Ford conducts first air intercept control event

USS Gerald R. Ford (CVN 78) completed an Air Intercept Control (AIC) event on July 30. A first for the crew, this accomplishment was another milestone of Ford's operational progress as she passes the half-way point of her 18-month Post-Delivery Test and Trials (PDT&T).

AIC missions are required to increase the Combat Direction Center's proficiency through training. AIC missions are also an opportunity to demonstrate integration with Carrier Strike Group (CSG) 12 as part of the air defense mission to defend Ford and the rest of the force.

Lt. Shane Welsh, the air defense officer for the Ticonderoga-class cruiser USS Leyte Gulf (CG 55) training with Ford's operations team, said the mission was a collaborative effort between Ford and Carrier Air Wing (CVW) 7 and CVW-8.

"The Ford is considered an air defense unit (ADU)," said Welsh. "The Air and Missile Defense Commander (AMDC) assigned Ford the mission to control defensive counter air assets. If we had other ADUs in the area, the AMDC would coordinate with them and would report information to the battle watch in

Tribute to Fallen Sailors Memorial Torch Motorcycle Riders cruise onboard NAVSTA

Tribute to Fallen Sailors Memorial Torch Motorcycle Riders rode onboard Naval Station (NAVSTA) Norfolk as part of their 11th annual tribute to the Fallen Soldier Memorial Torch Motorcycle Ride.

ferent states and honored a total of 68 fallen service members from all branches of the military. "It was such an honor to be able to ride on the base today," said Miner. "Stopping at Pier 14 to honor where my son Robby was once station we extremely special for me. I could immediately feel his presence."

Following the stop at Pier 14 the group proceeded to the USS Cole Memorial to pay tribute to the 17 Sailors killed during the USS Cole tragedy where they were greeted by the installations Commanding Officer, Capt. Vince Baker.

While in the Hampton Roads area, the organization honored seven local fallen

service members by hosting a dinner and presenting family members with a memorial plaque and hand painted canvas picture of their loved one. Those honored were MA2 Robert Miner III, AT2 Daniel Biddle, HM Bradford Dent, LT Peter Ober, PO3 Ronnie Palm, PO3 James Hearn and CPO Demond Walker.

"This token of remembrance was extremely beneficial to each family's healing journey, and that includes my own," said Melissa Black, NAVSTA Norfolk's Gold Star Coordinator and Gold Star Spouse. "No matter how many years pass since a hero's death, and regardless of the cause of death, all the surviving families want, is to ensure that their loved one's name is spoken and not forgotten. This group of ladies and gentlemen ensured that has not happened."

"I am extremely proud of the way the New Mexico team worked to bring the submarine back to life coming out of an ardu-

At sea, he served aboard three attack and nuclear-armed submarines. His most recent

shore assignment was as the Submarine Enlisted Community Manager.

Fast-attack submarines like New Mexico are multi-mission platforms enabling five of the six Navy maritime strategy core-capabilities - sea control, power projection, forward presence, maritime security, and deterrence. The submarine is designed to excel in anti-submarine warfare, anti-ship warfare; strike warfare; special operations; intelligence; surveillance and reconnaissance; irregular warfare and mine warfare from open ocean anti-submarine warfare to intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance, to projecting power ashore with special operation forces and Tomahawk cruise missiles in the prevention or preparation of regional crises.

The Virginia-class submarine is 377 feet long and 34 feet wide, and weighs about 7,900 tons when submerged. Underwater, it can reach speeds in excess of 25 knots.



SurgeMain reservists support fleet delivery at Norfolk Naval Shipyard

Since their arrival at Norfolk Naval Shipyard (NNSY) earlier this month, the immediate goal was to get SurgeMain Navy Reserve Sailors to hit the ground running — or rather, to hit the deckplates turning wrenches to deliver ships back to the fleet.

As part of the first phase of Naval Sea Systems Command's (NAVSEA) deployment of SurgeMain reservists across the four naval shipyards, 127 have now onboarded NNSY to leverage their skillsets to reduce the maintenance backlog due to the COVID-19 pandemic. These reservists have the technical and trade backgrounds necessary to provide quick benefits managing NNSY's workload, which currently includes two aircraft carriers, an Ohio-class ballistic submarine, and a submarine undergoing conversion into a Moored Training Ship.

NNSY's SurgeMain support will culminate in more than 480 reservists supporting work on all these projects and more through September 2021. "This arrangement will provide a 'win-win' both for these Sailors and America's Shipyard," said Shipyard Commander Captain Kai Torkelson. "While the reservists get valuable hands-on experience across our nation's shipyards, we get a large number of personnel ready to provide immediate impact on the deckplates with some of the biggest projects we have on our waterfront."

"Wherever the work is, that's where Surge-Main goes," said Lt. Cmdr. Emmanuel "Manny" Sayoc, NNSY's SurgeMain Program Manager. "They're going to the projects and all through the shops, even codes, wherever they are needed. Some are in Code 109 (IT Department), Code 700 (Lifting and Handling), and Code 300's Ship Safety Office."

With reservists onboarding the same week USS Harry S. Truman (CVN 75) arrived at NNSY for an Extended Carrier Incremental

Availability, Sayoc said several supported establishing temporary services such as lighting, ventilation and scaffolding to facilitate the carrier's overhaul. NNSY's Inside Machine Shop has already been tapping into the skillsets of these Sailors for assistance in machining of various components, with Sayoc adding he is anticipating many more requests for production support in the weeks and months ahead.

With COVID-19 causing schedule impacts on many of the ships undergoing maintenance across the four shipyards, having an experienced reserve workforce was one of the biggest priorities during the SurgeMain mobilization. Sayoc described "a very detailed interviewed process" where reservists are asked about their civilian background, Navy experiences, training opportunities and current certifications. "In Shop 56 for example, the Air Conditioning and Refrigerant Shop, my shop lead is looking for those who have been to AC and R school, have the Environmental Protection Agency certification, and have several years of relevant experience out in the civilian world or in the Navy," he said.

In addition to SurgeMain leaders evaluating Sailors for their shop assignments, they provide basic training in conjunction with shipyard instruction, then the shops validate skillsets and provide any additional training needed. This system was designed to help get the reservists supporting fleet delivery from day one, or as close to it as possible. "One reservist might have 30 years of relevant experience working in the civilian world, another might have a combined 20 years working as active duty or a reservist in the Navy with civilian service," said Sayoc. "To give you an idea of the level of experience, almost half of our SurgeMain workforce so far is a First Class or above. This was by design to bring our military leadership onboard early on to provide the deckplate leadership to care for and feed our Sailors. We rely on our civilian leadership to lead production and direct us to the work. Together, with military and civilian leaders, we help prepare and transition the Sailors in the shops and projects."

Beyond ensuring the Sailors are ideally matched to shipyard shops and projects based on experience and skill, they are also prepared for effective integration into the NNSY workforce and community at large. The Surge-Main leadership team coordinates logistics such as living arrangements, transit, and adhering to all COVID-19 requirements, while still overseeing military matters such as career development, evaluation and awards. And while production support is the driving

goal, Sayoc said it is equally important for SurgeMain to have the Sailors fully incorporated into the teams at America's Shipyard delivering vital assets back to the Navy. "In addition to turning wrenches, one of Surge-Main's main roles is to spearhead the civilian and military integration," said Sayoc. "We have to value and appreciate the civilian workforce—the mobilization won't be successful without it. We want our civilian and military to learn about one another, and be comfortable working with one another, in addition to the reservists helping get us caught up on the work. Our legacy will primarily be the relationships we built."

"This domestic mobilization of a Navy Reserve force for non-humanitarian purposes is unprecedented," said Capt. Rich Sussman, NAVSEA's Director of Military and Reserve Programs. "Sending our team to the ship-yards where a majority of our Sailors have served as qualified hull, mechanical, and electrical skilled tradespeople to augment the naval shipyards' civilian workforce to assist in reducing the maintenance backlog due to COVID-19 is exactly what our team is designed to do. For the past 15 years, since the SurgeMain program's debut, our Sailors have been training for this moment... this is what the SurgeMain program is about."



the Tactical Flag Command Center."

Ford's Air Intercept Controller, Operations Specialist 1st Class David Geary, from Davenport, Iowa, controlled two separate AIC events. Both were Defensive Counter Air missions designed to protect a high value asset against several waves of "red air" threats. First were two F/A-18E Super Hornets, attached to the "Jolly Rogers" of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 103, followed by four F/A-18F Super Hornets from the VFA-213 Black Lions. Despite being outnumbered by the threat, the Jolly Rogers and Black Lions integrated with Ford's AIC and employed TOPGUN recommendations to successfully defend Ford.

"We were simulating an air defense scenario," said Geary. "We were controlling the fighter to intercept, escort and if necessary kill the inbound threat aircraft."

The AIC is the third wingman in the fighter community. The AIC's job is to paint a mental picture for the pilots in the air via voice and data link communication.

"I am in voice communication with all the fighters," said Geary. "As the fighters and threats close, I must put together a specific timeline to ensure they have best situational awareness possible to enhance lethality and increase survivability."

"It was an excellent event," said Welsh. "It's a new ship, new crew, new strike group. Getting that continuity together where it's all second nature, that's what's important."

Gerald R. Ford is a first-in-class aircraft carrier and the first new aircraft carrier designed in more than 40 years. Ford is underway in the Atlantic Ocean conducting carrier qualifications during an independent steaming event.

"We are all incredibly proud of Lt. j.g Swegle and the entire class," Westendorff said. "This is a wonderful personal achievement but also a testament to their dedication and drive to succeed in the tactical air training pipeline. I wish them all every

success at the next level learning to fly our fleet aircraft." [

A 2017 U.S. Naval Academy graduate, Swegle reported to Naval Aviation Schools Command at NAS Pensacola, Florida, where she completed Initial Flight Screening and Aviation Preflight Indoctrination. She completed Primary flight training with the "Boomers" of VT-27 at NAS Corpus Christi, and after selecting the TACAIR, or Strike, pipeline, Swegle progressed to Intermediate and Advanced training with

Swegle is part of a new generation of TACAIR pilots to qualify on state-of-the art Aircraft Launch and Recovery Equipment (ALRE) unique to aircraft carrier USS Gerald R. Ford (CVN 78): the Electromagnetic Aircraft Launch System (EMALS) and Advanced Arresting Gear (AAG). She completed carrier qualifications in the Atlantic Ocean off the Florida coast, May 20.

"I'm excited to have this opportunity to work harder and fly high performance jet aircraft in the fleet," Swegle said. "It would've been nice to see someone who looked like me in this role; I never intended to be the first. I hope it's encouraging to

Chief of Legislative Affairs Rear Adm. Sara Joyner, a career naval aviator, served as guest speaker for the ceremony via teleconference.

"I'm incredibly proud of Lt. j.g. Swegle and her classmates and am excited to welcome them all to the fleet," Joyner said. "There's more work to do to make sure that we recruit, train and retain a diverse force that represents the best and brightest of this nation. Everything in Naval Aviation requires teamwork, and you will be judged by your professionalism, demonstrated capability, and leadership."

Swegle and her classmates will advance to graduate-level flight training at their respective fleet replacement squadrons. Specific platform selection for the TACAIR training pipeline (F/A-18 Super Hornet, EA-18G Growler, or F-35C Lightning II) typically occurs shortly before the winging ceremony. Swegle will report to the "Vikings" of Electronic Attack Squadron (VAQ) 129 at NAS Whidbey Island in Washington to begin training as an EA-18G

Growler pilot. VAQ-129 trains new naval aviators, naval flight officers, and naval aircrewmen in electronic warfare tactics, techniques, and procedures in preparation for their fleet assignments.

Swegle follows in the footsteps of Brenda E. Robinson, the Navy's first African American female naval aviator. Robinson earned her Wings of Gold June 6, 1980 and was the 42nd woman to be designated a naval aviator.

"Lt. j.g. Swegle has proven to be a courageous trailblazer," Commander, Naval Air Forces Vice Adm. DeWolfe "Bullet" Miller III said. "She has joined a select group of people who earned Wings of Gold and answered the call to defend our nation from the air. The diversity of that group—with differences in background, skill and thought—makes us a stronger fighting force."

Navy's only female commissioned **Flying Warrant** Officer retires at sea

Lt. Amy Blades-Langjahr, from Casper, Wyoming, was launched from USS Nimitz on a C-2 Greyhound for her last flight in the fleet Aug. 3.

The only female Flying Chief Warrant Officer ever commissioned in the U.S. Navy rose from the ranks before retiring at the end of her "Shooter" tour, a career that spanned the entire Global War on Terror.

"I was on the USS John F Kennedy (CV 67) and we were pulling out for COMPTUEX (composite unit training exercise), September 11, 2001," said Blades-Langjahr. "We were in the harbor being turned around by the tugs. The second plane hit when we were in the jetties. We had port calls in Saint Thomas lined up. We had a Mediterranean deployment; not even going

When I'd wear my normal get up — jeans, comfortable top, flat shoes and maybe a dab of mascara if any at all—

she was likely to greet me with a concerned expression, reach a hand out to my shoulder, and say, "You look a little ill ... are you feeling alright, my dear?"

I zipped the dress up over my tummy control underwear, slipped into low-heeled cork wedges, and applied make-up appropriate for the occasion. The tube of neglected lipstick I found in the back of my vanity drawer was a shade that matched the dress perfectly.

"Wow, you're a total Baberaham Lincoln!" Francis blurted when I walked into our kitchen. Although I hadn't heard that term since the early nineties, his outdated compliment put an extra spring in my step. At age 54, I'll take whatever I

Inflating my own ego even further, I was proud of the gourmet pizzas I'd made for the party. At pot-lucks past, I'd often contributed dishes that were too basic or not trendy enough. But this time, I'd knocked it out of the park with thin-crust caramelized Vidalia onion, blue cheese and walnut pizzas.

Back-to-school planning during COVID-19

the COVID-19 pandemic continues, parents and students may be facing new uncertainties. Conditions across the world differ widely and continue to change rapidly. In addition, school reopening policies vary and often include instruction and scheduling options. With so many unknowns, making decisions as a parent can be difficult.

Evidence shows that safety measures like physical distancing, face coverings and improved hygiene such as frequent hand-washing and disinfecting commonly used surfaces reduce transmission of COVID-19. Evidence so far also suggests that children under 10 seem to have less severe symptoms and are less likely to spread the virus.

Based on such evidence, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has issued guidelines for how to safely reopen schools. BACK-TO-SCHOOL PLANNING

If your child's school is reopening and you want to start getting ready, here are some gen-

- Talk with your child. Starting school, or a new school year, can be stressful in the best of times. Make sure your child knows it's OK to be nervous. Try these Red Cross tips for talking to kids about COVID-19 and keeping them
- Discuss new policies and safety guidelines. First-time students may be fine with the new procedures. Returning students may need extra time and attention to get used to all the changes. Be sure to explain the need for safety measures, but try to highlight what's exciting – like being able to see friends again and learn new things. And you can help your child build resilience by encouraging them to look at difficulties as challenges and chances for them to grow.

- Adjust the schedule. Start to tweak your child's daily schedule a couple of weeks before As back-to-school season approaches and the firstday of school. Making bedtimes earlier and screen times shorter can help your child develop a healthy morning routine and get ready for the new school year.
 - Check the program. If your child has an Individualized Education Program, review services your child will receive. Learn about any changes due to new safety guidelines, and talk with your child about them. If you are moving and your child will be attending a new school, check your child's services there before your move. If you have questions or need backup, your installation Exceptional Family Member Program family support staff and special needs consultants can help you identify additional resources and tools your child can
 - Plan around sales. Know when the tax holiday on school supplies will be, and plan accordingly. Look for the supplies list for your child's classes on the school's website or ask for one at local office-supply stores. And remember, every day is a tax holiday at the commissary and exchange.
 - Discuss clothes. Chat with your child about what they want to wear before you buy it. This way, you'll avoid purchasing and returning clothing your child won't wear, and these small decision-making exercises can help children make larger decisions down the road.

Navy extends fall PMK-EE deadline

Active and reserve Sailors now have an extra month to complete their Professional Military Knowledge Eligibility Exam (PMK-EE) ahead of the fall advancement exam cycle, as the Navy has extended the deadline for completion from Aug. 1 to Aug. 31.

The deadline extension was announced in NAVADMIN 216/20 released on July 30.

The extension is for the upcoming cycle only and was made because of technical issues, which may have hindered some Sailors' in being marked as PMK-EE complete in the Fleet Management and Planning System (FLTMPS), the message said.

Passing this military knowledge exam is required for sailors in order to be eligible for advancement to the next paygrade. However, it must only be passed once at each paygrade level and is not required for each subsequent advancement cycle.

Earlier this month, NAVADMIN 201/20 announced that PMK-EE deadlines for all future exams would be the first day of the month preceding the month in which the exams are to be given.

The new deadline schedule will now start Dec. 1 when all active duty E-6 Sailors must have their PMK-EE complete for the January E-7 exam.

Here's a look at how all future PMK-EE deadlines are scheduled:


- January AD/FTS E7 NWAE cycle—prior to Dec. 1 of the previous year
- February SELRES E4/5/6/7 NWAE cycle prior to Jan. 1 of the same year
- March AD/FTS E4/5/6 NWAE cycle prior to Feb. 1 of the same year
- August SELRES E4/5/6 NWAE cycle prior to Jul. 1 of the same year

■ September AD/FTS E4/5/6 NWAE cycle - prior to Aug. 1 of the same year.

United States Secretary of Defense (SECDEF), Dr. Mark T. Esper, visited Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay, Georgia, July 30.

Esper began his tour at the largest

"What an experience to see this platform firsthand," said Esper. "America's ballistic-missile submarines remain the most survivable and powerful deterrents on earth."

Esper toured various spaces on the

"I am impressed by the professionalism of this team," said Esper. "The submarine service runs silent and deep and I am glad to be here and meet these men and women in person."

Following his tour of the submarines, Esper visited the Trident Refit Facility, Kings Bay (TRF-KB), where he met with the commanding officer, Capt. Ed Robledo, in the facility's hull shop. He was briefed on TRF's mission which is to provide quality industrial and logistics support for the incremental overhaul, modernization, and repair of Trident sub-

"Today I was proud to visit and see firsthand the biggest peacetime construction project ever undertaken by the U.S. Navy," said Esper. "I am glad to have had the opportunity to see the great work being done here at Kings Bay."

"We were proud and honored for the

opportunity to show SECDEF the important role TRF-KB plays in the maintenance and repair of our submarines and to highlight the dedicated Sailors and civilians who support that critical mission," said Robledo. "Our Nation's top defense priority is strategic deterrence and TRF-KB is the front line of national defense."

Esper concluded his visit with a small group luncheon attended by enlisted Sailors and Marines, and junior officers.

Navy announces new Mid-Career **Officer Graduate Education Opportunity**

The Navy is now calling for applications to a new graduate education program to be piloted this fall, with 80 officers expected to start low-residency opportunities offered by up to eight partner schools.

The Low-Residency Graduate Education Program (LGEP) is designed to provide due-course naval officers in paygrades O-2 to O-5 the chance to get a Navy-funded graduate degree in one of three disciplines – strategy, management or international rela-

The pilot program was announced last week in Naval Administrative Message (NAVADMIN) 204/20, which requests that applications be submitted by August 2.

"This initiative is the product of close collaboration between the Chief Learning Officer (CLO), N7, and the warfare communities," said VADM Stuart Munsch, former Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Warfighting Development and service-lead for naval education, whose office helped to champion the new program. "Once implemented, LGEP will give officers with compressed career paths an opportunity to pursue a graduate degree that fulfills education requirements for promotion and milestone screening and contributes directly to Navy warfighting advantage."

The idea is to give officers on compressed career paths a flexible, Navy-funded option to earn graduate degrees which meet the O-7 promotion eligibility education requirement.

Each program is designed to be completed during a shore-duty tour. This means that selected officers will remain at their duty stations and complete most course work online or via telephone. Residency requirements are met through funded, monthly trips to campus.

The lineup of degree programs range in length from 10 to 24 months. Current part-

ner institutions are Old Dominion University, William and Mary University, American University, Johns Hopkins University, UCLA, UCSD, University of Washington, and the Naval Postgraduate School.

In return for the service-funded education, selected officers agree to a continued service obligation of three years, which is served concurrently with any other service obligations they have.

The obligation, which is incurred whether or not the officer completes the degree, starts either on the date of program completion or, should the officer not complete the degree, the date of withdrawal from the program.

This year's program is a test of concept, designed to gauge the effectiveness of lowresidency education delivery models in netting officers required graduation education

while also meeting the needs of the Navy for strategy-minded warriors.

If successful, the program could expand opportunities for up to 300 officers annually in future years.

The window for applications this year is open now and runs through August 2. A committee from the office of the CLO will review the applications; selectees will be announced by August 14.

U.S. NAVY CONDUCTS JOINT OPERATIONS WITH U.S. AIR FORCE IN THE BLACK SEA

BLACK SEA

The Arleigh Burke class, guided-missile destroyer USS Porter (DDG 78), a P-8A Poseidon Maritime Patrol Aircraft (MPA) from Patrol Squadron VP-47, four F-16 Fighting Falcons from the 31st Fighter Wing, Aviano Air Base, Italy, KC-135 Stratotankers from the 100th Air Refueling Wing, Mildenhall, England, and an MQ-9 Reaper assigned to the 52nd Expeditionary Operations Group Detachment 2, Miroslawiec Air Base, Poland, conducted a joint training mission in

the Black Sea, Aug. 2, 2020.

The training mission occurred in international waters and airspace within the Black Sea and was designed to train U.S. forces to integrate, operate and communicate while executing surface and air operations.

"With over 90 percent of the global economy and digital communication traveling via the world's oceans, protecting the maritime domain has never been more important," said Vice Adm. Gene Black, Commander, U.S. 6th Fleet. "Integrating with U.S. Air Force Europe during this training mission enabled us to conduct realistic and relevant

training to reinforce U.S. resolve at sea in the Black Sea region."

Participating units conducted training scenarios that included tactical maneuvering and communications.

"The purpose of this training event was to exercise command and control in a joint training environment with our U.S. Air Force brothers and sisters to increase our tactical proficiency, and Porter's crew did just that," said Cmdr. Craig Trent, Porter's commanding officer. "This training enabled us to continue to build on our combined capability to quickly and effectively respond to

any threats in the complex maritime environment."

Porter and the P-8A Poseidon are currently operating in the Black Sea following participation in the 20th iteration of Exercise Sea Breeze. Exercise Sea Breeze is an annual, multinational maritime exercise co-led by the U.S. and Ukraine and designed to enhance interoperability among participating nations and strengthen regional security in the Black Sea.

Navy reserve support staff increases reserve readiness with new NECs

In alignment with the Navy Reserve's Ready to Win (R2W) strategy, five new Navy Enlisted Classification (NEC) codes have been recently implemented to better classify Reserve Management jobs.

The change will also improve the training pipeline for Full Time Support (FTS) Sailors assigned to Navy Operational Support Centers (NOSC). The new NECs will signify for qualified Sailors an increased knowledge of Navy Reserve policy, requirements and an in-depth understanding Reserve specific

Commander, Navy Reserve Forces Command (CNRFC), along with Navy Reserve Professional Development Center (NR-PDC), spearheaded the new NECs to ensure NOSC Sailors have comprehensive training to be ready from day one to assist Reserve Sailors, and maintain mobilization readiness. Previously, Sailors could only apply for training — and compete for a seat — after reporting on the job at the NOSC.

"This is a big win not only for our FTS Sailors, but for our Reserve Sailors and big Navy as well," said Command Master Chief Tracy Hunt, CNRFC senior enlisted leader. "This is what the Navy needs. Our Reservists need to be prepared — trained, equipped, ready — to jump in the fight tonight."

Reserve Management jobs, normally filled by Sailors in the FTS community, are essential to the training and administration of the more than 60,000 Sailors in the Selected Reserve (SELRES). These positions are the starting point for maintaining mobilization readiness and increasing lethality throughout the Reserve Force.

The NECs affect 1,300 Reserve Management billets located across the Navy Reserve which will require at least one of the five:

■ 858A - Assistant Operational Support Of-

- 841A Reserve Pay and Personnel Management Clerk
- 862A Navy Reserve Order Writing System (NROWS) Orders Specialist
- 863A Navy Reserve Activity (NRA) Command Senior Enlisted Leader
- 866A Reserve Medical Administrative Technician

According to Hunt, the new coding will allow FTS Sailors to complete the associated secondary schools or training requirements prior to reporting to their assigned Navy Reserve Activity.

"With these NECs, our Sailors will be able to get the formal training needed to be able to go to a NOSC and be an asset instantly," Hunt said. "They will know the language and the process instantly. The training streamlining will introduce NOSC staff to the duties and responsibilities they will be performing and prepare them for a successful tour."

Cmdr. Ryan Mudd, commanding officer of NRPDC, says the new NECs ensure that

all eligible Sailors, regardless of enlisted community or duty status, will have a standardized training track in route to these jobs.

"Our talented instructors prepare Sailors for their Reserve Management duties by developing their foundational knowledge, skills and abilities," said Mudd who manages the five requisite NEC training courses located in New Orleans, Louisiana, and Norfolk, Virginia.

Moving forward, when a Sailor receives an assignment to one of these jobs, his or her detailer at Commander, Navy Personnel Command (PERS-4), adds an intermediate stop in the permanent change of station (PCS) orders to ensure the Sailor attends the requisite training course before reporting to the new position.

The NEC program is one aspect of Navy Reserve leadership's goal to best train the FTS support team to maintain a mobilization-ready Reserve force. Future updates to the Navy Enlisted Occupational Standards Manual (NAVPERS 18068F, Volume I) will include the new NECs.

"After completing one of our classes, students not only receive a graduation certificate for their achievement in the classroom, they now also proudly earn an NEC," Mudd

NHC Annapolis' operational approach to COVID-19 prevention puts U.S. Naval Academy on track for fall 2020 semester

ANNAPOLIS, MD.

It has been nearly a month since the first incoming freshmen, or plebes, arrived at the United States Naval Academy (USNA) to check in for their immunizations, vaccinations, blood draws, eyeglasses, and coronavirus (COVID-19) test. Following months of planning and coordination with Naval Health Clinic Annapolis Brigade Medical Unit, plebes have left their Restriction of Movement (ROM) status following a second COVID-19 test and fully engaged in Plebe Summer training.

In previous years, nearly 1,200 plebes would be processed by medical professionals by the afternoon of the first day. Contrary to conventional methods and in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, this

year, the Class of 2024 was processed over four days to maximize social distancing and reduce contacts between possible asymptomatic COVID-19 carriers.

"The mission has not changed. But, the operational approach changed so that we can meet mission requirements," said Capt. Walter Brafford, commanding officer of Naval Health Clinic Annapolis. "We are doing everything to support the USNA medical mission just as we have in years past. This year, we've added one more responsibility, and that's monitoring plebes' COVID-19 status."

The approximately 1,200 plebes, divided into groups of 40 plus nine detailers, are referred to as a "pod." Within the pod, life exists as usual—as usual as it can be for someone making the transition from civilian to military. Plebes move as a unit,

separated by masks and kept at least six feet away from other pods.

Every morning, all plebes and detailers undergo a temperature and COVID-19 symptom check. But, if something else is ailing them, they can no longer form a line at 8:00 a.m. to see a medical professional on the first floor of Bancroft Hall for sick call. Each pod has a blocked time they can go to Dahlgren Hall, which once housed an armory, for a socially-distant sick call to address medical issues typically associated with Plebe Summer.

Predicting the number of asymptomatic cases that would arrive during induction week was possible due to discussions with other accession points and recruiting commands, conversations with Navy and Marine Corps Public Health officials, on-going meetings with leaders at the Uniformed

Services University of the Health Sciences, and discussions with specialty leaders at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center.

All midshipmen with active COVID-19 symptoms, persons under investigation for COVID-19, and anyone with symptoms that could not be ruled out by other diagnoses were placed into isolation or quarantine within Bancroft Hall for close monitoring, separated from the other midshipmen.

"We created two types of isolation spaces: a space for those who tested positive and a space for those who tested negative, but have COVID-like symptoms," said Cmdr. Sara Stires, brigade medical officer. "Our plan is working, and Plebe Summer commenced without issues."

To date, over 5,000 COVID-19 tests have been performed since the first week of July and another 8,500 tests are planned in the upcoming months in order for the entire population of midshipmen to safely return for the new academic year. In order to continue surveillance, Navy Medicine expects to support the Academy with 600 tests per week, roughly testing 15% of USNA students, staff, and physicians.

to 5th fleet."

After spending close to two months at sea, Blades-Langjahr returned to port and found that the world had changed in the wake of the attacks on the World Trade Center. This was also a difficult time for the crew of Kennedy, who had recently failed an inspection.

Blades-Langjahr said the crew did not pass their Board of Inspection and Survey (INSURV). INSURV is a congressionally mandated inspection of U.S. Navy ships to thoroughly check damage control ability and the ship's material conditions to ensure ultimate mission readiness.

Kennedy divided the crew into two sections, port and starboard, to accomplish the repairs and maintenance needed to get out to sea again.

"We were working twelve hours a day, seven days a week, twelve on, twelve off, port and starboard crew," said Blades-Langjahr. "We had a full night check and a full day-check, the whole ship was working 24 hours a day. All the way through Thanksgiving. We didn't get Thanksgiving. All the way through Christmas."

It was difficult, because a lot of the crew was not able to travel home for Christmas because of certain geographical restrictions.

"January rolls around, and I'm up to reenlist," said Blades-Langjahr. "I wasn't going to do it. I was hard

set against it."

Her deadline to re-enlist was February 2, or she would be out of the Navy.

"January 31, my chief sits me down," said Blades-Langjahr. "And he said to me, 'Why are you getting out? How big do you think the Navy is?""

Her chief prompted her to think about different ships, potential duty stations and different opportunities the Navy could provide "My chief said, 'The Navy is bigger than one ship. The Navy is bigger than one IN-SURV failure. There are countless places that you could go and never be at the same place twice in a naval career. Why are you stopping now?"

"So, I walked down to the career counselors' office and I put my reenlistment papers in, three days before my EAOS," said Blades-Langjahr.

Her drive to see the next thing and push forward has led her to a career littered with firsts.

Blades-Langjahr started breaking ground early in her career. As an Aviation Boatswain's Mate 3rd Class, she secured herself a backseat ride in an EA-6B Prowler, despite not being a rate that had any business in that aircraft.

When asked why she pressed for the ride, Blades-Langjahr said, "Because people told

me I couldn't!"

This motivated her to take leave in order to complete the required survival swimming and aviation physiology courses on her own time. The request had to go to the Chief of Naval Operations for approval, and she sent it two before she was scheduled to leave for a deployment. One month before that sixmonth deployment ended that her request was returned: approved.

Blades-Langjahr shattered the normal again when she was accepted into the Flying Chief Warrant Officer program. This Navy program, which ran from 2006 to 2014, sought highly qualified, motivated Sailors between the paygrades of E-5 and E-7 to commission as Chief Warrant Officers and become Naval Aviators and Naval Flight Officers (NFO). To be eligible, personnel must have held a secret security clearance, hold an Associate's Degree, and be able to commission by the time they were 27 for pilots or 29 for NFOs.

She submitted her application in 2006, but was not selected. She applied again the following year, and would go on to commission in April of 2008.

"It felt like a wonderful accomplishment to be selected overall," said Blades-Langjahr. "I looked at every result, tried to see if there was going to be another female selected, but it just never happened."

Out of 49 candidates, she was the only

female selected for a program that lasted about 7 years.

"Yeah, I'm the only female, but I'm still a flying warrant," said Blades-Langjahr. "I still have to perform with my fellow flying warrants. I still have to work in the same capacity, and not be viewed as different."

She attended a month of Chief Warrant Officer Indoctrination, followed by Initial Flight Screening, and then Aviation Preflight Indoctrination before going to Training Squadron 4 (VT-4) in Pensacola, Florida, and then Patrol Squadron 30 (VP-30), based in Jacksonville, Florida. Upon completion of her training at VP-30, Blades-

Langjahr had earned her wings as an NFO. Her first fleet squadron was Fleet Air Reconnaissance Squadron VQ-2 at Naval Air Station Whidbey Island, Wash., where she stayed until VQ-2 was decommissioned and absorbed by VQ-1 in 2012. Six months later, now a Chief Warrant Officer 3, Blades-Langjahr moved on to the Aviation Survival Training Center at Whidbey Island, where she would spend three years as an instructor and department head. When the Flying Chief Warrant Officer program was terminated in 2014, Blades-Langjahr was given a choice: remain in the Chief Warrant Officer track as a Chief Warrant Officer 4, and be shifted into a different rate where she didn't feel she'd be competitive for further promotion, or transition into the officer career track as a Lieutenant.

"Instead of laying down and dying, I decided to fight and try to go past 20, which I did," said Blades-Langjahr.

She was also the first winged naval flight officer to serve as a department head at the Aviation Survival Training Center.

Upon attaining the rank of Lieutenant, Blades-Langjahr explained that she was told she needed a Bachelor's Degree to continue her career. She began working on her Fire, Arson, and Explosion degree.

At this time, she was assigned to USS Gerald R Ford (CVN 78). After eight months aboard the Ford, she became pregnant with her first daughter. She then transferred to Fleet Forces in Norfolk, and stayed for just over three years. During this time, she had her second daughter, and completed her dagger.

er degree.

From there, she came to USS Nimitz

(CVN 68), where she'll retire with 22 years

"It never ceases to amaze me how much life changes," said Blades-Langjahr, reflect-

ing upon the story of her career.

When asked about her favorite roles held over the course of her career, Blades-Langjahr gave two answers. The first was the role of "yellow shirt" aircraft director. The yellow shirt, she explained, is the only authority aboard an aircraft carrier who can move an aircraft, which, for junior enlisted, is an unheard-of amount of responsibility.

The second has been as a "Shooter," or catapult officer, who "shoot" aircraft off the flight deck. "Who gets to do that?" said Blades-Langjahr.

With 22 years of service, rising through the ranks from an Airman Recruit all the way to Lieutenant, fighting through all the twists and turns along the way, always hungry for the next challenge, Blades-Langjahr offered this advice for the next generation: "Never find yourself without a PQS (personnel qualification standard) in hand. Even if you're fully qualified for your particular job, keep going."

"I was an E-4," she explained, "Crash chief qualified, because I never stopped."

Blades-Langjahr took anything she could get her fingers on to become qualified in.

"And that's how it works," she said. "You just keep grabbing on to things to make your evaluation better than the guy sitting next to you. And that's how you succeed, and that's how you keep that motivation and drive to push past normal."

Blades-Langjahr's second piece of advice is to never accept "no" as the first answer, unless it can be backed up in writing. Opportunities are there, even if the person you're asking doesn't know about them. "So, don't stop asking questions."




The custom of manning the rail evolves from "manning the yards" (the pars on a mast from which sails are set) and cheering the ship.

In this together: Military couple recovers from COVID-19, donates convalescent plasma

The COVID-19 Convalescent Plasma Collection Program (CCP) is a Department of Defense effort to collect 10,000 units of convalescent plasma donated by members of the military community who have recovered from the disease. Convalescent plasma will be used to treat critically ill patients and to support the development of an effective treatment against the disease. During this COVID-19 pandemic, there is a heavy amount of difficult news, but there are also rays of hope and inspiration on the path. COVID-19 convalescent plasma donors Trae King-Latimer and her husband Jerome Latimer serve as examples of the generosity of service members and their families, as they

continue serve through their donation.

COVID-19 convalescent plasma, or CCP, is being investigated for the treatment of COVID-19 because there is no approved treatment for the disease at this time. There is information that suggests CCP might help some patients recover from the disease.

When a person contracts a virus such as SARS-CoV-2 — the virus that causes COVID-19 - their immune system then creates antibodies to fight the virus. These antibodies are found in the person's plasma, the liquid part of blood. Plasma with these infection-fighting antibodies is called "convalescent plasma." Through the blood donation process, this plasma can be collected from a fully recovered person and provided to a patient who is still fighting the virus.

A retired Air Force Chief Master Sgt. of 30-years, King-Latimer, and her husband believe they contracted COVID-19 around March 16 — of all things, the couple's one-

year anniversary. they believe that they became infected from Latimer's place of work, since a few individuals there had tested positive for COVID-19. After their symptoms started, they were officially diagnosed on April 9.

"We had every symptom except shortness of breath," explained Latimer. "We experienced body aches, chills, coughing, loss of smell, loss of taste, etcetera. We suffered all the major symptoms. The recovery lasted way too long for us, it was about 5-7 weeks total to fully recover from this."

As she and her husband recovered, King-Latimer was keeping an eye out for COVID-19 in the news, learning more about the disease. That's where she heard about CCP and wanted to know more. Serendipitously, around this time she received a call from Walter Reed National Military Medical Center about the CCP program to see if she would be willing to donate. Wanting to find

out more, she called the number they provided for the Armed Services Blood Bank Center – National Capital Region and spoke with the blood donor recruiter, who provided more information and qualifications to donate convalescent plasma.

King-Latimer, who had given blood several times with the Armed Services Blood Program while in the Service, didn't need to be asked twice. Latimer, a first-time donor, agreed to donate as well. The couple, having never donated via apheresis — or even what that process entailed — were ready to help. People were dying, even people King-Latimer knew. "We were going to donate no matter what the process was," she stated.

Echoed Latimer, "The reason for donating was to help someone who may be suffering and in need of our donation. Our experience was real, it was alarming, especially since so many were passing away ... we felt obligated to help others since we were blessed enough to recover."

In an unprecedented time, family, neighbors, and the community rallied around them during their recovery. It made King-Latimer, a contractor at the Pentagon, recall her military days due to the warm treatment she received.

"We don't live around the military community right now," explained King-Latimer. "When we had COVID-19 and were recovering, our neighbors and community were awesome and so helpful. It was like that military family feeling for us. So when we went to donate it was that feeling of family, community. When you think about donating for this program, think of it as donating for a family member. For your military family."

When asked about the experience and why people should come out and donate, King-Latimer was emphatic. "Don't be scared to do it. We didn't know [fully what apheresis plasma donation was like]. Once we got there, the entire team was amazing! If you are worried or scared about it, think about how beneficial it is to those who need it. It [apheresis donation time] was about 45-60 minutes to help save someone, and that was well worth

As one who has fully recovered from COVID-19 and now a successful CCP donor, King-Latimer said she would consider donating again. Her husband added, "I would tell anyone it's a great way to give back, and that by doing so, you can possibly help save a life or two." Latimer went on to praise the ASBP team, adding, "the experience was inspiring."

Transfer pan to wire rack and let cool 10 minutes before using parchment overhangs to transfer bread to rack to cool completely.






