MEMORIAL SERVICE HELD FOR OSCAR J. TEMORES

A memorial service for Master-at-Arms 3rd Class Oscar J. Temores was held on Joint Expeditionary Base Little Creek-Fort Story, Jan. 23.

The memorial service honored Temores, a native of Lemoore, Calif., who died after his patrol car was struck while responding to a civilian gate runner on Fort Story

Capt. Joey Frantzen, commander, JEBLCFS, offered words of comfort to Temores' friends, family and all in

"It's important that each of his co-workers and the command have the opportunity to have some closure but also to honor and recognize how much he meant to us," said Frantzen. "Not just in his final act but throughout his

Temores' family was presented the Law Enforcement Medal of Honor to recognize his service in the law enforcement community and for making the ultimate sacrifice, said Frantzen.

The memorial included remarks from Master-at-Arms 3rd Class Derek Lopez, Master-at-Arms 1st Class Luke Mathias and Master-at-Arms 1st Class Garrett Williams, all of whom worked with Temores and considered him a friend. Each spoke of the witty and infectious personality he exhibited in and outside of work.

"It was a big loss for my watch team," said Williams, Temores' watch commander. "He was bright and brought a lot of morale into the shop, it's almost unexplainable."

The ceremony concluded with a gun salute and the playing of taps.

Temores is survived by his wife and their 2-year-old

2019 JAG Legalman of the Year and Naval Legal Service Command Sailor/Marine of the Year

Leaders of the Navy and Marine Corps Judge Advocate General (JAG) communities honored the achievements and service of the top enlisted Sailors and Marines during a recognition ceremony at the Washington Navy Yard, Jan. 24.

Navy Legalman 1st Class (Surface Warfare/ Warfare/Information Warfare) Aviation Keiana K. Zinnah – who is assigned to the USS Kearsarge (LHD 3) as the Legal Officer and Executive Department Leading Petty Officerhas been named the JAG 2019 Legalman of the Year.

Marine Corps Staff Sergeant Jose L. Roman who is assigned to Naval Justice School as an instructor, course coordinator, Curriculum Development Chief, and Marines Awaiting Training Platoon Sergeant – has been selected as the Commander, Naval Legal Service Command (CNLSC) 2019 Marine of the Year.

Roman is the first enlisted Marine to be nominated and named CNLSC Marine of the

The Navy's JAG, Vice Adm. John Hannink, was joined at the event by Rear Adm. Del Crandall, CNLSC and Deputy JAG; Maj. Gen. Daniel Lecce, Staff Judge Advocate to the Commandant of the Marine Corps; and Master Chief Legalman Brook Larkins, who serves as the senior enlisted advisor to the

"Every one of [the finalists] came in here today a winner - and every single one will leave here a winner – because, at the end of the day, we are all on the same team," said Hannink. "Going forward in the future, given today's complex and challenging national security environment - more so than in the past few decades - the Navy and Marine Corps must be absolutely integrated and tied together."

The six finalists for these prestigious awards were selected from a wide pool of applicants. Twenty-seven enlisted personnel were nominated for the JAG 2019 Legalman of the Year award. Fourteen enlisted personnel were nominated for the CNLSC 2019 Sailor/Marine of the Year award.

The ceremony capped a week of rigorous interviews, as well as visits to the Pentagon, the U.S. Capitol, and the White House. It was attended by the finalists' family members, friends and colleagues.

Zinnah – who hails from Pineville, S.C. – has provided extensive legal support aboard the Kearsarge, such as processing nearly 250 military justice proceedings and 57 administrative separations, and coordinating pre-deployment workshops that resulted in 200 wills, 1,200 deployment letters and 453 powers of attorney.

"To be recognized in a pool of 27 extraordinary Legalman of the Year nominations, means the sacrifices of my family, the trust and guidance of my Sailors, peers and leadership were not in vain," said Zinnah.

Her commanding officer, Capt. Jason Rimmer, calls Zinnah a model Legalman.

The free annual virtual symposium offers Department of Defense uniformed and civilian professionals an opportunity to share innovative ideas, new trends and information in the fields of safety and occupational health and environmental protection. Offered online since 2013, the symposium has continued to grow.

"As a presenter you get the information out to a lot of people throughout the Navy and DoD. Consideration is given to presentations from all government, industry and academic agencies. Speakers can present anywhere worldwide using an internet connected device and telephone. Presentations may cover broad topics such as health and safety for disaster response and recovery, general safety, operational safety, occupational safety and health, industrial hygiene, occupational medicine, radiation and laser safety, environmental protection and other trending topics.

For those thinking about participating this year, the symposium is an opportunity to learn about latest trends, technology, best practices and interact with subject matter experts of various specialties. The symposium counts toward continuing education credits (CEUs) from an evergrowing variety of safety and occupa-

tional health, and environmental topics.

"Speakers can gain CEU's as a presenter at a conference if they have a national certification like a CIH or CSP based on the amount of time presenting at the PDS," Isaacson said. "You can also gain contacts and network through the conference after presenting when attendees email you during or after the conference to discuss a presentation."



NASO diversity committee holds Martin Luther King Jr. Day ceremony

Naval Air Station Oceana Diversity Committee held a ceremony Jan. 23 at the Hornet's Nest Galley to commemorate Martin Luther King Jr, the only nonpresident to have a national holiday in his honor.

Although King's birthday is Jan. 15th, it was formally recognized as a national

holiday in 1983 that would be celebrated on the third Monday of January each year.

Retail Services Specialist 2nd Class Zemario C. Sheppard, who recited King's famous "I Have a Dream" speech at the ceremony, spoke on the importance of recognizing King's legacy.

"It is important to recognize his impact because, a lot of times, people feel like if they try to do something, it won't make a difference," said Sheppard. "Martin Luther King Jr. was one man who put his pants on one leg at a time like everybody else. That goes to show you that if you do have a dream, if you have a 'why,' then the 'how' will work itself out."

As a civil rights activist, King held numerous inspirational marches and nonviolent protests to bring light to racial injustices in the 1950s and 1960s, and changed American society by placing black people and white people as equals instead of enemies.

King's first major civil rights action was the Montgomery Bus Boycott that was started when Rosa Parks did not give up her seat to a white man on the bus. Parks was arrested and jailed due to her actions.

The Montgomery Bus Boycott lasted for over a year and resulted in King being arrested and his home bombed. Through all obstacles, victory was won and a step toward equality was taken when segregation on the Montgomery buses ended at

"It's better to dream big and shoot for that dream, because you will affect a lot of people achieving that dream," said Sheppard, speaking on what Sailors can learn from the ceremony.



NNSY African American-ERG hosts annual MLK celebration

"King was more than a civil rights leader. He was a prophet for change," said Hardy-Harris. "He was not afraid to face what would test his faith. His efforts were catapulted into the national gaze. His non-violent campaigns were instrumental in the civil rights movement and ensuring equal rights in our country."

"Dr. King lived in constant danger for his dreams and actions. He was relentlessly harassed and jailed," she said. "Yet he persevered. He would not back down from the fight. Because he believed that what he did was right." Dr. Hardy-Harris then shared how Dr. King inspired her personally. "When I was nine years old, I had a dream of being a police officer," she said. "There were no women on TV that were black and police officers and there were no black women on the police force. People would question my dream but I didn't care. I wanted to be a police officer and help people. Just as Dr. King had a dream and fought to make it happen, so would I."


She continued, "In 1981 I was the first African American female officer assigned to the Kendall District in Miami. Within a year, I was promoted to detective and worked undercover in vice, narcotics, robbery and homicide. It was dangerous work and there were many days where I was scared for my life. But I enjoyed my career because I was making a difference. I was fulfilling a dream I had since I was a little girl. It was my destiny. Dr. King said I could do whatever I put my mind to. So I accomplished what I set out to do."

Torkelson said in closing, "At NNSY, our mission is any ship, any time, anywhere. Today's message from Dr. Hardy-Harris is about turning dreams into reality and working to honor King's legacy to guarantee equal rights and opportunities for all. In our command philosophy, we speak on the people being at the heart of our mission. We're trying to build to our fullest potential as a high performing team that treats one-another exceptionally well. By following that philosophy, we build on Care, Ownership, Respect, and Excellence - C.O.R.E. King once said, 'life's most persistent and urgent question - what are you doing for others?' I encourage each of you to think on those words. We are entrusted with continuing the legacy of King and do our part to make positive change."

The NNSY AA-ERG's goal is promoting economic opportunities, providing mechanisms for inclusion, and facilitating growth and advocacy by increasing knowledge and appreciation for the historical and cultural heritage of African Americans throughout NNSY and the surrounding communities.

Naval Station Norfolk: A super-star among the constellation of river stars

On Thursday, Jan. 23, Naval Station (NAVSTA) Norfolk's Environmental Department earned its title as the River Star Businesses Hall of Fame winner for 2020. The installation was chosen by the Elizabeth River Project cooperatives for its accumulation of environmental achievements.

The Elizabeth River Project is a non-profit effort to restore the health of the Elizabeth River to resplendent environmental quality through the partnerships of the government, businesses and community. NAVSTA Norfolk, being one of these partners, took the initiative to improve the installation throughout

"I have found that the Navy base is very proactive in environmental stewardship, especially pollution prevention," says Pam Boatwright, River Star Businesses Program Manager. "They also often submit the most comprehensive documentation in the River

Back in 2011, the base established the first "green roof" in the Navy's Mid-Atlantic region. The purpose of this project was to improve the water quality that entered into sanitized sewer systems by filtering and retaining

pollutants held in rainwater runoff. As well as provide better insulation for the building, thus reducing heating and cooling needs.

In 2012, the base unveiled the largest solar farm project in Virginia. A 10-acre landscape containing 8,624 solar panels collectively generating up to 2.1 megawatts of electricity. Participation in this project was intended to move the Navy passed its reliance on petroleum and increase its use of alternative ener-

With great strives for conservational improvements, the base constructed a 14.9 megawatt combined heat and power plant in 2018. Not only did this substantial installment reduce shore-based energy consumption by 50 percent and decrease greenhouse gas emissions, but it also aided in saving the Navy

NNSY breaks ground for \$200 Million renovation of historic **Dry Dock 4**

Norfolk Naval Shipyard (NNSY) held a groundbreaking for the renovation of its historic Dry Dock 4 January 23.

This \$200 million renovation, spanning nearly three years, marks NNSY's biggest initiative yet in the realization of Naval Sea Systems Command's (NAVSEA) Shipyard Infrastructure Optimization Program (SIOP). SIOP is a 20-year, \$21 billion program dedicated to completely refurbishing the nation's four public shipyards by modernizing equipment, improving workflow and upgrading dry docks and facilities.

The Dry Dock 4 renovation will meet the Navy's needs for submarine overhaul during the 2020s and decades into the future, supporting Ohio, Virginia and Columbia-class boats.

"Today's groundbreaking will ensure this historic dry dock will continue to serve the Navy and nation for the future Navy, just as it has done for the last 100 years," said Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Research, Development and Acquisition) James Geurts. "The Navy continues to invest heavily in our naval shipyard workforce and supporting infrastructure to ensure we can continue to support the world's finest naval force now and into the future."

First opened in April 1919, Dry Dock 4



Coronavirus: What providers, patients should know

With news of the contagious and potentially deadly illness known as novel coronavirus grabbing headlines worldwide, military health officials say that an informed, common sense approach minimizes the chances of getting sick.

Many forms of coronavirus exist among both humans and animals, but this new strain's lethality has triggered considerable alarm. Believed to have originated at an animal market in Wuhan City, China, novel coronavirus has sickened hundreds and killed at least 4. It has since spread to other parts of Asia. The first case of novel coronavirus in the U.S. was reported January 22 in Washington

Anyone contracting a respiratory illness shouldn't assume it's novel coronavirus; it is far more likely to be a more common malady. "For example, right now in the U.S., influenza, with 35 million cases last season, is far more

commonplace than novel coronavirus, said U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps Dr. (Lt. Cmdr.) David Shih, a preventive medicine physician and epidemiologist with the Clinical Support Division, Defense Health Agency. He added that those experiencing symptoms of respiratory illness like coughing, sneezing, shortness of breath, and fever - should avoid contact with others and making them sick, Shih

"Don't think you're being super dedicated by showing up to work when ill," Shih said. "Likewise, if you're a duty supervisor, please don't compel your workers to show up when they're sick. In the short run, you might get a bit of a productivity boost. In the long run, that person could transmit a respiratory illness to co-workers, and pretty soon you lose way more productivity because your entire office is sick."

Shih understands that service members stationed in areas of strategic importance and elevated states of readiness

are not necessarily in the position to call in sick. In such instances, sick personnel still can take steps to practice effective cough hygiene and use whatever hygienic services they can find to avert hindering readiness by making their battle buddies sick. Frequent thorough handwashing, for instance, is a cornerstone of respiratory disease prevention.

"You may not have plumbing for washing hands, but hand sanitizer can become your best friend and keep you healthy," Shih said.

Regarding novel coronavirus, Shih recommends following Centers for Disease Control and Prevention travel notices. First, avoid all non-essential travel to Wuhan, China, the outbreak's epicenter. Second, patients who traveled to China in the past 14 days with fever, cough, or difficulty breathing, should seek medical care right away (calling the doctor's office or emergency room in advance to report travel and symptoms) and otherwise avoid 1) contact with others and 2) travel while sick.

CDC also has guidance for health care professionals, who should evaluate patients with fever and respiratory illness (PUIs), who include those with 1) fever, als, and self-isolating when sick."

2) lower respiratory illness symptoms, and 3) travel history to Wuhan, China, within 14 days prior to symptom onset. PUIs should wear a surgical mask as soon as they are identified and be evaluated in a private room with the door closed, ideally an airborne infection isolation room if available. Workers caring for PUIs should wear gloves, gowns, masks, eye protection, and respiratory protection. Perhaps most importantly, care providers who believe they may be treating a novel coronavirus patient should immediately notify infection control and public health authorities (the installation preventive medicine or public health department at military treatment facilities).

Because novel coronavirus is new (as its name suggests), there is as yet no immunization nor specific treatment. Care providers are instead treating the symptoms - acetaminophen to reduce fever, lozenges and other treatments to soothe sore throats, and, for severe cases, ventilators to help patients breathe.

"Lacking specific treatment," Shih said, "we must be extra vigilant about basic prevention measures: frequent by taking a careful travel history to handwashing, effective cough and identify patients under investigation sneeze hygiene, avoiding sick individu-

When it first aired back in 2002, ABC had no idea that 'The Bachelor' would become so popular that it's now in its 24th season and has spawned several spin-offs — 'The Bachelorette,' 'Bachelor Pad,' 'Bachelor in Paradise,' 'Bachelor in Paradise: After Paradise' and 'Bachelor Winter Games.' No one could predict that millions of loyal viewers would be known as #BachelorNation, throwing weekly parties, forming fan clubs, and betting on contestants in 'Bachelor' fantasy leagues.

Lilly and I aren't fanatics, but we've played

Bachelor Bingo during a few shows, marking squares on cards we printed from the internet with common Bachelor phrases — "my journey," "not here to make friends," "can I steal you for a sec"—and common Bachelor scenes "make out session," "Bachelor cries," "jump-and-straddle hug."

It's all in good fun, I tell myself. But sometimes I wonder, do 'The Bachelor' contestants' attention-seeking behaviors negatively impact stereotypes of women in the #MeToo generation?

Producers ramp up the drama to satisfy fans who expect host Chris Harrison to make good on his promise that every season will be "the most dramatic yet." Contestants engage in more and more outrageous antics to win the Bachelor's heart, or at least to be considered for one of the spin off shows. If they play their cards right, they might even be invited to compete on 'Dancing with the Stars.'

In early seasons of 'The Bachelor,' good looks and stunning formalwear was enough to get viewers' to notice. But 23 seasons later, contestants willingly humiliate themselves for attention. "Hmm," they ponder, "perhaps I'll get more airtime if I step out of the limo with a

humongous windmill strapped on my back, wear a giant paper airplane around my knees, or escort a dairy cow into the mansion on a

Although coyness was an advantage in the early days of the show, today's 'Bachelor' participants must "open up" and "be vulnerable" on national television in order to progress in the game. Getting dumped by a previous boyfriend, being divorced, or being a single parent is no longer enough. Women must take the Bachelor aside, force crocodile tears, and reveal debilitating insecurities, shocking family dysfunction, incarcerated relatives, or childhood trauma involving amusement park rides.

If a contender is disadvantaged by good mental health, she can still employ the oldest trick in the book — sex. In the irony that is 'The Bachelor,' ladies must maintain an air of chastity and virtue while throwing themselves at the Bachelor every chance they get. In the early years, participants didn't smooch until halfway through the season. But in 2020, competitors lock lips with the Bachelor within hours of entering Villa De La Vina, profess the "Lword" soon thereafter, and willingly have sex in the Fantasy Suites, in the ocean, in a windmill, or anywhere else for that matter. A contestant on the current season walked out of the limo to introduce herself to the Bachelor, but instead, she surprised him with a blindfold and a steamy French kiss. Smart.

What does the future hold for this pop-culture phenomenon? What will contestants do to win five years from now? Dispense with sequin gowns and foreplay altogether, and beckon the Bachelor into the limo for an introductory shag? Will producers add a Pregnancy Testing Group Date for a suspenseful new twist? Would viewers tune in to find out: Will the Bachelor propose to his baby mama?

I'm not sure if 'The Bachelor' is irreparably damaging human culture or if it's just mindless fun, but one thing is for certain — on Monday nights, Lilly and I will be there, pencils poised over our bingo cards, when "the final rose" is announced.

Mid-season flu activity increase: How to keep healthy

Influenza can affect anyone, from the everyday civilian to the active-duty service member. Current trends show an increase in flu activity at the halfway point of the season. While it's too early in the season to determine the overall severity of the flu, the Military Health System maintains readiness and resourcefulness to protect the armed forces and their loved ones from effects of the flu.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has found an elevated level of influenza activity earlier in the season than is typically observed around this time. As of Jan. 16, the CDC estimates that there have been approximately 4,800 flu-related deaths and 87,000 hospitalizations nationwide this season. Active surveillance by the Defense Health Agency's Armed Forces Health Surveillance Division (AFHSD) has also found high levels of influenza activity among military personnel.

Despite the increase in activity, MHS is prepared to sustain the health of service members and their families. All military personnel are required to be immunized against the flu annually to decrease susceptibility to infec-

"Immunization is important given that military personnel live and work in close proximity with other members of the community," said Navy Cmdr. Shawn Clausen of AFHSD's Epidemiology and Analysis section.

While involvement in patient-care activities and participation in large gatherings increases the risk of infection, early data and discussions with the CDC show that the risk among military members and the general population appears to be similar. To get ahead of this risk, the Department of Defense has already distributed more than 3.3 million doses of influenza vaccine throughout the military. As of Jan. 16, approximately 90 percent of all service members have been vaccinated.

Vaccination is recommended not just for military members, but also their loved ones, according to Janet Brunader, a research nurse in the Vaccine Safety & Evaluation section of the Defense Health Agency's Immunization Healthcare Division.

"The good news is that although seasonal influenza vaccine is not always a perfect match, it is still the best way to provide protection against influenza disease," she said. Brunader suggests that everyone 6 months or older get a flu shot each year in the fall. Children over 6 months of age but under age 8 years who have never had a flu shot should get two shots – one shot followed by another at least four weeks later. Children who have had at least one flu shot in the past only need to get one flu shot each year.

There are numerous ways in addition to vaccination to keep safe against the flu.

"One helpful suggestion, in addition to washing your hands before eating or handling food, is to avoid touching your eyes, nose, or face with your unwashed hands," Brunader said. "This will help prevent spreading germs from surfaces to your eyes, nose, or mouth."

Since flu viruses can also spread through the air, Brunader suggests staying at least six feet away from people who are coughing, sneezing, or blowing their nose. If you already have the flu, coughing into a tissue or the bend of the elbow will reduce the spread of viruses. Those suspecting they have the flu should contact a health care provider within two days of the

symptoms. Early treatment with anti-influenza drugs can shorten the duration of ill-

Beneficiaries can receive flu vaccines through their closest military hospital and retail networks. TRICARE representatives can help determine how to get the vaccine if a person is unable to visit a military hospital. MHS also has an archive of influenza resources for beneficiaries to learn more about the flu and what they need to do to keep safe during the season.

Among the four types of flu, influenza A and B are the main two strains that cause "flu season." AFHSD has paid close attention to both of these strains this year.

"As reflected in the U.S. among civilian populations [this season], the majority of laboratory-confirmed influenza-positive specimens continued to be influenza subtype B [Victoria lineage]," said Navy Cmdr. Mark Scheckelhoff from AFHSD's Global Emerging Infections Surveillance section. "In recent weeks, the incidence of influenza A, specifically A(H1N1)pdm09, has increased steadily and appears that it will soon become the most predominant strain."

According to early data from AFHSD, most of the U.S. is experiencing at least "moderate" levels of flu and flu-like activity, with the exception of a few states. Globally, temperate areas of Europe are also observing increased incidences of the flu, with areas of Central and Western Africa continuing to have elevated activity as well. Most of South and Central America and most areas of South and Southeast Asia are reporting "low" levels of activity, but the World Health Organization characterizes other areas of Asia as either "elevated" or "increasing."

To monitor progression of the flu through the season, AFHSD produces a tri-service consolidated influenza report weekly to reflect data from military hospitals. The CDC also produces a more wholistic view on how influenza is affecting the rest of the country.

CNSL holds training, readiness symposium

NORFOLK

Aiming to improve operational readiness across the surface force, Rear Adm. Roy Kitchener, Commander, Naval Surface Force Atlantic, (SURFLANT), hosted a Waterfront Training and Readiness Seminar, Jan. 23.

During the event, commanding officers, executive officers and other local leaders met to discuss maintenance and training practices focused on improving ships material conditions and crew proficiency. The primary focus being to increase the number of ships available during the Basic and Sus-

tainment phase.

A resonating theme at the symposium was routinely conducting proper self-assessments on ships, to "get back to the standing orders," said Kitchener. He also spoke on the vitality of being able to conduct these assessments to find problems on equipment and get them fixed quickly. To achieve this, he reminded leaders to regularly conduct zone inspections with an operational mindset. Improved readiness is driven by ship's crewmembers focusing on the standards. "New missions are happening every day; the Navy must be ever ready at any point to act."

"It is vital to teach our Sailors the correct

way to do maintenance and inspections because it will become muscle memory for them," added Capt. David Fowler, Assistant Chief of Staff for readiness and assessments.

With roughly 75 in attendance, SUR-FLANT briefers discussed the revision of the Surface Force Training and Readiness Manual, (SFTRM), changes to the READ-E process, and recent trends that have been seen across all ship classes. The group also discussed how to execute an effective zone inspection program, as facilitated by Capt. John Bub, Board of Inspection and Survey (INSURV) Chief of Staff and lead senior assessor.

Bub reported that, in his inspections, he has observed three major issues. They include ships not having all spaces assigned for zones in accordance with the instruction; no measurable way to determine if the commanding officer trains his crew for inspections; and the required two years of

records not being organized or available. Ships should refer to the type commander's instructions for help in adhering to requirements.

The manager of Engineering Readiness Assist Team, (ERAT), Sam Lyons offered more advice for solving these problems. His team and the Combat Systems Readiness Assist Team, (CSRAT) are available for training and non-gradable assessments to ships across the waterfront before availabilities, Readiness Assessments, and INSURV. ERAT can provide and bring "A school to the deck plates" with training to any and all Sailors. They are not just trainers but mentors.

Fowler closed out the seminar by saying, "Material condition readiness should be at the top of the Commander's list every day. SURFLANT is available to support and assist the waterfront leaders and crew with maintaining standards and teaching Sailors to focus on the core fundamentals."

Ford utilizes virtual reality to train Sailors for flight operations

The Sailor places virtual reality goggles on and is instantly immersed into a different world. Their perspective changes to that of a Sailor working topside aboard a deployed aircraft carrier. They can see jets taxiing into position, flight indicators flashing and crew members signaling to each other. This no longer becomes a game but training for upcoming operations.

"Right now, you just have a bird's eye view of what's happening," said Lt. Brianne Law as she guides a junior Sailor through a flight deck virtual-reality simulation. "We are watching the aircraft come up. There is our shooter down by center deck. You see him give the retract signal."

Sailors assigned to the USS Gerald R. Ford (CVN 78) air department began using virtual-reality to simulate flight deck operations inside the mobile Carrier-Advanced

Reconfigurable Training System (C-ARTS) classroom located at Naval Station Norfolk. The trainer allows the Sailors to actively practice the procedures of flight operations in real time while the ship is pier side.

The C-ARTS classrooms have been in operation since December 2018 while Ford was at Huntington Ingalls Industries-Newport News Shipbuilding in Newport News, Virginia

"Some of these Sailors here, right now, have had zero flight deck experience," said Law, a Naval Flight Officer, from Pensacola, Florida, serving aboard Ford. "So, one of the great things about the virtual reality simulator is that we can do demonstrations. The Sailors can put on the virtual reality goggles and see exactly what is going to happen."

The flight deck of an aircraft carrier during flight operations can be very hectic with personnel and equipment moving around constantly. There are many variables to account for. Being able to simulate as many of

these different circumstances in a safe environment is extremely beneficial to Sailors.

"If something is wrong on the flight deck or somebody is giving a suspend signal, here is what I am going to do," said Law. "You can walk through that scenario and go through the motions. Doing the actual procedures, in a simulated environment. That is a lot safer."

As Sailors rotate from Ford, so does their base of knowledge. Finding economical ways to train year-round is the primary purpose of the C-ARTS trainers.

"In aviation we have simulators," said Law. "We have that built into our syllabus and that allows us to save time and money, and allows us to get additional training. We thought it would be a good concept for

Sailors are enjoying the training and finding it vital to mission readiness in a multitude of ways. It also provides hands-on training while creating a place for discussion. "They had us grouped together," said Aviation Boatswain Mate (Handling) Seaman Matt Costin, an elevator operator assigned to Ford's air department. "It was like a big meeting. They were teaching us how to use the Gerald R. Ford equipment. Then we got to talk through all the issues we were having. It was nice to get together."

The C-ARTS trainers can be arranged to facilitate virtual reality training along with augmented reality and mixed reality training. This allowed Ford to meet necessary training requirements for flight operations.

"The aircraft director just behind the shooter in the yellow, he is going to signal off breaks to the pilot," said Law, walking through a scenario. "Take tension. The deck edge operator is going to hit tension. We are going to watch for good stroke, good hook, the man goes out. Thumbs are up. The shooter takes control of the aircraft. Goes into military power. After mil power, he makes sure the pilot does his wipe out and final checks. Thumbs, thumbs, thumbs. We see the shoot signal and we are off."

Gerald R. Ford is a first-in-class aircraft carrier and the first new aircraft carrier designed in more than 40 years. Ford is currently underway conducting testing in the Atlantic Ocean.

Navy Reserve announces one-stop shop for Reserve order opportunities

Commander, Navy Reserve Forces Command (CNRFC) announces the release of ZipServe, a new application that allows Reservists to apply for all Reserve order opportunities

ZipServe is a complete overhaul of the advertising and application process for mobili-

zations, Annual Training (AT), Active Duty for Training (ADT), Active Duty for Special Work (ADSW) and Definite Recall (DR). It will replace the AdPortal and Mobilization Portal and provide users with a process similar to the private sector.

"ZipServe is one of many applications that are being introduced to Reserve Sailors in an effort to modernize the Reserve Force," said Rear Adm. John Schommer, commander, Navy Reserve Forces Command. "These capabilities being introduced are a direct result of listening to input from our Reserve Sailors about issues that affect them the most, and responding with tools to make their lives easier."

In ZipServe, Sailors can apply for multiple opportunities, view enhanced details about each opportunity, and monitor the status of applications. Users will receive email notifications on their application status, including selection, non-selection and changes or cancelations to their active applications.

"Think of ZipServe as your 'one-stop shop' for Reserve order opportunities," said

Capt. Michael Leachman, deputy chief of staff for CNRFC's Information Technology department. "Rather than being limited to using an application from a Navy Reserve activity, Sailors are now able to search and apply for orders by opening up ZipServe from the comfort of their home or mobile device."

Ford collects vital data for the Fleet during Aircraft Compatibility Testing

ATLANTIC OCEAN

The aircraft carrier USS Gerald R. Ford (CVN 78) is bringing vital information to the fleet from its Aircraft Compatibility Testing (ACT), which began off the East Coast Jan. 16.

ACT is allowing the crew of Ford to further test its Electromagnetic Aircraft Launch System (EMALS) and Advanced Arresting Gear (AAG), two Aircraft Launch and Recovery Equipment (ALRE) systems unique to Ford. It also allowing the crew and embarked test personnel to rigorously evaluate the effect of the CVN 78 air wake, or burble, and its compatibility with all types of fleet aircraft the Navy utilizes on an aircraft carrier.

"What we're doing is validating years of test catapult shots that were done at the EMALS test facility at Lakehurst N.J., and years of arrestments on AAG at Lakehurst, then taking that data, bringing it to sea and using it on installed equipment aboard our

ship, now in an austere underway environment with different wind and environmental conditions to build those safe flight envelopes," said Capt. John J. Cummings, Ford's commanding officer.

Ford's ACT has seen the first arrestment and launching of E-2D Hawkeye, C-2A Greyhound, EA-18G Growler, and the T-45 Goshawk aircraft on these new systems unique to Ford-class carriers.

"Honestly it's great to be the first ones to fly the E-2/C-2 out on an entirely new class of carrier," said Lt. Cmdr. Eric Thurber, a test pilot assigned to Air Test and Evaluation Squadron (VX) 20,

"We spent some time up at [Joint Base McGuire-Dix] Lakehurst, New Jersey doing some of the developmental testing for the systems before coming to the ship, so it's neat to have seen the entire system land based; see some of the issues we have here, then go back and correct it and come out to the ship and test it at sea."

Cummings reflected on the historical aspect of ACT for the entire Ford class of

ircraft carriers.

"We are pioneers in this new class to figure it out, and we will. We will do this for the Ford-class and then that's it, done," said Cummings. "Our crew is extremely proud to be a part of this historic event; to do this testing and get it to the fleet, and then get ready to accept all fleet aircraft."

Testing also includes an F/A-18F Super Hornet which was also previously used for testing aboard Ford in 2018. Prior to ATC, Ford had 747 launches and arrestments.

"Those four firsts were major milestones, and that's the payoff of a ton hard work by the engineering teams, and by the test squadrons," said Cmdr. Mehdi Akacem, Ford's air boss.

Since getting underway on Jan. 16, Ford has already seen over 70 successful launches and arrestments using the new EMALS and AAG technologies, and will continue to increase the sortie frequency in the second half of testing.

"To see it all come together and see the ship do what it's designed to do — which

is to launch and recover aircraft — it's extreme pride for our crew and for the aviators who've come out here to support that," said Cummings. "So I'm extremely proud of the work by the team to get here, and we'll continue to keep pushing to get a lot of flying in this next year."

This round of testing is allowing the crew to further test the improvements made during its post-shakedown availability (PSA) at Huntington Ingalls Industries-Newport News Shipbuilding while also allowing the crew to gain experience on these unique systems. The information captured during ACT will continue to inform improvements and modifications for Ford and follow-on Ford-class of aircraft carriers.

"We are clearly seeing improvements and in our knowledge, better reliability," said Akacem. "We're out here doing the things the systems are built to do, and we're learning so much every day."







Three international Class A Tall Ships coming to Norfolk

NORFOLK

A trio of the world's most prestigious Class A Naval sail training tall ships are slated to call on the Downtown Norfolk Waterfront this year.

The visiting ships include the Statsraad Lehmkuhl (Norway) (March 4-13), Bae Guayas (Ecuador) (May 16-19), and Capitan Miranda(Uruguay) (June 2-8).

STATSRAAD LEHMKUHL

The Statsraad Lehmkuhl (321'), hailing from Bergen, Norway, is set to arrive in Norfolk for an extended stay from March 4 to March 13. It marks the second consecutive year that the Norwegian vessel has visited Norfolk and the 15th overall.

Built in 1914 as a training ship for the German merchant marines, the Statsraad Lehmkuhl is a three-masted steel barque sail training vessel. The Statsraad Lehmkuhl is currently sailed by the Royal Norwegian Naval Academy's first-year cadets who participate in leadership and team-building training. While on board, the cadets work together as a team to overcome the timeless challenges and dangers of travelling the seas by sail without modern technology.

BAE GUAYAS

Bae Guayas (221'), from Ecuador, is scheduled to visit from May 16 to May

19. Bae Guayas last visited Norfolk in 2017 during Harborfest and also participated in OpSail 2012 in Norfolk.

Built in Spain in 1976, Bae Guayas is proud to serve as a goodwill ambassador for the Ecuadorian Navy. The three-masted steel barque sail training vessel is named after the Chief of Huancavilcas, a native culture in the Ecuadorian coastal region. During a cruise, considered one semester at the Ecuadorian Naval Academy, midshipmen apply - in a very challenging environment - theoretical principals of navigation, seamanship, and other subjects learned in the classroom.

CAPITAN MIRANDA

Capitan Miranda (198'), from

Uruguay, is scheduled to visit from June 2 to June 8 and will headline 2020 Norfolk Harborfest's (June 5-7) annual Parade of Sail on Friday, June 5. The ship's visit marks the second consecutive year that the Capitan Miranda has visited Norfolk.

Known around the globe for its award-winning spirit, Capitan Miranda serves as a training ship for the Uruguayan Naval Academy at Montevideo. Built in Spain, in 1930, the threemasted schooner was refitted and rerigged in 1978 and logs 10,000 sea miles annually. With its colorful sunburst sails, Capitan Miranda has won the "Most Spirit" award at many previous tall ship festivals around the world.

All three ships will be open for public visitations during their stays in Norfolk. Specific dates and times for visitations will be announced in the weeks leading up to each ship's arrival. 

Its all part of the Naval Museum's outreach efforts to make Naval History and Science, Technology, Engineering and Math Concepts relevant in a fun and engaging way. But before the event kicks off, active duty volunteers spent several days transforming the Decker Center in anticipation of the large crowds.

Last years event brought in 5,272 visitors with over 120 active duty volunteers from area commands staffed the event.
