HOSPITAL SHIPS, OTHER DOD ASSETS PREPARE FOR **CORONAVIRUS RESPONSE**

Two Navy hospital ships will be part of the Defense Department's response to the coronavirus pandemic, the Pentagon's chief spokesman said.

The USNS Comfort and USNS Mercy are being prepared for deployment "as needed to assist potentially overwhelmed communities with acute patient care," Jonathan Rath Hoffman, assistant to the defense secretary for public affairs, said during a news conference today at the Pentagon. He was joined at the briefing by Air Force Brig. Gen. (Dr.) Paul Friedrichs, the Joint Staff surgeon.

The Comfort is now in Norfolk, Virginia, for maintenance, and the Navy has been asked to expedite that, Hoffman said, adding that it may take "a little while" for that

ship to be ready to go. It will go to New York when its maintenance is complete.

The Mercy is on the West Coast and is ready to go in "days, not weeks," he said, and where it will go will be determined when it's ready to sail.

Both ships face issues with manning, however. Friedrichs, said the ships would likely be manned with typical staffs of personnel trained for combat casualty care, rather than for dealing with a contagious disease like the coronavirus.

"Our understanding is that the intent is the ships will be used to take non-coronavirus patients, which is what our staffs are best assigned and organized to do," he

Navy increasing health protection measures on installations to fight COVID 19

WASHINGTON

As part of the Navy's efforts to minimize the spread of Coronavirus, U.S. Fleet Forces Command has elevated its health protection measures to HPCON C (MI-NUS) for Navy installations in the 48 contiguous U.S. States and Alaska March 20.

Navy installations will continue to maintain fleet essential services such as security, port operations, air operations and emergency management through all HPCON

HPCON C coincides with the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) warning level 3, which indicates sustained community transmission. Most installations and Navy commands are already implementing the measures formalized by HPCON C (MINUS), such as strict hygiene (no handshaking, wipe common-use items); social distancing, postponing/cancelling non-essential activities, and avoiding large groups of more than 10 people. If exposed, consult medical personnel and implement self-isolation per CDC guidelines.

The Navy is using alternate delivery methods for many of our services to safeguard our ability to continue to defend the homeland. For example, we are leveraging technology for services that can be provided by phone or teleconference. For services that must conducted in person, we are prioritizing mission essential functions by enforcing social distancing, emphasis on cleanliness, and protecting our personnel and at risk population.

The Navy's focus is three-fold: We must protect our people; maintain mission readiness; and support the whole-of-government

The following new measures take effect immediately:

- Cancel unit and installation sponsored events and large public gatherings on instal-
- Issue instructions to personnel to avoid large public gatherings and practice social

NMCP implements screening car triage for COVID-19

PORTSMOUTH, VA.

Naval Medical Center Portsmouth (NMCP) is implementing a car triage screening process in response to the Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic. This car triage will allow patients with respiratory illness symptoms (fever, cough, and shortness of breath), a history of travel, and believed exposure to COVID-19, to be screened prior to entering the Emergency Department. The car triage will begin on March 20 from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m and will continue daily. NMCP may expand car triage hours based on NMCP's active duty military members and beneficiaries needs.

The car triage process is simple and efficient for NMCP patients. Those who are being evaluated for emergency conditions will proceed directly to the Emergency Department. Those who are seeking evaluation for flu-like illness or potential coronavirus infection will be directed to an outdoor area where they will be checked in, triaged, evaluated and treated by a licensed provider all from the comfort and safety of their own vehicle. During the triage process, the providers will determine if further evaluation and testing is needed or if patients can proceed home for self-observation. The car triage is primarily a screening process to determine the right course of care for patients, not all patients will be tested.

As NMCP responds to the COVID-19 pandemic, we are implementing additional health protection measures to minimize foot traffic throughout the organization and help to mitigate the spread of infection, enabling us to better preserve the health and wellbeing of our patients and staff. NMCP

beneficiaries are additionally encouraged to call the COVID-19 Call Center, a screening advice line, at 757-953-6200 or to call/text the Military Health System Nurse Advice Line at 1-800-874-2273.

Like other respiratory infections, most cases of COVID-19 are mild and will usually resolve on its own, though it can become severe in some patients, specifically those with pre-existing or comorbid diseases. The NMCP car triage is to help those who are at high risk seek medical care. Patients who are without symptoms, exposure, or travel should stay home.

NMCP is committed to ensuring the high quality medical care for our active duty military members and beneficiaries we are honored to serve.

Navy Preventive Medicine teams embark ships in 7th Fleet

Members of Navy Forward-Deployed Preventive Medicine Units (FDPMU) and Naval Medical Research Center (NMRC) embarked several 7th Fleet ships March 14 to help combat the risk of and provide laboratory batch testing for COVID-19 aboard the

Teams embarked on the amphibious assault ship USS America (LHA 6), the aircraft carrier USS Theodore Roosevelt (CVN 71), the U.S. 7th Fleet flagship USS Blue Ridge (LCC 19) can batch test Sailors onboard who present with influenza-like symptoms, instead of only sending samples to be tested

Batch testing provides early warning that a COVID-19 case is onboard a ship but does not individually diagnose Sailors. If a batch were to test positive for COVID-19, the medical teams would take additional measures, such as isolating the Sailors whose samples were in the batch and, depending on their symptoms, potentially medically evacuating them off the ship to a shore facility for testing.

To date, no cases of COVID-19 have been diagnosed aboard any U.S. 7th Fleet Navy

"The team here in 7th Fleet has taken COVID-19 seriously from the beginning and has many public health measures already in place," said Capt. Christine Sears, U.S. 7th Fleet surgeon. "The FDPMU and NMRC

augmentation teams provide additional depth in our ability to combat this virus."

Teams embarked the ships to provide atsea testing and to ensure the U.S. 7th Fleet operating forces are ready to combat a possible outbreak while maintaining mission readiness. The teams provide additional capabilities in addition to the U.S. 7th Fleet's isolation procedures.

The teams comprise a variety of specialized Navy Medicine personnel to ensure force health protection of the fleet and may include a microbiologist, medical laboratory technician, preventive medicine officer, and a preventive medicine technician.

"As a medical service corps microbiology officer, this embark gives us the chance to demonstrate some of our skillsets to the fleet, and what we bring to the fight," said Lt. Cmdr. Rebecca Pavlicek, Blue Ridge COVID-19 testing team lead. "This capability allows us, the Navy, to protect mission readiness and protection of our Sailors."

To ensure force health protection of the fleet, other medical specialties or logistical components can be scaled up or down to meet mission specific requirements in the mitigation, health surveillance, and casualty pre-

"This is the most advanced laboratory capability that Navy Medicine has placed forward deployed," said Lt. Cmdr. Danett Bishop, leader and microbiologist for the preventative medicine team aboard America. "We can make force health decisions in real

time, enhancing the health of the crew while minimizing any potential outbreak of COVID-19."

The FDPMU teams aboard the USS America and the USS Blue Ridge are from Navy Environmental Preventative Medicine Unit 6 based out of Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and work to facilitate and educate using preventive medicine practices and provide additional laboratory capabilities.

The team embarked with USS Theodore Roosevelt is assigned to the Naval Medical Research Center based in Silver Spring,

Currently, the teams are only authorized to perform surveillance testing and not individual testing. This means that the results cannot be linked to a particular patient for diagnostics, but would enable the team to detect

COVID-19's presence on the ship based off

"Since we are performing surveillance testing, the results of COVID-19 present, or not present can help inform the force health protection posture and provide valuable insight for the senior medical officer and outbreak response team," said Pavlicek.

The teams are equipped with two testing capabilities, including the BioFire Film Array and the Step One RT-PCR System. The BioFire Film Array will test for a dozen different respiratory diseases, while the Step One RT-PCR System allow for complex COVID-19 tests at sea, if necessary.

As the U.S. Navy's largest forward-deployed fleet, 7th Fleet operates roughly 50-70 ships and submarines and 140 aircraft with approximately 20,000 Sailors.

Graduation ceremonies canceled until further notice

GREAT LAKES, ILL.

Naval Education and Training Command (NETC) announced March 19 that until further notice, all large-scale graduation ceremonies for Recruit Training Command (RTC), in Great Lakes, Illinois, and Officer Training Command (OTC), in Newport, Rhode Island, are suspended. The measure is intended to help protect the mission by limiting the spread of COVID-19.

Recruits, officer candidates and other students will continue to graduate, but these milestones will be marked by small, internal events that cannot be livestreamed.

The decision, based on recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and other medical professionals, is intended to support the well-being of students and staff, and to maintain RTC's mission-essential function of providing basically trained Sailors to the fleet.

Although graduation is an important symbolic event for Sailors and families, it is not essential for training.

"Chaplains and Religious Program Specialists at all levels must find creative ways to minimize risk while continuing to serve their shipmates," said Rear Adm. Brent W. Scott, Chief of Chaplains. "It is during times like these that the mission of the Chaplain Corps is most vital."

Religious Ministry teams are further directed to:

- Assess the risk of their activities and day-to-day business
- Suspend the handling, serving, of sharing of food and refreshments in chapels until further notice
- Consult with their Religious Organization concerning any precautionary measure or ecclesiastical amendment
- Find creative ways of using social media platforms to communicate spiritual strength and encouragement to your entire region or installation
- "I have the upmost confidence in your ability to navigate these rough water and to bring Religious Ministries to Sailors, Marines, Coast Guardsmen and their families during this turbulent time," said Scott. "The peace and hope that you bring to this unique fight will help carry the day."

Navy cancels spring 2020 fitness cycle, delays advancement exams

bi-annual physical readiness test (PRT) which consists of push-ups, sit-ups and a cardio event.

WASHINGTON

In response to Department of Defense efforts to contain the spread of COVID-19, the Navy announced the delay of the spring Navy Wide Advancement Exams with NAVADMIN 069/20 and the cancellation of the spring 2020 Physical Fitness Assessment Cycle in NAVADMIN 071/20, released March 17.

The messages were released March 17 and 18 respectively.

The measures were taken to limit exposure of Navy personnel to the coronavirus by following guidance from Centers for Disease Control advising against large gatherings of people.

"With these exam date changes, the Navy Advancement Center (NAC) is focused on making sure no Sailor is disadvantaged in the advancements processes," said Tom Updike, deputy director of the NAC.

All enlisted advancement exams scheduled to be administered after March 17 are now rescheduled with the following administration dates:

- May, 21, 2020 Cycle 247 (E-4 only) Active Duty and Full-Time Support (FTS) regular NWAEs
- May 22, 2020 Cycle 106 (E-4 through E-7) Selective Reserve (SELRES) NWAEs approved for late administration

on the first available drill weekend after this date

■ June 12, 2020 – Cycle 247 (E-4 through E-6) final date to administer substitute exams

The rescheduled dates result in no change to the advancement candidate's final multiple score or eligibility requirements. Eligibility dates remain the same as listed in NAVADMIN 284/19, no new candidates will be added because of the delay.

The delay in testing also means there will also be a shift to the right of advancement results. E-4 through E-6 Total Force advancements as well as Selected Reserve and Full-Time Support E-7 Selection Board Eligibility are anticipated to be released in July 2020. Results will be heavily dependent on commands promptly processing and returning answer sheets.

Navy officials also cancelled the Spring PRT out of an abundance of caution to ensure COVID-19 does not spread further to Navy personnel.

"Ultimately, the intent of the Navy's PFA and the associated physical readiness standards are to maintain a baseline level of physical fitness for Sailors," said Paul Rosen, acting director of the 21st Century Sailor Office, which oversees physical readiness policy for the Navy.

"This is a unique situation that calls for a unique response. We know the coronavirus is highly contagious, and unnecessarily increasing the risk of infection due to the close physical proximity required to complete the PFA is not in the best interest of our Sailors or our overall mission readiness."

Commands that have already begun or completed the official PFA testing should stop immediately and take no further action in Physical Readiness Information Management System. Commands that have not started the PFA should not enter any data in PRIMS for Cycle 1 2020.

Commands are also directed to stop all organized or group physical training until further notice. This includes the Fitness Enhancement Program.

Sailors with a Soft End of Active Obligated Service before July 30 who are ineligible for retention or cannot submit a Career Waypoint application to reenlist because of PFA failures are eligible for a one-time extension, the message states.

A commanding officer's recommendation is required for the extension, which can't go beyond Sept. 30, 2020.

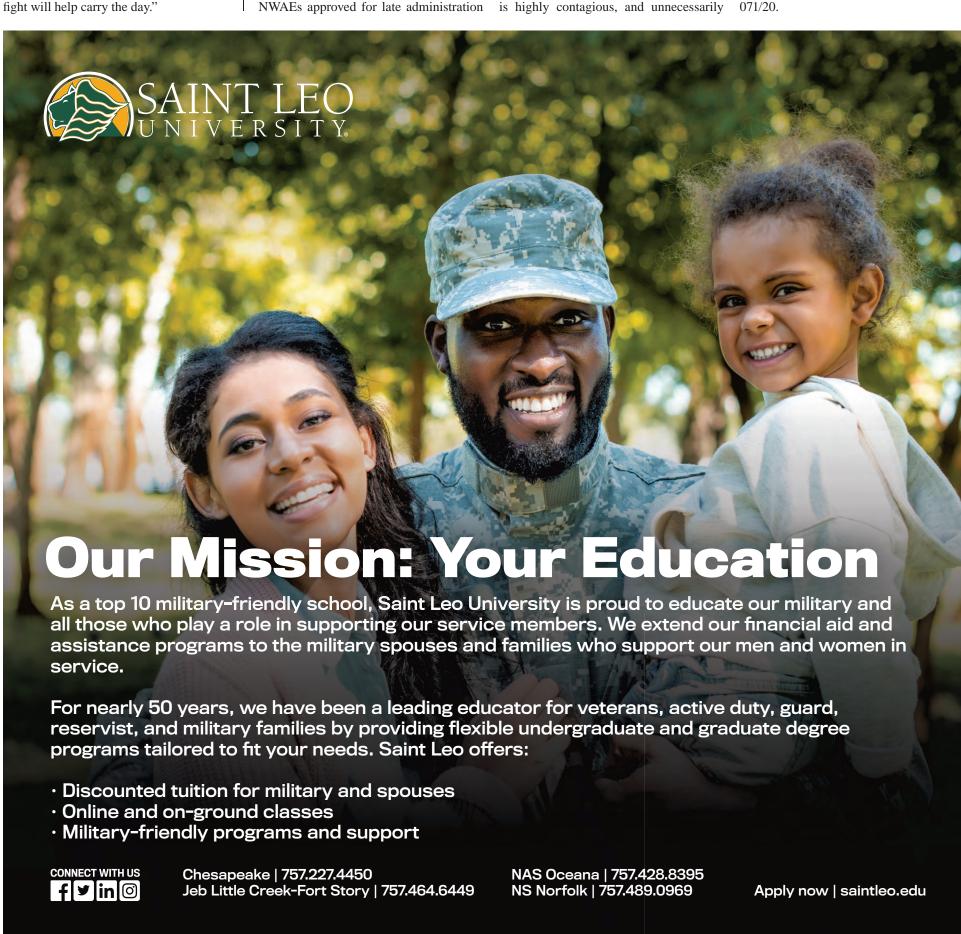
Additionally, all Navy commands are directed to immediately suspend all organized or group physical training, to include the Fitness Enhancement Program, until further notice.

Sailors not expecting not to participate in the spring Physical Readiness Test because they scored an excellent low or better on the fall 2019 PRT, will be required to participate this fall.

That's because NAVADMIN 141/17 states such exemptions are only valid for the following cycle only.

Sailors should be prepared to complete their PFA in the fall cycle.

PCS on hold? Why you might want to visit legal now

Sailors waiting out the 60-day hold on Permanent Change of Station moves should consult their local Legal Assistance Office before notifying a landlord of intent to terminate their lease or even if they need to negotiate an extension.

In situations like this, Congress has given military members wide ranging protections under a 2003 law known as the Servicemembers Civil Relief Act.

Known as the SCRA, the law's legal reach protects service members when signing rental agreements or negotiating credit card rates as well as postpones mortgage foreclosure and some civil judicial proceedings for those on active duty in the military.

This is important because once the travel ban is lifted and Sailors are given adjusted transfer dates, there are situations where they could lose some or all of their SCRA lease termination protection if they don't handle things correctly up front.

For example, Sailors should be aware if they negotiate a lease extension while in receipt of PCS orders -- even if the orders are subsequently modified -- they risk jeopardizing their lease termination protections under the act.

So, if you have received, or are expecting to receive, PCS orders and have not yet terminated your current lease, you should consider waiting until the Navy lifts the stop-movement order and reauthorizes PCS moves. Even once the travel ban is lifted, it may take some time to turn your move back on.

However, if you have already requested an early lease termination under the SCRA, seek immediate from your Legal Assistance Office in contacting your landlord to request a voluntary lease extension.

Any agreement to re-let or extend a lease, however, should be written and signed by both you and your landlord with specific language that protects you from losing SCRA protections.

If your landlord won't give the extension, it's not the end of the world, but you may have to relocate on an interim basis.

Under Joint Travel Regulation Section 051904(b), a short-distance move may be authorized when vacating local private-sector housing because of an involuntary tour extension. You could also contact the local transportation office to request the short-distance household goods move allowed in Chapter 5 of the same travel regulations.

Navy authorizes COs to relax some grooming standards if necessary

WASHINGTON

The Navy has given commanding officers discretion to temporarily relax grooming standards for men's and women's hair length, but only if those COs believe the move is necessary to maintain proper social distancing guidelines and limit Sailor exposure to the coronavirus

According to NAVADMIN 073/20, the policy only applies to hair length. It does not apply to existing rules regarding sideburns, hair styles and facial hair shaving requirements.

"Commanding officers may allow for additional hair length and bulk on the sides, top and back of the head, Vice Adm. John B. Nowell, the chief of naval personnel said in the message.

"At no time will relaxed grooming interfere with the proper wearing of Navy head gear, nor present an unprofessional appearance in uniform."

Head gear, the message said, applies to the proper use of protective personal equipment such as helmets, masks and protective hoods.

"Good judgement of leaders at all levels of the chain of command is required to ensure all possible COVID-19 precautions are being taken and grooming standards maintain the desired image of the Navy and its Sailors," Nowell said.

Navy Exchange Barber and Beauty Shops will remain open for now, subject to each individual installation commanding officer's guidance.

While open, shops will limit the number of customers in the shop at any one time to maximize social distancing.

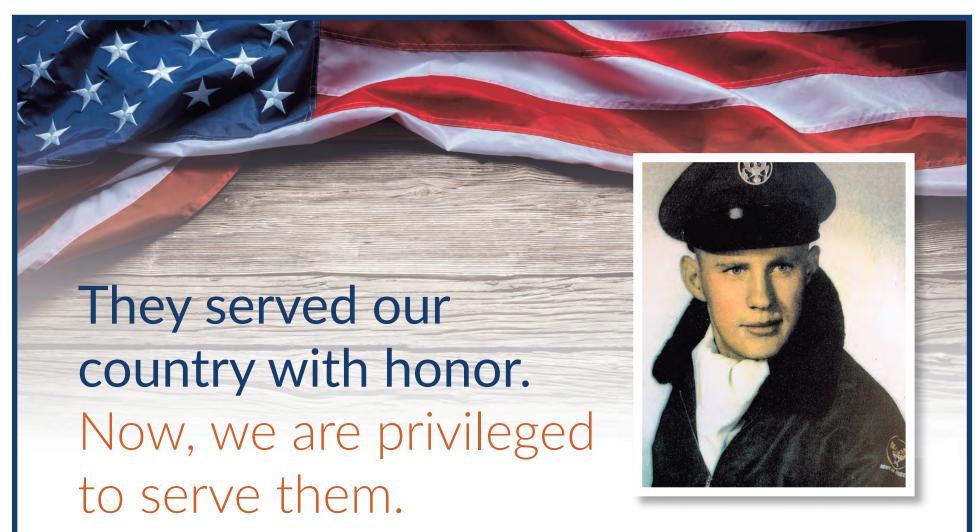
Those efforts will be in addition to the normal sanitation procedures NEX Barber and Beauty Shops must follow as directed by the Navy's Bureau of Medicine and Surgery.

These every-day requirements include routine cleaning and disinfecting of tools, and implements as well as surface areas with antibacterial cleaner.

Tools that actually touch customers, such as combs, brushes, shears, and clippers must be cleaned after each use. In addition, barbers and beauticians must wash their hand with soap and water for at least 20 seconds between customers.

Shipboard barbershops will continue operate under rules put out by their commanding officer or type commander.

Regardless if aboard ship or ashore, Sailors are reminded to take measures to minimize their exposure to the coronavirus when visiting or selecting any military or civilian barber shop or beauty salon for their grooming needs.

Navy postpones selection boards

WASHINGTON

Efforts to prevent the spread of the coronavirus has led the Navy's top personnel officer to suspend all selection boards until further notice.

The decision was announced in NAVADMIN 072/20 on March 18 as a further precaution "to protect the health and safety of our force," Vice Adm. John B. Nowell, the Navy's chief of personnel, said in the message.

The suspension affects all officer and

enlisted selection boards that were set to convene at Navy Personnel Command on or after March 24. This includes promotion, advancement, milestone and any other selection boards.

The suspension of boards was done to reduce the unnecessary risk of official travel to Millington, Tenn. where boards convene as well as limit large groups of Sailors working in close proximity to one

Once boards are again greenlighted "we anticipate it will generally follow the original selection board sequence," Nowell

"As the COVID-19 situation evolves, NPC will refine the board schedule and will promulgate additional guidance that ensures no eligible Sailor is disadvantaged by this action."

All originally published requirements for enlisted advancement eligibility or officer promotion zones will apply to the rescheduled boards. This means only those eligible for the original board based on original board convening schedule will be considered. No additional candidates will be added.

Letters to any officer or enlisted board are still due by the originally scheduled date. These will be maintained at NPC until that member's board meets.

Any enlisted Sailor with a high-year tenure date falling between July 1 and Nov. 30 can request a high-tenure waiver through Dec. 31 to remain selection board eligible. This applies to the Active Duty E-7, 8 and 9 as well as the Selected Reserve and Full-Time Support E-7 boards.

Once board season resumes, policy is being developed to ensure retroactive dates of rank can be set and allowances for back pay made, if necessary, after board results are eventually approved or confirmed by the Senate, ensuring no Sailor is disadvantaged by the delay.

NCIS: Beware of **Coronavirus-themed scams**

The novel coronavirus pandemic presents an opportunity for malicious actors to conduct spearphishing campaigns, financial scams, and disinformation campaigns via social media to collect sensitive information, steal money via fake donation websites, spread false information, and deliver malware to victims.

Several spearphishing campaigns since January have falsely represented various healthcare organizations, including the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the World Health Organization. In many cases, victims receive coronavirus-themed emails requesting the victim to open an attachment or click on a link to obtain details about the coronavirus. Once a victim clicks on the attachment or link, they are directed to a malicious website requesting the victim to enter login credentials.

Law enforcement agencies have observed campaigns wherein victims received hoax emails from what appear to be the CDC requesting donations via Bitcoin to fund an "incident management system" in response to the coronavirus pandemic. Agencies also observed in February a spearphishing campaign targeting Japanbased Internet users with emails that ap- change passwords often. peared to provide information relating to
Go directly to a trustworthy website for coronavirus prevention. The emails in- information rather than clicking on email cluded malicious Microsoft Office files that upon opening would initiate the download of a sophisticated Trojan known as

U.S. officials have released statements advising Russia is likely behind coronavirus disinformation campaigns that are being spread via social media. Reports indicate thousands of Twitter, Facebook, and Instagram accounts have been used to spread false information about the coronavirus pandemic.

Although there is no evidence that the Department of the Navy has been targeted, NCIS urges DON personnel to remain vigilant and use the following best practices to identify and avoid online scams:

■ Use complex passwords, use different

passwords for different services, and

- attachments, links, or pop-ups.
- Double-check a website address prior to typing it in as scammers typically slightly alter URLs so they closely resemble a
- legitimate URL. ■ Do not enter sensitive data such as username and password into websites that
- do not typically ask for it. ■ Use multi-factor authentication when-
- Check for spelling and grammatical errors within the contents of emails or suspicious websites.
- Keep systems updated and running antivirus software.

said. Defense Secretary Dr. Mark T. Esper suggested yesterday that one role for military medical professionals in regard to

coronavirus response would be to take non-coronavirus patient care off of the hands of civilian hospital staffs so that those staffs could instead deal with coronavirus patients. Military medical personnel, and military medical facilities are geared more toward trauma care than dealing with contagious patients, he said.

The Defense Department has also put a number of active duty medical units on alert. That includes different types of units, Friedrichs said. "Right now, what we are

trying to do is make sure we have a range of options available to meet the requests that may come to us from [the Department of Health and Human Services] and from communities."

Altogether, Friedrichs said, enough units have been put on alert to provide 1,000 beds, a number that doesn't include those on the Navy's hospital ships.

DOD has a variety of deployable medical units it could draw on to provide those 1,000 beds, Friedrichs said, including Air Force Expeditionary Medical System units that can be transported rapidly on aircraft; the Army's much larger Combat Support Hospitals, which can also be deployed by air or over the ground; Army field hospitals; and Navy Expeditionary Medical Fa-

Hoffman also said that as of 5 a.m. today, 49 military personnel, 14 civilian employees, 19 military family members and seven contractors had confirmed cases of coronavirus.

The hospital ship USNS Mercy (T-AH 19) departed Naval Station San Diego today, and is now underway to Los Angeles in support of the nation's COVID-19 response efforts.

"This global crisis demands whole-ofovernment response, and we are ready to support," said Capt. John Rotruck, Mercy's Military Treatment Facility commanding officer. "Mercy brings a team of medical professionals, medical equip-

ment, and supplies, all of which will act, in essence, as a 'relief valve' for local civilian hospitals in Los Angeles so that local health professionals can better focus on COVID-19 cases. We will use our agility and responsiveness as an afloat Medical Treatment Facility to do what the country asks, and bring relief where we are needed

with over 800 Navy medical personnel and support staff with the afloat medical treatment facility (MTF), and over 70 civil service mariners. The ship will serve as a

referral hospital for non-COVID-19 patients currently admitted to shore-based hospitals, and will provide a full spectrum of medical care to include general surgeries, critical care and ward care for adults. This will allow local health professionals to focus on treating COVID-19 patients and for shore-based hospitals to use their Intensive Care Units and ventilators for those patients.

Civil service mariners operate and navigate the ship, load and off-load mission cargo, assist with repairs to mission equipment and provide essential services to keep the MTF up and running.

Mercy's MTF is an embarked crew of medical personnel from the Navy's Bureau of Medicine and Surgery responsible for operating and maintaining one of the largest trauma facilities in the United States.

USNS Mercy's primary mission is to provide an afloat, mobile, acute surgical medical facility to the U.S. military that is

flexible, capable and uniquely adaptable to support expeditionary warfare. Mercy's secondary mission is to provide full hospital services to support U.S. disaster relief and humanitarian operations worldwide.

Mercy is the first of two Mercy-class hospital ships. A converted San Clementeclass supertanker, Mercy was delivered to the Navy's Military Sealift Command Nov. 8, 1986.

Military Sealift Command operates the ships which sustain our warfighting forces and deliver specialized maritime services in support of national security objectives in peace and war.

U.S. 3rd Fleet leads naval forces in the Indo-Pacific and provides the realistic, relevant training necessary for an effective global Navy, U.S. 3rd Fleet works in close coordination with U.S. 7th Fleet to provide commanders with capable, ready assets across the spectrum of military operations in the Indo-Pacific.

Telework increased for Reserve Sailors; Some admin requirements waived

As part of the ongoing efforts to minimize COVID-19 Coronavirus transmission, Commander, Navy Reserve Force (CNRF) is waiving several telework administrative requirements and increasing telework options for Reserve Sailors.

Per ALNAVRESFOR 009/20, the changes are to encourage liberal telework arrangements at all Reserve command levels to the maximum extent possible in order to provide Reserve Sailors opportunities to continue to complete annual drill point requirements.

"In order to help ensure our Reservists maintain readiness and get credit towards their 'good year,' we are making it significantly easier to telework," said CNRF Deputy Commander Rear Adm. John Schommer. "Our intent is to provide maximum flexibility for our Selected Reserve (SELRES) Sailors and set them up for success during these challenging times."

According to Schommer, unit leadership, coordinating with Navy Reserve Activity (NRA) leadership, is directed to work with drilling Reservists to accommodate liberal completion of Inactive Duty Training (IDT) via telework.

To allow for drill points to still be accrued, the following telework administrative requirements listed under COMNAVRESFOR Instruction 1000.9A have been waived, effective immediately, through May 11 for all Reserve Force active duty, Full-Time Support and drilling Reserve Sailors.

- Telework Fundamentals Employee Training & Telework Fundamentals - Manager Training
- DD Form 2946, Telework Agreement

- NAVRES 1000/7, Telework Eligibility Checklist
- NAVRES 1000/8, Telework Request Form
- NAVPERS 1070/613, Administrative Remarks (Page 13)

Several tasks and training opportunities available for Reservists to complete while on telework include preparing for unit training, accomplishing unit administrative tasks such as writing evaluation and fitness reports, completing online General Military Training requirements, and other tasks as directed by unit leadership.

While many remote tasks are routine in nature for Reservists, Schommer wants Navy Reserve leaders to think outside the box to be able to complete drills away from Navy Reserve Activities.

"Of course, completing GMTs is second nature to us, and even doable over mobile devices through the R2S application, but be

creative," Schommer said. "Some medical check-ups can be done over the phone. Is your passport application complete? Look at your upcoming security clearance needs or maybe you can work on reenlistment, awards or high-year tenure documents. At a minimum, all Selected Reservists should be able to update their Page 2's and update their civilian skills-set, or their family emergency data, in the Navy Family Accountability and Assessment System (NFASS)."

As Reserve Sailors complete and record drills through the Navy Standard Integrated Personnel System (NSIPS) Electronic Drill Management (EDM), members are reminded to select the 'telework' dropdown option from the IDT menu.

Special instructions for unit telework mustering have been provided via the CNRF GovDelivery services. If unit leadership has not received the instructions, they should reach out to their higher echelon for instruc-

distancing.

- Maximize telework plans for telework ready employees.
- Continue to approve leave and travel to and from the area on a case-by-case basis.
- Coordinate with state and local authorities to synchronize in-garrison self-monitoring guidance for personnel returning from higher risk locations.
- Assess travelers, in accordance with current guidance, upon arrival from other areas and inform them of any local monitoring and movement expectations.
- Evaluate operations at visitor control centers: utilize electronic means to the maximum extent possible to grant installation access. Discontinue waiting room utilization if social distancing cannot be maintained. If necessary, direct customers to secondary holding areas until called.
- All commands coordinate with contractors, vendors, delivery services, etc., to ensure their personnel are not performing services while sick or symptomatic

Every effort to limit COVID-19 exposure to the workforce should be implemented while balancing the mission requirements established by local commanders

The Department of Defense HPCON framework provides recommended force health protection guidance to safeguard personnel and promote mission assurance. The HPCON framework is:

HPCON 0: Routine: Normal operations. Maintain standard precautions such as routine hand washing, cough on sleeve, good diet, exercise, vaccinations, education, routine health alerts, and regular preparedness activities

HPCON A: Limited: Health Alert. Communicate risk and symptoms of health threat to installation; review plans and verify training, stocks, and posture; prepare to

diagnose, isolate, and report new cases **HPCON B:** Moderate: Strict hygiene (no

handshaking, wipe common-use items); if

exposed, self-isolate (wear mask or remain

home); avoid contaminated water/food or risk area; vector control if applicable

HPCON C: Substantial: Social distancing (limit or cancel in-person meetings, gatherings, temporary duty assignments); shelter in-place indoors; utilize respirators; mass distribution of medical counter measures.

HPCON D: Severe: Restriction of movement (e.g., quarantine).

HPCON C (MINUS) implements all actions of HPCON A and B and many elements of HPCON C. At this time, base remain open and the Navy is not conducting medical screenings at entry control points.

Center for Seabees helps develop Seabee rate training app

for advancement. Sailors in the seven Seabee rates can now download the Naval Construction Forces' new Seabee Rate Training Manuals (RTM) App and study on the go, whereever they are in the world. They can download RTMs in PDF format, answer and score review questions, and enter completed courses directly into their Electronic Training Jacket by entering their DODID number.

Chief Steelworker Samuel Ruby of the Center for Seabees and Facilities Engineering, who led the development, testing, and release of the application, said the app was designed with the fleet in mind.

"We developed the app to give Seabees the ability to have a reference for studying for the advancement exam, 24/7, around the world, without needing a CAC enabled asset and without having to print massive files," said Ruby.

Sailors can access the app without a CAC and once in, they can review course summaries, illustrations and glossaries, bookmarked content, set calendar reminders, find contact information for support, and send questions and comments to rating program managers using the in-app feedback form.

Addressing emotional responses to threat of coronavirus

While in graduate school, I was involved with some interesting research that examined students' reactions to media coverage on the potential threat of a disease pandemic such as coronavirus. The study showed several interesting findings, including high rates of worry that family members would contract the disease or that treatment might not be available. We also found that negative emotions associated with an outbreak (such as worry, fear, or hostility) might result in ignoring precautions rather than taking positive actions to decrease risk of infection.

With mounting worry and fear about the current outbreak of coronavirus, it's worth taking a pause to look at how to mitigate some of the emotional and behavioral effects that might come from media coverage and the threat of coronavirus.

Stay home if you're sick - and even if you're not. If you're feeling sick, be responsible and isolate yourself at home. This will be a great opportunity to binge watch your favorite series. We all want to preserve our paid time off, but a few unproductive hours being sick at work likely won't be worth potentially sharing a virus with your coworkers. Even if you're feeling healthy, medical professionals recommend staying home and limiting social contact as much as possible since avoiding those who are sick is the best way to decrease transmission of viruses.

Coping with Isolation. In most of the country, school has been cancelled, religious services have been curtailed, and recreational venues have been closed. The result for many has been a sense of isolation and feeling cut off from friends, family, and coworkers. The most important way to cope with this type of isolation is to re-establish and stick to a regular routine. Even if you are "stuck" at home, you

can establish a regular schedule for activities, such as routine chores, reading a book, or exercise. Kids in particular benefit from a consistent schedule, to include time set aside for learning activities and a regular bedtime.

Limit media exposure. During events such as natural disasters, terrorist attacks, and pandemics, the 24-hour news cycle can create significant anxiety and pull attention away from consistent day-to-day tasks. The best option for news updates is to find a reliable source, and check it on a limited schedule.

Control what you can. Consistently practicing good habits is one of the best ways to deal with worry and anxiety. The most effective ways to decrease coronavirus risk are the things you learned as a child: 1) Wash your hands regularly with hot water and soap (if you sing the "happy birthday" song while you do it, then you are washing long enough); 2) Prevent spreading viruses by coughing into the crook of your elbow; 3) Decrease likelihood of contracting a virus by not touching your face. Focusing on these basics will give you a better sense of control over your risk of

2009 H1N1 swine flu pandemic, I had small children who had risk of infection. Rather than anxiously chasing them around with a bottle of hand sanitizer, my wife and I made a game of making pig noises with the kids while practicing good hand washing. This ensured that we were creating good habits without focusing on the anxiety of our kids getting

What's with the facemask? One of the interesting effects of anxiety about coronavirus has been buying and wearing surgical masks. Although these might seem like a tangible and visible step to decrease risk, these masks won't actually prevent you from catching the disease. The intent of a surgical

mask is to keep the person wearing the mask (such as your surgeon or dentist) from infecting other people. The only time you should wear a mask is if you are already sick and you want to decrease the likelihood that you will get other people sick. You also can increase your risk of infection if you are frequently touching your face to adjust an ill-fitting

Get your info from reputable sources. Seeking information is a common way to cope with fearful situations. However, anxiety about the coronavirus has led to a lot of absurd myths being perpetuated from less-reputable sources. Any promises of a miracle cure for coronavirus involving essential oils, household chemicals, or herbal concoctions are inaccurate and frequently harmful. If you are worried about coronavirus and need more information, stick to these reputable sources with a scientific basis:

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention World Health Organization

Center for the Study of Traumatic Stress Occupational Safety and Health Adminis-

Military Health System

Manage your anxiety symptoms. If after taking the steps above anxiety is still interfering with your daily activities, practice these tips from the Real Warriors Campaign to help manage symptoms:

Prioritize sleep and aim to get seven to eight hours each night.

Get active to boost your mood, reduce stress, and help improve your quality of sleep. Limit caffeine and alcohol which can re-

duce feelings of anxiety in the moment but increase fatigue and anxiety the next day.

Reflect and relax by practicing breathing and relaxation techniques, such as meditation and yoga, or writing down your thoughts in a journal.

Pondering Pandemonium

By the time you read this, what I've written will be a mere time capsule — a frozen moment in our ever-changing sociological and physiological status. Columns are supposed to be timely, but with a new chronicle being made in hourly increments since the coronavirus outbreak, this week's musing is bound to be old news. So, consider this a history lesson. A look back at "the olden days" of last week, when life was entirely different than it is today.

About a week ago, I was in at a Latin bar in Key West, in a conga line with my teenage daughter and a horde of sweaty strangers, dancing and laughing, entirely carefree. A few days later, the Governor of Florida announced the mandatory closure of all bars and restaurants across the state to combat the global coronavirus pandemic.

At the Key West airport, waiting for the flight home from our ill-timed motherdaughter spring break trip, I waffled between thoughts of cautious indignation and secret panic as news blared on an overhead television at the gate.

"Everyone must be overreacting," I mumbled to my daughter, Lilly, with a dismissive huff. "I read that at least half a million people die of the flu every year, but over 95 percent of people infected with coronavirus

recover, so why should everything shut

Lilly, who I had insisted wear gloves and a scarf over her mouth and nose while traveling, shrugged. A minute later, a woman nearby coughed. Lilly and I glanced anxiously at each other. With gloved hands, I pulled my own scarf up over my nose, my eyes darting suspiciously.

Was I overreacting, too?

My husband picked us up at the airport. On the way home, he updated us on the state of emergency in our area. "I'm working from home until further notice, your hours at the library have been cut, we have to pick up Anna from college because her classes are online for the rest of the semester, and we have exactly twelve and a half rolls of toilet paper left at the house."

At home, we laughed about how ridiculous people were acting, but our underlying instincts told us to gather our family into the safety of our nest and hunker down.

The next day while imposing my own self-quarantine, my mind continued to waver between skepticism and dread over news reports. Between pity and pride in human beings. Between greed and gratitude for our personal belongings. Between confidence and concern over our finances.

Gun sales soared, stocks plummeted, schools closed, hospitals filled, death tolls

rose. Yet governments acted responsibly, citizens volunteered, an economic stimulus package was enacted, and random acts of kindness abounded.

By the end of the day, I needed a break from thinking about serious things. I'd cook a comforting home-cooked meal for my family, and we'd all watch a movie. For a couple of hours, we'd pretend like things were like they used to be.

While I had been in Key West, my husband had gone to the base commissary to stock up on "the essentials." I opened the fridge to find two cheap frozen pizzas, sports drinks, a bag of oranges, a head of iceberg lettuce, salami, a loaf of bread, milk, eggs and various half-used condiments.

Ironically, the sparseness of our food supply made me suddenly realize what I'd taken for granted. I found a wrinkling yellow pepper and a red onion to spruce up the pizzas. The radishes and carrots in the back of the vegetable drawer were still good, so with a half-bottle of Italian dressing, I made a tossed salad, too.

I still wanted to believe that the pandemic was just an overreaction, but as my family ate, I knew that, real or not, this crisis would reset my values. I would be grateful for family, for neighbors, for the military, for healthcare workers, for my job at the library, for my hairdresser who covers my greys, for restaurants, for first responders, for wrinkled peppers, for frozen pizzas ... and yes, for twelve and a half rolls of toilet paper.

Ready for the Fleet: Ford completes flight deck, CATCC certifications

"Man all flight quarters stations!" These words were heard across every space on USS Gerald R. Ford (CVN 78) last week as she prepared to launch "cat" and recover "trap" aircraft from Carrier Air Wing EIGHT (CVW 8), in order to complete Flight Deck Certification (FDC) and Carrier Air Traffic Control Center (CATCC) Certification, Mar. 20.

Conducting flight operations is the key role of every aircraft carrier in support of the Navy's mission to deter aggression and maintain freedom of the seas.

In order to certify Ford's flight deck and carrier air traffic control center, the ship was required to complete a Precision Approach Landing Systems (PALS) certification, and conduct two consecutive days of flight operations with 50 day traps on day one, followed by 70 day traps and 40 night traps on day two. Together, the crews of Ford and CVW 8 exceeded those minimum requirements

Over a two-day period, F/A-18E and F/A-18F Super Hornets from four squadrons assigned to CVW 8 conducted 123 day, and 42 night cats and traps aboard Ford to reach this milestone in Ford's operational readiness

"Our Sailors performed at a level that was on par with a forward deployed aircraft carrier, and this was a direct result of the hard core training and deployment ready mentality we have pushed every day for the past year," said Capt. J. J. Cummings, Ford's commanding officer. "Our team put their game faces on, stepped into the batter's box and smashed line drives out of the park. It was fun to watch."

Prior to FDC and CATCC certification, Ford received its PALS Mode IA and Mode II certification from Naval Air Warfare Center Aircraft Division (NAWCAD). PALS, through the assistance of air traffic controllers in CATCC, aids pilots as they execute night or bad weather landings, guiding pilots to a good starting position for approaches; and is a requirement for ships to conduct flight operations.

"PALS cert was a critical step to achieving our flight deck certification," said Cmdr. Phil Brown, Ford's air operations officer. "Our system performed really well during our approaches, and provided a solid level of confidence to NAWCAD in our ability to recover jets."

The Ford CATCC team was not only essential to FDC, but was also required to complete a certification in concert with the flight deck certification.

Ford's CATCC certification was the culmination of a three-phase process that began in October 2019 at the Naval Air Technical Training Center (NATTC) in Pensacola, Florida. Since then, NATTC instructors have been alongside Ford Sailors for every phase, testing their practical knowledge, reviewing their checklists, and observing their recovery operations.

According to Chief Air Traffic Controller Lavese McCray, Ford's OC Division leading chief petty officer, the NATTC CATCC team trainer was an essential factor to Ford's success.

"We had no rust to knock off," said Mc-Cray. "We've tested and trained for so many operations that it made the [certification] scenarios look easy."

The case III recovery scenario Ford completed during certification required aircraft to be stacked up behind the ship in 2 mile increments, in order to land on the flight deck every minute, a challenging task required of deployment-ready aircraft carriers. Ford was able to trap aircraft 55 seconds apart.

In its certification letter, Commander Naval Air Forces Atlantic (CNAL) inspectors provided shout-outs to the Sailors who performed exceptionally well during the certification.

"It was very apparent the entire CATCC team put forth a great deal of effort preparing for their CATCC certification," the letter stated. "All CATCC functional areas were outstanding. Additionally, the leadership and expertise exhibited by the Air Operations Officer and his staff were extremely evident throughout the course of the entire

week."

Air Traffic Controller First Class Scott Torres, Ford's CATCC chief, was recognized in the certification letter for his accomplishments, and shared the credit with his teammates in air department, noting that the certification was a group effort.

"Our success was a testament to air department, and their ability to quickly move aircraft from catapults to arrestments," said Torres. "The cert is about safety and efficiency, and their efficiency was really high."

The human element critical to FDC is the relationship between ship's company and the air wing in the "black top ballet" of flight deck operations. During hours-long evolutions, the teams work together to communicate pilots' status, their requirements, and provide them services.

CNAL's Handler evaluated how well the teams were able to work together to taxi and park aircraft on the flight deck, and to stack them up behind catapults for take-off. According to Capt. Joshua Sager, CVW 8 commander, and the first pilot to land onboard Ford to commence FDC on day one, the crews of Ford and CVW 8 worked together seamlessly.

crews, to the catapult and arresting gear teams, this ship demonstrated a level of professional competence that rivals any of her peers," said Sager. "I truly look forward to further air wing integration in the coming at-sea periods."

Lt. Cmdr. Rodney King, Ford's Handler, credited the crew's smooth operations to the training they conducted leading up to certification.

"You're only as good as your last move," said King. "You have to stay two steps ahead of the briefed plan, and we did a lot of training, so I had no doubt they'd be successful."

The completion of FDC and CATCC certification marks another first for Ford. She is now ready to give back to the fleet, as the only carrier qualification asset regularly available on the east coast this year.

"Over the past two days, the Ford and Carrier Air Wing EIGHT teams made incredible strides forward for the Naval Aviation Enterprise," concluded Sager. "Flying night sorties aboard the Ford felt exactly the same as previous experiences I've had while deployed on seasoned Nimitz-class carriers, and I'm so proud to have been a part of the flight deck certification of Ford."

Department of Defense tests hypersonic glide body

WASHINGTON

The Department of Defense successfully tested a hypersonic glide body in a flight experiment conducted from the Pacific Missile Range Facility, Kauai, Hawaii, March 19 at approximately 10:30 p.m. local time (HST).

The U.S. Navy and U.S. Army jointly executed the launch of a common hypersonic glide body (C-HGB), which flew at hypersonic speed to a designated impact point.

Concurrently, the Missile Defense Agency (MDA) monitored and gathered tracking data from the flight experiment that will inform its ongoing development of systems designed to defend against adversary hypersonic weapons.

Information gathered from this and future experiments will further inform DOD's

hypersonic technology development, and this event is a major milestone towards the department's goal of fielding hypersonic warfighting capabilities in the early- to mid-2020s.

"This test builds on the success we had with Flight Experiment 1 in October 2017, in which our C-HGB achieved sustained hypersonic glide at our target distances," said Vice Adm. Johnny R. Wolfe, Director, Navy's Strategic Systems Programs, which is the lead designer for the C-HGB. "In this test we put additional stresses on the system and it was able to handle them all, due to the phenomenal expertise of our top notch team of individuals from across government, industry and academia. Today we validated our design and are now ready to move to the next phase towards fielding a hypersonic strike capability."

Hypersonic weapons, capable of flying at speeds greater than five times the speed of sound (Mach 5), are highly maneuverable and operate at varying altitudes. This provides the warfighter with an ability to strike targets hundreds and even thousands of miles away, in a matter of minutes, to defeat a wide range of high-value targets. Delivering hypersonic weapons is one of the department's highest technical research and engineering priorities.

"This test was a critical step in rapidly delivering operational hypersonic capabilities to our warfighters in support of the National Defense Strategy," said U.S. Army LTG L. Neil Thurgood, Director of Hypersonics, Directed Energy, Space and Rapid Acquisition, whose office is leading the Army's Long Range Hypersonic Weapon program and joint C-HGB production. "We successfully executed a mission consistent with how we can apply this capability in the future. The joint team did a tremendous job in executing this test, and we will continue to move aggressively to get prototypes to the field."

The C-HGB – when fully fielded – will comprise the weapon's conventional warhead, guidance system, cabling, and thermal protection shield. The Navy and Army are working closely with industry to develop the C-HGB with Navy as the lead designer, and Army as the lead for production. Each service will use the C-HGB, while developing individual weapon systems and launchers tailored for launch from sea or

The similarities in hypersonic weapon design for sea and land variants provide economies of scale for future production as we build the U.S. hypersonics industrial

"Hypersonic systems deliver transformational warfighting capability," said Mr. Mike White, Assistant Director, Hypersonics, OUSD Research and Engineering (Modernization). "The glide body tested today is now ready for transition to Army and Navy weapon system development efforts and is one of several applications of hypersonic technology underway across the Department. These capabilities help ensure that our warfighters will maintain the battlefield dominance necessary to deter, and if necessary, defeat any future adversary."

Additionally, MDA is working closely with Army and Navy in sharing data that will inform their development of enhanced capabilities for a layered hypersonic defense to support warfighter need and outpace the adversary threat.

Cause Mapping course allows staff to map safer solutions

The Naval Safety and Environmental Training Center and Naval Safety Center (NAVSAFECEN) Mishap Investigations Team cohosted a Cause Mapping course March 3-5. Cause Mapping is a systems approach to cause analysis to provide a visualization of cause and effect relationships.

The course allowed participants to find solutions by breaking various problems into their causes to identify different solutions. Breaking processes into its steps helps to identify where solutions apply, clearly document and communicate problems and processes.

"This course and its methodology provide a consistent approach to investigating and preventing a wide array of problems," said Cmdr. Scott Morrill, Deputy Director of Mishap Investigations.

A turf weed analogy can best explain root cause analysis for problem solving. If you do not get to the root, the weed grows back. Root cause analysis digs into the details beneath the surface to provide a thorough explanation and to find better solutions. A comprehensive examination is critical to revealing more opportunities to prevent occurrence. Root-cause analysis reveals multiple causes that contribute to a problem, which can lead to the identification of various ways to mitigate the risk.

Course participants came from various backgrounds with different roles at NAVSAFECEN. As a center of excellence for modern data analytics, all personnel are encouraged to be diligent data stewards and to seek process improvement at all levels.

"As an investigator, I rely on cause mapping as a tool to help visually depict each mishap I investigate," said Capt. Greg Giunta, USMC, a ground mishap investigator assigned to the NAVSAFECEN. "This course helped to confirm my approach, as well as bridge the gap for the rest of the safety center, so each code has a better understanding of the analysis that is being conducted."

The course focused on the investigative process, procedures and the problem-solving cycle. The first two days centered on the principles of collecting and analyzing data, with the third culminating in how to apply these skills through cause mapping.

A cause map diagram visually captures and communicates the details of an issue, just as a map captures and describes the details of a location's terrain. This visual dialogue makes it easier to share insight and synergize the combination of a group's knowledge.

"The skills and tools I have learned will directly affect how I cause map in the future. There was a period of instruction dedicated to "facilitating" the cause map process for a board," said Giunta. "The facilitation process will be useful when I advise Safety Investigation Boards, and I can use this approach to help explain the process."

Participants learned to use a solutions comparison matrix, a helpful tool for evaluating possible solutions. This qualitative cost-benefit analysis tool helps to assess solutions relative to each other and to evaluate alternative solutions.

"Too often most people look at finding a quick solution to a problem; cause mapping showed us how to break things down further," said Aviation Electronics Technician Senior Chief William Crawford, an avion-

ics analyst at NAVSAFECEN. "It is important for us and individuals in the fleet to learn to identify the good outcomes, as well, so we can reproduce those results."

Critical to developing a prevention culture is identifying every single step performed within a company. High-reliability organizations engage people in the problem-solving process by focusing on fixes within the work process.

"I think a lot of people in the fleet would benefit from this cause mapping course and a more analytical problem-identification and solving approach," said Crawford. "The more you do cause mapping or any process improvement, the more it eventually becomes an accepted norm. We can all help mitigate unnecessary risks and implement safer solutions."

TAP available online for transitioning **Sailors**

WASHINGTON

The Navy has suspended all in-person Transition Assistance Program classes due to social distancing rules now in place to prevent the spread of the coronavirus.

But the Navy is not eliminating the training requirement and instead is authorizing all separating and retiring sailors to complete this requirement online, allowing them to separate on time.

Here's what you need to know:

"Commanders must continue to ensure transitioning Service Members are prepared to reintegrate into the civilian community, especially in the challenging times we face. Vice Adm. John B. Nowell, the Navy' top uniformed personnel



official said in NAVADMIN 082/20.

Active-Duty Sailors retiring or separating are exempt from the stop movement, which means that separations and retirements will go on as scheduled, unless Sailors request and are approved to reenlist or extend

The course completion requirement is also still in place for Reserve Sailors on active-duty orders for more than 179 days as well as mobilized reservists within 60 days of redeployment and demobilization.

For those with enough time left on the books, the message recommends they simply reschedule for a later date.

Those inside their 365-days prior to separation start time or 90-days prior to separation Capstone requirement must complete their training through the Joint Knowledge Online Website. Details on the TAP virtual curriculum to include links to the training available on the Department of Defense Transition Assistance Program Website.

What's not changed is the requirement for initial Self-Assessment Counseling, Pre-Separation counseling and Capstone sessions. These can still be done inperson using proper social-distancing protocol or telephonically by command career counselors or TAP managers.

FY20-21 tours with industry applicants sought

Navy announced March 19, that select Sailors can apply to participate in the Secretary of the Navy Tours with Industry (SNTWI) program.

Outlined in NAVADMIN 072/20, SNTWI is a unique and non-traditional opportunity for Active Duty and Full-Time Support (FTS) Sailors in paygrades E-6 to 0-6 to work with corporations. The tours are normally between 10 and 12-months in length depending on community and corporate requirements.

SNTWI Fellows are fully immersed in

corporate industry to learn and observe corporate processes and best practices while actively engaged in projects and company operations. The knowledge gained as a SNTWI Fellow will assist in bringing innovative ideas and proven practices back to the Navy.

Applicants must be high performing, within physical standards of readiness, and within three months of their Projected Rotation Date by September 2020 in order to be eligible for participation. Additionally, applicants who are within 11 months of a career milestone, within three years of retirement, or within one year of re-enlistment by July 2020 are not eligible for this program. Unfortunately, no more applications from the Civil Engineer Corps or the Surface Warfare Officer Corps can be taken for the FY20-21 program. Sailors in the aviation community must contact their detailer with questions regarding eligibility.

Deployed aircraft carriers conduct family member cross-deck visit

Sailors assigned to the aircraft carriers USS Harry S. Truman (CVN 75) and USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69) executed a cross-deck evolution in the Arabian Sea March 18.

The five-hour event allowed family members serving on each ship to spend some time with each other while on deployment.

The family members flew from the Eisenhower to Truman for the morning via an MH-60S Seahawk helicopter.

"Any time we have the opportunity to do something like this, we will," said Capt. Kavon Hakimzadeh, Truman's commanding officer. "Being away from loved ones

for one deployment is always tough, but offset deployment schedules are especially challenging for Sailors with family members who are also serving in the Navy.

"I often refer to the Navy as a family, but it is even more meaningful if Sailors have literal Navy family, and it is truly special when they get a chance to see each other while on deployment."

The last time two aircraft carrier strike groups were in the U.S. 5th Fleet area of operations for an extended period was 2012.

Among those reunited were identical twin sisters Aviation Ordnanceman 2nd Class Alexis Brothers, assigned to the "Proud Warriors" of Helicopter Maritime Strike Squadron (HSM) 72 embarked on Truman, and Master-at-Arms 2nd Class Alechia Brothers, assigned to Eisenhower's

security department.

"It's so nice seeing her," said Alechia Brothers. "When my chief pulled me into his office and asked me if I wanted to see my sister, I immediately turned around. I was crying because I missed her a lot."

Also reunited were Lt. j.g. Kyra Deboni, assigned to the "Sunliners" of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 81 aboard Truman, and Lt. j.g. Lorenzo Deboni, assigned to the "Swordsmen" of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 32 aboard Eisenhower, who have been married for nine months. Both have nearly four years of Navy service.

"It's amazing," said Lorenzo Deboni. "I'm so happy they set this up for us. This is the best part of deployment so far."

Kyra Deboni said the opportunity made her appreciate the little things.

"With both of us being in the military, it can be tough at times," she said. "It makes the time you do have together even more special, because you can go many months apart."

By the end of the event, nine married couples, three pairs of siblings, and two pairs of cousins were given the chance to embrace, catch up on how the other was doing and offer some encouraging words. Although the time they were able to spend together was short, they all expressed gratitude for the opportunity.

Due to both ships being at sea for an extended periodsince their last port visit, there was minimal potential of transferring COVID-19 from ship to ship.

History and Heritage Command moves Navy Art Collection

The Navy Art Collection, a branch of Naval History and Heritage Command (NHHC), suspended services and began renovations March 1, 2020 in order to create a climate-controlled environment, more suitable for storing historical artworks.

The move will affect the Art Gallery loan program for office displays," said Gale Munro, head curator at Navy Art collection. "High-level offices that are eligible for loans of original artwork will see significant delays, because we won't be able to access our storage easily. Loans of reproductions may end

entirely due to lack of facilities. Museums that want loans from Navy Art will need to plan far in advance."

The Navy Art Collection serves as the principal custodian of the Navy's art/ painting heritage; the division collects, documents, preserves, and exhibits art that is significant to the history of the Navy for service personnel and the public, while promoting the creation of such art through its Navy Art Collection traveling exhibition program.

The Navy Art Collection traveling exhibition program is designed to make the artwork accessible to as many people as possible through loans and exhibits to museums and institutions throughout the United States. Borrowers wishing to exhibit Navy Art are generally evaluated

in terms of their service and accessibility to the public. Institutions that meet eligibility requirements, may borrow exhibits for one month or up to six months (or longer depending on the medium and availability of the artwork). There is no participation fee and the only costs are transportation via a fine arts shipper and insurance to cover the value of the artwork while off government property.

Containing almost 20,000 pieces of art, the building where the art is stored was built for industrial use. Due to a lack of insulation, the buildings humidity is uncontrollable.

"The main goal is to make it climate controlled in here," said Munro. "In the past we've had mold grow on pieces causing damage that has to be restored by professional cleaning. If you control the humidity you can at least reduce the mold down to nearly nothing."

USS ROOSEVELT PREPARES FOR HOMEPORT SHIFT TO ROTA

The Arleigh Burke-class guided missile destroyer USS Roosevelt (DDG 80) departed Naval Station Mayport to commence its homeport shift to Rota, Spain, Mar. 21.

Roosevelt will replace USS Carney (DDG64) as one of four forward deployed naval forces (FDNF) Spain. Named in honor of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and his wife Eleanor, Roosevelt is the first Flight IIA ship stationed in Rota, which provides the ability to deploy with two organic Lamps MK III MH-60 helicopters embarked.

"My crew is excited and proud to execute this homeport shift to Rota, said Cmdr. Matthew Molmer, commanding officer, USS Roosevelt. "The hard work, dedication and shear level of effort put forth by my crew over the previous year will ensure delivery of a combat ready ship, with a battle-minded crew to the forefront of Naval Forces forward-deployed to Rota, in support of Sixth Fleet Operations."

To prepare to homeport shift, Roosevelt took part in the Dwight D. Eisenhower Carrier Strike Group's Composite Unit Exercise (COMPTUEX). COMPTUEX is designed to fully integrate a strike group as a cohesive, multi-mission fighting force, and test the group's ability to carry out sustained combat operations from the sea. Upon completion of COMPTUEX, Roosevelt is certified and ready to execute the full spectrum of maritime operations in any theater.

"I am immensely proud of our crew, and of our families who have supported us through our arduous training cycle," said Chief Fire Controlman (Aegis) Beau Sundin. "This is the most rigorous schedule I have seen in my career, and Roosevelt's crew and families have performed beyond all expectation. There is no doubt in my mind that we will be ready for Sixth Fleet."

In addition to certifying to deploy to support naval operations worldwide, Roosevelt Sailors and their families have been focused on preparing for the move to Spain. Staff members from Naval Station Rota traveled to Mayport to conduct briefs and answer questions concerning the homeport shift process, as well as give personnel an insight into daily life in Spain. Roosevelt's chain of command ensured that each Sailor had the opportunity to complete personal errands necessary for a move overseas, despite the busy schedule.

For Roosevelt's departure, friends and family members were asked to farewell their loved ones away from the pier and to observe proper social distancing to the maximum extent possible. The U.S. Navy will continue to meet combatant commander requirements around the world, but in order to do so, we must take protective steps to ensure the health and the safety our Sailors and their families.

Naval Station Mayport has served as Roosevelt's homeport since her commissioning in 2000. The naval base is capable of accommodating 34 ships and has an 8,000-foot (2,400 m) runway capable of handling most any aircraft in the Department of Defense inventory.

These multi-mission ships focus on ballistic missile defense in the Mediterranean Sea and Atlantic Ocean.

"It's great to share this moment in history with Ford. Integration between the air wing and ship's company is crucial to the everyday success of carrier operations," said Sager. "Completion of the 1,000th catapult and arrestment shows that the ship and her crew have tested and proven the newest technology the Navy has, and together we are ready to meet the operational requirements of our nation."

With 1,000 launches and recoveries complete, Ford will continue its flight deck and combat air traffic control certifications in preparation to deliver to the fleet regular flight operations in support of East Coast

Before closing, Norfolk's animal shelter found homes for all of its animals – and many more

Within minutes of sending out a public plea for help Friday afternoon, the computers at Norfolk Animal Care & Adoption Center began to chime.

Each ding represented an email from someone interested in taking in a dog or cat before the shelter was forced to close as a result of the coronavirus outbreek

And they didn't stop.

"I could hear from the different offices things like, 'Oh!' and 'Oh, my!" shelter manager Michelle Dos-

son said, recalling how staff members and volunteers reacted as they sorted through the hundreds of responses that poured in.

The facility's lobby was packed Saturday morning with people wanting to take pets home. By the time it closed Sunday, all of the animals were gone. Fifty had found permanent homes and five were placed in foster care.

The adopted pets included 24 dogs, 23 cats and three guinea pigs. Most were from the Norfolk facility, but some came from a shelter in Newport News.

"The one word to describe it would be magical,"

said Dosson, who just took over the role of bureau manager three weeks ago. "We had the community coming out in droves to help us."

The plea for assistance was sent out less than 24 hours after Norfolk officials announced that all city facilities — including libraries, recreation centers, Nauticus and the zoo — would be closed to the public for two weeks.

The order also included the animal care center. It was set to go into effect the following Monday, giving staff just a couple days to find homes for all its pets.

When Dosson saw the enormous community response Saturday, she contacted the Peninsula Regional Animal Shelter in Newport News later that evening to see if they'd like to have their animals included in the effort. The facility sent over eight cats and seven dogs Sunday morning, all of which found

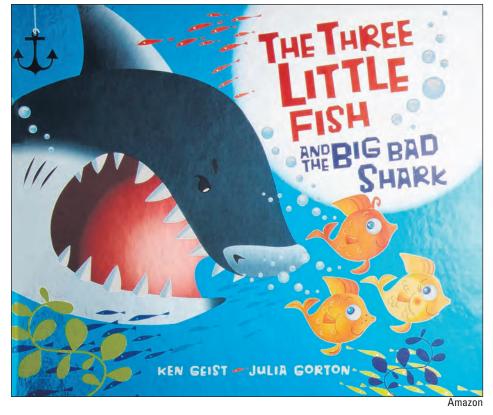

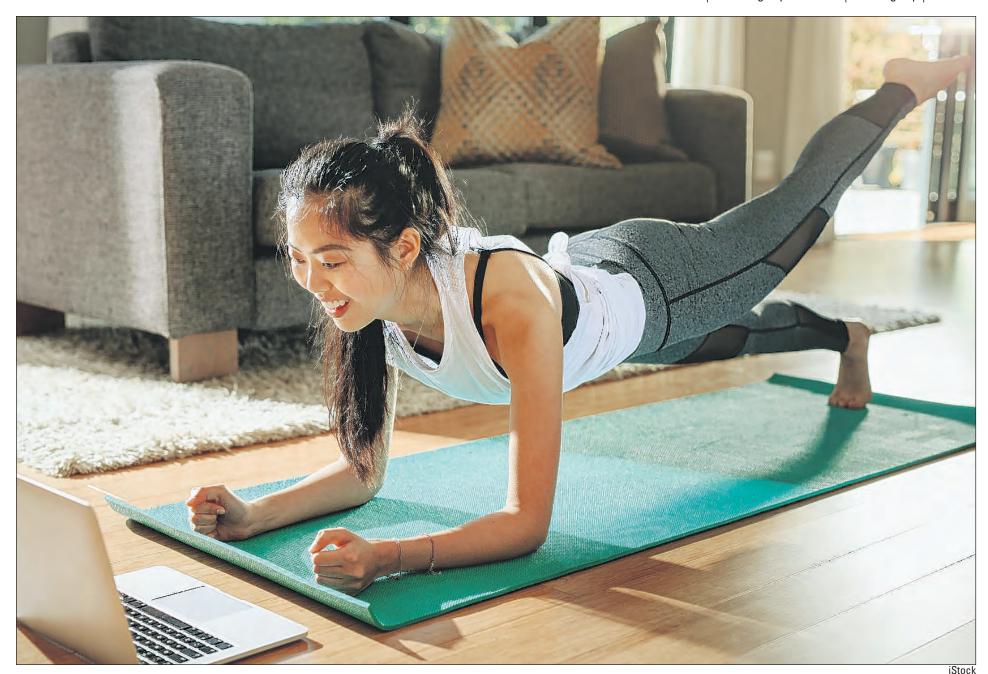
Dosson said the shelter has received nearly 500 emails since issuing its plea. Another 70 people came to the center to fill out a foster application.

The names and contact information for each person who reached out will be compiled into a list that the shelter plans to use when they need foster homes in the future.

Although the facility is now closed to the public, staff will continue to pick up loose animals, Dosson said.

Those that have evidence of having an owner — like a collar or microchip — will be held on the stray list for 10 days, while those that don't appear to have an owner will be kept on it for five. After that, the ones deemed to be adoptable will become available for foster care while the facility remains closed, and eventually for adoption once it opens up again.

Regular exercise is beneficial for immunity and can help flush bacteria out of the lungs and airways—it's also necessary to maintaining a healthy mindset, especially as many companies are now having their employees work remotely. "If you're working from home, it's important to stay consistent with your workouts to help maximize productivity and keep a routine," says certified personal trainer Alix Turoff, MS, RD, CDN, CPT.

7 BEST TIPS FOR WORKING OUT FROM HOME

For people who have a home gym, working out can be simple, but for those of us used to training in a studio, we have to get a little creative. "If you're home without any equipment, your body is your own machine! Work it," says corrective exercise specialist Tatiana Lampa, ACSM CPT, NASM CES.

Certified Personal Trainer Rachael De-Vaux, RD, CPT, PES, suggests grabbing anything that resembles dumbbells like: laundry detergent, bags of produce, or milk jugs, for your own makeshift gym. "Investing in some resistance bands from Amazon can offer a huge variety of different exer-

cises as well," she adds. **Tip:** If you're not used to working out at home, Elise Young, CPT, FMS, of Elise's Body Shop, says it's important to designate a spot in the house that feels like a good fit for some movement. "This is a stressful time and we must adjust to the place we are currently in. Lay out a mat or towel and make that your spot."

Below, we've rounded up several of our trainers' favorite at-home work out movements to try and incorporate into your routine. DeVaux suggests choosing six exercises, breaking them up into two circuits, and completing each exercise for 12-14 reps, three rounds through each circuit.

Legs and Glutes Workouts

Squats: Try air squats, side step squats, sumo squats, jump squats, and even weighted squats. You can even try holding a large bottle of detergent to get some added resistance with your squats, just make sure the lid is on tight.

Lunges: Front lunges, back lunges, and even side-to-side lunges are an excellent exercise for targeting the large muscles of the lower body. For an advanced movement, try jump lunges to get your heart rate up.

Glute bridge: This is a great bodyweight exercise to help warm-up the glutes and several muscles prior to incorporating more range of motion and any weights. You can enhance a glute bridge with resistance bands, and really make sure that you engage your core in addition to your glutes. Start with a regular glute bridge and work your way up to the single-leg bridge, which is very effective because it targets your ham-

strings, glutes, and core.

Step ups: Look for a durable box or sturdy bench to bang out some low-impact step ups. This move is great for balance, stabilization, and building strength. Hold some weights or detergent bottles on either side of the body for extra resistance.

Wall sits: Turoff says this effective and simple exercise activates your glutes, hamstrings, and quads. Try a 1:1 approach by working for 30 seconds and resting for 30 seconds, then repeating 3-4 times until you feel the burn.

Abs and Arms Workouts

Push-ups: A fantastic full-body workout, push-ups work almost every muscle with a huge emphasis on upper body and core strength. Even if you can't do a regular one, consider dropping to your knees or doing them against a countertop to make the transition easier. Try DeVaux's push-up progression here.

Dips: "Couches and chairs are a great alternative to a bench and allow for a ton of different movements," says Young. This makes for the perfect solution when doing dips to target the tricep muscles.

Planks: Probably the most effective core workout, planks really do benefit the entire body and require a ton of stabilization throughout your core. Try planks on your forearms, and work up building strength in a side plank if possible.

Shoulder taps: While you're at it holding a strong plank, consider incorporating shoulder taps to build stability and strength. Shoulder taps work you transverse abdominals and obliques as well.

Twists: Grab a weight or detergent bottle for added resistance, and pick your feet up off the floor for an even harder challenge.

Full Body Workouts

Burpees: This high-intensity, plyometric exercise is perfect for getting your heart rate up and is a fantastic finisher to any workout. Try doing burpees tabata style: push for 20 seconds, then rest for 10 seconds. Repeat four to eight times for a full-body endurance workout!

Tuck jumps: This vertical jump involves a lot of intensity and raising your knees to your chest. Tuck jumps make for a great high intensity interval training movement.

high intensity interval training movement.

Mountain climbers: Build strength, endurance, and cardiovascular stamina with mountain climbers. Try them at different paces; go fast if you want to get your heart rate up, or slow down and engage your core for some awesome ab work.

Superman hold: Turoff loves this full-body move as an effective way to build strength in the lower back, something that is often neglected when exercising. Try to hold for 15-30 seconds and keep working your way up to a minute.

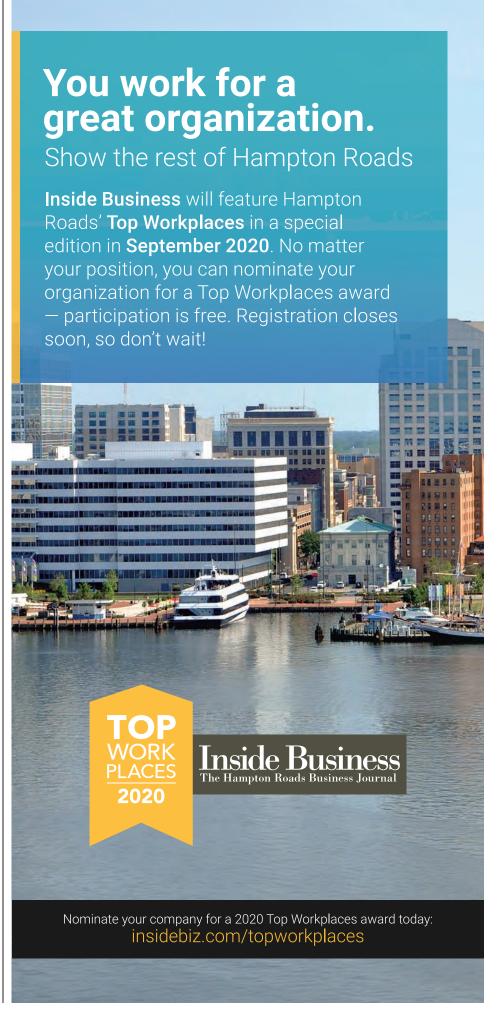

A full night's sleep could be the best defense against COVID-19

Amidst growing concern about COVID-19 infection, health officials have provided several recommendations to help individuals protect themselves and their families from infection, including washing hands regularly and maintaining a distance of at least six feet from anyone who is coughing or sneezing. Fortunately, a growing body of evidence suggests that an additional lifestyle modification could also dramatically improve your odds of avoiding infection – getting more sleep.

It has long been known that sleep is important for military performance. The Walter Reed Army Institute of Research has conducted sleep studies since the 1950s, showing that sleep loss negatively affects emotional regulation, judgment, cognitive performance, learning and memory, psychological resilience and reaction time each of which could be critical for success in multi-domain operational environments—and almost all other environments as well, from the athletic field to the classroom to the boardroom. This is why elite athletes make sure they obtain 8-10 hours of sleep per night: to acquire that extra "edge" that can make the difference between success and failure.

In addition, and of particular relevance given current concerns about the spread of COVID-19, recent evidence suggests that sleep is also important for healthy immune function and the ability to fight off infection. "From a Soldier lethality perspective,

we often state 'sleep is ammunition for the brain', as sleep is critical for decision making, vigilance and reaction time. When it comes to fighting the common cold and flu, sleep is your internal body armor that helps you fight some viruses and disease," said Army Col. Deydre Teyhen, Commander of the Walter Reed Army Institute of Re-

The relationship between sleep and infectious disease is now being explored by researchers across the world, and several interesting and important findings have been reported. For example, in one study, volunteers without previous exposure to the common cold were exposed to a live sample of the virus. Researchers found that no variable predicted whether a participant would fall sick better than sleep duration not even age or stress level. In other words, those who habitually slept less were more likely to fall ill with the cold virus.

In another study conducted by the same group, a "sleep threshold" was discovered: individuals who averaged less than seven hours of sleep per night were found to have a three-fold greater risk of infection relative to those who averaged eight or more; that rate climbed to a 4 1/2-fold greater risk for those with less than five hours of sleep.

Perhaps most surprisingly, it has also been found that six months after receiving a hepatitis B vaccination, individuals who slept fewer than six hours on the night prior to vaccination were at significant risk of being unprotected compared to those who had obtained more than seven hours of

In addition, there is now limited but exciting evidence from animal studies suggesting that sleep not only helps protect against initial infection, it also plays a direct role in aiding recovery from infec-

Although there have not yet been any studies in which the relationship between sleep duration and COVID-19 infection have been studied directly, lessons learned from studying the relationship between sleep duration and other infectious diseases can readily be generalized to COVID-19.

"Sleep is critical for maintaining physical, cognitive and immunological dominance on and off the battlefield. Leaders must prioritize sleep as a valuable asset in maintaining readiness and resilience, especially in the context of multi-domain operations and increased health risks worldwide—including those risks associated with exposure to infectious diseases," says Army Lt. Col. Vincent Capaldi, director of the Behavioral Biology branch at WRAIR, responsible for studying the relationship between sleep, performance and military effectiveness.

Unfortunately, approximately one in three American adults do not obtain the American Academy of Sleep Medicinerecommended 7+ hours of sleep per night, a situation that is estimated to cost the US economy approximately \$411 billion a year due to increased errors and accidents, lower productivity and increased absenteeism. And the problem is particularly pronounced

in the military, where approximately two in three Soldiers average six or fewer hours of sleep a night.

Research laboratories under the U.S. Army Medical Research and Development Command including WRAIR, the U.S. Army Medical Research Institute of Infectious Disease and U.S. Army Medical Materiel Development Activity, are working diligently on a range of solutions to detect, treat and prevent COVID-19, including a

WRAIR sleep and infectious disease researchers are also jointly exploring the relationship between sleep and immune function - a natural collaboration since the WRAIR infectious disease research programs are among the best in the world, having contributed to the development of many FDA-approved vaccines and every existing FDA-approved malaria prevention drug. Furthermore, WRAIR's world-renowned sleep and performance research program has generated several technological and knowledge products, including wrist actigraphy (a precursor to current smart watch technology) to reliably measure and quantify sleep in the field; human functional brain imaging studies that have furthered scientific understanding of sleep and sleep loss and the discovery of "sleep banking": the finding that extra sleep prior to a mission with sleep loss blunts the performance decrement and reduces the amount of sleep needed to fully recover afterwards.

As medical countermeasure development efforts progress, obtaining at least seven hours of sleep per night in a comfortable, cool, quiet, dark and safe area, in addition to regular handwashing with soap and water and maintaining a healthy social distance (6 feet), will continue to constitute the first line of defense against infection.

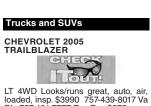

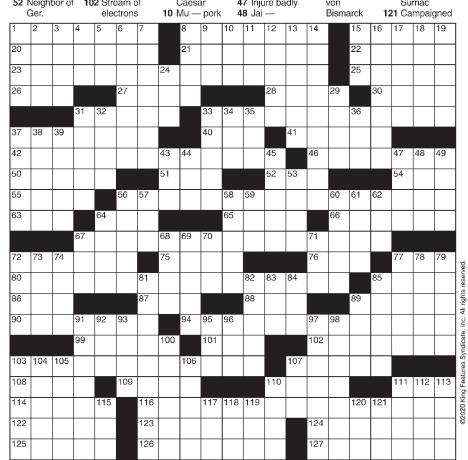

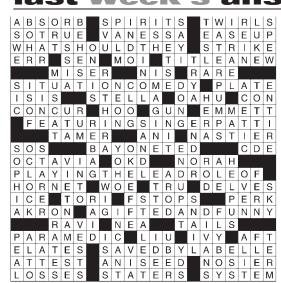
