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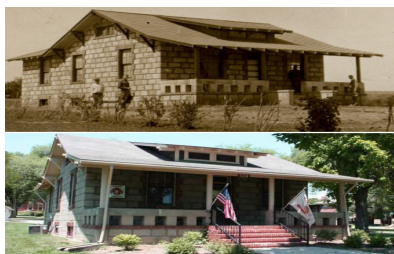
[Big Red 1 Year of Honor Opening Ceremony](#)

Four streets were renamed in honor of Medal of Honor Recipients who served in the 1st Infantry Division. The first was the road in front of the 1st Infantry Division headquarters building and was renamed in honor of Staff Sgt. David Bellavia. Quarters 524, at the intersection of Huebner and Riley Place, was built in 1925 as the residence of the post's civilian fire chief. Its Bungalow design is unique to the post and reflects the local civilian architecture of the period. It was constructed mostly of materials salvaged from Camp Funston including the concrete blocks used for the walls and foundation. It also featured wood floors and a roof made of composition shingles.
