

Distant signal: Bravo Co., 422nd ESB lone Army Guard unit now abroad

CAMP BUEHRING, Kuwait – The number of Nevada Army Guard units deployed this winter has decreased dramatically in comparison to last winter. After five units were deployed on three continents a year ago, only the Soldiers of **Bravo Company, 422nd Expeditionary Signal Battalion** are deployed this winter.

The roughly 140 Soldiers in the Las Vegas-based unit participating in the deployment hail from Nevada, Utah, California and Arizona. For the next nine months, however, they will call Kuwait their temporary home as they facilitate communications throughout southwest Asia. (Some may move to neighboring countries in the future.) The Soldiers departed for Kuwait in September and are

supporting Operation Inherent Resolve. The Nevada unit replaced Bravo Company, 324th ESB based in Georgia.

Months into their deployment, Bravo Company Soldiers have already passed several milestones, including a restriction of movement quarantine due to the global pandemic, several training and equipment validations, and the successful transport of more than 60 pieces of stationary- and rolling-stock equipment into the region. The validation of the unit's signal equipment, including satellite communication nodes, military vehicles, resupply assets, generators and maintenance equipment, went smoothly largely due to the expertise of the 422nd Soldiers.

Many of the unit's Soldiers have specialized technical skills that are highly sought after by many units in the region, including the Combined Joint Task Force headquartered at Camp Arifjan. The 422nd will work on the behalf of many

commands across the region during the upcoming year to support nodal and extension communications.

5 units return to Silver State

Five Nevada Army Guard units recently returned to Nevada after completing their foreign missions. At the height of activity, there were more than 210 Soldiers participating in the deployments to Asia, Africa and Europe.

The **3665th Explosive Ordnance Company**, with about 30 Soldiers, returned from its year-long deployment in Afghanistan in late summer. They supported Operation Freedom's Sentinel with ordnance disposal missions and reported no serious injuries.

All 60 Soldiers who participated in two rotations of **G Company, 2/238th Aviation's** deployment to Afghanistan are home. The two rotations performed medical evacuations and personnel recovery missions. They recorded 1,811 flight hours over Afghanistan and completed 77 medical evacuation missions.

The 60 Soldiers in **B Company, 1/189th Aviation** who had been serving in Kuwait returned to Nevada in early November. The unit transported cargo and personnel throughout Central Command since last autumn in support of the 34th Expeditionary Combat Aviation Brigade.

Detachment 3, Company B, 2/641st Aviation, which has been deployed to Africa since January, also returned to Nevada in early November. The small unit maintains and operates fixed-wing aircraft.

The **757th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion** returned home just in time for the holiday season. The 70-Soldier headquarters element from the battalion spent about 10 months in Poland supporting European Command's Operation Assured Response and the Defender 2020 exercise. The 757th Soldiers managed transportation assets, maintenance and security assets at seven sites across eastern Europe.

On the horizon, the **137th Military Police Company** based in Carson City will likely be the next unit to deploy abroad. The 137th, which trains to provide law and order operations on military installations, is set to support European Command.

Air Force recognizes High Rollers with Outstanding Unit Award

RENO – The Nevada Air Guard's 152nd Airlift Wing, nicknamed the High Rollers, received the Air Force's Outstanding Unit Award last fall for the wing's performance during a historic deployment cycle overseas and assistance to federal firefighters in the western United States during 2018 and 2019.

"This recognition highlights the great work High Rollers accomplish on a daily basis here at the Reno Air National Guard Base," Col. Jacob Hammons, 152nd Airlift Wing commander, said. "I'm extremely proud of the Airmen that make up our premier tactical airlift wing. I want to thank the Air Force for recognizing them with this prestigious award."

The Outstanding Unit Award is presented by the Secretary of the Air Force to units that "distinguished themselves by exceptionally meritorious service or outstanding achievement that clearly sets the unit above and apart from similar units," according to the Air Force's website.

The 152nd Airlift Wing deployed about 300 Airmen to multiple countries in support of military operations in Southwest Asia and around the world during 2018 and 2019. It was the largest overseas deployment cycle since the unit, then called the 152nd Reconnaissance Group, deployed in support of the federal government during the Pueblo Crisis in 1968.

Additionally, the unit continued to assist the U.S. Forest Service, operating the Modular Airborne Fire Fighting System, also known as MAFFS, for large-scale, wildland firefighting.

The 152nd Airlift Wing — established in Reno in 1948 as the 192nd Fighter Squadron — has now received the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award nine times. The recognized time periods are:

New Sexual Assault Response Coordinator passionate about position, prevention

My name is Karen-Nicole (aka Nikky) Randel and I am your Joint Force Headquarters - State Sexual Assault Response Coordinator. I joined the Nevada National Guard in 2012 and served in various roles as both a traditional Soldier and military technician before beginning my role in March as the Sexual Assault Response Coordinator. I am a civilian employee during the usual work week and a captain during Army Guard drill weekends.

As the SARC, my primary responsibility is to manage and maintain the Nevada Guard's Sexual Assault Prevention and Response program. The job involves a lot of coordination and I work in lockstep with several other key Nevada Guard offices and employees, including Joint Force Headquarters' Victim Advocate Coordinator Allen Morris; 152nd Airlift Wing Sexual Assault Response Coordinator Michelle Dieters (an Air Force reserve

captain); the Provost Marshal office's staff; the Staff Judge Advocate General's staff; and all Nevada Guard unit commanders to ensure we swiftly and appropriately respond to each report of sexual assault within the Nevada National Guard.

The SAPR program is not simply a reactive program. There is a preventative side of the program in which I work with community partners, chaplains, leadership and victim advocates throughout the state to promote awareness, provide training, and educate both individuals and groups with the goal to prevent sexual violence (sexual harassment and sexual assault) from occurring. Prevention is a collaborative effort and requires the commitment of every Soldier and Airmen to end sexual violence in the Nevada National Guard.

I am very passionate about the SPAR program and welcome the opportunity to serve Nevada Soldiers and Airmen in this capacity. I envision many things to occur in the future of the program, but I'm currently extremely excited to announce the Nevada Guard is set to employ a full-time victim advocate in Las Vegas starting in January 2021. New state CSM: Everyone will receive equal consideration

YERINGTON — The extraordinary journey of the Nevada Army Guard's longest serving Soldier in history reached its conclusion just a few days before Christmas when retired Command Sgt. Maj. Don Gable, 80, was laid to rest at Valley View Cemetery in the Mason Valley. Gable served an unmatched 43 years, 7 months in the Nevada Army Guard from Sept. 29, 1956, until April 28, 2000. Gable's longevity records in the Nevada Army Guard are unlikely to be broken, as the Lovelock native surreptitiously enlisted in the National Guard at the tender age of 16 and he remained enlisted in the Nevada Guard until his mandatory retirement age of 60. Gable was both a technician and Active Guard and Reserve (AGR) full-time employee in the Nevada Guard and spent many years drilling with the cavalry troop based in Yerington. He was also the operations training sergeant for Troop Command when it was located in Hawthorne and concluded his career as the United States Property and Fiscal Office sergeant major.

Nevada Army Guard goes into overdrive to certify military vehicle licensed examiners, instructors

LAS VEGAS — The Nevada Army Guard will devote more than \$500,000 to its drivers training program this year to certify more than 300 licensed evaluators and licensed instructors.

The large expenditure should quickly pay for itself as the new evaluators and instructors establish company-level drivers training programs and increase the number of Soldiers across the state with valid military drivers licenses. The growing number of drivers will increase the use and mileage on Nevada Army Guard vehicles, which will lead to an optimized maintenance plan for the state's approximated 1,500 ground vehicles and ultimately reduce maintenance expenditures by millions of dollars.

More than 100 Soldiers became licensed instructors and evaluators in 2020. Another 200 are set to receive the training in 2021. Soldiers can receive instruction in both the Palletized Load System and the Family of Medium Tactical Vehicles.

These courses are unlike the Army's previous 'Master Driver' program.

The current classes are taught by previously qualified licensed evaluators and licensed instructors. They instruct the future LE/LI

candidates how to conduct drivers training at the company level and how to evaluate military driving tests. Ideally, each Nevada Army Guard unit will have at least one LE/LI in order to conduct drivers training at the company level.

The up front expenditure for the bolstered LE/LI training should quickly be recouped as it will improve the Logistics Directorate's (G4) ability to follow the Army's Optimizing Maintenance Plans (OMP) in non-combat operations. (The Optimizing Maintenance Plan is based on miles, not time.) With more trained drivers, the majority of the ground vehicle fleet that is currently under-utilized will be driven more, therefore making maintenance service intervals more efficient and economical.

Both maintenance and training officials agree that the wheeled fleet is experiencing unneeded servicing during non-combat operations. Nevada Guard vehicles have not been transported or driven in a combat area in more than a decade. All agree a transition to only necessary maintenance would be economical without any loss of readiness.

A recent assessment concluded that if the Army could completely transition to the OMP, it could potentially save \$47.7 million in maintenance expenditures and about 2.4 million hours in associated labor per year.

"The minimum number of miles is very realistic," said Maj. Brett Eklund, the surface

maintenance manager. "It takes just 15 miles per quarter for a vehicle to become eligible for enrollment into the Army's Optimizing Maintenance Plans program,

"That's just five miles a month. This number can easily be reached if all of our licensed drivers hop into their unit's assigned vehicles, start them up, and use them during their drills and missions."

Eklund said that roughly 80 percent of the Nevada Army Guard's vehicles are fully mission-capable, but administrative deadlines have lowered the operational readiness level to less than 50 percent strength. He said the low percentage could be attributed to the fact that more than one-third of the fleet is delinquent for current, time based, maintenance service.

The OMP portion of the equation can't be solved without a sufficient number of drivers; hence the current emphasis on this training. 1st. Sgt. Scott Berry, a senior instructor in the driver's training program said: "The drivers training is critical because it serves as the first step for the state's units to fully use their equipment with qualified drivers."

Depending on the unit's assigned, Soldiers can opt to attend either the PLS or the FMTV drivers training course.

"First, we teach students how to safely drive the vehicle platform," Berry said. "Then we teach students how to effectively communicate with each other. We will then advance to lanes training where the Soldiers bring all of their acquired skills together."

Sgt. 1st Class Christopher Mills, a motor transport operator and senior training instructor, emphasized that — most importantly — proper drivers training is essential for accident avoidance.

"About 68 percent of vehicle accidents in the Army are due to lack of training or inadequate driver training programs," Mills said. "Eventually, individual units will train on their own and practice advanced combat tasks such as convoy defense," Berry said. "We need to be ready to deploy, fight, and win."

Nevada Guard cavalry scout claims Region VII Best Warrior title

CAMP WILLIAMS, Utah — The Nevada Army Guard's customary success in the Region VII Best Warrior contest continued in August as Sgt. Sidney Romero of Alpha Troop, 1-221st Cavalry, captured the NCO division in the competition in the Beehive State that included the top Soldiers from the western United States.

With his win, Romero, 24, of Las Vegas, joins the list of recent Nevada Guard Best Warrior champions that includes 1st Lt. Julian Batz, Staff Sgt. Oswald Sanchez and Staff Sgt. Grant Reimers. Reimers recorded the top Best Warrior season in Nevada Guard history when he won the Soldier division in the National Guard's Best Warrior title and placed second in the All-Army competition in 2017.

Spc. Parsa Khawari, 21, of Las Vegas, represented the Nevada Guard in the Soldier division. Khawari is a cavalry scout in Bravo Troop, 1-221st Cavalry. Cpl. Daniel

D'Ippolito, an infantryman with the Arizona Guard, won the Soldier division. (Khawari's final placing was unknown because only the winners of the contest were announced.)

With his win, Romero advanced to the National Guard's national Best Warrior contest in Camp Shelby, Mississippi, in September to compete against other regional winners. The Army's Best Warrior Competition tests Soldiers' physical and mental abilities in a wide range of events, usually including the Army's fitness test, Warrior tasks, weapons qualification and a board appearance.

Romero and Khawari won the subdued Nevada Army Guard's state Best Warrior competition just a few weeks before the Region 7 contest and had less than three weeks to prepare for the Utah contest. Romero was in his first year of competing in Best Warrior.

"From the beginning of this competition, it was nerve-racking. Just getting prepared for the travel and competition," said Romero, who is an electrical apprentice in Local 357 in his civilian occupation. "Finally getting here and getting over that hurdle, it relaxed me.

"I was able to focus on the competition and just check off each box. I got excited to see how I could place in the competition."

All of the events in Utah occurred within a whirlwind 48 hours. The competitors began with the Army Combat Fitness Test and then

the "Mystery Event" that turned out to be swimming races in uniform. The first day concluded with a written exam and board appearance.

After an early wake-up at 1 a.m., Soldiers were transported to the night land-navigation course. After land nav, the marksmanship event began with a stress-shooting contest that included Soldiers attempting to hit targets positioned from 50 to 500 meters in a variety of shooting positions. The final event was an 11-mile ruck march.

Romero did not know if he was in first place when the events concluded, but he calculated he was among the leaders with his ruck march time of about 2 hours, 30 minutes and his time of 13:30 in the 2-mile run event of the ACFT, the fastest time of any NCO.

"I knew I was doing pretty well," Romero said. "I tried to maintain a competitive mindset. When I had a disappointing event, I would just brush it off and keep going and pushing."



NEVADA GUARDSMAN BATTLES ENEMY ON TWO FRONTS: WILDFIRES AND COVID-19



LAS VEGAS — Pfc. Cheyenne Romans of the 1864th Motor Transportation Company has thwarted attacks on multiple fronts this year.

For much of the summer, Romans, 20, of Pioche, was on the wildfire front lines in Nevada and helped extinguish the blazes that burned more than 100,000 acres. Her service to the state didn't stop when the fires were doused: She currently serves with Task Force South in the battle against the deadly coronavirus in Las Vegas. In the Nevada Army Guard, she's a motor transport operator with the 1864th.

Romans said she spent the majority of the summer alongside some of the best firefighters in the nation while employed by the Department of the Interior's Bureau of Land Management (BLM) for the 2020 fire season.

The BLM's Nevada Fire and Aviation office oversees about 48 million acres of public land in Nevada. The Silver State has the second largest Fire and Aviation program within the Bureau behind only Alaska. It has six district offices located in Las Vegas, Ely, Carson City, Winnemucca, Elko and Battle Mountain.

Out of 3,200 Soldiers, Romans is the only Nevada Guard Soldier who resides in the southeastern Nevada town of Pioche. The Old-West town serves as the county seat for Lincoln County, Nevada, and has a population of about 1,200. Romans works as an emergency medical technician for Lincoln County when not battling fires or on National Guard duty.

In June, Romans put on her firefighter gear for the first time and joined the members of the Pony Springs BLM Fire Station to battle against a series of wildfires that ravaged northern Nevada. The past summer was Romans' first season as a firefighter and she quickly learned the tricks of the trade, including how to proficiently wield a chain saw, axe and shovel.

"Once I arrived at my first fire, it was non-stop action," Romans said. "In no time, I was running the saw, learning how to dig line and working with my team."

The rookie firefighter quickly assumed a crucial role during the wildfire-fighting operations. One of her main jobs was to clear dead trees and snags. Once the trees and snags were cut down or removed, teams would dig a line around the flames and allow that specific portion of the fire to burn itself out. Often, the trees and snags were very dry and brittle and created dangerous situations.

"The trees that were in flames and severely burned are very weak," Romans said. "They are at high risk of falling and possibly injuring firefighters. You have to cut those down and control the line."

The soot, heat, and exhaustion from firefighting in the rugged northern Nevada wilderness didn't stop Romans from battling a second enemy later in the summer. Once she helped the BLM quell the wildfires in northern Nevada, she traveled south to Las Vegas and began a new fight against coronavirus.

Romans is now on the coronavirus mission for the Nevada Army Guard and is a member of the Las Vegas Strike Team, a section within Task Force South. The team has tested more than 1,000 people since she joined the team October 1. The small group is renowned for its ability to quickly support Southern Nevada Health District requests for rapid mobile testing at community based collection sites.

In September, Task Force South tested more than 25,000 people in the Las Vegas metropolitan area.

"The military has been a great experience for me," Romans said. "It's sometimes scary to be in unfamiliar territory, whether in a wildfire fight or on a coronavirus health response mission. Although I may find myself in a frightening or uncomfortable situation, my training has taught me to overcome that fear."

"That is really important to me and has helped me overcome a real obstacle in my life (conquering trepidation). I feel better prepared to face that challenge, now more than ever."

Speedway Readiness Center slingshots into operation

NORTH LAS VEGAS – The jewel in the crown of the Nevada Army Guard’s facilities inventory is open for business.

The Army Guard’s long-awaited state-of-the-art facility, the Speedway Readiness Center, opened its doors in late September. The opening of the Nevada Guard’s \$37 million southern Nevada flagship armory was marked by a ribbon-cutting ceremony attended by Gov. Steve Sisolak.

The name of the readiness center is derived from its close proximity to the Las Vegas Motor Speedway in North Las Vegas. The 71,000-square foot facility is located on Hollywood Boulevard on 18.65 acres of state land.

The new center will eventually house the 17th Sustainment Brigade, the 17th Special Troops Battalion and the 3665th Explosives Ordnance Detachment. It was built to provide a training center for the growing number of Nevada Guard Soldiers in Clark County. More than two-thirds of Nevada Army Guard
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Soldiers now reside in southern Nevada.

Construction on the facility began in 2019 the work was completed sooner than expected.

Initial estimates said the project would be done in 2021. \$35 million of the construction funds came from federal coffers and \$2 million was provided by the state. The readiness center includes administrative and accessory space, classrooms, unit lockers, and a commercial kitchen.

Adjutant General Maj. Gen. Ondra Berry was one of the Nevada Guard representatives in the ribbon-cutting ceremony.

“The southern Nevada location of the new facility gives us a chance to grow and progress,” Berry said. “This building is a sign to Las Vegas Valley citizens that the training and preparation of our force is a top priority. In addition to accommodating our current force, this facility allows the Nevada Guard to position itself for future growth as well.”

The Speedway Readiness Center meets the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Silver Rating standards in an effort to maintain the Nevada National Guard’s energy and resource efficiency. The new center is

designed for a minimum service life of 50 years, in accordance with the Department of Defense Unified Facilities Code.

Yerington Armory update

Built in 1959, the “old” Yerington Armory is set to become the “new” Yerington City Hall by early 2021.

In September, the City of Yerington announced it had acquired the armory from the National Guard at the cost of \$213,087. The two parties had negotiated the transfer of the property since April 2019.

The property sits on 4.37 acres of land and includes seven buildings. The main building is 10,400 square feet. Yerington’s previous city hall, 102 S. Main St., at was built in 1926 and had just 2,500 square feet of office space.




The 1/221st Cavalry maintained a troop in Yerington for several decades but all Nevada Army Guard cavalry troops are now based in North Las Vegas.

High Rollers act record-setting fire

SACRAMENTO, Calif. – Even in the face of a pandemic, the Nevada Air Guard completed its busiest firefighting season in history as it helped quench the 4 million acres of wildland fires that burned in the Golden State in 2020.

The 152nd Airlift Wing was activated for firefighting in July and remained on orders through October. The activation became the High Rollers' longest Modular Airborne Fire Fighting System deployment since it became the newest member of the four-unit Air Expeditionary Group in 2016. All four units fly C-130 Hercules aircraft.

Since 1976, C-130s have supported federal firefighters with MAFFS equipment that include large containers of retardant that fit into the back of the military transport aircraft and effectively turn the C-130s into air tankers capable of fighting wildland fires.

“It’s very rewarding knowing you are helping so many people,” said Tech. Sgt. Paul Teska, a MAFFS flight engineer with the 152nd and former civilian wildland firefighter. “I remember being on the ground (as a civilian firefighter), looking up, and seeing the planes dropping retardant. Being part of the MAFFS team, and contributing to firefighting in general, is a great feeling.”

During the 2020 record-setting fire season, the 152nd MAFFS team flew 113 sorties and dropped more than 310,000 gallons of retardant on fires across California. In total, the combined AEG units flew 518 sorties and dropped 1.3 million gallons of fire retardant.

“We are grateful for the High Rollers’ dedication to our nation during a time of great need,” said Lt. Gen. Kirk Pierce, the commander of the 1st Air Force (Air Forces Northern), which served as the operational lead for the MAFFS mission. “They are performing a highly-complex mission while flying very low in mountainous terrain while dealing with poor visibility from smoke and flames. Their specialized training prepares them for such challenges.”

The mission was a collaborative effort between civilian and military agencies, including the U.S. Forest Service, Cal Fire, the Department of Defense and the contracted civilian fleet.

“The support from these entities and all the groups in the Nevada Air Guard is instrumental to making the mission happen,” said Lt. Col. Erik Brown, the 152nd Maintenance Group deputy commander and MAFFS pilot.

MAFFS-equipped C-130 aircraft units provide resources for firefighting when civilian assets are exhausted. When deployed to support wildland firefighting efforts, MAFFS units stand by for a call from dispatch centers based on requests from civilian incident commanders.

The 2020 fire season saw the need for all four military MAFFS units to fly missions, including the 152nd, the 302nd Air Force Reserve unit based in Colorado, the Wyoming Air Guard's 153rd Airlift Wing, and the California Air Guard's 146th Airlift Wing.

According to CAL Fire, more acres burned across the Golden State in 2020 than in any other year. By the time the 152nd's activation concluded in October, more than 4 million acres were charred in California, including the massive Creek Fire that devastated more than 300,000 acres near Fresno in the Sierra Nevada mountain range

Coronavirus proves formidable enemy as relentless battle continues

CARSON CITY, DUCKWATER AND LAS VEGAS — More than eight months into the Nevada Guard's support of the battle against COVID-19, the stubborn microscopic enemy showed no sign of surrender as many of the state's counties reported record number of cases in late autumn.

Despite the fact that nearly 400 Nevada Guard Soldiers and Airmen were on duty daily in November supporting the state's effort to curb the pandemic, health officials continued to report record high numbers of coronavirus cases. Clark County reported it had topped 100,000 cases of COVID-19 on November 19, the same day Washoe County reported its record high of active cases, 5,878. The number in Washoe County on November 19 was four times the number of cases on October 18 (1,432). The Nevada Guard was not immune from the sting of COVID-19, as dozens of Airmen and Soldiers also reported

contracting the disease.

Through October, Nevada Guard Soldiers and Airmen had recorded some staggering statistics during the Guard's mission to assist the state during the pandemic. Since the mission began in April, Guardsmen had distributed more than 2 million K/N95 masks, 3.5 million surgical masks, 8.3 million pairs of gloves and 1.1 million Tyvek shields. They also distributed about 2.9 million meals and administered more than 1.1 million coronavirus tests.

Yet the spread of the coronavirus ran rampant despite the efforts of the Nevada Guard and its community partners. Officials said it would take a concerted effort by the entire community to reverse the coronavirus spread.

"The Nevada Guard has been an indispensable part of the whole of community response to the COVID-19 outbreak. However, despite all efforts to increase testing, contact tracing and personal protective equipment distribution, we will not be able to mitigate the exponential spread

of the virus unless the public embraces all aspects of strict adherence to social distancing and protective measures," said Lt. Col. Brett Compston, the director of the Nevada Guard's Joint and Domestic Operations section.

Down from April's high of 1,150 Nevada Guard Soldiers and Airmen on duty, the nearly 400 Guardsmen who remained on health response duty through the autumn performed a familiar list of tasks, including staffing of community based collection sites, warehouse support and contact tracing. The COVID-19 health response this past spring was the largest domestic activation in Nevada Guard history.

On any given day in autumn, there were dozens of missions ongoing throughout the state. In late November, Task Force 422 in northern Nevada had more than 130 Soldiers on 12 separate missions, including assisting at the Northern Nevada Food Bank, helping with Washoe County Health District mapping and data input, and conducting community based collections.

The health response duty for all Nevada Guardsmen was extended in December and is set to now last through March 31.

The White House made the announcement last fall with the state of Nevada entering a 75:25 cost share with the federal government..

Snapshots of support

In November in Las Vegas, more than 50 Guardsmen teamed with the Clark County Fire Department's mobile surge command to test Las Vegans during the city's autumn uptick in coronavirus cases. More than 1,900 people were screened on the first day of operations at a new testing site at the Texas Station Hotel and Casino.

Deputy Incident Commander with CCFD, Noah Wheatley, the Clark County Fire Department's deputy incident commander, said the goal at the site was to test more than 2,000 people per day.

"This is a cooperative effort between University Medical Center, the Southern Nevada Health District, the Nevada

National Guard and the Clark County Fire Department,” Wheatley said. “We want to get as many people tested as possible – without an appointment and for free. We are all professionals with the same resolution – winning the battle against this coronavirus.”

Tribal assistance

In rural Duckwater, Soldiers and Airmen on Task Force South’s mobile collection team headed north to the remote Nye County village in November to assist the Shoshone Tribal Health District with its community-based testing for COVID-19.

Eight members of the Nevada Guard surge team helped test more than 70 people at the Duckwater Health Clinic. It was the second visit for the Nevada Guard to Duckwater this year for coronavirus support after the task force tested 80 percent of the Tribal elder community in July.

Duckwater has a population of about 220. The village is in Nye County about 50 miles south of Eureka. Despite being small in population, Duckwater includes more than 4,300 square miles of area. The community was named for the ducks which frequented wetlands near the original town site.

Brenda O’Neil, the health manager for

the Duckwater clinic, said her community – just like the entire state – was experiencing an uptick in positive coronavirus cases in November. She expressed her gratitude for the Guard’s willingness to go anywhere in Nevada to assist the state’s citizens.

“We are very grateful the Guard is here to help,” O’Neil said. “I want to give them a huge thanks for their ongoing support.”

That same week, the Nevada Guard also assisted the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony with coronavirus testing at the nation’s Hungry Valley and downtown Reno locations.

Bethany Sam, spokesperson for the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony, said that the colony’s increasing number of cases correlated with Washoe County’s increasing number of positive tests.

“We are seeing numbers go up here,” Sam said. “We appreciate the state of Nevada and the Nevada National Guard’s efforts to help us combat the pandemic.”

The Reno-Sparks Indian Colony includes 1,157 members with locations in rural Washoe County and its urban colony just east of downtown Reno. The majority of the members hail from the Paiute, Shoshone and Washoe tribes.

Since the beginning of the Guard’s health response support in April, task forces have provided assistance at more than a dozen tribal locations across Nevada with either food distribution support and/or COVID-19 testing medical and logistical support.

In addition to the Duckwater Shoshone and the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony, other Native American sites, tribes and organizations receiving assistance from the Nevada Guard included: the Moapa band of Paiutes; the Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada; Hungry Valley; the Pyramid Lake Paiute; the eastern Nevada bands of Te-Moak and western Shoshone; the Duck Valley Shoshone-Paiute; the northern Paiute and western Shoshone in McDermitt; and the northern Paiute in Yerington.

With the state’s largest domestic activation in history continuing into the new year, Compston emphasized all of the state’s residents needed to cooperate to eradicate the coronavirus.

“Nevadans must work together to combat this fiend,” Compston said. “It’s not about politics. It’s about doing the right thing to help your neighbors and quicken our return to normalcy.”

Historian's Notebook

Not just COVID-19: Nev. Guard activations include long history of state support

The Nevada National Guard has activated many times throughout its history to assist the Silver State, but nothing has come close to the scope of the response of the more than 1,150 Nevada Soldiers and Airmen who mobilized to support the state in 2020 during the COVID-19 pandemic.

“The Guard has always trained and responded to these types of events in the state, whether floods, earthquakes or fires,” retired Nevada Army Guard Lt. Col. Steve Ranson, a news reporter and former Nevada Guard public affairs officer, said. “Planning has always been there. COVID-19 has just been one of those unprecedented, unexpected rollouts that we hopefully never see again.”

While most state activations involve natural disasters — snowstorms, fires or floods — other activations stem from man-made reasons such as riots or prison

breaks. Given the unprecedented events of the past year, let's take a look at historical activations that sparked statewide, even national, interest and, at times, included hundreds of Soldiers supporting Nevada citizens.

Nevada State Prison War, 1873

Following a prison break in Carson City in 1871, about 30 inmates overran the state armory. The Nevada Guard, then called the state militia, was called to quell violence and return the majority of the escapees. In response to the embarrassment, the 1873 Nevada Legislature deemed it necessary to establish a full-time state warden position. The state penitentiary was previously overseen as an additional duty of the state's lieutenant governor.

In March of 1873, Nevada's second governor, Lewis Bradley, along with the Nevada's attorney general and secretary of state, walked up to the prison to relieve Lieutenant Governor Frank Denver of his duties as prison warden. Based on his

interpretation of the law, Denver refused. He felt he had one more month as warden and, thus, was entitled to one more month of pay. After Denver denied entrance to the governor and his staff, about 60 Nevada state militiamen armed with a 3-inch howitzer marched to the prison. Denver conceded and the spectacle — deemed more circus than war — ended, but received great interest in local press and among citizens in the state capital.

Of course, the state militia's most common reason to respond in defense of citizens in the 19th century was during disputes with Native Americans, but these were usually conducted with unorganized local militia, not at the state level, with a few exceptions such as the Bannock War of 1878.

Operation Haylift, 1948-1949

Nevada Guardsmen also assisted in the Herculean effort to assist ranchers around the state during the blizzard of 1948, which eventually turned into a Hollywood film, “Operation Haylift.” It was Nevada's worst winter since the “White Winter” of 1889-1890. Both severely threatened the state's livestock industries.

Luckily in 1948, Nevada, along with other states around the American West and plains paralyzed in a deep freeze, possessed much-needed aerial support. Through subzero temperatures and frigid snowstorms, the Nevada Air and Army Guard, along with federal partners, including the U.S. Air Force, were able to transport feed and supplies to cattle desperately in need. According to Nevada Guard biennial reports, 43 Army Guardsmen with trucks and other equipment effectively spared the state's cattle industry from the outcome it experienced 60 years earlier. The newly-formed Nevada Air Guard also made hay drops for cattle and food for stranded citizens, including one rescue mission that saved 75 people.

Other activations in the post-World War II era included a gas main explosion that killed five, injured 50 and destroyed



blocks of downtown Reno near Sierra Street along the Truckee River. Hundreds of Nevada Guardsmen were activated and a controversy arose when news reporters alleged the adjutant general had issued martial law when he blocked reporters' access to the site.

Rodney King Riots, 1992

The Rodney King Riots, mainly associated with civil unrest in Los Angeles, also erupted in Las Vegas' West Side, a neighborhood a few miles northwest of old downtown Las Vegas. Authorities estimated about \$6 million in damages occurred and one person was killed. About 400 Nevada Army Guardsmen were activated to support law enforcement for three days.

Nevada Guardsmen with the 72nd Military Police Company, fresh off deployment during Desert Storm/Desert Shield, were stationed at the Cashman

Center as a show of force, according to the Nevada Guard publication "On Guard."

Eventually, an agreement was reached between Las Vegas minority leaders and the state to allow peaceful protests as long as the National Guard remained off the streets.

Nevada Guard state public affairs officer Lt. Col. Chris Anastassatos told reporters in 1992: "People were really impressed with (the military police)...with their batons and riot gear," Anastassatos said. "The governor was really tickled pink."

The New York Times reported that fast-growing Las Vegas — with 1.75 officers per 1,000 citizens vs. the national average of 2.45 officers — was in desperate need of assistance during the melee.

Lemmon Valley Floods, 2017

The mix of a sizeable mountain snowpack followed by unseasonably warm weather and rainstorms in northern

Nevada during the spring of 2017 led to flooding into the valleys north of Reno and caused Swan Lake to overflow.

The Truckee River in downtown Reno crested, but did not spill over as it had in 1997. The valleys north of Reno weren't as lucky. After President Donald Trump issued a major disaster declaration, more than 140 Nevada Guardsmen participated in an effort to save the neighborhood. They moved 1 million pounds of sandbags and constructed a four-mile HESCO wall. It remains the largest flood activation in Nevada Guard history.

The Guard also responded to major floods in Nevada in the winter of 1982-1983 and in 2005. And, just last summer, the 152nd Airlift Wing experienced its largest firefighting activation from July to October during a record-setting fire season in California.

Homegrown Nevada officer new land component commander

RENO — Almost 25 years after graduating from the state's Officer Candidate School, Col. Troy Armstrong succeeded Brig. Gen. Zachary Doser as the land component commander of the Nevada Army Guard in November. Armstrong, 52, of Las Vegas, now oversees and manages the more than 3,200 uniformed Nevada Guard Soldiers.

Armstrong is set to attain the rank of brigadier general and will be one of only two general officers in the Nevada Army Guard along with assistant Adjutant General Brig. Gen. Michael Hanifan.

"It's my sincere honor to be standing before you as the incoming commander of the Nevada Army Guard," Armstrong said to the socially-distanced attendees at the ceremony

that marked the start of his command inside the Army Aviation Support Facility. "I assure you I will do everything within my abilities to provide direction and purpose in a manner that's professional, inclusive and transparent.

"Most important, we'll work as a team to support the needs of our state and defend our nation against all threats as the finest National Guard force in our state's history. I'm honored to be your commander and proud and honored to be a Soldier in the Nevada Army Guard. I look forward to working with everyone, expanding opportunities, creating transparencies, and leading with nothing less than absolute honor."

Doser, 56, of Reno, who works for the Reno Police Department in his civilian occupation, retired from the military. Doser had served as the land component commander since August 2017.

Armstrong had been the commander of the 17th Sustainment Brigade since 2018. In his civilian occupation, Armstrong is the manager of administrative services for the Clark County Department of Family Services. He has been employed by Clark County for more than 27 years.

After graduating from the state's now-shuttered OCS in 1996, Armstrong served on some of the most visible deployments in Nevada Army Guard history, including two deployments to Iraq with the 72nd Military Police Company. He was also the commander of the 72nd when it deployed to Louisiana in 2005 in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. In 2008, Armstrong returned to Iraq with the 140th Military Police Brigade Liaison Detachment. In 2015, he assumed command of the 17th Special Troops Battalion and deployed

with the unit in 2016 to Southwest Asia in support of Operation Spartan Shield.

Doser had served in the Nevada Army Guard since 1999 and had recorded more than 33 years of both active- and reserve component military service.

For his meritorious service, Dosier was awarded the Maj. Gen. Drennan Clark Order of Nevada.

The award is the second highest state military award possible behind only the Medal of Valor. The award is reserved for individuals who have recorded a minimum of 25 years of extraordinary service in the U.S. military, including at least 20 in the Nevada National Guard.

Chappell assumes command of 17th Sustainment Brig.

On the same weekend Armstrong was promoted to land component commander, Col. Clayton Chappell, 53, of Minden, succeeded Armstrong as the commander of the 17th Sustainment Brigade, the largest brigade in the Nevada Army Guard.

The Las Vegas-based brigade maintains administrative control over two-thirds of the Nevada Army Guard's units and personnel.

Chappell deployed with the 17th to Kuwait in 2016 as the brigade support operations officer before a stint with the Army Reserve's 364th Expeditionary Sustainment Command in Marysville, Washington.

Twice as nice: Henderson recruiter goes distance, earns elite status in 2 sports

2 Nev. female Soldiers also tabbed All Guard

OMAHA, Neb. — In the span of just three weeks in late summer, Staff Sgt. Paul Duncan of the Recruiting and Retention Battalion earned elite status in two of the five sports sponsored by the National Guard Bureau. In August, Duncan, 36, earned a spot on the All Guard Endurance Team with his 20th place in the inaugural Endurance Team Trials; in September, Duncan scored a position on the All Guard Marathon Team with his 13th place in the Marathon Trials contested in conjunction with the Omaha Marathon.

Two other Nevada Army Guard Soldiers, Staff Sgt. Jazzmene Loftis, 33, of the Recruiting and Retention Battalion, and Maj. Liberty Reyes, 41, of the 17th Sustainment Brigade, also garnered All Guard status in their respective specialties. Loftis placed 12th among female Soldiers at the Endurance Team trials and Reyes was the women's master champion (+40 age) among National Guard entrants.

The All Guard Endurance Team is an expansion of the National Guard Marathon Team and adds a fifth sport to the National Guard competition schedule. The other sponsored sports are biathlon, marksmanship and LeapFest (target parachuting.) All of the sports bolster the National Guard's retention program by promoting physical fitness and encouraging self-discipline and esprit de corps. Athletes earning All Guard status are usually invited to represent the National Guard throughout the year at both local and national competitions.

The National Guard's Endurance competition closely resembles a "Spartan Race:" a distance race featuring obstacles and barriers. The Nebraska Guard's course at Greenleaf Training Site included 13 challenges in four types of athletic categories on a 7-mile course, including

Army Combat Fitness Test events. Sixty-three Soldiers and Airmen participated in the inaugural event.

Loftis, 33, of Henderson, cruised through the course in 2 hours, 56 minutes to easily secure her All-Guard status among female Soldiers. Duncan scored the final All Guard Endurance Team slot with his 20th place in 2:02. Both are eligible to represent the National Guard at future endurance races, including Spartan Races, but that series has been postponed due to the global pandemic.

Duncan returned to the Cornhusker State a scant three weeks after the Endurance Team trials for the Marathon Team trials held in conjunction with the Omaha Marathon on Sept. 19. In the marathon trials, each National Guard state and territory sends its four top runners to contend for positions on the All Guard Marathon Team. A full marathon course is 26.2 miles.

The National Guard Marathon Team trials are usually held in Lincoln, Nebraska, each May. Due to the coronavirus, this year's event was held in Omaha in September. Only the top 20 male runners and top 12 female runners in the National Guard, along with three master men and two master women, were named to the 2020 All Guard team.

On the streets of Omaha, Duncan blazed the 26-mile course at a sub-7 minute per mile pace to finish in 3:03:39, good for 13th among National Guard runners and 20th overall. Capt. Kenny Rayner of the California National Guard was the National Guard champion and overall winner in 2:35:19.

Reyes earned one of the two All Guard master women's spots with her time of 4:51. She was 10th among all women in the 40-44 age division.

Las Vegas residents Capts. Keishmer Cardoso, 29, and Dan Woodbury, 30, both from the 17th Sustainment Brigade, also represented Nevada at the marathon trials. Cardoso was 19th in his age division in 3:54; Woodbury was 23rd in 4:45.

SPC. MICHAEL HIGHLINE, 1984-2020: 422nd Soldier died en route to training

FERNLEY — Nevada Army Guard Spc. Michael Highline was poised to enjoy several positive new chapters to his life this winter. The 36-year-old Cold Springs resident had just transferred to Charlie Company, 422nd Expeditionary Signal Battalion, in Stead and was entrusted to become the unit’s driving instructor and examiner; in his personal life, he had just recently become engaged to Nancy Crombie, also of Cold Springs.

Highline’s promising future was never realized, however, as the father of four died in a vehicle accident on Dec. 14, 2020, in Cold Springs while en route to military training. He was buried Tuesday with military honors at the Northern Nevada Veterans Cemetery in Fernley, Nevada. He is survived by Walker, 14, Emerald, 11, Violet, 8, and Ryker, 6; previous spouse Shannon Highline and Crombie.

“At the drop of a dime, he would do anything to help anyone,” said Crombie, recounting how one of her first experiences with Highline involved his help when her car broke down. “He was the first to help and take care of a situation.”

Crombie admitted Highline could be quite the character.

“He was a combination of Peter Pan and

Steve Urkel,” Crombie said. “He was very personable and sometimes goofy.”

Highline enjoyed time spent with family and was excited become the step-father to twins Tommy and Isabella, 10.

“He loved playing any type of game with kids,” Crombie said. “You could sit in one room and hear him and the kids playing throughout the rest of the house.”

Highline grew up in Reno and graduated from Hug High. He joined the Nevada Army Guard in December 2010 and became

a familiar Soldier in northern Nevada as a supply specialist, armorer and wheeled-vehicle mechanic for several Washoe County units. In his civilian occupation, Highline worked at Tesla, Inc.

In the Nevada Army Guard, Highline was a respected Soldier and was set to take on a new responsibility as Charlie Company’s military license instructor and examiner.

“He did everything I ever asked him to do and I trusted him completely. He was a hard worker,” said Sgt. 1st Class Raymond Polson, a previous military supervisor of Highline. “What I will miss about Highline won’t be his character in uniform, but rather his character out of it. He loved his kids and his family meant the world to him.”

Polson succinctly summed up the Nevada Guard’s downhearted feeling about losing its memorable Soldier and character.

“Highline was my brother. He was his children’s father, And he was a Nevada Soldier,” Polson said. “I believe he viewed all of those aspects of his life equally, with as much love and dedication as was his character.”

Highline was posthumously awarded the Army Commendation Medal for his contributions during the past decade to the Nevada Army Guard. He had previously received two Army Achievement Medals.


