

Building and Flying Dominate 1976 Summer Camp

An ambitious construction program and a heavy flying schedule highlighted the activities of the fifth annual Summer encampment of the 507th Tactical

Fighter Group.

Most of the approximately 900 members of the Group convened at Tinker AFB for their two-week tour of active duty. Members of the Weapons Systems Security Flight and Mobility Support Squadron, however, journeyed to Nellis AFB, Nev., for their train-

ing activities.

The 507th Civil Engineering Flight filled the hallways of Group Head-quarters building with sawdust, paint, and the sounds of buzz saws and hammers as part of a major remodeling project. New offices, larger and more private, were professionally constructed by CE members for the Recruiting, Legal and Information offices, and for sections of Combat Support Squadron.

Pilots of the 465th Tactical Fighter Squadron flew 162 sorties in the F-105 Thunderchief for a total flying time of 239.2 hours, in addition to conducting extensive training in ground tactics, refueling, and air combat maneuvers.

"A" Flight won the squadron gunnery competition, and Lt. Col. Roger P. Scheer was the individual "Top Gun."

Earlier in August, during the monthly UTA, the 507th played host to a number of civilian visitors who toured the Group facilities as part of a base-

wide open house.

In summary, Summer Camp 1976 was much different than that held in 1974, when the 507th airlifted people and aircraft to Savannah, Ga., to conduct field training. Nonetheless, the Group's actions of August, 1976, were varied and essential in the development of the 507th as a combat-ready member of the Air Force Reserve.

Generals Olds, Risner Attend 507th Dining In

Two of the Air Force's most famous fighter pilots of the Vietnam war were guests of the 507th at the Group's Dining In held during the Summer Encampment last month.

Brig. Gen. Robin Olds (USAF Ret.) and Brig. Gen. Robinson Risner (USAF Ret.) joined Tinker AFB officials and approximately 80 members of the 507th TFGp in the annual assembly.

General Olds, who shot down 17 enemy aircraft in two conflicts, including four MIG's over North Vietnam, served as guest speaker for the Dining-In, and told the youthful fliers from the 465th Tactical Fighter Squadron that "I envy every one of you for having your careers in front of you. I wish I could start all over again."


General Olds also served as Superintendant of the U. S. Air Force Academy during his career.

General Risner, a native of Oklahoma City who has been inducted into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame, was considered one of the most important American prisoners of war held captive by the North Vietnamese during that conflict. He was released in 1973 after more than seven years as a POW, and has since written a book about his experiences that has achieved national recognition.

General Risner, who was piloting an F-105 Thunderchief in September, 1965 when he was shot down over North Vietnam, only recently retired from active duty.

After his repatriation, the general commanded an F-111 fighter wing.

Both of the highly-decorated generals expressed their enjoyment of the diningin, and the opportunity to renew old acquaintenances with those in attendance.
