




 $2^{020}$  began much like any year in the 21st century for the Wisconsin National Guard.

#### MARCH 15: Initial COVID-19 response

Twenty-nine Wisconsin residents aboard the Grand Princess cruise ship that docked at the Port of Oakland in California March 9 were safely transported to Volk Field Air National Guard Base at Camp Douglas, Wis., late March 15, where Wisconsin National Guard Soldiers and Airmen were waiting to transport them back to their homes for self-quarantine.

At 4:18 a.m. March 16, the 29 Wisconsin passengers from the Grand Princess cruise ship were safely returned to their homes. Two passengers chose to remain in quarantine in Texas under the custody of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HSS), citing personal reasons. State officials continue to work with HHS to return home the seven Wisconsin passengers who remain in HHS custody in California. ### **Preparing for a pandemic**

Approximately 350 Wisconsin National Guard members were called to state active dury in March to train for their role in the state's response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Initial Guard support to local officials included providing medical specialists to augment staff at senior residences, as well as work at voluntary self-isolation facilities in Milwaukee and Madison, Wis. The Wisconsin National Guard also worked at a Department of Health Services warehouse to distribute personal protective equipment. Guard members also trained to safely collect specimen samples at COVID testing sites.

## **Fighting misinformation**

Shortly after Gov. Tony Evers declared a health emergency March 12, making the Wisconsin National Guard available to assist local authorities in the state's response to COVID-19, false information about the Guard's true mission began to spread.

The Wisconsin National Guard responded with a public information campaign on social media to address rumors and false information in real time. The Wisconsin National Guard also began posting weekly updates on its activities across the state supporting the COVID-19 response effort.





#### **Poll positions, spring**

The COVID-19 pandemic led many polling station volunteers deciding to stay home during the spring elections. In a first for Wisconsin, more than 2.400 Wisconsin National Guard members were called to state active duty in April to be trained to work polling places in the counties where they lived. Approximately 250 were called to state duty to assist with the 7th Congressional District special election in May. Guard members performed their polling station duties in civilian attire.







#### In memory

Retired Maj. Gen. Albert Wilkening, Wisconsin's adjutant general from 2002-07, died April 8, 2020 after a long fight with cancer.

Wilkening commanded the Wisconsin National Guard during some of its most active and trying days early in the Global War on Terror. He was serving as the deputy adjutant general for Air when he was thrust into duty on Sept. 11, 2001 because the adjutant general at that time, Maj. Gen. James Blaney, was undergoing scheduled surgery.

Wilkening has been credited with developing the framework for managing deployments, as well as the state's protocols for when Wisconsin service members lost their lives serving overseas. He also served as Wisconsin's homeland security advisor and chairman of the governor's Homeland Security Council.

After retiring from the military, Wilkening was active with the Wisconsin chapter of the Employer Support for the Guard and Reserve. He remained an ardent backer of the Wisconsin National Guard.

"I've watched this organization grow and grow and become more and more of the benchmark organization it is today," he said in 2019. "There is no finer organization than the Wisconsin National Guard — Army and Air."

#### **APRL 15:** 115th Fighter Wing catches the Lightning

After a three-year process, Secretary of the Air Force Barbara Barrett signed the record of decision selecting the 115th Fighter Wing as the next location to receive a fleet of F-35A Lightning II aircraft to replace its aging F-16 jets.

"The Department of the Air Force selected the 115th Fighter Wing and the 187th Fighter Wing as the next Air National Guard locations to receive the F-35A," Barrett said. "Putting F-35s at these two bases continues our transition into the next generation of air superiority."

The United States Air Force in 2017 selected the 115th Fighter Wing and Truax Field as one of its two preferred candidate bases, out of five originally considered for the next two F-35A bases. The Air Force's basing criteria included mission requirements such as weather, airspace and training range availability, capacity requirements that focused on facility considerations, environmental requirements and cost factors.

The base will receive 18 F-35As, which will replace the current 21 primarily assigned F-16 Fighting Falcons, and the first aircraft arrival is estimated to be in 2023.



#### **JUNE 17:** Middle East medevac missions



#### AUC. 10-24 Northern Lightning

The Volk Field-based two-week joint-training exercise Northern Lightning, one of the first to take place since the COVID-19 pandemic began, involved nearly 25 units from all across the country – including Guam – and included Air Force, Army, Navy and Air National Guard assets.

Due to the pandemic, fewer aircraft and personnel were staged out of Volk Field, but the realistic combat scenarios that Northern Lightning is known for were still conducted with a force size similar to past years, with many aircraft flying directly to the military operating area from their home station. During the exercise, air crews flew 658 sorties, and off-loaded more than 870,000 gallons of jet fuel. Thousands of ground tasks were executed simultaneously. Throughout the exercise, simulated threats targeted aircraft from four different locations to replicate the fight aircraft would face with a near-peer adversary.

# AUC. 24 SEPT. 72 Kenosha civil support mission

The Wisconsin National Guard supported local authorities in Kenosha for two weeks following civl unrest there.

Approximately 125 troops arrived in the city Aug. 24 to serve in a supporting role to local civil authorities and to help preserve public safety and the rights of individuals to demonstrate peacefully. The number of troops doubled Aug. 25 to 250 and then to 500 Aug. 26 in conjunction with local requests received from Kenosha.

On Aug. 26, Gov. Tony Evers made an Emergency Management Assistance Compact request to other states to send additional National Guard military police companies to Kenosha. Michigan, Arizona, and Alabama sent more than 700 troops collectively, and by Aug. 28, approximately 2,000 National Guard troops, including more than 1,200 Wisconsin National Guard troops, were on the ground in Kenosha assisting in public safety efforts.



#### SEPT. 11-OCT. 16: California wildfire support

The 1st Battalion, 147th Aviation Regiment sent two UH-60 Black Hawk helicopters and crews to California Sept 11 to assist with wildfire suppression efforts there. "The Wisconsinteamhas been a true value added to Joint Task Force Phoenix," said Col. David L. Hall, commander, California National Guard's 40th Combat Aviation Brigade and JTF Phoenix commanding officer. "They were recently singled out [for] their expertise and seamless integration into the firefighting team here in California. We are lucky to have them out here."




# OCT. 7-12: Wauwatosa civil support mission

#### In memory

Retired Maj. Gen. James Blaney, Wisconsin's adjutant general from 1997-2002, died Oct. 18, 2020 at the age of 82.

Blaney commanded the Wisconsin National Guard during the 9/11 terror attacks and the beginning of the Global War on Terror. He was undergoing scheduled surgery on Sept. 11, 2001.

Blaney joined the Wisconsin Army National Guard as an enlisted Soldier in 1960 and served nearly 42 years when he retired in 2002. He was a Spc. 4 with Headquarters Troop, 2nd Recon Squadron, 105th Cavalry during the Berlin Crisis (below center), serving on active duty at Fort Lewis, Washington. He commissioned as an armor officer in 1963 after completing officer candidate school at the Wisconsin Military Academy, and changed branches to infantry in 1971.

Blaney was the last Wisconsin Army National Guard officer to serve as Wisconsin's adjutant general.

"His whole life was the National Guard," said his wife Ramona Kane-Blaney. "He loved what he did and all the people he served with."

Capt. Durwood "Hawk" Jones, a pilot with the 115th Flghter Wing, died in an F-16 crash in Michigan's Upper Peninsula Dec. 8.

He is survived by his wife and two children. Capt. Jones joined the Air National Guard in 2011 and graduated from F-16 basic qualification training in 2015. He is a decorated combat veteran, deploying as a part of a United States Pacific Command Theater Support Package to Japan in 2015 and to Korea in 2017.
