Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day: 78 years later

December 7, 1941 was a day that will always live in infamy throughout United States history. The morning of the 7th, more than 3,000 people started their day like it was no different than the day before. While working their way through their daily routine, the Imperial Japanese Navy Air Service struck the U.S. naval base at Pearl Harbor. The attack, which killed more than 2,400 American service members and wounded another 1,100, led to the United State's entrance into World War Two.

Today, we remember all those killed on the island of Oahu on that fateful Sunday morning in 1941, and we honor the American patriots of the Greatest Generation who laid down their lives in the battles of World War II. America is forever blessed to have strong men and women with exceptional courage who are willing and able to step forward to defend our homeland and our liberty.

Herk Nation Turkey Shoot: No substitute for ARC experience

On Nov. 12, the 189th, 314th, 19th Airlift Wings and the 913th Airlift Group participated in the annual Turkey Shoot. The event, a demonstration of skills, experience, and tenacity, is a combined effort between air crew and maintainers assigned to each unit. The friendly competition showcases their abilities and knowledge of the aircraft, how they apply it to precision drops and other actions supporting the combat airlift mission. The event promotes an environment of camaraderie while allowing Airmen to test their combat skills in action. The competition lasted throughout the day and concluded with a ceremony and awarded recognition for the winning team.

At the end of the day, points were tallied and the 913th Airlift Group, Team Little Rock's Air Reserve component took the win and brought home the trophy for all to look upon. The revelry was short-lived however, when a miscount brought astonishing results. As it turned out, the 189 AW won by a hair. Due to the hard work of the wing's maintainers and a little flawed public math on the active duty side, the Airmen pushed the Guard to the win.

It was a close call. With a 3/100th of a difference between scores, the 913 AG begrudgingly handed the trophy to the 189 AW. The exchange was far from bittersweet however, with the knowledge that the

two ARC's swept their active duty competitors off the board.

"The fact that the National Guard and Reserve placed in the top spots is a testament to our experience and what we bring to the fight," said Air Force Reserve Maj. Matt Heisel, 327th Airlift Group pilot. "Our highly skilled part-time force can quickly spin up and provide that essential manpower and capabilities when the nation calls."

With the aircrew dominating the skies, the maintenance groups kept their feet on the ground, demonstrating their quick reaction capabilities. The teams showed off their skills which are vital to the support of the aircrew mission. From fuels to maintenance on every part of the aircraft, the C-130H maintainers brought their A-game to face their active duty and reserve counterparts.

"I'm not surprised that it was a close finish," said Air Force Reserve Tech. Sgt. Jimmie McDougall, 913th Maintenance Squadron aircraft overhaul leader. "Just from the maintenance events, you can tell the Guard guys have a lot of experience, but we held our own. We'll crush them next time."



Overall, the objective of the Turkey Shoot was achieved. Each unit demonstrated their readiness capabilities and ability to adjust to a rapidly changing environment while enhancing individual Airmen's skills.

"It was a little bit of shock and awe," said Maj. Dan "MOTO" Maslowski, a 189th Operations Group navigator. "Guard and Reserve units shocked Herk Nation active duty counterparts with the awe-inspiring level of expertise our aviators and maintainers provide every day. Congrats to our ARC brethren for bringing in a strong second. We look forward to defending this win!"





ANG Federal Tuition Assistance BETA Program

DSGs (Enlisted and Officer) can now take advantage of Fed TA to pursue off-duty educational opportunities!



ANG Federal Tuition Assistance BETA Program

DSGs (Enlisted and Officer) can now take advantage of Fed TA to pursue off-duty educational opportunities!

The ANG Fed TA program will pay 100% of your tuition not to exceed:

-\$250 per semester credit hour, or

-\$166 per quarter credit hour, and

-\$3,750 maximum per fiscal year

ANG Fed TA will approve up to 124 Semester Hours (186 Quarter Hours) for an undergraduate degree and 42 Semester H (70 Quarter Hours) for a graduate degree.

The institution must be a national or regional accredited institution, recognized by the U.S. Department of Education and have a signed DoD Partnership MOU.

Request Fed TA through the Air Force Virtual Education Center no earlier than 45 days and no later than 7 days PRIOR to course start date.

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189th Airlift Wing awarded Air Force Outstanding Unit Award

Showcasing the Air Force's core value Excellence in All We Do is something the Airmen of the 189th Airlift Wing take very seriously. Recently, the wing was awarded recognition for its commitment to excellence with the Air Force Outstanding Unit award.


"Over the past two years, the wing has gone above and beyond to demonstrate our capabilities to the rest of the Guard and the Air Force," said Col. Dean Martin, 189th Airlift Wing commander. "I am extremely proud of our Guardsmen for what they've done within our wing to be honored with this achievement."

The Air Force Outstanding Unit Award is presented by the Secretary of the Air force to units that "distinguished themselves by exceptionally meritorious service or outstanding achievement that clearly sets the unit above and apart from other units," according to the Air Force's website.

Over the last two years, the wing played a crucial

role in the development and expertise of more than 300 coalition and crew members. The wing also generated more than 1,500 training sorties and executed more than 4,300 training missions, leading the way in in flying training for the Air National Guard. More than 400 expeditionary Security Forces Airmen were also deployed during this time in support of INHERENT RESOLVE, securing assets and facilities in the fight against adversaries. The 189 AW provided direct support to 100 aircraft from 18 countries involving more than 11,000 personnel during the 2018 and 2019 Northern Strike exercises, fostering and sustaining joint and coalition combat readiness.

The 189th Airlift Wing, created in 1924 as the 154th Observation Group, has received the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award 10 times. Its rich history and participation in historic world events, such as the Pueblo Crisis, Korean War and many more, exemplifies the wing's ability to remain combat ready in an ever-changing military environment.
