USS Emory S. Land's crest was designed with the assistance of the U.S. Army Department of Heraldry. The field of the shield, with its blue and yellow background, suggests a chasm with a red bar serving as the bridge. The upper edge of the bar represents mountain peaks and the lower edge represents flowing water. Together, they simulate the Royal Gorge in Colorado, where Emory S. Land was born. The three stars indicate Vice Admiral Land's leadership, denote his highest rank and refer to his service in three wars. He served in the Spanish War, World War I (he was awarded the Navy Cross, represented by the cross on the collar of the sea horse) and World War II. The trident is associated with Neptune, the "Ruler of the Seas," and is symbolic of a Sailor's knowledge of the sea. The sea horse represents the submarine tender as the Navy's work horse, a theme which is further expressed in the ship's motto "OPERARIUS INDEFESSUS MARIS," which translates literally as, "Tireless Worker of the Sea." The anchor denotes seaworthiness and the atomic symbol is indicative of the ship's capability to repair nuclear powered ships.

THE STORY




Emory Scott Land, a native of Cannon City, Colorado, attended the University of Wyoming prior to his appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland. He entered the Academy as a Naval Cadet and graduated with distinction on May 21, 1902. After two years at sea, then required by law, he was commissioned an Ensign on May 2, 1904. After leaving the Academy he became a Naval architect specializing in submarine construction.


During World War I, Vice Admiral Land was assigned for duty with the Board of Devices and Plans Connected with Submarines in Warfare in May 1917; the Board of Standardization of Submarines in September 1917; the Staff of Admiral W. S. Sims, USN (Commander Naval Forces operating in European Waters) at Naval Headquarters, London, England, in July 1918; and the Allied Naval Armistice Commission. He was awarded the Navy Cross for his work on submarine design and construction and for

work in the war zone. As Chief of the Bureau of Construction and Repair from 1932 to 1937, he supervised the design and development of submarines that formed the backbone of the U.S. Submarine Fleet in World War II.

On October 1, 1932, Rear Admiral Land was designated Chief of the Bureau of Construction and Repair, and remained there until he retired from active duty on April 1, 1937. Within a month he was appointed to the newly created U.S. Maritime Commission, tasked with rehabilitating the Nation's rapidly declining merchant fleet. On February 9, 1942, following the outbreak of WWII, he was also assigned as Administrator of the War Shipping Administration. He served in the dual capacity until the ending of hostilities. During the war he directed the design, establishment and maintenance of a 6,000 vessel merchant fleet, the greatest maritime fleet in the history of the world.

LAUNCH DATE:

USS Emory S. Land (AS 39) is manned by an integrated crew of Sailors and civilian mariners under the administrative control of Commander, Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet, Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and operational control of the Commander, Task Force 74. As a forward-deployed naval force, ESL is tasked to provide expeditionary, intermediate-level maintenance and repairs, hotel services, and logistics support to deployed Guided-Missile and Fast-Attack submarines deployed in the 5th, 6th and 7th Fleet areas of operation.

ESL is one of two United States Navy submarine tenders and the lead ship in her class.

The Emory S. Land is designed, but not limited, to support Los Angeles-class fast attack submarines, and was named for Admiral Emory Scott Land (1879-1971) who is noted for his contributions to naval architecture, particularly in submarine design. She was christened and launched on May 4th, 1977. Mrs. Sarah H. Long, the wife of Adm. Robert L. J. Long, served as sponsor of the ship. ESL was officially commissioned by Congress, July 7th, 1979.

The ship provides food, electricity, water, consumables, spare parts, medical, dental, disbursing, mail, ordnance, equipment and legal services that a submarine may require. To accomplish this, the ship has a physical plant similar to that of a small town, including 53 different specialized shops.

In 2017 and 2019, ESL was awarded the Battle Efficiency "E" award for exemplary performance for an AS class ship in the Navy's submarine service.

Captain Luckett, from Banning, California, graduated with distinction from United States Naval Academy in 1994 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Naval Architecture. He is a graduate of the Joint Advanced Warfighting School, Joint Forces Staff College in Norfolk, Virginia, holding a Master's of Science Degree in Strategy and Joint Campaign Planning. He also holds a Master's of Science Degree in Leadership and Human Resource Development from the Naval Postgraduate School and a Masters of Engineering Degree in Naval Architecture and Offshore Engineering from the University of California, Berkeley.

At sea, Captain Luckett has served as a Division Officer onboard USS JEFFERSON CITY (SSN 759), home ported in San Diego, California; Engineer Officer on USS HOUSTON (SSN 713), home ported in Bremerton, Washington and Apra Harbor, Guam; and as Executive Officer of USS PENNSYLVANIA (GOLD) (SSBN 735) home ported in Bangor, Washington. He commanded USS MISSOURI (SSN 780) from April 2012 to January 2015 and USS MISSISSIPPI (SSN 782) from March to June 2015.

During his time in MISSOURI, his crew completed the ship's inaugural deployment to the US European Command (EUCOM) Theater of operations and a short-notice, surge deployment to EUCOM. The MISSOURI team earned a Meritorious Unit Commendation for these deployments and was awarded and the Submarine Squadron FOUR Battle 'E' for 2013.

Ashore, Captain Luckett has served as a Company Officer and instructor of both leadership and engineering at the Naval Academy, as an operational planner in the Future Operations Division (J-35) of United States Special Operations Command, and as senior member of the Tactical Readiness Evaluation Team for Commander, Submarine Forces, U.S. Atlantic Fleet. Most recently, he served as Deputy Commander of Task Force 69 in Naples, Italy; responsible for submarine and Theater ASW operations for Sixth Fleet.

Captain Luckett's personal awards include the Legion of Merit, Joint Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, Joint Achievement Medal, the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal. He has deployed in support of submarine missions worldwide and has been privileged to serve alongside many skilled professionals as part of successful crews that collectively earned five Meritorious Unit Commendations, five Battle 'E's, and various other unit and campaign awards.

Commander Ritchie Taylor

A native of Albany, Georgia, Commander Ritchie Taylor enlisted in the United States Navy in July 1986. Upon completion of Basic Training and Nuclear Field "A" School, he attended Basic Enlisted Submarine School in Groton, Connecticut. After completing submarine school, Commander Taylor reported aboard the attack submarine USS Billfish (SSN 676) in January 1988. During this tour he qualified in submarines and was selected as Sailor of the Year for 1991.

Following his tour on Billfish, Commander Taylor reported to Naval Submarine Support Facility in Groton, Connecticut. There he served as the liaison between submarine commands and contracted shipyards for submarine Depot Modernization Periods from June 1992 until June 1995.

Upon returning back to sea duty, Commander Taylor reported aboard the attack submarine USS Pasadena (SSN 752) and in 1997 was the ship's Sailor of the Year. He was advanced to Chief Petty Officer in 1998, and one year later, was selected for a commission as an Ensign under the Limited Duty Officer Program. Commander Taylor served as a Machinist's Mate for thirteen years before earning a commission as a Limited Duty Officer.

After receiving his commission in 1999, he attended Limited Duty Officer/Chief Warrant Officer School in Pensacola, Florida with follow-on orders to the submarine repair tender USS Frank Cable (AS 40) homeported in Guam. During this tour he completed numerous fleet exercises supporting forward-deployed submarines.

Upon completion of this tour and returning stateside, Commander Taylor was assigned to the Naval Submarine School in Groton, Connecticut, from May 2002 until June 2005. There he served as the Electronics Division Officer until his selection as the Engineering Department Head in 2003.

Transferring to the west coast, Commander Taylor reported aboard Submarine Development Squadron FIVE, in Silverdale, Washington, from June 2005 until May 2008, he was the Quality Assurance Officer responsible for the oversight of quality maintenance practices for all Seawolf-class attack submarines, Deep Submergence Rescue efforts, and other various detachments involved in undersea research and development.

He then reported back to USS Frank Cable (AS 40) in July 2008 and served as Chief Engineer. During his tour, his department received the Engineering Excellence Award and the Red Damage Control Award for two consecutive years, a recognition not accomplished in the ship's recent history.

In August 2010, Commander Taylor once again transferred back stateside and relieved as Officer in Charge for Detachment SIERRA. In 2011, he then relieved as the Special Projects Department Head on the Submarine Development Squadron FIVE staff. He was then selected as Deputy for Undersea Research in May 2012, where he served until October 2014.

Returning back to the east coast in December 2014, Commander Taylor reported to Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, Kittery, Maine, and assumed the duties and title as Deputy Commander, Base Operations where he served until July 2018.

Transferring overseas for his third tender tour stationed in Agana, Guam, he reported onboard EMORY S LAND in September 2018 where is currently serving as the Executive Officer.

His education includes a Bachelor of Science Degree in Workforce Education and Development from Southern Illinois University Carbondale, Summa Cum Laude, and he holds a Master of Arts in Organizational Leadership from Brandman University.

His service awards include the Meritorious Service Medal (three awards), Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (five awards), Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (five awards), and various other campaign medals and ribbons.

Command Master Chief Nicholas Wallace is a native of Glenwood, Illinois, and reported to Recruit Training Command Great Lakes in June 1998. He began his career after completing Basic Enlisted Submarine School and Machinist Mate "A" School in Groton, Connecticut. His first duty assignment was on board USS PARCHE (SSN 683) in Bangor, Washington. During this tour, he qualified in submarines and completed two missions vital to national security. In March of 2001, he split tour to USS ALASKA (SSBN 732)(GOLD) and helped complete its conversion from C4 to D5 Strategic Missile System and completed several strategic deployments with them.

In May of 2004, he reported to Recruit Training Command Great Lakes, Illinois, as a Recruit Division Commander. There he trained eight divisions transforming civilians into Sailors. During this tour he completed his certification as Master Training Specialist and was also awarded the Recruit Division Commander of the Year for 2006. He was selected to Chief Petty Officer in 2007. In October 2007, Master Chief Wallace reported to Submarine Development Squadron FIVE Detachment Undersea Research and Developments in Bangor, Washington. As the Leading Mission Auxiliary Chief he deployed and completed two missions vital to national security onboard USS JIMMY CARTER (SSN 23). He was promoted to Senior Chief Petty Officer in 2010 and transferred to the USS OHIO (SSGN 726)(BLUE) as the Auxiliary Division Leading Chief. There he completed numerous SSGN deployment cycles and missions in support of Naval Special Warfare.

Upon graduating the Navy Senior Enlisted Academy and Chief of the Boat/Command Master Chief course in February 2013, he reported as the Chief of the Boat onboard USS CONNECTICUT (SSN 22). During his tour he advanced to Master Chief Petty Officer and in February of 2014 transferred to USS SEAWOLF (SSN 21) as the Chief of the Boat. Onboard SEAWOLF he completed a United States European Command deployment as well as two arctic deployments and surfacing at the North Pole. While onboard, SÉAWOLF was awarded the 2014 and 2015 Battle Efficiency "E" Award. He was selected into the Command Master Chief program in February of 2016 and transferred to TRIDENT Training Facility, Bangor, Washington. Here he was responsible for Tactical, Navigation, Engineering and Strategic Weapons training to 23 Pacific Northwest submarine crews, two aircraft carriers, and a remote learning site for Integrated Undersea Surveillance Systems. In 2018 he transferred to be the Command Master Chief of Submarine Development Squadron 5. Here he focused on the maintenance and operation of 3 assigned SEAWOLF Class attack submarines, submersibles, and the Navy's Ocean Engineering system as well as serve as the tactical development authority for SÚVs, UUVs, Undersea Acoustic Arrays, and Arctic Warfare. During this tour he was selected to serve as the Command Master Chief on USS EMORY S. LAND.

Command Master Chief Wallace is a graduate of the National Defense University Keystone Course 17-2 and is authorized to wear the Meritorious Service Medal (3 awards), Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (six awards), Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (seven awards), and various unit and campaign citations.

Senior Chief Paul James

Senior Chief James was born August 5, 1979, in Los Angeles, California. He enlisted in the Navy in September 1997 and graduated boot camp from Recruit Training Command, Great Lakes, Illinois. He attended Fireman "ATD" School in Great Lakes and reported to USS FIFE (DD 991), Yokosuka, Japan. During his tour he was assigned as a main space maintenance man and advanced to Engineman Third Class.

In October 2000, Senior Chief James reported to Naval Computer and Telecommunications Station, Naples, Italy assigned as a C4I power technician responsible for six satellite stations within the Naples area. He advanced to Engineman Second Class during his tour of duty. In December 2003, he reported to Ingleside, Texas where he attended MCM Propulsion Technician School receiving NEC 4324.

Senior Chief James then transferred to USS CARDINAL (MHC 60), Manama, Bahrain where he was assigned as a technician for Auxiliary Division. During his tour he deployed within the FIFTH Fleet AOR in support of IRAQI Freedom and MARK TIME II. He participated in initial assessment; SRA, Sea Swap, ESTSI and ESTA II aiding engineering department successfully pass ATG assessments. After a short tour, Senior Chief James reported to Coronado, San Diego where he attended Outboard Engine Mechanic School receiving NEC 4313. In November of 2004, he reported to Explosive Ordnance Mobile Unit FIVE, Santa Rita, Guam as an outboard engine technician. During his tour he served as Work Center Supervisor for the Boat Maintenance Shop until making Engineman First Class. Afterwards, he was selected to take over the duties as Chief Master-At-Arms. In September 2008, Senior Chief James transferred to USS Frank Cable (AS-40), Santa Rita, Guam where he served as Leading Petty Officer for 25D Shore Services Shop providing maintenance support to home ported and forward deployed submarines in the FIFTH and SEVENTH Fleet. In November 2011, Chief James transferred to Recruit Training Command where he received NEC 9502 (Master Instructor) and 9508 (Recruit Division Commander). He graduated Recruit Division Commander C School in April 2012 and trained 9 divisions consisting of 88 recruits each.

Senior Chief James is qualified as an Enlisted Surface Warfare Specialist, Expeditionary Warfare Specialist and certified as a Master Training Specialist. His personal awards include the Navy Commendation Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (six awards), Good Conduct Medal (five awards), National Defense Service Medal, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, NATO Medal, Navy Sea Service Deployment Ribbon (10 awards), Navy and Marine Corps Overseas Service Ribbon (10 awards), and other service and campaign medals and ribbons. Senior Chief James earned his Masters of Science Degree from Brenau University College.

MILITARY SEALIFT COMMAND

Military Sealift Command exists to support the joint warfighting across the full spectrum of military operations. Our mission is timeless and essential. Regardless of the challenge, we prevail! Working seamlessly with key partners to master the maritime and cyber domains, MSC provides on-time logistics, strategic sealift, as well as specialized missions anywhere in the world, under and condition, 24/7, 365 days a year.

During world war II, four separate government agencies-controlled sea transportation. In 1949, the Military Sea Transportation Service became the single managing agency for the Department of Defense's ocean transportation needs. The command assumed responsibility for providing sealift and ocean transportation for all military services as well as for other government agencies.

Only nine months after its creation, MSTS responded to the challenge of the Korean War. On July 6, 1950, only 11 days after the initial invasion of South Korea by communist North Korea troops, MSTS transported the 24th Infantry Division and its equipment from Japan to Pusan, South Korea, for duty.

During the Vietnam War, MSTS was renamed Military Sealift Command. Between 1965 and 1969, MSC transported nearly 54 million tons of combat equipment and supplies and nearly 8 million tons of fuel to Vietnam. MSC ships also transported troops to Vietnam. The Vietnam era marked the last use of MSC troop ships. Now, U.S. troops are primarily transported to theater by air.

Through the 1970s and 1980s, MSC provided the Department of Defense with ocean transportation in support of U.S. deterrent efforts during the Cold War years.

During the first Persian Gulf War's Operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm, MSC distinguished itself as the largest source of defense transportation of any nation involved. MSC ships delivered more than 12 million tons of wheeled and tracked vehicles, helicopters, ammunition, dry cargo, fuel and other supplies and equipment during the war. At the height of the war, MSC managed more than 230 government-owned and chartered ships.

Since Sept. 11, 2001, MSC ships have played a vital and continuing role in contingency operations around the world. As of January 2013, MSC ships have delivered more than 25.7 billion gallons of fuel and moved 126.2 million square feet of combat equipment and supplies to U.S. and coalition forces engaged in operations supporting Iraq and Afghanistan.

In addition, MSC, the Navy and several non-governmental organizations have treated hundreds of thousands of patients' onboard hospital ships deployed worldwide.
