Boomers and Sooners make AFR history

The newest Air Force Reserve mission became part of Oklahoma aviation history recently as KC-135s refueled F-105s in the first reserve-to-reserve aerial refueling endeavor.

Thirsty, reserve F-105s from the 465th Tactical Fighter Squadron were refueled by tankers assigned to the 452d Air Refueling Wing, March AFB, Calif. The wing is the first Air Force Reserve unit to be assigned a KC-135 aerial refueling mission in direct support of the Strategic Air Command (SAC). F-105 Thunderchiefs were selected for the first mission to provide the boomers training in the technique of refueling fighter aircraft with the drogue.

The unit began its new mission Oct L Preplanning, in cooperation with SAC, permitted the 336th Air Refueling Squadron of the 452d to have six aircrews qualified in KC-135s by the transfer date.

This figure represents 50 per cent of the squadron's aircrews ready to conduct air refueling missions, and puts the wing about a year ahead of the normal readiness schedule of a converting unit, officials say.

The wing is commanded by Brig. Gen. James L. Wade, a native Oklahoman and former commander of the 507th Tactical Fighter Group.

The 336th ARSq is collocated with the wing at March AFB and the 940th Air Refueling Group, another unit of the 452d will be stationed at Mather AFB, Calif., and will also receive eight KC-135s.Conversion date for the 940th is scheduled for Jan. 1, 1977.

As a result of the reorganization, the group's strength has increased some 40 per cent to approximately 1300 reservists officials say.

"In the event of a recall to active duty, the units would still be assigned to the commands with which they were previously affiliated," said Lt. Col. Roger P. Scheer, group commander.

Wrucha addresses Civilian Aviators

Capt. Jerry A. Wrucha, group safety officer, was a keynote speaker during the base's first Civilian Aviation Safety Fly-In, Sunday of the November UTA.

Over 2000 aviation'buffs' and 263 light aircraft participated in the event.

Assisting in the parking of the aircraft near the Flight Test facility were reservists from the 10th Maintenance Squadron.

The fly-in was held to develop a closer relationship between civilian and military aviators and to promote aviation safety awareness.

Capt. Wrucha spoke on mid-air collision potentials and their avoidance.

He stressed that all reactions to possible mid-airs take time. "It's not the aircraft you see that will get you, but the one you don't," he said.

He addressed some ways for civilian aviators to help alleviate problems of mid-airs.

"Learn to improve your scanning techniques. Know your cockpit design; preflight; wash the wind shields.

"While in the plane, don't keep your eyes constantly fixed on the horizon, exercise eye muscles by looking around. This helps from getting "altitude myopia".

"Wear sunglasses. Paint aircraft in dull colors to cut-down on the glare.

"Move your head around for variety. Turn on all lights in less favorable weather conditions.

"Radar contact does not alleviate you of the responsibility of looking around. Use a transponder. ATC can better identify your position. Transponders will help others see you.

Capt. Wrucha further explained the low-level routes of the 507th as a two-hour period, twice a day, Tuesday thru Saturday. He emphasized that aviators use flight service and know the restrictions of these routes before you fly.

"Make a right decision deliberately instead of a wrong decision instantly," he concluded.

How ready are we?


In a talk to a meeting of the Order of Daedalians at Bolling AFB, D.C., Lt. Gen. John W. Pauly, then deputy chief of staff, plans and operations, said:

"How ready are we..to commit forces to help turn back a Soviet attack on our European allies? Or how about the Middle East? Or what would be the outcome if war broke out in Korea-how well could we protect our national interests in these vital areas.

"We are now looking at such fundamental issues as:

- How can we inject more realism into our operational readiness inspections?
- How can we improve our training so that it more closely resembles combat tasks?
- What yardsticks should we be using to give us an accurate indication of our war munitions requirements, and how can we more accurately measure our logistics capability to sustain our combat forces in the scenarios I mentioned earlier?

"We have also asked the commands to tell us what they consider to be the most important factors determining their readiness."
