TIME TO CHECK ANNUAL LEAVE

The leave year for LADO employees will end on January 8, 1977. If there is a possibility that you will lose any excess leave by that time, check with your timekeeper immediately to find out the amount of annual leave involved. Next, arrange with your supervisor to use this leave. Something to remember: any annual leave accrued above the amount of the employee's ceiling will be automatically forfeited as of January 9, 1977.

Forfeited excess annual leave may be restored under either of the two conditions listed below.

1. The District Engineer declares an exigency (an emergency or operational demand of such magnitude or significance that employees cannot be excused from duty to avoid forfeiture of annual leave).

- The annual leave was scheduled in writing prior to the exigency and at least three pay periods before the end of the leave year;

- The exigency precluded the use of the scheduled leave; and

- The cancelled leave could not be rescheduled because of insufficient time remaining in the leave year.

The employee was on sick leave during the period initially scheduled in advance for annual leave . - The period of illness interfered with the usage of scheduled annual leave; and

- The cancelled annual leave could not be rescheduled because of insufficient t remaining in the leave year.

And with 1977 just around the corner, let's take a look at some of the highlights of LADO events of 1976.

HOLIDAY INSURANCE

The Christmas season is a joyous occasion, and a special time which brings warm expressions of love and friendship, and hopes for a bright future. Paradoxically, this is a time when too many hopes are shattered by tragedy. Many factors combine to make this a season for a large number of home and traffic accidents. The more common causes of Christmas accidents can be avoided by an awareness of the hazards. Some tips for a safer holiday are:

 Keep Christmas tree trunks under water through the period the tree is on display.

Keep lights off when the tree is unattended.

3. Plan shopping, entertaining, and visiting far enough in advance to avoid rushing. Haste is especially ill advised at this ime of year, when others are rushed also.

4. Avoid drinking to excess when required to drive. Plan to stay overnight if long celebrations are anticipated. Watch out for guests who may have overindulged. Have the guest stay overnight, or have someone else drop the guest off. Remember the casual drinker is a more dangerous driver than the habitual drinker.

5. Select toys with care. Consider the age and ability of the child. Avoid toys with sharp corners or small parts that can be swallowed.

Lack Incentive ?

A frequent complaint about the civil service is that there is no incentive for outstanding ideas and performance - that mediocrity is encouraged.

A look at the record, however, shows that in fiscal year 1976 more than 131,000 Federal employees were motivated to contribute ideas and actions that resulted in more than \$333 million in tangible benefits to the Government, an amount equivalent to the Federal income taxes of 182,000 average taxpayers. This record compares very favorably to the private sector, which achieves substantially less tangible benefits than the Government does per dollar awarded. There is a continuing willingness to contribute among Federal employees, and top managers should be aware of and support the Federal Incentive Awards Program as a means to encourage and recognize outstanding performance and ideas.

Court Leave

Under a new law that became effective October 1, Federal employees who appear in court as witnesses will be granted official (paid) court leave if the United States, the District of Columbia, or a State or local government is a party to the proceeding. (Details: Public Law 94-310 of June 15).

Flash Flood - Prognosis

The heavy unnecessary loss of life among outdoor recreationists during the Big Thompson Creek, Colorado, flash flood last July, and at Nelson's Landing, Nevada, in September 1974, provided the stimulus for LAD's cooperation in the filming of a special documentary on flash floods with station KOOL-TV, Phoenix, Arizona.

Presented on Saturday, November 20, the 12-minute program featured Dr.Charles Pyke, LAD meteorologist. Dr. Pyke was filmed on location in a rugged canyon of the Superstition Mountains. He explained what a flash flood is, what causes it, and how outdoor recreationists can protect their lives in flash flood prone areas.

The program also featured special footage of the Big Thompson disaster taken for LAD by the Bureau of Reclamation. Other sites visited were Nelson's Landing and Apache Lake, Arizona. Three people were killed at Apache Lake when they ignored repeated warnings of an imminent flash flood in Crabtree Wash and continued to camp in an unauthorized area.

As a public education service, LAD in cooperation with the National Weather Service, designed and produced a four page booklet "Flash Flood - a Checklist for Survival". The booklet was made available to KOOL-TV viewers through announcements on the documentary and during the station's weather forecasts on the evening news. Intended for use by outdoor recreationists, the booklet describes the origin of a flash flood and provides eight suggestions for preventing loss of life in flash flood regions. Over 8,000 copies of the booklet are now being distributed in the Los Angeles area by the Southern California Automobile Association. The initial printing of 20,000 copies has been exhausted.

Plans are being made to distribute the booklet to the public through the National Parks and Monuments of the Southwest at the beginning of the flash flood season next April.
