CAMP LIBERTY, Iraq

— It's early in the morning, around 4 a.m. to be precise, and while most of the 4th Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division Soldiers are sound asleep or winding into the second half of their night shift, a special breed of Soldier is wide awake and full of energy. They are the sports fans.

"I am just so glad to watch the games, so I really didn't care what time it comes on," said Pfc. Johnny Lyon, a Lawrenceville, Ga. native, who was up early Monday morning to watch the New York Yankees and Philadelphia Phillies face off in the Major League Baseball World Series. "Baseball is my favorite"

"Baseball is my favorite sport, and I would stay

up all night to watch this World Series if I had to," said Lyon, an intelligence analyst with the Raider Brigade. "Only true fans can say that and not these bandwagon fans."

Many Soldiers decide to use facilities such as the Morale, Welfare and Recreation center, which is open 24-hours a day, to watch the World Series and other sporting events. Others purchase televisions and take advantage of the free Armed Forces Network television signals running into their housing units.

"When I got here I didn't expect to be able to watch the World Series, but now I can track it like I did back at home," said Staff Sgt. Kevin Deramus, a Bessemer, Ala. native.

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"It does help that I work at night because I am up anyways for those games." In the tactical operations center, or TOC, the brigade night battle noncommissioned officer Sgt. 1st Class Steven Burns has a con-

stant stream

of news and information passing in front of him during his 12-hour shifts. Sports scores, incidentally, are among that information.

As the World Series takes place, Burns checks out highlights and scores and

broadcasts them to fellow fans in the TOC whose duties don't allow them to watch the games live. Once baseball season is over, he said he already has his next target lined up: college football. After that he'll move onto the National Football League Super Bowl in February, college basketball's March Madness and then the National Basketball Association's playoffs in April.

By the time football season comes back around, Burns explained, he knows his tour is almost

> up and it will be time to go home to Fort Lewis, Wash.

"I know that when the World Series is over, I have just a few months left before my mid-tour leave," said Deramus, a 4th Bde., 2nd Inf. Div. imagery analyst. "Then I will have a few more months after that until I get back home to my wife."

He added that it doesn't matter who you're cheering for, Yankees or Phillies, during these World Series as long as Soldiers realize that their mission here is to do their job so that everyone can get back home to their families and to watching sports at a reasonable hour.
