## USS Nassau ensures presidential security

Shrouded with an air of secrecy and speculation, Marines from Marine Forces Caribbean 1-90, boarded the *USS Nassau (LHA-4)* in the early morning hours of Feb. 5, at pier side in Norfolk, Va.

A fully equipped Marine Air Ground Task Force was getting under way and until the ship arrived off the coast of Colombia, South America, days later, few people knew exactly what was the mission was.

In Norfolk, the Ground Combat Element consisting of Marines from Lima Co., 3rd Bn., 6th Marines and Delta Co., 2nd Recon. Bn., 2nd MarDiv., and the support element, Combat Service Support Detachment-20, 2nd FSSG, boarded. Before leaving the pier, Marines and helicopters from Marine Helicopter Squadron-1 (the presidential helicopter squadron) also boarded.

Short stops along the way, the first off Camp Lejeune's Onslow Beach and later at Roosevelt Roads, Puerto Rico, filled the ship with more Marines, a composite squadron of helicopters and an array of civilian-clothed staffers.

Upon leaving Puerto Rico, Navy Capt. "Skip" Dirren, the ship's captain, put speculation to rest as he explained why the civilians

were aboard and spelled out, at least vaguely, the upcoming mission. The *Nassau* was steaming through the Caribbean Sea to take up a position off the coast of Colombia to support a presidential visit. President George Bush was scheduled to confer with Colombian authorities Feb. 15, to discuss drug interdiction efforts between the two countries.

Days before the visit, *Nassau's* passageways and conference rooms came to life as scores of White House communications people and Secret Service agents finalized security arrangements for the presidential visit. Navy and Marine Corps commanders joined in the planning to ensure the White House people had all the support they would need.

The planning ended and everything fell into place two days before the president was scheduled to arrive. Marine helicopters ferried the civilians back and forth to the Colombian mainland to finalize plans for the visit.

During two days of flying before the visit, CH-53E "Super Stallion" and CH-46 "Sea Knight" helicopters shuttled more than 38,000 pounds of cargo and 700 people to the coast. The CH-53s were from Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron-461 while the CH-46s were assigned to the MAGTF from Marine

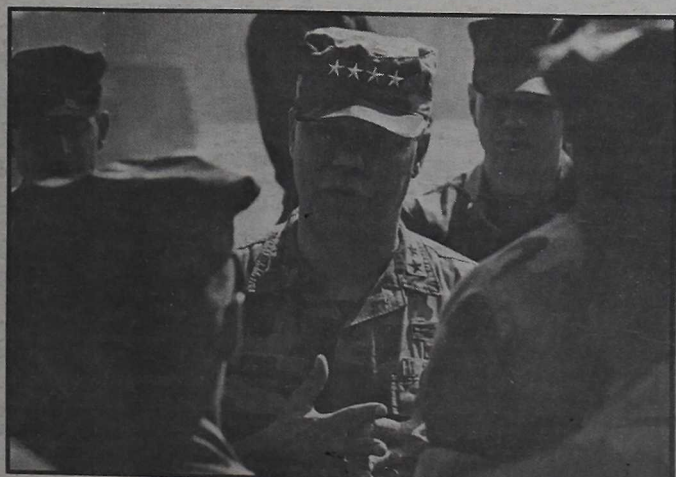

## Tarawa Terrace landfill allegations unfounded

Despite protests by residents of Tarawa Terrace of health problems that stemmed from allegations the housing area was built on a landfill, officials Monday substantiated the claim as unfounded.

While Tarawa Terrace was not built on a landfill, a 1983 initial assessment study identified a disposal site in the Tarawa Terrace area. The site contained construction debris, STP filter sand and household trash. The site consisted of a few acres, was closed in 1972, and after examination was found to contain no hazardous material.

The housing area was built in the early 1950s, when Bud Miller was a maintenance supervisor for MCB. He began working for the base in 1946.

"No. There was never a landfill at Tarawa Terrace," said Miller, who retired as deputy maintenance officer in 1976. "When Tarawa Terrace was built there weren't enough people here at the time for one."

Miller's claim was independently confirmed by Arthur G. Linton, regional

federal facilities coordinator, Environmental Protection Agency, Atlanta. "Camp Lejeune has specific sites that are on the National Priorities List, and the Tarawa Terrace site is not one of them."

The list prioritizes EPA-designated hazardous waste sites eligible for federal cleanup grants. Government installations are not eligible for the grant, but are placed at a higher priority than non-federal sites.

Linton was advised of the March 14 protest, by Vic Weeks, EPA's NPL project officer. While the agency has the right of entry onto base unannounced, according to Linton, the agency has no reason to come to Lejeune outside "its mandatory annual inspections."

If Tarawa Terrace were once a disposal site, according to Linton, "past disposal site documents would exist."

Residents of base housing areas who experience health problems linked to their quarters are instructed to call the Base Inspector's Office at 451-2718. A housing inspector will give individual attention to each call.

Camp Lejeune officials are continuing to investigate the issue.

Unseasonably hot temperatures hit the coastal Carolinas last week, and base facilities were deluged with megacalls for kilowatts to power air conditioners.

But the office is forecasting hotter times by reducing energy consumption, before a possible cooling trend in midsummer.

Air conditioning units in workplaces and barracks will not be turned on before July this year. The reason for the delay is related to the severe cold snap in December. The high energy consumption then forced the base over its first quarter (fiscal year-90) energy budget by \$300,000, according to Col. Howard L. Luttrell, director, base facilities.

"We had hoped to turn on the air conditioning by July 1," Luttrell said. "The problem is funding. We don't have enough money to buy the normal amount of power, so we have to buy less."

Last year the base, the third largest consumer of energy in the Department of the Navy, spent \$17.8 million on energy. In the past, 125 buildings have had air-conditioning turned on in the spring.

However, this year the Department of Defense froze the energy budget across the board.

If the base isn't allocated more money, air conditioning may not come on in offices and barracks this summer. These buildings are the largest energy consumers with 100-ton central air conditioning systems.

Cooling the buildings will have to be done by the old-fashioned way — open the windows and doors. Though there are no screens for the windows and doors, the base will not be buying any either, according to Luttrell. "Buying screens for the windows would cost \$200,000," he said. "And we'd rather spend that on electricity."

Before the base can spend more money on power, it must first conserve to save money. It can use the money saved this spring to buy extra electricity to power air conditioners later.

But this can only be done if everyone does their part to save energy in the weeks and months ahead, according to Luttrell.

It's as easy as "hitting the switch when leaving a room," Luttrell concluded.

# Arbor Day plans for future

Other holidays memorialize people, actions or events from the past, but according to its founder J. Sterling Morton, "Arbor Day proposes for the future."

Morton first presented a tree-planting holiday to be called "Arbor Day" at the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture meeting Jan. 4, 1872, because the state was a treeless plain.

The first Arbor Day was set for April 10, 1872. It was estimated that more than 1 million trees were planted in Nebraska on that day.

Because Morton was a journalist and editor of Nebraska's first newspaper, he had a forum to spread agricultural information and his enthusiasm for trees. He not only advocated tree planting by individuals, but encouraged civic organizations and groups of every kind to join in.

### International

This tradition of planting trees is carried on today in every state, Guam, Puerto Rico, Canada and many other countries. The date Arbor Day is celebrated varies in each place, depending on climate and when conditions are favorable for planting trees.

Statewide North Carolina observed Arbor Day March 16. Jacksonville recognizes it every year on March 15.

"Since this year marks our 10th year Jacksonville has received the 'Tree City Award,' we decided to incorporate this into our Arbor Day celebrations and coordinate programs with 10 local schools," said Martha Garrick, chairman of the Tree Board.

Camp Lejeune schools that participated included Berkley Manor Elementary School, Stone Street Elementary School, Tarawa Terrace I Elementary School and De Lallo

Elementary School.

"We [Jacksonville Beautification and Appearance Commission] thought this celebration was a really great way to get the Onslow and Camp Lejeune schools to work together on a joint project. It is very important to have our schools work together," said Helen Aitken, Brewster Middle School science teacher and member of the Beautification and Appearance Commission.

### Ceremony

Each school held a ceremony commemorating Arbor Day and sponsored various activities including planting a tree donated by the city of Jacksonville. "The city bought the trees for the schools to give the kids ownership and because they wanted Camp Lejeune schools to be involved with the city schools," said Aitken.

Some of the events sponsored by the schools included a tree planting ceremony with songs, dances and poems in honor of Arbor Day and trees. A "Spruce Up Day" was held to clean the campuses and tree seedlings were given to students to plant at home. Trees were also labeled in the school yard, skits performed and newspaper recycling projects were started.

### Creative

"The schools tried to come up with creative ways to present this topic to the students to get them involved," said Aitken. "We want to make the students aware that the earth is a special place to live in, and that every person counts in the decision of whether we are going to pollute our society or to recycle."

Theodore Roosevelt, our 26th president, said, "A people without children would face a hopeless future; a country without trees is almost as hopeless."

Approximately 800 gallons of disinfected, treated waste water was discharged into the New River, March 15 at 9:30 a.m. by the Camp Johnson Waste Treatment Plant.

Untreated sewage must go through several stages of treatment before it meets an acceptable standard and is discharged. In this case, to implement recommendations made by the state, the waste water was routed directly to the chlorine contact chamber, bypassing the secondary clarifier. This waste water was also disinfected prior to reaching the chlorine contact chamber with a granular chlorine disinfectant. This liquid received a final treatment in the chlorine contact chamber before being discharged into the river. Although the secondary clarifier was by-passed, no untreated or dangerous waste was discharged.

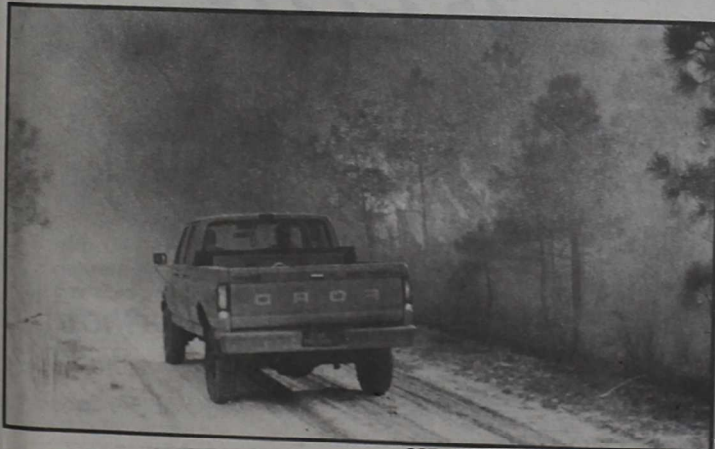

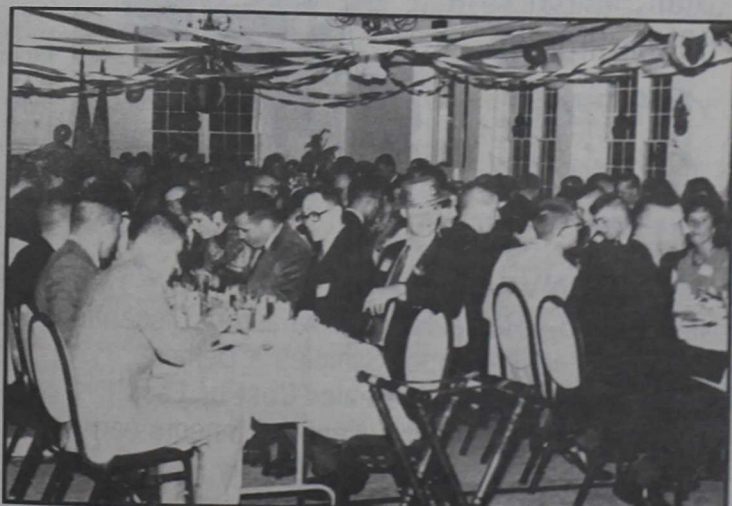

# Panama corpsmen play vital role, raise morale

"Lejeune Marines see action in Panama!"

"Delta Co. Marines receive a hero's welcome!"

Many times the corpsmen who support our Marines are left out of the headlines. Many people may not associate corpsmen with being in the thick of the battle, when in actuality that is exactly where they are. Where there are Marines and war, corpsmen are there saving lives.

The conflict in Panama was no different. There were corpsmen bandaging everything from blisters to gunshot wounds. There was only fatality: Cpl. Garreth Isaak.

"In my mind I knew he was dead, but I continued the lifesaving steps anyway until the medical officer pronounced him dead," says Petty Officer 2nd Class Glen "Shakes" Cornwall, a 2nd LAI Bn. corpsman.

Two scouts brought Isaak to Cornwall and Petty Officer 3rd Class David Smith, another Delta Co. corpsman, but Cornwall knew there was nothing he could do to save Isaak's life.

Isaak was the only Marine fatality during Operation Just Cause.

Everyone's spirits were down after that, Cornwall says. "We were all

a little shaky." The corpsmen tried to keep the Marines' morale high, especially since there wasn't a chaplain around.

"When Isaak went down, morale went down with him. We sat down and talked to these guys and tried to build their spirit," Cornwall says. "It was like a family; we actually wiped tears away. After that, I think it impressed on the Marines how important the situation was and how we had to bring them (PDF) down."

This was just one of the injuries Cornwall, a native of the Virgin Islands and senior corpsman in Delta Co., 2nd LAI Bn., encountered while in Panama.

He arrived in the turbulent country in October, and as senior corpsman took charge of sick call and supervised the other corpsmen.

Cornwall spent most of his time in an LAV used as an ambulance. He shared the vehicle with his company gunnery sergeant, an armorer, a communicator and, of course, the driver. "It was sort of a joke," says Cornwall, "how everyone on the ambulance was vital to the company."

Cornwall explains how the lifesaving process worked. "Our comm guy would receive a call over the radio that someone had been wounded. The driver would take the LAV as close as

it could go to the injured person. I would either dismount and go on foot or a HMMWV would retrieve the man."

When he received a call he didn't know what the extent of the injuries would be. As soon as he would climb out of the vehicle, he would mentally begin a step-by-step check of what action he would take for each injury and hope that a vital organ hadn't been hit.

The most common injuries Cornwall tended were gunshot, and shrapnel wounds created by grenades. "I worked three years in an emergency room, so I had seen life and death situations before," Cornwall says, "but the weirdest thing was having to take care of the PDF and civilians too."

One of the most memorable days Cornwall spent in Panama was Christmas Day.

Christmas night was dark and damp; it had been raining for several hours, Cornwall says. A warm breeze was gliding in off of the Pacific, echoing through the still, quiet town of Vaca Monte, on the southern side of Panama. Cornwall had been on watch since 10 p.m.; it was almost his turn to rest. Slowly, 2 a.m. came and Cornwall was relieved of his duty.

He found the only available place to sleep — a wet concrete sidewalk.

"We slept in full gear hanging on to our M-16A2s," Cornwall says. "It sounds uncomfortable, but we were so tired it didn't matter. We slept knowing anything could happen at any time."

"Our sleeping conditions improved when a radioman and I found an abandoned car to sleep in," Cornwall adds jokingly.

He couldn't help wondering how his friends and family were spending their Christmas.

Cornwall returned to Camp Lejeune on Valentine's Day with the rest of Delta Co. "Everything seems to have changed since I've been back," Cornwall says. "I know I was only there three months, but everything seems different. When I left I was medically prepared to lose at least 30 percent of the company, but we didn't. Delta Co. is an awesome set of guys; they did a hellified job."

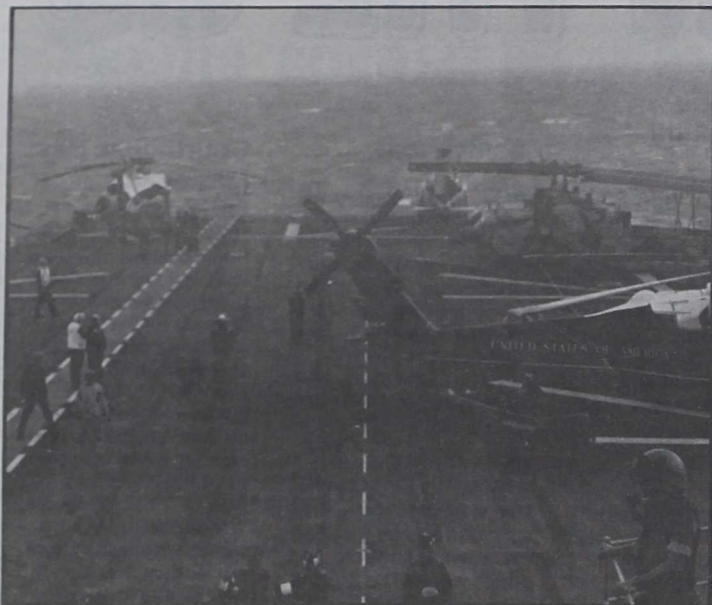

Medium Helicopter Squadron-264, both based at MCAS New River.

In the early morning hours of Feb. 15, scores of Secret Service agents boarded the embarked helicopters and joined the three HMX-1 helicopters flying to the coast.

Marines and Sailors gathered by nearly all of the ship's television sets to watch the Spanish language newscasts of the meetings that were being broadcast by Colombian stations. The fact that few of those watching understood what was being said didn't seem to matter, as most eyes were glued to the broadcasts.

Though the president's schedule didn't permit time for a personal visit to the ship, he did talk to those aboard over the air waves.

Bush's voice broke over the ship's communication system, thanking the Sailors and Marines for their contribution in making his visit a success.

"Greetings from the American people,"

the president said. "It's a great comfort knowing you guys are out here somewhere not too far away. I'm grateful to you. I'm grateful to you for your service to your country."

As the president spoke, he explained the purpose of his visit and told everyone listening that his meetings with the Colombian leaders to discuss and plan interdiction efforts to stop the narcotics growers and pushers went well.

"As I head back, I want to thank the officers and men, Sailors and Marines aboard *Nassau*," he continued. "Thank you for what you're doing ... not just for this special mission, but for what you do every day in defense of the greatest country on the face of the earth. God bless you all!"

Everyone who was part of the Navy/Marine Corps team who worked so hard to do the job at hand, knew from the president's words that the mission they embarked on 10 days earlier, a mission most were assigned to just days before leaving, was a resounding success.

# Shipboard Marines

While Marines often tramping around in the streams of Camp Lejeune relish the vast expanse it provides once they go aboard to have to find nooks and crannies for a shop.

Many don't even realize how much training area Camp Lejeune provides until they're forced to find it. The pitching, rolling aircraft carrier forget how many miles of runway Camp Lejeune provides for running on their umpteenth lap around the deck. There are more than 100 miles of roadway and 50 miles of off-road trails for running.

## Interesting experiences

As amphibious (or expeditionary) Marines are now more accustomed to being housed on a vessel before they're assigned to the U.S. Navy at some time in their career. When they are, the training on the ship can sound very interesting experience. Being aboard a ship like the *Nassau* (LHA-4) is not so bad. A son realizes he could be aboard a Ship Tank or Landing Ship. They don't have the luxury of a flight deck, but training can nonetheless be very different from what it is at a base.

Probably the single biggest training program aboard a ship is the "chilly depths below." There's only so far a person can go before an abrupt ship could sink to the chilly depths below.

For that, the *USS Nassau* (LHA-4) has very distinct advantages. *Nassau's* flight and hangar deck has wide open spaces (although sometimes cluttered by helicopters throughout) for all types of training.

## Room to move

For the Marines of Marine Corps Air Station Camp Lejeune assigned aboard the *Nassau*, the flight deck was at a premium. The flight deck was used for small arms firing as well as the almost

# Shipboard training helps Marines appreciate land

While Marines often complain about tramping around in the woods and streams of Camp Lejeune, many of them relish the vast expanse of training area it provides once they go aboard a ship and have to find nooks and crannies to set up shop.

Many don't even realize just how much training area Camp Lejeune has until they're forced to fastrope onto a pitching, rolling aircraft deck. People forget how many miles of roads and trails Camp Lejeune provides for running until they're on their umpteenth lap around the flight deck. There are more than 400 miles of roadway and 50 miles of sidewalks at Camp Lejeune with hundreds of additional off-road trails for running.

## Interesting experience

As amphibious (or expeditionary as Marines are now more accurately titled) forces, Marines can no doubt expect to be housed on a vessel belonging to the U.S. Navy at some time during their career. When they are, they realize that training on the ship can sometimes be a very interesting experience.

Being aboard a ship like the USS Nassau (LHA-4) is not so bad when a person realizes he could be aboard a Landing Ship Tank or Landing Ship Dock where they don't have the luxury of a hangar and flight deck, but training on any ship can nonetheless be very different from what it is at a base.

Probably the single biggest obstacle to a training program aboard a ship is space. There's only so far a person can run before an abrupt slip could send him into the chilly depths below.

For that, the USS Nassau (and other LHAs) has very distinct advantages. The Nassau's flight and hangar decks provide wide open spaces (although somewhat encumbered by helicopters scattered throughout) for all types of training.

## Room to move

For the Marines of Marine Forces Caribbean 1-90 who were recently assigned aboard the Nassau, training space was at a premium. The flight deck was used for small arms firing and fastroping as well as the almost daily

physical training sessions, and the hangar deck was used for additional fastrope training.

Planning and coordination for the training to be accomplished aboard ship have to be tight, according to 2nd Lt. M. R. Nobsch, platoon commander, Weapons Plt., Lima Co., 3rd Bn., 6th Marines.

## Meticulous planning

"Planning has to be complete and take into consideration the space available, unit size, time needed [so as not to interfere with flight operations] and the ship's schedule [because of things like general quarters and other drills the ship is required to have]," Nobsch said. "We have a specific principle we follow for training: talk through, walk through, run through and evaluate. On the ship we cycle small units through the training with more emphasis on the talk-through part."

During three weeks aboard the Nassau, the Ground Combat Element Marines from Lima Co., 3/6 and Delta Co., 2nd Recon. Bn., had the opportunity to perform functional checks on machine guns, fire M-16A2 rifles with Occluded Eye Gunsights to set battlesight zero, and fire 9mm pistols and shotguns for familiarization.

## Fastroping

Marines assigned to the GCE also got to fastrope onto the flight deck of the ship, training that, according to Capt. D. E. Liddell, company commander, Lima 3/6, is much more difficult than it sometimes appears.

"There's no tougher fastrope training than to slide from a moving helicopter to the moving deck of a ship," Liddell said. "We did 150 Marines with full combat equipment onto the flight deck without a single injury. That says a lot for the talk-through training we did beforehand."

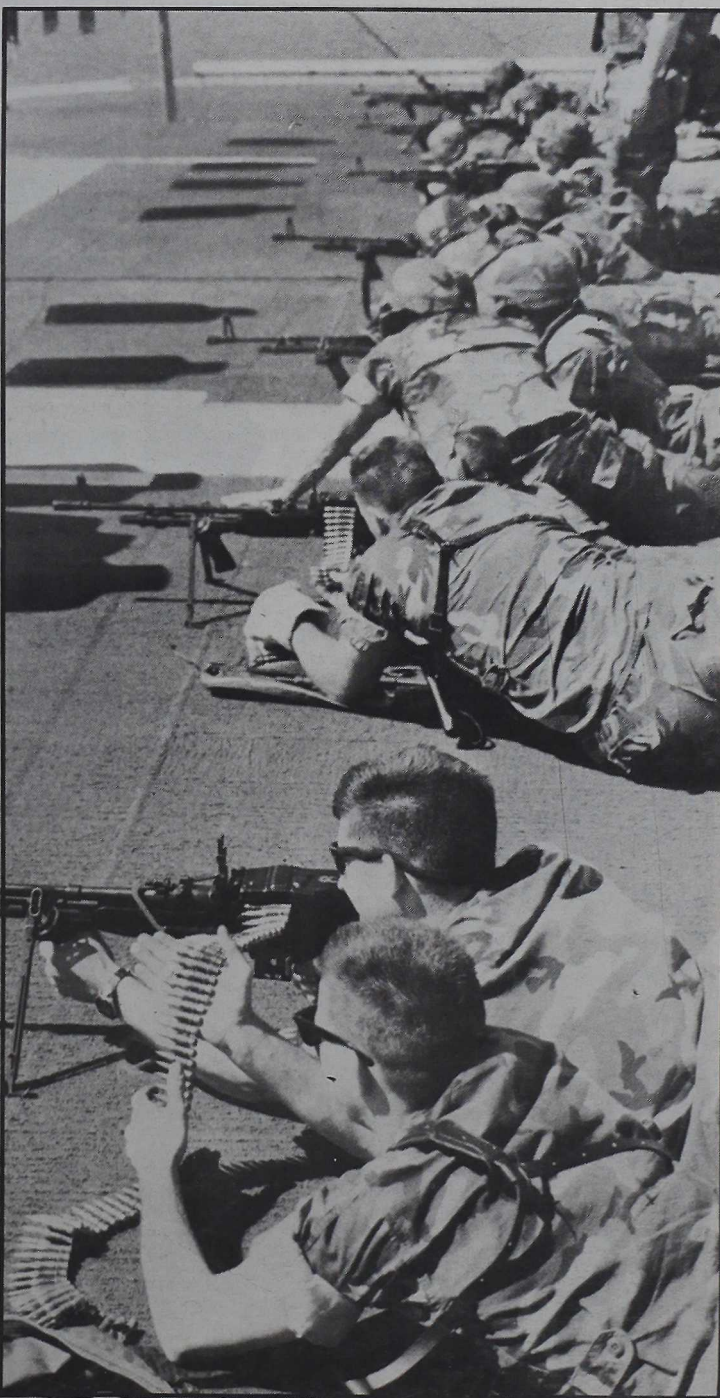
Prior to going up on the flight deck, the GCE Marines also did static fastroping inside the hangar deck of the ship.

Even when Marines are aboard a ship it seems they take advantage of every opportunity to do some training.

In such cases, the Marines will no doubt relish the vast expanses of training area they have when they are on dry land.

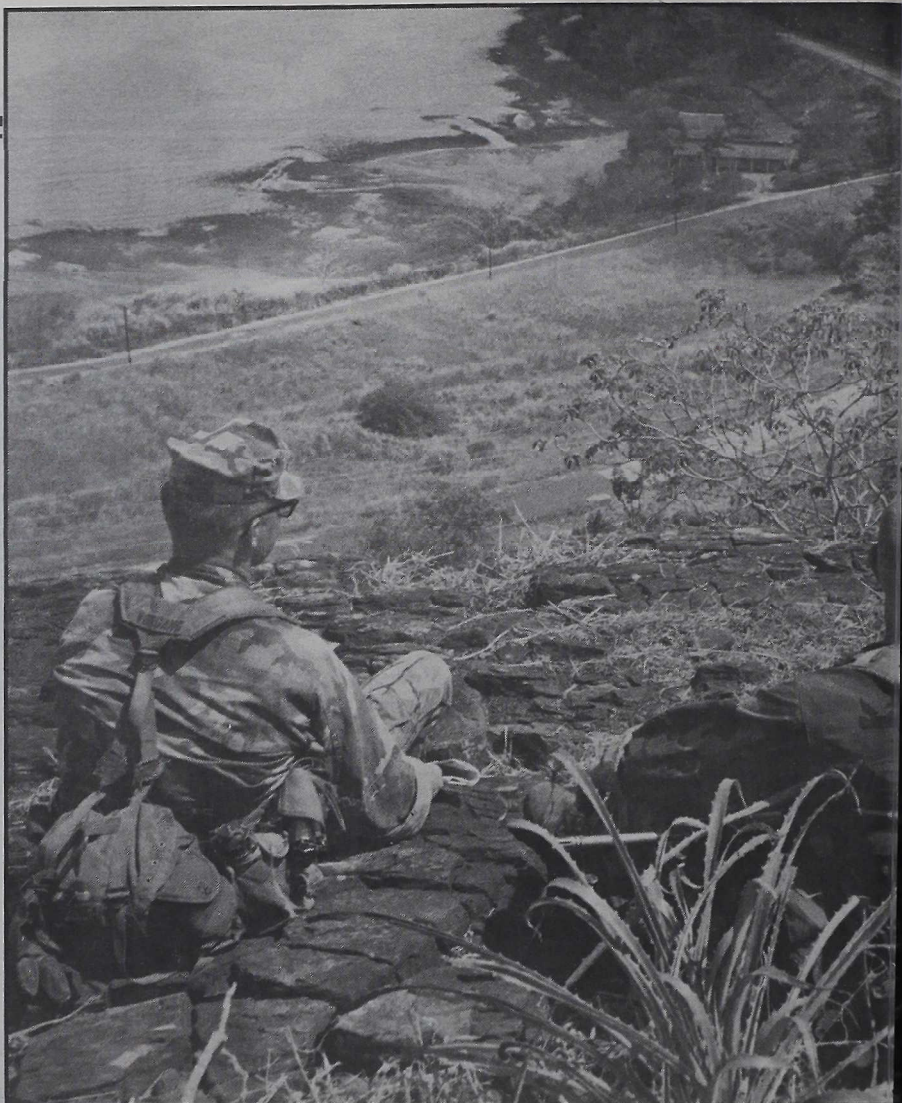

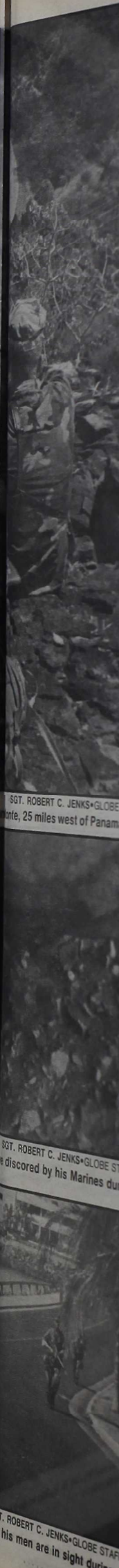

## Panama Marine discovers tunnel

PANAMA — "I was scared," said Lance Cpl. Terrance Rogers, remembering when another Marine lowered him by his boots into a one-by-one-foot hole that opened into a tunnel once used for a weapons cache site. "All I kept thinking about was booby traps, or rats, or bugs."

Fortunately for Rogers, the only things he found were several rounds for a Russian AK-47 assault rifle, containers for grenades and squashed fruit.

The tunnel, the first found following Operation Just Cause, was discovered by Marines from Marine Forces Panama during a company-sized sweep conducted Feb. 17-18.

During the sweep, India Co., 3rd Bn., 6th Marines, searched, inch-by-inch, four kilometers of the Vaca Monte Peninsula. The peninsula, located on the Pacific Ocean, 25 miles west of Panama City, was formerly the training base of Noriega's elite Special Anti-Terrorist Security Unit.

"This was the first extensive large-scale sweep we conducted in Panama," said Capt. Blaine Vorgang, India Co. commander. "It was also the first time I had ever seen an entire company moving through the jungle on-line."

One of the challenges, according to Vorgang, was maintaining command and control over that many Marines in terrain ranging from dense jungle to open pasture and steep hills.

"We had to go over the area with a fine-toothed comb," Vorgang said. "There had been reports of weapons caches in that area, so we mounted out and humped across the peninsula looking for anything suspicious."

The first day, 2nd Plt. discovered a hollowed-out cave beneath a cliff. It could only have been used for a bunker or a cache site, according to Staff Sgt. Ernie Hatcher, platoon sergeant.

"The design and the location of the position could have been used for only one thing," Hatcher said. "It was obviously made for military use. It's a good thing there was no one there because if there was, we would have had a tough time digging them out. Whoever built it knew what they were doing. One could cover the entire road leading into Vaca Monte (a port city)."

When the company launched its sweep, it faced terrain of almost every type. Crossing a fence on-line, the company made its way across a rough, open pasture that was pock marked by the herds of cattle that had grazed there during the rainy season two months earlier. The pasture land gave way to two steep hills that were ringed by thorny scrub of many varieties including the infamous Black Palm, a vicious little palm that protects its fruit from animals by growing porcupine like spines on its trunk and fronds.

On the final day of the sweep, Cpl. Gerald Galloway, Vorgang's driver, discovered the tunnel on a ridge overlooking the fishing port, the aqua-blue of the Pacific a scenic backdrop.

"We were all pretty excited when we found the tunnel," said Rogers. "It showed that we were serious about checking the entire peninsula out for caches, and that we weren't just doing it to get it over with."

After checking the tunnel entrance for traps, Rogers was lowered into the tiny hole head first, carrying a 9mm pistol and a flashlight. Once inside, he said, it was pretty spooky.

"I didn't know what to expect," said Rogers. "They needed a Marine to check it out and that's what I did. I didn't like it, but it needed to be done. That's part of what being a Marine is all about."



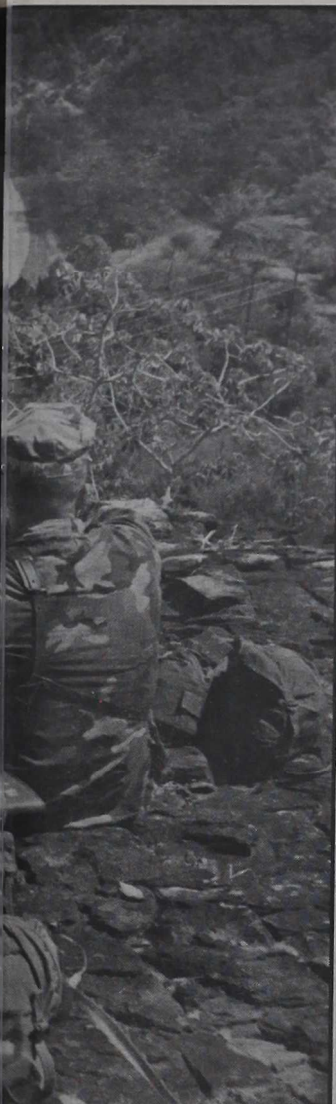

A census is like a painting. It illustrates who people are and where they are. It reflects the true nature of our society with all its goals, problems and preoccupations.

Census '90 is not just a collection of dry statistics, but in essence a crystal ball, which makes it possible to estimate future trends and is therefore essential to all kinds of planning: nationally, locally and publicly.

## Essential information

It is essential for knowing future economic manpower potentials, consumer needs, forthcoming school requirements, growth in metropolitan areas, potential Social Security costs, requirements for highways, utilities, parks, water, energy, hospitals, clinics and employment.

The 1990 Decennial Census takes place April 1. Most residents have already received theirs in the mail and are requested to fill it out and return it immediately to avoid a visit by a census taker.

Federal law, Title 13 of the U.S. Code, requires individuals to complete the census form to the best of their knowledge. It also guarantees confidentiality. No one will see the answers except Census Bureau

employees. These employees can be sent to jail if they release any information.

Census counts are used to decide the number of members of Congress each state can send to the U.S. House of Representatives, a right which is guaranteed in Article 1, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution. It also determines

representation at the state, county and local levels of government.

Census results will be used to distribute federal, state and local funds for education, housing, health services, transportation planning, job training, public works, child care and parks.

The information collected is grouped

into statistical totals enabling government, business and industry to plan more effectively.

The census contains questions concerning sex, ethnic background, age, marital status, housing characteristics and costs.

It's the only chance every 10 years to get a complete picture of the population and housing; so, take a few minutes to "stand up and be counted" and help your community.

Fort Fisher's recreation center has a weight room, racquetball court, jacuzzi, sauna and pool tables.

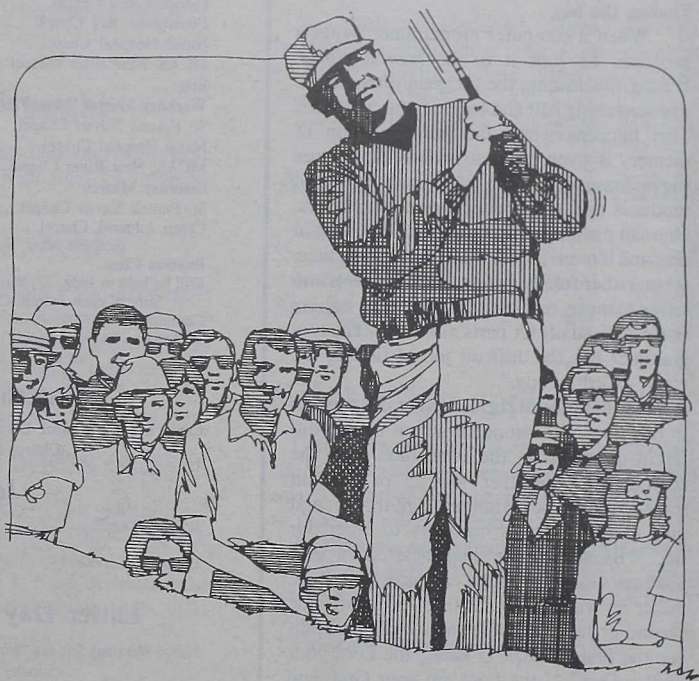

#### Finding the bug

When a computer programmer writes a program, he runs it to see how it works. During this testing, the program often comes to a screeching halt and locks up the computer. This happens when the same location of memory is given two instructions. Sometimes the program follows the wrong instruction and produces one of the classic computer errors. One can picture an electron marching along in line, and it receives two orders at the same time. The programmer has the difficult job of finding the error, called a "bug."

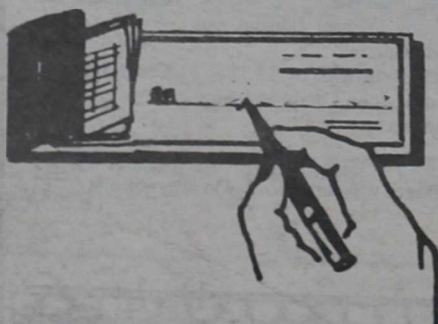

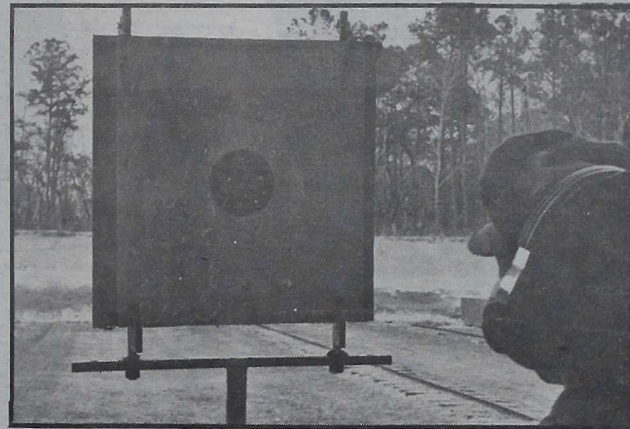

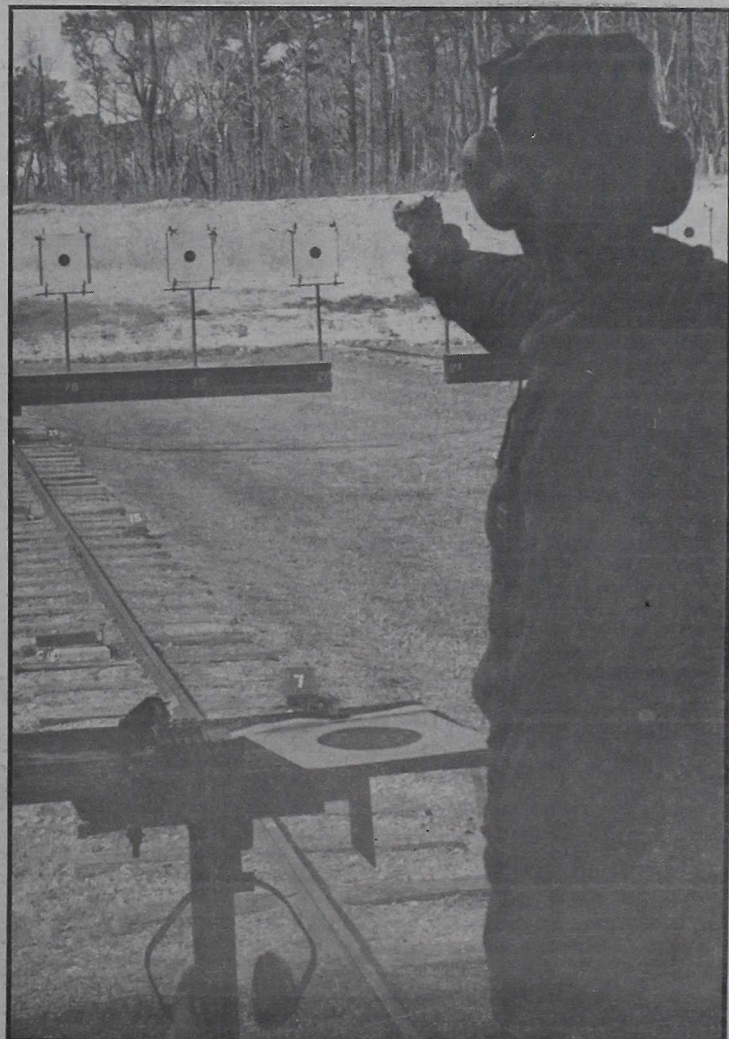
