

#### NAVY EASING PCS STRESS WITH NEW MYPCS MOBILE APP

Permanent Change of Station (PCS) moves are an unavoidable part of Navy life. Whether you're getting ready to do your first one or you're a seasoned pro, the process can be stressful because it has so many components.

Making it easier for Sailors to execute a PCS move is a high priority, as part of the Navy's pay and personnel transformation efforts.

So the Navy created the MyPCS Mobile app. MyPCS Mobile can help ease the stress during a PCS move, whether it's from the usual causes or COVID-19.

With the onset of COVID-19, the De-

partment of Defense issued a stop-movement directive on official travel. Most Sailors with PCS orders now experience more stress due to the additional expenses, as their orders are canceled, postponed, or modified. A new COVID-19 Guidance Link has been added to the MyPCS Mobile Checklist on the Ship-

ping Household Goods page. MyPCS Mobile offers greater choice

and control during the moving process, and it provides information and resources needed to plan and execute a PCS move. Sailors can access MyPCS Mobile MyNavy Portal at https:// my.navy.mil/ and clicking on the "Quick Links" tab and the blue MyPCS link.

MyPCS Mobile can be downloaded directly from the MyNavy App Locker at (https://www.applocker.navy.mil) and can be used from any mobile device. No matter which way you access MyPCS

#### Navy Reserve extends drill postponement until June 30

In a new message to all Navy Reservists, Commander, Navy Reserve Force (CNRF) is extending the current postponement of on-site Reserve drill weekends until June 30, and providing additional guidance resulting from the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

ALNAVRESFOR 012/20, released today, provides guidance for the following topics: drill weekends, teleworking, Annual Training (AT) waivers, Navy Operational Support Centers (NOSC) re-opening, selection boards, the Direct Commissioning Program, High Year Tenure (HYT), and civilian personnel. Here are some of the highlights (the full message can be read at https://www.public.navy.mil/nrh/Pages/library\_messages.aspx):

June drill weekends will be conducted virtually. Regular on-site drill weekends remain postponed until June 30.

Telework for drills remains authorized

until further notice. All Reservists should strive to obtain their AT requirements without a waiver, but the deadline remains June 30 for those Sailors who have a hardship. Sailors with concerns about achieving a "Qualifying Year" for retirement and a "Satisfactory Year" for annual participation should review the latest brief from the Reserve Force Career Counselor (https://www.dvidshub.net/publication/issues/52995).

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#### USS Ronald Reagan marks fifth year of service as part of U.S. forward deployed naval forces

#### PHILIPPINE SEA

The Ronald Reagan Carrier Strike Group is underway serving as America's strongest symbol of resolve, navigating the global pandemic as its mission endures, in support of a free and open Indo-Pacific.

This deployment marks USS Ronald Reagan's (CVN 76) fifth year of service as part of U.S. forward-deployed naval forces. Reagan, along with Carrier Air Wing Five (CVW 5), represents the cornerstone of the Strike Group's capability to sustain presence, project power, fight and win decisively from the sea.

"In a testament to our namesake's slogan, the Reagan crew has proven time and again that whatever challenge we face, It CAN Be Done," said Capt. Pat Hannifin, Reagan's commanding officer. "Our team has embraced this motto, completing in port maintenance ahead of schedule, doing our part for the health protection and warfighting readiness of the Navy, and continuing to stand the watch as America's away team."

To protect the health of the Strike Group amid the global coronavirus pandemic, Sailors completed a phased restriction of movement (ROM) with the support of several U.S. military facilities in Japan, and embarked the ship following required medical testing in compliance with recommendations from the Center for Disease Control and Navy and Marine Corps Public

"These extraordinary measures of precaution were implemented because the health and safety of our Sailors is front and center to our warfighting readiness," said Rear Admiral George Wikoff, commander, Carrier Strike Group Five. "I cannot overstate my appreciation for the hard work of our Sailors to protect the health of our force, and to all those who support us and enable our enduring mission."

The ROM period allowed fleet leadership the ability to monitor the health of the force in a controlled facility, and build a safe environment for Sailors to accomplish assigned missions at sea. While participating in ROM, Sailors used their time constructively by taking online college courses,

studying for advancement exams and military qualifications, catching up on hobbies and personal projects, as well as participating in services and activities provided by organizations including Fleet and Family Services, the USO and MWR.

One officer proved that you can take the Sailor out of the aircraft carrier, but you can't take the aircraft carrier out of the Sailor.

"I cannot get enough of aircraft carriers," said Lieutenant Matthew Chiong of Aircraft Intermediate Maintenance Department. "Using my time in ROM, I built a 1:800 scale model of USS Kitty Hawk (CV 63)."

While underway, Sailors continue to practice proper mitigation procedures to prevent the spread of coronavirus, to include social distancing, high standards of hygiene and cleanliness, and wearing personal protective equipment (PPE).

To kick off deployment, Reagan on-

loaded more than 1,000 tons of ordnance – enough combat power to cause the ship to sit five-inches lower on the waterline – in addition to personnel and aircraft from aviation squadrons within CVW-5. With more than 5,000 crew embarked, and 60-plus aircraft, Reagan is capable of sustaining around-the-clock maritime operations.

"We are committed to the defense agreements with our allies and partner nations," said Hannifin. "We provide regional security and stability, deter aggression from those who challenge a free and open Indo-Pacific, and maintain warfighting readiness to respond to any contingency."

While underway, the Ronald Reagan Carrier Strike Group will work alongside allies and partners to strengthen regional capabilities, further develop warfighting concepts, and improve distributed maritime operations that provide layered defense options to protect shared interests. Together,

the U.S. and its allies promote peace and prosperity by supporting international norms

The United States remains committed to protecting the rights, freedoms, and lawful uses of the sea, and the ability of all countries to exercise those rights.

The crew and support staff of the Ronald Reagan Carrier Strike Group continue to demonstrate that no challenge is beyond reach and that together "it CAN be done."

The Ronald Reagan Carrier Strike Group is forward-deployed to the U.S. 7th Fleet area of operations in support of a free and open Indo-Pacific region. U.S. 7th Fleet is the largest numbered fleet in the world, and with the help of 35 other maritime-nation allies and partners, the U.S. Navy has operated in the Indo-Pacific region for more than 70 years, providing credible, ready forces to help preserve peace and prevent conflict.

## Navy releases commander guidance on adjusting Health Protection Conditions (HPCON)

#### WASHINGTON

The Vice Chief of Naval Operations issued supplemental guidance for commanders on adjusting health protection conditions (HPCON) and base services, May 20.

The new guidance also establishes reporting requirements for HPCON and installation services status and supplements

guidance from the Secretary of Defense as a result of ongoing efforts to mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

"There will be a natural, yet healthy tension between keeping services secured to protect our work force and ensuring we provide services to our work force during this enduring pandemic," said Adm. Robert P. Burke, Vice Chief of Naval Operations. "Commanders are expected to take a measured risk-informed approach and all hands

are expected to follow public health measures to facilitate the balance of risk to mission and risk to force."

This HPCON guidance outlines a framework to assess Navy installations and facilities using local community health conditions and criteria to include:

(1) Downward trajectory of reported

cases of influenza-like illness and COVID-like illness cases reported over the preceding 14 days

(2) Downward trajectory of documented COVID-19 cases or of positive tests as a percent of total tests over the preceding 14 days

(3) Military medical treatment facilities or local hospitals have the capacity to treat all patients without situational standards of care and have an established COVID-19

testing program in place for at-risk healthcare workers and those exhibiting influenza-like and COVID-like symptoms

Additionally, the HPCON guidance describes minimum public health mitigation measures to inform commanders' decisions on adjusting health protection conditions or opening restricted services.

"Local commanders maintain the inherent right to shut down services when guidance is not being followed," said Burke. "Through an all-hands effort, we can return basic services to our work force as we open up our Navy and operate in this new normal."

#### NSA Hampton Roads-Northwest Annex Galley implements safety measures during COVID-19 pandemic

CHESAPEAKE

Safety. That word is at the forefront when you walk into the galley at Naval Support Activity Hampton Roads-Northwest Annex.

Since the beginning of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the galley has implemented various measures to ensure that the staff and patrons are in a safe environment as they come in for different meals throughout the day.

Some of those measures include a handwashing station that was installed near the entrance for staff members and patrons, plexiglass set up to offer more separation between the cashier and the patrons, blue tape placed on the floor to adhere to the six foot physical distancing guidelines, closure of the dining area and only takeout meals are offered, and self-service options such as the salad, soup, and nacho bars were eliminated. Face coverings are also required to be worn while in the facility.

"It is important to continue these measures because we need to ensure we are being safe for ourselves and our customers," said Culinary Specialist Senior Chief Melissa Mohammed. "Right now there is no cure for the virus, so we need to make sure we are still practicing the safest procedures we can to prevent someone getting it and potentially spreading it."

The new measures have slightly changed how the galley provides their breakfast, lunch and dinner meals, but it has not changed the staff's dedication to the custom-

Culinary Specialist 1st Class Shawn Judson, who has been working at the galley since December 2019, has not missed a beat since the pandemic began in March.

For Judson, a typical workday at the galley begins early as he begins to prep for the breakfast rush.

"At 4:30 a.m. we start up the oven and grill and begin to prepare the breakfast food," he said. "After some prep, we serve breakfast around 6 a.m."

After breakfast, the day continues with lunch and dinner preps, serving takeout meals, and heavy cleaning and sanitizing of the entire galley.

"Since we are in the middle of the pandemic, we have staff members serving the patrons their food and there is less face-to-face contact than there was before," said Judson. "And we continue to do extra cleaning of the food line."

Another change at the galley has been the schedule of the culinary specialists and other staff members.

"The military members who work at the galley are currently on a day-on, day-off schedule to mitigate the footprint on the base," said Mohammed.

Even with the modification in some operations, the galley still serves about 800 meals a day to Sailors, Marines, and Coast Guardsmen.

"We are still seeing about the same amount of military personnel coming in through the galley," said Mohammed. "[They] come through during certain times with their classes and they do it safely to maintain physical distancing."

Although the Navy galley experience looks a little bit different than it did before, the mission there and on the installation remains the same.

"COVID-19 has impacted everyone in some way, and the galley is no different," said Lieutenant Commander Luz Davis, Officerin-Charge at Northwest Annex. "In spite of this, the day-to-day operations at NSA Hampton Roads-Northwest Annex remains so that our tenant commands can continue to execute their mission and we can provide exceptional service to our military members and their families."

The galley is open to serve military members every day from 6 a.m. until 5:30 p.m.

## USS Portland conducts Laser Weapon System Demonstrator test

Amphibious transport dock ship USS Portland (LPD 27) successfully disabled an unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) with a Solid State Laser - Technology Maturation Laser Weapon System Demonstrator (LWSD) MK 2 MOD 0 on May 16.

LWSD is a high-energy laser weapon system demonstrator developed by the Office of

Naval Research and installed on Portland for an at-sea demonstration. LWSD's operational employment on a Pacific Fleet ship is the first system-level implementation of a high-energy class solid-state laser. The laser system was developed by Northrup Grumman, with full System and Ship Integration and Testing led by NSWC Dahlgren and Port Hueneme.

"By conducting advanced at sea tests against UAVs and small craft, we will gain valuable information on the capabilities of the Solid State Laser Weapons System Demonstrator against potential threats," said Capt. Karrey Sanders, commanding officer of USS Portland.

The U.S. Navy has been developing directed-energy weapons (DEWs), to include lasers, since the 1960s. DEWs are defined as electromagnetic systems capable of converting chemical or electrical energy to radiated energy and focusing it on a target, resulting in physical damage that degrades, neutralizes, defeats, or destroys an adversarial capability.

Navy ships face an increasing number of

threats in conducting their missions, including UAVs, armed small boats, and adversary intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance systems. The Navy's development of DEWs like the LWSD, provide immediate warfighter benefits and provide the commander increased decision space and response options.

"The Solid State Laser Weapons System Demonstrator is a unique capability the Portland gets to test and operate for the Navy, while paving the way for future weapons systems, "said Sanders. "With this new advanced capability, we are redefining war at sea for the Navy."

Portland is the 11th San Antonio-class amphibious transport dock ship. While it is the third ship to bear the name 'USS Portland,' it is the first ship to be named solely after the largest city in Oregon.

## USS Blue Ridge arrives in Okinawa for limited port call

#### OKINAWA, JAPAN

U.S. 7th Fleet flagship USS Blue Ridge (LCC 19) and embarked 7th Fleet staff pulled into Okinawa, May 24, making the ship's first port visit in more than 70 days.

While on liberty, Sailors will have limited access to specific designated areas on the pier and neighboring beach. This type of "safe haven" liberty allows for quality of life and readiness, while strictly mitigating the risk of contracting COVID-19. Ship's personnel and 7th Fleet staff will not physically interact with anyone who is not part of the crew, including people from the base and local community.

This port visit will pave the way for future

ships to do "safe haven" liberty in a manner which Sailors' morale and quality of life is considered while mitigating the risk of COVID-19.

"It is not lost on me how difficult a longer than normal deployment can be on top of the stress of the COVID pandemic on my Sailors and their families," said Blue Ridge commanding officer, Capt. Craig Sicola. "These types of port calls are absolutely required to restore our mental readiness, stay healthy, and enable us to fight another day."

Blue Ridge's MWR committee has worked diligently to ensure that, Sailors will have access to areas of the base and have entertainment available while in Okinawa, all while inside the designated safe zone or "bubble."

Wi-Fi is being installed on the pier so that Sailors can use their phones and laptops. The beach will be open for Sailors to swim and lounge out on the beach, and sporting events like softball, soccer, kickball, volleyball, and basketball will be available at the facilities on base.

"A lot of great work has gone into planning this port visit," said Blue Ridge's senior MWR representative, Chief Navy Counselor Min Jun, from Davis, California.

Sailors were also given the opportunity to order personal items from Kadena's Exchange and have it delivered to the pier.

"Providing pierside delivery was an excellent way to help Sailors get the items they need to keep them running their best during deployment," said Lt. j.g Raymond Kosak, Blue Ridge's disbursing officer.

All purchases will be delivered to a drop off station on the pier and fully disinfected by a qualified cleaning crew or be placed in large storage containers for an appropriate time that will ensure it is COVID-free.

With the exception of a few mandatory personnel to ensure the ship's safe arrival, there will be no interaction with any personnel outside the designated liberty areas. For the docking process, all COVID mitigations will be in place to include social distancing,

masks, gloves, and minimal interactions.

"It is important to realize that the Blue Ridge has maintained a COVID-free bubble since the outbreak," said Sicola. "We are taking extreme caution to retain this bubble by not allowing any human interaction with personnel outside the bubble and maintaining strict disinfecting procedures for items and equipment on the pier."

The visit to Okinawa comes after Blue Ridge recently broke its record of consecutive days at sea, which had previously been 64, last set during the summer of 1972 during the Vietnam War.

"Being underway this long has really opened my eyes to how the Navy operates. I'm so proud to be serving on the Flag Ship for U.S. 7th Fleet and even more excited to be able to get the opportunity to pull into Okinawa," said Culinary Specialist 3rd Class Justine Hughes from Albany, Oregon. "The fact that this ship has taken on the challenge of maintaining our presence at sea during this time of worldwide crisis is very humbling and makes me feel like I have a bigger purpose in this military organization."

Blue Ridge is the oldest operational ship in the Navy, and as the 7th Fleet command ship, is responsible for fostering relationships within the Indo-Pacific region.

#### Navy clarifies advancement eligibility due to COVID-19 postponements

The Navy issued clarifying guidance for enlisted advancement eligibility due to the postponement of the Spring Navy-wide advancement exam, enlisted promotion selection boards, and suspension of the Cycle 1, 2020 physical fitness assessment (PFA) as a result of ongoing efforts to mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

NAVADMIN 145/20, released May 19, provides clarifying guidance to enlisted advancement eligibility issues arising from the suspended spring PFA. The announcement is also intended to head off any potential concerns with Sailors approaching highyear tenure gates, once the postponed advancement exam and selection board cycles

"Sailors who were waiting to regain advancement eligibility or have their delayed advancement reinstated will have to wait a little bit longer because of the PFA suspension," said Lt. Cmdr. Peter Simerman, assigned to the Enlisted Force Plans and Policy branch for the chief of naval personnel.

"Once social distancing policies have been relaxed, we will allow passing mock PFAs to count toward Sailors regaining advancement eligibility and also for those who had their advancement withheld due to a PFA failure, to have their advancement reinstated," Simerman continued.

Sailors who were selected for advancement during fall 2019 cycles 105 or 244, or who are a part of an auto or accelerated advancement program, but had advancement withheld due to failing one or more PFAs will receive an additional six months to have their advancement reinstated.

"We are also allowing for Sailors in a PFA failure status who have Soft End of Active Obligated Service dates this calendar year the option to extend until December 31, 2020," said Simerman.

"This provides Sailors an opportunity to pass the Cycle 2, 2020 PFA and regain the eligibility to reenlist, participate in the Navy-Wide Advancement Exam and be advanced."

Sailors ineligible for the originally scheduled spring NWAE dates due to PFA failures will not be allowed to establish eligibility as a result of postponed exams.

Sailors who were eligible for advancement, but may not receive the results from their advancement until after their HYT date, may request a waiver to remain in service past their HYT date until their advancement status can be determined.

Additionally, NAVADMIN 145/20 suspends the requirement for enlisted personnel selected for commissioning through any program to pass a commissioning PFA.

However, those individuals selected for commissioning must have passed their most recent PFA and if a member is medically exempt, they must have passed their most recent PFA prior to being medically exempt.

Full details, including the procedure for reinstating reenlistment and advancement eligibility due to fitness failures are available in the NAVADMIN.

#### **Officer Training Command** uses remote learning to train leaders during pandemic

Officer Training Command Newport (OTCN) is using online training to develop future Navy leaders during the Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic.

OTCN, consisting of Officer Candidate School (OCS), Officer Development School (ODS), Limited Duty Officer and Chief Warrant Officer Academy, and Naval Science Institute, first began using remotely delivered training April 5.

"All of the classes to date have been delivered via a pre-recorded lecture, which made it tricky to remain engaging," said Lt. Jacqueline Linster, director of the education and training department. "In class, you have engagement with the students that fuels the energy and passion of learning."

Linster noted that when using a prerecorded lecture there is no student feedback to encourage discussion, but they are working on solutions to facilitate the interaction.

"We have done a few virtual classrooms to increase information clarity and provide test reviews, but we have not fully implemented the virtual classroom," said Linster. "As we get more comfortable with the

virtual learning environment, we will continue to implement more opportunities that leverage technology and maximize social distancing efforts."

Remote learning courses are currently used during the 14-day restriction of movement required for all newly arrived students, during which they are separate from the larger OTCN population and cannot congregate in traditional classroom environments. As the command becomes more familiar with the process, it will incorporate some of these processes into more

advanced training. Lt. Briana Alman, an OCS instructor, has found that although this method of teaching is different, online training is still an effective tool to get students all the information they need to be successful.

"For me it presents a new challenge, which I love," said Alman. "There seem to be many more questions because there is so much more material to cover in a short amount of time. However, at the same time, we have the ability to rapidly respond with the internet to provide our students with instructions, publication, NAVADMINS, etc. so they can get into the material."

"Employing distance learning modules allows OTCN to achieve social distancing policies and procedures," said Cmdr. Clemia Anderson, ODS director. "It is essential that we take advantage of current technology and employ distance learning platforms to sustain the quality of the educational experience while maximizing training time and mitigating the spread of COVID-19."

OTCN morally, mentally, and physically develops future leaders of character and competence - imbuing them with the highest ideals of honor, courage, and commitment in order to serve as professional naval officers worthy of special trust and confi-

#### **US** and Saudi forces conduct joint military exercises on Saudi Islands

#### **ARABIAN GULF**

The U.S. and Saudi forces are conducting routine and joint sustainment training on and around Karan and Kurayn islands, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, May 24-30.

The second phase of the training follows the successful completion of the training on April 20-22, and provides the Bataan Amphibious Ready Group (BATARG) with the embarked 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU) an opportunity to continue missionessential training and planning with our Saudi

"We appreciate the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia allowing the BATARG and 26th MEU another training opportunity on these islands," said Col. Trevor Hall, commanding officer of the 26th MEU. "Being able to train on these islands allows our team to expand upon our previous training by adding capabilities and assets from our partners in the region. The ability to plan and operate with other forces supports our ability to rapidly deploy aviation, maritime, and ground combat elements – all from over the horizon – at a moment's notice in order to support maritime security, freedom of navigation, and the free flow of commerce."

In close coordination with our Saudi partners, U.S. Naval Forces Central Command (NAVCENT) Task Force (TF) 52 and TF 56, the BATARG and 26th MEU are conducting well deck operations, underwater beach surveys, maritime patrolling, boat lane security operations, and will establish a forward arming and refueling point for aviation assets to refuel in an austere environment - which increases the aviation combat radius and enables them to conduct follow-on operations.

"These islands in the Arabian Gulf provide our Navy-Marine Corps team an ideal setting to prepare for a wide range of operations, while exercising seamless integration with our highly qualified partners," said Capt. Lance Lesher, commodore of Amphibious Squadron 8. "This return training on Karan and Kurayn islands allows us to exercise our full mission readiness as a premier crisis-response option for our nation, as we also work alongside our Saudi partners for security and stability in the region."

ARG/MEUs operate continuously across the globe and provide the geographic combatant commanders with a forward-deployed, flexible and responsive sea-based Marine Air-Ground Task Force (MAGTF). Mobile, you can choose to log on with a Common Access Card (CAC) or sign up for CAC-free access.

#### THE BASICS

When a Sailor receives orders, their information is populated in MyPCS Mobile. When logging in the first time, there will be questions on the number of dependents, traveling with a pet, shipping a vehicle, or doing a Personally Procured Move (formerly known as a Do-it-Yourself / DITY move).

After these questions are answered, a screen shows links to the PCS Checklist, Travel Voucher, and Orders. A fourth link for a new Travel Entitlements Calculator was added May 15.

The "View Orders" icon allows Sailors to view a copy of their full orders as well as something called lean orders. The lean order gives all the essential information required to make the PCS move a streamlined, simplified, and plain language format. Both can be downloaded and printed.

A travel voucher must be turned in within five days of arrival at the new duty station; clicking on the "Voucher" icon will bring

you to all the electronic forms you need to fill out. Some of the basic information from the orders will already be there, but changes can be made. This section also includes a travel itinerary and travel details. Additionally, travel receipts can be uploaded.

Finally, MyPCS Mobile lets the Sailor send the completed voucher and receipts to the servicing Command and Pay Personnel Administrator (CPPA) for final processing.

#### **CHECKLISTS**

People who have made several moves often make checklists of things they need to do. But for many, those checklists can be difficult to make, update, and track.

Wouldn't it be nice if there were PCS checklists, such as the ones available for

renovation projects or weddings? Guess what? There is! MyPCS Mobile has almost everything that you need to make and plan your move.

One of the biggest benefits of the MyPCS Mobile is the PCS Checklist. The sections are broken down by six, three, and one months prior to a move; one week prior to a move; week of arrival, and then one month after the move.

Each section is broken down into small steps/tasks that are simple to understand and easy to accomplish. There are areas where decisions will need to be made, reminders, tips, and other topics should be discussed with financial specialists, family members, and/or people at either the old or new commands.

Each step/task will have a due date and a

status so that what has been done, what is in progress, and what hasn't been started yet can be seen. This entire checklist can also be printed out.

#### BUDGET

One of the critical areas in all moves is the budget. The very first section of the checklist is all about entitlements and budgeting. This section has a complete list of entitlements Sailors might be eligible for and short descriptions of each.

This also tells Sailors who they should meet with during the move (such as their CPPA and transportation office); where to go for more information. It gives links to resources useful for helping with moving budgets and even offers a short online course from the Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC), "Money and the Move."

#### TRAVEL ENTITLEMENTS

The fourth icon is the Travel Entitlements Calculator, designed to help Sailors make decisions about the move options available. It enables them to estimate PCS travel entitlements using their personal mobile devic-

Sailors will need to verify or answer a few questions such as which dependents are traveling; selecting Dislocation Allowance (DLA) type; estimated mileage between duty stations; and what kind of quarters will be used at the new duty station, etc.

Using these answers, the Travel Entitlements Calculator will compute total travel days authorized; estimate the DLA and flat per diem total; the PCS mileage total; and provide a total entitlements estimate based on the Sailor's paygrade, marital status, separating/retiring status, and Sailor inputs from the questionnaire.

It also provides links to Joint Travel Regulations, the Defense Travel Management Office, DLA rate, and additional al-

#### **HANDS-ON TRAINING**

Additionally, interactive training packages have been added to MyPCS Mobile. Training is available for MyPCS Checklist, My PCS Orders, MyPCS Travel Voucher, and MyPCS Travel Entitlements. The interactive training may be found at https:// np2.nav.mil under training, then under MyPCS UPK Training.

MyPCS Mobile is designed to be convenient, easy to use, and a time saver. Whether Sailors have moved many times or are making their PCS move, MyPCS Mobile can be extremely helpful in clarifying budgets and reducing the stress that comes with moving.

"Extending our COVID-19 mitigation policies for another month protects our Sailors and provides stability for themselves, their careers, and their families," said Rear Adm. John Schommer, deputy commander, Navy Reserve Force. "Virtual drills via Commercial Virtual Remote is working, and we continue to see our Reserve leaders take innovative approaches to ensuring our Reservists complete drills and earn points for a satisfactory and qualifying year."

Although in-person drills are postponed for another month, Reservists should anticipate some Navy Reserve Activities (NRAs) to begin conducting regular drills later this

"We want to start re-opening our NOSCs as soon as possible, but we want to be deliberate and methodical about it," said Capt. Errin Armstrong, chief of staff, Commander, Navy Reserve Forces Command. "It won't be a situation where one day all the NOSCs are closed, and the next day all are completely opened. NOSC commanders will have to consider guidance from their Navy region, state, and local governments before they begin hosting regular drill weekends."

A diverse planning team of subject matter experts from across the Navy Reserve Force has already started creating a framework for a phased re-opening.

"Our planning team is comprised of Full Time Support (FTS) and Selected Reservist (SELRES) members from different NOSCs, Navy Region Reserve Component Commands (RCC), Reserve medical staffs, and operational planners who are working together to see what makes the most sense for bringing our Navy Reservists back," said Armstrong. "But we must do so while protecting them from unnecessary health risks."

"From the beginning of the COVID-19 crisis, our message to the Force has been that we have our Reservist's backs and are focused on providing them with maximum flexibility in these challenging times," said Schommer. "Regardless of when or how we start to return to in person drills, that guidance will not change."

#### **Pandemic** ramps up PCS move rivalries

It's summer PCS season, when 40% of the 400,000 military and DoD civilian moves take place each year. This time brings back memories of our family's final military move in May of 2017. It was our eleventh in 23 years of marriage, and it was pretty much like all the rest — a stressful experience involving tedious planning, unexpected crises, broken and lost belongings, and physical exhaustion.

Like most military spouses, I've told stories of PCS moves gone by to my friends, around kitchen islands, bunco tables, and backyard patios. Like the time the movers snapped the leg off our dining room buffet, or when they neglected to put our crib back together when I had a newborn baby and a toddler, or that move when my husband's entire collection of military challenge coins disappeared. Within military spouse culture, telling tales of moving mishaps is a sort of competitive sport. Kind of like talking about childbirth. The spouse who has endured the most misery wins.

It's hard to imagine the PCS experience getting worse for military families, but thanks to the coronavirus, moving hassles have reached epic new levels. The Stop Movement

Order announced by Secretary of Defense Mark Esper in April has been extended to June 30th, causing delays that could last until the end of the year.

Two thirds of PCS moves have been delayed, causing a massive back up. Some military families who had already started the moving process, got trapped in limbo between two locations, paying double housing costs due to leases or mortgages executed before the Stop Movement Order. Others shipped household goods and moved into temporary housing, then got stuck without their belongings. Parents can't register their children for the 2020-2021 school year because they don't know where they will be living. Kids who planned to enter new schools at the end of summer, may have to enroll mid-school-year, making it more difficult for them to adjust socially and academically. While Congress is working to pass legislation which would provide financial relief to many of the affected families, uncertainty and stress abounds.

To make matters worse, the back up is further complicated by the military branches' efforts to offer incentives to delay retirements and separations, and to reenlist those who had already retired or separated. They hope these strategies will balance the drop in recruits caused by the COVID-19 shut down, and provide medical personnel and troops who can deploy immediately so that readiness is not further compromised. However, moving priority will go to those who can deploy or fill medical billets, while waiting families will be pushed back in the line.

The Pentagon says that it will allow 30,000

waiting families to be granted waivers to move before June 30th. However, those who are able to move will be required to follow mandatory coronavirus prevention guidelines that could further delay the process. No matter which way you cut it, military families will endure major PCS hardships this year.

One day, when life returns to some form of normalcy, military spouses will inevitably gather together like they always have, to chat around fire pits, bunco tables, kitchen islands, base housing patios, backyard barbecues and coffee shops. They will share bottles of wine and pots of coffee, they will laugh, and they will tell miserable tales about child birth, deployments, and PCS moves — just like military spouses have for decades. The only thing that remains to be seen is, now that the pandemic has upped the ante, who will win the unspoken competition over who has endured the most hardship?

I, for one, will resist the urge to offer up my often-told PCS stories — about our buffet leg being snapped off, our television being stolen, my favorite ceramic Christmas tree showing up in chards, the missing hardware needed to put our disassembled bicycles back together, etc. — while in the company of anyone who has endured a PCS move during the pandemic. Out of respect, I will graciously concede defeat.

But there's no guarantee I won't try to get back in the game with a good labor and delivery story. Our first born weighed over nine pounds, so it's a doozy.

#### **Future USS Kansas City** arrives at San Diego homeport

The next ship to be commissioned and carry the Kansas City name arrived at its homeport in San Diego, May 24.

The future USS Kansas City (LCS 22) arrived for the first time at Naval Base San Diego, where the Navy will commission the Independence-variant littoral combat ship (LCS) June 20

"I am extremely proud of all the hard work the crew has done to complete the sail around and prepare us to officially join the fleet on commissioning day," said Cmdr. RJ Zamberlan, Kansas City's commanding officer. "We are honored and excited to represent the Navy, the nation, and our namesake, as well as fulfill the ship's motto, 'United We Stand, Divided We Fall."

Kansas City will be homeported in San Diego with sister ships USS Independence (LCS 2), USS Coronado (LCS 4), USS Jackson (LCS 6), USS Montgomery (LCS 8), USS Gabrielle Giffords (LCS 10), USS Omaha (LCS 12), USS Manchester (LCS 14), USS ulsa (LCS 16), USS Charleston (LCS 18), and USS Cincinnati (LCS 20).

"The arrival of the Kansas City here today is exciting and the crew has worked incredibly hard to get to this point," said Capt. Matthew McGonigle, commodore of Littoral Combat Ship Squadron (LC-SRON) 1. "We look forward to 'bringing the ship to life' next month on the day of commissioning."

Kansas City was built in Mobile, Alabama by Austal USA in conjunction with General Dynamics. Prior to departing Mobile for San Diego, Kansas City's crew conducted a 21-day restriction in movement (ROM) in accordance with U.S. Navy pre-deployment guidelines.

Due to public health safety and restrictions of large public events related to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the Navy cancelled the traditional public commissioning ceremony for the future USS Kansas City (LCS 22). The Navy will commission Kansas City via naval message and transition the ship into service as

Kansas City is the 21st LCS to be delivered to the Navy, and the 11th of the Independence-variant to join the fleet. LCS 22 is the second ship to be named for Kansas City, the largest city in the state of Missouri. The name Kansas City was as-

Roosevelt proclaimed Maritime Day in 1933, to commemorate the first steam-assisted Trans-Atlantic crossing by the SS Savannah on May 22, 1819.

The merchant mariners of Military Sealift Command (MSC) have been a driving force for the U.S. Navy since the inception of the command as Military Sea Transportation Service (MSTS) on October 1, 1949. Currently, MSC is the largest employer of U.S. merchant mariners in the United States, and works with the U.S. Maritime Administration, industry and



USS Constitution closed to public visitation to reduce exposure to COVID-19 on March 14.

Since that date, the crew began offering

virtual tours and has conducted more than 60 virtual tours on Facebook Live, which have received more than 1.2 million views.

At this time, no Sailors assigned to USS Constitution have tested positive for COVID-19, and USS Constitution is following all preventative guidance from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), Department of the Defense and Navy leadership.

USS Constitution, is the world's oldest commissioned warship afloat, and played a crucial role in the Barbary Wars and the War of 1812, actively defending sea lanes from

During normal operations, the activeduty Sailors stationed aboard USS Constitution provide free tours and offer public visitation to more than 600,000 people a year as they support the ship's mission of promoting

sustained naval presence.

USS Constitution was undefeated in battle and destroyed or captured 33 opponents.

The ship earned the nickname of Old Ironsides during the war of 1812 when British cannonballs were seen bouncing off the ship's wooden hull.

#### USS **Zumwalt** completes first live fire test

**PACIFIC OCEAN** Sailors aboard USS Zumwalt (DDG 1000), working with engineers and technicians from Navy Surface Warfare Centers, successfully executed a "structural test fire" of the Mark 46 MOD 2 Gun Weapon System (GWS) on the Naval Air Weapons Center Weapons Division Sea Test Range,

Point Mugu, May 16. "The privilege of being a 'first-in-class' ship includes having the opportunity to systematically conduct testing across the breadth of systems installed onboard the ship," said Capt. Andrew Carlson, Zumwalt's commanding officer. "The real plus is conducting those tests, such as today's live fire with the Mark 46 GWS, which provide tangible evidence of combat capability maturation."

The Mark 46 GWS is a remotely operated naval gun system that uses a 30 mm high velocity cannon, a forward looking infrared sensor, a low light television camera, and a laser rangefinder for shipboard self-defense against small, high speed surface targets. It is a program of record already successfully installed and operated on LPD-17 and LCS class ships. The test firing on board Zumwalt was the first large caliber weapons firing event for the Zumwalt Class Destroyer Program

and occurred only three weeks after the Navy officially accepted delivery of the Combat System.

Structural test fires assess structural and electrical components of the ship against shock and vibration of the weapon firing, as well as measuring any potential hazards to personnel or degradations to adjacent equipment as a result of firing live ordnance. The tests are a coordinated effort between the Zumwalt Class Destroyer Program Office, the U.S. 3rd Fleet, Commander, Naval Surface Forces, U.S. Pacific Fleet, and the Naval Sea Systems Command (NAVSEA) Surface Warfare Centers located in Dahlgren, Virginia, Port Hueneme, California, and Indian Head, Maryland.

"Today's event is the first in a chapter of live fire test events over the next year that will prove the lethal capability that these ships will bring to the fight," remarked Lt. Cmdr. Tim Kubisak, the Zumwalt Test Officer for the Program Executive Office for Integrated Warfare Systems, embarked on Zumwalt.

The Zumwalt-class destroyer is designed and built to execute multiple maritime missions including deterrence and power projection. The ships' stealth and ability to operate in both the open ocean and near-shore environments creates a new level of battlespace complexity for potential adversaries.

Zumwalt is 100 feet longer and 13 feet wider than the Arleigh Burke-class destroyer at 610 feet long, providing the space required to execute a wider array of surface, undersea, and aviation missions.

#### New regional studies program prepares enlisted Sailors for next assignment

A handful of senior Navy enlisted personnel are taking advantage of a new opportunity at the Naval Postgraduate School (NPS) to

while also earning graduate-level credit. Chief Cryptologic Technicians (Interpretive) (CTIC) Ann Sonnier, Kevin Farr, and Naomi Mori will learn advanced skills in how to develop a professional CTI workforce, tailored to the specific regional areas they will operate in, thanks to a four-course graduate certificate program in Regional Security Studies.

better prepare for their next deployment

"These Sailors will gain a robust knowledge of theater operations, politics, and foreign policies that influence countries and the decisions they make," said Cmdr. Paul Rasmussen, NPS Regional Security Studies Program Officer. "This will prepare the CTIs to best fulfill their duties to advise leadership on cultural and regional factors that impact mission operations for areas within the CT occupational standards."

To prepare them for their next assignments following the program, each student's coursework is customized to provide an understanding of the region he or she will be assigned to. Currently, they are studying the politics, history, and culture of their assigned regions.

"The chance to study at NPS and learn more about the region where I have worked throughout my Navy career got me interested in the Regional Security Studies Program," said Sonnier, whose next assignment spans East and Southeast Asia.

The importance of NPS educating Sailors for their next duty assignment stems from the 2020 Education for Seapower Strategy (ESP) and the associated conclusions of the landmark Education for Seapower (E4S) report. Both detailed the importance of the Navy and Marine Corps to strengthen and

expand their educational efforts to maintain naval power in an era of great power competition and technological change.

"The enlisted students who are taking part in this program are a direct result of the ESP study and strategy," said Rasmussen.

Before being selected for the Regional Security Studies program, the CTICs demonstrated a deep pool of prior qualifications ranging from linguist training at the Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center, regional experience and familiarity during previous commands, and/or prior graduate level education.

"While my graduate degree is in business, Regional Security Studies is quite different from MBA studies," said Farr, who is studying Latin American regions to prepare for his next assignment in Navy Information Operations Command Texas. "But the knowledge gained at NPS will help me to better understand the history and context of current and future issues."

The change from the fast-paced work environment of taking care of Sailors and completing operational requirements of their sea or shore commands to the fast-paced learning environment of graduate level studies has been a familiar yet still challenging adjustment for the enrolled Chief Petty Offi-

"As a full-time student, the long days are all about me and my academic requirements," said Sonnier. "There is a strong dichotomy between taking care of the mission and others and now being focused on more personal requirements."

Training CTIs to develop ways to use their foreign language skills and advanced computer systems to support information and cyberspace operations for international regions can assist allied nations, but learning more about the other countries can also improve allied relations.

"Our history teaches us that interoperability is very difficult to build during wartime, and thus, we need to place great emphasis on building that interoperability during times of relative peace," said Rasmussen, citing one of ESP 2020's objectives. "By learning about history, politics, and the culture, the CTIs are better prepared to work with allies."

#### **USS Blue** Ridge sails through underway record

The crew of the U.S. 7th Fleet flagship USS Blue Ridge (LCC 19) and embarked 7th Fleet staff hit a 48-year historic landmark by surpassing the ship's underway record, marking 65 days of continuous underway operations, May 17.

Blue Ridge's previous record of 64 days was set during the Vietnam War when she left port April 5, 1972 and stayed at sea in and around the Gulf of Tonkin until June 2, 1972, when she moored in the Philippines.

The 2020 Blue Ridge patrol changed with the outbreak of COVID-19. The ship and crew have spent 65 consecutive days underway, and counting, an unusual length of time for a ship well-known for its frequent port visits.

"This is an amazing accomplishment for the Blue Ridge, especially being the Navy's oldest operational warship and approaching her 50th year of service," said Blue Ridge commanding officer, Capt. Craig C. Sicola, from Dallas. "As I told the crew, the record is only a number, but their hard work and resiliency has been truly impressive and that's what really matters. These times are uniquely challenging for the entire world, but it takes an extremely dedicated crew to maintain this old of a ship at sea for this long."

While not a normal Blue Ridge patrol, the ship and her crew have remained at sea conducting operations during this challenging pandemic, including supporting 7th command and control of the fleet and supporting partners and allies across the region, as opposed to a physical visit.

"From the beginning of this pandemic and our extended underway period, our focus has been on how to adapt to this new enemy and maintain our ability to stay in the fight," said Sicola. "It is that mental focus that has kept our Sailors engaged, even with great personal sacrifice and stress. Blue Ridge and 7th Fleet staff have bonded together to ensure the fleet remains operationally ready."

To stay operationally ready Blue Ridge's crew has utilized the extended time at sea to maintain training, operational standards and capability and even hit some major milestones for the crew throughout the

Blue Ridge's damage control training

team coordinator, Damage Controlman 1st Class Bryan McCullough, from Rancho Cucamonga, California, said his team has taken advantage of the extra time "by making routine drills like fire, flooding and structural damage more advanced which has made the crew's response times faster."

"Never knowing what might happen, is what makes these drills so important," said McCullough. "Keeping the ship afloat is always our number one priority so being able to keep Blue Ridge capable of conducting her mission regardless of what that mission may be, is why we conduct these

drills over and over." "The crew has been amazing," said Sicola. "I realize every day how tough it has been, especially for some who have lost loved ones, or who have families that have endured challenging events during this pandemic. Even through all that, their heads are high and they have taken great pride in Blue Ridge's historic underway during her 50th year of service."

Blue Ridge is the oldest operational ship in the Navy, and as 7th Fleet command ship, works to foster relationships among allies and partners within the Indo-Pacific

As the U.S. Navy's largest forward-deployed fleet, 7th Fleet has approximately 50-70 ships and submarines and 140 aircraft with approximately 20,000 Sailors in the AOR at any given time.

## Sailors taking summer, fall college courses should begin the application process

#### PENSACOLA, FLA.

Sailors planning to take summer or fall college courses using Tuition Assistance (TA) or Navy College Program for Afloat College Education (NCPACE) should begin to submit their application requests.

Sailors can submit their command-approved TA/NCPACE applications as early as 120 days in advance, but no later than 14 days prior to the term start date of the course.

"Submitting applications early allows sufficient time to resolve any issues," said Navy College Program Counselor Desmond Pierre-Louis. "That way, funding authorizations can happen in a timely manner."

Service members are required to obtain approval for TA/NCPACE funding before the official start of a course. There is no risk in applying early, but there are eligibility require-

ments that Sailors must meet before they can submit a request and funding can be authorized.

"Sailors must have a minimum of two years of military service before becoming eligible to use TA or NCPACE funding," said Pierre-Louis. "After that, and with approval from their command, they can do the required online training and speak directly with a counselor to define their education goals."

Sailors planning to attend college classes are required to complete two training courses prior to using TA/NCPACE for the first time. The training products are accessible in My-Navy Education or through the Navy College Program mobile app. The specific steps a Sailor has to take to request TA/NCPACE funding are located on the Navy College Program website.

After the command-approved TA/NC-PACE application is authorized by the Navy College Virtual Education Center (NCVEC),

an authorization voucher is generated. Once printed and signed, the Sailor can then forward the voucher to the academic institution for payment. Sailors can also save and digitally sign the authorization voucher prior to sending to their school electronically.

With recent efforts by the Navy to demonstrate the importance of education to the overall warfighting strategy, such as creating the Naval Community College and giving more weight to education in FITREPs, it is the perfect time for Sailors to attain their higher-education goals.

"Sailors continue to embrace lifelong learning as they strive to improve themselves," said Voluntary Education Program Deputy Director Lt. Cmdr. Adam Walski. "This helps foster the culture of learning that we strive for within the Navy to maintain our advantage around the

One of the rewards of higher-level learning is that it is mutually beneficial for the Sailor and the Navy as a whole.

"A Sailor utilizing the program takes control of their future, whether in pursuit of a certificate or degree, and it provides advantages towards promotion," said Walski. "What cannot be overlooked is the influence this now empowered Sailor brings back to the com-

"Toledo's efforts are a great example of the extraordinary operations our high-caliber undersea warriors are executing around the clock, on scene, unseen with unmatched readiness and skill."

Established by the Secretary of the Navy on Dec. 18, 1944, and awarded by the secretary with the approval of the President, a unit commendation is conferred on any ship, aircraft, detachment or other unit of the U.S. Navy or Marine Corps that distinguished itself for extremely meritorious service in support of military operations, which were outstanding when compared to other units performing similar service.

Toledo was commissioned Feb. 24, 1995, and is the third U.S. warship named after the northwestern Ohio city. It is 377 feet long and holds a crew of approximately 147, consisting of 18 officers and 129 enlisted Sailors.

U.S. 6th Fleet, headquartered in Naples, Italy, conducts the full spectrum of joint and naval operations, often in concert with allied and interagency partners, in order to advance U.S. national interests and security and stability in Europe and Africa.

## Returning to the workplace: managing mixed emotions and uncertainty

COVID-19 has brought radical change to our society—for nearly two months, many of us have been working from home, limiting trips outside and keeping ourselves socially distanced.

Now, as states begin to consider how to re-open and find a new normal, the ability of leaders to ensure that staff feel comfortable with the transition becomes increasingly important.

"Over the past several months, we have all experienced so much change," says Col. Deydre Teyhen, commander of the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research. "Leadership will be key to a successful transition back to the workplace. Just as leaders have taken steps to help smooth the transition to

widespread telework and social distancing, it is important to take steps to ease the transition back into the workplace."

Some employees might be excited to return to the workplace and re-engage with their previous routines; others might feel apprehensive, either because of anxiety about infection or becoming accustomed to their new routine—many will feel some combination of the two.

#### What Can Leaders Do?

The first step is to recognize that experiencing mixed feelings is normal.

"Leaders should be patient and remind their teammates to prepare themselves for an adjustment," says Amy Adler, director of the WRAIR's Research Transition Office, which bridges the gulf between laboratory and field to get research advances into Army training

Furthermore, as most re-openings are expected to be gradual, for some teammates, normal may not feel normal. Compounding that, many may feel concerned that there will be a resurgence of the disease.

"Difficulty adjusting back and ongoing concerns are completely understandable—it's important for leaders to recognize and validate these feelings, and to make a plan for how the team will address changing circumstances," says Adler.

Setting clear expectations, both for leaders and for teammates, and establishing contingencies in the case of a return to strict social distancing can help address these worries.

Finally, it is important to honor the accomplishments of the team while they were away. Mark the milestones you have shared,

tell your team's story to create a shared narrative and acknowledge individual contributions to the team's mission. It is important to recognize with gratitude the entire team's effort to stay safe and productive—whether they worked from home or remained in the workplace.

"Ultimately, it comes down to keeping an eye out for one another—we know our teammates," says Col. Jeffrey Thomas, director of the WRAIR Center for Military Psychiatry and Neuroscience. "Both leaders and team members are well positioned to observe signs of stress like increased irritability, conflict with co-workers, lack of motivation or mistakes on the job. Teams can work to alleviate stressors and listen to people who might be struggling with yet another transition."

This pull-apart pigs in a blanket recipe, using cocktail franks and crescent roll dough, takes your childhood favorite to the next level, and is best served with plenty of Dijon mustard.

#### **DO YOU HAVE TO WRAP PIGS IN A BLANKET IN CRESCENT ROLL DOUGH?**

No! You can use other store-bought doughs to wrap cocktail franks. Puff pastry is one of our favorites, which adds a little extra elegance to this easy appetizer.

#### **WHAT GOES WITH PIGS IN A BLANKET?**

Try mixing up a classic cocktail to serve with this home-

made pigs in a blanket recipe. They also make for a great addition to a festive cocktail party spread and complement plenty of other appetizers!

#### **HOW CAN I MIX UP THE FLAVORS OF PIGS IN A BLANKET?**

Adding flavors into the roll or sprinkling different spices on top offers a little pizzazz to these classic bite-sized appetizers. Here are three variations to spice up (literally!) your go-to party starter:

- Jalapeño Popper Pigs in a Blanket: Combine 1/2 cup cream cheese with 1/4 cup jarred jalapeños in a food processor and blend to combine. Spread 1 teaspoon of the mixture onto each crescent strip before adding the sausage and rolling. Garnish with a thin slice of fresh jalapeño before baking.
- Pretzel Pigs in a Blanket: Combine 5 cups water and 1/3 cup baking soda in a large pot and bring to a boil. Spread crescent strips with a heaping teaspoon of mustard before adding sausage. Using tongs or a strainer, dip each wrapped sausage into the boiling water for 5 seconds and place on parchment-lined baking sheet. Garnish with coarse sea salt and bake as directed.
- German Pigs in a Blanket: Use German-style sausage like Bratwurst, halved vertically if too thick, and cut into 2 1/2-inch lengths. Spread each crescent strip with 1 teaspoon grainy mustard and 1 teaspoon drained sauerkraut. Garnish with caraway seeds.

**INGREDIENTS** 

112-oz package cocktail franks

2 tubes refrigerated crescent roll dough

2 tbsp. Dijon mustard 1 large egg

1 tsp. caraway seeds Mustard, for serving

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Heat oven to 375°F. Line baking sheet with parchment. Unroll dough and brush with mustard. Cut each triangle in half lengthwise to create 2 skinnier triangles.

Place 1 frank on each wide end of dough, then roll up and arrange on prepared sheet in two concentric circles, making sure dough on both circles touches.

Beat egg with 1 Tbsp water, brush over dough and sprinkle with caraway seeds. Bake until golden brown, 18 to 22 min. Serve with mustard.




