# **Battery tours** French guns

"Oh hail, hail, artillery! The king of battle, follow me."

CAMP DE CANJUERS, France -Red legs from the 22d Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable) recently toured Camp De Canjuers outside Draguignan, France and observed a French self-propelled artillery unit fire during the *USS Nassau's* visit to Toulon, France.

The French 3d Regiment D'Artillerie

De Marine of the 6th Brigade Legere Blindee showed the Marines their normal operations for employing the "King of Battle." Five-ton trucks took the Marines through the steep hills of Southern France to reach the observation area. The French had four armored vehicles for artillery observation set on a ridgeline.

Before the Marines saw the French AUF1 tracked 155 mm cannon, they took a peek at the communications and coordination command trucks. The long-cab trucks towed the communications gear and maps on the truck bed. By loading all their equipment on trucks the battery is highly mobile, however, they are more easily visible to passing enemy.

The automated loading system, and maximum range of the weapon is impressive, as well as the mobility of the AUF1," said Capt Joseph Allena, Alpha Battery commanding officer.
The four AUF1's overlooked the val-

ley as they awaited their next fire mission. With the AUF1, the French have a

highly mobile, defensive weapon that possesses the capability to self-load and carry 42 high explosive, dual-purpose rounds. The self-propelled tracked vehicles were designed for firing while pro-tecting the personnel inside. That includes protection against Nuclear, Biological and Chemical attacks, small arms rounds and shrapnel.

Unlike the Marines' towed M-198 Howitzer that requires a crew of nine, the French AUF1 needs only three. Also, while Marines lay down communica-

tions wires and manually target their guns, the French have an internal positioning and orientation system in the tank connected to the automatic calculation system of the bat-

targeting. However, the range of the M-198 has the AUF1 beat by three kilometers.

The self-propelled character of the French artillery unit impressed the Marines. "It was so easy for them to pack up and go," said LCpl Nicholas Grungo of Erial, N. J., about the French regi-ment's ability to move out of position. The Marines hosted their French

brothers two days earlier on USS Nassau where the expeditionary warriors had an opportunity to show the French how to operate the M-198 as well as providing them the opportunity to see the various capabilities of the MEU.

From the heritage of both World Wars and numerous conflicts, 10th Marine Regiment, 2d Marine Division celebrated its 87th birthday here yesterday.

Shortly after its activation, a Marine artillery regiment was eeded to man seven-inch naval guns in support of an all-Marine division during Allied operations planned for Europe in 1919. The "Long Arm of Decision" answered the call.

Reorganized numerous times during the 1920s, elements of the regiment participated in expeditions in the Caribbean, Pacific, Puerto Rico and Hawaii. 10th Marines also supplied elements to guard U.S. Postal Service routes and carriers dur-

"As the only artillery regiment in existence at the creation of the Fleet Marine Force, the 10th Marines wrote the doctrine for the employment of artillery with the landing force," according to *A brief History of the 10th Marines*, by the History and Museums Division Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps.

Later, in World War II, 10th Marines participated in cam-

paigns at Guadalcanal, Tarawa, Okinawa, Saipan and Tinian. During the occupation of Japan in 1945, 10th Marines relocated to Nagasaki and then to Camp Lejeune the next year.

From here, the Long Arm of Decision was involved in the Cuban Missile Crisis in 1962 and the successful rescue

There were also more mundane, though equally important, tasks to complete, many of which took place after Marines' normal working hours. Units took turns getting predeployment medical and den-tal screenings and went to the Staff Judge Advocate's office to declare powers of attorney and write last wills and testaments. Units also updated their service record books at the Installation Personnel Administration Center. Units simulated taking care of personal business such as packing household belongings and storing vehicles. Finally, Marines formed up for their final pre-embarkation

That's a lot for several thousand Marines and Sailors to get done within a few days, but some didn't even get that much time.

Some units have to be ready to deploy within 48 hours," said

CWO Richard Ekborg, 7th Marines embarkation officer. He explained that the first, and therefore quickest responding, of the regiment's Marines during a deployment are the Surveillance, Liason and Reconnaissance Party. The SLRP team makes an initial assessment of the arrival and assembly area and assists the respective commanders and their staffs in the final evaluation of the arrival

The SLRP team, comprised of officers and enlisted Marines from throughout the regiment, took their gear and vehicles to March Air Reserve Base near Riverside April 6

The team loaded an Air Force C-141 cargo jet with two Humvees and a trailer full of all the equipment they would need to pave the way for the rest of the arriving Marines.

Once the jet was loaded, the team conducted a fly-away as if it were actually on its way to a trouble spot. However, the plane only landed in Palm Springs.

"This was good for Marines who've never deployed before, or never flown," Flores said. "Now, they know exactly what their responsibilities are.

"Everything went really well," Ekborg said, explaining that such a regiment-wide exercise tests the deployment readiness of units and the base support structure all over the Combat Center, from administration, medical, legal and personnel readiness to the base's ability to provide assistance to the deploying units. "StratMobEx stresses the units in preparation for deployment, ensuring we have the right people and equipment at the right place and time, ready for deployment at a moments notice."





'Warrior-scribe touches the soul'

### Multi-tour Lejeune Marine captured 'Nam in words

The five purple hearts probably say it all.

But Maj Ralph E. G. Sinke Jr. took up the pen several years ago to say still more – on behalf of some 60,000 patri-

otic Americans who lost their lives in the Vietnam War.
"The warrior-scribe touches the soul," read a 1985 *Marine* Corps Gazette book review of Sinke's Don't Cry For U cargo-pocket sized compilation of prose and poetry that follows a fresh young PFC through the grinder, jungle and back home again.

"Don't Cry For Us is profound in its simplicity," said the Gazette and probably will, for many Vietnam veterans, serve as an everyman's diary of time spent 'corralled by wire, sand-bags, and young men grim with guns.'"

One of the author's favorite passages, from the short story, "We Called Him 'Abe,'" speaks to the impact that a fellow Marine – a lance corporal – can have on his fellows:

"If God, in fact, made a man a little lesser than the angels, then, in the case of Lance Corporal David Nelson, He left out not much except the wings. Abe was born caring. He cared about people and he cared about everything that was honest, and decent, and true. The real measure of his loss can never be taken as he was one of those very few who,

whatever he did, and wherever he went, would have left things so much bet-

ter than he found them, just by being what he was

When I stood before the strange, new monument to that wretched, wrenching war, and found his name on a granite wall, I felt the warm wet

wash of seventeen years of unshed tears. I did not cry for Abe. I knew his troubles had long been over forever. But I cried for me, and for all those who would never know the gentle strength and goodness of the man - the enduring worth

There haven't been many gentle things in my life, but Abe

was surely one, and he touched my world forever.

Today, in the soft, shrouding mists of morning, or on the lonely road to a new duty station, I remember. And I know that I am a better man for having known and loved David Nelson, the Marine we once called 'Abe.'"

Sinke, who was a professional football running back Canada and also sings and acts, was a company commander at Camp Lejeune with 2d Recon in 1974 and with 1st Battalion, 8th Marines from 1976-78. He played water polo here (leading scorer and MVP for six consecutive years) and, while now retired in Minnesota, still admits to a soft spot in his heart for the pines of Carolina. Marines of the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit's ground combat element, Battalion Landing Team 3/6, took full advantage of the Military Operations on Urban Terrain facility during a recent workup exercise at Fort

The MOUT facility is a mock town perfect for training young Marines and refreshing vet-erans in the techniques used to perform vari-

ous missions in urban environments.

Marines how to conduct them-selves in urban warfare," said Cpl Matt D. Morgan, a team leader with BLT 3/6. 



#### Deployments

The recent 2000 National Defense Authorization Act mandates that services report how many days each service member spends deployed. The services must report to DoD, and DoD then must report to Congress. DoD officials explained they are trying to reduce the number of days service members are deployed. To keep numbers down, Congress has provided a financial disincentive. Any service member deployed more than 400 days in the previous two years will receive \$100 for each additional deployment day past 400.

#### **EP-3 Update**

Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld told reporters recently that Navy pilot Lt Shane Osborn's EP-3 surveillance plane was on autopilot and flying straight and level when a Chinese fighter jet hit him March 31.

The Chinese jet was "buzzing" the EP-3 when its tail hit the Navy aircraft's No. 1 engine propeller. At that point, the EP-3's auto pilot went off and the plane made a steep left turn and lost some 5,000 to 8,000 feet in altitude before Osborn regained control.

# Salute to the Mustangs

In the fog of battles gone they held the high ground of courage and faith that illuminated the way home with honor. Where they report they rested is unknown, but their honor is eternal, and lives to our country and corps, for so long as we remain worthy of the sacrifices of such

brave men and women - "mustangs." The term as used in the Navy and Marine Corps today refers to a commissioned or warrant officer who has risen from the enlisted ranks. It appears to have been borrowed from Naval usage although there are those who say it originally was an Army term. There is no clear-cut simply defined definition. Its usage has been descriptive and complementary in the Marine Corps, which has long been accustomed to obtaining its officers from many sources and not disparaging

as in its original Naval usage Going back to the Middle Ages, there was always a distinction between officers and men in the ranks, which amounted to a caste system. Shakespeare, in his Henry V, exemplifies this when he has a sentry hail, "Art thou officer? Or art thou base,

An early Navy expression used to refer to officers who rose from the ranks was to say they "came in at the hawse to indicate rank being achieved by an unorthodox

During the war with Mexico (1846-48) the enemy were sometimes referred to as mustangs although the reason is obscure.

In its proper sense, mus-tang refers to the wild or half wild horse of American plains, especially of Mexico and California, and was a distortion of the Spanish term "mesten-

The term was applied after the Civil War to an officer entering the U.S. Navy from the merchant navy after serving through the war. Just prior to World

War I, the officer ranks of the Navy functioned as an exclusive caste, and enlisted men, regardless of their technical accomplishments, were separate from the officers by an unbridgeable gulf. During Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels's watch, a certain number of promotions of the enlisted men of the Navy to the officer ranks was provided. However, their seniors, who called them "jackass officers" and assigned them to such jobs as the command of tugs and target scows, gave these new officers a rather "thin" time. "Jackass officers" was probably modified to "mustangs."

By 1935 the term mustang was being used in the Navy to denote former enlisted men who had worked their way up from

The tremendous expansion of all the Armed Forces during World Wars I and II with corresponding increases in the number of officers from all sources (civilian life, reserves, militia, National Guard and officer training units) did much to eliminate the prejudice against the mustangs.





# EMD receives quality award

amp Lejeune's Marine Corps Base Management -Environmental Division, Installation and Environment Department recently took top honors in three categories of the Secretary of the Navy Environmental Awards competition for fiscal year 2000.

It took first place in the Environmental Quality, Natural Resources and Recycling categories.

"The base has always been recognized as a leader for environmental stewardship," said John R. Townsen, head of Fish and Wildlife Branch, EMD. "Camp Lejeune has a lot of land and a lot of active-duty service members training, which makes it pretty special. Because of the intensive ground and amphibious training, we have a lot of issues to work on."

The Environmental Quality Assessment Division was the recipient of this year's Environmental Quality Award:

According to Douglas C. Piner, director of EQAD, the division won the award because of its proactive and innovative environmental compliance planning programs

Currently, EQAD has several initiatives in place, including air quality, safe drinking water compliance, solid waste and asbestos management.

These programs led to a 46-percent reduction in air pollutant emissions and a 50-percent reduction in solid waste, five ears earlier than required by the

Department of Defense, said Piner.
"We also developed environmental projects leading to the correction of many erosion problems by improving tank trails and restricting improper use of streams and creeks located here. It is vital that the units located at Camp Lejeune

have the environmental regulatory awareness to handle materials, waste and the environment in a responsive and compliant manner," Piner added.

Townsen, whose department won the Natural Resources Award, agreed support from units is vital to a successful environmental protection plan.

"We couldn't do our job if we didn't have the assistance of the units," said Townsen of Bogue. "We, as civilians working for the Marine Corps, admire the training units and are here to support the mission of the Marines while complying with the law."

He said the contributing factors leading to his department's award were the management plan for Red-Cockaded Woodpeckers and an aggressive quality deer management program.

Sammy D. Gwynn of Richlands, head of the Environmental Compliance Branch, said Marines help his department by properly disposing of recycled

"The Environmental Compliance Branch provides environmental and natural resource training to more than a thousand troops each year and publishes environmental information in the Base Web site and in THE GLOBE," said Piner.

"Aside from the environmental regulatory requirements imposed on Camp Lejeune by the Environmental Protection Agency and the North Carolina Department of Environment and Natural Resources, it is obviously important to protect the health and safety of the population of Camp Lejeune and preserve our natural resources for all to enjoy.

Camp Lejeune is comprised of more than 153,000 acres of land, with a fragile barrier island system separated from the mainland by marshes, small bays and the Atlantic Intracoastal Waterway. Piner said this sensitive ecosystem is protected and nurtured by the hard work of EMD.



Throughout the pre-deployment workups, SOTG also facilitated the training for Tactical Recovery Aircraft and Personnel (TRAP),

Humanitarian Assistance (which the MEU's MSSG is primarily responsible for), Non-Combatant Evacuation, Mass Casualty exercises, and boat/mechanized raids.

As intense as the training may seem from the instructor's angle, MEU personnel had to "step up to the plate" on every instance to ensure they received effective training.

According to Maj D. Flynn, MSSG 24 Executive Officer, the training at Fort A. P. Hill was the first step in properly training for deployment, as he stated in an article from a December issue of THE GLOBE.

The 24th MEU completed its Special Operations Capable Exercise (SOCEX) March 26 after five months of intensive training, giving it the title







"I was shocked! You judge yourself against your peers to make sure you are doing what you're supposed to be doing," she said, "I don't feel like I was any better than any of the other instructors. I feel very humbled by the whole thing.'

Her word of advice to instructors following in her footsteps: "What you give to the stu-dents comes from within. I didn't set out to win any titles. I just try to be the best instructor that I can be," she said.



### Hundreds of Lejeune cable customers may rate refund

Last week, Olen Criswell, general manager of Charter Communications, met with government representatives to address the concerns of Base customers. Of primary concern is the complaint that Base customers are being charged a rental fee for digital receiver cable boxes

These devices were distributed to Base customers by Charter Communications in November 2000. The receiver cable boxes

were required for customers that subscribed to "basic and expanded basic service" (channels 2-66) and "premium

service," channels such as HBO or Showtime.

In March 2001, Charter Communications upgraded its service to offer digital technology to all households and to comply with the requirements of the FCC.

As a result, as of March 1, the digital cable receivers are no longer required for customers that subscribe to basic and expanded basic service Digital cable receiver boxes are still required for customers desiring to subscribe to pay-per-view programming, commercial-free music channels, premium movie channels and the interactive program guide and remote

Customers with a digital cable box are being charged a rental fee of \$6.95 per box per month. As a result of the meetings with government representatives, customers that subscribe to basic and

expanded service and do not desire any pre mium services will be promptly credited the rental fee per box for charges incurred dur-ing March and April.

Charter representa

tives estimate this could affect approximately 1200 to 1400 customers.

The next issue addressed was the concern over high-speed Internet access available to Base customers through Charter Pipeline. Customers were promised high-speed access; however, relations between Charter Communications and Charter Pipeline, a sub-contracted entity of Charter, and the high usage by customers has caused a slower response in accessing the Internet.

"We are now approaching 97 percent capaci-ty at peak times," Criswell said, "thus accounting for the slowing down of the speed of service

MCAS BEAUFORT, S.C. - While Navy Cmdr Tom Kelley was serving his first tour as a chaplain at Parris Island, Army chaplain Capt Edwin O'Brien was giving soldiers their last rites in Vietnam. The year was 1971.
With many miles behind them and more than 30 years

later, the two former chaplains finally met.

Archbishop Edwin F. O'Brien, responsible for a ministry of 1.5 million Catholics, including all branches of the military, came to the Air Station Chapel Sunday to preside over mass

Retired Navy Chaplain Capt Kelley was invited to the mass, but was unaware that he would be awarded one of the highest accolades the ministry has. On behalf of Pope John Paul II, Archbishop O'Brien overwhelmed Kelley when he pinned the Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice medal to the chaplain's

The medal translated in English, "For Church and the Pope," was instituted by Pope Leo XIII July 17, 1888, and is bestowed on those lay persons and clergy who have given exemplary service to the Catholic Church and its head, the Pope.

"I've never done anything more than what I'm supposed to do. I don't consider myself a hero, I just do what I'm told," said a modest Kelley. "I thought it was an honor just to finally meet the Archbishop - to receive this medal, I

In the line of simply 'doing what he was told,' Kelley, a Philadelphia native, was first ordained to the priesthood June 3, 1950. During his 50 years as a priest, he served 28 years in the Navy, twenty of those years belong ing to the Marines, before retiring to Beaufort in

After hitting his golden anniversary, Kelley has no plans to slow down. He divides his time presiding over masses, and performing other priestly duties between Parris Island, the Air Station, Naval Hospital Beaufort and St. Peter's Catholic Church in Beaufort.

"After serving all those years as a priest and with the Marines, I don't know how he has made it, let alone still walking!" joked O'Brien.

"I have only God to thank for preserving my good health," said the 77-year-old Kelley. "As long as He keeps me going, I will never stop working."

"Having the Archbishop in our chapel was a great honor and a privilege. He is our shepherd and direct connection to the Pope," said Navy Cmdr Thomas Falkenthal, Air Station chaplain. "For Father Kelley, his faithful dedication and selfless service to God and country is a tremendous example of what priesthood is about."

Falkenthal had started writing up the package to award Kelley seven months ago. Every time he thought the Vatican had approved the medal, he invited Kelley to mass only to find out more time was needed.

"He (Falkenthal) told me to come to mass for something special in November, no, then January, then February, and finally on April 1," recalled Kelley. "I was beginning to think it was an April Fool's joke!

"I knew something was going on with the Archbishop, but I just thought he would say, 'I was a nice guy,' and that would be it."

In on the surprise were Kelley's brother and sister-in-law, Don and Betty from Wallingford, Pa., and his sister, Suzanne Bojanowski from Boca Raton, Fla.

"From the time he was 10, holding mass in our basement with the kids in our neighborhood, we knew Tom was born to be a priest," said Don. "We are very proud of all he has accomplished."

During Kelley's twenty years with the Marines, he served with 1st Marine Division as head Chaplain, 3d Marine Division, 1st Marine Air Wing, two tours at Parris Island and one at MCRD San Diego.

"Everyone told me bootcamp was eleven-weeks long," said Kelley, about his three tours at recruit depots, "I would tell them they were wrong, 'It's eleven

On his formula for success, Kelley offered these two pearls-of-wisdom. "Always look for the likenesses in your fellow man and not his differences, and instead of trying to demand respect, take responsibility.'

expected by customers."

In October 2000, Charter identified a need for more bandwidth, space needed to carry large amounts of data, because of unexpected growth and usage during peak times

Charter has advised government representatives that they have placed an order with Sprint for additional bandwidth capacity and that Sprint has committed to having additional bandwidth by May 16, which will increase the speed of the service

Many of the Charter Pipeline customers have taken advantage of a sixmonth promotional offer, but, while Charter works through the bandwidth capacity issue, any customer with this service can call the Charter office to request the service be disconnected without penalty.

In addition, Charter Pipeline customers will receive a \$20 credit per month for February, March and April if they subscribed to the service during

Charter communications and government representatives also addressed issues

dealing with illegally splicing cable to houses or barracks rooms. Charter stated that in some cases, they have found entire barracks illegally receiving cable. Additionally, many subscribers do not pay their final bills or return the digital cable boxes worth approximately \$500.00 after discontinuing services

According to Col Mark Goodman, Camp Lejeune's Director of Installation Security and Safety, "theft of cable ser es is a crime punishable under the UCMJ as well as in the civilian court systems.'

Individuals caught stealing cable services will be punished; good Marines don't steal things that do not belong to them, period. The illegal actions of a few Marines have caused cable rates to increase drastically for all Base customers.

The government has raised the appropriate issues and questions on behalf of the subscribers to Charter and will continue to pursue issues until they are mutually resolved.



# Crucial battle fought, wo

That winning the battle for Guadalcanal in August 1942 was crucial to the United States is an indisputable historical fact, about which a plethora of noted historians have written at length during the 50 years

The whole six months of fierce jungle fighting between the First Marine Division and the overwhelmnever-defeated Imperial Japanese Army on Guadalcanal is deserving of repeated recall, as is the critical three-day battle for Lunga Ridge, which the author and publisher of "Bloody Ridge" both claim has never before been fully told.

This book focuses in thorough detail on what might then have been called "the mother of all battles" Lunga Ridge, which was a brutal showdown between overwhelming, cocky, battle-hardened Japanese army forces and undermanned, undersupplied, but indomitable American Marines, most of whom had yet to experience the indescribable ferocity of combat.

The primary Japanese objective on Guadalcanal was to regain control of Henderson Field, the critical airstrip they were in the process of buildwhen the unbending

Taking full advantage of five decades of still-emerging sources recording the history of the battle for Guadalcanal, author Michael S. Smith, an active-duty U.S. Navy officer and life-long student of the Guadalcanal campaign, leaves no stone unturned in his meticulous search for confirmed (including some not-before-reported) data about both sides based on interviews, first-person accounts, radio intercepts, afteraction reports and diaries

He pulls no supermen; between com-

The 264-page hardcover tome contains an excellent collection of annotated tactical situation maps updated frequently as the battle progresses.

Fourteen pages are devoted to black-and-white photographs, including an aerial of Henderson Field and a classic group photo of the highranking Marine leaders. Some of those men became legendary in Corps history. Some even became Marine Corps Commandants.

Also shown are portraits of the senior commanders of elite Japanese units that challenged the Marines for control of Lunga Ridge, eventually labeled "Bloody Ridge" by the invincible leathernecks who denied it to an overconfident enemy.

During a visit to Guadalcanal, Rear Adm John S. McCain, commander of U.S. naval air forces in the Pacific, informally addressed MajGen Vandegrift and his staff "expounding convincingly" on an aspect of the campaign that the Marines had not fully appreciated.

He told the leathernecks that Guadalcanal could be a "sinkhole" for the limited Japanese air and naval Saved Guadalcana

power. If Guadalcanal was lost, McCain asserted, the Allied advances after the Coral Sea and Midway would be squandered. Holding Henderson Field, the admiral declared emphatically, was absolute-


