Navy announced increased High Year Tenure (HYT) waiver authority for Active Component Sailors E7-E9 desiring to continue sea duty in NAVADMIN 192/18, released Aug. 8.

Chief, senior chief, and master chief petty officers willing to continue serving as deckplate leaders at sea are a key element in meeting the Navy's aggressive force-growth

Community managers routinely grant HYT waivers to minimize gaps in deployable sea duty billets. Navy leadership encourages HYT waiver requests from senior enlisted leaders willing to fill sea duty deployable and equivalent (Type 2-4) billets that would otherwise be gapped. Implementing this initiative will help maintain the vital leadership and technical experience necessary in manning the Navy the Nation Needs.

Sailors can expect improved retention incentives and leadership opportunities as the Navy continues to grow.



Virginia Senate Bill 775 assists transitioning military families with K-12 education

A big change took effect on July 1, which will impact military families and the unique K-12 education challenges they face when moving into and out of Virginia. Senate Bill 775 will help to mitigate additional stress

that is associated with the school enrollment process, in order to help school-aged children have a more seamless transition.

"Virginia's previous K-12 education enrollment policies regarding permanent residence lacked flexibility for transimilitary tioning families creating additional stress," said Debbie Patch, Commander, Navy Region Mid-Atlantic School Liaison Officer (SLO). "When families

went to enroll their children in the school of their intended permanent residence, they would find that school board policies directed them back to the school or school division of their temporary residence. Then, once the family secured their permanent residence, an additional school transition was required. This often resulted in children attending three schools because of a Permanent Change of station (PCS) to Virginia."

Multiple SLOs from around the Hampton Roads area attended the signing of Senate

Bill 775 in April. The bill, signed by Virginia Governor Ralph Northam, allows service members' children to be enrolled into the school division of their intended permanent residence while transitioning to a new duty

"There is no question that the children of active duty military men and women have challenges that, perhaps, other chil-

> dren don't," said Northam. piece of legislation means that the children of service members will be able to attend the school that is located where their permanent residence will be, and not have to move around more than necessary."

Governor Northam spoke to SLOs from military installations across the Commonwealth, well as city and state leaders, students, and faculty Kecoughtan

High School in Hampton, Virginia, before signing the bill.

"As you know, we have the world's largest naval base very close to here in Norfolk, Oceana Naval Air Station, and Langley Air Force Base. We have a large military presence here in Hampton Roads and in Virginia," said Northam. "We wanted to make sure that all of the children of active duty military members were taken care of, so last year we introduced legislation to make sure that we identified all dependents of active duty and

to make sure that their needs were met."

Navy installation SLOs worked to help with that transition.

There are 18 military SLOs located at military installations across the Commonwealth. SLOs support military families with information and resources regarding local K-12 education, while also supporting local educators with information on military culture and lifestyle. The Virginia General Assembly enacted into law the Virginia Interstate Compact on the Educational Opportunity for Military Children Council in 2009. The Council's charge is to assist in easing the transition of the children of military families into school as a result of frequent moves and deployment of their parents.

"While helping these transitioning military families during their PCS, SLOs began to notice challenges associated with temporary housing and school enrollment," said Patch. "Many of these temporary housing challenges were brought before the Council, and it was requested that a working group be convened to explore the situation and provide information back to the Council."

Senate Bill 775 was legislation introduced by Senator Mamie Locke and signed by Governor Northam as a direct result of the Council's request to garner more information on this issue.

"As a Navy School Liaison Officer, it gives me a great sense of pride that Virginia recognized a need for change and then took action to help military families in transition" said Tiffany Johnson, Naval Support Activity Hampton Roads' SLO. "For families utilizing temporary housing prior to securing their permanent residence, this legislation will significantly ease the school enrollment process and provide military-connected students the ability to start school in their intended city of residence from day one."

NMCP's TPC Chesapeake new **location ribbon cutting**

A ribbon-cutting ceremony was held to mark the new location of Naval Medical Center Portsmouth's TRICARE Prime Clinic (TPC) Chesapeake at 1400 Crossways Boulevard,

The new building is only about a mile and a half of the previous location, and will open for patient care Aug. 13.

"Our current clinic began as a NavCare clinic more than 25 years ago, transitioned into a research-sharing clinic with Humana, and then became one of Naval Medical Center Portsmouth's nine branch health clinics," said Capt. Christopher Culp, NMCP's commanding officer. "If you liked the old clinic, this one will 'wow' you. Today, we get out of the 1990s and into the 2020s."

Shauna Hicks-Mumford, one of the project's primary coordinators, said this was the first major move for a TRICARE clinic since the '90s. "The clinic was moved in an effort to right size the building for staffing and for the needs of our patients." said Hicks-Mumford. "The new location is quiet, it's off to the side, and we have enough space here so providers have enough exam rooms," she said. "We also have the ability to do mammo (mammography) with an up-to-date 3D machine, a brand new x-ray machine that shoots better pictures — all top of the line equipment which increases the capabilities over what we had at the other location, and more parking."

Prior to cutting the ribbon, Culp mentioned the new Suffolk-based TRICARE Prime Clinic will be unveiled soon and be open for patient care by the end of the month. This is in addition to scheduled upgrades that have happened, or are in

the planning stages, for the various clinics located throughout the Hampton Roads area.

NAS OCEANA **HOLDS PRE-AIR SHOW EXERCISE**

Naval Air Station Oceana held its annual Pre-Air Show Exercise Aug. 10 on the flight line to demonstrate the ability of NAS Oceana and the City of Virginia Beach to respond and recover from a mass casualty incident.

Personnel from NAS Oceana and local first responders simulated an aircraft mishap to prepare emergency personnel for any situations that can potentially occur during an

Sailors and civilians role-played as injured bystanders, each holding a patient card with details of their fictitious condition and injuries. Emergency medical personnel practiced treating and transporting these "patients" to medical facilities.

Local agencies such as the Virginia Beach Fire Department, Virginia Beach EMS, Virginia Beach Police Department, Sentara Virginia Beach General Hospital and Virginia Port Authority partner with NAS Oceana for the annual airshow and were present at the exercise to practice for an incident.

"This is an annual drill," said Capt. Chad P. Vincelette, commanding officer. "We've always had a very good relationship with Virginia Beach, and we change the scenario every year to keep it fresh."

Vincelette said practicing for incidents allows Sailors and emergency responders to be ready in the event of a real-world scenario.

"The airshow is a very safe event," said Vincelette. "We practice just in case an incident occurs, such as an aircraft mishap or other accident where a crowd would be involved," said Vincelette.

Vincelette also said it's fascinating to see how strong NAS Oceana's partnership is with Virginia Beach while conducting this annual exercise.

"Seeing all of the experts from the Navy, the city and all of our partners working tois and how much it grows every year," said Vincelette.

Kenneth Snyder, district fire chief, said it's important for all the emergency responders to work together on perfecting their skills.

"We get together several times a year and integrate," said Snyder. "We work on our communication, we work on our team skills. We cannot underestimate how important it is for us to work together."

THE **FUTURE OF U.S. NAVY ONBOARD DELIVERY MISSIONS**

ATLANTIC OCEAN

- "Power."
- "Nacelles."
- "Brakes, brakes, brakes."
- "Power steering."
- "Aft cyclic."

These are the calls MV-22 Osprey pilots relay as they come in for a landing on the flight deck aboard the aircraft carrier USS George H.W. Bush (CVN 77) while testing some of the Department of the Navy's newest and most innovative

In August 2018, Osprey pilots successfully tested rolling landing and takeoffs in excess of 57,000 pounds on the flight deck of the ship. This key capability allows the Osprey to haul more weight than the C-2A, which is limited to landing at 49,000 pounds. GHWB's onboard testing included integrating the MV-22 into flight deck operations, and heavy gross weight rolling landings and takeoffs.

"I started off flying Greyhound carrier onboard delivery (COD) aircraft and I love the platform," said Lt. Cmdr. Steven Tschanz, from Libertyville, Illinois, a test pilot assigned to Air Test and Evaluation Squadron (HX) 21. "With that said, nothing lasts forever and the Navy came up with a solution to move us into the future with the CMV-22 Osprey."

The CMV-22 Osprey, the Navy's MV-22 variant, combines fixed-wing aircraft speed and range with the vertical lift capabilities of rotary wing platforms, making it the ideal carrier strike group COD and vertical on board delivery (VOD) platform in sup-

port of aerial resupply and logistics. The Navy COD crews piloting CMV-22 aircraft will land and take off with forward airspeed, which allows flight at a much higher weight.

The Osprey has already proven its capabilities in humani-

tarian assistance and disaster relief, amphibious assault and medical evacuation missions. Its next evolution will use those capabilities to accomplish traditional COD missions.

"The COD community is growing," said Tschanz. "It's

an exciting time. I think the next few years are going to be a dynamic and exciting time, not just for pilots, but also the U.S. Navy."

Lt. Gavin Kurey, from Albuquerque, New Mexico, and also assigned to HX-21, is the first Navy pilot to land an MV-22 on an aircraft carrier.

"This underway is a historic event for the Navy," said Kurey. "I never thought I'd be part of something like this as a COD guy. There's a lot of reluctance to join new platforms that are so different initially, but to be part of the first wave that can help to make that transition happen is an amazing

experience." Kurey had another first aboard GHWB in 2012 when he

made his first arrested landing in a COD. The main advantage of the Osprey is its capability to take off and land vertically as a helicopter does, while requiring a

much shorter runway than a Greyhound. For Osprey pilots, the chance to fly new aircraft that is on the frontline of expanding the Navy's logistics mission is a point of pride.

"This is why I went to test pilot school," said Tschanz. "I finished my flight with my co-pilot and we fist-bumped. This is why I joined. This is why I'm a test pilot. It's things like this that make this job."

Tschanz is excited this change will enhance a carrier strike group's operational reach and expand the ability to support missions in a multitude of environments.

"To be one of the first Osprey pilots to fly aboard a carrier is just awesome," said Tschanz. "I deployed previously aboard the George H.W. Bush for the maiden deployment in 2011, while flying the C-2 for COD missions. To come back on a totally different platform and do vertical landings

The CMV-22 Osprey is expected to achieve Initial Operational Capability by 2021. As compared to the MV-22B, the Navy variant has extended operational range, a beyond lineof-sight HF radio, improved fuel dump capability, a public address system for passengers, and an improved lighting system for cargo loading.

NRL's Sun Imaging Telescopes fly on NASA Parker **Solar Probe**

WASHINGTON

The U.S. Naval Research Laboratory's unique expertise in sun-viewing telescopes will be an integral part of the historic NASA Parker Solar Probe mission scheduled to launch Aug. 11 to better understand how the Sun affects our solar system.

The mission to "touch the Sun" is 60 years in the making and will bring a spacecraft carrying a suite of instruments the closest ever before to the Sun with NRL's Space Science Division's coronagraph telescopes called the Wide-Field Imager for Solar Probe, or WISPR, being the only imager.

WISPR is built with telescopes that create a solar eclipse type image by blocking the actual sun so its atmosphere, or corona, can be captured. These images show the Sun's emissions, including streamers, plumes and the energetic coronal mass ejections that burst from the star.

According to Dr. Russell Howard, the NRL WISPR principal investigator, and a leading world authority on coronagraph telescopes, it's not just the pictures that are important - it's where that energy goes.

Understanding how the Sun's atmosphere then flows important because it can have dramatic effects on communications, power and other essential technologies that the U.S. Navy fleet relies on, said Howard.

"What this mission is going to be able do is pin down exact-We'll be able to image that," said Howard. "But also, there's

WASHINGTON

The proposal to form the U.S. Space Force is rooted in protecting America's advantages in space and in ensuring such advantages continue, Deputy Defense Secretary Patrick M. Shanahan said during a roundtable discussion with Pentagon reporters yesterday.

Shanahan and Air Force Gen. Paul J. Selva, the vice chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, spoke following Vice President Mike Pence's announcement of the proposal to establish the U.S. Space Force, which would be America's sixth armed service.

Space is now a combat domain, the leaders said. Russia and China have demonstrated capabilities to destroy, hack or jam satellites. The U.S. Space Force would concentrate expertise to protect those assets.

Importance of U.S. Space Operations Shanahan and Selva emphasized that military operations worldwide depend on space. Squad operations in Afghanistan all the way

through command and control of America's nuclear deterrent depend on assets in space. Space is an integral part of the National Defense Strategy and the DoD proposal for the way forward keeps that firmly in mind, the deputy secretary said.

"You know the first principle of change management is do no harm," Shanahan said.

The plan calls for DoD to stand up a unified combatant U.S. Space Command under the direction of a four-star officer. Initially, that command would be patterned on U.S. Special Operations Command — where all the services contribute people and resources to accomplish the worldwide mission. And like Socom, the new Space Command would set the parameters for training and employment of the service assets.

Officials said that about 80 percent of space qualified personnel reside in the Air Force, but all services have personnel with space expertise. Selva said there are roughly 18,000 people in the services with a space qualifier badge. There are also a number of civilian personnel in the department with this expertise and thousands of contractors who could be drawn into the new command.

Another important aspect of the proposal should help speed development and acquisition of space assets. There are currently around 140 military satellites. What assets replace those satellites? Who maneuvers

those satellites in time of tension? How does the department build in defenses or harden its space assets to prevent tampering or jamming? These are all questions that would be on the command's plate.

Establishing the U.S. Space Force will require congressional action, and Shanahan and Selva said that even as the U.S. Space Command is standing up, another group of Pentagon officials will be drawing up proposed legislation to establish the sixth armed

A separate service will require a separate department under DoD like the Department of the Air Force. It will require a secretary, personnel systems, a promotion system, legal help, recruiting and more.

During the brief, Gates highlighted the different commissioning programs available to Sailors, fielded questions about navigating the application process, and provided insight and encouragement to Sailors looking

Gates has been the OIC of NSA Hampton Roads-NWA for 15 months, and a

Commissioned Officer for 11 years.

"Becoming a commissioned officer means that I have the opportunity to make a tremendous difference in the lives of my family members, as well as my Sailors," said Gates. "Being an officer in the U.S. Navy is an honor and privilege, and I do not take any day for granted."

Gates, formerly a Chief Yeoman, received his commission through the Limited Duty Officer (LDO) Program in April 2007.

"I was not selected for LDO on my first

In today's Navy, there are many programs available to Sailors who strive to become commissioned officers. Among those programs are the U.S. Naval Academy and Naval Academy Preparatory School, Officer Candidate School, Medical Enlisted Commissioning Program, Medical Service Corps In-Service Procurement Program, Seaman to Admiral-21, Chief Warrant Officer Program, and LDO Program.

"Sailors should always strive to be the best in whatever they do, whether that is at sea, at home with family, or in school," said Gates. "The selection boards are looking for the best qualified Sailors."

The requirements for each program vary, however most require a recommendation from the Sailor's Commanding Officer, United States citizenship, no record of disciplinary action in the past three years, and good physical fitness and performance evaluation scores.

"The commissioning programs brief provided inspiration and motivation," said Navy Counselor 1st Class Elizabeth Scotto. "It

(OPNAV N170A). "Our campaigns aren't over the past year," said Lanorfeia Parker, just created for Sailors, they're created with them. Asking for feedback through surveys and focus groups helps to ensure that these campaigns are resonating with today's Sailors and engaging them with the products and tools they need," said Favorite.

The Keep What You've Earned and Prescription for Discharge Combined Campaign Survey launched Aug. 8 and will continue through Sept. 7, and is sponsored by Navy's Alcohol Abuse Prevention and Drug Detection and Deterrence offices. The survey is short – it takes less than 10 minutes to complete - and completely anonymous. Although the primary audience for the survey is enlisted Sailors under the age of 25, all members of the Navy team are encouraged to participate, including deck plate and senior leaders, drug and alcohol abuse prevention personnel, Navy civilians and Navy family members.

"When this survey was last administered in 2016, nearly 40% of respondents observed that safe and proper use of prescription medication had been discussed more often

Director of Navy Drug Detection and Deterrence (OPNAV N170D). This insight led OPNAV N170D to fine-tune Prescription for Discharge messaging among different audience segments to shape these discussions at all levels-between peers, leaders and their Sailors, as well as providers and their pa-

"In nearly a quarter of a century of CARAT exercises, we have continued to ensure forward presence, deterrence and sea control each time when U.S. and Royal Malaysian ships get underway together and conduct cooperative exercises," said Rear Adm. Joey Tynch, Commander Task Force 73.

Expeditionary fast transport ship USNS Millinocket (T-EPF 4) and a P-8A Poseidon maritime patrol aircraft will conduct nearly a dozen at-sea exercises with the Royal Malaysian Navy including a gunnery exercise (GUNNEX) to maintain Sailors' readiness with onboard weapon systems, visit, board,

search, and seizure (VBSS) exercise to increase and maintain proficiency in boarding vessels that may harbor illegal weapons and drugs, and division tactics (DIVTACS) to enhance cooperative fleet maneuvers.

"This is a great opportunity for all of us working side by side, to improve and enhance all of our operational capabilities," said Brig. Gen. William Jurney, Commanding General of 3rd Marine Infantry Division. "We look forward to continuing to advance all of our joint and integrated capabilities' both here and in the future."

CARAT Malaysia builds upon other engagements with Malaysia including Pacific Partnership, the largest annual multilateral humanitarian assistance and disaster relief preparedness mission and Southeast Asia Cooperation and Training (SEACAT), which involves nearly a dozen partner nations. These engagements serve to enhance information sharing and coordination and support longterm regional cooperation.

"I have seen first-hand the professionalism of the Malaysian Armed Forces. Annually for the past 24 years our armed forces have engaged and exercised with each other in increasingly complex and sophisticated scenarios. Throughout this time we have learned much about each other — how we communicate and operate — and it is vital to effectively working together to ensure security, stability and prosperity in the region," said Capt. Lex

Walker, commodore of Destroyer Squadron 7. "The aim of this exercise is to enhance interoperability as well as individual capacity to conduct amphibious operations at a tactical level," said Maj. Gen. Dato' Zulkapri bin Rahamat, General of Officer Commanding Task Force 450. "It is also to provide good opportunities for all of us to reshape ideas and experiences so that we can plan and conduct operations in the region whenever something arises. We are looking forward to an active discussion and a productive outcome in the planning and conduct of amphibious assault and ship-to-ship training as well as other exposures through subject matter expert exchanges."

Malaysia has been part of the CARAT exercise series since it began in 1995. After more than two decades of annual training events between the armed forces, CARAT Malaysia remains a model for cooperation that has evolved in complexity and enables both navies to refine operations and tactics in response to traditional and non-traditional maritime security challenges.

Disaster Relief: How Can Al Improve Humanitarian Assistance?

The unique topic of artificial intelligence (AI) for humanitarian assistance and disaster relief (HA/DR) was in the spotlight last week, as leading minds from academia, industry and the federal government met to discuss how modern technology can help victims of disasters around the globe.

The Artificial Intelligence and Autonomy for Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Relief Workshop—co-hosted by the Office of Naval Research (ONR) and Carnegie Mellon University (CMU)—took place at the university's Pittsburgh campus Aug. 2-3.

"The problem of catastrophes affecting humanity will unfortunately always be among us," said Chief of Naval Research Rear Adm. David J. Hahn. "The great minds in this room are here to figure out how we can best leverage artificial intelligence and autonomy to better deliver resources and people to those in urgent need."

As Hahn addressed the group, pictures of naval relief efforts over many years scrolled behind him, including Sailors and Marines assisting victims in Haiti after an earthquake, Japan after an earthquake and tsunami, New Orleans and New York after hurricanes and more.

Hahn noted the Navy and Marine Corps are uniquely suited to support rescue and relief work done by different federal agencies, when called upon. Naval assets include ships, planes and helicopters; being positioned globally; and being highly mobile.

Dr. Andrew Moore, dean of CMU's School of Computer Science, thanked Hahn for helping to inspire the meeting, which included renowned AI-focused academics; senior representatives from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA);

leaders from the new Joint AI Center; relief directors at the U.S. State Department; representatives from NASA, the U.S. Army and Air Force; and many more.

Some in attendance had been on the ground providing assistance on multiple occasions, from natural disasters to war zones.

"We've brought in some of the best roboticists and technologists in the world, with the single goal of keeping people safe during disasters" said Moore. "Technology to save lives is inspiring for everyone in the AI field."

AI and autonomy are wide-ranging terms that include multiple fields of study and are increasingly relevant to disaster relief work. Some of those focus areas include machine learning, human-computer interaction, big data analytics, computational modeling and robotics


Several speakers at the event discussed real-world examples of how AI could help

victims of disasters, including better using unmanned aerial vehicles to find survivors; using robots to communicate with trapped victims—for example, under the rubble of a building; generating the most accurate data on emerging damaged areas, using crowd-sourced social media reports; and computer models and simulations to predict the best ways and tools to help in different disaster situations.

Both Hahn and Moore encouraged workshop attendees to not let the meeting's value fade. A series of working groups addressed multiple topics and were requested to come up with short-, mid- and long-term ideas on how to utilize AI in real-world HA/DR situations

Follow-up meetings are currently being slated to track progress.

NAVY AND UCSB TEAM UP FOR ENGINEERING AND SCIENCE DESIGN CHALLENGE

(NAVFAC) Engineering and Expeditionary Warfare Center (EXWC), in collaboration with University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB), and Naval Surface Warfare Center, Port Hueneme Division (NSWC PHD), hosted the Problem-based Initiatives for Powerful Engagement and Learning in Naval Engineering and Science (PIPELINES) final presentations and Design Challenge Awards at the Seabee Museum at Naval Base Ventura County, Aug. 3.

"This program allows us to link driven, dedicated individuals with professional engineers, show them the incredible reach of the Navy, and share what opportunities are out there for them," said Maria Teresa Napoli, PIPELINES program director. "Every year, I have been thrilled and impressed by the group of students that participate. We

keep setting the bar higher and the students excel each time."

NAVFAC EXWC Technical Director and event moderator, Kail Macias, spoke on the Naval Facilities Engineering Command importance of supporting initiatives such as the PIPELINES program.

"As a leader of the Navy and the Department of Defense in science and technology, it's important that we stay at the forefront and recruit the best and brightest in science, technology, engineering and mathematics careers," said Macias. "Our recent designation as a Science and Technology Reinvention Laboratory gives us the authority to employ talented individuals while still in school and to potentially hire them full-time upon graduation."

Six student intern teams spent eight weeks of the summer with NAVFAC EXWC, NSWC PHD, and UCSB mentors working on engineering design challenges. The teams of two to three students enrolled at state and local community colleges were assigned a themed project and given the freedom to develop unique solutions for real-world situ-

The six PIPELINES Design Challenge projects included: Design of Testing Device and Procedures for Navy Bollards; Enlisting the Sun: Optimizing Portable Solar Energy; A New Maritime Buoy Pump System for Refueling Operations; Modernizing Navy Resource Allocation and Distribution Logistics; Miniaturizing a Subsea Fiber Optic Repeater for Naval Applications; and Increasing the Resiliency of Navy Fuel Pipelines.

Prior to judging, team mentors briefed each project by providing background information. The student intern teams then presented their design challenge solution by using PowerPoint presentations and poster boards to the judges and audience of more than 100 educators, engineers, and guests. The four judges representing Navy leadership, engineering expertise, and education scored each presentation on three aspects: technical level or challenge of the project, readiness level, and the clarity and persuasiveness of the presentation.

The PIPELINES Design Challenge project winner was Modernizing Navy Resource Allocation and Distribution. NSWC PHD Logistics interns James Byrne, Alessandro Guaresti, and Cole Morter received recognition for their accomplishment from NAV-FAC EXWC Commander Vince Fonte, executive officer (acting). An honorable mention was awarded to Miniaturizing a Subsea Fiber Optic Repeater for Naval Applications by NAVFAC EXWC interns Matthew Martinez, Natalie Holliday, and Andrew Serna.

The 2018 PIPELINES program was the final year funded by a 3-year Office of Naval Research grant, initiated in 2016, to develop real-world engineering and science solutions to ongoing Naval issues.

SEAL BEACH FIRE DEPARTMENT **ROLLING OUT ANTI-CANCER PROGRAM**

SEAL BEACH, CALIF.

The Naval Weapons Station Seal Beach Federal Fire Department has been selected to be the Commander Navy Region Southwest (CNRSW) pilot department for the Cancer Awareness and Prevention Program.

The Cancer Awareness and Prevention Program (CAPP) was founded in 2016 with the purpose to reinforce practices of firefighters in the workplace that result in clean air, clean body and clean gear.

"Being in the fire service, personnel encounter dangerous atmospheres and have a greater chance of contracting cancer," said station Fire Captain Chris Mookini. "Let's all do our part in helping prevent another brother or sister from dealing with this threat."

Firefighters are exposed to significant amounts of carcinogenic chemicals and vapors when responding to daily duties like hazardous materials, confined space rescues,

structural fires and building collapses.

These exposures can originate from inhalation or skin contact. Too much exposure to these chemicals could lead to

illnesses including various types of cancer. CAPP is helping implement changes to Fire Department personnel's daily routines to help keep them protected from this threat.

The program's proposed changes include methods to reduce vehicle exhaust inside fire stations, and processes to avoid cross-contamination

involving gear exposed to hazardous chemicals. For example, fire stations use top-loading

washing machines to wash heavy duty contaminated personal protective equipment (PPE). However, this method does not always extract harmful chemicals,

PPE. "CNRSW Fire and Emergency Services has already taken an active approach to cross contamination and cleaner gear," said Region Fire Chief Christopher Connelly. "We are also

in the process of procuring hoods that will protect our firefighters from toxins, pathogens and other hazardous substances

to a greater extent than our current hoods."

"Seal Beach will be the first Navy fire station in the region to acquire two sets of PPE," added Connelly. "These initial steps are only the beginning to what we envision as a long standing commitment to our personnel and their health and safety."

Upon completion of the CAPP trial, findings will be reported and regional leaders will decide on which practices to be included in the polices for all the fire departments in the Southwest Region.

"The Seal Beach Federal Fire Department is honored to be the pilot program for this initiative," said base Fire Chief Eric Johnson. "Many of us have personally been affected by cancer within our immediate families and also in our firefighter family. We hope to be the beginning of a Navy and ultimately DoD-wide firefighter cancer prevention effort."

DIVING DEEP: ENGINEERING, SCIENCE STUDENTS FACE OFF IN UNDERWATER COMPETITION

It was an exciting time in San Diego last week as nearly 50 high school and university teams from around the world made a splash at the 21st International RoboSub Competition at the Space and Naval Warfare Systems Center Pacific Transducer Evaluation Cen-

The week-long autonomous submarine competition, co-sponsored by the Office of Naval Research (ONR) and the Association of Unmanned Vehicles International Foundation, tested students' mechanical, electrical, computer and systems engineering skills—as well as their presentation skills and teamwork while competing for cash prizes (which go directly to the school, usually to a robotic club or program).

"The submarines are all designed and built by students," said Dr. Daniel Deitz, a program officer in ONR's Ocean Battlespace Sensing Department and RoboSub judge. "It is amazing to see how every year these teams—whether seasoned competitors or first timers—take a singular set of rules and turn it into 40-plus distinctive, innovative, working submarine prototypes."

While each submarine in the competition is unique, they all have one common mission: to demonstrate autonomous capability

by completing a series of visual- and acoustic-based tasks that simulate some of the duties required of today's underwater vehicles.

To meet this year's mission requirements, the submarines-without human or computer interaction—had to complete a variety of "casino-themed" tasks that included: touching dice buoys; dropping chips into a roulette bin; pulling a slots lever to fire mock torpedoes through small cutout holes; and cash in by grabbing a chip, then surfacing the vehicle and dropping the chip into a cashier's register.

Teams also had to create a website, write a paper that outlined their work and give a

"RoboSub is a well-rounded event, providing participants the opportunity to apply their classroom knowledge to real-world problems-as well as hone their networking, presentation and communication skills as they prepare to enter the workforce," said

According to the recently released DoN Strategic Roadmap for Unmanned Systems (short version), which lays out a plan to seamlessly integrate more unmanned systems into the naval services and across all domains, having a well-rounded generation of engineers and scientists is essential to the Navy's future force.





Hospital Corpsman helps battle mosquito-borne diseases

It happens every year. South Texas is dry for weeks, then it rains.

And, then come the mosquitoes.

"They can lay their eggs in even the smallest amount of water," said Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Jessica Wright, a hospital corpsman and preventive medicine technician at Naval Branch Health Clinic Kingsville. "If it dries out, the eggs wait until it's wet again and then hatch."

She added, "Mosquitoes live to feed, breed and lay eggs. And carry disease."

According to Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, 85 species of mosquito have been identified in Texas. If there is a disease that can be transmitted by mosquito, there's a species that can do it somewhere in Texas.

Disease Carriers

Texas mosquitoes have been found carrying West Nile, chikungunya, dengue, Zika and malaria. Corpus Christi finds mosquitoes carrying West Nile almost every year.

Wright, originally from Fayetteville, Arkansas, works to minimize the disease risk. She tracks mosquito populations at Naval Air Station Kingsville and recommends control measures, like fogging.

"So far, including records before I got here two years ago, we haven't had any trapped mosquitoes test positive for disease," Wright said. "We're still tracking on Zika and West Nile — that's a big one. Nothing yet, and I hope it stays that way."

She added, "But we have a mobile population that goes all over the world. Or people can get bit on vacation, come back here, get bit and spread that disease."

Wright has been in the Navy for seven years and a preventive medicine tech for two. The job includes inspections of food service, childcare and recreational facilities, water systems, bacteriological analysis, epidemiological investigations, mass immunization programs and field sanitation as well as disease vector control.

"It encompasses everything. And I get to go outside," she said.

But she has a special passion about mosquitoes.

"I hate them. I can't think of any reason for them to exist except to spread disease," she said.

'Mosquito Magnet'

Wright's primary tool for combating mosquitoes is a 'mosquito magnet,' a trap that uses propane to emit a carbon dioxide scent that attracts mosquitoes into a mesh bag.

"I set it up overnight and in the morning extract the mosquitoes, live and dead, package them and ship them overnight to the state lab in Austin," she said.

The lab sends back results showing the numbers of mosquitoes by species and if any were carrying a disease.

So far this year, there have been few mosquitoes, even with the heavy rains.

Part of that has been due to the ongoing effort in recent years to reduce the number of places mosquitoes can lay eggs, such as ensuring there are no abandoned tires or other standing water traps.

Two intermittent ponds were filled in several years ago, also reducing places mosquitoes could breed.

"We go out and pump the water when it could attract mosquitoes," said Arturo Alvidrez, a performance assessment representative with NASK Public Works.

"We also use insecticide and fogging. I think we have a very effective control program on the base," Alvidrez added.

And, recent frequent high winds scatter the insects. "If the winds are high, say above 20 mph, you're not going

to catch anything in the traps," Wright said.

But Wright's policy is not to take chances.

"My attitude is, let's fog and kill them and not have this risk," she said. "I'd rather make sure everyone is protected."



NAMRU-Dayton Environmental Physiology Team tackles Naval Aviation's top priority: Physiological episodes

Protecting aircrew against a wide range of physiologic challenges posed by the tactical aviation environment is a primary driver of research priorities at Naval Medical Research Unit (NAMRU) - Dayton. With the

growth of unexplained physiologic episodes (PE) being reported across U.S. Navy and U.S. Air Force aircraft platforms, NAMRU-Dayton is responding to the challenge. We are rapidly expanding our environmental physiology research capacity by adding experienced altitude effects researchers and developing new laboratory facilities.

The Naval Aerospace Medical Research Laboratory (NAMRL) at NAMRU-Dayton expanded its research portfolio of PE related studies from about five per year prior to fiscal year 2017 to 25 unique PE related research protocols in fiscal year 2018. Research topics include the effects of barometric pressure changes, the effects of variable breathing gas mixtures, and the effects of breathing resistance on aircrew physiology and performance. The lab is developing and testing a range of physiologic, gas and chemical sensors for use as in-flight PE detection and mitigation tools.

NAMRL is not alone in the fight to understand and mitigate PEs. The Environmental Health Effects Laboratory (EHEL) at NAMRU-Dayton is conducting research to characterize the potential role of chemical contaminants in PEs. EHEL is collaborating with NAMRL to conduct more extreme environmental exposure protocols than NAM-RL can accomplish through its human-use research program.

NAMRU-Dayton is strengthening collaborative relationships with Department of Defense laboratories including Naval Medical Research Center, Naval Health Research Center, Naval Submarine Medical Research Laboratory, NAMRU-San Antonio, Naval Air Warfare Center (Aircraft and Training Systems divisions), Navy Experimental Diving Unit, U.S. Air Force 711th Human Performance Wing and U.S. Army Aeromedical Laboratory. Additionally, NAMRU-Dayton is working with academia and industry partners including Case Western Reserve University, Florida Institute for Human and Machine Cognition, and KBRwyle to conduct research and development (R&D) in response to the rise of in-flight physiologic

The command continues to receive R&D support from long-term line stakeholders like NAVAIR. More recently, non-traditional sponsors of aeromedical research such as Defense Health Agency (DHA) and Bureau of Medicine and Surgery (BUMED) have enabled the lab to mount a substantial response to the threat of PEs to DOD aircrew.

In support of the lab's planned research NAMRL is constructing a new respiratory physiology laboratory that will aid studies on the effects of four factors; variable

breathing gas mixtures, in-line breathing resistance, breathing gas pressure and flow disruptions, and flight equipment fit on aircrew physiology and cognitive function. To support these initiatives NAMRL is building several aircraft-specific life support system (LSS) simulators to reproduce the breathing environments of the T-45 and F/A-18 aircraft, for example.

Due to this surge in PE-related research NAMRL has added a number of senior scientific staff with experience in respiratory physiology research. Most recently Drs. Dan Warkander and Barbara Shykoff joined the team, bringing collectively over 40 years of research experience in respiratory physiology and life support system design through their previous work at University of Buffalo and Navy Experimental Diving Unit. Such additions to the staff bolster an already excellent cadre of altitude effects researchers.

Research experts at NAMRU-Dayton are equipped to lead the Navy's research response to in-flight physiologic episodes our military is facing.



An ocean away, **Virginia Beach native** serves in U.S. Navy, lives in Europe, supports NATO mission

A 2014 Landstown Lakes graduate and Virginia Beach, Virginia, native is serving our country in the Navy, living on the coast of Spain, and participating in a critical NATO ballistic missile defense (BMD) mission while assigned to the guided-missile destroyer USS Carney.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Thomas Lindley is a gunner's mate aboard one of the four advanced warships forward-deployed to Rota, Spain, a small village on the country's southwest coast 65 miles south of the city of Seville.

A Navy gunner's mate is responsible for maintaining the over the side torpedo tubes, 25mm, all small arms and crew

Lindley credits success in the Navy with lessons learned growing up in Virginia Beach.

These four destroyers are forward-deployed in Rota to fulfill the United States' phased commitment to NATO BMD while also carrying out a wide range of missions to support the security of Europe.

According to the NATO website, many countries have, or are trying to develop ballistic missiles. The ability to acquire these capabilities does not necessarily mean there is an immediate intent to attack NATO, but that the alliance has a responsibility to take any possible threat into account as part of its core task of collective defense.

U.S. Navy Aegis ballistic missile defense provides scalability, flexibility and mobility. These systems are equally beneficial to U.S. assets, allies and regional partners in all areas of the world. Positioning four ballistic missile defense ships in Spain provides an umbrella of protection to forwarddeployed forces, friends and allies while contributing to a broader defense of the United States.

Guided-missile destroyers are 510 feet long warships that provide multi-mission offensive and defensive capabilities. The ships are armed with tomahawk cruise missiles, advanced gun systems, close-in gun systems and long-range missiles to counter the threat to friendly forces posed by manned aircraft, anti-ship, cruise and tactical ballistic mis-

Destroyers are deployed globally and can operate independently or as part of carrier strike groups, surface action groups or amphibious readiness groups. Their presence helps the Navy control the sea. Sea control is the necessity for everything the Navy does. The Navy cannot project power, secure the commons, deter aggression, or assure allies without the ability to control the seas when and where desired.

Serving in the Navy is a continuing tradition of military service for Lindley, who has military ties with family members who have previously served. Lindley is honored to carry on that family tradition.

"My father served in the military," said Lindley. "He influenced my choice in branch of the military."

While serving in the Navy may present many challenges, Lindley has found many great rewards.

Lindley is proud of advancing to the rank of petty officer second class quickly.
