a local civilian population. They visited the Pearl Harbor memorial and were given a private tour of the USS Missouri (BB-63). Additionally, they went zip-lining at Kualoa Ranch, the location of many film scenes, including scenes from Jurassic Park and Jumanji.

JTWC provides tropical cyclone reconnaissance, forecast, safety warning and decision support services for operational advantage to U.S. government agencies operating in the Pacific and Indian Oceans.

JTWC also provides tsunami advisory information and recommendations to shore installations and units, as well as impact forecasts for U.S. Pacific Fleet's airborne Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance and decision support services to U.S. Pacific Command and its subordinate commands, as directed.







#### MONTEREY, CALIF.

Naval Postgraduate School (NPS) Dean Emeritus Wayne Hughes, renowned as a foremost authority on naval tactics, has just published a new edition of his seminal book, "Fleet Tactics and Naval Operations."

Co-authored with retired Rear Adm. Robert Girrier, and with a forward by Adm. John Richardson, Chief of Naval Operations, the new third edition traces the historical evolution of tactics, analysis and operations from the age of sail to the present, including an expanded understanding of how emerging technologies are impacting battles at sea.

"This edition emphasizes information warfare, including unmanned vehicles, cyber warfare, modern means of deception, and artificial intelligence," Hughes explained. "There is a whole new chapter on information warfare and its influence on tactics.

"The main reason for reading the new edition is its descriptions of how to fight and win battles past, present and future," he added.

"Fleet Tactics" has long been considered a go-to resource for Navy officers on battle planning and tactical thinking since it was first published in 1986. Its relevance has not waned over the last four decades, and continues to be a 'wheel book' for freshly-minted junior officers and seasoned leadership alike.

"I am sure that I am not alone when I say that my copy of 'Fleet Tactics' is one of the most consulted, most dog-eared, most underlined, most marked-up books in my library," Richardson wrote in his forward. "The book filled an important void, providing an upto-date treatise on the importance and execution of tactics in modern naval warfare."

The landmark study was the first since World War II to thoroughly examine technological advances for the American Navy to successfully engage a peer competitor — the Soviet Union. The second edition, published in 2000 at the apex of the post-Cold War era, explored tactical adaptation to missile threats and littoral operations.

"Wayne Hughes' 'Fleet Tactics' is one of the most

widely-read books on naval warfare," said retired Navy Capt. Jeff Kline, NPS Professor of Practice in the operations research department. "This new edition maintains the foundational lessons of the first two editions, while addressing the emerging impact of cyber and robotics on naval tactics."

Throughout the post-Cold War era, the United States enjoyed naval ascendency and technological superiority. However, with the arrival of the information age, near-peer adversaries have emerged in the virtual domains of space, cyberspace and the electromagnetic spectrum, according to Richardson.

"The U.S. Navy now faces significant blue-water competition," he wrote. "It is no longer possible to ignore fleet-to-fleet engagements as naval forces seek to influence events ashore; navies will have to fight their way in from far out at sea."

"The sea-control game is back on, and we need to get moving — and new tactics will lead the way," he added.

The third edition of "Fleet Tactics" also considers how technological advances affect operations in traditional domains: undersea, on the surface, in the air and over land in the littorals.

The on-demand availability of precise information and networks to nearly anyone — not only adversarial militaries — has shifted focus from information superiority to decision superiority in these environments, pushing commanders to think in new ways, Richardson said.

"The introduction of information warfare into fleet tactics is an important development that demands critical analysis and thought," he wrote. "The imperative that we update our tactics to account for this new reality is here."

"In an era where 'firing effectively first' may now mandate that the first salvos will be non-kinetic, this update is a timely 'kick' to remind us to rig for sea and get under way," he wrote.

# **NPS** professors honored with Navy's **Distinguished Service Award**

#### MONTEREY, CALIF.

Two Naval Postgraduate School (NPS) professors have received the highest honorary award bestowed on Navy civilians by the Secretary of the Navy.


Operations research (OR) professors Gerald Brown and Nita Shattuck were presented with the Navy Distinguished Civilian Service Award (DCSA) at the 86th Military Operations Research Society Symposium in King Auditorium, June 19, in recognition of their research which has had a significant impact on the naval service and the Department of Defense.

NPS president retired Vice Adm. Ronald A. Route presented the awards, noting the honor of recognizing these two faculty in an assembly of their peers.

Shattuck, who holds faculty appointments in both the operations research and system engineering departments, has extensively researched the human body's natural circadian rhythms, and the effects of fatigue and sleep deprivation on performance.

Years of research into crew endurance has led to a revolution of sorts in how the Navy schedules when Sailors should stand watch. In fact, the Navy's entire surface force has been directed to implement circadian-based watch schedules, based on Shattuck's research to improve performance and crew endurance.

"I am so honored and humbled by this," Shattuck said. "It's a once in a lifetime kind of achievement, I never expected to receive something like this."

Shattuck's DCSA citation specifically commends her "exceptional leadership, unmatched dedication, and business acumen." Often spending months at sea in austere conditions, through rough seas and sleepless nights, she earned the respect of junior sailors and senior leadership alike.

Yet Shattuck refuses to take sole credit for the prestigious

"I have a wonderful team," she explained. "They're really the reason I received this because they work so hard alongside me."

For Brown, an icon in the field, this is the second DCSA for the emeritus distinguished professor. With an operations research career at NPS dating back to 1973, he is known as a "true giant" in the field of military operations research, as

His vast and wide-ranging corpus of academic research has had a direct and significant impact across the Navy and the U.S. military at large.

Since 2013, both Fifth and Seventh Fleets have utilized software Brown developed to optimally schedule daily logistical replenishment operations. His capital-planning modeling has influenced billions of dollars in procurement across all services.

"It's gratifying to be recognized for this most-recent work," Brown said. "The DCSA is customarily awarded to select retiring senior Navy executives, so to receive this award as a less senior civilian employee — a mere academic with no particular managerial responsibility — at a command far from the Pentagon is recognition of the importance and influence of the work we do at NPS.

Brown's research also greatly improved the resiliency of the energy supply chain across the Pacific, and his basic and applied research into attacker-defender modeling has changed how the U.S. plans its defense against terrorism.

"I have visited many other universities and laboratories world-wide, and have found nothing to compare with the professionals I work with at NPS and our mission," he added

# **USS Buffalo** (SSN 715) holds inactivation ceremony celebrating 35 years of service

#### KEYPORT, WASH.

The crew of the Los Angeles-class fast attack submarine USS Buffalo (SSN 715) held an inactivation ceremony, July 16, at the Keyport Undersea Museum, celebrating the boat's 35 years of service.

The occasion marked the crew's final public event before the submarine is officially decommissioned in the controlled industrial area (CIA) at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard (PSNS) in Bremerton, Washington.

"Today we will be talking proud as we celebrate USS Buffalo," said Buffalo's executive officer Lt. Cmdr. Joshua Ragadio. "She is the third of her name, 28th of its class and the 24th to be commissioned; she is silent thunder, the tip of the spear, the warrior of the deep. We are here to recognize the plethora of accomplishments earned by this mighty fine warship, the places she has gone and the things she has seen. Most importantly we are here to celebrate all the officers, chiefs and Sailors who proudly served."

Supporters, Navy League members, representatives from the city of Buffalo and former crew members attended the ceremony to reunite with old shipmates and bid the submarine farewell. Also in attendance from the city of Buffalo was Jim Dentinger, son of the late Fred Dentinger, the inaugural USS Buffalo Committee Chairman and lifetime supporter of Buffalo.

"Our nation owes the Sailors that served on USS Buffalo a tremendous 'thank you' for all your sacrifices to keep this country safe throughout its many successful deployments," said Dentinger. "On behalf of every Buffalonian, and my father Fred Dentinger, thank you for 35 years of incredible service and memories."

When a commissioned U.S. Navy ship is decommissioned, it is taken out of active service and the crew is reassigned to another

ship or command. Inactivation is the process in which the submarine will be de-fueled, with the hull retained in safe storage until de-

"We anticipate that sometime in early February, on a cool, damp day here in the Pacific Northwest, behind the security of Puget Sound Naval Shipyard's Controlled Industrial Area and with little fanfare, myself, along with the executive officer, chief of the boat, a small fraction of the crew and a handful of shipyard personnel will witness the commissioning pennant hauled down and the ensign lowered for the final time aboard Buffalo," said Cmdr. Paul Lee, Buffalo's final commanding officer. "Today's ceremony is our opportunity to bring together current and former crewmembers and families, members of our inactivation project team, and a number of our brothers and sisters in our profession of arms to remember and to truly appreciate the sacrifices of the crew and their families and say goodbye to the 6,000 tons that we called

The ceremony concluded with the lowering of the national ensign along with a symbolic securing of the watch.

"Ultimately, warship Buffalo and the men who served on Buffalo are defined by their

legacy," said guest speaker Capt. Richard Sief, commodore of Submarine Squadron 1 and Buffalo's 14th commanding officer. "A legacy of unmatched combat and mission readiness, superb leaders who went on to do great things within the submarine force and beyond, and a bond of Buffalo-tough shipmates who made each other better."

Buffalo completed their last deployment December 23, 2016. During their final 7-month deployment to the Western Pacific region, Buffalo visited Singapore, participated in cooperative exercises with the Indonesian and Republic of Singapore navies and had 25 crew members receive their submarine warfare qualifications, or "dolphins". Buffalo departed Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii for a homeport change to Bremerton, Washington, May 1, 2017 for decommissioning. Since their arrival to the Pacific Northwest, the crew has participated in a number of innovation projects and has devoted thousands of hours to community service projects.

"So while the Buffalo will finish the final stages of her decommissioning, all you current Buffalo Sailors will now join the proud tribe of former Buffalo Sailors, and you will unify with them," said guest speaker retired

Rear Adm. Robert Hennegan, Buffalo's 7th commanding officer. "This is the common linkage of service to our great country and to one of our greatest warships, the USS Buffalo. While over the decades, the Buffalo operated out of multiple homeports, multiple shipyards, multiple missions, they operated every single day for 35 years; whether they were on a spectacular mission, that we can't talk about here, or stuck deep in the shipyard getting extensive maintenance done, it was always the Buffalo crew on board, serving our country away from their families, for one night, for one month, or one deployment. Well done! So when you step back and think about this, this continued service from a select group of submariners and the associated sacrifices these men and their families made, it is truly inspired. Buffalo crew, thank you and welcome to a proud tribe of Buffalo submariners."

The keel was laid by the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics in Groton, Connecticut, January 25, 1980. The boat was launched May 8, 1982, and commissioned November 5, 1983.

A rave review in the New York Times led eventually to a record deal, which in turn spawned worldwide touring.


The Norfolk Admirals, ECHL affiliate of the Arizona Coyotes, have signed netminder Ty Reichenbach the team announced on Tuesday morning.

# A Conversation with "Something To Wrestle With Bruce Prichard"

The conclusion of our 3-part series on the behind-the-scenes stories of professional wrestling podcast

*Yiorgo:* It's been documented that you had to convince Bruce to do the podcast so on behalf of the millions of fans, thank you.

Conrad Thompson: We tried to create a community of shorts. We did not want to talk at the audience; we want to laugh with them. It's a fine line and I believe we have been able to make it happen for all the shows so far. Among other things, they told us to keep the podcast short. We instead let the conversation take us where it needs to go. Some of our episodes have been 3-4 hours long.

Y: Bruce, what are your memories about Vince McMahon and the government steroid trial?

Bruce Prichard: Vince was confident he could beat it. He was innocent. It was all an incredible travesty. Pat Paterson and I would usually meet at Vince's house to go over things or if Vince was busy prepping for the trial Pat would come over my house or I would go over his. I lived about 20 minutes away from Vince. It was a treat not to have to go in to that office. We did have a hiring freeze at the time until it was resolved. I remember Bam Bam Biglow was the last one we hired for a long, long time.

Y: You know, it's a testament to Vince McMahon who could have become very bitter about what the government tried to do to him yet look how patriotic he still is with everything he does for the troops and so much more. It speaks volumes as to who he is as a human being.

BP: Excellent, I agree.

Y: On the podcast you love to do imitations. Who are your top 3 favorite imitations?

**BP:** Well I would like to say that I don't do imitations I do caricatures. One is Vince McMahon I just fall right into him. Second Dusty, I fall into him as well, and Jim Cor-

nette I just fall into him as well. They are naturals. You tell stories about people and you try to become that person in the story and if you can do it in their voice and passion, you got it licked.

Y: Bruce, you have seen it all and done it all. What have been some of your wow moments?

BP: There have been quite a few. From closing down Wall Street when we went public on the New York Stock Exchange and being in the board room there in the Stock Exchange using that as our dressing room. To be able say on a Thursday I want to close Wall Street down to making it happen by the following Wednesday and actually doing it and experiencing it. That was pretty cool.

The different times we did things in Time Square. Going to Berlin and being in that same place where Adolf Hitler made that famous speech. The guide said no one is allowed to go there. You actually felt the evil you felt the evil! That's the best way to describe it. Things like that, that we've been able to experience in our lifetime just because of what we did for a living.

There are so many. Flying in a Lear jet by myself to get back home. Those are things as a kid you dream off. People think wouldn't it be great to do, and I did it. It almost became second nature. What, you want me to fly coach or commercial air? Really? Come on I can't do that. You become accustom to it.

Making history on that Football field when Vince McMahon did the XFL that was history. Being in so many WrestleMania's, that was history. That was some amazing stuff.

There are so many but what it boils down to for example is recently with our "Something To Wrestle With Bruce Prichard" Show on Tour to step out on the stage in Chicago at the sold out House of Blues and all those people were there to see Conrad and I, that to this day gives me goose bumps. Go-

ing out there to our live shows and knowing that people are still listening to our stuff, you can't top it.

Y: Why should people listen to your podcast, "Something To Wrestle With Bruce Prichard" at http://www.mlwradio.com/ something-to-wrestle-with-bruce-prichard. html watch your show on the WWE Network and come see you live?

BP: We really give a unique perspective from someone who was actually there from the top. For so long, the people have only gotten a certain narrative with 90-95 % of it being rumor, innuendo and jealousy of stories without anyone giving the other side. What I do is I give the other side. I talk about things that actually happen not what someone said happened. There are a couple of people who can dispute me, Vince Mc-Mahon and Pat Paterson. I use to say they are not talking but Pat Paterson has come to several of our live shows and shared some of the same stories. It's a behind the scenes peak, we break down that fourth wall down even further and we let the people in. We dig deep into our subjects. Sometimes people think why are they going here, but if you listen you realize that maybe some of the less most popular talent has some of the most interesting stories.

On the video side of things it's an opportunity to see things that you have not seen before and hear stories that for sure you have not seen before. I was involved in it from a

business, creative and I was in the trenches on every aspect of it because that's how closely I worked with Vince. If for example creative services had to have a meeting with Vince we had to sit in it because they would have to come to us. If promotions, marketing or anybody in the company had to have a meeting with Vince we were involved with it and a part of those decisions. I was a part of so much of that. A lot of time I would just sit back and listen and ask him afterwards why he did what he did after the fact? I was in a very unique position and better then any college education. Including Pat Paterson, I was under the learning trees everyday and now I get to share it with all our fans.

Y: Yes indeed. The millions of fans that download your podcast of witch I am one, we are all very happy that you finally gave in and said yes to Conrad's request to turn your talks into a podcast. Conrad is Everyfan. That perfect inquisitive fan that spends hours doing the research and holds your feet to the fire until you answer completely. Thank you both for taking us along for the ride

Conrad and Bruce: It is our pleasure.


