SENIOR MISSION COMMANDER GUIDANCE INSTALLATION ACCESS POLICY

Effective 16 June 2020–Page 1 (UPDATES IN RED)

This notice explains the Senior Mission Commander's Guidance on Fort Buchanan's Installation Access Policy <u>effective 16 June 2020</u> until further notice. THIS POLICY IS SUBJECT TO CHANGE AT ANY TIME – Please watch for updates on our Facebook and Webpage

1. <u>HPCON Charlie</u>: US Army Garrison Fort Buchanan is currently under Health Protection Condition (HPCON) Charlie (Substantial - Sustained Community Transmission). Information about HPCON Charlie measures is available at: <u>https://phc.amedd.army.mil/topics/campaigns/covid19/</u><u>Pages/HPCON.aspx.</u> To protect the force, we urge our community members to follow the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines for hygiene and social distancing. The use of cloth face covering and social distancing is mandatory at the installation **if indoors or unable to maintain social distancing**. Do not come on post if you are sick or been mandated to be on restriction of movement from your command or health care provider.

2. SPC Vega and The Boringueneers Gates access:

a. Until further notice, SPC Frances M. Vega gate is open Monday—Saturday from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. (Sunday and Federal holidays closed), Inbound and Outbound traffic. Traffic through this gate is ONLY for Service Members, Common Access Card (CAC) card holders, select personnel from the Puerto Rico National Guard supporting COVID-19 operations, and Fort Buchanan housing residents with the yellow identification cards. Uniform wear is not required.

b. Borinqueneer's Gate (Main Gate on PR 28) is open 24/7. On Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday ALL valid installation access credentials will be accepted at Borinqueneer's Gate from 5 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily and must exit the installation by 6 p.m. if not associated with the installation. The MWR card and the VHIC pass are accepted to access the installation.

c. VHIC and MWR cardholders, in addition to Retirees and their dependents will be allowed based on the last digit of their license plate number **ONLY** Tuesday and Saturday FOR cars with odd numbers, and Wednesday and Friday for cars with even numbers.

d. Only two (2) persons per vehicle. Exception are Resident's with Yellow credentials who may have more than two persons in a vehicle or Soldiers in uniform.

e. The trusted traveler program is suspended. No guests allowed.

f. Retired Disabled Veterans (RET DAV) are authorized to have one (1) authorized person to assist them to shop at either the Commissary or Exchange. Appropriate paperwork and clearance will be vetted at the VCC.

g. COVID-19 medical screenings to include temperature checks will be conducted for all personnel attempting to access Fort Buchanan. Any individual deemed unsafe will be denied installation access. **Failure to comply will lead to negative action**.

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3. <u>Access Delays</u>: We expect medical screenings to cause major delays. Personnel seeking access to Fort Buchanan must plan accordingly.

4. Commissary (DeCA) and Exchange (AAFES) Operations:

a. Only two (2) persons will be allowed to enter the Commissary and Exchange.

b. All active/reserve Service Members and their dependents will have access to visit the Commissary and the Exchange every day of the week; however, preferred days will be Thursday and Sunday with shorter wait time.

c. Federal employees authorized to visit the Commissary and Exchange will have access to visit the Commissary and the Exchange during the week; however, preferred days will be Thursday and Sunday.

d. The visitor policy is suspended. Authorized patrons are **NOT** permitted to bring any visitors into the Commissary or Exchange facilities. Only one hundred and fifty (150) in-store customers will be allowed at any given time inside the Exchange main store, only fifty (50) at the PXtra and only three (3) at the Gas Station Store. Only one hundred (100) in-store customers will be allowed at any given time inside the Commissary. The use of cloth face covering and social distancing of not less than six (6) feet is mandated and will be strictly enforced, **unless cohabitation of spouse or children**. Social distancing is mandated inside the stores as well as in the lobby, food court, sidewalk and parking areas.

e. Patrons will bring and wear their own protective equipment - cloth face covering (mask) and gloves. None will be dispensed at Fort Buchanan. Patrons should be prepared to stand for long periods of time.

f. Patrons will adhere to the above instructions as well as any other imparted by DeCA, AAFES and Fort Buchanan's Police Force. Non-compliant patrons will be escorted off the installation and will be barred from reentering post as deemed proper.

5. Mandatory Guidance:

This Notice constitutes an **ORDER** to all individuals within the Fort Buchanan military installation. It is mandatory and punitive in nature. Violators will face adverse criminal and administrative sanctions. The Visitor Control Center hours are from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday thru Friday. If you have questions concerning access to Fort Buchanan, please contact the Visitor Control Center at (787) 707-3995. Access to the Visitor Control Center is limited to five (5) patrons at a time inside the facility. First come-first served by sign-in roster. VHIC and MWR Card holders must receive locally produced credentials at VCC.

1.<u>HPCON Charlie</u>: La instalación del Fuerte Buchanan se encuentra actualmente bajo el Nivel de Condición de Protección de la Salud (HPCON) Charlie (Sustancial – Transmisión Comunitaria Sostenida). Información sobre las medidas de HPCON Charlie se encuentra disponible a través de: <u>https://phc.amedd.army.mil/topics/campaigns/covid19/Pages/HPCON.aspx.</u> Con el fin de proteger a nuestra fuerza, solicitamos a los miembros de nuestra comunidad que sigan las guías de los Centros para el Control y la Prevención de Enfermedades (CDC) sobre higiene y distanciamiento social. El uso de mascarillas y el distanciamiento social es mandatorio en la instalación si se encuentra adentro o no puede mantener el distanciamiento social. No visite la instalación si se encuentra enfermo o se le ha ordenado a estar en restricción de movimiento por parte de su comandante o proveedor médico.

2. Acceso a través de los portones Especialista Vega y Los Boringueneers:

a. Hasta nuevo aviso, el portón Especialista Frances M. Vega está abierto de lunes a sábado, de 6 a.m. a 6 p.m. (Cerrado los domingos y días feriados federales), tráfico de entrada y salida. El tráfico a través de este portón es SOLO para Miembros del Servicio, portadores de la Tarjeta de Identificación de Acceso Común (CAC), personal selecto de la Guardia Nacional de Puerto Rico en operaciones de apoyo del COVID-19 y **residentes en el Fuerte Buchanan con tarjetas de identificación amarilla. No se requiere usar uniforme.**

b. El portón Los Borinqueneer (**Portón Principal en la Carretera PR 28**) está abierto 24/7. Los martes, miércoles, viernes y sábado **TODAS** las credenciales válidas de acceso a la instalación serán aceptadas en el portón Los Borinqueneers de 5 a.m. a **5 p.m**. diariamente, si no guarda relación con la instalación deberá salir de la misma a las **6 p.m**. La tarjeta de MWR y el pase VHIC están aceptados para accesar a la instalación.

c. Los portadores de tarjetas VHIC y MWR, además de los retirados y sus dependientes se les permitirá el acceso en función del último dígito de su número de tablilla **SOLO** los martes y sábados para vehículos con números impares (nones), y los miércoles y viernes para vehículos con números pares.

d. Sólo dos (2) personas por vehículo. Exceptuando a los residentes con tarjetas de identificación amarillas quienes pueden tener más de dos personas en un vehículo o soldados en uniforme.

e. El programa de viajeros de confianza está suspendido. No se permiten visitantes.

f. Los retirados DAV están autorizados a tener una (1) persona autorizada para ayudarlos con sus compras en la Comisaría o el PX. La documentación apropiada y la autorización serán revisadas en el Centro de Control de Visitantes.

g. Se realizarán exámenes médicos de COVID-19 que incluyen cotejos de temperatura para toda persona que intente acceder al Fuerte Buchanan. Cualquier individuo que aparente ser un riesgo de seguridad se le negará el acceso a la instalación. El incumplimiento dará lugar a una acción negativa.

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3. <u>Demoras en el Acceso</u>: Esperamos que los exámenes médicos ocasionen demoras mayores. Las personas que busquen acceso al Fuerte Buchanan deberán planificar consecuentemente.

4. Operaciones de la Comisaría (DeCA) y el PX (AAFES):

a. Sólo se le permitirá acceso a dos (2) personas para entrar a la Comisaría y el PX.

b. Todos los miembros del servicio activo/reserva y sus dependientes tendrán acceso para visitar la Comisaría y el PX todos los días de la semana. Sin embargo, los días preferibles serán jueves y domingo con un tiempo de espera más corto.

c. Los empleados federales autorizados para visitar la Comisaría y el PX tendrán acceso todos los días de la semana. Sin embargo, los días preferibles serán jueves y domingo.

d. Se suspende la política de visitantes. Los clientes autorizados **NO** están permitidos a traer ningún visitante dentro de las facilidades de la Comisaría o el PX. Sólo se permitirán ciento cincuenta (150) clientes en la Tienda Principal del PX a la vez. En el PXtra sólo se permitirán cincuenta (50) y en la tienda de la Estación de Gasolina tres (3). Sólo se permitirán cien (100) clientes en la Comisaría a la vez. El uso de mascarillas y el distanciamiento social no menor de seis (6) pies es mandatorio y se hará cumplir de manera estricta, a menos que conviva con el cónyuge o hijos. El distanciamiento social es mandatorio dentro de las tiendas, así como en el vestíbulo, área de comida, acera y áreas de estacionamiento.

e. Se fomenta que los clientes traigan y utilizen su propio equipo protector – mascarillas y guantes. Ninguno será provisto en el Fuerte Buchanan. Los clientes deberán estar preparados para estar de pie por largos períodos de tiempo.

f. Los clientes deberán seguir las instrucciones anteriores, al igual que cualquier otra impartida por los empleados de DeCA, AAFES y la Policía del Fuerte Buchanan. Los clientes que no cumplan con dichas disposiciones serán escoltados fuera de la instalación y les será prohibido que puedan re-entrar a la instalación según se considere pertinente.

5. Guía Mandatoria:

Este Aviso constituye una **ORDEN** para todos los individuos dentro de la instalación militar del Fuerte Buchanan. Es de índole mandatoria y de naturaleza punitiva. Los infractores enfrentarán sanciones penales y administrativas adversas. Las horas del Centro de Control del Visitante son de 7:00 a.m. a 4:00 p.m., lunes a viernes. Si tiene preguntas sobre el acceso al Fuerte Buchanan, favor de comunicarse con el Centro de Control de Visitantes al (787) 707-3995. El acceso al Centro de Control de Visitantes está limitado a cinco (5) clientes a la vez dentro de las facilidades. El servicio será a base del primero en llegar y mediante lista de registro. Los portadores de tarjetas VHIC y MWR deben recibir credenciales producidas localmente en el Centro de Control de Visitantes.

Borinqueneers' Gate has new signs

Visitors and personnel entering through Fort Buchanan's The Borinqueneers' Gate will now observe new posted illuminated signs overhead.

Each lane has been equipped with light-emitting diode (LED) signs to direct traffic to available lanes. The LED signs are located at the top of the structure and open lanes will be identified by a green "OPEN" and closed lanes will be identified with a red "CLOSED".



In addition to these new signs, in the front area of building 689 (Commissary/PX) there are signs indicating "No Loading Zone" and "Do Not Drop Off and/or Pick Up Passengers". Failure to follow the new posted signs can result in a citation.



Remember citations on Fort Buchanan are either Armed Forces Tickets or Central Violation Bureau citations.

The Fort Buchanan Police is constantly

improving to better serve our community. Policing is as much about helping people and maintaining community quality of life as it is about enforcing laws.

Hurricane Season Preparedness Tips-Part 1

While Mother Nature is unpredictable, preparing for a hurricane before it makes landfall can help save your life. Here are a few steps to take today before a hurricane strikes your area.

Start by identifying any nearby evacuation areas with your family, and pick one place to meet for safe shelter.

Make plans for elderly, infant and pet needs during an evacuation. If your senior needs assistance, consider keeping a walker or wheelchair nearby to help them evacuate safely. Consider car seats for infants and crates or kennels for your pet.

Stock up on gas and keep your car tank full. In the event of a hurricane warning, there may be a shortage, so consider storing it in a gas can now safely outside of your home. Bring patio furniture and outdoor items inside. Leaving them outdoors may damage your home from wind gusts. Protect your home with sandbags, plywood or storm shields to reduce damage from strong winds and flooding.

Turn off gas, water and other utilities before hurricane impact, use battery operated devices. Whether you plan to stay through the storm or evacuate, you should have the essentials ready.

Pack a bag when a hurricane warning is issued. This way, if you need to evacuate, it's one less thing to worry about. Pack at least three days' worth of clothes, medication and non-perishable food. Start by stocking up on canned goods, they have a longer shelf life than the majority of fresh items that need to be cooked. Other foods that don't need refrigeration are fruit, beef jerky, crackers and nuts. Other common items to pack include blankets, flashlights and hygiene items.

CDC also recommends storing at least five gallons of clean water per person as water may be contaminated. You'll likely need water for drinking, bathing and medical needs. Here are a few other essentials the battery-powered radio or the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) mobile app, First-aid kit, cell phone chargers, cash, infant and pet supplies as needed.

After the hurricane passes and it is safe to operate fuel electric generators and gas (LPG) appliances ensure to check for leaks with soapy water before operating.

Legal Corner

Military Spouses Residency Relief Act¹

The Military Spouses Residency Relief Act, amended in 2019 provides a great tax benefit to military spouses.

First let's look at a few terms:

<u>Domicile</u>, is a legal term that can best be described as meaning, simply, "home." Under the concept on which the state tax system is based, each person can only have one domicile at a time. Your domicile could be where you own property, have your car registered, have a driver's license, are registered to vote, or a variety of other official transactions that tie you to a specific place. A domicile is changed when you establish those official connections in a new location.

A <u>residency</u>, on the other hand, is simply the place you live, or the address you are currently using. A military spouse may be domiciled in Virginia, for example, because that's where all her legal paperwork originates, but physically live in North Carolina. Residency changes based on where you are physically living.

"<u>Home of record</u>" is a term used by the Department of Defense for service members. The home of record is the location where he or she lived when joining the military. It is used for determining some military entitlements, including final permanent change of station (PCS) allowances.

What is the Military Spouses Residency Relief Act?

The Military Spouses Residency Relief Act (MSRRA), as it was first passed in 2009, allowed military spouses to claim for tax purposes the same state of domicile as their service member, as long as they had established domicile there, too. The 2019 amendments to the law give spouses more choices. Now military spouses can choose to file state tax returns in the service member's home state whether they have ever lived there or not. Beginning with the 2018 tax year, military spouses can file taxes in the same state as their service member -- claiming the same domicile -- without ever having set foot in the state. Alternatively, they can also choose to file in the state in which they have established their own domicile.

However, the MSRRA does not permit military spouses or their service members to arbitrarily pick for tax purposes a convenient state in which they have never established a connection. Claiming a state as domicile without establishing real connections could result in serious legal problems. You should seek the help of a bona fide tax professional in your state of domicile or you may call your nearest legal assistance office at (787)

June is National Safety Month: Conduct on-site inspections

Your Installation Safety Officer Wants You to Know

National Safety Month is observed in June. Army leaders at all levels can make a difference by becoming personally involved and fostering a positive safety and occupational health culture that enables Soldiers, Army Civilians and family members to effectively manage their personal risk.

Here are some tips to make <u>your</u> workplace safer.

Conduct on-site safety inspections in your workplace

When on-site, make sure you are wearing the right Personal Protective



Equipment (PPE) for each area you enter.

Nothing takes away credibility faster than having the wrong PPE or not wearing it properly.

Be safe; don't

expose yourself to hazards during an inspection. Limit the size of the inspection group. Large groups tend to stifle open communication with workers.

Look for easily observable hazards first, such as:

- Tripping hazards
- Blocked exits
- Frayed/exposed electrical wires
- Missing machine guards
- Poor housekeeping
- Poorly maintained equipment

Look for property damage, such as walls or doors damaged by equipment or forklift traffic. Such damage may indicate a potential for future worker injuries.

Talk to workers at their work stations. Workers are likely to know the most about the hazards and safety issues in their jobs. Tap into that knowledge. Make them comfortable talking with

you. Assure them that you are interested in finding problems and fixing them, i.e., improving safety, not blaming anyone for your findings.

Avoid yes/no questions. Encourage conversation.

Ask open-ended questions such as:

- What is the most hazardous task in your job? What makes it hazardous?
- If you have been injured in your job, what was the injury and how did it happen?
- What was done to make your job safer?
- How would you report an injury, hazard, or

near-miss?

Seek out and talk to the most recently hired workers to get their perspective on safety. These "fresh eyes" could have valuable insights.

Observe workers as they perform their job. For example, do they lift heavy objects? Do they stand/ sit in awkward postures? Are they performing repetitive motions? If so, take notes and photos.

If their job involves handling chemicals or exposure to excessive noise and/or heat, a more detailed evaluation by a safety professional may be in order.

Try to find solutions for hazards while you are conducting the inspection by applying your own creativity and inspiring the creativity of workers. Finding solutions "on-thespot" demonstrates your commitment to making the workplace safer.

Because just as we reflect the best of America, we reflect its imperfections as well. We need to work harder to earn the trust of mothers and fathers who hesitate to hand their sons and daughters into our care. How we respond to the anger that has ignited will chart the course of that trust.

Every Soldier and Department of the Army Civilian swears an oath to support and defend the Constitution. That includes the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for a redress of grievances. We will continue to support and defend those rights, and we will continue to protect Americans, whether from enemies of the United States overseas, from COVID-19 at home, or from violence in our communities that threatens to drown out the voices begging us to listen. To Army leaders of all ranks, listen to your people, but don't wait for them to come to you. Go to them. Ask the uncomfortable questions. Lead with compassion and humility, and create an environment in which people feel comfortable expressing grievances. Let us be the first to set the example. We are listening. And we will continue to put people first as long as we are leading the Army. Because people are our greatest strength.

God bless all of the people of our United States Army: our Soldiers, Families, Civilians, and Soldier for Life retirees and veterans. And God bless the United States of America.
