Ready, Aim, Hire! NAVSUP WSS **Recruitment Readiness Team wins** hiring challenge

The NAVSUP Weapon Systems Support Recruitment Readiness Team tied for first place in the U.S. Naval Air Systems Command-sponsored hiring challenge which culminated at a hiring summit in Norfolk, Va. The team's innovative ideas were selected over 46 other entries from six systems commands and the Office of Civilian Human Resources.

Teams were challenged to redesign the hiring process to reduce hiring cycle time to a goal of 45 days or less, from the time a request for personnel action is initiated

to the time a candidate is on-board. Recent figures showed the average hiring time was

approximately 88 days. When the challenge was issued in July of this year, 46 teams applied to be part of the competition. Through a series of status checkpoints required in the challenge, teams were eliminated based on progress. As teams and ideas were narrowed down, NAVSUP WSS was among an elite group of seven semifinalists. From there, four teams were selected and advanced to the finals.

Finalists were invited to attend a hiring summit in Norfolk, Va., Nov. 7-8. The NAVSUP WSS Recruitment Readiness

All your Open Season questions answered

Open season is Nov. 12 to Dec. 10. TRI-CARE Open Season is for enrollment in a TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select health plan. Federal Benefits Open Season is for vision coverage or retiree dental coverage through the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program (FEDVIP).

If you're enrolled in a TRICARE health plan and don't want to make any changes, you don't have to do anything. If you have TRICARE Retiree Dental Program (TRDP), provided by Delta Dental, and want dental coverage in 2019, you will need to choose a FEDVIP dental plan. TRDP ends on Dec.

Take the time now to learn about eligibility, plan options, and enrollment. Learn more on the Open Season page. If you and your family want to make changes to your TRI-CARE health benefit, take action during the 2018 open season.

Here are a few frequently asked questions about open season.

Q: Does TRICARE Open Season affect me?

A: TRICARE Open Season affects you if you're eligible to enroll in a TRICARE

Prime or TRICARE Select health plan. The TRICARE Open Season doesn't apply if you're using:

- TRICARE For Life
- TRICARE Reserve Select
- TRICARE Retired Reserve
- TRICARE Young Adult
- Continued Health Care Benefit Program Q: What happens if I don't change

health plans during the TRICARE Open

A: If you don't change health plans during the TRICARE Open Season and remain eligible, you'll stay in the plan you're in now.

Q: Will I still get eye exam coverage through TRICARE Prime?

A: TRICARE Prime eye exam coverage isn't changing. Routine eye exams are covered as needed for active duty service members, once a year for active duty family members, and every two years for all other TRICARE Prime beneficiaries. Diabetic patients with TRICARE Prime coverage get routine eye exams once a year. For more information, visit the TRICARE Eye Exams

Vision plans available through FEDVIP are in addition to TRICARE vision cover-

age. If you're eligible and choose to enroll, your FEDVIP vision coverage will be your primary vision insurance. TRICARE will pay second after FEDVIP.

Q: Am I required to enroll in both dental and vision plans with FEDVIP?

A: No. FEDVIP dental and vision plans are optional. However, enrollment in a TRI-CARE health plan is required in order to enroll in a FEDVIP vision plan.

Q: How do I enroll in FEDVIP?

A: Enroll in a FEDVIP plan online through the BENEFEDS enrollment portal.

Q: If I'm currently paying my premium by allotment to Delta Dental through the TRICARE Retiree Dental Program, how do I transfer my allotment?

A: Delta Dental will terminate your allotment for your 2018 TRDP coverage after your December premium is paid. You don't need to do anything to start an allotment for FEDVIP. When you enroll in a FEDVIP plan, you'll answer questions about your eligibility, payments, and allotments.

Q: Will I have a waiting period for services like orthodontics?

A: Each FEDVIP dental plan is unique. Some plans may have waiting periods for orthodontics or other specialty services. Some plans offer orthodontic coverage without a 12-month waiting period or age limit. Visit the FEDVIP website for more information.



NAS Oceana promotes safety during colder months

VIRGINIA BEACH, VA.

Naval Air Station Oceana held a Fall and Winter Safety Stand-Down during the first week of November to provide base personnel with the appropriate information to promote safety during the coming fall and winter months.

Household fires, carbon monoxide poisoning, and cooking accidents are common during the colder months, and the NAS Oceana Safety Office held a presentation to help prevent these incidents.

NAS Oceana Fire Prevention Inspector, John Cirillo, discussed fire prevention and carbon monoxide safety during the presen-

Carbon monoxide (CO) is an odorless, colorless gas that kills without warning. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), CO poisoning claims the lives of hundreds of people every year and makes thousands more ill.

Heating furnaces, fireplaces and portable generators all produce CO.

Cirillo said it is important for people to know the symptoms of CO poisoning so they could remove themselves from a potentially deadly situation.

According to the CDC, the most common symptoms of CO poisoning are flu-like, and can include headaches, dizziness, weakness, upset stomach, vomiting, chest pain and confusion.

"If you are in your living room and start

feeling the flu-like symptoms, don't just open a window and sit near it," said Cirillo. "Leave your house immediately and call 9-1-1."

Cirillo recommends installing CO detectors near every sleeping area of your home to provide a warning if CO levels rise while you are sleeping.

In addition to installing and testing existing detectors, it is important to have your heating systems inspected and maintained by a professional to prevent CO leaks and

"If you have a fireplace in your home, have your chimney cleaned by a professional and keep a record of it," said Cirillo. "The cleaning logs you can buy in a hardware store are not enough."

Though it is important to practice fire prevention and safety when it comes to heating your home, cooking is the leading cause of home structure fires and fire injuries, according to the National Fire Protection Agency.

Unattended cooking is the leading factor contributing to these fires, while frying poses the greatest risk of fire.

Cirillo said to avoid cooking while drowsy or intoxicated, and recommends always staying near whatever you are cooking to monitor for any danger.

If a fire does break out while you are cooking on a stovetop, the NFPA recommends smothering the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner, leaving the pan covered until it is completely cooled. For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

Cirillo said to call the fire department even if you think you extinguished a fire completely.

The winter holidays are a great time to take a break from work to spend time with your family. However, it is important to remember winter safety guidelines to keep yourself and your loved ones safe during the holiday season.

NETC employee earns Meritorious Civilian Service Award for Sailor 2025 RRL contributions

Rear Adm. Kyle Cozad, commander of Naval Education and Training Command (NETC), presented Robert Monette with the Department of the Navy Meritorious Civilian Service Award, during an all-hands call with NETC's Virginia Beach staff Nov. 6.

As the deputy director of NETC's Fleet Integration, Learning and Development Division (N7), Monette played a key role as a primary architect for Ready, Relevant Learning (RRL) as part of Sailor 2025, the Navy's program to more effectively recruit, develop, manage, reward and retain the force of tomorrow.

On any given day, Monette's leadership and vision improved training and education processes and programs supporting the development and provision of initial skills training to more than 30,000 Sailors.

"Mr. Monette's ability to process complex information, conduct thorough analysis, and provide senior leadership with actionable information has made him an irreplaceable member of the Manpower, Personnel, Training and Education (MPT&E) team," said

Capt. John Dye, NETC N7 director. "He is without question the 'go to' civilian when it comes to training integration and development, Sailor 2025 Ready, Relevant Learning and Block Learning."

Monette oversaw the design and implementation of the RRL phase one process of Block Learning, which changes the Navy's current practice of front-loading individual rating training to a more disbursed, modular delivery that will span across a Sailor's career-long learning continuum. His team conducted the subsequent meticulous analysis of 77 ratings, 788 training paths and 813 unique courses of instruction. As a result, U.S. Fleet Forces Command, as the executive agent for RRL, approved 54 Block Learning reports, which paves the way for the next steps in the RRL process.

"His efforts laid the foundation for the over-arching goals of Ready, Relevant Learning and the future of Navy modernized training delivery," said Dye, who explained that Monette's expertise in the science of learning is also what led to his selection to represent NETC as the training subject matter expert on the Chief of Naval Personnel's Strategic Integration Group that developed the concept and design of the Sailor 2025

NAVSUP FLC Norfolk completes transition to new Navy Cash Cards

The NAVSUP FLC Norfolk Navy Cash Fleet Support Group completed a year-long effort to re-card the ships of the Atlantic Fleet to new Navy Cash Cards in October, as part of transferring responsibility for Navy Cash Cards from JPMorgan Chase to the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston (FRBB).

According to Hugh Chin, the effort involved 57 ships in the command's area of responsibility, with more than 45 thousand Sailors receiving new Navy Cash Cards. He says each ship required a five phase process that included:

- 1. Coordinating ship availability
- 2. Conduct an executive brief 30 to 60 days in advance
- 3. A scrub of the ship's roster and the placing of a card order 60 days in advance
- 4. Complete on site re-carding
- 5. An update each Sailor's profile and transmission of data to FRBB to complete account update

"Re-carding required a face-to-face process where the team had to confirm full dates of birth and obtain civilian emails from each Sailor in order to comply with federal regulation requirements," Chin explained. "After a ship is re-carded the team had to update each member's profile then transfer data to the Federal Reserve Bank for validation and completion of update to each member's account."

He added that the process time varied from ship to ship, with a small ship taking two days on average and a large deck ship taking about four.

The Navy Cash card is a branded debit card that looks like a typical debit or check card. Navy Cash combines a chip-based electronic purse (stored-value function) with the traditional magnetic stripe (debit card and ATM function). The electronic purse replaces currency aboard ship.

The process allows Sailors to continue to have the capabilities of the Navy Cash Card, to now include the ability to receive an electronic receipt for each transaction off ship. Additionally, Sailors will now be offered access to several thousand additional ATMs worldwide due to partnership with FRBB and PNC Bank.

Chin explained that approximately three years ago, JPMorgan Chase (JPMC) decided to leave the Navy Cash program. Since that announcement, the Navy Cash Team has been planning for the transition to the

Federal Reserve Bank of Boston (FRBB), which will take over as the Treasury's overall operations manager for the Navy Cash program. Additionally, PNC Bank (PNC) has been brought on board to take over as the open-loop provider for the MasterCard pre-paid debit feature on Navy Cash cards.

A HELPING HAND BACK HOME

Eighteen years ago, a young man came to America. But, for a while, he didn't know if he would ever make it to his parents' side in Virginia, the place his parents called home after leaving

For Chief Hospital Corpsman Manuel Aponte-Blanco, a lab technician assigned to the hospital ship USNS Comfort (T-AH 20), this was his reality.

"My future was in limbo as I was waiting to come to America," said Aponte-Blanco. "My parents left for America, and my siblings and I were waiting for the day they saved enough to bring us to our new home."

"I remember my mother telling me that I wasn't able to get a job yet," said Aponte-Blanco. "So, I went back to school for two years. That's where I learned and comprehended most of my English, and I made friends through playing soccer."

Upon his graduation from high school, Aponte-Blanco found the United States Navy, where he signed his contract as a Hospital Corpsman.

"I was a painter and a cleaner before joining the Navy," said Aponte-Blanco. "I always wanted to be a doctor in Peru, and I wanted to further my education, so I joined the Navy as a Hospital Corpsman."

Aponte-Blanco has found great personal achievement while being attached to Comfort during the Enduring Promise 2018 initiative.

"It's all about helping people," said Aponte-Blanco about the mission. "I don't know how to explain it, but in my heart, I know that I'm feeling great about this mission."

Aponte-Blanco is the Chief Lab Technician aboard the ship. His role is to manage the laboratory and make sure that all processes are completed on time for the shipboard patients and at host nation medical sites.

On Thursday, Nov. 8, 2018, 29 candidates for US Citizenship crossed the gangway to board the USS Wisconsin (BB 64). It's a sight that is repeated daily, as the ship hosts re-enlistments, retirements and promotions on her ageless teak decks. But this group of service members crossing the gangway was unique. Twenty-seven of them were in the U.S. Navy, one in the U.S. Army and another in the U.S. Air Force; for a total of twenty nine service members. All 29 were service members in active service. They came from all points in the globe including: the Philippines, Jamaica, Ghana, Nigeria, China, Vietnam, Congo, Kenya, Federated States of Micronesia, Togo and Burkina Faso. Each stopped before the gangway ended, faced aft to render honors to the national ensign and headed aft to the

They all boarded the Iowa-Class Battleship as immigrants, and they would depart the ship later that day as U.S. Citizens, in an iconic and historic naturalization ceremony for service members. The ceremony was hosted by the Hampton Roads Naval Museum, in

proud partnership with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, the U.S. District Court of Eastern Virginia, Nauticus and the City of Norfolk. This was the first time in more than a decade that so many service members would earn their naturalization certificates aboard the Wisky.

The naturalization ceremony was presided over by the Honorable Henry Coke Morgan, Jr, U.S. District Court Judge for the Eastern District of Virginia. Morgan provided some opening remarks and noted with eloquence that naturalization ceremonies are "one of the favorite ceremonies that judges in our court have to perform; today, we get to rule in favor of everybody."

Thereafter, candidates for citizenship stood at attention and rendered a salute as Fotu Misa, an Immigration Services Officer with the Norfolk Office of the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, performed the National Anthem. Virginia Van Valkenburg, Assistant United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia formally presented the candidates for citizenship; and noted that "each candidate has been examined under Oath by a designated official of the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services and has been found eligible in all respects." The Oath of

Allegiance was recited by candidates, and Roberta Gribble, Vice Regent for the Great Bridge Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, led the candidates in reciting the American's

Afterwards, the ceremony's guest speakers, Taneisha Kelly, an Immigration Services Officer, took to the podium. Kelly remarked on her own journey to become an Immigration Services Officer and included some resonating remarks in her speech. Kelly noted that "America is now your land. America needs your fresh perspective, and your cultural contributions." Thereafter, a folder of naturalization certificates was brought to the podium, and each service member was called to the front. They walked excitedly towards the front, and many fought back tears. The certificates were presented to each candidate, and each returned to their seats with a broad smile across their face. Judge Morgan concluded the ceremony and provided some closing remarks. After a plethora of handshakes, hugs, pictures with family members and members of their

Residents can help protect our local waterways

This article serves as part one in a four article-series on everyday habits residents can adopt to prevent pollution from storm-water runoff and to protect our local waterways.

Have you ever wondered what you can do to help protect the rivers, streams, and waterways near your home? These water bodies supply our drinking water, provide us with recreational activities and beautiful scenery. This four-part series provides information about common sources of pollution from everyday activities and, habits you can adopt to prevent water pollution.

Storm-water runoff results when rain cannot soak into the ground because of impervious surfaces such as roads and rooftops. Storm-water pollution results when storm-water picks up, carries, and discharges various pollutants into storm drains or ditches, and ultimately into the downstream waterways. Pollutants

include items such as pesticides, fertilizers, construction site sediments, pet waste, litter, and other items.

First, it is important to understand the difference between the sanitary system and the storm drain system. The illustration shows how water from our sinks, showers and bathtubs, clothes washing machines, and dish washers all enter the sanitary system via pipes that are connected to a wastewater treatment plant. Pollutants from these waters then are removed by the treatment plant before being discharged.


By contrast, storm-water, which runs off our rooftops, driveways, roads, and lawns, enters into the storm drain system and discharges directly to nearby streams, lakes or bays without receiving any treatment.

You may have noticed decals near storm drains indicating that the storm drains flow directly to a nearby waterway. NAVFAC Mid-Atlantic installs these decals to educate residents and

employees of the Navy installations on

storm-water pollution prevention. Common sources of pollution in the storm-water runoff from our lawns include pet waste, fertilizers, pesticides, lawn clippings and leaves, and other substances which may be left uncovered (such as dirt piles, salt piles, paints, oils, etc.). In addition, car maintenance activities such as oil changes and car washing can contribute to storm-water pollution when oil and detergent run into the gutter. Remember to collect all used oil and dispose of it properly. When washing a car, it's better to wash on grass, which filters the contaminants, or to use a commercial car wash.

Guam Son killed during World War II comes home

The solemnity of Taps and smoke from the rifle volley filled the air as Steward Mate 1st Class Ignacio Camacho Farfan's casket was lowered into the ground to his final resting place at the Guam Veterans Cemetery in Piti Nov. 8.

Nearly 80 years after the attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, and years of temporary internment, Farfan's recently identified remains were returned to his island of Guam where he was born and raised.

"Petty Officer Farfan, this veteran's cemetery will welcome you home today to your final resting place, carried on the arms of your Navy brothers and sisters, your coffin swathed in an American flag, escorted by the decedents of your family's blood line, surrounded today by an entire community," said Rear Adm. Shoshana Chatfield, commander, Joint Region Marianas. "This is where you belong, where you will be visited, where you will be revered. Petty Officer Farfan, we have the watch."



If you're not practicing abstinence, but want to be mindful of your drinking behavior, there are ways to set limits. Tracking your daily drink intake may be a helpful way to manage substance use, but can be difficult to practice in social situations. Before going to the party, have a plan and remember to be S.M.A.R.T:

- Specific. Set a drink type and number limit for yourself. If you decide to drink a beer, ask yourself what type of beer, stick to that brand and style, and don't go over your limit. Every alcohol beverage has a different alcohol content, which changes your body's response. ■ Measurable. Understand how your body
- processes alcohol to determine your specific limitations. Look at the standard drink calculator to see how different types of drinks will affect your body. ■ Attainable. Is your goal realistic for your
- lifestyle? Set a goal that you are confident and positive about achieving. ■ Relevant. Ask yourself if your goal ap-
- plies to your current surroundings. If you are at a wine-tasting event, know how much wine is enough for you.
- Time-based. Set a drinking cut-off time

■ Pier Pressure, developed by Navy Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention, offers resources to help practice responsible drinking behaviors in real life to include: a blood alcohol content (BAC) calculator; calorie and alcohol content calculators for beer, wine, spirits and popular cocktails; safe drinking tips; and direct access to local taxi searches and popular ride-sharing apps

■ VetChange, developed by the Department of Veterans Affairs, is for veterans and service members who are concerned about their drinking and how it relates to post-traumatic stress after deployment, and for all people who are interested in developing healthier drinking be-

"There are U.S. service members laid to rest at this cemetery who died while in the performance of duty in Asiawith Veteran's Day coming up, it is important to honor and remember our veterans who served our country by cleaning up the memorials and graves."

Sailors who participated in the COMREL said they felt it was great to understand the history of the site while supporting the local

"It's important that we came together as ambassadors of the U.S. Navy to support the local community," said Religious Program Specialist 2nd Class Maryann Conley, assigned to CFAY Chapel of Hope. "I learned [about] the long-standing relations between Japan and the rest of the world."

Participants also remarked that volunteering at the cemetery was a rewarding experience.

"Today was an amazing and solemn experience," said Master-at-Arms 1st Class Michelle Marcial, a security operations leading petty officer assigned to CFAY. "It feels great to be able to go out and bring a sense of betterment not only to our nation's but other [nations] past heroes."

The cemetery began in 1854 after the death of a 24-year old U.S. Marine on one of Commodore Matthew Perry's ships. Perry, who played a leading role in the opening of Japan to the West, had asked for a piece of land to bury the Marine. Following negotiations, the government offered Perry land within the Zotokuin temple in Yokohama village with a view overlooking the

The cemetery covers more than four acres and consists of approximately 5,000 names and about 3,000 tombstones marking the resting place of foreigners from 41 na-

In addition to CFAY, the forward deployed naval forces commands in Yokosuka were represented by Sailors assigned to Commander Naval Surface Group Western Pacific, Information Warfare Training Site Yokosuka, Defense Logistics Agency Yokosuka, Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet Navy Data Center, Naval Computer and Telecommunications Station Far East, Naval Supply Systems Command Fleet Logistics Center, USS Antietam (CG 54), USS Barry (DDG 52), USS Milius (DDG 69), USS Mustin (DDG 89) and USS Shiloh (CG 67).

When Hurricane Michael hit Florida's Gulf Coast Oct. 10, Gary Churchwell, a division head at the Naval Surface Warfare Center in Panama City, Florida, and his family evacuated to Mobile, Alabama, to wait out the storm. When it was safe to return, they came home to fallen trees, downed power lines, their roof and ceilings collapsed, and their family home

Navy, NASA complete underway recovery test 7

SAN DIEGO

The San Antonio-class amphibious transport dock ship USS John P. Murtha (LPD 26) successfully completed test recovery operations of NASA's mock Orion capsule,

The Underway Recovery Test-7 (URT-7) is part of a U.S. government interagency effort to safely retrieve the Orion crew module, which is capable of carrying humans into deep space.

This marks the first completion of a URT aboard John P. Murtha. NASA engineers worked alongside Sailors from the John P. Murtha, Special Boat Team 12, and Navy divers from Mobile Diving Salvage Unit 11 and Explosive Ordnance Disposal Mobile Unit 3 to test recovery operations of the Orion test article. Tests were conducted throughout the day and night in varying sea states.

"John P. Murtha was tasked to assist NASA with their seventh Underway Recovery Test. Our crew executed of every assignment given to them flawlessly and their recovery-at-sea experience and dedication directly contributed to our overall mission success," said Capt. Tony Roach, commanding officer USS John P. Murtha. "I am continually impressed and proud of the outstanding efforts of my crew members during each and every evolution."

San Antonio-class ships have distinctive capabilities essential to NASA's mission. One of the more important capabilities is the ship's ability to recover the test capsule using the ship's well deck, designed to launch and recover amphibious craft. John P. Murtha also has the ability to carry and deploy multiple small boats to assist in the recovery process of the capsule, and an advanced medical facility ideal for treating returning astronauts.

The tests allowed NASA and the Navy to continue to demonstrate and evaluate the recovery processes, procedures, hardware and personnel in a realistic open-ocean environment before conducting ac-

CARAT Exercise kicks off with US, **Brunei Navies**

The U.S. and Royal Brunei Navies commenced the 24th annual Cooperation Afloat Readiness and Training (CARAT) maritime exercise at Muara Naval Base, Brunei, Nov. 12.

The sea phase will take place in the South China Sea with ships and aircrafts from both partner navies including the expeditionary fast transport ship USNS Fall River (T-EPF-4) and a P-8A Poseidon maritime patrol aircraft. Evolutions at-sea will include a tracking exercise (TRACK-EX) aimed at increasing both navies' ability to together track and pursue targets through the coordinated deployment of surface ships and maritime patrol aircrafts, anti-air warfare (AAW) exercise to increase proficiency in missile defense, and division tactics (DIVTACS) designed to enhance communication as ships sail together in complex maneuvers.

"The U.S. Navy remains forward and engaged with regional partners by developing mutual capabilities to address shared maritime security priorities and concerns," said Rear Adm. Joey Tynch, Commander Task Force 73. "Our combined ability to effectively operate out at sea in any maritime environment demonstrates our rapidly growing partnership and unwavering commitment to ensuring freedom of navigation and respect for international law."





"Personally, I have learned a lot in the time we've spent together," said See. "I'm really impressed with the way the Navy trains their personnel and the level of knowledge your individual corpsman has. I can positively say that these days we spent with your corpsman will definitely affect the way we train in the future. For me, this is the main purpose of

Winkle found the training beneficial for both services.

"Seeing how the Norwegian medevac platoons are set up and how they operate was an amazing experience, Winkle said. "Even though we operate differently, we were able to integrate seamlessly to perform our mission of saving lives."

According to Lt. Cmdr. Joseph Moore, CAS Surgeon for Camp Frigaard, Winkle's contribution cannot be overstated.





and worked for Capt. Henry B. Price Elementary School in Mangilao before enlisting in the U.S. Navy in September 1939 at 19-years old.

He was killed in action at the age of 21 while serving aboard the battleship USS Oklahoma (BB 37) during the attack on Pearl Harbor. He was interred with 429 of his shipmates in unknown graves at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific in Honolulu.

"Our lost sheep has been found," said Guam Gov. Eddie Calvo said in reference to Biblical scripture. "It is now time to celebrate and welcome him home, and to give thanks to him and to so many who've paid the ultimate sacrifice for the paradise we live in. Eternal rest be granted onto Ignacio."

Following remarks from military and local leadership, Sen. Therese Terlaje, speaker of Guam's 34th Legislature, and her colleagues presented a legislative resolution to Farfan's family, and a final salute was rendered by the Guam Air Force Veterans Association.

As the memorial service ended, six Sailors from the JRM honor detail donned in dress whites carried Farfan's casket to his final resting place as a Chamoru blessing was of-

The Guam National Guard funeral detail rendered military honors with a 21-gun salute and a bugler who performed the eight

Machinist's Mate (Weapons) 1st Class Niels Gimenez, assigned to the Los Angelesclass submarine USS Oklahoma City (SSN 723), held the national ensign to his heart as he approached Farfan's niece Julia Farfan Tedtaotao, to present her with the American flag as a symbol of gratitude for her uncle's service and sacrifice.

"This is where he belongs," Tedtaotao said. "God knows that he served his country well. He died for his country because he loved his country. He's really a brave man. All the good ones go first. When the time comes, we'll be there. We love you."

Farfan's remains were identified earlier this year as part of a Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency project, which sought to identify the service members who died during the Dec. 7 attack.

He returned home on the evening of Nov. 5, escorted by Tedtaotao, and her son and

became an official American holiday. Arrayed below are selected Navy Thanksgiving menus from NHHC's collections that span the first half of the 20th century. Although some dishes ("Mayonnaise Salad" on battleship Arizona in 1917; "Baked Spiced Spam à la Capitaine de Vaisseau"
