based upon our tenacity, skill in combat, and readiness to fight our country's battles. This reputation is the result of hard work, effective training, and success in combat. It has come at considerable cost: the blood

Marines spilled in combat across the globe.

We grudgingly endure these because risk is inherent in war. We assess it, we plan for it,

and we avoid or minimize it as much as possible, avoiding obstacles, using preparatory fires to reduce the threat, wear-

ing force protection equi ment such as helmets, flak jackets and gas masks. Unfortunately,

peacetime risk management activities are sometimes less proactive.

Leaders at all levels

have historically been reluctant to halt an operation or training event due to safety concerns. Junior Marines have been even more hesitant to stop an evolution that "just does not feel right." It takes a bold individual to

recommend to the commander that we cancel or halt an evolution. Yet, this aggres-sive and thoughtful spirit is just the sort of attitude that we expect from Marines in

Each year, over 100 Marines die in mishaps and over 2000 are injured. We must reduce these losses. Non-combat casualties diminish our readiness, our cohesion and our camaraderie. Our Corps needs a cultural change and this change must be profound. We will effect this change through leadership.

To lead that cultural change, I have established the Marine Corps Executive Safety Board (ESB). On June 15 the Assistant Commandant hosted the first

The ESB consists of commanding generals from our operational commands, major bases and supporting organizations. Their mission is to provide safety policy and guidance for our Corps. The Marine Corps Safety

To begin implementation of this cultural shift, the following actions will be taken,

All personal safety equipment and seat requirements be enforced both on and off base and Marines will be disciplined for failure to

utilize required safety equipment. Within seven days of any Class A mishap, all commanding officers shall brief their commanding generals on the circumstances surrounding the mishap and the steps taken to prevent recurrence.

The executive officer or deputy commander within each command is responsible for the execution of safety policy.



## CA study evalutes Technical Performance

As previously reported, the CA study process is broken down into fifteen distinct steps. In previous articles, we've discussed steps one through 13. Today we'll discuss step 14 which is titled, "Compare

Government and Contractor Proposals." The purpose of CIVILLA

this step is to compare the best value con-tractor proposal with the government proposal prepared by the CA team and make a tentative selection decision. The comparison is managed by the contracting officer and conducted in two stages. The first stage is reviewing the government and contractor technical proposals. The second stage is review of the government and contractor cost proposals

With the selection of the bests value contractor offer, the contracting officer submits to the Source Selection Authority (SSA) the government's Technical

cal proposals requirements of the solicitation. The SSA evaluates the Technical Performance Plan and assesses whether the same level of performance and performance quality as the best value contractor proposal will be

If the SSA deter-

mines that the gov-ernment's Technical A-76 Study Performance Plan does not offer the L.C. GREENE formance as the contractor offer, the

Technical Performance Plan is returned to the CA team to be revised. The CA team makes all changes necessary to meet the performance standards accepted by the SSA. If necessary, the Most Efficient Organization (MEO) and







# 26th MEU Sailors learn from chaplains

USS SAIPAN - Being a Navy chaplain is

The U.S. Navy's Chaplain Candidate Program is teaching that lesson to Ensigns Shane Baxter and Jacobo Munoz.

"Here we'll be dealing with people from all other faiths," he said. "It's truly an opporfunity to broaden your mind."


Baxter is no stranger to the Navy. He was enlisted for six years until getting out with plans to start a family.





# CAX serves as 'rite of passage

One of the most storied training traditions in the Marine Corps is participating in a Combined Arms Exercise aboard Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center Twentynine Palms, Calif. For many reasons, it has become a rite of passage for Marines of all occupational specialties

Like all transformational experiences, CAX has developed its own legends. An almost mythical quality surrounds Twentynine Palms, as evoked by the names of some of its training areas: Noble Pass, Lavic Lake, Quackenbush, the Delta Coridor, Gypsum

According to many Marines, Range 400, a combined-arms training area at CAX, has become the preeminent experience in a young infantryman's development.

Far from being exclusively an infantry exercise, however, Range 400 - and all of CAX - is aimed at teaching the integration of and ranks

Nowhere else in the Corps can you integrate weapons and supporting assets like you can here," said Col Mastin Robeson, Marine Air Ground Task Force 8 commander. "This is the premiere training exercise in the Marine Billeted at Twentynine Palms' Camp

Wilson, MAGTF-8 is participating in CAXs 9 and 10 this summer. They have brought over 3200 Marines and Sailors into the heart of the Mojave Desert to learn how to fight and survive during the harshest season of the year. LtCol Jerome Lynes, MAGTF-8's execu-

tive officer further described the significance of CAX. "We're able to weave all of our assets together here in the practical application of live fire and maneuver concepts," he said. "Most of our junior Marines have never been on a CAX before," said SgtMaj Ronald Fetherson, MAGTF-8 sergeant major. "They know what they're here to do, though, and they're facing the challenge well. This is a

great opportunity for Marines to understand what their brothers-in-arms in different elements of the MAGTF do for a living." It's not uncommon for temperatures in the training areas to reach 120 degrees Fahrenheit in the daytime, and the only water available is

what you bring with you. "Hydration, the buddy system, and vehicle safety are our three keys to success," said Robeson. "They are non-negotiable."

MAGTF-8 is composed of the traditional four components: the Command Element, the Ground Combat Element, the Aviation Combat Element, and the Combat Service Support Element.

Each of these accomplishes its individual tasks in support of the overall MAGTF effort. Working in concert, it's difficult to imagine a more effective or flexible organization.

Marines participate in MAGTFs all the time, whether they realize it or not. In fact, Marine Corps installations of all shapes and sizes are considered the "fifth element" of whatever MAGTF they support.

The Marine Corps presence at Twentynine Palms began in 1952.

"Under the current model, the Corps has en conducting CAXs since 1980," said Col Mel Spiese, Director, Tactical Training Exercise Control Group, the organization which oversees the conduct of CAX. Spiese is leader of the "coyotes," the Marines who act as trainers during CAX's live-fire and other exer-

"This is basically a 22-day live-fire obstacle course," said Spiese. "We focus on those critical warfighting skills under live-fire conditions at which we cannot fail on the battle-

Although previously considered evaluators by Marines participating in CAX, the "coyotes" have undergone a fundamental shift in identity. "We'd rather be seen as instructorcoach figures," said Capt Scott Beeson, the electronic warfare representative at TTECG. Robeson, shares this view.

"I've been extremely impressed by their teaching and coaching," he said.

"It's because of their watchful eyes that we're able to replicate near-combat conditions. We have a healthy and positive rapport with them and are grateful for their dedicated support." Things have changed a lot since

# 8th Comm Maringet combat ready

According to Reyes, an external lift is when a helicopter is used to transport a motor vehicle by picking it up and placing it in the preferred area.

This type of vehicle transport is helpful in a combat situation because it can help you move a vehicle quickly in places which may be otherwise hard to get to, such as the top of a mountain, said Reyes, of Elizabeth, N.J.

# Communicators get taste of recon

Drabbed in heavy camouflage while trekking through the thick brush and weeds surrounding Combat Town here, a four man reconnaissance team positions themselves and takes detailed notes on the enemy who stands a stone throw away.

This scenario was part of a recent threeday exercise in which Service Company and Headquarters Co, 8th Communication Battalion, II Marine Expeditionary Force took their differences out of the office and into the training areas here.

Throughout the exercise, the same fourman headquarters team provided first hand intelligence on the whereabouts and movements of Service Co.

"Our team is the eyes and ears of Headquarters Company. Whether it is seeing how many vehicles are coming in and out of their camp, viewing their command post or eavesdropping to find out their passwords, we are observing it all," whispered team leader Sgt Derek Soloway who stressed sound discipline during the

Soloway, from Hollywood, Fla., also stressed the importance of endurance during the three-day-war.

"Although we are Marines who are mostly in administrative positions and do not go out in the field every week, we have to be ready at anytime to be in a physically taxing situation such as this on short notice," Soloway said referring to the hot and humid weather of North Carolina. "If you are not in good shape, there is no way you can complete your mission."

The other Marines in the team were LCpl Samuel Nunez, Cpl Tauriq Griffin and LCpl Norman Cunningham.

"These Marines were really motivated that's why they were picked for the job," said Headquarters Co Commanding Officer Capt Jersey Reyes from Elizabeth, N.J., referring to his choosing of the recon team.

Sharpening of field skills is a neverending task for Marines. 





Initial success or total failure. These can be words to live by if you are in the business of detonating or disarming

For many of the Marines who enjoy this dangerous task, a wrong move may mean the injury of themselves or a fellow Leatherneck

These hard charging defusing blastmasters are the small band of brothers of Explosive Ordinance Disposal, 2d Force Service Support Group.

One of the smallest units in the Corps,

consisting of approximately 300 troops, EOD Marines have one of the most important jobs and are prepared to be called upon for nearly any scenario.

'The exciting part of our job is we are versatile. EOD units are usually called upon to neutralize explosives which have not discharged, but we are not limited to

being in the field.

"At Camp Lejeune we work in coordination with local police bomb squads in seven surrounding counties and are on call 24-hours a day," said training operations chief for 2d EOD Platoon, 8th Engineers Support

Battalion, 2d FSSG, GySgt John B. "At Camp Lejeune we work in Allover Protection Barber. According to

school, we are sent through a very extensive course learning about almost every kind of bomb one can think up. It is impossible to learn about them all

because, in the end, the assembly is up to the individual's imagination," said GySgt Richard L. Harrington, EOD disposal technician for Marine Corps Base here.

According to Barber, EOD Marines are always in the background of high profile events, usually with the help of Secret Service, the FBI or other government agencies, making sure the threat of terrorist attacks are at a minimum by searching and securing areas that may be vulnerable to them. Every EOD Marine wears the bomb,

wreath, lighting bolts and shield badge to symbolize his job. The MOS is always looking for squared away people, said Harrington.

"If you like to deploy this is also a good place to be," he said.

the crumbling old resort town.

He went on to be local counsel for the big casinos that moved east from Nevada once

the gambling referendum passed.
"Sometimes Paddy's style of politics was a little in-your-face, and I didn't agree with all of his views," said State Sen. William L. Gormley of Atlantic County, a Republican, but he was a wonderful friend. He had the kind of personality that filled the room.

Gormley was speaking on the floor of the Republican National Convention in Philadelphia, where he was wearing the tie that McGahn had brought him from a postwar trip to Korea, *The Times* said. It was emblazoned with elephants.

McGahn, son of an Atlantic City saloonkeeper, graduated from Mount St. Mary's College in Emmitsburg, Md. As a Marine captain, John R. "Russ" Blandford was field judge for an Allied Football Games double-header at the City Oval in Ballarat, Australia, June 26, 1943

The 1st Marine Division had been brought to the Melbourne area after helping secure Guadalcanal. The Yellow Tigers, bolstered with players from the 11th Marines, faced the Crimson Field, and the R.A.A.F. opposed Ballarat in games laced with rugby.

The games went "on and on," Blandford said, "almost until dark. In fact, I started counting the timeouts as time played, which a few players detected."

"You never saw such a donnybrook and melee in your life," said retired SgtMaj Ernest Reid. "And it continued after the game followed by a few Australian beers."

Blandford, to become a major general in the Marine Reserve, was chief counsel of the House Armed Services Committee and a defense contractor consultant. He died at 82. MOVIES-TV
