You may know that mosquitoes carry disease. But did you know that disease epidemics from mosquito-borne viruses are on the rise? Protect yourself against mosquitoes, and know how TRICARE covers you if you suffer more than the usual itchy bite this summer.

Mosquitoes are flying insects known for their irritating bites. While most mosquitoes simply cause itchy bites, if infected, they can spread disease. Some common ones include:

Malaria. If traveling to Central America, South America, East or West Africa, or South Asia, talk to your doctor about medications to prevent malaria and understand your options. If symptoms arise, a doctor can diagnose malaria with a blood test.

Yellow fever. There is currently a yellow fever outbreak in Brazil. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that if you haven't received the yellow fever vaccine, postpone travel to Brazil. If you must travel to South America or Africa, where yellow fever is most common, consider getting vaccinated. TRICARE covers yellow fever vaccine or other vaccines required for overseas travel for active duty family members traveling with their sponsor on official travel or permanent change of station orders.

Zika. While it doesn't usually require hospitalization, the CDC warns that the Zika virus presents additional risk for pregnant women. If you're pregnant, consider postponing travel to areas where the virus is active, like parts of South America, Central America, and the Caribbean. Check the world map of areas with risk of Zika for the latest informa-

West Nile virus. Last year, the West Nile virus affected more than 2,000 Americans and caused over 120 deaths. But not all cases are severe. Within the U.S., West Nile is most common in Arizona, Utah, New Mexico, Mississippi, Nebraska, and North and South Dakota.

Mosquitoes can spread dangerous diseases no matter where you are. Here are some ways that you can prevent mosquito bites and reduce your chances of getting sick:

Wear long sleeves and pants when exploring outdoors, especially at night.

Use an insect repellant registered with the Environmental Protection Agency and reapply frequently when outdoors. Sleep in an air-conditioned or well-screened room.



Navy Region Mid-Atlantic Fire and Emergency **Services** personnel awarded for life-saving actions

Personnel from Navy Region Mid-Atlantic Fire and Emergency Services received Certificates of Significant Achievement July 31 at a ceremony at the Fire and Emergency Services building on Naval Air Station Oceana Dam Neck Annex.

Eight emergency responders received the awards for saving the life of Chief Sonar Technician (Submarine) Kevin C. Pope, leading chief petty officer at Commander, Undersea Surveillance on February 7 when he suffered from a heart attack during a workout.

Lester Schneider, firefighter/paramedic at NRMAFES, said he was the one who received the emergency call when Pope was experiencing chest pain and responded from Naval Air Station Oceana because the ambulance at Dam Neck Annex did not have a paramedic.

"Once I arrived on scene, we started the advanced life support procedures that we do," said Schneider. "That's how we noticed that he was having a heart attack."

Pope said he doesn't remember much from the time he arrived at the hospital, but said the emergency responders were working the whole time to keep him awake.

"The surgery was a success," said Pope. "I'm recovered now, and it's all because of the work these guys did in that very finite amount of time. These guys saved my life."

Schneider also said any paramedic won't be a good paramedic unless he has good EMTs.

"The team of guys that I work with every day, we train, we have classes, we have recurring certification training," said Schneider. "The biggest piece of

Schneider said they took Pope to advice I give my team is, 'it's not our emergency; it's his emergency' and the cooler and calmer we are, the better we are at treating the patient."

The U.S. Navy Fleet Forces Four Star Edition rock band will open for the concert. Following Four Star Edition will be Parmalee, a country music band consisting of brothers Matt and Scott Thomas, along with their cousin Barry Knox and Josh McSwain. Parmalee will perform starting at 7:30 p.m.

The base will close to the general public at 9:30 p.m.

Naval Weapons Station Yorktown Historical Factsheet

On Aug. 7, 1918, President Woodrow Wilson ordered the Secretary of the Navy to take possession of a tract of land, "being part in the County of Warwick and part in the County of York, both in the state of Virginia."

This was the beginning of Navy Mine Depot Yorktown.

Initial construction of the depot included a mine loading plant, magazines for storage, a power plant, machine shop, a railroad to connect with local rail lines, a pier, and various barracks, administration offices and a galley. Total cost for the initial construction was \$3 million, equaling over \$37 million today.

The main workhorse of the installation is the ordnance pier. The original pier was constructed in 1920. It was a wooden pier with inlaid rail road tracks to facilitate the loading/unloading of mines and other ordnance. In the beginning, barges were loaded with ordnance and towed out to ships anchored in the river or down to ships at Naval Station Norfolk. The pier suffered major damage during a hurricane

in 1933 and a fire in 1954. In 1962, construction began on a new U-shaped pier that is still in service today.

Over its long history, NWS Yorktown has employed a variety of military and civilian personnel to carry out its mission, By October 1943, there were 94 officers, 890 enlisted, in addition to 250 Marines permanently stationed at the installation. The civilian work force totaled more than 2,300, including 545 women. Today, the installation is home to 5, 096 military, civilians and family members.

NWS Yorktown hosts 35 tenant commands including Navy Munitions Command, Navy Submarine Torpedo Facility, the

Naval Ophthalmic Support and Training Activity, Navy Expeditionary Logistics Support Group, Navy Cargo Handling Battalion, the Marine Corps Security Force Regiment, Fleet industrial Supply Center Detachment, Navy Expeditionary Medical Support Command and many more.

The base and its tenant commands work together to provide handling, maintenance, storage, research and development for explosive ordnance. It is the site of expeditionary logistics training and operations, warfare training for sailors, Marines and other services and serves as a premier recreational destination for service members and their families.

Sandra Barnes, one of the original staff members for the standup of the Navy Campus for Achievement, the Navy's new Voluntary Education (VOLED) program in 1973, visited the NCVEC to share some vintage sea stories and see how the current program has leveraged virtual services.

"When Adm. Elmo Zumwalt created the Navy Campus program, I was approached and agreed to be the representative for the Norfolk area," said Barnes. VITAL SIGNS: HIGH-TECH, **PORTABLE HEALTH MONITOR TREATS WARFIGHTERS AND CIVILIANS**

A technology designed to treat injured warfighters on the battlefield is proving its worth to civilian emergency-response teams.

The sensor-laden Wireless Vital Signs Monitor (WVSM) tracks critical health information like heart rate, pulse and blood pressure. Sponsored by the Office of Naval Research (ONR), it weighs less than a pound and can be carried easily into combat zones or mass-casualty emergency situations.

The device is strapped to a patient's arm and transmits data wirelessly via a specialized software app to a tablet or smart phone, which is handled by attending medical personnel such as Navy corpsmen. This enables the medics to monitor the vital signs of more than 15 patients at once.

"Since this technology can monitor multiple patients simultaneously, corpsmen can attend to someone, move to the next patient or even step away to get supplies—while still keeping an eye on everyone in their care," said Dr. Timothy Bentley, a program manager in ONR's Warfighter Performance Department, which has sponsored the WVSM's development.

A collaboration between ONR, the U.S.

Army Institute of Surgical Research and industry partner Athena GTX, the WVSM recently was approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. More than 200 of the monitors so far have been sold to emergency-response units in Iowa, Texas, North Carolina, Maryland, Missouri and Pennsylvania.

The WVSM also is used currently by the U.S. Special Operations Command and the Air Force.

Through complex software algorithms, the WVSM analyzes patient data; determines if someone is in stable or worsening condition; and calculates the need for life-saving interventions such as surgery or blood transfusions. This differs from traditional vital signs monitors, which provide basic health information but can't predict if someone's medical condition is about to deteriorate.

First responders already have used the WVSM successfully in training exercises and emergencies such as fires, tornados, hurricanes and large public events where groups of people required medical attention. In June, Texas emergency crews treated people injured during a hospital explosion.

"The feedback from customers has been very positive," said Dr. Mark Darrah, president and chief executive officer of Athena GTX. "They like that the WVSM is lightweight, portable and can provide crucial

vital sign data quickly. The sooner you can receive such data, the better the outcome in an emergency."

The WVSM is designed as part of the ONR-sponsored Automated Critical Care System (ACCS)—a patient-care system that can be described as an intensive care unit in a suitcase. Weighing under 25 pounds, with an accompanying stretcher, ACCS is ideal for diverse missions.

"Expeditionary forces penetrate deep into remote areas where casualties can take hours or days to evacuate," said Bentley. "The capabilities needed for patient care must be compact, lightweight and scalable to mission requirements. ACCS makes the clinical expertise and capabilities of a critical-care center available to warfighters in the most severe conditions."

ACCS can provide care such as vital signs monitoring; resuscitation and breathing assistance; supplemental oxygen; fluid and drug therapy; and patient data gathering, storage and transmission. The system can monitor and treat patients under the control of a medic-or autonomously within predetermined parameters.

COMMANDER, SUBMARINE **FORCES HOLDS CHANGE OF** COMMAND

Vice Adm. Charles A. Richard relieved Vice Adm. Joseph E. Tofalo as Commander, Submarine Forces/Submarine Force Atlantic/Allied Submarine Command during a change of command ceremony onboard the Virginia-class fast-attack submarine USS Washington (SSN 787) August 3 at Naval Station Norfolk.

Since taking command of the Submarine Force in September 2015, Tofalo played a pivotal role in the future of the force. As Commander, Submarine Forces, he focused his efforts on ensuring the U.S. Navy maintains undersea superiority today and into the future. As Commander, Submarine Force Atlantic, he had operational command of all U.S. submarines home ported on the Atlantic coast, as well as supporting shore activities. As Commander, Allied Submarine Command, he acted as the principal advisor to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization on submarine plans, operations, and doctrine.

Tofalo kicked off remarks by reminding guests that sixty years ago today, 3 August 1958, USS Nautilus (SSN 571) reached the North Pole, and became the first submarine in history to do so.

"This "top of the world" historical reference is certainly fitting," said Tofalo. "Because I'm "on top of the world" today, as it has been the honor of my lifetime to command the greatest submarine force the world has ever known. A force made up of 24,000 outstanding active duty, government civilians and reservists, and their families, who combined are only 4% of the greater navy, yet operate 25% of the Navy's warships including 70% of Nation's accountable nuclear weapons."

Admiral John Richardson, Chief of Naval Operations, and Admiral Christopher Grady, Commander, U.S. Fleet Forces Command were guest speakers during the ceremony.

Richardson, a former Commander, Submarine Forces himself, recognized the history of the submarine community and described a culture inspired by four generations—the pioneers, the warfighters, the cold warriors, and the innovators.

"Joe has led his team to strengthen the readiness of the fleet, strengthen the bonds of trust and confidence," said Richardson. "He has spent every waking moment thinking about how to make our force stronger, ready to sail under the seas and over the horizon, to face any challenge, and to return stronger than when we left."

In welcoming and recognizing the many distinguished guests at today's ceremony, Grady also lauded Tofalo's leadership, his continued support of excellence, and the elite culture that he established within the submarine community.

A native of upstate New York, Tofalo graduated with distinction from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1983 with a Bachelor of Science in Computer Science. He also holds a Master of Science in Engineering Management from Catholic University of America. His father was a 35-year career naval officer, and his mother was a Navy WAVE, one of the first enlisted women in the Navy.

Tofalo was commanding officer of the Ohio-class ballistic-missile submarine USS Maine (SSBN 741), and was Commander, Submarine Squadron 3, Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. Prior sea assignments include the Permit-class attack submarine USS Flasher (SSN 613), the Ohio-class guided-missile submarine USS Michigan (SSGN 727), and the Los Angeles-class attack submarine USS Montpelier (SSN 765).

His shore assignments include three assignments on Commander, Submarine Forces staff; two assignments on Commander, U.S. Fleet Forces staff; four assignments on the Chief of Naval Operations staff; U.S. Joint Forces Command; and the Joint Staff.

Selected for Rear Admiral in December 2009, his first flag assignment was as Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff for Global Force Management and Joint Operations (N3B), U.S. Fleet Forces Command. In August 2011, he relieved as Commander, Submarine Group 10, and in December 2013 as Director, Undersea Warfare on the Chief of Naval Operations staff in the Pentagon.

Tofalo retired from active duty as part of the ceremony after more than 35 years of service in the U.S. Navy, and left the Force with one last challenge.

"To the Sailors and the Force, I challenge you to continue our emphasis on competence and character, relentlessly pursuing your theoretical maximum performance as both individuals and teams," he said. "I also challenge you to continue to do everything with honesty and integrity. Revel in hard facts and the certitude of being a standardsbased organization."

Upon assuming command, Richard thanked Tofalo for passing on a Force that is "ready to deliver" and reassured Richardson, Grady and Hyten that he understands their strategic guidance and the important role submarines play in the nation's defense.

"The mission of our Submarine Force today is clear, said Richard. "We are back in a world in the midst of major power competition. In that competition our strength undersea is a key advantage that we have," said Richard. "That will not change on my watch. With so much at stake, we cannot let up and must execute our mission with a continued sense of urgency."

To the men and women of the Submarine Force, Richard delivered just one thought, "Prepare for battle! This was Admiral Tofalo's direction, and it is mine as well," said Richard. "It is only by being prepared for battle that we can hope to avoid it. If we cannot, our nation expects and demands victory. We shall not fail!"

A native of Decatur, Alabama, and a graduate of the University of Alabama, Richard has also earned master's degrees with honors from the Catholic University of America and the Naval War College. His flag assignments include command of Submarine Group 10 in Kings Bay, Georgia, and the deputy commander of Joint Functional Component Command for Global Strike at U.S. Strategic Command (USSTRATCOM).

His operational assignments include command of USS Parche (SSN 683) as well as Submarine NR-1, then the U.S. Navy's only nuclear-powered, deep-submergence submarine. He also served aboard USS Portsmouth (SSN 707), USS Asheville (SSN 758) and USS Scranton (SSN 756).

Richard's recent staff assignments include service as the executive assistant and naval aide to the Under Secretary of the Navy; chief of staff, Submarine Force Atlantic; and command of Submarine Squadron (SUB-RON) 17 in Bangor, Washington. Other staff assignments include director of resources on the staff of the Under Secretary of Sefense (policy); squadron engineer on the staff of SUBRON-8 and duty on the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (Submarine Warfare) staff. He has also served as a member of Chief of Naval Operations' Strategic Studies Group XXVIII, studying the integration of unmanned systems into naval force structure.

Richard previously served as the director, Undersea Warfare Division (N97) in Washington, D.C., and was responsible for the

devices and applications to track their pace, running routes, calories burned and more. These devices then store the information and upload it to central servers where it can be shared with third parties. That information can present enemies with information on military operations.

Using GPS Devices Pose Risk

"The rapidly evolving market of devices, applications and services with geolocation capabilities presents a significant risk to the Department of Defense personnel on and off duty, and to our military operations globally," Manning said.

These Global Positioning System capabilities can expose perinformation, locations, routines and numbers of DoD personnel. Their use in overseas locations "potentially create unintended security consequences and increased risk to the joint force and mission," Manning said.

Personal phones and other portable devices also contain apps that rely on GPS technology, and they will be affected. Commanders will be responsible for implementing the policy, and they will be allowed to make exceptions only after conducting a thorough risk assessment.

Security is at the heart of this guidance. DoD seeking a balanced way that allows for legitimate official and personal uses of geolocation technology that does not impact security.

Manning said the department will continue to study the risk associated with these devices and change the policy as needed.

active component (AC), MMA and MMW rated Sailors are no longer required to convert to the MM rating when transferring to the RC.

This change allows these Sailors to maintain critical skillsets and remain better aligned with the career paths of their AC counterparts, enhancing their ability to move between active and Reserve components. MMA and MMW Sailors must take the appropriate advancement exam that matches

their specific rate. Educational services officers (ESO) should ensure that MMA exams are ordered for MMA candidates and MMW exams are ordered for MMW candidates. ESOs should contact Navy Education and Training Professional Development Center (NETPDC) to order exams for those Sailors whose initial exams were not ordered in the correct rate.

EXERCISE RIM OF THE PACIFIC 2018 CONCLUDES

Twenty-five nations, 46 ships, five submarines, about 200 aircraft and 25,000 personnel are participating in RIMPAC from June 27 to Aug. 2 in and around the Hawaiian Islands and Southern California. The world's largest international maritime exercise, RIMPAC provides a unique training opportunity while fostering and sustaining cooperative relationships among participants critical to ensuring the safety of sea lanes and security of the world's oceans. RIMPAC 2018 is the 26th exercise in the series that began in 1971.

JOINT BASE PEARL HARBOR-HICKAM, HAWAII

The world's largest international maritime exercise concluded Aug. 2 following more than a month of training events conducted in and around the Hawaiian Islands and Southern California.

Twenty-five nations, 46 surface ships, five submarines, 17 land forces, and more than 200 aircraft and 25,000 personnel participated in Rim of the Pacific exercise 2018. This year's RIMPAC iteration marked the 26th in the series that began in 1971 and is now held every two years.

Hosted by U.S. Pacific Fleet, RIMPAC 2018 was led by U.S. Vice Adm. John D. Alexander, commander of the U.S. 3rd Fleet, who served as the combined task force (CTF) commander. Royal Canadian Navy Rear Adm. Bob Auchterlonie served as deputy commander of the CTF, and Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force Rear Adm. Hideyuki Oban was the vice commander. Fleet Marine Force was led by U.S. Marine Corps Brig. Gen. Mark Hashimoto. Other key leaders of the multinational force included Commodore Pablo Niemann of Armada de Chile. who commanded the maritime component, and Air Commodore Craig Heap of the Royal Australian Air Force, who commanded the

"I couldn't be more proud of our international team's ability to successfully complete an exercise of this nature," said Alexander. "Most importantly, we completed the exercise safely while still achieving national training objectives. This is a true testament to the talent and lasting partnerships we built through RIMPACs past and present, and will continue to build for the foreseeable future."

Alexander said the involvement of so many different countries working together to successfully accomplish RIMPAC was a strong reminder of the unity coalition forces can exhibit in a real-world situation.

"Multinational operations are complicat-I," he said. "It takes skill to assemble an international team and have it be successful. Throughout the duration of the exercise, from the planning conferences to the ships returning to port, this team proved they work great together and can adapt quickly to a dynamic environment."

This year's exercise included forces from Australia, Brunei, Canada, Chile, Colombia, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Israel, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, Netherlands, New Zealand, Peru, Republic of Korea, Republic of the Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Tonga, United Kingdom, United States and Vietnam.

Additionally, for the first time since RIM-PAC 2002, U.S. 3rd Fleet's Command Center relocated from San Diego to Pearl Harbor to support command and control of all 3rd Fleet forces in 3rd Fleet's area of responsibility, to include forces operating forward in the Western Pacific. The Fleet Command Center established at a deployable joint command and control on Hospital Point, Pearl Harbor, for the first part of the exercise and then transitioned to amphibious transport dock ship USS Portland (LPD 27) for the remainder of the exercise.

Auchterlonie said all participating nations worked together incredibly well to overcome


RIO DE JANEIRO, BRAZIL

DNA testing to begin immediately on remains from North Korea, officials say

DNA testing will begin immediately on the 55 boxes of service members' remains returned to the United States this week from North Korea, where they were contained since the fall of 1950, Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency officials told reporters at the Pentagon today.

The United Nations Command recently repatriated 55 transfer cases from North Korea that contain what are believed to be the remains of American service members lost in the Korean War.

Speaking by phone from the agency's headquarters in Hawaii, DPAA Director Kelly K. McKeague and chief scientist Dr. John E. Byrd discussed the process for identifying the

McKeague said DNA samples exist for 92 percent of U.S. Korean War service members, and in some cases, dental records also are available and will be used to analyze the remains. Additionally, chest radiographs are available for 75 percent of the Korean War missing in action, which will help when finding chest bones among the remains, Byrd said.

VCNO ENGAGES, CONNECTS WITH **CHICAGO LEADERS**


The second highest-ranking U.S. Navy officer visited Chicago to engage with local residents, contribute his military story for historical preservation and connect with civic, government, and business leaders, Aug. 2.

Vice Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Bill Moran, accompanied by Fleet Master Chief Russell Smith, stopped in Chicago on his way to Naval Station Great Lakes, and ultimately out to West Coast naval installations as part of a fleet tour to discuss and receive feedback on aviation, surface forces readiness and new deployment rotations.

"It is important for Navy leaders to engage and connect with community members, outside the fleet concentration areas, in part, to inspire more Americans to participate in serving this country in the Navy and to communicate the Navy's important national security role in a busy global environment that is busier than it has ever been," Moran said.

Contributing to military history

Moran first visited the Pritzker Military Museum and Library, in the heart of Chicago on Michigan Avenue, at the library's request, to contribute his military story and perspective as a senior leader to the library's oral history collection.

In addition to being saved in archives, the interview will be broadcast on Pritzker Military Presents, an original program series that airs each week on Chicago Public Television, WTTW Prime, and is also available via streaming video on-

Retired Illinois Army National Guard Col. Jennifer N. Pritzker founded the Pritzker Military Museum and Library to display her collection of books and related materials on military history. To date, the library has collected about 200 oral histories from service members spanning from World War I to present day.

Pritzker said contributions like Moran's are invaluable to create a primary source of material for future historians, as a well as creating an asset that connects our military with the community.

During the taping, Moran discussed his entry into the Navy through college athletics, and described how his parents - who were both teachers - instilled a sense of service that "gets in your blood."

Moran, a Navy aviator who flew the P-3 Orion on subma-

rine hunting missions, shared that an important point in his career was the opportunity to instruct young pilots, because it was inspiring to work with young people and watch them gain confidence and ability.

Community engagement

Moran later spoke with leaders from the five regional Navy League of the United States chapters, along with local civic, government and business leaders on the status of the Navy.

During his presentation, Moran discussed what the Navy has done over the past year to address issues with surface fleet readiness and talked about changes in national defense strategy that are altering how the Navy executes irregular de-

Moran said it is important to communicate to our citizens the role the Navy plays in maintaining global access to food, energy, information and trade that transit across the open

Not accounting for traditional national security threats, almost 90 percent of the global trade occurs at sea, and almost 99 percent of data transfer occurs through undersea cables.

It is the U.S. Navy that protects shipping lanes and con-

duits of undersea cables that augment the U.S. economy, and in turn enhance the global commerce, Moran said.

Toby Mack, co-chair of the Chicago Navy Memorial Foundation, introduced Moran at the meeting and said afterward he was grateful for his visit.

"It is critically important for business and civic leaders to have high-level connections to the Navy," Mack said. "Chicago is a Navy town with deep roots and ties to the history and heritage of the naval services. The Chicagoland area has, and continues to make, significant contributions to the naval services and the nation's national security."

Great Lakes visit

Moran concluded his visit in the area with a stop at Naval Station Great Lakes, where he met with boot camp instructors and senior leaders on the base. The naval station is home of the Navy's only boot camp, located in North Chicago.

Commands aboard the naval station include Recruit Training Command, Training Support Center and Navy Recruiting District, Chicago. Great Lakes is the largest military installation in Illinois and the largest Navy-operated training

A major topic for this year's summit is the new Command Resilience Team (CRT)

Guide. The CRT Guide replaced the Command Assessment Team Guide (NAVED-TRA 7542). It was developed to guide commands through the completion of the Command Climate Assessment process. The guide outlines the roles and responsibilities of the required members of the CRT and stresses the importance of engaged deckplate leadership in creating a culture of excellence.

"Command Resilience Teams (CRT) are designed to provide the commander with information and insight into concerns of command personnel in order to implement positive measures to promote well-being and resilience," said Bradshaw. "CRTs will allow leaders to connect the dots on personnel wellness and they provide commanders with visibility of resilience trends across the command and a means to improve support programs and enhance overall command readiness."

The Navy's 21St Century Sailor office integrates the Navy's objectives for equal opportunity, Sailor personal and family readiness, physical readiness, alcohol and substance abuse prevention, suicide prevention, sexual harassment prevention, sexual assault prevention and response (SAPR), hazing prevention and transition assistance.

TOP SWOS BEGIN SURFACE WARFARE TACTICS AND INSTRUCTOR TRAINING

Twenty Warfare Tactics Instructor (WTI) candidates completed the first stage of the WTI qualification — the Instructor and Tactics Course — August 3 at Naval Surface and Mine Warfighting Development Center (SMWDC).

"It's great to see all the different types of WTI candidates under one roof. It's our intent that these first weeks of training establish a network of tacticians to solve the Navy's most complex problems," said SMWDC Academics Manager, Lt. Cmdr. Chris Polnaszek.

The instructor and tactics course provides the basic framework all WTIs will need to complete the qualification and return to the Fleet as Warriors, Thinkers, and Teachers. The aim is to make the entire cadre a single group of networked professionals that can leverage each other's strengths and emphasis areas. This deep integration early in their training is essential, as the maritime domain becomes more complex and integrated with overlapping mission sets.

After completing the Instructor and Tactics Course, candidates head to their respective divisions to achieve full WTI qualification. WTIs are trained as Anti-Submarine Warfare/Surface Warfare (ASW/SUW), Amphibious Warfare (AMW), and Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD) tactical experts. This most recent class of WTI candidates included four AMW, seven ASW/SUW, and nine IAMD candidates.

Beginning in fiscal year 2019, SMWDC will also train WTI candidates to become Mine Warfare (MIW) WTIs, expanding the depth and breadth of the surface WTI cadre and network.

After earning their patches, WTIs are assigned to a variety of readiness production tours where they are challenged to bring their expertise to bear by training the fleet, developing tactics and doctrine, and providing operational support to the fleet.

"WTI candidates learn and refine their instructional techniques in this foundational course, before continuing to the surface warfare specialty training that they were selected for," said Rear Adm. David Welch, SMWDC Commander. "After they are qualified as WTIs, they will work alongside SMWDC mentors to plan and conduct Surface War-

fare Advanced Tactical Training exercises with the Fleet to increase the lethality, capability and readiness of the Surface Force."

SMWDC headquarters is located at Naval Base San Diego with four divisions in Virginia and California focused on AMW, IAMD, ASW/SUW and MIW. The command's mission is to increase the lethality and tactical proficiency of the Surface Force across all domains. Its four lines of operation are advanced tactical training, doctrine and tactical guidance development, operational support to combatant commanders, numbered fleet commanders, and task force commanders, and capabilities assessments, experimentation and future requirements.



As one of the Defense Department's largest acquisition organizations, PEO Ships is responsible for executing the development and procurement of all destroyers, amphibious ships, sealift ships, support ships, boats, and craft.

More than 38,000 people braved Japan's summer heat to visit U.S. Fleet Activities (FLEACT) Yokosuka for the installation's annual Friendship Day festival, Aug. 4.

This year marked the 42nd time this base, just 36 miles miles south of Tokyo, opened its gates for the summer event.

Visitors enjoyed sampling American food and watching a variety of entertainment at Yokosuka venues, but this year's big draws rested at FLEACT Yokosuka's waterfront where visitors got a chance to tour ships of both the 7th Fleet's Forward Deployed Naval Forces and a ship from Japan's Maritime Self-Defense Force (JMSDF).

"Fleet Activities Yokosuka welcomes the opportunity each summer to open our installation to tens of thousands of host-nation guests at Friendship Day," said Captain Jeffrey Kim, commanding officer of the largest U.S. Navy installation overseas. "This event showcases the strength of our two countries' friendship and the mutual commitment to our alliance."

Yokosuka's Friendship Day began in 1976 as a way to promote a positive relationship with the City of Yokosuka and the people of Japan. On average, the event draws more than 35,000 visitors each year looking to experience a piece of American culture.

This year's event kicked off in the morning with Kim and Katsuaki Kamiji, the mayor of Yokosuka City, delivering welcoming remarks to visitors, many who have waited hours in line in anticipation of the event opening.

As thousands of visitors strolled through the installation's gates, it was clear that one of the biggest draws for this year's events was a taste of American culture. In fact, guests feasted on more than 2,800 Yokosuka Navy Burgers, 2,700 pizzas, and 2,500 turkey legs, according to Morale, Welfare and Recreation Yokosuka.

"Three years ago, I ate pizza and it was delicious so I wanted to (attend Friendship Day) to eat it again," said Syuuki Inoue, who is visiting from Yokohama.

Another highlight for this year's event was the ships available for touring at Yokosuka's

"Today we were very pleased to have USS Ronald Reagan (CVN 76), USS Blue Ridge (LCC 19), and the JMSDF JS Asuka (ASE 6102) available for tours," said Kim.

The lines leading to these ships reached from the waterfront more than a kilometer toward the main Friendship Day area along Yokosuka's Nimitz Blvd., reflecting the host nation guest's great interest and curiosity about the U.S. Navy and JMSDF.

"I had a plan to visit the base, but (when) I saw the installation's Japanese Twitter post (@FLEACT_Yokosuka) in the morning I got more excited to learn that I can get aboard and see inside the ship," said Reiko Nishikawa from Tokyo. "I have seen Ronald Reagan from the outside on a cruise ship before, but this is a completely different experience. It was huge!"

Nishikawa noted the informational placards explaining different parts or areas of such a large aircraft carrier in Japanese proved helpful. "The description on the guide plates were

very detailed, but simply put together," he said. "They deepened my knowledge of the ship."

While Ronald Reagan left an impression with its immense size, Fujiwara Ai of Kawasaki found it impressive to learn about what it was like to work and live in tighter quarters of a ship. "I was surprised at how narrow the rooms are," Ai said, who toured the Blue Ridge. "We saw the ship's captain's room where he can eat his meals and it was amazing."

The close partnership between the two countries was on display throughout the day, at both at the U.S. base, as well as across Yokosuka Harbor at the JMSDF Yokosuka District piers, where USS Benfold (DDG 65) was open for public tours as well.

"We are very proud of our close partnership with the JMSDF," said Kim. "Nowhere else in the world are two allied naval forces so closely situated than here in Yokosuka."

In addition to the food and ships tours, a number of cultural exchanges was also on

display as well. One of the Friendship Day performers was renowned Japanese pianist and Yokosuka-native Keito Saito, who plays boogie-woogie music, a uniquely American export. Aimi Mukohara, a popular Japanese recording artist, also took the stage.

Ultimately, the pinnacle of Friendship Day is the interaction between U.S. Navy Sailors, civilians and their families with local citizens. Sailors and their families cheered alongside their Japanese guests at a number of activities such as softball games and dance perfor-

"Seeing our Japanese neighbors and our Fleet Activities community sharing good times side by side is the best part of our openbase events," Kim said.





FROM GHANA TO VIRGINIA, NAMING TRADITION **TRAVELS** WITH FAMILY

NORFOLK

A life preserver with the message "Welcome Aboard" decorates the front door, a greeting befitting a Navy family. Inside, above the entrance, a framed sign reads: "Home is where your story begins."

Bernard Akoli and his wife, Adwoa Essel-Akoli, had welcomed their newborn son six weeks earlier. On this rainy Saturday, they have invited guests into their home to watch their infant's story begin in earnest, with a naming ceremony in the tradition of their native Ghana.

Akoli and his wife are Akan, a major ethnic group in Ghana. Traditionally, in Akan societies, a child is named on the eighth day after birth to ensure that he or she has "come to stay on earth," according to Kwasi Konadu, a history professor at City University of New York, who adds that the name of a person or entity "reflects its purpose in life."

Akoli, who goes by the nickname Ben, is a hospital corpsman 2nd class aboard the USS Gerald R. Ford aircraft carrier. He immigrated to America eight years ago through the Diversity Immigrant Visa Program, a lottery which makes 50,000 visas available annually to individuals selected ran-

domly from countries with low rates of immigration to the

United States. Ben and Adwoa are U.S. citizens now. He joined the Navy five years ago in Ohio and asked to be stationed in Virginia to be near family members in Richmond, a city he was told was beautiful and accommodating to immigrants. The couple also have a 3-year-old daughter, Ayla Angennte Akoli.

Richmond Times-Dispatch about attending his son's adinto, or naming ceremony, which he said would "highlight the cultural diversity of Richmond and Virginia," and, "make people understand, appreciate and tolerate people with different cultures and values."

On this Saturday, the gathering of about 60 people includes Akoli's commanding officer Capt. Robert C. McCormack, an assortment of naval officers and his son's godparents, Gabriel Anteh and Beverly Lambert-Amponin.

mack sitting to the right of elder Albert Wright, a retired vice middle name is going to be Johan." chancellor and professor of civil engineering at Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology, named after the first president and prime minister of Ghana, which gained its independence from Britain in 1957.

Off to the side, Ben and Adwoa sit in upholstered chairs in front of a curtain of white and gold crepe paper flowers, with five letters spelling out the baby's first name. A white blanket swaddles the newborn cradled in his mother's arms,

During the ceremony, Wright speaks the Fante dialect of the Akan people. As an elder, he does not speak directly to the assembled and often speaks in proverbs. His words are interpreted and refined by linguist Josiah Bediako, Adwoa's uncle, who jokingly describes himself as the emcee of the

What ensues is a blend of Ghanaian, naval and Christian culture and traditions, interspersed with prayers and hymns and the dispensing of gifts and advice.

The gathered are told that naming a child comes with responsibility and must be done with caution. Children tend to Following the birth of his son, Ben Akoli reached out to the follow the characteristics of those for whom they have been

> Two clear liquids are placed on a table in front of the room. One is water; the other is not. The liquids will both be spoon fed to the infant as a sort of truth serum, to teach him that "in this world, things are not always what they seem."

At the moment of truth, Ben stands and speaks.

"Though I have the authority to name my baby, I have to consult with my wife," he said, bringing chuckles from the audience. "So what we have decided ... his first name is going

Chairs in the room are arranged in a square, with McCorto be Aviad — A-V-I-A-D — as you can see from here. His

Aviad is a name the prophet Isaiah gave to Jesus. Johan is a

Hebrew name for "gift from God." For the continuity of the Akoli family, the baby would have

his last name, Ben said. "So the name I've chosen for this baby, friends, is Aviad

Johan Akoli."

But there is more.

This is Aviad's official name, the title that will go on his his gray bow tie and white dinosaur-dotted shirt peeking from birth certificate, but the naming is far from done. Aviad will now receive his "soul name," one of which will be based on the day he was born. Since Aviad was born on a Monday, Ben's family — who is from the Ashanti tribe — will call him Kwadwo; Adwoa's family, from the Fante tribe, will call

> Aviad will have a second soul name: Awudor, the last name of his grandfather and Ben's father.

John Awudor did not bestow his last name on any of his three sons, being a man who scoffed at self-gratification, Ben explains later. He preferred to honor others who had positively affected his life.

Ben noted that his father was born in 1941, when Ghana was still a British colony. After its independence, the Nkrumah government established close ties to Russia and planned to send his father to study engineering there. But Nkrumah was overthrown.

"All his dreams, ambitions and everything were shattered," Akoli said. But his father found purpose in his three sons, declining to take on other wives and children as was common in Ghana at the time.

An information systems technician performs core and specialty functions of communications operations, message processing, and network administration and security.

"If we, his children, feel like he led a good life and he deserved to be honored, then we shall honor him. So today, I thank God that I have the opportunity to honor him by giving my son his name."

After Akoli has named his son, Wright, the elder, receives Aviad into his lap.

In the olden days, he says of the infant, he would have placed a machete on the infant, "So you know that when you grow up, you have to go into the farm," Wright says, according to Bediako's translation.

"But in this generation, what is important is you learn hard, become a scholar," Wright says. He says he would place a book on the infant, "but today as well, everything is on a computer. So I'm going to put a computer on him." He places an iPad on the baby, then lays a Bible on him.

And then, he spoons the clear liquids into Hospital Corpsman 2nd Class Bernard Akoli, the other, a soft drink.

"You have to be truthful," he says.

Lt. Cmdr. David Kim, a Navy chaplain, is asked to bless Aviad.

"We thank you for the beauty that we see just in the mix of faces and the mix of cultures," said Kim, the son of Korean immigrants, "and the way that you have brought these cultures and these families together. ... We thank you for the love that is clearly in

Eventually, Ben Akoli is called upon to give a special blessing to his son.





5 simple tips for a lowmaintenance lawn

Whether it's regular outdoor entertaining, kids playing soccer or dogs chasing tennis balls, fun on the lawn — combined with hot, dry conditions — can mean your grass gets a major workout during the summer and early fall. But that doesn't mean you have to.

To keep your lawn looking sharp without breaking your back, follow these five simple tips.

1. Mow high. Crew cuts are out. Don't fall for the myth that the shorter you cut your grass, the less often you'll have to mow. Leaving the grass blades a bit longer allows them to shade the roots and provides more leaf surface for making food, so you can water, feed and mow less often. The type of grass in your lawn will determine the height you should set your mower, but most turfgrasses can be allowed to grow 3 inches tall in the summer before the top one-third of the blades is removed by

2. Find the most efficient mowing pattern. Most people mow their lawns in rows, and that's usually the fastest way to do it. If you have a more-or-less rectangular lawn, mowing in lengthwise rows (along the longest side of the lawn) will reduce the number of turns you need to make and thus speed up the job. Another option is to work in concentric circles — this can be more efficient because the turns are all in the same direction and, except at the very center, they're not as sharp, so you can maneuver the mower better. Whatever pattern you choose, be sure to overlap the rows a bit so you don't have to go back later and clean up areas you

3. Leave the clippings. If you aren't cutting off more than one-third of the height of the grass blades (which you

shouldn't be anyway, as this stresses the plants), you don't need to bag the clippings. Just leave them on the lawn and they'll break down easily, providing the soil with nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium — the same nutrients found in commercial fertilizer. Clippings don't cause thatch, and leaving them on the grass is a zero-cost, zero-effort way to feed your lawn. If you have a mulching mower, you can also mulch in fallen leaves in the fall to add extra nutrients and save time raking.

4. Water thoroughly but less frequently. Many homeowners think they need to water their lawns daily, but turfgrass actually prefers a thorough watering once or twice a week rather than a light misting every day. Allowing the soil to dry between waterings encourages the grass to grow deeper roots and can improve the lawn's drought tolerance. So take watering off your daily todo list and irrigate only when needed. A quick way to determine whether your lawn needs to be watered is to push a screwdriver into the soil. If it goes in without difficulty, the grass has enough water already. If the ground is so hard that the screwdriver doesn't penetrate easily, it's time to start up the sprinklers.

5. Overseed now to save time later. Overseeding in the fall, before cold tem-

peratures hit, can save you significant time next spring and summer. Fall overseeding with a cool-season seed blend can help your lawn emerge from the winter thicker and healthier, improving the grass's ability to fight insects, diseases and weeds in the spring — meaning less weed pulling, spot seeding and early-season lawn revitalization. Coolseason grasses should usually be planted by mid-September, and warm-season grasses by mid-October. You'll want to avoid drastic temperature changes and water regularly yet moderately so the seed has time to absorb moisture and build strong roots. A bit of extra effort now will pay off in the spring with a lush, low-maintenance lawn.

"A lawn is a great asset that provides the perfect environment for a wide variety of outdoor activities," said Bryan Ostlund, executive director of Grass Seed USA, a coalition of American grass seed farmers and turf specialists. "If you're lucky enough to have space for grass, don't let the maintenance become a burden. Simplifying your lawn care practices and working more efficiently can help you enjoy a healthy lawn all season long without hours and hours of labor."




