Phoenix Rising: Task Force Phoenix completes Culminating Training Exercise

The Soldiers of Task Force Phoenix faced several worst-case scenarios during a Culminating Training Exercise (CTE) over 10 days in April 2021. Indirect fire attacks, downed aircraft, improvised explosive device (IED) attacks on ground vehicles—everything but the kitchen sink was thrown at them.

This occurred while the Task Force was executing typical aviation tasks its Soldiers will perform during an upcoming deployment overseas, such as VIP flights and Forward Arming and Refueling Point (FARP) operations.

"The CTE prepared us not only for the mission we'll be expected to perform downrange, but for many unplanned contingencies as well," Task Force Phoenix commander Col. Alan Gronewold said. "We brought together units from nine states to form a team and we conducted pretty intense operations to build that team."

Toward the end of the CTE when events were coming to a head, a real-world Texas rainstorm created additional challenges, temporarily grounding aircraft due to lightning, high winds and low visibility.

"Train to your worst day in theater; your hardest day of the deployment should be here at Fort Hood," 166th Aviation Brigade Commander Col. Jennifer Reynolds told the Soldiers of Task Force Phoenix at the midpoint of the exercise.

First Army Division West's 166th Aviation Brigade, based at Fort Hood, is responsible for all Army Reserve and National Guard aviation mobilization training and validation for deployment. Reynolds and her team of Observer, Controller/Trainers (OC/Ts) ran the CTE.

The purpose of the exercise was to enable the brigade headquarters staff, battalion staff sections and line companies to run through some of the most difficult scenarios they could potentially encounter once they commence their mission providing full-spectrum aviation operations to U.S. Central Command's (CENTCOM) Operation Spartan Shield and Operation Inherent Resolve.

"It's always challenging when you bring together more than 1,100 Soldiers from nine states," Task Force Phoenix Chief of Operations (CHOPS) Maj. Matt Jackson said. "We executed four air assault missions, almost 30 MEDEVAC scenarios, four downed aircraft recovery missions and multiple convoys while providing mission command at the battalion and brigade levels. We proved that we're ready and trained for our mission overseas."

Task Force Phoenix has been at North Fort Hood for a monthand-a-half of mobilization readiness training and pre-deployment administrative tasks. The CTE was the final required training event to validate before the Task Force commences its mission. In addition to training, the Task Force has simultaneously been sending advanced parties to Kuwait and undergoing a load out of equipment.

Major training events during the CTE involved MEDEVAC and Downed Aircraft Recovery Team (DART) missions, Forward Arming and Refueling Point (FARP) operations, convoys, and culminated with a complex air assault raid on an enemy position. Pilots and crew chiefs flew both real-world UH-60 Black Hawk and CH-47 Chinook helicopters for the training missions, as well as virtual flights in Aviation Combined Arms Tactical Trainer (AVCATT) simulators.

"We saw quantifiable growth from the start of the exercise each day until the end," said Lt. Col. Tyler Smentek, commander of 1st Battalion, 168th Aviation Regiment (General Support Aviation Battalion). "We exercised deliberate and rapid planning processes that allowed our subordinate units to provide aviation combat power to the Joint Task Force commander. We walked away from the CTE with processes and products that will enable our geographically dispersed Task Force to succeed in the CENTCOM AOR (Area of Operations)."

"The team did great," Gronewold said of the exercise. "Everyone worked hard. Everyone stayed focused. Everyone stayed motivated and I couldn't be happier with how the team performed."

Task Force Phoenix is composed of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 40th Combat Aviation Brigade; 1st Battalion, 168th Aviation Regiment (GSAB); and the 640th Aviation Support Battalion. In all, the Task Force includes Army National Guard units from nine states. An active-duty U.S. Army AH-64 Apache attack helicopter battalion will join the Task Force once in theater.

Task Force Phoenix will replace Task Force Anvil, led by the Pennsylvania Army National Guard's 28th Expeditionary Combat Aviation Brigade, which has been in theater for the past nine months.





Soldiers use coffee, live music to prevent sexual assault

During the 28th Expeditionary Combat Aviation Brigade's deployment to the Middle East, the sexual harassment and assault response and prevention team found a unique way to serve their Soldiers while providing knowledge about their program.

A small compound here is home to the 28th ECAB chaplain's office, equal opportunity office and the sexual assault response coordinator. Usually these offices are a place for crisis and counseling where Soldiers and leaders can come for consolation and advice during times of duress.

But every Tuesday there is the smell of fresh coffee and snacks, the sounds of live music, conversation and laughter.

The counselors and advocates who run this makeshift coffee shop call it the Teal Bean Café. Teal is the Army color representing SHARP and the bean is the gourmet coffee that makes this an unlikely gathering spot for Soldiers to come and relax for a while. All coffee, tea, hot chocolate and snacks are free for the Soldiers who stop by the office.

"We wanted a way to not only raise awareness about sexual harassment and assault but to have a fun and relaxing environment where Soldiers and leaders can meet the Brigade's counseling team," said Master Sgt. John Paul Karpovich, 28th ECAB SARC. "It makes it much easier if you need these resources when you know where to turn and have already established a slight familiarization with those who you're dealing with."

Staff Sgt. Andrea Whelan has been running the coffee social since the beginning.

"It has really grown. When we started, it was just coffee, some Pop-Tarts and granola bars," said Whelan, the brigade's victim advocate. "Now, we have people and organizations sending us all kinds of snacks, and we have live music from The SandWalk Prophets, the ministry worship team."

In addition to the Teal Bean the team members run the "Free X," where Soldiers can pick up toiletries, snacks and assorted items at no cost. The items are donated by different organizations then sorted and organized for easy access for anyone.

Maj. Doug Knepp, the 28th ECAB chaplain, says there is more to the Free X than just a place to get toiletries.

"The advantage of having these teams together is that it provides a one-stop-shop. If a Soldier wants to speak with the chaplain or talk to the SHARP or EO, the coffee bar and free-x provide some anonymity," said Knepp. "It is not unusual to see Soldiers stopping by for a coffee and snacks or things from the Free X, so nobody assumes that people are coming to see the chaplain or lodge a SHARP or EO complaint. It is advantageous for everyone."



The Teal Bean provides a non-threatening way for the ministry and counseling teams to interact with the Soldiers. Still, for those that attend, it's a welcome break from work and a place to relax.

For Sgt. 1st Class Dale Mahafkey, one of the brigade's lead medical specialists, the Teal Bean is a chance for informal networking. Mahafkey says he enjoys coming to get coffee and donuts, but also to have something to look forward to every week. The event gives him an opportunity to interact with the command team on a social level.

The Soldiers who run the Teal Bean also offer raffles and giveaways to keep things fun. Pvt. Bianca Gonzalez says it's the variety that keeps her coming back.

"I like coming to the Teal Bean because it's a comfortable place to talk and socialize with Soldiers of all ranks over coffee and snacks. There is always something interesting going on, whether it's music or the weekly raffles," said Gonzalez. "It's a great start to my morning, and I look forward to every week."

When Soldiers stop by the Teal Bean, they can also participate in the "stamp out sexual harassment" campaign where Soldiers are given free stamps for letters and postcards. The program is made possible through donations from the SHARP Team's family and friends back home.

SARCs from sister brigades make regular appearances at the Teal Bean, helping to support the overall mission of raising awareness of sexual harassment and assault prevention. The Teal Bean served as a meeting place to plan Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Month events with SARCs and collateral-duty victim advocates from around the post.

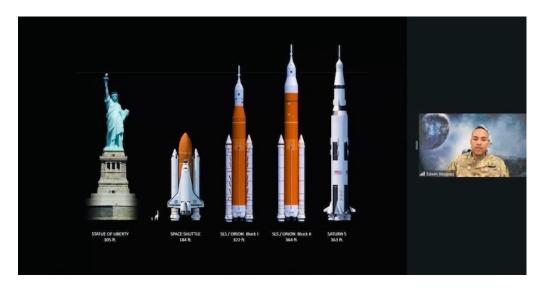

U.S. Soldier Teaches Kuwaiti Students to Reach for the Stars with Space Presentation

At the invite of the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait, Task Force Spartan Chief of Space and Special Programs, Maj. Edwin Vasquez, gave a virtual Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics presentation on NASA's Artemis Space Program to students at the Sabah Al-Ahmad Center for Giftedness and Creativity April 3, 2021, in Kuwait.

Over 300 students and Soldiers logged in for the virtual event, which emphasized the importance of STEM. During the presentation, Vasquez educated the students on NASA's plans to return to the Moon, and one day put people on Mars.

"It was an honor to speak with the students about the NASA Artemis program, something I have been fortunate to be a part of in my civilian career," said Vasquez. "As both an engineer who has worked for NASA, and a leader in the Army's Space Corps., I hope this presentation has only strengthened the students' interest in space exploration so one day they too may work in this field."

This presentation came at an exciting time for children and adults across the Arab world, as last month the United Arab Emirates became the first country in the region to reach Mars with the Hope probe.

"The students who attended this program were thrilled to have the chance to speak with someone who worked on NASA programs," U.S. Embassy Cultural Attaché Nelson Wen said. "They asked many questions about how to pursue a career in space and about the Artemis missions. This kind of outreach shows the diversity of talent and backgrounds which U.S. military members in Kuwait have, and I hope we can continue to inspire local audiences by showcasing people like Maj. Vasquez."

The presentation hosted by the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait was a part of their Every Soldier is an Ambassador Program. ESA aims to strengthen the Kuwaiti public's relationship with U.S. service members through service members' contributions of their time, skills, and experiences to their host country. Past ESA events have included volunteer work, speaking engagements about an area of interest to the service members, sports and music performances.

"This is a huge moment for our friends and partners in the Middle East," said Vasquez. "It is exciting to see that as we strengthen our military relationships through bilateral training exercises, we may one day work together in space exploration as well."

Task Force Spartan is a U.S. Military organization that strives to strengthen U.S. partner relationships across Southwest Asia through annual seminars, key leader engagements and training events between U.S. Soldiers and their partner nations in the region. Norwegian Foot March

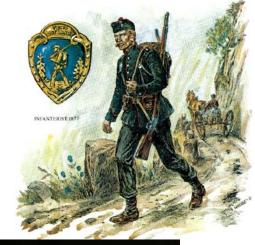

The standards for the event are that you must:

- Complete the foot march using an issued ruck or pack weighing a minimum of 25lbs
- Complete 30k (18.6mi) within your demographics' time standard
- Not leave the course at any time except to utilize the latrines

Out of the 125 attending Soldiers from our Brigade, only 84 finished in the time standards of their demographic. 38 of these Soldiers were from the 628th.

Several months into our deployment, the Army National Guard Bureau was able to start up a 22 day Virtual Basic Leader Course (vBLC), enabling our Soldiers to continue their Professional Military Education (PME), in a virtual environment. The vBLC course is the first step in the Noncommissioned Officer Professional Development System (NCOPDS).
