

507th Begins Fifth Summer Camp

The 507th puts its best foot forward August 14-28 as the fighter group begins its fifth summer camp.

Six hundred reservists are expected to sign-in and display the annual gathering of fatigues, flight suits and the two-week question, "Where am I going to park?"

The sign-in process and assignment of billets has been well organized and personnel are checked-in and on the job with surprising speed.

Those traveling to Nellis AFB, Nev., for annual tours are Mobility Support Flight, commanded by Maj. John D. Ellington, and Weapons Security Flight, commanded by Capt. Steven M. Schnitzer.

They will assist the 57th Fighter Weapons Wing with security posting, administrative security, messing and transportation.

The Civil Engineering Flight completed its annual tour July 10-24, 30 days earlier than the group, at Mt.Home AFB, Idaho. Maj. Terry L Mock, Prime BEEF Officer, said the flight was assigned to the 366th Tactical Fighter Wing. They remodeled the Officers' Open Mess kitchen and refabricated metal fire escapes to fit facilities using out-dated wooden ladders.

The fire fighters remained at home training with the base Fire Department.
