

The original content of the photo will not be altered; however liberal adjustment will be authorized in order to achieve the photographer's vision. Any photo which does not accurately depict the originally captured subject will be

labeled photo illustration. Photos need not be strictly operational, the purpose of The Sandstorm is to tell our story through images.

The Sandstorm will feature one photo essay and one photo contest a month. The remainder of the publication will feature photos from the provinces within MND-S. Monthly photo contests will be announced in The Sandstorm and will include submissions from trained photographers, public affairs photojournalists and combat camera, as well as hobbyists and enthusiasts. The origin of photo submissions will not be taken into account when selecting photographs for publication. In short, only the best will be selected, regardless of who the photographer may be. 




(Above) The sun and a lone cloud reflect off the water of a marsh. (Right) An abandoned cargo ship sinks into the marsh.























# PHOTO WORKSHOP

ne of the things separating the Army Reserve and National Guard from the active Army is that Reserve and Guard Soldiers tend to have full time jobs outside the military.

This is no different in the realm of public affairs. Though there are truck drivers and accountants among our ranks, there are also a few professional photographers.

The photo workshops instituted by the 343rd Mobile Public Affairs Detachment


are intended to further the skills of its military photojournalists as well as its professional photographers; however, the workshops are open to anyone wishing to further their photography skills.

The subject for the first photo workshop held in May was high and low-key lighting.

Low-key photos traditionally have a single light source, creating a dark image with a black background and harsh shadows.

HIGH-KEY LIGHTING

High-key images are lit with many light sources to create a uniform lighting pattern. They are comprised of primarily light tones with relatively few mid-tones or shadows, often giving them a romantic appearance.

Though these techniques would seem to lean toward our art and portrait photographers, they also have applications in photojournalism.

Say for example you are photographing a wounded Soldier receiving aid; you would not want to shoot this in high key. Likewise, happy children shot in low key would confuse the reader.

On this, and the facing page, are two examples of finished photos from the first workshop. Anyone interested in upcoming workshops should contact the MND-S PAO office.

# PHOTO-CONTEST:

G reat portraits are often shot in the moment, when people aren't trying to look perfect for the camera.

For this photo contest, we want you to photograph people being themselves in natural settings. Try to capture the revealing expressions that are only shared between friends. The tired face of your roommate as he pours cream into his morning coffee. Or the

frustration as a co-worker struggles to finish a job.

Shooting candid portraits can be an adventure and a challenge. It's beautifully spontaneous, but anything can happen. You have to act fast to capture the moment, and make sure your subjects are relaxed enough to show who they truly are.

Take the next few weeks to shoot candid portraits of the people around you, and send us your best shot!

#### CANDID PORTRAIT TIPS

- Little mannerisms are good ways to show personal character. Smiles or unique facial expressions may be the
  feature that helps you capture your subject's personality.
- A person's interests or hobbies can enhance the personality and life of a photo. Try having the subject use or pose with personal objects that represent their interests.
- A photographer can enhance a portrait with props as long as the
  person remains the central focus, but a portrait's power can be
  lost if the subject is surrounded by too much scenery. Keep your
  subject in close.
- Most people are photo shy, making portraits a real challenge. Try
  taking candid portraits, pictures taken when they're unaware of
  the camera. Candid shots can produce portraits that catch people
  focused on an activity they enjoy.
- The position of the person is also very important. Avoid taking photos directly level to the face or profile photos that tend to give the photograph a police mug shot feel. Instead, try shooting the face from a variety of angles.
- Portrait photography doesn't always need a smiling face, especially if the smile seems fake and unnatural.
