No furloughs for Christmas
The \$70 billion in emergency funds approved by Congress has sidestepped the need to send out furlough notices for now, but that money won't last long, the Pentagon's top official said. There will be no furlough notices sent out in the holiday season," Gates said. But, "absent timely congressional action in the new year, we will still face the risk of running out of money," Defense Secretary Robert Gates said at a news briefing.

DoD officials are analyzing the bill, all DoD received half of the \$189.3 billion. Above the \$55.7 billion needed to continue the emergency operation will provide for military pay raises, replacing training combat pay, and funds for Afghan security according to DoD.

Not, however, money needed to train troops for the full operating funds cut out again in the officials said. "I hope that next year all come and move quickly to provide the remaining funds to troops," Gates said. "My hope has been that the circumstances on the ground will continue to improve in a way that will allow a continuation of the draw downs at roughly the same pace as the first half of the year," Gates said.

That balance of the capacity of the Iraqi security forces to bear the security burden, the efforts and capacity of the provincial governments to provide services, and finally the stability of the national government - all of these things are going to have to be weighed by Ambassador (Ryan C.) Crocker and General (David H.) Petraeus ... when they make their recommendations to the president," Gates said, referring to the U.S. ambassador to Iraq and the commander of coalition forces in Iraq.

Welcome to the grinder

WASHINGTON — Why do Marines drill? There are perhaps no other services in the world more proud of their service than Marines. Just ask them.

They have their own language, sharp uniforms and snazzy commercials. Before equality became formality in the U.S. armed forces, they developed catchy slogans that clued in on how separate they viewed themselves.

"A few good men." "The few, the proud, the Marines." Marines like to look good and want everyone to take notice. Even when they walk together in groups. A civilian would call it "marching." They call it "drill."

When a Marine begins his first days at boot camp, he is taught everything all over again. As if his parents did not do a good job of teaching him to walk, talk, clothe, and feed himself, his new daddy is quick to provide instruction.

Perhaps none of the above instructions are more important than drill. At first, Marines are filed into platoon formations, looking like green eggs staked neatly in a carton. They begin to master the "box." Then they "slime" their way around the depot; a gaggle of geese ditty-bopping to the familiar sounds of their drill instructor's voice. Eventually they are taught the simpler drill movements: position of attention, saluting, left and right faces. Perhaps the most important is putting one foot in

front of the other in unison. This might sound like a hard thing to do, but when there are 50 or more people trying to be on the same page, things get complicated. Evolution of footwear is also an important step to understanding Marine drill.

General delivers message from hero's mother to Marines in Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghanistan — The assistant commandant of the Marine Corps made a quick stop at Camp Eggers yesterday and passed a message from a modern-day Marine Corps hero's family to Marines serving in and around Afghanistan's capital city.

Gen. Robert Magnus was on the move throughout the country, but made it a point to praise leathernecks here and to pass on a message from Debra Dunham, the mother of Marine Cpl. Jason L. Dunham, who received the Medal of Honor posthumously for his heroism in Iraq.

"Deb Dunham asked me to bring a simple three-part message," Magnus said.

"First, 'Thank you,'" the second-ranking Marine said.

MARINE CORPS LOGISTICS BASE ALBANY, Ga. — Cpl. Dustin Jerome Lee, a military working dog handler, was killed in Iraq during combat operations on March 21, 2007. He was 20. His canine partner, Lex, sustained multiple injuries from the mortar attack, and remained with his partner until other Marines arrived to provide medical attention. Following the incident Lex underwent 12 weeks of intensive treatment at Camp Lejeune, before he was deemed fully recovered. Several months following the incident, Lee's parents, Jerome and Rachel — avid dog lovers — began appealing to the Marine Corps for the adoption of eight-year-old Lex, even though the dog was still on active duty with the

Marines. The Lee family's request was indeed a unique one; the first of its kind. After months of prayer, mailing tons of letters and making hundreds of phone calls, the Lee family's prayers were answered. On Dec. 21, 2007, the family traveled to Marine Corps Logistics Base Albany to receive a wonderful early Christmas gift ... Lex. As hoards of local and national media outlets lined up at Marine Corps Logistics Base Albany's main gate early Friday morning, Lex was being fed his last military meal at the Marine Corps Police Department's dog kennels. Did he know that in just a few more hours he would be joining his fallen partner's family on their trip back to Mississippi the next morning? We'll never know. Lex arrived at Covella Pond with Kennel Master

Civil service employees to convert to pay for performance system

This is the ninth of a series of articles about the National Security Personnel System that will help Marine Corps supervisors and employees successfully transition to this new human resources system. NSPS is scheduled for implementation among non-bargaining unit general schedule employees at Marine Corps Base Feb. 3, 2008. NSPS is on an event driven schedule so these dates may change if events dictate.



Reassignments

The Department of Defense (DoD) established NSPS to help attract, recruit, and retain a high-quality civilian workforce environment. NSPS includes a compensation system that adapts to Department challenges in today's evolving national security environment. Managers and supervisors have greater authority, responsibility and flexibility to effectively manage DoD's civilian workforce with many new or modified compensation tools, one of which is reassignments.

NSPS lets managers and supervisors make salary adjustments upon reassignment of an employee; managers must carefully determine the most appropriate salary based on work responsibilities and a variety of other factors including labor market conditions, special requirements for a particular position, level of education or experience required for a particular position, scarcity of qualified candidates, program needs, current salaries of the candidate pool, and other criteria deemed appropriate to make pay decisions.

Reassignments in NSPS

When an employee moves to a position or set of duties in the same pay band or a "comparable" pay band on a temporary or permanent basis, the move is a reassignment. In a comparable pay band, the work performed in the new position entails the same level of work as the current assignment (e.g., entry/developmental level, journey level, or expert level).

- Reassignments can occur within or across the varying pay schedules and career groups in NSPS, regardless of the earning potential of the pay band.
- Reassignments give employees the opportunity to perform different types of work assignments that may provide career development opportunities.
- NSPS gives management the opportunity to provide employees with a salary increase of up to 5 percent on reassignment
- Reassignment compensation is a managerial flexibility in NSPS and is not a requirement. Supervisors must carefully bal-

ance the needs of the organization, budget restrictions, and other pay-setting factors before deciding whether to compensate an employee for a reassignment and prior to determining the amount of pay.

- Criteria used in some organizations to govern the use of the reassignment increase include: (1) the position must be critical to the mission; (2) the position must be hard-to-fill based on previous recruitment efforts; or (3) the employee must possess critical skills that are not prevalent in the organization, can be applied immediately, and cannot be obtained in the absence of a reassignment pay increase.

With reassignments, pay cannot be set less than the minimum or greater than the maximum of the pay band to which the employee is reassigned.

An employee-initiated reassignment occurs when an employee applies and is selected for a position in the same pay band or in a comparable pay band. The supervisor may grant a discretionary base salary increase of up to 5 percent. The use of this flexibility to grant a salary increase must be consistent with local or Component-level policies.

The employee in NSPS can have several employee-initiated reassignments and receive associated increases, as long as the increases do not exceed 5 percent in a 12-month period.

For example, an employee may reassign in April and receive a 2 percent base salary increase. In September of the same year, the employee may reassign again and receive a 3 percent base salary increase.

An employee's base salary can also remain the same upon an employee-initiated reassignment, or it may be decreased in any amount agreed to by the employee, provided the reduction does not result in the employee's base salary being set below the minimum rate of the assigned pay band.

Management-directed reassignments are actions initiated by management to laterally move an employee to another position in the same or comparable pay band within the organization or between organizations. These actions typically occur when an employee's skills can be better utilized in another equivalent position.

With a management-directed

reassignment, the employee may receive a discretionary base salary increase of up to 5 percent for an employee-initiated reassignment that is directed by management. There is no limit on the number of times an employee can receive a management-directed reassignment. An employee's base salary can also remain the same upon a management-directed reassignment, but it may be decreased.

Involuntary Reassignment

When an employee is involuntarily reassigned to the same or comparable pay band through adverse action procedures, the base salary may be reduced by up to 10 percent, provided the reduction does not result in the employee's base salary falling below the minimum rate of the assigned pay band.

How can an employee working in NSPS benefit from employee-initiated reassignment?

The broad pay bands under NSPS cover a wide range of responsibilities. Within a pay band, an employee's salary may progress based on varying levels of employee responsibility, performance, knowledge, and ability. Taking on a new assignment or changing positions within the same pay band may increase opportunities to make contributions to the organization and help employees develop a different set of competencies that may be used to seek a promotion in the future. With a reassignment, the supervisor may grant an increase of up to 5 percent in base salary. The use of this flexibility to grant a salary increase must be consistent with local or Component-level policies.

In NSPS, supervisors have the flexibility to align individual work with organizational goals, providing employees with increased opportunity to expand skill sets and develop new competencies. With management-directed reassignments, supervisors can exercise this flexibility and may be able to provide reassigned employees with salary increases, when local or Component-level policies permit.

It is important to consider the financial implications of management-directed reassignments because the percentage of increase (up to 5 percent for each reassignment) is attached to the employee's base salary. The supervisor is responsible for ensuring that the budget can sustain the base salary increase over time.

New Year's resolution: keeping safety a top priority

As the New Year approaches, it's a good time to reflect on the success of your safety program during the past year. Was safety a top priority for everyone in your organization? Did you manage to meet objectives, or do you perhaps need to undertake some new initiatives in 2008?

Hunt down and eliminate hazards: One initiative that you might consider is to turn the spotlight on workplace hazards. For example:

- Take a second look at the layout and condition of work areas.
- Examine tools and equipment to make sure they are safe for employees to use (and review maintenance schedules to make sure they stay that way).
- Observe the way employees work (you might be surprised at how many unsafe behaviors you observe).
- Check to make sure that appropriate personal protective equipment (in good condition) is readily available to all employees.
- Identify potential fire, chemical, electrical, and other hazards throughout your facility and take action to eliminate these risks.

Emphasize training: Employee training is probably the most important aspect of any safety program.

- Check OSHA standards for training requirements (many regulations have very specific requirements).
- Make sure training sessions are

interactive and provide plenty of opportunities for questions and discussion.

- Take advantage of available technology to enhance and expand training options.
- Provide lots of demonstrations and hands-on experience during training sessions.
- Don't forget to provide training for supervisors and managers, too (especially when new regulations, policies, equipment, processes, etc., are introduced).

Encourage employee participation: If employees at all levels in the organization are actively involved in promoting workplace safety, your safety initiatives for 2008 are much more likely to achieve objectives and improve overall safety;

- Encourage employees to make suggestions about how to improve workplace safety and then be sure to give their suggestions serious consideration!
- Involve employees in problem-solving when challenging safety and health issues arise.
- Rely on safety committees composed of employees from all levels and functions to identify hazards, investigate accidents, and promote

safe work habits among your workforce.

- Promote the OSHA Voluntary Protection Program initiatives within your unit.

Why It Matters...

- The Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that there were more than 4 million nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses reported in 2005 (the most recent year for which statistics are currently available).
- Almost 1.3 million of those cases involved days away from work.
- Also in 2005, 5,702 employees died because of work-related injuries and illnesses.

Recognize and reward safe behavior: Finally, don't forget to show your gratitude for the efforts employees and supervisors are making to create a safer workplace. Use recognition and reward programs to reinforce safe behavior and positive safety attitudes. Talk up safety at every opportunity. Let employees know that their safety is your top priority this year, and ask them to join you in making it their top priority as well.

As Marines, sailors and civil servants we live by our ethos. So think before you jeopardize the safety of yourself, your fellow Marines, sailors, civilian employees or family.

Motor Transport Platoon trains for combat

FORT BRAGG, N.C. — The Marine Corps is a force in readiness. To always be ready, Marines must train realistically and successfully at all times. Marines with Motor Transport Platoon, Headquarters and Service Company, 1st Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, participated in a counter improvised explosive device operations scenario here Dec. 9. The scenario was part of a 10-day urban training exercise to prepare for an upcoming deployment in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. A convoy left and returned to the staging area

at a nearby range. The platoon swept the surrounding area for IED activity and radioed them in. The purpose of the training is to teach new Marines platoon tactics, techniques and procedures when a convoy is hit by an IED, said Sgt. Donovan Dukes, the motor transport platoon sergeant. "We have a young platoon right now, so we have to start fresh and show them the basics," Dukes said. The scenario followed a building block approach. The convoy hit of three checkpoints on the route. At checkpoint four, a role player placed an IED in a location so the Marines could see it. Marines called the Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team and swept the area for any other devices. Dukes said it was important for him to see how the Marines reacted and

what mistakes they made. "I would rather make a mistake here and be able to fix it than make a mistake in [Iraq]," Dukes said. At checkpoint five, the convoy was hit twice by separate IEDs, which allowed the platoon commander to evaluate the Marines on how efficiently they called in casualties and secured the area. The exercise also gave corpsmen an opportunity to train. Seaman Brian Andrade, a hospital corpsman with the Battalion, evaluated the casualties and informed the platoon of the critically injured. Just past checkpoint five, Dukes detonated an IED to take the convoy by surprise. "The purpose of the training was to bring that human element and unexpected

Marines build house-clearing foundations

FORT BRAGG, N.C. — Marines with 2nd Platoon, Company B, 1st Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, participated in predeployment training here Dec. 4.

As part of this 10-day training exercise, the platoon practiced patrolling, urban assaults and house clearing to prepare for the upcoming deployment in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

"House clearing is an essential part of the fight," said 2nd Lt. Thomas Vallely IV, 2nd platoon commander. "Today's wars are fought in an urban environment and it is important that Marines know the proper tactics, techniques and procedures when in that environment."

House clearing is a vital tactic for the Marines serving in combat environments. "Marines patrol the streets, and if anything happens we have to be able to successfully make entry into a building and clear it," said Cpl. Randall White, 1st squad leader.

Marines practiced basic room clearing, with concentration on squad cohesiveness. The training is broken down step by step in order to build a foundation for the Marines, said White.

"It is important to train as a squad," White said. "It's your

and your squad out there, so everyone has to be on the ball and work well together." Marines applied clearing a single room to a three-story house as a platoon. Each squad in the platoon had the mission of clearing and securing one floor of the

house. First squad secured the bottom floor followed by second and third squads assaulting up the stairs. People screaming, dogs barking, babies crying and other sounds Marines might hear in a real situation were played through speak-

ers piped into the building to create a realistic environment. Vallely said this serves as a simulated distraction for the Marines and teaches them to tune out those distractions and focus on the mission. Aggressors throughout the building also created a realistic feel.

"The job of the aggressors is to give Marines the real life feeling of handling a detainee," Lance Cpl. Joshua Dubois, squad automatic rifleman with 2nd Platoon, said. "It gives us an idea of what we'll run into with the language barriers."

Dubois said having role players gives Marines the hands-on experience they need for Iraq. He said training would not be effective if Marines had to imagine an aggressor in the house.

The worse case scenarios were presented during training. Vallely said the training is designed to be as stressful as possible to train Marines to overcome confusion in war. "If Marines train hard here, they will perform during an actual mission," he said. "You have to know what's going to happen and be prepared for the worst," White said.

The only way to know what might happen while on patrol is to train for the worst, White said. Poor performance during training will only breed poor performance in the fight.

To help make the Marines' performance as flawless as possible, video cameras recorded the training. This allows leaders to make corrections accurately and develop the best course of action when Marines experience an attack in Iraq. The platoon commander and squad leaders watched the replay of the Marines' actions during a debriefing for a detailed look into what they were doing right and wrong.

"I can't be everywhere during the scenarios, but if I can go back and review my Marines' performance, we can fix any mistakes," said White. It is hard for a squad leader to nit pick every mistake during the exercise. The video cameras allow for a more precise understanding of mistakes made, said White. "We get to see the Marines in action and see what they are doing wrong," said Vallely. "It allows them to see what they are doing wrong and correct it."

mentally important.

"I want your family to someday feel as comfortable as they felt on Sept. 10, 2001," he added.

"The third part of the message is, 'Please take care of each other,'" the general said. "That's exactly what Corporal Dunham was doing when he was on his mission."

The general briefly spoke about Dunham's heroic act in saving the lives of his fellow Marines in Iraq when he covered a grenade, which ultimately cost him his life.

Magnus told the Marines that he recognized the difficulty in being away from family during the holidays, but told them that it is good to be with their Marine Corps family as an alternative.

"This is a great time to be a warrior and a Marine," he said. "You are God's gift to your family. ... The Marine Corps is God's gift to the United States ... and to the Afghan people and the Iraqi people."

He also reminded the Marines that it is important for them to consider serving an additional combat tour, or staying in

the Marine Corps longer, as well as to encourage young Marines to do the same.

"Your Marine Corps is at war. Your buddies are at war," Magnus said. "You know why you're here now. You're here to help these people win back their neighborhoods and so we don't have another 9/11, and you know that."

"This mission is not over by a long shot, and you know that," the general added.

Marine travels with Old Glory

OT A.P. HILL, Va. American flag holds special meaning to Cpl. Brandon Hawke, embarkation chief, Headquarters and Service Company, 3rd Battalion, 6th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force. The flag means so much to him that he is continuing his goal of carrying his stars and stripes around the world. He carried his flag as a boarding bum in Breckinridge, Colorado, in 2000. "I joined the Corps in 2002 and I've been everywhere since," Hawke said. He took the flag to the United States during training stages as a Marine. His first duty station was Okinawa, Japan, where he had the opportunity to travel with his colors. Although it doesn't hang atop a flagpole on every expedition, Hawke said he always unpacks the flag from his belongings, unfurls it and thinks back on the places he's been and where he'll eventually take it. "My flag hangs by my rack like it always does," he said. "After seeing so many countries and cultures, I'm constantly reminded of the love for my own. I take pride in being an American. That flag reminds me of that no matter where I am." His ties to Old Glory probably grew stronger this year during a festival in Colorado Springs, when he took action after spectators alerted him of a flag hanging upside down above a local bank's 10-story rooftop.

Marines increase security with Iraqi police training

HABBANIYAH, IRAQ — "You are policemen, you must protect the people," said Sgt. Wayne T. Twaddell, the chief instructor of provincial security forces training for Headquarters and Support Company. "You are the future of your country." Marines with 1st Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment, Regimental Combat Team 6, began the first of two 8-day, 80-hour training courses for Iraqi provincial security personnel here, Dec. 18. This single course prepared approximately 60 Iraqis for the Iraqi Police Academy and certified them as security personnel under the Iraqi ministry of the interior. The same 80-hour training schedule is also being conducted by Company A Marines who are handling two classes themselves, bringing the total number of classes trained by 1st Bn., 1st Marines, to four. "The goal of the class is to provide basically trained Iraqis who are prepared to attend the IP Academy and will be a legitimate police asset when assigned to a station during their waiting period," said Twaddell, a 29-year-old Eureka, Calif., native. "I think it's great, it should be the main focus for all coalition forces working in Iraq, Iraqis securing Iraq." The training will teach the Iraqis vehicle and personnel searches, weapons handling, report filing and police ethics and morals, all skills that will be required during their careers. Although the men must still attend the IP Academy, this may not happen immediately after the course, said 2nd Lt. Russell E. Bennett, the officer in charge of training. "They sign an agreement that they will attend the Iraqi Police academy on Camp Habbaniyah at its first availability," said Bennett. "Until then, they receive a minimum pay grade and work at

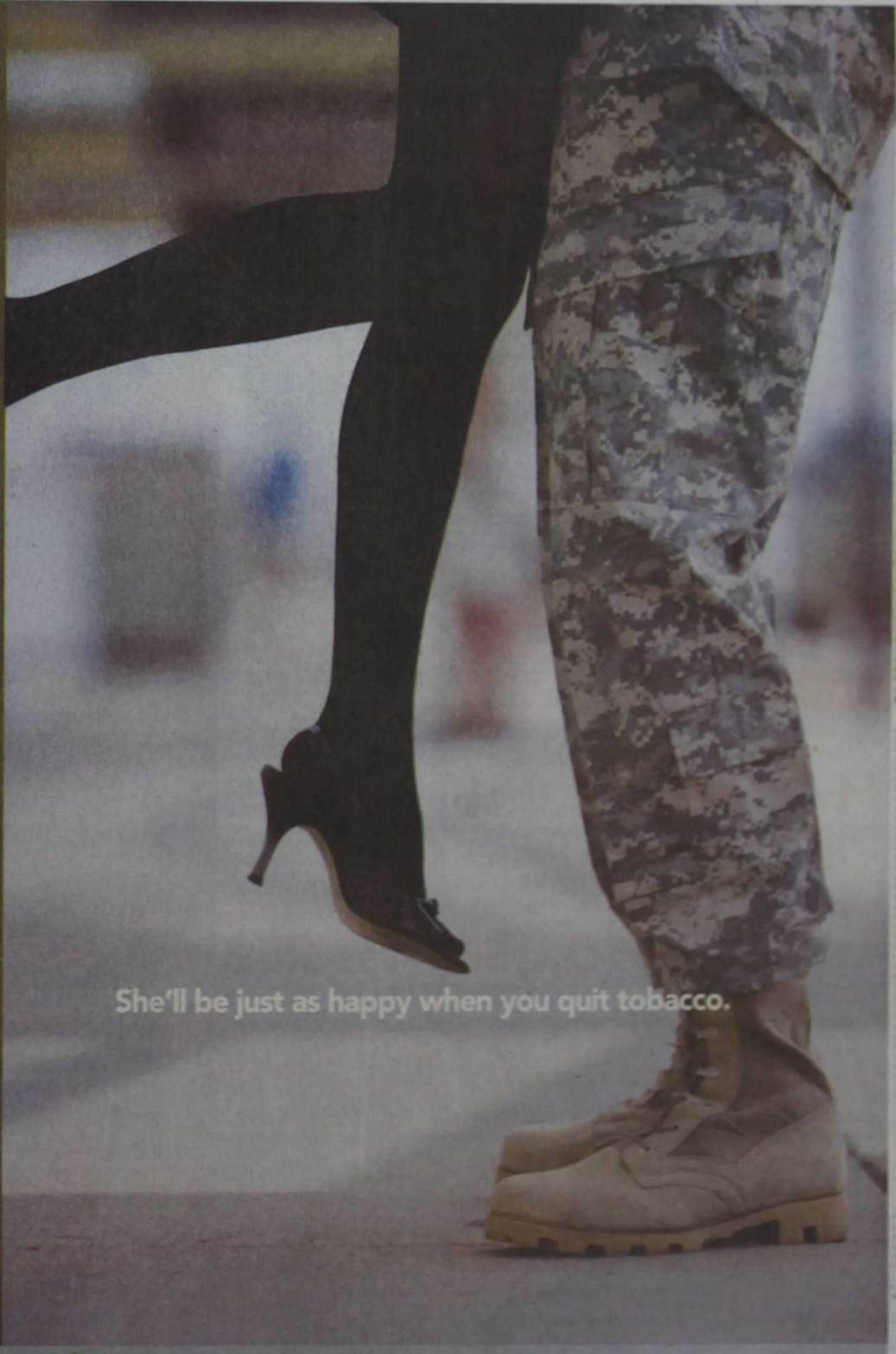
a local IP station until they are able to attend the course. They're not just going to have a uniform and carry a weapon, they will be serving the community, they will be legitimate policemen." According to Twaddell, the course puts them on the right track to becoming Iraqi Police with solid training. To Cpl. Derrick N. Yazzie, the operations noncommissioned officer in charge for Headquarters and Support Company, it's also an interesting experience for him personally. "I teach them vehicle searches, patrolling, basic marksmanship and also weapons safety rules and maintenance to prepare them for the range," said the 22-year-old, Thorsena, N.M., native. "I enjoy this because it makes me feel like I'm doing something to actually help Iraq." But that isn't the only reason he enjoys the training, said the 2003 Thorsena High School graduate. "It's also good to learn other cultures, how they grew up and their religion compared to mine," said Yazzie. "I'm 100 percent Navajo. My culture is the Navajo tradition and religion. I can read and write my language fluently. We pray to Mother Earth, Father sky and also God. They pray to Allah and must wash their feet and hands before prayer. Today, I noticed that they washed before they came to God. We all have different rules and that's just one more thing I've learned out here. I enjoy the training and the knowledge I can pass off to them and they pass to me. It's an important step." Yazzie and his fellow instructors all feel that the training is vital for continued positive progression and they all enjoy it for different reasons. "I enjoy it also, but my big thing is [1st Bn., 1st Marines] does an outstanding job of securing the AO. What really

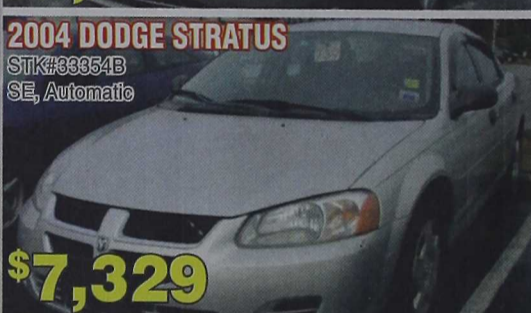
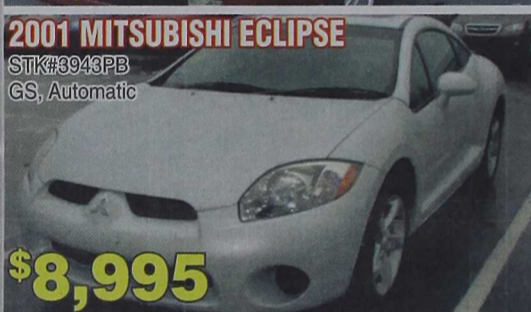
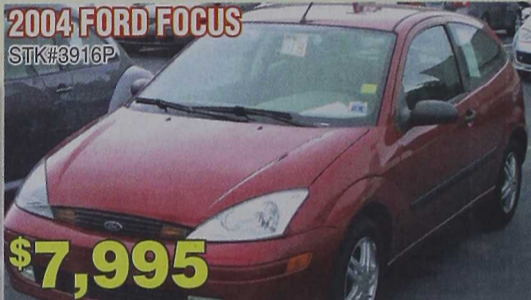

Marines are first required to wear sneakers with their camouflaged utilities. Here the basic drill movements are repeated until Marine have a fair understanding of what are basic drill movements. Their pant legs are rolled down and cuffed like a kindergartner wearing his older brother's jeans.

But then they are issued combat boots. This is like handing a drummer a set of really good sticks. They roll their trousers over their boots and blouse them with green elastic cords. Now the young Marines have reached a new goal. Now the Marines are expected to bring what drill instructors call "thunder."

After long days under the grueling heat and sand fleas of Parris Island the sound of roaring jet engines of the nearby airport of San Diego, the recruits have grasped the understanding of drill. While they

might not be masters, they do gain confidence and discipline through a memorized routine.

What the Marines like to call "instant obedience to orders."

It is through drill that Marines at any rank can go back to the basics. A junior Marine leading a platoon formation is something to be admired in the Corps when a senior Marine is expected.

Drill is used as confidence builder in this instance. Much like civilians with a fear of public speaking, putting a young Marine in front of a platoon of his peers can be slightly uncomfortable. They mumble or stutter their commands, lose focus, and generally do a bad job. Any resemblance of the confident Marine on the boot camp grinder is gone. After some remedial instruction, and egging on by the drilees, the young Marine gains confidence. Soon, he's barking orders and singing cadence like a hard-nosed, barrel-chested, square-jawed drill instructor. Like a Marine.

Capt. Mike Reynolds soon after that last MCLB Albany meal, ready to greet the dozens of cameras waiting to zoom in on the canine for audiences around the world. "It's not every day that a dog gets this much attention," Col. C.N. Haliday, MCLB Albany commanding officer, quipped as he addressed the audience after the reading of the dog's retirement certificate, "but today, it is very fitting ... fitting because Lex shared a special bond with Corporal Dustin Lee of Quitman, Mississippi. A unique bond shared only between a military working dog and his handler." Haliday, who signed Lex's paperwork for the dog's transfer from active duty to retirement

and then adoption by the Lee family, shared some heartfelt comments at the ceremony.

"This day is really not just about Lex, is it?" the colonel asked. "I don't think we all would be here - the cameras, the reporters - if it were just about Lex, a good and faithful military dog. It is really about honoring a fallen Marine and the family he leaves behind."

"Through this adoption, we not only want to bring honor to the memory of Corporal Lee, but we want to bring honor to his family gathered here in front of you ... a family who deserves our fullest respect and admiration for their son's brave service," Haliday said.

Following Haliday's comments, Lee's father - Jerome - spoke briefly to the audience and thanked the colonel, the commandant and the Marine Corps for honoring his family's request to take Lex home with them. "My children," he said, "will (now) have a part of Dustin to play with." As Jerome Lee addressed the solemn crowd, his wife - Rachel - was unable to hold back her emotions knowing that her family was finally being honored with the last piece of her son's life. Several members in the audience brushed back tears as well.

"This is a spiritual connection," Rachel said, referring to her family being able to adopt Lex. "Dustin would be proud," she added. Cpl. Lee first teamed with his faithful partner Lex in 2006. The two quickly developed a close bond.

"Dustin loved his dogs," Jerome Lee said. "He spent as much time as he could to try to train the dogs as best he could."

"A lot of the Marines that I've talked to who were in

Iraq with Dustin told me that wherever you saw Dustin, you saw Lex," he added.

His wife Rachel added, "Since we can't have Dustin for Christmas, besides spiritually, we can have his best friend ... his companion."

Lex will be joining the Lees and other dogs the family owns, including Doenja, a retired Belgian Malinois who was Dustin's first military working dog partner. The family is very experienced with raising, training and handling dogs. After the ceremony, the Lees and Lex posed for additional camera shots and

the family provided extensive interviews. Then, they got some well deserved rest before their departure - Saturday morning.

The Lees and Lex departed MCLB Albany at 7:45 a.m. Saturday with special escorts by six Patriot Guard Riders and a number of Dougherty County Police cars. Marine officials report that his playful and affectionate nature will serve him well on his new domestic mission - becoming the family pet of his fallen partner. Merry Christmas, Lee family - enjoy Lex!

matters is how well these guys can hold the AO," said Twaddell. "The more confident they are in their capabilities, the more they are willing to be aggressive against the insurgency and the calmer the AO will become. With these guys securing the area, there won't be a need for coalition forces."

"Using this course, we try to get as many Iraqis properly trained before we have to turnover with the next unit, so we don't just drop this program on their doorstep," said Bennett. "But the main reason, is because the area warrants it. There is no need for a heavy handed control anymore, it's about policing now and this training is another important step in the process."

The training has been a success for both the Americans and Iraqis, said Ahmed K. Mater, a 42-year-old, Jazeera, Iraq, native, who is taking part in the training.

element to the scenario," said Sgt. Samuel Williams, a logistics chief with the battalion who played the role of an insurgent.

Williams said the enemy is always looking for new ways to attack and the element of surprise is their greatest asset.

At the final checkpoint, the convoy was hit again by another IED. The insurgent responsible for the attacks was spotted at this checkpoint. All the same procedures applied, but now Marines were responsible for apprehending a role player. The platoon commander evaluated the Marines on handling the role player.

"This is something that forces Marines to deal with the things that are inconvenient as far as taking casualties or detainees," Williams said. The training was successful and overall the platoon did an outstanding job, Dukes said.

"A few guys made mistakes here and there, but that's the way you're going to learn," Dukes said. "We have a lot of new Marines coming from school and they did outstanding. They're a bunch of hard-charging devil dogs."

Dukes said after the Marines identified their mistakes, they adjusted and increased their proficiency.

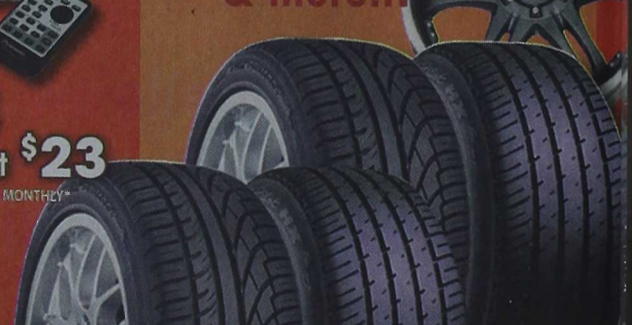

Hook Line & SINKER



Hook Line & Sinker

I know I wrote a couple of weeks ago that the "Hook, Line and Sinker" column wouldn't be back until the middle of January, but enough is happening in the angling world to warrant an update.

I must attribute the following information to Richard Ehrenkauser, a.k.a. Dr. Bogus, who stayed local during the holidays while your faithful scribe saw fit to bug out to the mountains of North Carolina for a little rest and relaxation.

There are still red drum and speckled trout back in the creeks, where they will remain throughout the winter. How well they will bite depends greatly on recent weather developments and, most-importantly, the water temperature. If you can find water in the mid-50s, you're in business. Just remember, these

fish are not doing a whole lot of eating this time of year. Their metabolisms have slowed to allow them to survive through the lean months, therefore, your bait and lure presentations must slow down as well.

Plastic shrimp and grubs, small swimming plugs and live baits when you can find them will all work. Keep your retrieve speeds to the bare minimum — just bump it along as slow as you can stand it and hope for the best.

Currently, there are trout to be caught around the local creeks and ocean piers — some weighing as much as four pounds and that's a nice trout at any time of the year. Trout and drum are also active around the Cape Lookout Jetty and the Emerald Isle high rise bridge, so don't give up.

One angler who hasn't given up (and for good reason) is Gary Mohorn of Emerald Isle. Recently, the intrepid fisherman decided to dig up a few sand fleas and see if anything was biting at the Bogue Inlet Fishing Pier. Mohorn was rewarded with a pair of nice sea mullet, one of which weighed just over a pound and the other just shy of two pounds.

If you have the financial means to do it, the charter boats have had good luck on giant bluefin tuna over the past week. Several dozen of the 200-400 pound

fish were caught by the fleet just offshore.

Winter is a great time to catch up on the latest and greatest in fishing techniques and gear. The Saltwater Sportsman Magazine 2008 National Seminar Series is scheduled to visit the New Bern Convention Center Saturday. Register by calling 1-800-448-7360.

If you can't find a way to improve your skills with list of off-season classes like that, then I hope you're content with pinfish and crabs.

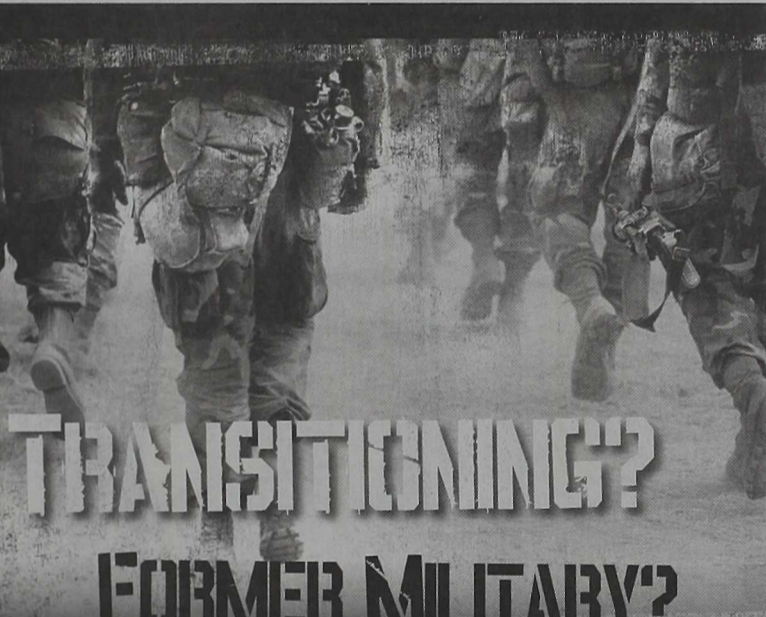

Start the New Year with proper running program geared toward health

The "heart" of running season is over and Semper Fit's Grand Prix series has concluded another successful year. As we reflect on our 2007 running accomplishments, plan a competitive 2008 or look forward to just shedding a few extra holiday pounds, I'd like to discuss the all too common statement that "running is bad for the body."

It is so commonly used, many people actually believe it. Interestingly, the last time I heard it was from an obese man smoking a cigarette. I get discouraged by this statement because it can be damaging to an activity that, when performed correctly and safely, is one of the most efficient and effective weight loss and weight maintenance strategies. It can be therapeutic for the mind and the body, and you can't beat the cost!

The argument made by running naysayers is that the constant pounding of running creates too much stress on the major joints of the body such as the ankles, knees, hips and back. The truth is, obesity wreaks more havoc on joints than running does and research shows that running does not affect your joint health negatively. In fact, it probably helps prevent bone and joint injuries by keeping body weight down and muscles, ligaments, and tendons strong. Running so reduces the risk of cardiovascular disease, the No. 1 killer of Americans.

Obviously, to ensure safety, you must run with correct form, in safe places, with appropriate lighting or reflective gear and follow a well-planned program at your skill level. A good program will fluctuate in its intensity so that the body doesn't have to "go full speed" all year. For non-competitive runners, a few months of reduced running intensity between several months of high intensity

training is warranted. Here are some more tips to help make running a staple in your active lifestyle for as long as you choose to:

Proper sneakers

The other day a Marine asked me if sneakers make a difference in running. He had had the same sneakers since middle school! My answer was, "do tires and shocks make a difference on a car?" Sneakers and socks are the only equipment essential to running. Replace sneakers every 300-500 miles. A sneaker's sole will wear out long before its shell looks damaged. Get into a habit of changing running sneakers every 3-6 months. Use the lower recommendation if you are an avid runner or a Clydesdale (weighing more than 180 pounds). Go to the main exchange or a local running store to get appropriate shoes for you. You should be choosing running sneakers appropriate for your gait, landing zone (place where your sneakers wear down first), arch of your foot and body weight. Keep in mind that style and price shouldn't be a factor. And a higher price doesn't mean it's the best sneaker for you. What should you do with your used running shoes? Graduate them to lawn-mowing specialists, "kick-around-the-house" shoes or donate them to less-fortunate runners. Many running stores and running events collect "like new" running sneakers for charity.

Soft ground

Soft ground will allow for more shock absorption, much like appropriate sneakers will. Try to run laps around a field or do some trail running for a percentage of your weekly mileage to help reduce some pavement-pounding.

Recovery nutrition

I can write a book on this subject alone, so in a few words, be sure that you are eating something immediately after your run. Too many Marines and sailors ignore their post-exercise meal and miss a great opportunity to quickly repair broken down muscle tissue and replenish glycogen stores (stored carbohy-

drate used as fuel during running). Low fat chocolate milk or soy milk is a great post-run drink. The sugar will replenish glycogen while the casein and whey protein will help repair your muscles.

Proper rest and active rest days

Running is great, but more is not better. Just like weight training or any other exercise, you need to allow for rest after your run and get plenty of sleep at night. Optimal sleep is seven to nine hours each night. The more active you are, the more sleep you need. The sleep will help promote recovery and prevent the immune system from breaking down. Active rest days are also great for athletes. Try walking, bicycling, elliptical training, rowing or swimming.

Stretching

Most discomfort from running can be healed or prevented by stretching. Take 15-20 minutes after each run to stretch all the muscles of your body. In addition to your post-run stretching, perform some light stretching while watching TV or sitting at your desk.

Strength training

Weights, resistance bands and body weight are all going to help strengthen muscles and prevent imbalances created by running. Strength training will even help your running directly by increasing the muscles' efficiency so don't be afraid of strength training.

WALK-RUN

Trademarked by former Olympian and running guru, Jeff Galloway, adding short walk breaks can actually improve your times and recovery process. Yes, I know two people very well who improved their running times significantly by walking; my brother and I! While walking every mile I reduced my half-marathon time by over seven minutes and my brother, Bill, walked every four minutes to improve his marathon time by 15 minutes. Walk breaks are frowned upon by many inexperienced runners. I used to be one of them, but adding walk breaks is

a wise choice for the endurance runner who would like to run forever.

Start slowly and progress slowly

Adding mileage too quickly will break you down. If you plan on running longer distances such as the Marine Corps half or full marathons, talk to a Semper Fit personal trainer about helping create an appropriate running program for you. A good rule of thumb is to add no more than a half-mile to each week of running. As you increase your weekly mileage up to 15-20 miles per week, you can begin to add about a mile a week to your weekly mileage. Be smart and listen to your body.

Don't run through injury

Although there is going to be some discomfort associated with strength and speed training, pain is not weakness leaving the body. Real pain is a signal from your body that something is wrong. Stop running and have a doctor check it out. Most injuries, when caught early, can be healed with some rest, ice, compression and elevation. If you try to push through pain, you'll find yourself sidelined for a lot longer or worse, in need of surgery.

I don't "plug" books too often, but if you're like me and can't imagine your life without running, you may want to read the book *Run Until You're 100*, written by Jeff Galloway. Jeff is a former Olympian who has worked with more than 200,000 average people in training for specific goals and is the inventor of the Galloway WALK-RUN method which helps many runners improve their running efficacy while preventing injury. Running, like all sports, carries a potential risk for injury, but done right it can help prevent dozens of diseases and provide miles of unique experiences. Galloway states it best in his book when he writes, "if exercise was a controlled medication, it would be the most heavily prescribed on record."

Fallujah organizes soccer league

FALLUJAH, Iraq — Fallujah citizens gathered in large numbers to kick off the "Fallujah Cup" soccer tournament here, Dec. 14.

Soccer, a favorite sport among Iraqis, was chosen as the first organized sporting event the city would embrace as a result of improved security in the area.

"This is kind of a microcosm of everything that is going well right here in Fallujah, and this is a culminating event," said Gregory Collins, the platoon commander of 2nd Platoon, Company K, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, Regimental Combat Team 6.

Collins initiated the request to bring the community together through the sport. He helped facilitate the organization of the tournament and helped obtain uniforms that were donated to the participating teams.

The amateur league welcomed soccer players of all ages to try out for the teams. Soccer players throughout the city signed up and were organized into 21 teams to compete. Each team represented one of the 10 districts of Fallujah.

The event began with an opening ceremony presenting all 21 teams to the field and an exhibition of Fallujah's tae kwon do martial arts program.

Competition began with two of the best teams facing off for an entertaining game opener.

More than 70 invitations were handed out to special guests for seating in the VIP tent for the event. Among those invited were commanding officers and Marines with 3rd Bn., 5th Marines. Also invited were the city's mayor, police chiefs and the sheiks, mukhtars and Imams from the surrounding areas.

"They wanted us here just to be able to see how well things are progressing here in Fallujah," said Collins. "They're very proud of everything they've accomplished because of the security increase. Everything that is going on is all built through the Iraqi police and through the local leadership taking hold of the city."

Preparations for the tournament began with local contractors who brought in heavy equipment to remove all extra rubble to clear the fields and locals were paid to help rid the fields of the trash.

A town hall meeting was held a week prior to the event to bring the teams together to collect official rosters and coordinate on

the FIFA (Fédération Internationale de Football Association) rules the tournament would follow.

Brothers transition from football field to battlefield

RAMADI, Iraq — Some Marines in the infantry claim those they work the closest with as family; even further their brothers. Two assault men with Fox Company in Ramadi have not only the birth certificates, but also the DNA to prove in fact they are brothers.

Fraternal twins, Lance Cpls Brad and Scott Stys, assault men, Fox Company, 2nd Battalion 8th Marine Regiment coin the term "brothers-in-arms." The 22-year olds are just two of the many Marines supporting Operation Iraqi Freedom and conducting daily infantry operations.

After attending college for two years at Rowan University in New Jersey the brothers decided college wasn't for them at that time. They then visited their local recruiter's office with one goal in mind — to become infantry Marines.

"We just knew it was the right thing to do at the time," said Brad. "Our grandfather was a Marine in the South Pacific during World War II and our father was in the 101st Airborne during Vietnam. We were just brought up that way; we knew we were Marines long before we even joined."

Before the brothers decided to fight together they played together. Natives of Hunterdon County, New Jersey, both were starting wide receivers while in college and say they compare much about football with the Marine Corps.

"We'll talk about it a lot," said Scott. "How similar being a football player is to being an infantry Marine. Just like in football if everyone does their job it all comes together as a whole. That goes for an individual in a squad to the platoon and all they way up."

Although both the brothers belong to Fox Company, Brad and Scott perform very different jobs. Brad, a member of the jump platoon serves as part of the personal security detachment for the company commander.

"I'm a turret gunner in the lead vehicle with Fox Company jump," said Brad. "We run the mobile patrols [and] go on foot patrols with the company commander."

Scott who works with a group of Marines embedded with Iraqi Police describes his day's routine a little differently.

"We do a lot of security patrols and make sure the people in our area are safe and are doing ok," said Scott. "Aside from that, we also provide the quick reaction force for our area and stand post protecting where we live."

Prior to the deployment not everyone knew just how many Stys there really were in Fox Company.

"Before coming to Iraq we would have people come up to one of us, kinda confused, and say they just saw us on third deck in uniform and shortly after on first deck with PT gear," Scott said. "I guess they just thought we changed really fast," added Brad.

For the company, welcoming a set of twins was something most were familiar with. The addition of the Stys brothers

ensured this was the third deployment in a row Fox Company would embark on with a set of twins in its ranks.

"I could tell these Marines were leaders from the first day I met them, when I picked them up from the School of Infantry," said 1st Sgt. Robert Williamson, first sergeant, Fox Company, 2nd Battalion 8th Marine Regiment.

Williamson, who remembers his first set of twins in the company, says the toughest part about dealing with twins is wanting to keep them together, but at the same time keeping them apart.

"There was an incident last year with the previous set of twins I had when one of them got shot," said Williamson. "You just never know what's going to happen and in this case in showed it was beneficial to have had them separated."

The separation of the twins isn't just to prevent damage control when things go bad. Williamson said aside from the leadership they bring to the company they also evoke a competitive side in everyone.

"One of the best things about these guys is they're very competitive," said Williamson. "They make everyone want to compete; to be the best. Whether it's the brothers competing to see who the better of the two is, or their squads competing to see who can get the job done better, they bring that level of competition."

Making a good impression for anyone who's new to an infantry unit can be hard, but both the brothers seem to have figured it out.

"They're both outstanding Marines," added Williamson. "Brad is on the commanding officers mobile, and he's the guy we feel comfortable riding in his truck knowing that he's doing his job. Scott not only was put up for company Marine of the month, but is also filling in as the Corporal of the Guard a month into his first deployment. These

Marines are telling guys on their second deployment to themselves."

As for made up minds; Williamson isn't the only one sure of the Stys' future after this deployment. Both the brothers have both short term and long term goals in the making.

Although the Stys' don't plan on making a career out of the Marine Corps they said they'll never forget the time the Corps has taught them.

"One of the greatest things about the Marine Corps is the leadership," said Scott. "You get to see a lot of different leadership styles and from that point pick and choose which ones you like as you mold yourself as a leader."

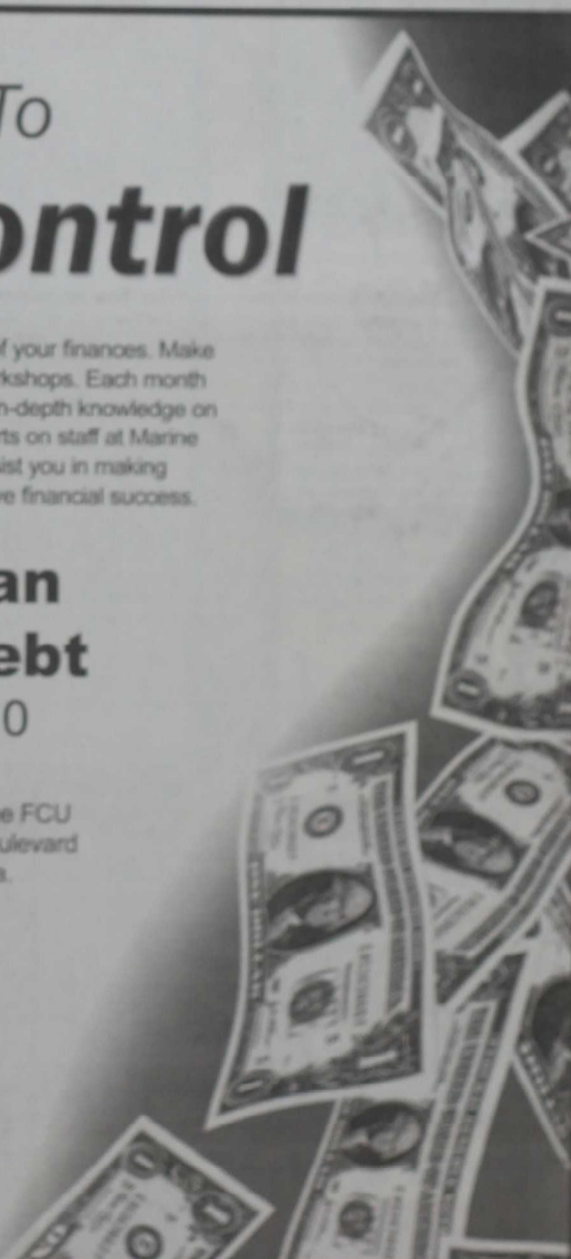

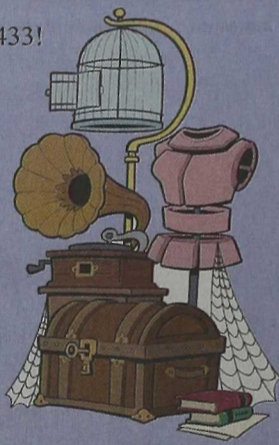

Career spans four decades

In December 1966 Camp Lejeune welcomed a civilian Marine who would go on to serve almost half of the commanding officers ever to lead it. Now, after 42 years, seven months, three weeks, five days and eight hours, Don W. Collins, assistant chief of staff Manpower, Marine Corps Installations East, has retired.

When he started, his first position was Accounts Maintenance Clerk, the job only paid \$4,776 annually, Collins remarked. However, he noted, "Gas was 29 cents back then."

It didn't take him long to move up the ladder. In 1967, Collins accepted the position of Supervisory Cash Clerk. From there, he was promoted to Management Analyst Trainee, where he acquired extensive training. That experience led him to participate in the Army Management Engineering Training program. This course would set the foundation for his many accomplishments to come.

About nine years later, Collins joined the Assistant Chief of Staff, Manpower as a Manpower and Position Management Specialist. There he distinguished himself by developing local procedures and determining standards for the Manpower Utilization Program.

In May 1983 he received a promotion to Deputy, Assistant Chief of Staff, Manpower. Just five years later, Collins was tapped to be Assistant Chief of Staff, Manpower.

During his tenure, he was directly responsible for opening Camp Lejeune's first Joint Reception Center. In addition to facilitating Marines and sailors checking into Lejeune, the JRC provides services to military retirees, civilian employees and contractors. The center allows service members to complete 90 percent of the check-in process at one location. Shortly after the center's opening in 2003, a study revealed centralizing this process saved each Marine approximately 88 miles in travel.

Collins also consolidated the New Join Brief. Because of his efforts, representatives from Marine Corps Community Services, TRICARE and Installa-

tion Safety and Security now routinely attend these briefs, which are mandatory for new joins.

Other accomplishments during his career include oversight of the reorganization of the Provost Marshal Offices throughout MCIEAST. This effort will eliminate the need for Fleet Assistance Program Marines in garrison and replaces them with civilian law enforcement officers returning military police to the operating forces.

Aside from these impressive accomplishments, Collins said he felt negotiating was his favorite part of his job. "It is interesting how you can get people to make the right decisions. That is what it is all about. Every-

one walks away happy."

Keeping everyone happy doesn't always work out however, as Collins learned while trying to please both Gen. Donald R. Gardner Commanding General, MCB, Lejeune (1988) and his wife. Gardner would chide Collins about his beard, while Collins' wife wanted him to keep it. To their complete surprise and laughter, one day Collins showed up to work with half of his face clean shaven and the other half still bearded. That is the type of friendly working environment he has experienced throughout his career, he said.

"The Marines and the civilians have a partnership," said Collins. "I have a remarkable, professional staff.

My accomplishments reflect the work of my staff."

The new retiree humbly explained he is really just a fix-it guy, and when he gets bogged down in the trenches he enjoys turning the wrench on his collection of classic cars. "You know when you just get to the point where you want to go out and whip something," he says, "I whip cars."

With a long impressive civilian Marine career behind him, this fix-it guy isn't likely to slow down. Whether volunteering with Rolling Thunder, a non-profit biker volunteer club, or working with his church, this Onslow County icon will be an influential presence in the community for years to come.

Marines with U.S. Marine Corps Forces Special Operations Command teamed up with Air Force Special Operations Command and U.S. Army Fire Support Officers to hone basic and advanced skills in joint terminal air control close air support here, Dec. 12 and 13.

During an exercise at Observation Post 5, Marines with 2nd Marine Special Operations Battalion and Marine Special Operations Support Group acquired CAS targets with representatives from AFSOC and the Army on hand to develop skills to U.S. Special Operations Command standards.

"As MARSOC gets more proficient in their SOCOM mission sets, we can be here to help," said one Army fire support officer. "It's good to see how SOCOM is standardizing training requirements throughout its component commands."

The main purpose of the exercise was to prepare MARSOC Marines for JTAC school.

"We're not all JTAC's here," said Sgt. William Stowe, radio operator, fire control platoon, MSOSG. "We all want to be JTAC's though, and this training will get us closer to our goal."

Marines also became familiar with targeting equipment used by special operations forces during CAS operations. When a target was chosen, Marines used laser designators to direct fire from two AH-1 Cobra attack helicopters circling the range. Minutes after targets were marked by the laser, the helicopters closed in to destroy the targets with rockets and gunfire.

Supervisors assessed the performance of each Marine and experienced JTAC's took every opportunity to teach advanced skills.

"This is a good experience having the other services here," said Stowe. "It will just make us even more prepared for when we head to JTAC school."

The training included both day and night firing, and by the end of the second day, the representatives from the Army and AFSOC were pleased with what they saw.

"The Marines have really impressed me with how they have taken to SOCOM," said the Army fire support officer. "We are out here to share our knowledge with them and build a lasting partnership between services in the special [operations] forces."

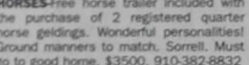

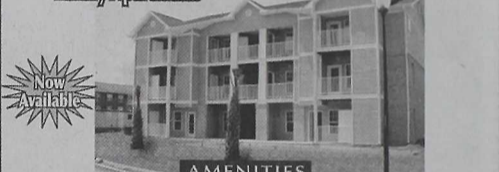

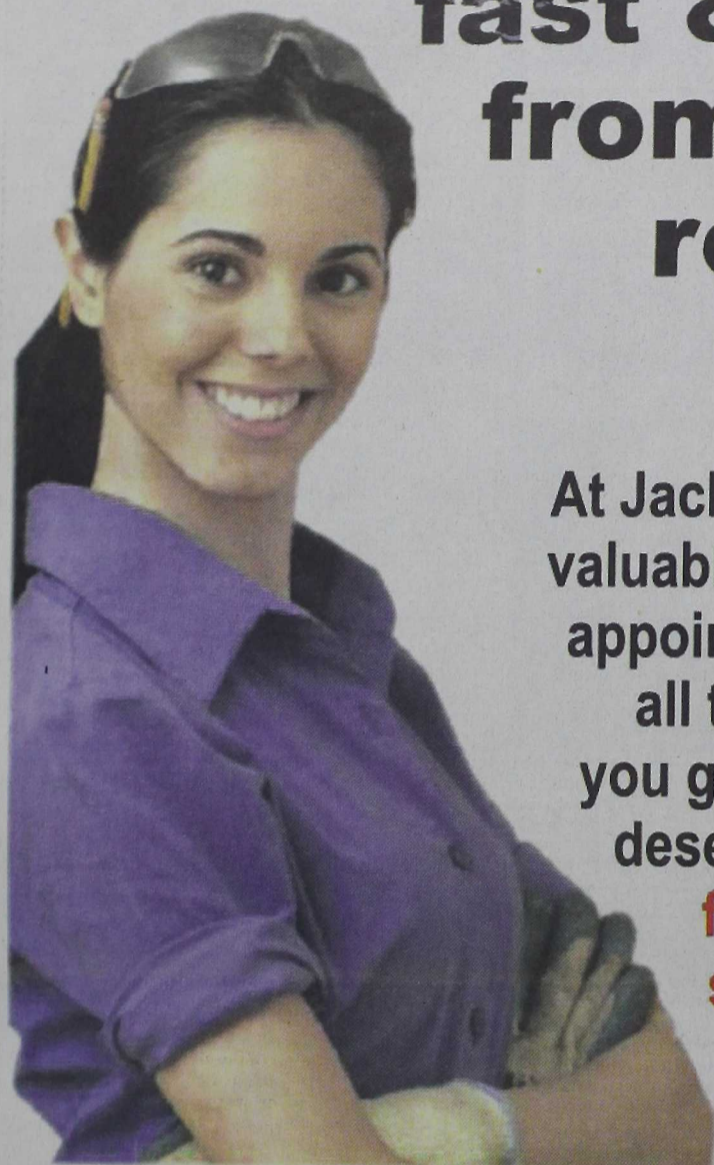

Utility meets couture

Marine spouse harnesses MBA to build business opportunities for self, others

"My philosophy is 'what is good for one, is good for many,'" said Roxanne Reed, a local business owner and Marine spouse, "and that philosophy has helped other businesses as well as our own. The part of this business that has pulled at my heartstrings the most is that we've helped other spouses increase their businesses."

Reed, who holds a masters in business administration in e-commerce and business systems, founded the All Fired Up candle company in April 2001. "All Fired Up started literally in my kitchen. I had just come out of college and I was having trouble finding work down here at Lejeune. So I decided to step out on a limb and start my own company," said Reed.

Since then, she has moved from Camp Lejeune to other duty stations and back and had three stores in the local area. "The whole concept of All Fired Up would be that all of our products would be designed by military wives for military families and all of our products, including Jane Wayne Gear has followed suit with that philosophy," said Reed.

About every two to three years, Reed starts a new branch to her business. When she went to a Jane Wayne day with her husband's reconnaissance group back in 2003, she started seeing incorporating military gear as a new possibility for her enterprise.

"I was a real big tomboy as a kid. My dad was in the Marine Corps, and I was always going through his duffle bag," said Reed. "I have literally been in gear all my life."

Reed embraces the obstacles that she has faced in starting her business. "I see being a military family as an opportunity to not only have a fun and adventurous lifestyle but to be a unique business owner," said Reed, adding, "It has helped me reach the global market much faster for the mere fact that our customer base literally changes every two years."

Since starting her business, Reed has employed more than 60 military-spouse contractors to help market her lines around the world. She spends a great deal of time mentoring other women, mostly military family members, to start and grow their businesses.

"We get a lot of accolades for being an enterprising entrepreneur," said Reed, adding, "We hope that other wives will be inspired by seeing what we've done and let them know that you can start a business as an active-duty spouse."



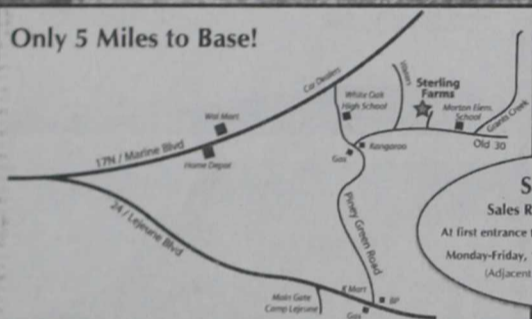

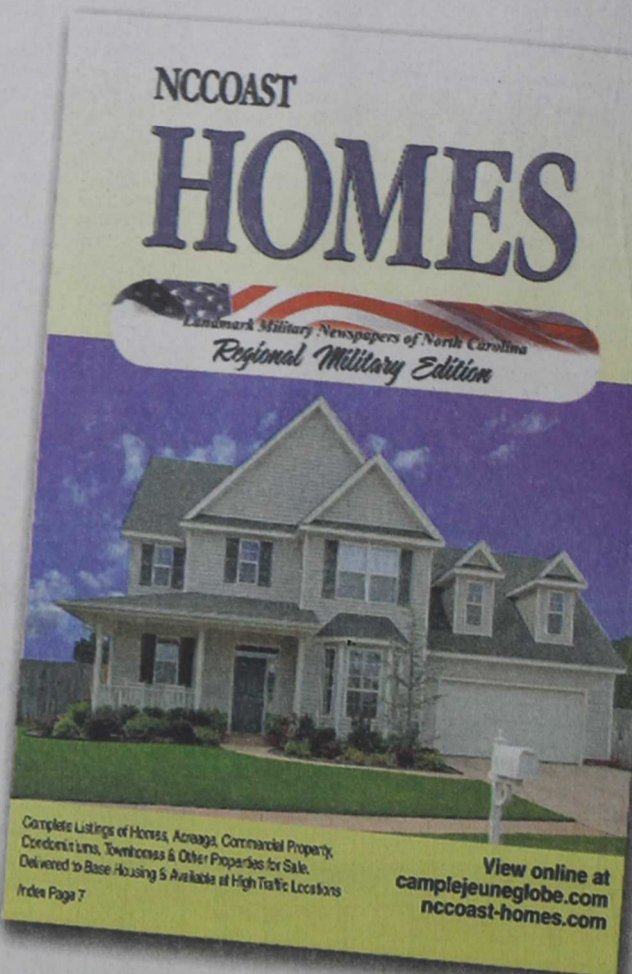

Employee receives Molly Pitcher Award

There is something about an individual who loves what they do for a living. The passion which such an individual possesses for his/her job seems to grant them special powers of creativity and an unlimited supply of enthusiasm which almost seems contagious.

These are the kinds of employees that Marine Corps Community Services looks to recruit into its leadership ranks.

It is indeed a difficult task to describe such an MCCS employee without mentioning the name Jolyne Agramonte. Throughout the 6th Marine Regiment, 2nd Tank Battalion, 10th Marine Regiment, 2nd Light Armored Reconnaissance Battalion and the 9th Marines, name rings bells. Among the leadership of those units Agramonte brings to mind such words as diligence, creativity, dedication and resilience. It's a name which is rarely heard outside of phrases such as, "Good job, excellent work, well done, congratulations and outstanding."

If searching for this name aboard Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, you will often find her in the company sentences describing the successful completion of a difficult assignment. Furthermore, Agramonte was recently sounded by Col. Douglas Thomas, commanding officer of the 10th Marines, during the annual St. Barbara's Day ceremony held at the Officers' Club aboard Camp Lejeune. It was at this esteemed ceremony when Agramonte received the Molly Pitcher Award for her noteworthy contributions to the 10th Marine Regiment.

The Molly Pitcher Award is usually reserved for Ma-

rine spouses who render support and assistance to the artillery community above and beyond any reasonable expectation. If you paid attention in boot camp you may remember learning about Mary Hays McCaully, otherwise known as Molly Pitcher, and her courage at the battle of Monmouth during the American Revolution on June 28, 1778. It was during this battle that Molly Pitcher scurried across the battlefield bringing pitcher after pitcher of cool spring water to the exhausted and thirsty soldiers. Cannons roared and ammunition ripped through the air, tossing it aside with the fierce sounds of battle, but this did not faze Molly. She continued to assist the patriots, and even manned (or womaned) the gun that her brave-but-wounded husband was too injured to fire himself. These actions earned Molly Pitcher the respect of Gen. George Washington who issued her a warrant as a noncommissioned officer.

Artillery units everywhere honor her display of sacrifice and dedication on the part of artillery unit spouses. Though Agramonte is not the spouse of an artilleryman, her service to the 10th Marines could not be ignored. "I was very surprised to get this award. I'm honored to have received it considering the legend from which this award was fashioned. I absolutely love my job, so to me it, doesn't feel like I'm going above and beyond the call of duty it just seems like I'm doing more of what I enjoy doing, serving the Marine Corps Community," said Agramonte, area 4/5 coordinator.

Within humble service lie the seeds of greatness. One only needs to mention the name Agramonte in the 10th Marine Regiment area to realize its truth.

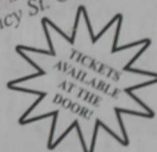
