Retired Rear Adm. Alene B. Duerk, the Navy's first female admiral, passed away July 21, 2018. She was 98 years

"It took 197 years and a forward-

looking Chief of Naval Operations, Elmo Zumwalt, to break with tradition before Alene Duerk became the first woman admiral in the U.S. Navy," said Naval History and Heritage Command director Sam Cox. "But the credit goes to Duerk. From the crucible of caring for wounded Sailors, Marines and prisoners of war during World War II in the Pacific, she blazed a trail of stellar performance in tough jobs, serving as an inspiration for an ever increasing number of women officers

who have followed her path."

Born in Defiance, Ohio, on March 29, 1920, she received nursing training at the Toledo [Ohio] Hospital School of Nursing, from which she earned her diploma in 1941. From there, Duerk entered the U.S. Naval Reserve and was appointed an ensign in the Nurse Corps.

"Alene Duerk was a strong and dedicated trail blazer who embodied the very principles that continue to guide Navy Medicine today," commented Vice Adm. Forrest Faison, Navy surgeon general, upon learning of her passing. "She will forever be remembered as a servant

leader who provided the best care to those who defended our nation, honoring the uniform we wear and the privilege of leadership."

Her first tours of duty included ward nurse at Naval Hospital Portsmouth in Virginia, Naval Hospital Bethesda in Maryland, and sea service aboard the Navy hospital ship, USS Benevolence (AH 13), in 1945. While anchored off

> the coast of Eniwetok, Duerk and the crew of the Benevolence would attend to the sick and wounded being brought back from the Third Fleet's operations against Japan.

Upon cessation of hostilities on Sept. 2, 1945, Duerk and the Benevolence crew took on the task of repatriating liberated Allied prisoners of war, an endeavor that solidified her commitment to nursing and patient

Years later, when asked about her service for the Library of Congress' Veteran's History

Project, Duerk said, "The time I was aboard the hospital ship and we took the prisoners of war, that was something I will never forget . . . that was the most exciting experience of my whole career."

Thereafter, Duerk was assigned to Naval Hospital Great Lakes until being released from active service in 1946.

In 1951, Duerk returned to active duty serving as a nursing instructor at the Naval Hospital Corps School in Portsmouth, Va. and later as inter-service education coordinator at the Naval Hospital

CNSF ANNOUNCES CHANGES TO SURFACE WARFARE OFFICER SWO QUALIFICATION INSTRUCTION

From Commander, Naval Surface Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet Public Affairs

SAN DIEGO

Commander, Naval Surface Forces/Commander of Naval Surface Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet announced a revision to the requirements for qualification and designation as a surface warfare officer (SWO), July 23.

Effective immediately, designators 116X and lateral transfers into the SWO community are the only designators eligible to pursue SWO qualification. This change aligns with new career path revisions, which focuses on increased experience on ships, including increased bridge watchstanding opportunities for SWOs.

"The surface warfare officer qualification is the path to 1110 and is the crucible of a junior professional surface warfare officer to develop and master the core competencies necessary to excel as a future commanding officer of a warship," said Vice Adm. Richard Brown, commander, Naval Surface Forces/commander of Naval Surface Force U.S. Pacific Fleet. "My team and I remain committed to ensuring the future leaders of our community are properly trained and qualified."

Officers pursuing SWO qualification must be a commissioned officer permanently assigned to either a commissioned or pre-commissioning U.S. Navy surface ship.

Non-116X officers, who are currently pursuing a SWO qualification, are authorized to continue until Oct. 1, 2018.

Additionally, only commanding officers of commissioned surface ships may qualify officers who are permanently assigned to their ship

as SWOs. Once SWO qualification is achieved, transfer from one ship to another will not require requalification as a SWO or revalidation of the entire SWO PQS package.

However, requalification in all applicable watchstations is required.

Further changes to the instruction include removing the time requirement for attaining SWO qualification and now documenting it in the instruction.

The minimum time requirement for SWOs to attain their qualification is not specified in the instruction. However, open communication with NPC is required if a qualification is expected to take longer than the first division officer tour. Ships must actively manage and maintain Personnel Qualification Standards Plan of Action and Milestones (PQS POAMs) for each officer to ensure the officer is on track for SWO qualification. In addition to the PQS POAM, SWOs must keep a log book of the amount of hours spent on the bridge. This information will be used when detailing junior officers to their second division officer and shore tours.

The update to the SWO qualification instruction follows a revision to the SWO Career Path and Training Continuum. The intent of the revised career path is to develop the most experienced and capable commanding officers who are specialists in five areas: seamanship, navigation, and shiphandling; combat systems; engineering; command and program management and administration; and leadership.

CNP launches new MPT&E transformation future state video: The future of Navy personnel management

The Chief of Naval Personnel released a video that shows Sailors and their families the future of Navy administrative services, July 26.

The "Manpower, Personnel, Training and Education (MPT&E) Transformation Future State" video looks ahead a few years to depict Sailor-focused pay, personnel management and training systems Sailors can expect, once the Transformation is complete.

The short video follows Sailors throughout their Navy career, from their recruitment into the Navy, as they train at boot camp, negotiate orders online, access the personnel and pay system, upload personal documents for a significant life event (marriage), and retire or separate using MyNavy Portal (MNP) and MyNavy Career Center (MNCC).

"We are very excited to share this video and the larger Transformation efforts that have been taking place across the MPT&E enterprise," said Vice Adm. Robert Burke, Chief of Naval Personnel. "We are working hard to provide an improved customer experience to Sailors and their families and this video illus-

trates the changes that are coming as we approach 2025."

The video also gives Sailors a preview of MNCC capabilities that will come later this year. The launch of MNCC, known as MNCC Beta, will provide initial online self-service to Sailors via MNP, a 24/7 contact center, and initial standardization of back-end processes to provide Sailors with improved Human Resources (HR) support.

Sailors are encouraged to share the video with others within their command and family members.

The MPT&E Transformation is a modernization effort that will overhaul the way HR services are provided to all Sailors, their families, and future recruits. Over the next several years, the



Navy Environmental and Preventive Medicine Unit Two's lactation room — A place for breast pumping in combat boots at Naval **Station Norfolk**

NORFOLK

Pumping breastmilk in a bathroom stall is a reality for many women who choose to continue to provide this food for their babies after they return to work. Fortunately for the staff and students at the Navy Environmental and Preventative Medicine Unit Two, as well as neighboring commands, there is a bright, clean, and comfortable alternative in the "Mother's Room."

Mother's "NEPMU2's Room is wonderful, and I'm so happy I found out about it," said Logistics Specialist 2nd Class Andrea Stoppel. "I worked at the mail center nearby, so I used to stop in to use the room on my mail runs. The presence or absence of this type of accommodation can have a big impact on milk supply and your ability to continue breastfeeding after returning to work."

NEPMU2, whose mission includes health promotion and wellness, felt a special obligation to create a breastfeeding space. Established in 2014 by Capt. Jennifer Espiritu during her tenure as

NEPMU2 officer in charge (OIC), the "Mother's Room" is a private office with locking door, an electrical outlet, comfortable chair, table, couch, and fridge for milk storage, as well as educational materials for breastfeeding and donated pumping and nursing supplies.

In March 2018 the Navy released OPNAV Instruction 6000.1D, "Navy Guidelines Concerning Pregnancy and Parenthood," an update to the 2007 policy that reaffirms its commitment to enable breastfeeding mothers in uniform to provide milk for their babies. Furthermore, it now mandates that commanding officers provide a "private clean room for expressing breastmilk," with access to running water for hand-washing and pump cleaning within the room.

This Navy policy aligns with guidance from the American Academy of Pediatrics and the World Health Organization, which recommend exclusive breastfeeding of infants for six months, followed by continued breastfeeding as complementary foods are introduced until the child reaches at least 1 year of age.

In 2016, maternity leave across the military was increased from six weeks to 12 weeks. This has resulted in a significant increase in breastfeeding duration and exclusivity through nine months for active duty mothers, as evidenced by a recent study presented at the Pediatric Academic Societies 2018 meeting. "Impact of Extended Maternity Leave on Breastfeeding in Active Duty Mothers," pro-



feeding for both mother and baby (and the military) are numerous. For example, breastmilk enzymes, immunoglobulins and white blood cells boost baby's immune system, which means fewer sick days for baby and fewer missed workdays for mom. And because a breastfeeding mother's body burns approximately 500-1000 calories per day to make milk, her increased metabolism can help facilitate postpartum weight loss in preparation for her next physical fitness assessment.

"We have a duty, as part of our public health mission at NEPMU2, to adhere not only to the OPNAV instruction, but to support breastfeeding mothers from the standpoint of evidencebased best practice," said Cmdr. Marion Gregg, OIC of NEPMU2. "We invite

servicewomen at neighboring commands, as well as those visiting on orders to Naval Station Norfolk, to use our Mother's Room, and to consider creating a similar space at their own command."

With increased awareness, and a bit of ingenuity and resourcefulness, the number of lactation suites on installations can grow, providing solutions for nursing military moms on the go, and making Naval Station Norfolk and other military facilities a friendlier place

for mothers.



NMCP's Chest Pain Center earns re-accreditation, adds Primary PCI **Accreditation**

Naval Medical Center Portsmouth (NMCP) announced July 26 that the medical center was re-accredited by the American College of Cardiology (ACC) Accreditation Services as a Chest Pain Center with Primary PCI Accreditation.

The accreditation shows NMCP is capable of providing the highest quality of care for heart attack patients and that heart attack patients receive treatment within a critical time period. Receiving treatment during this critical period can lessen dam-

"This accreditation was a result of a long period of work done by many people and spearheaded by our CPC director, Cmdr. Nelle Linz," said Capt. Christopher Culp, NMCP's commanding officer. "The accreditation team was beyond enthused with our program. The requirements were not only noted to be met, but they were very well met."

During the accreditation site visit, a member of the accreditation team noted that "your door-to-PCI (stent placement) was in 90 minutes and you're 100 percent compliant with that, which is outstanding. I can stay that I've not been to another facility that is 100 percent compliant for door-to-PCI. Your length of stay for observation is 4.63 hours with the use of Coronary Computed Tomography Angiography (CT scanning) for your lower-risk population patient groups, which is by far the best observation length of stay that I've seen nationwide. (And your) chest pain medical director is absolutely remarkable (in the work she has done)."

NMCP had originally been accredited as a CPC in 2013 as the first and the only military treatment facility to receive the accreditation. A requirement of the accreditation is that facilities must have a robust and detailed transfer protocol in place so that the time from first medical contact by emergency medical services (EMS) to intervention in the Cardiac Catheterization Lab is less than 120 minutes.

The accreditation means that, in addition to TRICARE beneficiaries, anyone who is experiencing symptoms of a heart attack can be brought to the medical center by EMS if NMCP is the closest CPC-accredited medical facility. With the reaccreditation, local residents can continue to receive the best emergency cardiac care at NMCP.

"We first achieved accreditation back in 2013," said Linz, who is an interventional cardiologist. "(With the PCI designation), we've upgraded our accreditation now to have more detail about our capabilities with Cardiac Catheterization Lab services for heart attack care, so it's a much more comprehensive accreditation. This accreditation really gives us a great

reputation within the community as to what we can provide in terms of services."

The upgraded accreditation adds Primary PCI, which stands for percutaneous coronary intervention and was formerly known as angioplasty with stent. The non-surgical procedure uses a catheter to place a small structure called a stent to open up blood vessels in the heart that have been narrowed by plaque

The PCI designation requires that a call team made up of the Cardiac Catheterization Lab staff and an interventional cardiologist must arrive at the facility within 30 minutes of activation of heart attack protocols.

In order to add the designation, Linz said there were national benchmarks that NMCP was required to meet.

"There were 262 different metrics and requirements that we had to meet to achieve this accreditation," Linz said. "We were evaluated over a three-year time period, and the accreditation will last for three years. It's an absolute honor to be the director of the Chest Pain Center at NMCP. I have a dedicated team. Without having that dedication, we would never get to where we needed to be, to bridge communication between quality and safety all the way up through cardiology. So we are very excited

Both men and women were surveyed to gather their opinions and concerns on Navy life and family issues. Survey results show reasons for staying or leaving the Navy were similar for both women and men.

The 2018 survey was sent to a randomly selected group of 29,103 women and 49,800 men on active duty, representing 48 percent and 19 percent of the active duty force, respectively. The survey produced 12,682 useable responses, with a 16 percent response rate and a margin of error of plus or minus 1 percentage point.

Some of the key takeaways from participants of the 2018 survey include:

- Although 25 percent of women were attached to a deployable unit when they found out they were pregnant, only 15 percent of these women were actually deployed at the time.
- Fifty-one percent of women who were transferred to a new command due to pregnancy felt valued by their new command, but only 34 percent were transferred to a career-enhancing posi-

 - While most Sailors think Navy provides adequate information on how to access birth control, only 44 percent think there is enough information on birth control side effects and 36 percent think there is enough information on how to access emergency contraception.
- Of women who use birth control, 89 more likely to be in a dual-military relapercent received enough to last the entire length of their most recent deployment, a slight increase from the 2016 survey.
 - Although most women (54 percent) are satisfied with the quality of military OB/GYN care, only 48 percent report having easy access to OB/GYN care regardless of duty station, and only 22 percent have easy access while on shore
 - While 61 percent of Sailors report hearing their command's leaders talk about work/life balance, only 47 percent see their command's leaders demonstrate work/life balance.

CNO's visit coincided with the 200-year





NAVOCEANO forges ahead, surpassing unmanned systems milestone

The Naval Oceanographic Office (NAVO-CEANO) made history earlier this year, simultaneously commanding and controlling 50 ocean gliders, more than any other governmental or academic entity, and continues to raise the bar this summer.

The U.S. Navy's leader in the operation of unmanned underwater vehicles (UUVs), NAVOCEANO's oceanographic and engineering departments are on track to exceed their own milestone, achieved in April 2018. Dozens of additional gliders have been launched from a range of platforms, including the T-AGS class ships under the command's technical control, in the last few

"We are well on our way to having 100 si-

multaneously deployed gliders. It has taken hard work and dedication from all involved as we find new ways to implement automation and gain efficiency." says Bryan Mensi, NAVOCEANO glider operations branch


The Littoral Battlespace Sensing (LBS) gliders employed by NAVOCEANO are UUVs used to collect environmental data such as temperature, salinity (salt content), water clarity and depth. Once launched from a T-AGS ship or vessel of opportunity, the UUVs are directed to predetermined locations by NAVOCEANO glider pilots based at Stennis Space Center in southern Mississippi. The military and civilian pilots manning the command's Glider Operations Center use satellite communications to direct the vehicles while monitoring data collection and glider performance 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The temperature and salinity profiles the gliders collect within the water column are assimilated into ocean models that provide underwater forecasts, similar to the way atmospheric models are used to provide weather forecasts. These forecasts are imperative to a wide range of naval operations and have numerous applications, from diver safety to detection of submarines to hurricane prediction.

NAVOCEANO has been operating gliders for decades, and is now home of the world's largest fleet of these vehicles, which have been launched from an array of vessels operated by the U.S. Navy, U.S. Coast Guard, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, as well as universities. With average missions spanning several months, LBS gliders collect thousands of environmental data profiles across the globe each year at a fraction of the cost of ship-collected

NAVOCEANO, comprised of approximately 700 military, civilian, and contractor personnel, uses a variety of platforms including ships, aircraft, satellite sensors, buoys, and unmanned underwater vehicles to collect oceanographic and hydrographic data from the world's oceans.

Force Master Chief James Osborne, force master chief, U.S. Pacific Fleet, visited with the Fargo Native American Commission (NAC) while visiting Fargo, N.D., during Fargo-Moorhead Metro Navy Week.

Osborne, who is visiting Fargo for the Fargo-Moorhead Metro Navy Week, went on to say, "Navy week itself is a way to educate the community, but also a way to educate us as well on what is happening. That is what took place this morning, and it was all very rewarding to hear about their dedication to serving the community and veterans."

The meeting between Osborne and the NAC concluded with the NAC gifting Osborne with a traditional Native American star quilt, which was draped around Osborne's shoulders as a symbolic way to honor and

protect him on his journey through life.

Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Carl Vinson (CVN 70) rescued five mariners in distress July 27 near Hawaii's westernmost inhabited island.

The mariners issued a distress call after their 36-foot vessel ran aground in shallow water near the island of Niihau.

Two MH-60S Sea Hawk helicopters assigned to the "Black Knights" of Helicopter Sea Combat Squadron (HSC) 4 airlifted the mariners from their vessel to shore at approximately 8:30 a.m. local time.

Carl Vinson was operating seven miles from the vessel when bridge watchstanders heard the distress call and offered assistance. HSC-4 transported four of the mariners to a U.S. Coast Guard facility on the island of Kauai. The fifth mariner was flown to a local medical facility for evaluation.

"We were ready," said Capt. Matt Paradise, Carl Vinson's commanding officer. "When nearby mariners needed assistance, we stepped up immediately and helped. That is what we are trained to do, and I'm proud of our team."

A Coast Guard MH-65 Dolphin helicopter crew from Coast Guard Air Station Barbers Point and a 45-foot Response Boat-Medium crew from Coast Guard Station Kauai deployed to assess the scene. The Coast Guard is working to determine the best way to refloat the vessel.

"This case illustrates the partnerships we enjoy in Hawaii as the Navy was quick to respond and get this mariner to a higher level of medical care," said Ensign Seth Gross, command duty officer with Coast Guard Sector Honolulu. "The Coast Guard's role now is to assess the vessel and work with the owner as available to mitigate any impact to the environment from the fuel and batteries aboard."





THE KOREAN WAR ARMISTICE **EXPLAINED**

Sixty-five years ago, on July 27, 1953, North and South Korea signed an armistice - a formal agreement made by opposing sides in a war – which ended the Korean War.

Negotiations for the armistice spanned over two years, the longest negotiated armistice in his-

Over those two years, the U.S., North and South Korea met in Panmunjom on the border between the two countries. There were 158 meetings before any of the parties agreed to sign the document. During the meetings, all parties sought to make an agreement that would suspend open hostilities, arrange

the release and repatriation of prisoners of war and prevent all sides from entering areas under control of the other.

In the final meeting, the Korean armistice accomplished those goals and established the Military Armistice Commission, as well as other agencies to discuss any violations and ensure adherence to the truce terms. Additionally, the armistice made a 4,000-meter-wide zone where all military forces and equipment would not be allowed as part of the agreement to suspend hostilities.

The Korean armistice was signed by U.S. Army Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison Jr. of the United Nations Command Delegation and North Korean Gen. Nam II, who also represented China, putting an end to the roughly three years of fighting of the 1950-1953 Korean

The Korean armistice is unique because it is purely a military document. No nation signed the agree-

After the armistice was signed, a new border between North and South Korea was drawn, giving South Korea additional territory and establishing the Demilitarized

Zone between the two nations. The armistice ceased a war that costed the lives of millions of Koreans, Chinese and Americans.

elements: alignment, habits, training, education, opportunity, feedback and self-awareness.

Aguilar said the aim of Sailor 360 is to introduce these leadership elements to sailors below the rank of petty officer first class — something that was not part of the previous leadership model.

"We tend to focus leadership at a senior level," she said. "The junior enlisted people are the foundation of the Navy and our future chiefs."

Navy Secretary Richard V. Spencer addressed the Sailor 360 program's integrated leadership style in "Laying the Keel — Developing the Backbone of Our Navy."

"A professional, formal leadership development curriculum reinforced by innovative, meaningful command-developed training such as Sailor 360 [is] how command leaders will grow competence and improve character while instilling integrity, accountability, initiative and toughness in every sailor," he wrote.

Because Sailor 360 is command developed, leaders have the flexibility to tailor existing source material to best

fit their observed needs.

A majority of sailors deployed to Camp Lemonnier are members of the Navy Reserve. Before deploying, many reserve sailors are introduced to leadership training through CPO 365 at their Navy operational support centers.

Aguilar said if reserve centers emphasize the importance of this training, it will help lay the foundation for the continuation of training for those stationed here.

ANCCR Program achieves utility commodity cost savings for DON

WASHINGTON

The Advancing Navy Commodities Cost Reduction (ANCCR) Program realized its first cost savings at Naval Station Rota by using market projections and forward contract prices to recommend a new competi-

tive electricity procurement strategy. resulting in \$200,000 in savings.

The ANCCR team also developed an Internal Government Estimate (IGE) that was within 1 percent of the awarded contractor's bid price, highlighting the accuracy and sophistication of ANCCR's analytical capability and validating the procurement strategy.

Within Naval Facilities Engineering Command (NAVFAC) Europe
Africa Southwest Asia (EURAFSWA), the ANCCR program has been lauded as setting a new standard in contracting.

"Thanks to the ANCCR teamwork, we can speak of a successful strategy and effort. In addition to the tangible savings, we've also improved the contract language and the overall solicitation process," said Maurizio Caschera, FEC EURAFSWA Public Works Utilities Manager. "Our Acquisition support line was very impressed by the team's market analysis and the IGE."

The ANCCR program serves as a community of expertise for Department of the Navy (DON) utilities procurement that drives cost reduction and process improvement. The goal of the Program is to identify 5 percent savings opportunities on purchased utility commodity costs by December 2019, which establishes a one-

time target of \$40 million.

"The DON has a big utility bill. If we improve how we purchase utilities, even saving a small percentage results in serious savings," said Rear Adm. Bret J. Muilenburg, commander, NAVFAC. "Those savings enable resource flexibility in support of the DON mission."

NAVFAC established the ANCCR Program as part of the 2016 NAVFAC Strategic Design to reduce

the cost of purchased utility commodities and create a hub of expertise for business case analysis and utility procurements.

Within its first year, AN-CCR analyzed 17 separate opportunities to reduce costs at NAVFAC regions throughout the world, utilizing three strategies developed to meet the \$40 million target: reducing projected utility commodity costs, identifying market and utility revenue opportunities, and optimizing enterprise-wide business processes.

To simplify the complex DON utility commodity land-scape, ANCCR developed the Utility Tariff Record Management System

(UTRMS), a business intelligence tool designed to analyze and visualize DON utility data, enabling cost-effective purchasing decisions.

ANCCR continues to pursue DON utility commodity cost-saving and revenue-generation opportunities from its pipeline of pilot projects. The Program is positioned to meet the \$40 million target by December 2019 following strategies outlined in a comprehensive Execution Roadmap developed by the program in coordination with NAVFACs Atlantic, Pacific, and their respective echelon IV FECs.

FIGHTING FIRES | NAS Sigonella and Italian fire crews work together

Senior Fire Officer in a command vehicle to the scene to see where they could be useful. The on-scene commander, one of the fire officers from Catania, assigned the Navy crew to the northern end of the fire line. After extinguishing the fire in that area, they were reassigned to fight the fire at a construction material storage warehouse belonging to the company Edil Motta.

This is the first time in over six years that the base has been called to fight a fire off of the installation. The NAS Sigonella personnel who responded to the fire were a mixed crew composed of two local national firefighters, two Sailors, and Assistant Fire Chief Lucas Lechtenberg, the Senior Fire Officer in charge of the group.

"This is the first time that our crews and the Italian crews have worked together on a joint scene," said Lechtenberg. "When we got there everyone knew what to do and got right to work. Firefighting is the same here in Italy as it is in the United States."

After about two hours on the scene, thanks to all of the crews working together, the fire had been extinguished and Engine 11 was able to pack up and head back to the base.


On Monday 23 July, FES once again was asked to help fight another fire in Motta. This time the fire, although smaller, was much closer to the inhabited areas of the town. With Trickel's approval, three vehicles were sent and six more firefighters from Sigonella got the opportunity to work with their local counterparts.

"Though we won't always be able to respond, we are very happy to assist when we can," said John Ogletree, NAS Sigonella Acting Fire Chief. "Of course the safety of the base and the success of NAS Sigonella's mission comes first, but part of that is ensuring the surrounding areas also stay safe."

Due to its proximity to NAS Sigonella, Motta is a popular place for American personnel to live, and to frequent for shopping and dining.

NAS Sigonella, "The Hub of the Med", is a U.S. Navy installation and an Italian Air Force base in Sicily, Italy. NAS Sigonella is the Navy's second largest security command, second only to that located at Naval Support Activity Bahrain. Because of its location near the center of the Mediterranean Sea, NASSIG is well placed to support operations by the U.S. 6th Fleet, other U.S. military units, and U.S. allies and coalition partners.

Fabrication begins on Amphibious Assault Ship Richard M. McCool, Jr.

PASCAGOULA, MISS.

Huntington Ingalls Industries (HII) started fabrication of the 13th LPD-17 San Antonio class ship, LPD-29, July 30, at its shipyard in Pascagoula, Mississippi. The start of fabrication signifies that the first 100 tons of steel have been cut.

"We are excited to commence fabrication on the 13th and final ship of the LPD-17 Flight I class," said Capt. Brian Metcalf, LPD 17 class program manager for Program Executive Office Ships. "We continue to benefit from the maturity of this program, and look forward to achieving future production milestones as we work to deliver this versatile and capable warship to the fleet."

LPD-29 is named in honor of Navy veteran and Medal of Honor recipient, Capt. Richard M. McCool, Jr., and will be the first vessel to bear the name. McCool served in defense of the nation for 30 years, spanning three wars. He was awarded the Medal of Honor in 1945 for heroism, after his ship was attacked by kamikaze aircraft and he led efforts to save the ship and rescue injured Sailors.

The principal mission of LPD-17 San Antonio class amphibious transport dock ships is to transport and deploy the necessary combat and support elements of Marine expeditionary units and brigades. The ship will carry approximately 720 troops, have the capability of transporting and debarking air cushion or amphibious assault vehicles, and accommodate virtually every size of Marine Corps helicopter and its tilt-rotor MV-22 Ospreys. These ships will support amphibious assault, special operations and expeditionary warfare missions through the first half of the 21st century.

The Navy awarded the detail design and construction contract for LPD-29 to HII on Feb. 16, 2018. Eleven San Antonio class ships have been delivered, the most recent being USS Portland (LPD 27), which was commissioned April 21, 2018. LPD-28 and 29 will serve as transition ships to LPD-30, the first ship of the LPD 17 Flight II class. LPD Flight II class ships will be the replacement for the Navy's aging LSD 41/49 class ships.

As one of the Defense Department's largest acquisition organizations, PEO Ships is responsible for executing the development and procurement of all destroyers, amphibious ships, special mission and support ships, and special warfare craft. Currently, the majority of shipbuilding programs managed by PEO Ships are benefiting from serial production efficiencies, which are critical to delivering ships on cost and schedule.







- 1 1/4 pounds trimmed flank steak
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt (divided)
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon ground coriander
- Freshly ground pepper to taste
- 3/4 cup corn kernels, either freshly cut off the cob or thawed, frozen corn kernels
 - 1/2 avocado, diced
- 3/4 cup red California grapes, halved

Directions

In a small bowl, combine the olive oil, vinegar, juice, zest, honey, mustard, tarragon, parsley, salt and pepper. Set aside.

Heat grill or grill pan to medium high. Using a brush, lightly coat the bread and onion slices with olive oil. Season with salt and pepper. Place the onion slices on the grill. Cover and cook until charred, about 4 minutes, then flip and cook, covered, for another 2-3 minutes. Set aside. Grill the bread for 3 minutes or until toasted. Flip and grill another minute. Set aside. Roughly chop the grilled onions and the bread into 1" square pieces.

In a large bowl, combine the onions, bread, grapes, radicchio, cucumber and pistachios. Add the salad dressing and gently toss to combine. Divide the salad into 6 equal servings and top each with goat cheese.

Kids and screens: Not all screen time is created equal






