USS HARRY S. TRUMAN STRIKE GROUP JOINS NATO FOR TRIDENT JUNCTURE

VESTFJORDEN SEA

The Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Harry S. Truman (CVN 75) and select ships from Carrier Strike Group Eight (CSG-8) joined U.S. Army, Air Force and Marine Corps service members Oct. 25 for the largest NATO exercise since 2015 – Trident Juncture 2018 (TRJE 18).

The U.S.'s 14,000-strong combined force will join participants from all 29 NATO

member nations, as well as partners Sweden and Finland. The Harry S. Truman Carrier Strike Group (HSTCSG) will send aircraft from embarked Carrier Air Wing One (CVW-1) to conduct sorties, both at-sea and on Norwegian land ranges, nearly every day while participating in TRJE 18. Adding to the exercise, the strike group will be conducting high-end warfare training in air, surface and subsurface operations. Through these focused, multi-mission events, HST-CSG will work alongside allies and partners to refine its network of capabilities able to

respond rapidly and decisively to any potential situation.

"For nearly 70 years, the NATO alliance has been built on the foundation of partnerships, cooperation and preserving lasting peace," said HSTCSG Commander, Rear Adm. Gene Black. "Our strike group's operations in the North Atlantic region over the past several weeks demonstrate our commitment to these ideals, and we're looking forward to enhancing our cooperation with our allies and partners during Trident Juncture."

The HSTCSG has spent much of the past

few weeks in the North Atlantic refining its skill sets and capabilities in preparation for the exercise. After sailing off the coasts of Iceland and in the North Sea, strike group ships crossed the Arctic Circle and began operations in the Norwegian Sea. For several days, the strike group also operated alongside Royal Norwegian Navy ships in the Vestfjorden – a sea area inside Norwegian territorial waters.

Along with fostering stronger bonds



Navy reinstates Officer Board photo requirement

MILLINGTON, TENN.

Official photographs will once again be displayed for all officer promotion selection boards, according to a Navy message, released Oct. 29.

This policy change came about due to board feedback. Boards overwhelmingly found the photo to be useful in evaluating officers' ability to fulfill the Title 10 requirements for promotion to the next grade.

Effective with the release NAV-ADMIN 265/18, the requirement to maintain an official full-length officer photograph remains in accordance with Military Personnel Manual Article (MILPERSMAN) 1070-180 – Officer Photographs. A change to MILPERSMAN Article 1070-020 - Officer Official Military Personnel File (OMPF) - will reflect the reinstatement of the requirement to display the photo during officer selection boards.

The Navy had eliminated the requirement to display photos for officer selections in 2016, but the requirement for officers to

Residents can help protect our local waterways

This article serves as part one in a four article-series on everyday habits residents can adopt to prevent pollution from storm-water runoff and to protect our local waterways.

Have you ever wondered what you can do to help protect the rivers, streams, and waterways near your home? These water bodies supply our drinking water, provide us with recreational activities and beautiful scenery. This four-part series provides information about common sources of pollution from everyday activities and, habits you can adopt to prevent water pollution.

Storm-water runoff results when rain cannot soak into the ground because of impervious surfaces such as roads and rooftops. Storm-water pollution results when storm-water picks up, carries, and discharges various pollutants into storm drains or ditches, and ultimately into the downstream waterways. Pollutants include items such as pesticides, fertilizers, construction site sediments, pet waste, litter, and other items.

- Prevention of storm-water pollution is important to: • Prevent contamination of drinking water sources
- Protect our precious water resources for recreational activities such as fishing, swimming, and boating
- Protect plant and animal habitats
- Preserve the natural beauty of our landscape

First, it is important to understand the difference between the sanitary system and the storm drain system. The illustration shows how water from our sinks, showers and bathtubs, clothes washing machines, and dish washers all enter the sanitary system via pipes that are connected to a wastewa-






ter treatment plant. Pollutants from these waters then are removed by the treatment plant before being discharged.

By contrast, storm-water, which runs off our rooftops, driveways, roads, and lawns, enters into the storm drain system and discharges directly to nearby streams, lakes or bays without receiving any treatment.

You may have noticed decals near storm drains indicating that the storm drains flow directly to a nearby waterway. NAVFAC Mid-Atlantic installs these decals to educate residents and employees of the Navy installations on storm-water pollution prevention.

Common sources of pollution in the storm-water runoff from our lawns include pet waste, fertilizers, pesticides, lawn clippings and leaves, and other substances which may be left uncovered (such as dirt piles, salt piles, paints, oils, etc.). In addition, car maintenance activities such as oil changes and car washing can contribute to storm-water pollution when oil and detergent run into the gutter. Remember to collect all used oil and dispose of it properly. When washing a car, it's better to wash on grass, which filters the contaminants, or to use a commercial car wash.

Coast Guard Cutter Diligence returns home after deterring migrants, responding to hurricanes

WILIMGTON, N.C.

The crew of Coast Guard Cutter Diligence returned to Wilmington on Friday, Oct. 26, following a 60-day patrol in the Caribbean, Mid-Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico.

The Diligence's crew performed counterdrug and migrant interdiction in the northern Caribbean Sea and post-hurricane responses in North Carolina and Florida.

The crew began their patrol in the Windward Passage between the west coast of Haiti and the east coast of Cuba to deter and respond to mass migration. Their presence served to discourage the departure of unstable and overloaded sailing freighters and kept them from attempting voyages in unseaworthy vessels toward the Bahamas and the U.S.

Following Hurricane Florence's landfall, the Diligence's crew transited to North Carolina to aid relief efforts for citizens in Wilmington. Once on scene, the Diligence assumed the role of surface action group commander and directed three other Coast Guard cutters in response operations. The crew provided water and food to those in need at Bald Head Island and the surrounding communities, assisted Coast Guard Station Oak Island's crew with post-storm reconstitution, and provided search and rescue response off the coasts of Oak Island and Wrightsville Beach.

After Hurricane Florence, the Diligence's crew transited to the Gulf of Mexico to assist in the wake of Hurricane Michael. The Diligence acted as a critical offshore search and rescue communication platform while local communication sites were disabled, and the crew provided water to the affected cities of Panama City and Apalachicola, Florida.

"Change was abundant this patrol, and the crew's adaptability was truly remarkable," said Cmdr. Robert Mohr, commanding officer of Coast Guard Cutter Diligence. "The crew's devotion to duty and service to nation shone as they responded to two major hurricanes, even though several crewmembers

experienced personal setbacks due to property loss as a result of Hurricane Florence. I was extremely proud of their resolve and their ability to remain mission-focused while they assisted those in need."

Coast Guard Cutter Diligence is a 210foot medium endurance cutter homeported in Wilmington. The Diligence's primary

missions consist of counter-drug and migrant interdiction, enforcing federal fishery laws and search and rescue operations.

Naval Computer and Telecommunications Area Master Station Atlantic's (NCTAMS LANT) Drug Education For Youth (DEFY) won the 28th annual Secretary of Defense Community Drug Awareness Award and the 2018 Secretary of Defense Fulcrum Shield Award at the Hall of Heroes in the Pentagon Oct. 18, 2018.

This is the first time a DEFY Program has won both awards at the same time. Also, a few DEFY youth participants were in attendance, another first!

The awards were presented at the 2018 Department of Defense Red Ribbon Week Ceremony. During the event, the 28th Annual Secretary of Defense Community Drug Awareness Awards were presented to units and installations within each of the military services, the National Guard Bureau, and Defense Agencies. The award was established in 1990 in an effort to promote community drug awareness efforts within the Department of Defense community. The Fulcrum Shield Award was established to recognize the efforts of independent military-affiliated youth organizations that have successfully assisted in articulating the anti-drug message through their community.

"No one starts off with a goal of abuse or addiction. They often start by just wanting relief and they take one step down the path they often cannot easily turn back from," said Executive Director, Office of Force Resiliency Dr. Elizabeth P. Van Winkle, holding a doctorate in Applied Experimental Psychology. "I would like to personally congratulate each of the 2018 winners and offer my heartfelt appreciation for all that you do. all you have accomplished. Continue to innovate and lead. You are indeed fighting a force bigger than all of us. Keep fighting and in doing so, you keep those members off the path to addiction. Know you are making a difference in ways you don't even realize."

DEFY delivers year-long leadership and life skills training for military and Department of Defense civilian children ages 9-12 and teaches team-building, conflict resolution, age appropriate goal-setting, and increasing self-confidence.

The awards were received by Dr. Sharon Shaw, recently earned her doctorate in Organizational Leadership with Specialization in Information Systems Technology and currently works at Naval Information Forces. DEFY NCTAMS is headed by Shaw, who is responsible for ensuring that all activities are planned prior to the execution of Phase 1 and Phase 2. Having been involved in the program for 18 years, Shaw is also responsible for recruiting, selecting, and training the staff each year. She establishes and maintains support and links with community organizations to recruit youth and mentors, as well as other resources that enhance DEFY.

"It was an honor to represent DEFY and accept the awards on their behalf, but it is

team effort," said Shaw. "The mentors, junior staff members, youth, their parents, and the support from the chain of commands is why we are here today. Without them, the program would not be successful."

The DEFY program is broken down into two phases throughout the year. The first phase is structured to provide a focused classroom-learning environment that will teach leadership, team-building, conflict resolution, goal-setting, and increase self-confidence. Although the classroom is the focus, leadership camps are structured to provide a fun environment that allows quality-training time, while still permitting a relaxed but organized and memorable experience.

The second phase is a 10-month mentoring program during the school year, in which DEFY youth are matched with an adult mentor team. Mentoring events are built around a curriculum module and are structured to provide reinforcement of skills, techniques, and procedures taught in the leadership camp.

"It was an educational year attending all the classes to include the camp," said one of the children participating in the DEFY program. "It all paid off in the end with the award and a cool trip to the Pentagon."

Navy Curators assist Mariners' Museum with Ironclad Monitor Project

RICHMOND, VA.

"Water connects us all." That is the message from Howard Hoege III, president of the Mariners' Museum and Park located in Newport News to visitors that come to the 90,000 square foot gallery that includes the award-winning USS Monitor Center.

The state-of-the-art exhibition and conservation lab houses 210 tons of artifacts from the Civil War Ironclad Monitor, which were recovered from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) Monitor National Marine Sanctuary. In 2002, two XI-inch Dahlgren, smooth-bore shell guns that weigh nearly nine tons each were added to the collection.

As part of the conservation process, Erik Farrell, a member of the archaeological conservation team assigned to the guns along with Hannah Fleming and Will Hoffman, connected with the Naval History and Heritage Command's Curator Branch and arranged a visit to the branch's Collection Management Facility (CMF) Oct. 23. The CMF houses a set of Dahlgren guns from the 19th century sloop of war Kearsarge from which Farrell and his team gathered measurement data to aid in the ongoing conservation of the Monitor guns.

"There is concretion all along the bore which we are going to have to take out," said Farrell. "We need really accurate dimensions of the interior bore which we can't get off of our guns until after they are cleaned. Ideally, we wanted to check an actual historical example first. This one [Dahlgren] from the Kearsarge is from the same foundry as the one from the Monitor; it is pretty much the most exact parallel we could get to check to see what we need to do."

Farrell explained that the Kearsarge guns will allow the Mariners' Museum team to create coring drills of different sizes. By taking measurements of the Kearsarge guns, the drills can be made to exact sizes, which is especially important as they drill toward the back of the gun since the shape of the opening starts to change as you move further inside the gun. Even though there are diagrams

of the Dahlgren guns available, a physical representation makes a better foundation for the work to be done.

NHHC Curator Branch Head Jeff Bowdoin shared his excitement at the chance to collaborate with Farrell and his team on the USS Monitor project. He said it was an excellent opportunity for the CMFs curatorial staff to showcase their professionalism and knowledge while interacting with a non-government agency in a joint effort to preserve

"The visit was not only a great opportunity for the Mariners' Museum, it also afforded NHHC's Curator Branch an opportunity to share a part of our collection with fellow history professionals," said Bowdoin. "We believe it will have a direct, positive affect on the outcome of the effort to preserve artifacts from one of history's earliest ironclad war-

David Krop heads NHHC's Conservation Branch, also located at the CMF. He said the visit also offered his team an opportunity to speak with fellow archaeological and objects

"They [Mariners' Museum team] needed to access non water damaged Dahlgren guns to measure the interior of the bores," said Krop. "It's a great example of NHHC's collection being used to help other heritage projects with their conservation needs. It's a really unique collaborative effort."

Krop went on to say that the USS Monitor is one of the most iconic pieces of Civil War naval technology. Commissioned on Feb. 25, 1862 in New York, N.Y., Monitor had a thick-armored round turret which was twenty-feet in diameter. It was the first ship-mounted rotating gun turret. Rotated by steam power, the turret could fire nearly 360 degrees from the pair of eleven-inch Dahlgren smoothbore shell guns.

Departing for Hampton Roads, Va., Monitor arrived on March 9 and immediately engaged in battle with the Confederate ironclad, CSS Virginia, which was the first battle between ironclad warships. The previous day, Virginia sank both USS Congress and USS Cumberland. Though the battle with the Confederate ironclad was a draw, the engagement prevented the Confederates





Sea science: Navy Task Force promotes increased knowledge of ocean environment

ARLINGTON, VA.

In a keynote speech to attendees of the 2018 Oceans Conference—held last week in Charleston, South Carolina-Chief of Naval Research Rear Adm. David Hahn discussed the goals of the U.S. Navy's Task Force Ocean, a signature program of Chief of Naval Operations Adm. John Richardson. TFO is designed to reinvigorate the Navy's commitment to ocean sciences, advancing its tactical advantage through a better knowledge of the ocean environment and its impact on sensors, weapons and operations.

Hahn, who leads the Office of Naval Research (ONR) and serves as the director of TFO, began his comments by highlighting the critical role of ocean commerce to global prosperity, and the need to provide order and security to that commerce for the good of the nation and the world.

"Fundamentally, that is the role of your Navy—it's what we do every day," Hahn said.

He pointed out, however, that in this era of increasing "great power competition," the Navy needs to maintain an advantage, and the time to prepare for that is now. Hahn quoted James Forrestal, appointed the first Secretary of Defense in 1947, who said in a Congressional testimony, "The tempo of modern war has reached the point where this Nation will probably never again have the opportunity to arm itself successfully after the start of hostilities."

That message bolstered the one given at a Tactical Oceanography Symposium held a week earlier at the Undersea Warfighting Development Center in San Diego. Hahn highlighted the importance of furthering ties between the Navy, academia and industry.

"The Navy needs your help," he told attendees at the three-day symposium, the first in a series designed to highlight Navy ocean science issues. "We need a committed partnership between government, academia and industry to ensure the U.S. remains the world leader in ocean science, especially Navy-relevant science. Our competitors are gaining on us."

"Our decades-long competitive advantage in the undersea domain is eroding. This is not a Navy problem—it is our nation's problem," said Oceanographer of the Navy Rear Adm. John Okon during a presentation at the symposium. "As Task Force Ocean continues to evolve, we must remain focused on advancing ocean science and uniting our nation's intellectual capital to increase our competitive advantage."

A recent report prepared by the Consortium for Ocean Leadership, an umbrella organization that includes over 100 public and private ocean research organizations, highlights the mounting pressure on the Navy's

advantage over global competitors.

To accelerate the recovery of that advantage in these critical areas, Hahn announced that ONR will increase research and sponsor an additional 50 graduate students and 50 post-doctorates under TFO, primarily in the areas of physical oceanography and acoustics, in addition to ONR's ongoing support for academia.

According to Dr. Tom Drake, director of ONR's Ocean Battlespace Sensing Department, "ONR will revitalize the "Scientist-to-Sea" program, which provides opportunities for selected scientists and engineers to visit submarines and submarine training facilities, undersea warfighting training centers, Navy laboratories and engineering centers to better understand the needs and priorities of

The Navy's commitment to revitalize its ocean science efforts will have very positive benefits to the national ocean science program, as well as the Navy. "This is a most welcome turn of events for Navy oceanographic research," said Prof. Arthur Baggeroer, the Secretary of the Navy and Chief of Naval Operations Chair for Ocean Science at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

NEXCOM announces **NEX** Fee Free Layaway and Holiday Season Return Policy

To kick off the holiday season, NEX customers will pay no fee when opening a new layaway account through Nov. 21, 2018.

The NEX Layaway Policy states that clothing, accessories, shoes and general merchandise can be placed on layaway for up to 90 days with three equal payments required 15 days apart. Any single jewelry or watch item over \$500 may be put on layaway for 180 days with equal payments required every 15 days from creation until paid in full. Computers, tablets, iPads, monitors, digital cameras, peripheral computer equipment, software and video games as well as clearance and sale merchandise ending in .94, .96 and .97 are not permitted on layaway.

Check with your local NEX for other specific details relating to layaway. Some NEX locations must limit the type or number of items permitted on layaway due to space constraints.

In order to accommodate customers making post-holiday gift returns, all NEX locations will accept returns through Jan. 26, 2019. This extended holiday return policy applies to original purchases made between Oct. 24 - Dec. 24, 2018, at any NEX or through myNavyExchange.com. Customers are asked to include any packaging material along with the receipt when making a return. Any returns without a receipt will be placed on a NEX Gift Card.

AppleCare/AppleCare+ Protection Plans are returnable within 60 days of purchase. Requests for returns of these protection plans after 60 days will be referred to Apple for a pro-rated refund for the days remaining

NAVY ANNOUNCES CHANGES TO IN-RESIDENCE GRADUATE EDUCATION FOR URL OFFICERS

WASHINGTON

Navy announced that officers in Unrestricted Line (URL) communities must now be screened by administrative boards in order to attend in-residence graduate education (IRGE) programs, in NAVADMIN 263/18,

Beginning with the Fiscal Year 2019 cycle, community administrative boards began selecting the most fully-qualified, due course URL officers for IRGE programs and in-residence Joint Professional Military Education

Tuition assistance, graduate education

vouchers, and other opportunities remain open for all officers, without the board re-

Starting with Fiscal Year 2020, statutory and administrative boards will adhere to revised precept language that enforces the value and importance of IRGE programs in their selection of officers for promotion and career

URL officers in year group 2015 and beyond will be required to graduate from an IRGE program prior to assuming major com-

However, these officers will be able to screen for major command prior to graduating from an in-residence program. This will allow maximum career flexibility to meet the graduate education requirement.

To meet the requirements of this policy, IRGE is defined as a completion of a graduprogram allowing officers to dedicate time in an academic environment. The program may be funded through the Navy or self-funded.

In-residence education programs, such as Naval War College, Naval Postgraduate School, Fleet Scholar Education Program, Olmstead Scholar, and other similar programs, provide the best opportunities to mature critical and strategic thinking skills for

Distance learning degree programs and the

compressed JPME Phase II course at Joint Forces Staff College will not count toward this requirement.

The graduate education program changes reflect the Navy's continued emphasis on developing Navy leaders who understand the art and science of warfighting and can lead in complex strategic environments.

'Strong progress' in decreasing death from breast cancer

Air Force Lt. Col. Michelle Nash calls her breast cancer diagnosis at the age of 40 shocking and unexpected. "I had no family history. I breastfed all four of my children, and that's a protective factor," she said. "I didn't have any lumps or any symptoms that would cause me to think, 'I should go get that checked out.'" Nash's breast cancer was diagnosed after a routine mammogram, her first.

A year later, Nash said she's feeling great and has no regrets about her decision to have reconstructive surgery after a double mastectomy. And she's become even more passionate about advocating for preventative care such as mammograms.

"Mammograms may be something women hesitate to get because they're afraid they'll be unpleasant or even painful," said Nash, assistant professor and director of operations at the U.S. Air Force Academy

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. It's the No. 1 cause of cancer deaths among Hispanic women, and the second most common cause of cancer deaths among white, black, Asian, and Native women.

According to the CDC's most recent statistics, approximately 242,500 women in the United States were diagnosed with breast cancer in 2015, care provider. For women 45 to 55 years old, an annual mammogram is and 41,500 women died of the disease. But thanks to improvements in recommended. Women 55 and older can get mammograms annually or detection and treatment, "more and more breast cancer patients are becoming breast cancer survivors," said Army Col. Craig Shriver, director have a family history of breast cancer, the CDC recommends discussing of the John P. Murtha Cancer Center at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Bethesda, Maryland.

Citing a study that was published October 2017 in the American Cancer Society's "CA: A Cancer Journal for Clinicians," Shriver said breast cancer deaths declined 40 percent from 1989 to 2015.

"That's dramatic," said Shriver, who's also an oncology surgeon and a surgery professor at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in Bethesda.

Shriver said the study showed the number of women diagnosed with breast cancer during this 15-year period didn't change much. "But our screening programs are better, so we're able to detect the cancers at an earlier stage, when they're treatable."

Also, oncologists have fine-tuned traditional treatment approaches. Genetic testing of breast cancer tumors allows oncologists to treat with chemotherapy only those patients who are most likely to respond to it. Those who aren't can be given other treatments or put into clinical trials.

"In the past, we'd spend a year or two giving chemotherapy, only to find out the cancer came back anyway," Shriver said. "Now, we're not wasting that time."

Shriver said less-invasive breast cancer surgeries are also on the horizon. For example, in a traditional lumpectomy – also known as a breastconserving therapy – surgeons remove the tumor and some surrounding normal tissue. Researchers are conducting clinical trials to determine if instead of surgical removal, the tumor can be destroyed while it's still in the breast with directed laser technology.

"We're moving more and more toward a day, maybe five years from Behavioral Sciences and Leadership Department. "But they're just so now, when women with breast cancer will be treated almost exclusively without surgery," Shriver said. "That would be a great advance."

> Meanwhile, he and other health care experts stress early detection. All women over the age of 20 should do a self-exam monthly and get a physical exam by a health care provider annually, Shriver said. For mammograms, women ages 40 to 44 who are at average risk for breast cancer can choose an annual mammogram after consulting with their health every two years, based on provider recommendation. For women who screening frequency with a health care provider.

"We can treat breast cancer patients with fewer side effects and with "We're making strong progress in decreasing death from breast can- better, targeted therapies," Shriver said, "and survival rates are better. But early detection is still the best thing."

PHILANTHROPY, SORORITY **COULD BECOME CASUALTIES** OF FRAT MISCONDUCT

worth it at all.

I was about to hit delete when the words "Greek life," "hazing" and "criminal charges" caught my eye. It was another email blast from from an administrative muckety-muck at our daughter Anna's university, but this one didn't look like the usual update about tuition increases. Considering that we were about to travel to Syracuse to attend Anna's sorority charity event, I figured I'd better give this one a gander.

Whew! Anna hadn't been arrested! The email was simply informing parents of new state anti-hazing legislation, initiatives to enforce the prohibition of hard alcohol at Greek events, and an online reporting form for parents who think their students are being hazed. Apparently, eleven of the university's Greek organizations recently had their chapter rights revoked because of misconduct. Also, Dr. Muckety Muck said three outside consultants had been hired to review the school's Greek life system and report back in November with recommendations. This email was coming on the heels of other recent negative news I'd read about Greek life at colleges in the U.S. Four male fraternity-related deaths at separate universities in 2017 prompted several prominent universities to suspend all fraternities and sororities on their campuses while they conducted reviews of Greek life culture, customs and rules. The stories of frat-parties-gone-wrong were tragic, heartbreaking, and senseless. A national conversation ensued about whether Greek life is

Even before these tragic deaths, Harvard University had already decided that fraternities and sororities were persona non grata, for gender-related reasons. After two years of debate, protest and exhaustive discussion, it instituted a ban on single-gender social club members taking leadership roles in student clubs or sports, and also denied members of College recommendations for prestigious scholarships. The administration took this controversial action because it had concluded that "male-only" social organizations nurtured misogynist attitudes and promoted sexual assault on women. But ironically, Harvard's elite Crimson student newspaper reported in September that the sanctions had resulted in a dramatic decrease in sorority pledge numbers, forcing all sororities to disband by August 2018. The all-male "finals clubs" and most fraternities, who have been at Harvard for much longer and have more money and resources, survived the ban.

The Crimson editorial board stated, "[B] ecause all-female social groups counter the hostile environment inherent in a male-dominated social scene, they should be treated differently," and pointedly asked the administration, "Do you believe that the sanctions have had their desired effect? Is Harvard better off now that women's spaces are gone, while male clubs remain?"

As colleges and universities across the country consider whether or not to ban Greek life, they might consider — if the gals don't have sorority sisters to hang out with on Friday

night, they are more likely to end up drinking out of a solo cup at Sigma Chi.

And what about the charities? Every accredited fraternity and sorority participates in philanthropy. Organizations such as the USO, the Red Cross, Children's Miracle Network, Big Brothers Big Sisters, Service for Sight, Reading is Fundamental, The Arthritis Foundation, Girl Scouts USA, and many others receive thousands of dollars from Greek philanthropic events each year. Perhaps students pledge frats and sororities for purely social reasons, but the requirement that they learn and participate in philanthropy is admirable. It's sad that such contributions to charity could come to an end.

We made it to Syracuse last weekend in time to attend the Alpha Phi Red Dress Gala with Anna. It was a swirl of girls and their proud families, all decked out in red. My husband, Francis, had to pop a nerve blocker for his sciatica before he could make Anna proud on the dance floor, but winning two prize baskets in the charity raffle helped ease his pain. In the end, Anna's Alpha Phi Chapter raised \$25,000 to support women's heart health that night.

No doubt, colleges need to monitor and enforce prohibitions on excess drinking and hazing. But hopefully, Dr. Muckety Muck and other college deans will see the good in women's social organizations and won't throw the baby out with the bathwater like Harvard did.

Naval Station Newport NGIS facility nears completion, paves way for future construction

NORFOLK

The Navy Gateway Inns & Suites (NGIS) transient lodging facility on Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport, R.I. is nearing completion and making final preparations for its first guests. A ribbon-cutting ceremony is slated for Nov. 1, with doors opening to guests in the near future.

"A significant difference on this project ... this is the first NGIS – out of the ground, brand new - built as a hotel," said Kevin Coyne, Naval Facilities Engineering Command Mid-Atlantic (NAVFAC MIDLANT) Project Manager for the new facility. "Over the years [NGIS] had been adapting existing buildings previously built for unaccompanied Sailors, which is extremely difficult in terms of getting a unified brand."

The new \$48M facility, broke ground on Aug. 21, 2015 and traces its origins back to 2007 when the need for additional lodging became apparent, is the first hotel built by the Navy and the first NGIS funded entirely by funds rendered by guest room charges at NGIS locations within the Mid-Atlantic Region. The building replaces an older 100room NGIS facility on the same site and doubles the guest capacity to 200 rooms (194 standard rooms and six two-room suites). The facility not only upgrades the experience for the guests, it's fueling a new vision for NGIS as a whole that will ultimately establish its brand.

"[The building] is in a prominent position on the base, it's right inside [Gate 1] ... you can see it from the 'Pell Bridge' [Claiborne Pell/Newport Bridge]," Coyne explained. "It had to be a visual goal route and our design had to reinforce that."

The design team responsible for bringing the concept to life consisted of the architectural engineering firm Michael Baker International out of Pittsburg, Pa.; the construction firm Korte Construction Company out of St. Louis, Mo.; and was overseen by NAVFAC MIDLANT and NGIS teams. The design of the building is in line with commercial, mid-grade hotel standards found across the U.S. and features a commercial laundry operation that will handle all the

laundry needs of NGIS locations on the installation. This not only saves time and money, it increases the onsite quality control of the linen and terry products being provided

The building was designed and built with a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver standards benchmark rating as a green building to use less energy and generate lower greenhouse gas emissions. Additionally, the building has digital controls for lighting, heating and air conditioning, as well as other digital features to save energy. It has lighting zones that can be turned on and off from the front desk area for efficiency, and plenty of natural lighting in the building to reduce the dependence of additional lights.

"A lot of the materials we used are not only sustainable in terms of LEED points, but they make maintenance easier, therefore reducing the lifecycle costs," Coyne said, noting the return on investment will be achieved over the life of the products used despite the upfront costs. "... we went with a lot of treatments that provided LEED credits for a much larger vision of the overall cost of this building through its lifespan, and as a quality experience for the guests."

"Each guest room is set up with individual heat and air conditioning that will allow the guest to control the temperature in the room and complies with the DOD adequacy standards established for lodging," said Norman Aurland, the Regional Lodging Director and NGIS Project Manager. "It has all the amenities of a mid-grade hotel while providing the convenience of being on the installation, close to the TDY [temporary duty] location."

It also has the first 24-hour Navy Exchange micro mart on the East Coast within a lodging facility, equipped with a self-service kiosk that allows guests to purchase hot and cold sandwiches, hot and cold drinks, fresh fruit and various snacks.

Aurland said a lot of thought and consideration went into the design and look of the building, creating a home away from home environment, and the décor pays homage to the New England area.

"We did not stop with our vision on the installation of just building a new facility," he explained. "We also put another \$35M of

non-appropriated funds (NAF) into restoring and upgrading three additional NGIS buildings on the installation, ensuring the entire base has upgraded operations that meet or exceed DoD adequacy standards."

For NGIS, the design and functionality of the new building were a top priority and focused heavily on the overall guest experi-

"We will ensure that the military members here on TDY have a rest and relaxation opportunity while staying," Aurland said, noting each of the state-of-the-art rooms comes equipped with a comfortable queen-sized bed and soft linens, roller shades with a blackout curtain, stand-up shower, a large vanity with mirrors, a 49 inch flatscreen TV, hairdryer, iron and ironing board, microwave and micro fridge, Keurig coffee maker with all the fixings, a bar sink, free WiFi and hardwired Internet access in all rooms, and furnishings throughout that enhances the building décor.

Free WiFi is also available throughout the building and in the common areas, and the on-site Business Center is equipped with both NMCI and non-NMCI computers to allow guests to check their e-mail and browse the Internet.

"We spent a lot of time crafting all aspects of the facility, from the clerestory check-in area, the individual guest rooms, to the twostory lobby/lounge where Sailors can relax by the fireplace," Coyne said. "... as well as an outdoor patio where guests can barbecue or relax by the water."

Coyne said this project will serve as an inspiration and platform for additional projects in the future.

"If we can do it here, let's do it everywhere," he said. "Our Sailors deserve a quality guest experience. This is a shining example of when we put our best effort forward, we can really get great results!"

Although this is the first hotel built by the Navy, it will not be the last. There are projects in the pipeline to build similar facilities in Mayport and Jacksonville, Fla., and Dahlgren, Va. funded by the all-NAF concept. NGIS is also working to eliminate smaller facilities that are no longer efficient or needed to right-size their inventory.

"Rather than putting large amounts of money into renovating smaller buildings, we will look heavily at the replacement and consolidation [of NGIS buildings] on an installation where it makes financial sense," Aurland explained. "If we can take an installation that has three NGIS buildings and consolidate them into one, it's a cost savings for the program and a savings of land usage ... it brings all of our lodging operations into a campus-style environment for our TDY travelers."

NGIS provides lodging for official travelers and families of the DoD military and civilian workforce worldwide, and offers lodging on a space-available basis for the leisure traveler. The NGIS program utilizes a combination of installation lodging, and local community lodging for overflow that cannot be accommodated on the installation, to handle the needs of the official traveler.

Naval Station Newport is the Navy's Center of Excellence for Officer and Senior Enlisted education and development, with more than 17,000 students attending schools onboard the installation annually.

U.S. successfully conducts SM-3 Block IIA Intercept Test

Sailors aboard USS John Finn (DDG 113) and the Missile Defense Agency (MDA) successfully conducted an intercept of a medium-range ballistic missile target with a Standard Missile-3 (SM-3) Block IIA missile during a flight test off the west coast of Hawaii, Oct. 26.

The SM-3 Block IIA is being developed cooperatively by the U.S. and Japan and operates as part of the Aegis Ballistic Missile Defense system.

The target missile was launched from the Pacific Missile Range Facility at Kauai, Hawaii. John Finn detected and tracked the target missile with its onboard AN/SPY-1 radar using the Aegis Baseline 9.C2 weapon system. Upon acquiring and tracking the target, the ship launched an SM-3 Block IIA guided missile which intercepted the target.

"This was a superb accomplishment and key milestone for the SM-3 Block IIA return to flight," said MDA Director Lt. Gen. Sam Greaves. "My congratulations to the entire team, including our Sailors, industry partners and allies who helped achieve this milestone."

Based on observations and initial data review, the test met its objectives. Program officials will continue to evaluate system performance.

Aegis Ballistic Missile Defense is the naval component of the U.S. Ballistic Missile Defense System. The MDA and the U.S. Navy cooperatively manage the Aegis BMD program. The Missile Defense Agency's mission is to develop and deploy a layered ballistic missile defense system to defend the U.S., its deployed forces, allies and friends from ballistic missile attacks of all ranges in all phases of flight.

Pence, Shanahan detail progress made in Space Force

WASHINGTON

Space is a crucial domain that the United States must continue to exploit and lead in, said Vice President Mike Pence at the fourth meeting of the National Space Council at Fort Lesley J. McNair, Oct. 24.

"Space is a warfighting domain, just like the land, air and sea," Pence said. "And America will be as dominant there as we are, here on Earth."

This is the basis for President Donald J. Trump's creation of the United States Space Force, which would be the sixth branch of the military, the vice president said.

Deputy Defense Secretary Patrick Shanahan called this "the next and natural evolution" of America's military. The new service "is absolutely necessary to ensure American supremacy in space," he said. "The U.S. military is the best in the world in space, but our adversaries have taken note and are actively developing and fielding capabilities to potentially deny our usage of space in crisis or war."

Also pushing this is the growth in capacity and capabilities of the commercial space

industry, which has moved forward in ways never imagined, Shanahan said. "President Trump has directed that a response to the threats from adversaries and the opportunities of commercial space be combined to generate a solution — the Space Force," he said.

The department will submit a legislative proposal in the coming weeks, and the deputy secretary called that "a significant lift."

"The legislative proposal will embody our guiding principles, speed and effectiveness," he said. "Speed in leveraging commercial space technology and resources. Speed in escaping red tape. Speed in fielding capabilities sooner. It will reflect our drive to be more effective — effective in maximizing how we are more integrated technically to unlock our ability to be united in our space operations. Effective in creating a solution, and then together — not singularly — leveraging the solutions across the enterprise. Effective in how we structure the Space Force."

The department is also working on the Space Development Agency. The agency will leverage technology, standards, and architecture to enable unparalleled integration,

he said. "The effort now is on reconciling capabilities prioritized by the National Defense Strategy with the readiness of technology, anchored by our assumptions on how quickly we can scale," Shanahan said.

Air Force Gen. Paul Selva, the vice chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, told the council that all members of the Joint Chiefs support the stand up of a combatant command for space. The command will focus DOD activities and the department's development of doctrine, tactics, techniques and procedures in the domain. The command will also focus discussions on "the authorities, responsibilities, and rules of engagement for conduct in space, for the conduct of defensive and offensive operations to protect our constellation, to fight our constellation, and to support our war fighters in all domains, and across all domains, as we protect our ability to deploy civil, commercial, and military space, to the benefit of the nation," Selva said.

Seeking Strategic Advantage

This is needed, said Sue Gordon, the deputy director of national intelligence. "The intelligence community applauds the redoubled emphasis on ensuring and protecting our strategic advantage in this domain that is so necessary to our national interests," she said. "But it's a strategic advantage that our adversaries and competitors would seek to diminish.

Intelligence analysts believe Russia and China continue to focus on establishing operational forces designed to attack U.S. space systems. "Space is a priority warfighting domain for them, as demonstrated by the creation of dedicated space organizations over the past several years," she said. "Russian and Chinese destructive antisatellite weapons will probably reach initial operating capability in the next few years. And both these countries are advancing directed energy weapons technologies for the purpose of fielding anti-satellite weapons that could blind or damage our sensitive spacebased optical sensors, such as those used for remote sensing or missile defense."

Russia and China also continue to launch experimental satellites to advance counterspace capabilities. "If a future conflict were to occur involving Russia or China, either country would probably justify attacks against U.S. and allied satellites as necessary to offset any perceived U.S. military advantage derived from military, civil or commercial space systems," she said.

NMRC Researchers present findings at annual meeting on tropical medicine and hygiene

Naval Medical Research Center (NMRC) researchers and their colleagues from across the Navy Medicine Research and Development Enterprise presented their latest findings at the American Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene's (ASTMH) Annual Meeting Oct. 28 – Nov. 1.

The meeting was held at the Sheraton New Orleans and New Orleans Marriott, and focused on research related to tropical medicine and disease, hygiene, and global health.

"At NMRC and throughout the Naval Medical Research and Development Enterprise, we give great attention to the distinct infectious diseases countermeasure needs of Navy and Marine Corps," said Dr. Kevin Porter, director, Infectious Diseases Directorate. "We are unmistakably committed to exploring newer and better ways to improve the readiness of our Sailors and Marines who operate in areas of the world where potentially mission-aborting infectious diseases exist."

During workshops, poster presentations, meetings, and lectures the researchers discussed their work on sepsis, dengue, multidrug resistant bacteria, malaria, and other infectious diseases, and were joined by colleagues from across the entire Navy Medicine research and development enterprise. They highlighted their innovative work and discussed how current research improves

mission readiness. Topics included:

"Countering the threat of antibiotic-resistance: bacteriophage based approaches"

"Prevalence of Dengue virus, Chikungunya virus, and Zika virus determined through Enhanced Surveillance of Emerging Infectious Diseases in Malaysia"

"A study on field testing insecticide-treated barrier screens for protection from hostseeking, exophilic mosquitoes in the northern Peruvian Amazon"

Lt. Cmdr. Nicholas Martin, deputy director, Defense Malaria Assistance Program, Naval Medical Research Center – Asia traveled from Singapore. He delivered an update to research being achieved on the epidemiology of imported malaria cases in Vietnam among returning nationals.

"Resistance to anti-malarial drugs threatens to shrink the arsenal of treatments available to the Department of Defense (DoD)," Martin said. "Malaria, invisible to rapid diagnostic tests, presents a direct threat to the warfighter and to the many tools used by the DoD to detect malaria."

A key contributor to NMRC's success in tropical medicine and hygiene is its Infectious Diseases Directorate (IDD). The directorate consists of four research departments: Malaria, Enteric Diseases, Viral and Rickettsia Diseases, and Wound Infections.

"In IDD, we are working to find better preventive measures, diagnostics, and treatments for the infectious diseases that have the greatest impact on the military. The pathogens we are working on have the potential to

disable a large number of deployed forces in a very short time, and seriously impact mission readiness and execution. Most of them are major tropical public health concerns, such as malaria, dengue, and other arthropod-borne viruses, and bacterial diarrhea, which is also called traveler's diarrhea," said Cmdr. Stockelman, deputy director, Infectious Diseases Directorate. "We also have a program to address the antibiotic resistance crisis in wound infections. Because these are global diseases, it's really valuable for us to come to ASTMH and bring together the investigators from across our Enterprise and the whole tropical medicine field."

As the largest scientific organization of experts dedicated to reducing the burden of infectious disease, the ASTMH Annual Meeting draws more than 4,000 attendees from around the world and provides an opportunity for tropical medicine and global health professionals, military personnel, researchers, industry leaders, and academics to exchange scientific knowledge and information

Months of training toward healing have paid off for fourteen Navy wounded warriors representing the nation and Team USA at the 2018 Invictus Games, an international adaptive multi-sport event currently being held in Sydney, Australia.

The Navy athletes are able to compete in the Invictus Games as part of their enrollment in the Navy's Wounded Warrior - Safe Harbor program, which is managed by Navy Installations Command (CNIC) and coordinates non-medical care of seriously wounded, ill and injured Sailors and Coast Guardsmen, and provides resources and support to their families.

"We have many of resources for our Sailors in the Navy, and it's important for the fleet to have awareness of Navy Wounded Warrior's mission," said Vice Adm. Mary Jackson, Commander, Navy Installations Command. "There are local elements to the program, which include not only adaptive sports, but many other non-medical resources. If there is a Sailor who is eligible, then we absolutely want to get them enrolled."

More than 550 wounded, ill and injured

servicemen and women from 17 allied nations competing in the international competition --going head-to-head in archery, athletics (track and field), indoor rowing, powerlifting, road cycling, sitting volleyball, swimming, wheelchair basketball, wheelchair tennis, wheelchair rugby, golf and sail-

Among those athletes is Hospital Corpsman 1st Class Carlos Valerio, who contributes his continued healing to the Navy Wounded Warrior program.

"I can't thank Navy Wounded Warrior -Safe Harbor enough for what they have done for me," said Valerio. "It has been instrumental in my recovery and helping me return to duty after my illness."

The competitions are taking place across Sydney at venues including the Olympic Park facilities, the location of the 2000

"We have a special relationship with our Australian partners, and it's been a rewarding visit strengthening our ties," said Jackson. "Seeing the power of sport and all that our athletes on the US team have accomplished this week is beyond inspiring."



Approximately 10,000 U.S. service members from commands such as U.S. Pacific Fleet, U.S. Forces Japan, 7th Fleet, 5th Air Force, 374th Airlift Wing, 18th Wing, 35th Fighter Wing, and III Marine Expeditionary Force will take part.

Two Royal Canadian Navy ships will participate in the maritime portion of the exercise for the first time, along with observers from several other partner nations. Martinez said, "These developments are a positive sign of our shared interest in expanding partnerships and increasing multilateral cooperation in the Indo-

Pacific." The U.S.-Japan alliance has been the cornerstone of regional peace and security in the Indo-Pacific region for nearly 60 years, and events like Keen Sword ensure that we will remain ready for the next sixty years," Martinez added.

Toto guitarist, Steve Lukather, celebrates 40 year career with tour and book release

The band brings its 40 Trips Around The Sun tour to Sandler Center Tuesday night

Toto guitarist, and long-time session ace, Steve Lukather has stories. . .lots of stories – and after 40 years of writing, recording and performing with Toto, he's compiled them into a book to share with us all. "The Gospel According to Luke" released last month, is an entertaining, inside look at the Los Angeles music scene in the 70s and 80s, as well as a great window into Lukather's life journey. Pair that with the fact Toto will be performing in Virginia Beach on Nov. 6 at the Sandler Center, and you've got somewhat of the per-

Obviously, Toto is known for a string of hits including "Africa," "Rosanna," and "Hold The Line," however the band's story goes much deeper than their own music. The band, and its members were and integral part of the musical fabric of the 70s and 80s, as studio players in the LA music scene, playing on thousands of records.

As a studio guitarist, Lukather was 'the guy' on so many hit records in the late 70s and 80s, that it'd be almost impossible to have never heard his talents. . . whether you realized it or not. He traded solos with Eagles guitarist, Joe Walsh, on Don Henley's "Dirty Laundry." His guitar solo on Lionel Richie's "Running With The Night" was recorded while Luke was literally warming up, playing to the track in the studio. After playing over the changes, and getting a feel for the song, Luke told the engineer he was ready to record. . .however the engineer informed him that he was already recording, and got the solo he needed! Remember The Tubes (band from the 80s)? Steve wrote and recorded the guitar parts on the hit "She's a Beauty." He's recorded guitar parts for Cher, Richard Marx, Chicago, Kenny Loggins, Kenny Rogers, Boz Scaggs, Quincy Jones, and literally thousands of others. It would almost be easier to list the artists he hasn't played with than the ones who he has played with.

Undoubtedly, the most famous session Lukather (and Toto) is known for, is his contributions to the most successful album of all time — Michael Jackson's "Thriller." Most music aficionados know that it was Eddie Van Halen who played the guitar solo in Jackson's "Beat It," however most aren't aware that Lukather played all the other guitar parts on the song. . .as well as the majority of the rest of the al-

To say that his contribution to recorded music was massive would be an understatement.



Now, in celebration of the band's 40 year career, Toto is bringing their 40 Trips Around The Sun tour to Hampton Roads. Few ensembles in the history of recorded music have individually or collectively left a larger imprint on pop culture than the members of Toto. The band has sold over 40 million albums and have over half a billion streams worldwide as

"Myself, David, Steve and Joseph are humbled and thrilled at the long lasting success of the band," Steve Lukather remarked. "This 40th Anniversary tour is going to be a special one for us and all of the fans that come out."




