RAWAH, IRAQ

Iraqi police, army graduate from first combined course

"Why are you detaining?" yelled the flex-cuffed suspect, sitting outside his car while Iraqi security forces searched the building for evidence of insurgent activity. Outside, a similar situation unfolded where other expected insurgents waited for their guard and flex-cuffed in their vehicle while Iraqi investigators photographed the improvised explosive device found in the bed of the vehicle.

The capture of the 'insurgents' was the culminating point in a three-day Tactical Sight Exploitation course held at Combat Outpost Rawah, May 25 through 27.

The course was presented by international police advisors and Marines with Company G, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment, Regimental Combat Team 8, who helped advise and play the role of the insurgents during the exercise.

"The Iraqis are very organized," said Sgt. Scott Dietrich, a noncommissioned officer in charge for the TSE course. "They have searchers, a reader and a photographer. They have roles and everyone knows their job."

During the first two days of the course, international police

advisors instructed Iraqi police and soldiers on evidence location, cache finds, search techniques and detainee handling. Each class subject led directly into the next, building off what was previously taught.

"This is the first time they've been investigators," said Ed Coleman, a retired Baltimore police officer and an IPA with Police Transition Team 7, Multi National Force - West.

During the regime of Saddam Hussein, police were soldiers specifically tasked with urban environments, but detective work wasn't assigned to anyone. Since the installment of legitimate police forces within Iraq, they have gradually shifted into protecting their communities through traditional police work.

"The army has their job fighting insurgents," Coleman said. "The police will be investigating crimes and be police for a change."

After the Anbar Awakening, Iraqis and coalition forces have been working hand-in-hand to find and disrupt insurgent networks, but employing the methodical process of tactical sight exploitation now allows them the ability to be crime scene investigators. Catching an insurgent in the

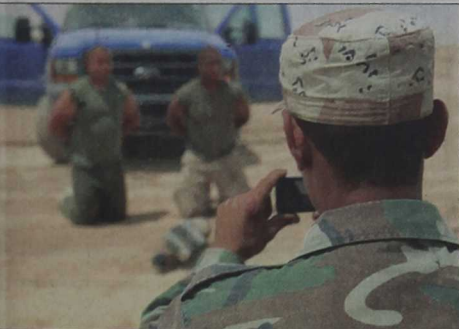

ABOARD USS BATAAN

22ND MEU TRAP TEAM TRAINS IN THE MID-ATLANTIC

The smell of friction-burned leather fills the air of the enclosed hangar bay aboard USS Bataan as leathernecks with leather gloves grip a dark green rope 30 feet in the air. The only way down to the safety of the deck is fast.

Marines with 81 mm mortar platoon, Weapons Company, Battalion Landing Team, 3rd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit, recertified in fast-rope operations aboard the Bataan, May 18.

The mortar men conducted the training as part of their responsibility as the Tactical Recovery of Aircraft and Personnel team for the 22nd MEU.

"Every 60 days we requalify as the TRAP team for the MEU," said Staff Sgt. Jacob L. Smith, a section leader and Helicopter Rope Suspension Techniques master with Weapons Company.

Marines climb up two levels of ladders, up the narrow passageways, wearing full body armor. Once at the top, a HRST master hands the rope to Marines and they shoot out of a hole in the ceiling like shell casings ejecting from a semi-automatic rifle.

The TRAP team specializes in recovering personnel and equipment, such as downed aircraft, by using techniques like fast-roping into restricted areas where helicopters can't land.

"The Marines need to safely and quickly descend to the ground," said Sgt. Jeremy L. Leaders, a fire direction center chief for Weapons Company. "They need to have confidence in me as their HRST master to guide them down."

The Marines need to be prepared mentally and physically for fast-roping out of any helicopter for operations in any environment said Leaders.

Smith added that HRST masters also encourage Marines not to pause when they take that initial leap in dropping down the line.

Hesitation can be hazardous in a hostile area. This type of training motivates Marines to get over the natural human fear of heights and continue the MEU's missions.

"To me, fast-roping is a controlled fall," said Smith. "That's why we do this

AL ASAD AIR BASE, IRAQ

Naval officers roll closer toward their FMF insignia

More than 30 Naval officers currently deployed to Al-Asad Air Base, in support of Multi National Force - West, have spent the past months boning up on their Marine Corps knowledge and skills in pursuit of the coveted Fleet Marine Force Qualified Officer designation and the right to wear the unique gold and silver breast insignia.

According to Lt. Cmdr. Todd Lewis, the deputy surgeon and medical planner for MNF-W, earning this warfare qualification is a boon to a Naval officer's career and professional competence.

"Attainment of the FMFQO designation for a Navy officer signifies an achieved

level of excellence and proficiency in Marine Corps operations," said Lewis, who is on his second deployment to Iraq with Marine forces, and is one of the architects of the current FMFQO designation course for MNF-W. "It indicates a fundamental understanding of a Marine Air-Ground Task Force and its components."

The FMFQO program is optional for Naval officers who are attached to a Marine Corps unit or a part of a unit that directly supports a Marine Corps unit, and MNF-W's ongoing FMFQO candidates include chaplains, medical officers, staff judge advocates, and officers from both the Al-Asad Base Command Group, Riverine Squadron, and Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 24.

Done only in their spare time and aside from their primary duties, these officers study all aspects of the Marine Corps including history, organization, weapons, land navigation and a host of other skills to enhance their service alongside Marine units. The officers must also participate in the combat marksmanship program, complete a series of conditioning hikes and pass the Marine Corps physical fitness test.

After completing the required classroom instruction and practical applications, the Naval officers take a 100-question written exam. If they pass, they later participate in an oral test, given by a board consisting of two FMF-qualified Naval officers and one Marine officer. They must pass with an 80 percent or better on both

the written and oral exams to earn their FMF insignia. While most Marines are familiar with seeing FMF insignia on the chests of corpsmen and religious programmers,

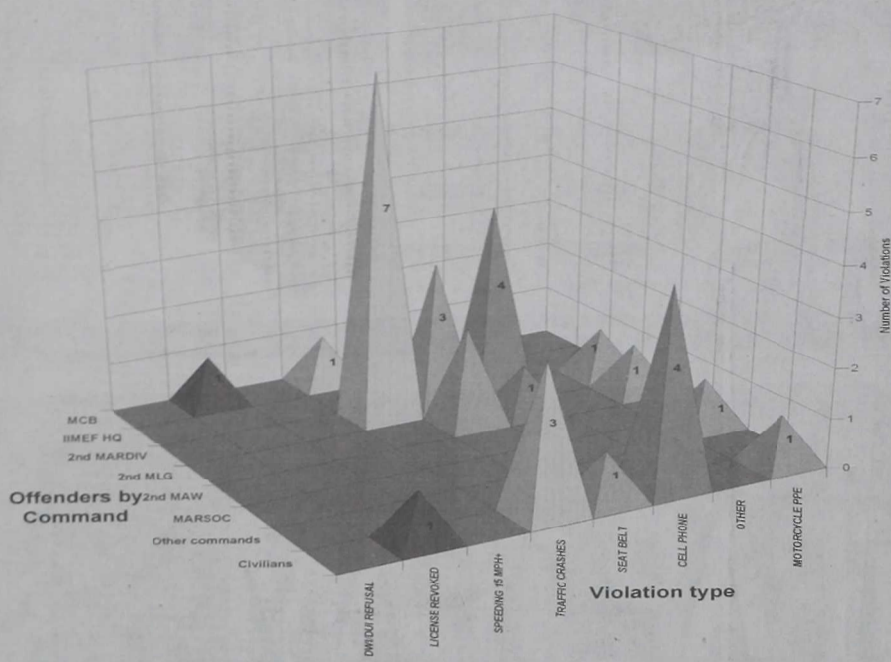

Stay alert, avoid phishing

The word "phishing" is a combination of the words fraud and fishing. Phishing occurs when a crook dangles some phony promise before many people, usually via e-mail, hoping someone will take the bait. There are endless variations, although they tend to fall into a few categories:

Getting money into the U.S.

In this scam, the crook pretends to control a large sum of money and claims to need assistance to get it into the U.S. For example, the crook may claim to be the executor of a large estate in Egypt. The scammer offers you a percentage of the money if you will (a) cash checks or money orders he will provide you and / or (b) provide personal financial information so he can make deposits into your account. The information will be used to steal from you. The checks or money orders may be good enough fakes that they will initially be cashed. However, when discovered to be worthless, you will be stuck with reimbursing the bank not only for the 10 percent you took, but also the 90 percent you sent to the thief who will never be heard from again.

In the military version, the scammer claims to be a military officer who found Saddam's loot, or some terrorist's treasure, and needs your help to smuggle it in.

Identity verification.

In this scam, the crook pretends to be a bank or credit card issuer. His letter warns of suspicious activity on your account and threatens to close it unless you verify the account by providing information that will be used to steal from you. Scammers will send troops e-mails appearing to be from the Navy or Marine Federal Credit Union, knowing service members tend to use these institutions.

Reputable institutions won't send mass e-mails demanding personal financial information. Usually, the company's genuine Web site advises of ongoing scams targeting the institution. Further, you can always go personally to the financial institution and check on your account.

Casualty call.

In this scam, the service member's spouse is called by a person pretending to make a Red Cross casualty call. The scammer claims the member is gravely injured and unconscious, and permission from the next of kin is necessary to undertake a drastic medical procedure. The caller then asks to verify her identity by providing a Social Security number and other personal information.

Prizes and gifts.

This type of scam claims the recipient has won millions, usually in some foreign lottery or contest. The scammer requests personal financial information so the recipient can

claim the prize. In the military variant, the scammer claims that, in appreciation of military service, his company has selected the service member to receive free accommodations or airline tickets. However, the winner must provide a credit card number in order to claim the prize and make the reservation.

Chain letters.

E.g. the Microsoft beta test, the founder of Microsoft is engaged in some extraordinary charitable work. However, Mr. Gates will not give you money just because you forwarded an e-mail about some beta test. Forwarding this or other chain mail violates military regulations and can adversely affect server performance.

"I'm from the government."

The scammer pretends to be a government agent requiring personal information: an IRS agent investigating tax fraud, a court clerk demanding to know why the recipient failed to show for nonexistent jury duty, a commercial lender pretending to be the Veteran's Administration in order to get you to refinance your home loan.

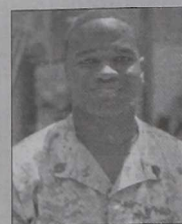
Long distance phone calls.

The scammer leaves a phone message asking you to call back about some terribly important issue. When you return the call, you are put on hold, the call is dragged out, and you later discover that you are charged some exorbitant long distance fee.

Don't take the bait. Don't get scammed.

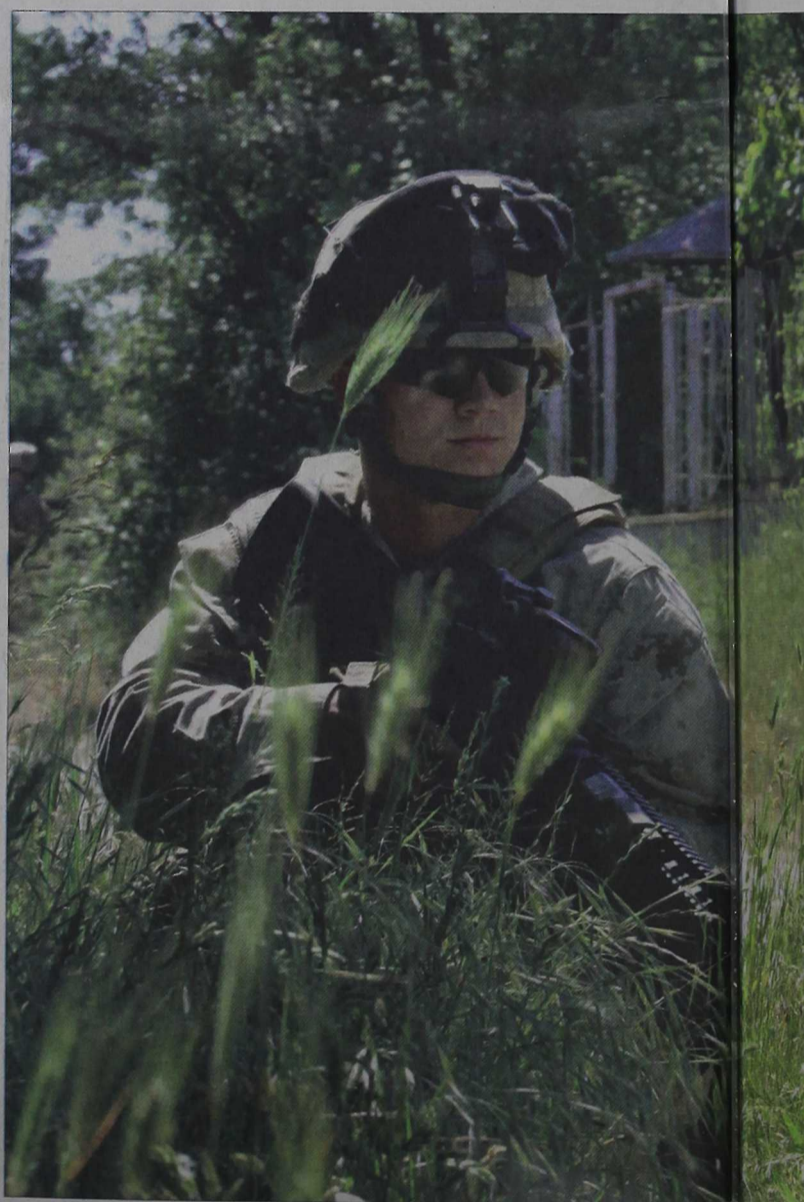

SLIVEN, BULGARIA

First for the Corps, 22nd MEU trains in Bulgaria

Several time zones away from America, thickets of thorns await Marines in a country not many of their brethren have trained in before.

Marines with Company K, Battalion Landing Team, 3rd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit, tackled skills such as land navigation, Military Operations on Urban Terrain and unknown-distance shooting aboard the Nova Selo Training Area in Sliven, Bulgaria, May 28 through June 1.

Bulgaria and the U.S. are strategic allies and their armies have successfully trained together in the past, though this time was a first for U.S. Marines.

Moving a Marine infantry company into a foreign country took much coordination with the American embassy and the Bulgarian Ministry of Defense. Several Marines went ahead of the main group to make liaison so things would be in place when the bulk of the group arrived.

"I really have to compliment the Bulgarian Military Police," said 1st Lt. Brian D. Green, the executive officer for Company K and one of the advance party Marines. "They have been highly professional beyond our expectations and it's been an awesome experience."

Green, added that the Bulgarian Base Operations Officer Maj. Alexandrov did more than asked for by providing a barracks on the joint Bulgarian-American training base on short notice for the Marines to live in during the training.

"When we first came out here, we thought we would be living in two-man tents," said Green. "Now we are able to sleep in these barracks that are a lot nicer."

After the Marines settled into the white, four-story Bulgarian army barracks on the first day, some of them headed outside to do a little weapons' maintenance before the main training events started.

The Marines' method for passing a little down time turned into an opportunity to make friends with the local soldiers.

"He was staring more at the weapon than he was at me," said Lance Cpl. Joel E. Schram, a M-249 Squad Automatic Weapon gunner. "I knew after being around him only for a few moments that he liked weapons just as much as me."

Schram said he enjoyed teaching the Bulgarian soldier how to assemble and disassemble the M-249 SAW even through the language barrier.

"I believe we are here to establish good relations with the Bulgarian army," Schram said.

The down time was short-lived and soon the Marines were stretching their sea legs on a company march, through the Bulgarian countryside, out to the training sites.

The separate platoons from the company used a round-robin approach to maximize the time they had on the ranges.

After waiting for construction crews to safely

clear out of the areas next to the firing lanes, the Marines on the small-arms, unknown-distance range used their skills at range estimation to sight in and hit the man-sized silhouettes leading the way up the side of the nearby mountain.

At the same time, but a couple of kilometers away, Marines used aiming stakes posted in the ground to calibrate their compasses in preparation for the next day's land-navigation exercise.

"This is the best training area we could use for land navigation, because we can use terrain association," said 2nd Lt. Michael Fee, the second platoon commander.

Over the hill from the land-navigation area, Marines practiced patrolling and assaulting through a makeshift town.

Though the simple concrete-and-rebar, mostly roofless, buildings were not as elaborate as the MOU towns on most Marine bases, the Marines used them to good effect, honing their skills in room and building-clearing exercises.

"Training in an unfamiliar territory is beneficial because we can use all the skills we've been taught and put them into action," said Lance Cpl. Scott C. Verry, a M-249 SAW gunner.

The training culminated in a final "Squad Competition" that included tests of knowledge such as remembering weapons' characteristics and writing a patrol order.

The Marines also had to prove their skills with communication equipment and make proper radio calls for artillery support and medical evacuation.

In an event known simply as "Kim's Game," an instructor would momentarily remove and quickly replace a tarp over a collection of random military equipment. Then the squad members would have to identify what was under the tarp.

The Marines used the different training events to build a brothers-in-arms bond while away from their loved ones stateside.

"Being in Bulgaria helps you keep camaraderie with your squad. You get to learn each other's tactics a lot more," said Cpl. Christopher A. Maristany, a squad leader. "These are the only guys we're going to be around for the next six months, so it brings us together."

Whether for the next six months or the next six years, this training opportunity was an experience the Marines can take with them.

"It's just great to be able to show these Marines there's more to the Marine Corps than just going to a sandy place and fighting," said Green.

FMFQO insignia is a rarer, and those officers reporting MNF-W leapt the chance to earn the designation.

"Officers who wear the FMFQO insignia stand out as significant contributors to the Naval services' ground-attack mission," Lewis added, "and signifies additional general knowledge that enhances their understanding of warfighting."

Much of the classroom instruction is given by Marine instructors, who also supervise the PFT and practical application scenarios. During a recent vehicle familiarization aboard Camp Ripper, Marines from the 3rd Light Armored Reconnaissance Battalion, Regimental Combat Team 8, got a hand in improving the avial officers' understanding of all things Marine.

"The purpose of the vehicle familiarization is for

the students to learn more about the vehicles," said Lt. Cmdr. John Brooks, a preventative medicine officer with MNF-W and a FMFQO program coordinator. "When they see the vehicles outside of a textbook, it reinforces knowledge and gives them hands-on experience."

The sailors looked at five different variants of the light armored vehicle, including the basic LAV-25 as well as mortar, logistical, command and control, and recovery variants. Marines from 3rd LAR explained the nomenclature and functions of the LAVs, as well as the crew members' roles, and how LAVs have been used in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Allowing the sailors to interact with the Marines and climb in and over the vehicles gave them an understanding of amount of classroom instruction could duplicate.

Navy Capt. Gerard Hayes,

the battalion surgeon for NMCB-24, said he not only learned more about the vehicles from hands-on experience, but also enjoyed interacting with Marines, something Hayes does not get to do on a regular basis.

"The 18, 19, and 20-year-old Marines are very knowledgeable and professional," said Hayes, who is serving his first deployment in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. "The class was great, and I learned a lot. I always wanted to serve with Marines, so this is a good opportunity."

Gunnery Sgt. Lance Anderson, who serves in 3rd LAR's operations section, said the course was also a good learning experience for the Marines in the battalion, because it allowed them to interact with a variety of people.

"It's great to be able to open up and share knowledge with some of the other branches of

service," said Anderson, who is on his second deployment to Iraq. "The only time we usually work directly with the Navy is with our corpsmen, so this is a unique opportunity to give the Navy officers an understanding of what we do."

Navy Lt. Corinne Devin is a dental officer with Combat Logistics Battalion 7, 2nd Marine Logistics Group (Forward), and said participating in the program helps her gain a well-rounded perspective of the Marine Corps.

"I believe it's very important for a Naval officer to have a solid understanding, especially in the Medical Corps," said Devin. "To understand (the Marine Corps) will not only aid in getting my job done, but strengthen the Navy-Marine team."

Anderson said the pin not only represents hard work and commitment, but also shows the great relationship

act of planting an IED or attacking ISF didn't involve much investigating, but now that insurgent activity has moved underground, the investigative process is a key element in solving crimes.

"The problem the ISF had at first was they were detaining the people in the house right away," Dietrich said.

The Iraqis learned when there is suspicious activity involved within a house, detaining the individuals in the home before finding proof of wrongdoing led to resistant detainees. By sitting the citizens down on a couch and letting the police find evidence usually makes the citizens less defensive and more willing to cooperate.

The capstone event of the course consisted of a scenario where there was a truck with bomb-making materials, a supposed IED cache in a yard, and a house filled with suspected insurgents. The teams were split between Iraqi police and army, and they had to work together to solve each crime and connect the evidence between the cache, truck and the house.

The Iraqis were quick to find the evidence in the bed of the truck because it's a common place for insurgents to hide materials. Once the ISF had suspicions of a cache site in the yard, they found a target indicator and swept the ground with a metal detector.

"A target indicator is a marking stone, tree or pile of rocks," said Lance Cpl. Solomon Gomez, a grenadier with Company G. "It's basi-

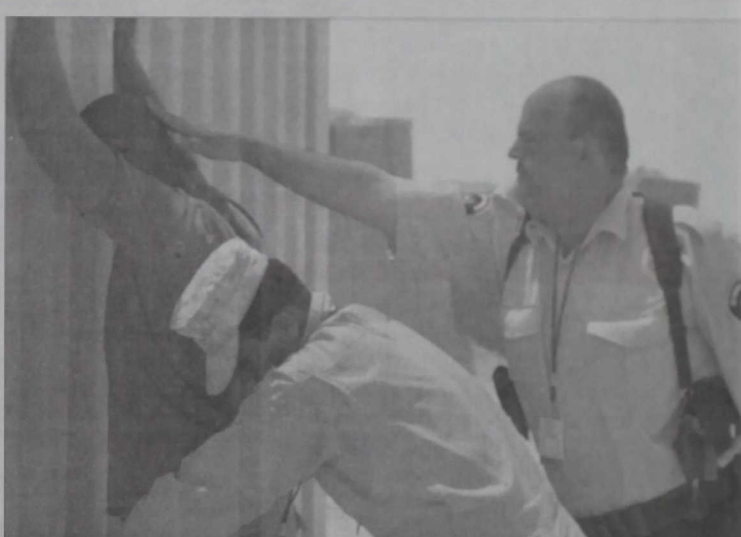

cally any anomaly in the landscape."

The police quickly found a pile of rocks that seemed out of place. After they did a quick metal detector sweep, they carefully dug up the dirt and scraped an artillery shell. But without a target indicator, this can take much longer.

"If you can't find that TI, you'll be there all day," Gomez said.

Learning when to detain the suspects was taught by lessons learned; but where and how to treat the detain-

ees seemed second nature to these men.

"They were smart getting the two detainees away from each other so they wouldn't be able to collaborate a story," said Cpl. Tom Richmond, a team leader and course role-player with Company G.

After the three-day course of instructing how to find evidence and applying what they've learned, the students had their graduation ceremony.

The Iraqi people are well aware of coalition forces dwindling down their presence and also know they must trust their police officers and soldiers to protect them.

"Whether or not they maintain the gains they have made, it matters if they have the heart or not," Coleman said.

Though the suspects and IED may be fake, the newfound skills of the Iraqi police, were not. This growing evidence of the ISF's increasing ability to secure and safeguard their own country will in turn allow the U.S. to draw-down its forces from Iraq.

Young anglers REEL in fun

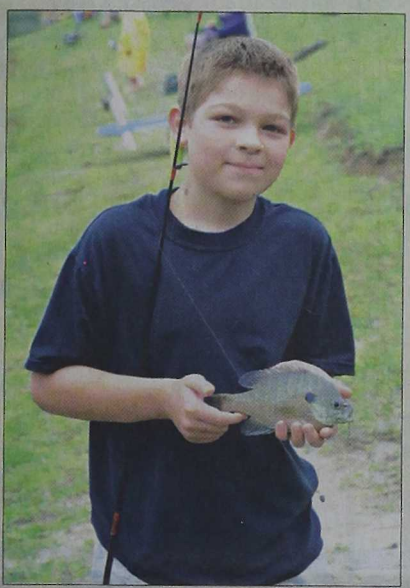

They were certainly not alone in that respect. As the morning wore on, more and more vehicles, loaded with children and fishing tackle, pulled into the parking area at the pond, located near the intersection of Julian C. Smith Road and Gonzalez Boulevard.

"We've had a great turnout and there were a couple of groups that did pretty well," said Martin Korenek, wildlife biologist with Land and Wildlife Resources Section. "This is just another way to encourage people, especially young people, to take advantage of the outdoor activities available on base."

In addition to a representative from the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission, several members of the Lejeune Rod and Gun Club were on-hand to assist the little anglers and offer sage advice.

"We've co-sponsored and helped spread the word on this event since it started in 2006," said club member James Smith. "It seems like it's growing every year. It's a great way to get kids out of the house, away from the computers and televisions, and let them know there's another world out here. Big Rock Blue Marlin Tournament underway

The 51st annual Morehead City Big Rock Blue Marlin Tournament, arguably the largest and most lucrative marlin tournament in the world, kicked off June 6 with the 1-day, all release Lady Angler Tournament.

Camp Lejeune's own Col. Annita Best, Director of Base Public Affairs, joined Capt. Ed Petrilli onboard the "Carnivore" to try for the \$6,481 first place award, but the crew never got a bite.

With two blue marlin releases, the "James Joyce II" beat out 59 other teams in the ladies' division to win the event, held in honor of long-time tournament angler Keli Wagner, who lost her battle with breast cancer late last year.

The main event has been underway since Monday, with 157 top offshore fishing teams vying for more than \$1.6 million in prize money. In addition to the billfish division, boats are also awarded for the heaviest tuna, wahoo and dolphin (mahi-mahi) brought to the weigh-in scales during the week. The final day of fishing is Saturday.

At the time of this writing, no one had landed a blue marlin worthy of bringing back to the dock, though dozens of smaller marlin have been caught and released. Tournament rules require blue marlin to weigh at least 400 pounds to qualify. Any crew that weighs a marlin that doesn't meet the minimum weight is penalized.

You can follow the action online at the tournament's official Web site, thebigrock.com, where real-time updates keep track of who's hooked up and daily photos from the weigh-in.

For those of us not fishing in the tournament, inshore action is heating up as water temperatures continue to rise.

According to Richard Ehrenkaufner, a.k.a. Dr. Bogus, surf fishing along Bogue Banks is showing some signs of life, with red drum and big bluefish hitting artificial lures and natural baits.

Pier anglers are still cashing in on snapper bluefish and Spanish mackerel, especially in the early morning and late afternoon when the sun is low on the horizon. Bottom fishing from the piers is

producing sea mullet, pompano, spots and the occasional flounder and black drum.

Speaking of flounder, fishermen are starting to see more and more of the tasty flatfish as they move into the shallows for the summer. Live baits like finger mullet, mud minnows and shrimp, fished along the bottom, are always a good option when targeting flounder, but they will also hit soft plastics and bucktails tipped with a strip of squid or cut bait. After a recent and

unsuccessful nighttime flounder fishing trip, I can attest to the abundance of shrimp and baitfish in the creeks off the Intracoastal Waterway. When the flounder do make it up there, they will have plenty of dinner options on which to grow fat and sassy in the coming months.

For those of you who like to catch your own shrimp for the barbie, the crustaceans I saw were almost big enough to consider for your next cast-netting adventure. Good luck out there.

Keeping gym safety in mind

With warm weather approaching, more people are engaging in physical activities and trying to get back into shape before hitting the beach. But, with the warm weather comes many safety precautions to be aware of.

"Be aware of the flag conditions outside, use the proper safety gear, and be aware of health and sanitation concerns," said Gregory Ray, the IronWorks Complex manager.

The most common injuries occur because people don't use proper gear and don't ask questions, he added.

Injury breaks motivation and the momentum of your progress. When exercising, remember to keep these safety tips in mind:

Hydration

- Drink at least eight 8-ounce glasses of water a day.
- Athletes should drink more to replenish the fluids they lose during exercise to avoid dehydration, which reduces performance. Some signs of dehydration are fatigue, chills, dark-colored urine, irritability, dry mouth and headaches.
- Drinking too much water can cause hyponatremia (water intoxication), which refers to low levels of salt. Low sodium levels can cause confusion, nausea/vomiting, restlessness and irritability, dizziness, and in severe cases, seizures, unconsciousness or death.

Hygiene

- Fungi and bacteria thrive in moist areas, so always wear flip flops when walking around the locker room, in the showers and around the pool.
- Wipe down machines after use to prevent the spread of germs.
- Everyone is required to use a towel in the gym for health and sanitation reasons.

Healthy eating

- Never skip breakfast. It's the most important meal of the

day. It gives you an energy boost and helps you maintain a healthy weight by jump-starting your metabolism.

- Eat a well-balanced meal. Grains, fruits and vegetables are great sources for carbohydrates for energy, plus vitamins, minerals and fiber.

Reducing injury

- The key to reducing injury is to integrate warm-ups, stretching and cooldowns into your exercise routine.
- If you're unfamiliar with equipment or weight-lifting techniques, ask the front desk of the gym for proper instruction. Fitness coordinators and physical trainers are available to assist you.
- When beginning a new exercise program or learning a new exercise, start with small weights and warm up with a set of 15 repetitions while perfecting the technique. Gradually increase the weight each week.
- Always use proper lifting form. Execute a full range of motion in a slow, controlled manner.
- Use a weight-lifting belt for exercises that put stress on your lower back.
- Always use a spotter. Spotters can ensure your safety while lifting weights and give you motivation to push out that last repetition.
- Know your limits. A longer, moderate workout is more effective than a short, intense one.
- Implement proper breathing techniques. Remember to exhale when you exert. Holding your breath raises your blood pressure and starves your brain of oxygen. It also creates pressure on your abdominal cavity, which may lead to a hernia.

Around the gym

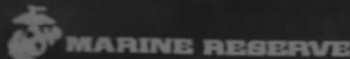
- Don't leave weights lying around where someone can trip over them.
- Use collars to prevent weights from falling off the barbells during exercise.
- Keep hands away from chains, pulleys and weight plates on exercise machines, and always push the pin in all the way when adjusting the weight.

5 time Cy Young winner epitomizes good pitching

Two weeks ago I covered jaw-dropping plays of the 2009 season so far. With nothing in the interim that made me flip a wig, I decided this week to focus on league leaders and accomplishments.

Randy Johnson of the San Francisco Giants won his 300th game after an amazing 21 years in the majors.

Johnson has had one of the best careers a pitcher could hope for. During his more than two decades as one of baseball's most dominant starters, he has pitched for six different teams and held an impressive 3.28 earned run average over that time period. He has had three 20-plus win seasons and seven all-star game appearances.

All I can do is stand up with the rest of the baseball universe and applaud the Big Unit for his great career. Let's stay with pitching. What makes one pitcher better

than another? Is it the one who has the lowest earned run average in the league, or the one who gets the most wins?

So far this season there is one pitcher with double-digit wins; Roy Halladay of the Toronto Blue Jays. Currently, the closest starter to him has just eight wins. But, when it comes to putting zeros on the scoreboard, there's none better than Zack Greinke from the Kansas City Royals.

So which one of them is a better pitcher? I believe the only real way to answer this would be to have them pitch the same game at the same time, and unfortunately, this will never happen.

Some baseball experts say a team's batters respond to pitchers they know and like, and will give them solid offensive support every time they step on the rubber.

The only area where Greinke is lacking to Halladay is in the win column. Looking at a statistics column will never tell you how great a pitcher is. The only way to tell that is to watch them pitch the game after their worst outing.

If they can come back and take it to the other team, then that's a great pitcher, which brings us back to Johnson. He has had his ups and downs, but he always came back and threw just as hard the next day. He's something all young pitchers should aspire to be.

On that note, batter up.

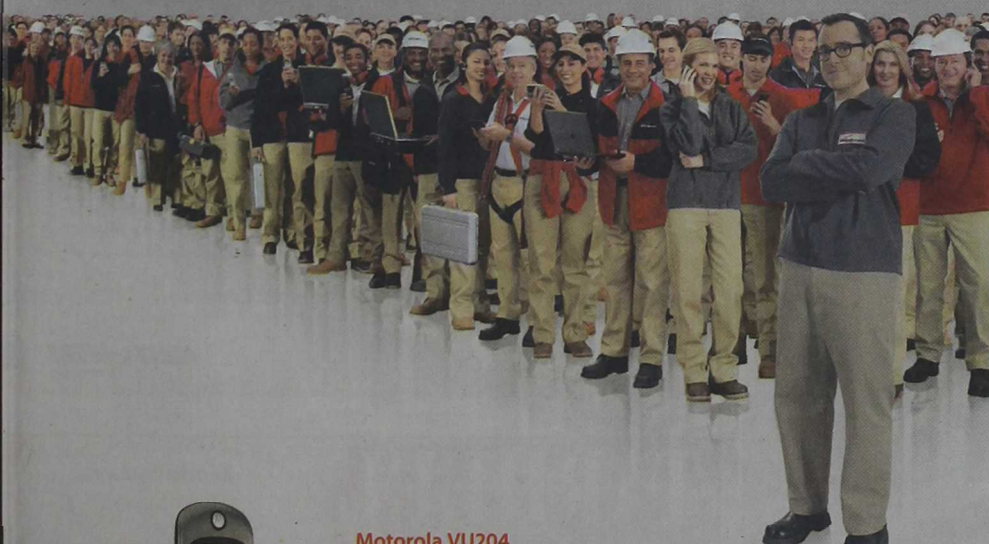

Tiger takes trip to Bethpage, prepares for title defense

Tiger Woods returned to the Black Course at Bethpage on Monday, tuning up in preparation for his U.S. Open title defense.

Woods made a detour on his way home from winning the Memorial in Ohio a day earlier, playing 18 holes with swing coach Hank Haney.

Newsday reported that several dozen golfers who planned to play at Bethpage State Park's four other courses spied the world's No. 1 player and immediately

pulled out cell-phone cameras.

Woods planned to return home to Florida later Monday and practice on his home course at Isleworth leading to the Open, which is June 18 through 21.

Woods won last year's Open at Torrey Pines in a 19-hole playoff against Rocco Mediate. He won the U.S. Open in 2002, the last time it was held at Bethpage Black, and was the only player to finish under par.

The Black Course has been lengthened to 7,426 yards since. It features graduated rough that should allow players to reach the green instead of hacking out to the fairway.

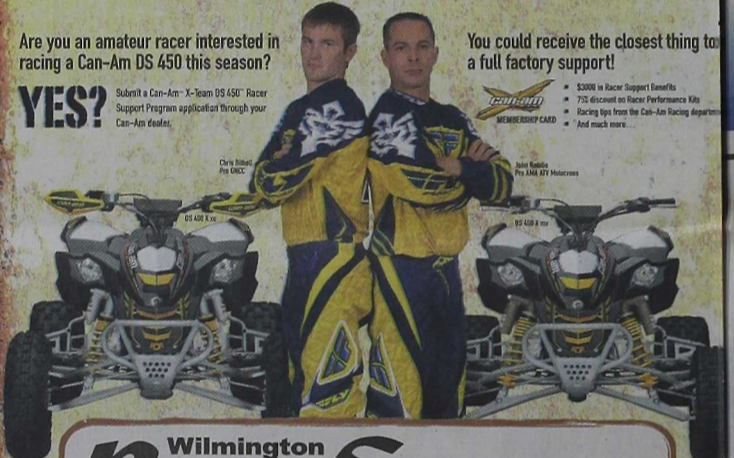

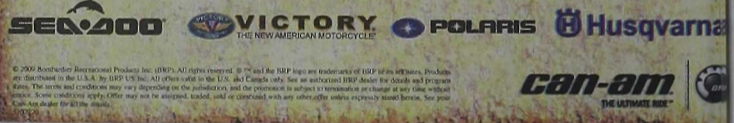

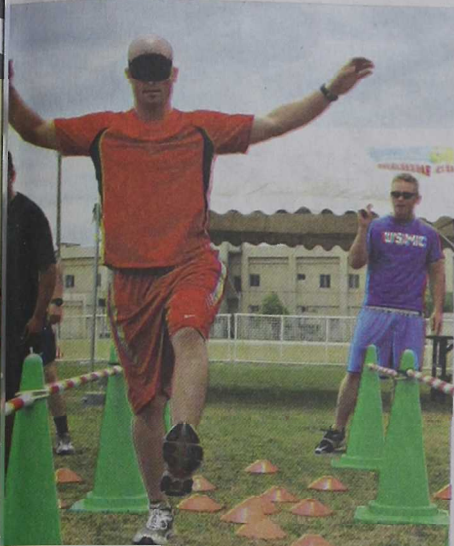

Twenty-six teams with stamina, marksmanship, athleticism, military knowledge, and the ability to think on their toes kicked off the Amazing Race at the parade deck, May 22.

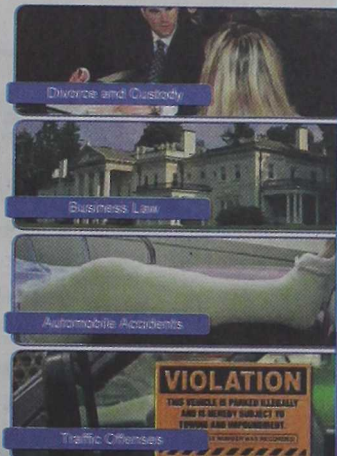

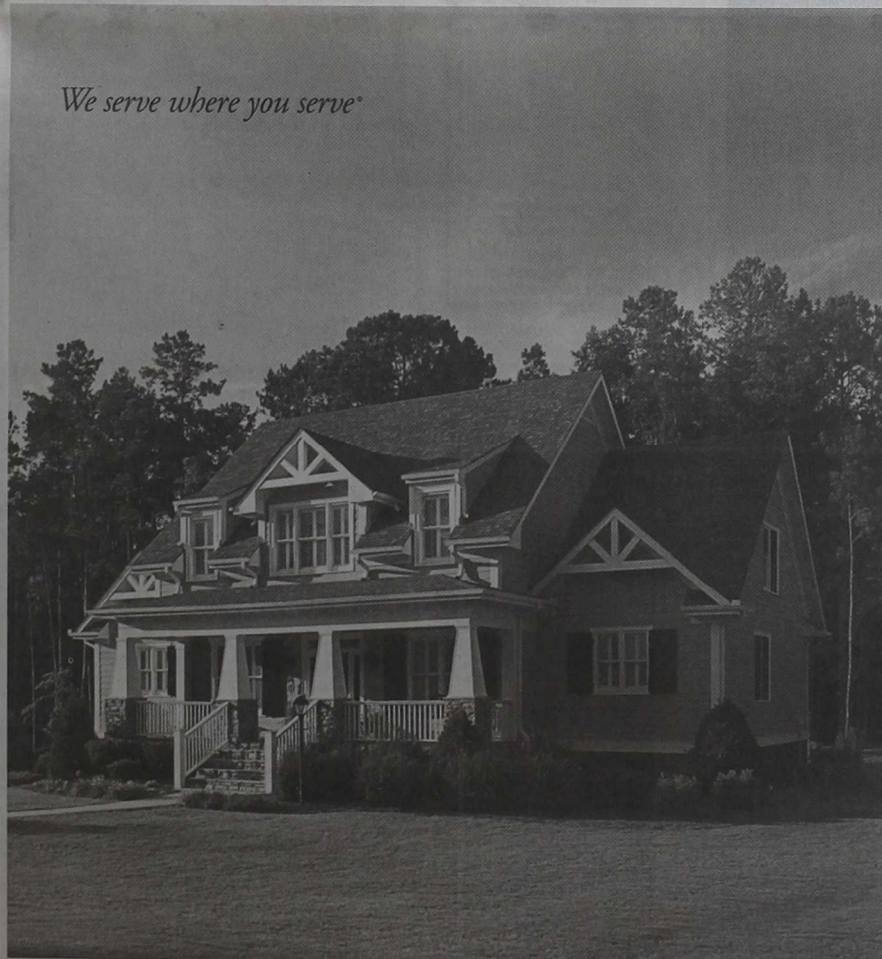

The training allowed Marines to maintain their jump skills, because for them, jumping into enemy territory is just another part of their job. "They call us the eyes and ears of the Marine Corps," said Cpl. Christopher Miller, a reconnaissance Marine with 2nd Reconnaissance Battalion. "Parachuting allows us to drop behind enemy lines,

much closer to our objective. That way we can quickly get information on our enemy to make sure Marines go into combat with the right personnel and equipment." Although the Osprey's tilt-rotor configuration gives the aircraft the ability to get to a landing zone quickly and unload troops like a traditional helicopter, parachuting has the added benefit of

being nearly silent. For a small team of six Marines operating near hostile forces, that extra advantage can enable them to gather sensitive information on the enemy so Marines can fight smarter. Before they load onto the aircraft, a jump master inspects each Marine and their gear from head to toe, because once you jump out of an air-

craft at 1,500 feet, there's no turning back. It's a daunting responsibility, and one the Corps doesn't take lightly. Half of the Marines who attend jump master school are weeded out, because in their line of work there is no room for error. After a thorough safety check, the Marines were cleared for a jump. An Osprey made a vertical landing

about 100 feet away and the Marines loaded up. The Osprey then performed a vertical take off, and transitioned into horizontal-flight mode for the jump. As it sped over the target zone, the jump master gave the Marines the signal, and they stepped into the open air. "You try not to think about

Beach Safety: it's not just the lifeguards' problem

Beach season has been well underway for a few weeks and with more people visiting the shoreline every day, now is the time to make beach safety a priority. Rules are posted at the entrance of each beach, and beachgoers would be wise to know them, especially how to read the flags before

rushing into the water. "A green flag condition is just a normal day at the beach," said Sgt. Malachi Buico, lead lifeguard with Headquarters and Support Battalion, Beach Detachment. "If we see a rip current forming, we'll change the flag condition to yellow and warn the people on the beach." If someone gets sucked into a rip current, they should never try to swim against it, Mother Nature will

always win. In order to get out of a rip current, the swimmer should swim parallel to the shoreline. When the flag condition is either green or yellow swimming is permitted, but if the flag condition changes to red or black swimmers will be asked to leave the water. "A red-flag condition means there is either shark in the water or a thunderstorm off shore," said Buico. "Beachgoers will be asked to

leave the water but will still be allowed on the beach." The most serious flag condition is the black flag. If a severe thunderstorm is imminent, everyone will have to leave the beach and will be asked to go home. Although the signs and flags posted give beachgoers a black and white version of what they can and can't do, there are some common sense rules that are implied when

visiting the shore. "Come with friends and keep an eye on each other," said Buico. "Also if you see wildlife like jellyfish it's just best to leave them alone. If you do get stung, the lifeguards have a spray that can be put on it." Service members are encouraged to have fun while attending the base beaches, but are reminded to police their own. As long as it's safe, going to the beach can be fun for everybody.

Lejeune civilians cream of USDA leadership crop

PMO lays down the law

You hear their cry, and your heart pounds in nervous question. You analyze your recent actions with quick fervor, and if any indiscretion arises, you contemplate various excuses as to your conduct. Their wails grow louder and you grit your teeth; who do their cries seek?

The scream grows and pulses but then flies past you, the volume shrinking as you now trail far behind, breathing a sigh of relief. Just like the Sirens of old Greek mythology, these cries are also sirens; the sirens of the Provost Marshal's Office.

For many, the sound of the approaching PMO military police cars brings a feeling of gratitude, being ensured that a vigilant watch is kept over the safety of the community. Those people parked on the side of the road, in front of one of these cars, are grimly reminded that not only will every passing motorist be laughing at them, but also that the MPs take their job seriously, as base safety and security itself is nothing to laugh at.

"Our overall mission is to act as a deterrent against any possible crime," said Master Sgt. Bernard Coe, the base PMO chief. "We dictate our force to the community's immediate needs."

"On any given day, we have around 10 two-man teams out on patrol, but if an event comes up, we'll concentrate forces for added security," said Coe. "Such as the Beach Bash coming up, we'll have 50 MPs out to cover it."

The PMO now runs foot and bike patrols on base not only for the versatility of individual officer movement, but also for community awareness.

"It gives the community a personal presence," said Sgt. Bryan Whalen, a PMO desk sergeant. "It's a lot more assuring to the people if they see an MP out walking as opposed to a squad car driving by."

Although only performed upon request, courtesy house checks for anyone going on leave or temporary additional duty have become procedure of PMO protocol to ensure security is kept while away.

"You submit your house check request to the military housing office, which then comes to us," said Whalen. "We will send an MP out to your house when you are away at a random time. The frequencies of visits per day vary on how many requests we have."

To increase property security, it is also recommended that a neighbor or friend checks periodically on the house as well.

"Make sure to include that person's information in the request so we don't

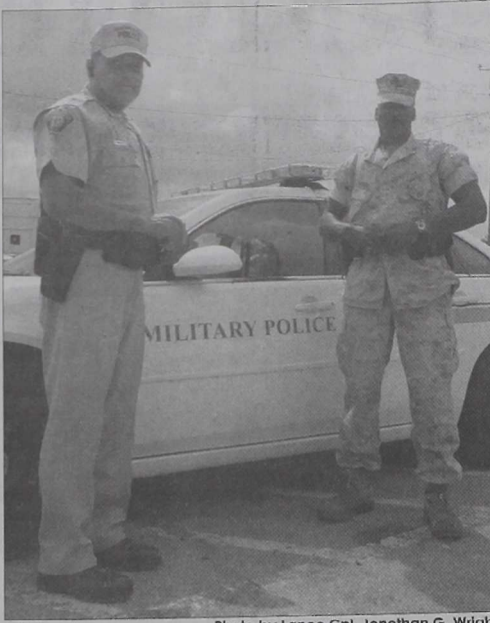

think they're attempting to break into your house," said Whalen.

The newly-inducted foot and bike patrols as well as courtesy house checks both increase community awareness in their PMO; it's not just community safety that

is needed, but also for the people to feel and see that safety daily.

So, the next time you hear the scream of sirens heading your direction, you can feel at ease that PMO is here... only if you're not committing any crimes.

Marines encouragement of physical activity was a key aspect to their participation in the field meet.

"Being out here and running around and being active," said 2nd Lt. Nicholas M. Thompson, platoon commander of second platoon, Co. E, "it's very important for kids today. This event is telling them about exercise and being active. It's good to see them doing these things out here."

But Thompson was quick to point out the event benefitted the Marines almost as much as the kids. He said participating in the event helps the Marines break their routines and do something different.

"It's good for the community and the Marines," said Thompson. "It's good for the Marines to interact with the community and not the same Marines they see every day. The kids look forward to each event and interacting with someone they don't normally interact with."

"(The Marines) set a good example for the kids," Thompson asserted. "Helping is a big thing, being involved in what's going

on. I think the Marines are having as much fun as the kids," he said.

Hines agreed that the Marines' behavior at the event set a good example.

"The Marines are respectful," Hines stated. "They have manners. I like the kids to see that. Our kids need to see that respect and showing manners. They're perfect role models."

West said it only took a short set of instructions to ensure the Marines knew what was expected of them.

"I told them not to curse," West said, "to keep their uniforms on, mind their Ps and Qs. They're representatives of the battalion and of the Marine Corps. Once you talk to them they get it. They made some jokes on the bus on the way out here, but once they got on deck, they had their game faces on."

"We want to put out the image that we're not all muscle-bound jarheads," said Cpl. Aaron M. Minot, a squad leader with third platoon, Co. G, "and that we can interact with the kids."

"We're trying to build teamwork and hard work and playing hard and having fun," Minot said. He stressed that setting a good example for the children would have long-lasting benefits. it," said Lance Cpl. Britt Wadi, a reconnaissance Marine with the battalion. "I was the first one out, so I just shouted 'Geronimo' and made the jump."

Seconds into their free fall, a cord still attached to the aircraft pulls the rip cord on their parachute, and although they look like they're drifting down, they are actually falling between 15 to 20 feet per second.

Safely landing at such speeds while carrying 55 pounds of gear requires Marines to distribute the impact over as much of their body as possible to prevent injury, but with their training everything went smoothly.

As the Marines begin to relax after their jump, a sergeant came up to the group and said, "Hey, we've got another chance to go. Suit up if you want to jump."

Suddenly, everything was a bustle of activity, as Marines prepared for another taste of the thrill you get jumping out of a perfectly good plane.

Stay safe biking roads, paths

With gas prices rising and base traffic almost at standstill, service members are finding alternative ways of commuting to and around base.

Bicyclists are becoming more prevalent both on an off base and there are a few key reasons commuters are making the switch from cars to cycles.

"Warm weather brings (cyclists) out," said Stephen Crue, an occupational safety health specialist with Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune. "Summer is a time when you see more cyclists on the roads. Plus, it's a time when children are out of school and biking around base."

With the growth of bike traffic, there becomes an increased need for bicycle safety. This is pertinent to both cyclists and motorists.

"Motorists need to be looking out for cyclists, especially children," said Crue. "Bikers need to wear bright or reflective clothing. The brighter a cyclist is, the safer they are."

Not only should motorists be looking out for bikers but they should be courteous to them as well. The biker always has the right of way.

"If you are driving up behind a bike on the road and a car is coming at you, then you should slow down, allow the car to pass and then go around," said Crue. "I've seen motorists push riders off the road and that is very dangerous."

In addition to wearing reflective clothing and helmets there are other safety features that need to be present on a bike to ride at night. Night, according to the base order is considered to be after evening colors and last to morning colors.

"You need to have a rear reflective device on the bike if you are going to ride when it's dark," said Eric Quinn, a safety specialist with MCB Camp Lejeune. "Additionally, you need a head lamp mounted in the front."

While riders can bike on the road, it is safer if they don't. Car traffic can make it more dangerous for bikers when they take to the streets.

"It isn't against the base order to ride on the roads," said Crue. "However, we do encourage cyclists to use sidewalks and trailways. There is less of a chance for them to have an accident involving a car."

Other safety rules for cyclists include riding with the flow of traffic and walking the bike across intersection or any time while crossing a street. Furthermore, be aware of areas where it is unsafe or off limits to ride. It is prohibited to bike Holcomb Boulevard between Brewster Boulevard and Sneads Ferry Road.

There are several benefits of riding a bike. Due to the absence of carbon emissions, biking is an environmentally friendly mode of transportation, which cuts down on pollution. However, cycling isn't just about commuting. "I get out there as much as I can," said Quinn. "It relieves stress and it is great exercise. Plus, you don't have to worry about traffic, if you are commuting."

There are several places locally to take a bike and ease tension and get in shape. The rails to trails greenway offers 5.2 miles of path, which stretches from the front gate to the McDonalds on Highway 24. From there, another trail begins and will take a rider another 1.2 miles to New Bridge Middle School. Additionally, on base, there are off road bike trails at the intersection near the bridge.

Whether biking for fun or transportation, safety paramount.

"Marines are Marines 24 hours a day, seven days a week," said Crue. "Always use proper preventative equipment and operational risk management whether biking for a commute or for fun."

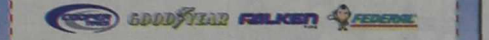

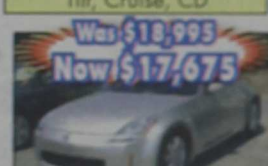

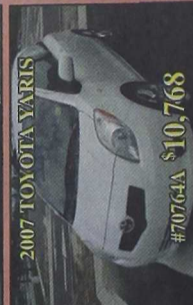

RETURN TO THE WILD

Volunteers release rescued sea turtles

Hundreds of people gathered for a day at the beach. The weather was a perfect mix of hot and breezy air with an abundance of sunshine, but these beachgoers were not there to swim or play in the sand.

The crowd showed up to cheer on the release of 23 sea turtles rescued by the Karen Beasley Sea Turtle Rescue and Rehabilitation Center, June 3. The turtles included 14 greens, eight loggerheads and one Kemp's Ridley.

There are currently six species of sea turtles that nest on U.S. beaches and live in U.S. waters. All of these turtles are designated as endangered by the Endangered Species Act. The turtle hospital has been working hard to get these animals off the list.

Eight guests from Camp Johnson's Field Medical Training Battalion assisted with releasing one of the turtles.

It was a special experience for Chief Petty Officer Nona Cullen, the academics chief for the battalion.

"I'm really excited," she said. "I think it is a good cause. I've been in this area since (1995) and I have never had an opportunity to do anything like this. I am (ecstatic) to be chosen this year."

This was Cullen's first time helping turtles but not the first time representatives of the battalion came out to support the release.

"Last year was the first year I came out," said Master Chief Petty Officer Tony Polanco, the battalion's command master chief. "My wife Amy volunteers here every Friday, and she asked for the assistance. I'm glad they actually asked us to come back and support it."

Polanco also thanked his command for giving him and the battalion's other representatives the opportunity to help the turtles.

"I would definitely like to thank our (commanding officer) Capt. (Efren) Saez for being a very big supporter of community service," Polanco said.

"He pretty much gave us the day off to come do this."

For Jean Beasley, the founder and director of the Karen Beasley Sea Turtle Rescue and Rehabilitation Center, this was an especially meaningful day, which brought tears of joy and sadness to her eyes.

She addressed a small crowd of turtle lovers before the turtles were released in front of the hospital. Her speech mainly focused on thanking volunteers, but also touched on the reasons why she is so passionate about saving turtles.

"A number of years ago, I read a blog and it touched me what Matthew

Godfrey, (the Sea Turtle Program Coordinator for the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission,) wrote," she said as she began to fight back tears while quoting the content of the blog. "More than 1,000 people came out to the beach to cheer the turtles on. The turtles were clapping as if they knew they were going home. It was a wonderful day and experience. Later he returned to the beach and pulled out those turtles who didn't make it. As he lined them up, he thought there is no one here to clap for these turtles. No fanfare, no one to cheer them on."

She then explained the ones who

didn't make it are the reason she fights so hard to save the ancient beasts.

She then had hospital volunteers hand out pastel blue and green ribbons to those attending the ceremony to honor the ones that couldn't be saved. Over the years the hospital has helped to ensure that sea turtles continue to be a fixture at Topsail.

"When I first had the idea to create this hospital, nearly 14 years ago, I was told I would probably only see three or four turtles a year," Beasley said. "So far, we've had 54 turtle rescues in 2009. My goal is to save so many that when you are out swimming you literally have to dodge them."

'Crank 2: High Voltage:' Full of action, violence

"CRANK 2: HIGH VOLTAGE" (R)

"Crank 2: High Voltage" is the sequel to the 2006 "Crank."

This action hit picks up immediately where the first movie left off. Jason Statham ("The Bank Job," "Death Race," "Transporter") reprises his role of hitman Chev Chelios, who in "Crank" spent 24 hours in overdrive, fighting, killing, and keeping his adrenaline flowing at full-force to combat a deadly poison injected into his body.

Managing to survive all that, Chev is about to face a brand new day when he is kidnapped by a mysterious Chinese mobster.

Three months later, Chev wakes up to discover that his heart has been surgically removed and replaced with a battery-operated device that requires electrical jolts on a regular basis in order for it to work.

Escaping from his captors, Chev is on the run again. This time from a Mexican gang boss, El Huron, played by Clifton Collins, Jr. ("Babel"), and the Chinese Triads headed by Poon Dong, David Carradine ("Kill Bill")

Killer graphics boost 'Killzone 2'

Some say revenge is sweet, but they've never tried to exact vengeance on Helghan.

In "Killzone," the ruthless Helghast attacked the planet of Vekta. In "Killzone 2," it's time for some payback.

The M-rated game, developed by Guerrilla Games for Sony for its PlayStation 3, opens with Helghast Emperor Visari delivering a Saddam-style rant against a looming counter-attack by Vekta. You play as Sev, a veteran whose special forces unit is assigned the job of grabbing Visari and putting an end to the Helghast threat. It's supposed to be an easy operation, but you know it won't be.

Helghan is an unforgiving rock, bathed in dirty air and radiation. Its inhabitants have learned to harness one of the planet's more unstable elements to defend themselves. Part of your job is to take down a massive weapons system powered by the element.

Aside from that, most of the missions involve assaulting buildings or rescuing friendly forces. The missions are generally well constructed, interesting and very intense. Although there is some running and gunning, it's usually a good idea to use cover wisely and find routes to flank your foes.

Most of the time you'll have at least one squadmate tagging along to help. And most of the time, he'll do a pretty good job of covering your back and dropping hints on what to do next. The enemy's artificial intelligence is generally good, too — taking cover, throwing grenades if you linger in one spot too long, replacing fallen comrades at machine guns and the like.

Your basic selection of weapons is decent; assault rifles, missile launchers, sniper rifles, flame-throwers, etc. More exotic

weapons are pretty rare, but are terrifically fun to use when they are available.

Game play is very good. The controls are intuitive and very responsive. Movement is smooth. And the system for firing around cover works very well.

The graphics are quite impressive. Helghan's environments are rendered in rich, gritty detail. Characters, vehicles and weapons boast plenty of texture and move realistically. And explosions pack a good visual punch. Of course fans had high expectations, primarily because of an eye-popping trailer unveiled at E3 in 2005 — a clip that drew a firestorm of criticism when it was revealed that it didn't use in-game graphics. Overall, I believe those expectations were met.

"Killzone 2" offers several online game formats, with players able to compete in seven different character classes. There's also a skirmish mode, which lets players re-create the online experience offline by fighting with and against AI soldiers.

The only gap in "Killzone 2" is the lack of cooperative play. However, this is an especially large gap since all of the best shooters of the last year — "Tom Clancy's Rainbow Six: Las Vegas 2," "Call of War 2" and "Call of Duty: World at War" — have offered co-op play in their campaigns and in special skirmish modes. It would have been great if I had been able to take on the Helghast with a friend covering my back.

Despite that, the game offers a sizeable boost to Sony's stable of PS3-only titles.

Armin Brott's latest fatherhood book advises military dads

Moms-to-be have always had plenty of guidebooks to help them know "What to Expect When You're Expecting."
For a long time, fathers did not have similar volumes of advice to guide them through the maze of parenthood.

Enter Armin Brott.
A Marine veteran, Brott certainly didn't know what to expect when his first daughter (of three) was on the way.

He began to write essays about his thoughts and feelings of pending fatherhood. As a talented writer, some of his musings ended up in The New York Times.

As he became more active in his daughter's life (and the lives of her two siblings who followed), Brott said he came to understand, "Guys want to be more involved with their kids."

Yet, as he learned in an incident at his neighborhood playground, society holds certain misconceptions and prejudices about men and children. That day, when Brott caught a child as she fell backward off the steps of the slide, a woman in the park made a big deal out of it.

"There was suspicion because I was with a child," he said. "It was a hurtful kind of thing."

At that moment, a professional father was born.
"It was really kind of an accidental thing," said Brott. "It became one of those things that, if you channel anger properly, then it can really turn into something."

Flash forward, and Brott is now an author of seven books about fatherhood. He also pens a syndicated column on the subject and as a long-running radio program near his home in Oakland, Calif.

As a recognized fatherhood expert, Brott has been receiving e-mail inquiries for years. When the War on Terrorism started heating up, he began to receive imploring messages

from deployed fathers.
He said the topics ranged from: "My teenager was just busted for smoking dope, and I'm over here in Iraq," to "I've been deployed a year, and I've killed people. What am I supposed to do when my family asks what I did?"

Brott began to realize he had to write a book to help military fathers with issues surrounding parenthood and deployment.

His seventh book in The New Father's Series: "The Military Father: A Hands-on Guide for Deployed Dads," does just that.

Published in 2009, the hefty volume takes military fathers step-by-step, from the first moment they learn they are deploying, through post-deployment life.

It also provides helpful advice for civilian contractors who work in theater and dads whose wives deploy.

Though Brott was not yet a parent when he was in the Marine Corps, he was able to draw on his knowledge of the military in writing the book. He also sought research and "field tested" tips from a variety of outlets,

ranging from Military One Source to actual dads who have been through the deployment process.

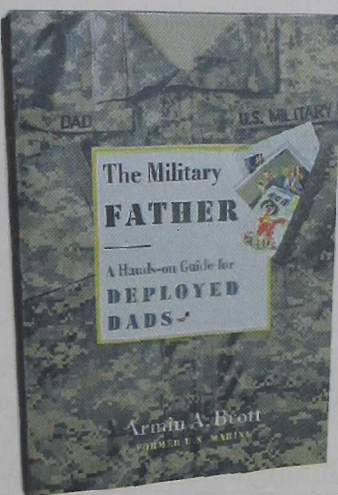
An Army officer at West Point also provided actual military research about the subject. Much of that research was not yet known to the public.

"A lot of it hadn't made it out of military journals," he said.

The book that emerged from all that research includes cartoons and some humor, all written in "digestible chunks," said Brott.

Despite the light moments in the book, Brott does address serious issues as well. In the final chapter, he included material about coping with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, brain injury, physical injuries and death.

"I'm trying to get this information out there because it's just a tremendously important thing," he said.

Brott wrote the book to help military fathers with the entire life cycle of the deployment process and to realize they can continue to parent while they are away at war.

The most important thing military dads need to know is things will go better when they plan as much as possible in advance and understand what is going on with their wives and children as they navigate their

own process through deployment, he said. "Your family needs you. You need them. And there are some things you can do to keep in touch," said Brott.

Camp Lejeune Dependents Schools' have preschool programs for children who will be 4 years old by Sept. 1, live in base housing or whose sponsor holds a 90-day housing letter.

There is no fee for attending this program. The preschool program is located at Johnson Primary, Tarawa Terrace I Primary and Delallo Elementary Schools. The only exceptions to the age requirement are for children 3 or 4 years old who have developmental delays and have an Individualized Education Program by CLDS specifying preschool education as a service.

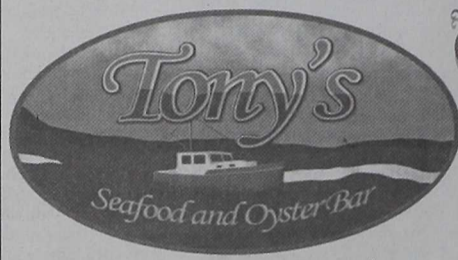
Preschool is a half-day program on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. There are morning and afternoon sessions. Wednesdays are set aside for parent workshops, home visits, parent-teacher confer-

ences, team planning and staff development.

Transportation is provided for children who live 1.5 or more miles from the school, who attend a Base Child Development Center or have transportation listed as a needed service on an IEP.

Registration is now taking place at all CLDS elementary schools.

Student Registration Begins at Camp Lejeune Dependents Schools

Camp Lejeune Dependents Schools' student registration for school year 2009-2010 is scheduled to begin Tuesday for students in preschool through 12th grade.

Dependent children, living with their military sponsor in assigned quarters, and who are 4 years old by Sept. 1, 2009, are eligible for the half-day preschool program. The half-day preschool programs are:

- Delalio Elementary, for families living aboard Marine Corps Air Station New River
- Tarawa Terrace I Primary School, for families living at if living in Tarawa Terrace I, II and Midway Park housing
- Johnson Primary School, for families living aboard Camp Lejeune

Dependent children, living with their military sponsor in assigned quarters, and are 5 years old by Sept. 1, 2009, are eligible for kindergarten. Kindergarten programs are:

- Delalio Elementary, grades pre-kindergarten through 5th grade, for families living aboard New River
- Tarawa Terrace I School, grades pre-kindergarten through 1st grade, for families living at living in Tarawa Terrace I, II and Midway Park housing
- Tarawa Terrace II Elementary, grades K through 5 living in Tarawa Terrace II
- Tarawa Terrace II Elementary, grades 2 through 5 living in Midway Park
- Johnson Primary School, grades pre-kindergarten through 2 residing on main side
- Bitz Intermediate School, grades 3 through 5 residing on main side

All recognized, legal dependents residing permanently, assigned family housing in all Camp Lejeune/New River areas in grades 6, 7 and 8 attend Brewster Middle School, while students in grades 9 through 12 will attend Lejeune High School.

Requirements at initial registration for the biological children of the active duty member include: the child's certified birth certificate; immunization record; family housing voucher; and sponsor's permanent change of station orders (or other verification of active duty status).

Stepchildren or non-biological legal, recognized dependents of the active duty member must be approved by the District Registrar at the Superintendent's Office, 855 Stone Street, Camp Lejeune prior to enrollment in school. Before authorization to enroll will be granted, the following documentation must be presented: the child's original, certified birth certificate; sponsor's DD Form 1746, Application for Assignment to Housing; family housing voucher or completed lease agreement; custody document showing spouse has legal custody of the child.

Failure to provide required documents will delay the child's enrollment in school. Parents of new students enrolling in grades 1 through 12 should provide the name and address of the previous school attended along with the last report card or withdrawal grades from that school.

Parents of new students may visit the school offices to register, between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m., Monday through Friday. For clarification of district school, contact the Office of the Superintendent for confirmation at 451-2461.
