Counselors will sit down and work out a budget with people. If they need money and fit the requirements, they will refer them to Navy Relief or another agency that can help them.

The FSC also teaches stress management skills on a one-on-one or group basis. Holm said the FSC would be glad to come over and give a stress management class to wives groups that are having a meeting.

"The most important thing the FSC offers anybody is information. We point people in the right direction, no matter what the problem. We will do the walking through the yellow pages and the calling. If we can't give them the answer, we will give them the number or the person who can," Holm said.

Beginning in September, an Away Wives Group will meet at Tarawa Terrace or Midway Park where they will talk with a counselor and a facilitator and discuss their feelings and problems.

Whether it is anger that their husband is leaving or depression that he is gone, the wives learn to recognize those feelings and how to deal with them.

Holm said a program is underway, and he perceives a lot of get-togethers and block parties. A letter-writing class might be given to help those with poor communication skills.

"I know many people feel hesitant to come into the FSC because they think it will look bad, or people will think they need counseling, or they're afraid their husband's command will find out," said Holm. "The command isn't told unless they need to be notified in order to solve a problem."

Middle East continues as hot spot

In an unprecedented move Saturday, the U.N. Security Council voted to enforce an embargo by allowing warships to stop Iraqi vessels by force, if necessary. This blockade is designed to create severe shortages of goods of every kind against the 18 million-plus people of Iraq; subsequently forcing Saddam Hussein to back out of Kuwait.

The 4th MEB, its backbone being Marines from Camp Lejeune left Morehead City last week. Those Marines hooked up with the 13-ship task force of Amphibious Group Two, commanded by RAdm. John B. LaPlante, and sailed to the region where elements of the 7th MEB are already pitched in the desert.

Developments over the weekend included 52 American dependents escaping from Iraq across the Turkish border to the north. Reports claim the 13-car convoy made it to Ankara, the capitol, while Saddam Hussein toyed with world emotions by broadcasting images of British hostages, including children. Meanwhile, Ambassador Nathaniel Howell and seven others remained in the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait, defying Iraqi orders to close by Friday.

While the future may hold diplomatic solutions to the crisis, Marines, alongside elements of the 82nd Airborne Division, continue to prepare themselves for possible combat.

The 4th MEB is commanded by MGen. Harry Jenkins Jr., and the 7th MEB is commanded by MGen. John I. Hopkins.

The Secretary of the Navy has given the authority to order to active duty up to 3,000 members of the Selected Marine Corps Reserve.

At this time, the Marine Corps does not anticipate a requirement to activate reserve forces. This decision is in line with our consistent policy of organizing, training and equipping our active forces for combat.

Traffic cone system suspended Sept. 4

The "cone system" used to control rush-hour traffic on base will be suspended Tuesday in order to reassess traffic flow and traffic patterns.

The current system was initiated 20 years ago as a temporary solution to control increased traffic flow during rush hour. This temporary solution has persisted, creating confusion among visitors and newcomers to the base. Also, since then, many improvements have been made to Holcomb Boulevard and Highway 24 which allow those roads to accommodate increased traffic.

Base officials have decided it's time to reevaluate the need for the system. In addition to the safety problem caused by the reversible lane, the "cone system" results in too many people not being able to go where they want to go, or being forced to go where they do not want to go. OUR ENVIRONMENT

Pond scum or algae, it turns out, is a basic ingredient in our life.

But don't tell those holistic vegetarian types, lest they try marketing it in the produce section of your favorite grocery store.

Science has shown we survive by the ability of plants, algae and some bacteria to photosynthesize energy from the sun. The energy produced promotes growth of other plants and animals.

The earth has been using this means of producing energy and food from the beginning.

Since antediluvian times man has happily coexisted with nature. Nature in turn, has provided and cared for mankind from the beginning of this relationship.

The earth as the great provider has given us oral contraceptives from Mexican yams, and muscle relaxants from an Amazonian vine, traditionally used to poison darts.

Even today in China, plants are used in medicine.

However, as civilization progressed, man demanded more of the great provider. Because of man's ability to harness the natural forces around him, the Homo sapien species flourished.

The population growth of mankind could not be checked as easily by natural forces, as in lesser species. Though in many regions, even today, drought produces famine and death. Verdant conditions produce abundant food and birth rates increase.

Increased population gradually increased the stress on the environment, by crowding other plants and animals habitats out.

By the end of the next century, the world's population is expected to double, experts predict.

"By 2020, the people living in the tropics will grow to about five billion," said Peter Raven, director of the Missouri Botanical Garden, in a National Geographic report.

If severe deforestation continues, Raven contended it will accelerate climatic warming by loading more carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Without the trees, plants and even algae to absorb the excessive amounts of carbon dioxide, Raven predicted the corn belt may become the dust bowl in the future.

So management of our natural resources has become paramount.

Case in point is Camp Lejeune. In the 1930s most of the land was privately owned and most stands of timber had been logged. There was 6,000 acres of open farm land, according to Danny Marshburn, timber management forester, Environmental Management Dept., here.

When the Marine Corps purchased the land in the 1940s, an intensive forestry and wildlife management program was established.

Today, as a result, the aesthetics of the base and the wildlife population have improved remarkably, according to Marshburn.

It has only been in the last few decades that we have realized what a fragile state of coexistence we share with the earth.

As mankind has evolved to become the masters of the planet, we can no longer take its resources for granted.

Without our help, the great provider this earth is, will not provide for us infinitely.

It is time we assume a new role as caretaker.

Business as usual
Unit training tempo continues

While Camp Lejeune Marines deploy to the Middle East, joining other expeditionary Devil Dogs, for Operation Desert Shield, scheduled training for remaining units aboard base continues.

Generally, routines in 2nd MarDiv., MCB, and 2nd FSSG units, have not been disrupted by the deployment, according to training and operation departments at the major commands.

Training is still going as planned in division units, said MSgt. James Grochan, division training chief. However, Grochan's office is juggling some quotas and re-scheduling ranges and rifle range detachments to accommodate units. "We've experienced no major problems and MCB has been very cooperative in any re-scheduling we've had to do," he said.

Meanwhile the pace of action is considerably due to Desert Shield, L. J. Kimball, deputy chief of operations.

Red Cross

Pentagon minimizes emergency messages

The Pentagon has placed a "minimize" on emergency messages that can be sent through the Red Cross to Marines and Sailors in the Mediterranean and in Saudi Arabia.

"Right now, we can accept only three types of messages," said Evelyn Abrams, the Camp Lejeune Red Cross station manager. "They are births, serious illnesses and deaths, and they must all be verified."

Abrams said families who need to relay information to servicemembers should call the nearest Red Cross of-

fice first. They should have names and addresses involved including the doctor and phone numbers. As soon as the information is received, the message is sent.

If someone in the family is injured in an emergency, or they just haven't heard from a loved one while the message won't be sent.

"Sometimes it takes a while to get the message," she said. "We have to track down the person who wrote the statement. We're fairly picky about who we're not miracle workers."

"If people would get in contact with the Red Cross where they live, it makes a difference. Occasionally, we get calls from members who are so hysterical they can't do anything. In those cases, we get the message down."

There is Red Cross staff in the Mediterranean and messages to the troops.

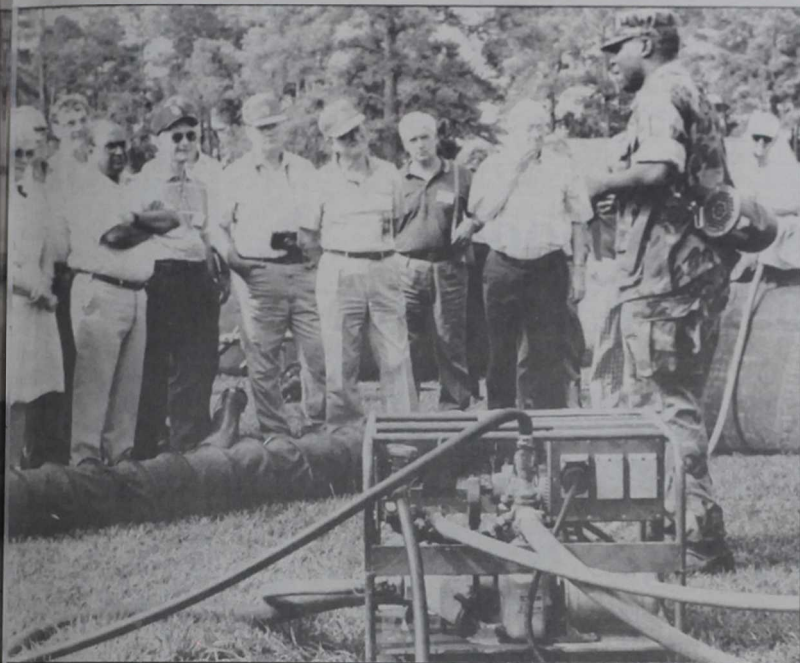

Civilians support mount-out

TMO provides buses, trains

The civilian employees aboard Camp Lejeune may not be leaving the base to join Marines serving in Saudi Arabia. However, they proved their dedication by packing up, trucking off and busing out thousands of Marines and tons of equipment to neighboring ports and air stations during the recent mount-out of deploying Marines.

One of the responsibilities of the 32 Traffic Management Office civilian workers included arranging more than 50 buses that took the Marines from their barracks to Morehead City.

When Camp Lejeune's transportation resources were used up and needed more, TMO took up the slack.

"Whenever we called them (TMO), they got the job done," said GySgt. James Ford, Logistics Movement Control Center, 2nd FSSG.

"During the last couple of weeks, we moved more than 11,000 troops by bus," said Ed Fountain, traffic manager, TMO.

Along with buses, TMO also loaded railroad cars with tanks and tons of engineering equipment. They also unloaded the gear at the port.

Besides the coordination of the rails, TMO also ensured the leathernecks had plenty of trucks to move the additional equipment that had to be embarked.

TMO didn't only participate in the moving of equipment and Marines going to the ships, they also were responsible for providing Marines a place to stash their personal gear such as extra clothing and stereos.

"The units would call LMCC. In turn, LMCC would call us saying Marines needed their gear stowed," said Capt. Robert McManus, traffic management officer, TMO.

TMO would then call the movers to pick up the gear and store it.

During the mount-out, TMO also had to performed their normal daily operations. These included receiving and shipping goods and equipment to support the base.

During one 24-hour period of the mount-out, TMO shipped out more than 160 trucks.

Other aspects that placed additional stress on the TMO crews were the shipping of Marine reservists and units deployed to Camp Dawson, W.Va.

"The reservists had just finished operation Solar Flare, here. Their gear had to be shipped back to their headquarters," McManus said.

TMO also got buses and trucks up to the engineers to bring them back in addition to pumping out buses for the units here.

This movement continued to push the TMO crews with cargo, especially when HQMC cancelled Combined Arms Exercise. Tons of equipment scheduled to be shipped to Twentynine Palms, Calif., had to be unloaded, then loaded again for the deploying units.

The many hours the civilians put into the Marines movement added up. Many of them clocked-in double shifts, making their work days last from 19 to 21 hours.

"We had employees volunteering their time to work more shifts to get the Marines out," said McManus.

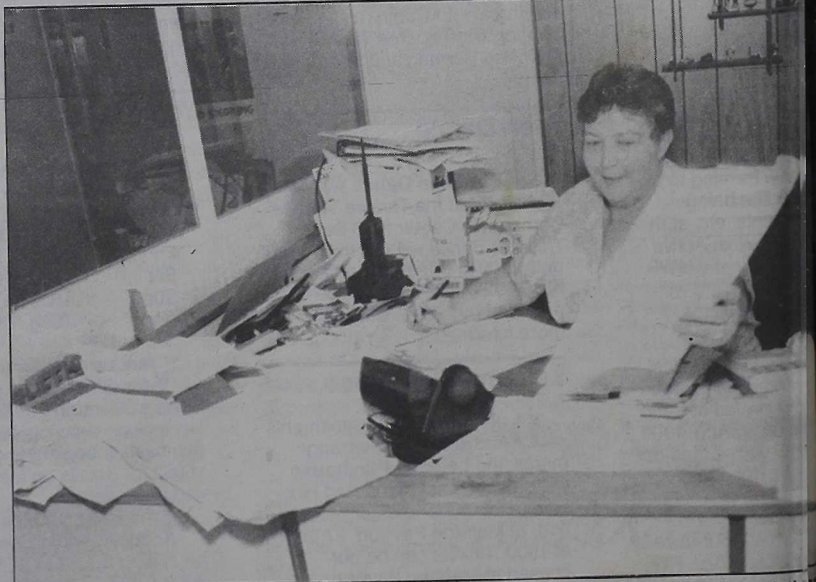
The employees also battled the rain and lightning to rig the rail cars to help get heavy equipment to the port as quickly as possible.

Mounds of paperwork also had to be completed for all the truck and rail cargo, adding more work for the civilians.

TMO's relationship with the deploying Marines doesn't end when the Marines leave. They'll also be there spending more long hours, scheduling the buses, trucks and tracks to bring the Marines home.

DRMS: Recycles, reutilizes DoD property

The mission of the Defense Reutilization and Marketing Service (DRMS) is to dispose of excess property generated by the military services and other Department of Defense activities. DRMS accomplishes this mission by reutilization within DoD, transfer to other federal activities, donation to qualified recipients, sale to the public or ultimate disposal by qualified service contractors.

The worldwide organization, headquartered in Battle Creek, Mich., employs more than 3,500 civilian and military personnel in five regions.

The Columbus region, headquartered at Columbus, Ohio, comprises 23 northeastern and midwestern states as well as Greenland, Bermuda and Cuba. The twelve southeastern states, Panama and Puerto Rico compose the Memphis region, headquartered in Memphis, Tenn. Fourteen western states, including Alaska, make up the Ogden region, operated from Ogden, Utah.

The European region, headquartered at Lindsey Air Station, Wiesbaden, Germany, oversees field offices in Germany, Iceland, the United Kingdom, Belgium, Italy, Spain, the Azores, Greece and Turkey.

The Pacific region is headquartered at

Items range from beds to bombers to tents

Camp H.M. Smith, Hawaii, and manages operations in Hawaii, Guam, Japan, Korea, Australia, the Philippines and Thailand.

Within the five regions are more than 200 Defense Reutilization and Marketing Offices located on or near major military installation in the United States and 19 foreign countries. It is here that the actual disposal of excess property is done.

The DRMOs receive more than 12,000 items of excess military equipment each workday that they classify and process through the DRMS system. These items cover a wide range of property — from air conditioners to automobiles, beds to bombers, and tents to typewriters.

DRMS's first priority is reutilization or reuse within DoD thus saving the cost of new procurement or uneconomical repair. Over the years, users of excess DoD property have saved themselves, as well as the American taxpayers, billion of dollars in procurement or repair costs.

Property is then looked at for transfer to civilian departments and agencies of the federal government. It then may be donated to authorized non-federal public

agencies and other specially designated recipients such as museums, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, schools or other qualified recipients.

If property cannot be reused, transferred or donated, it is made available to the public through sales held at the DRMOs or regions. Proceeds from these sales are returned to the U.S. treasury.

DoD property sometimes contains gold, silver or platinum-family metals. These precious metals are recovered where it is cost effective and turned in to the Defense Industrial Supply Center account and offered to government contractors at a minimal charge in return for an equal reduction in cost for manufacture of government items using these metals. The Precious Metals Recovery Program was established by a DoD directive that requires all DoD activities to participate. The PMRP has returned more than \$200 million to the government in the last decade.

DRMS is the sole manager for the disposal of most of the hazardous property generated by the military services. Hazardous property that cannot be reused or sold is disposed of through

commercial disposal companies. All disposal must comply with all applicable state and local environmental regulations. DRMS maintains control over the hazardous property and is a leader in environmental management.

DRMS also manages the Defense Reutilization and Marketing Program for the DoD. In cooperation with military activities, DRMS has established a Quality Program to identify recyclable material for return. The DRMOs sort materials and return them to the program generator.

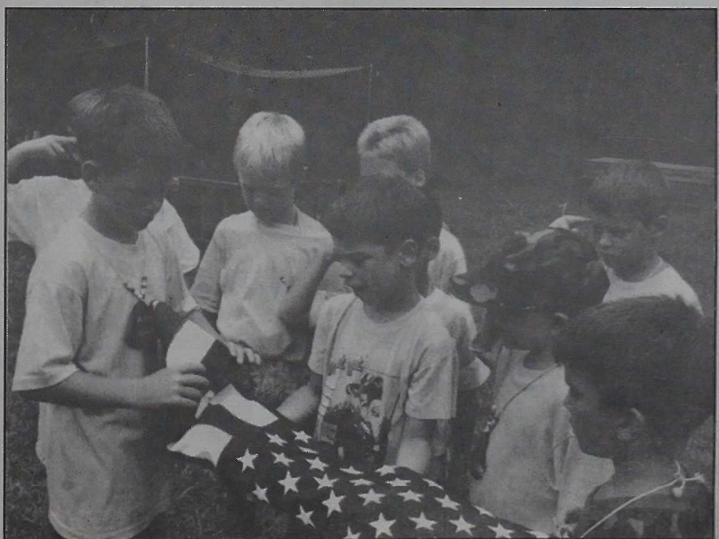

22nd MEU (SOC):

Marines reinforce embassy, citizens fl

MONROVIA, Liberia — Two hundred thirty-seven Marines from the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable) (MEU SOC) were flown into the American Embassy compound here Aug. 5, to boost security and aid in the drawing-down of the embassy staff.

The Marines had been standing by on Navy ships some 20 miles off the Liberian coast for 62 days when the decision was made to conduct the operation. The same CH-46 and CH-53D helicopters that carried the Marines in, were used to lift 79 embassy employees and American citizens out to the USS Saipan.

Hotel Co., BLT 2/4 Marines, commanded by Capt. Daniel S. Rogers, spotted armed rebels fleeing the vicinity as they moved to establish blocking positions outside the embassy compound. Sporadic small arms fire could be heard from outside the compound as the Marines set up defensive positions in and around the embassy compound.

Approximately 45 Marines were flown back to the ship Aug. 6, leaving one company (reinforced) remaining to provide security within the compound. Twenty-one more citizens were evacuated to Navy ships Aug. 6, bringing the number of evacuees to 100 over the two days.

"The operation was pulled off without a hitch," said LtCol. Richard L. Pugh, BLT 2/4 commander. The Wheeling W. Va. native accompanied MEU Commander, Col. Granville R. Amos and other MEU staff officers who observed the operation at the scene.

"The performance of the troops, especially the small unit leaders, was truly magnificent. It was a good simple plan and the extraction and reinforcement were executed flawlessly," Pugh said. "All the long hard MEU (SOC) training paid us big dividends throughout the planning and execution.

"Thank God for the United States and the Marines. They're always there to help when people are helpless, said one grateful woman before she carried her baby aboard the waiting CH-53 and her ticket to safety. "I'm ready to go, but I leave with mixed feelings," said one gentleman on his way to Providence, R.I. "It's hard to leave family behind who aren't American citizens. I fear for them and look forward to America helping Liberia.

"I hope we can help resolve the situation," said LCpl. Sean T. O'Connell, a 21-year-old infantryman from Santa Clara, Calif. "I have butterflies, but I'm confident in my training and really motivated to get to go ashore and help out."

"It's about time," said LCpl. Harbon W. Johnson from War, W. Va. The 20-year-old SAW gunner with Hotel Co. 1st Plt. "I'm ready to go in and do whatever the mission calls for and help people who want to leave."

"It's a little scary, but I've got faith in all my people. They know what they're doing and there shouldn't be any problems getting the job done," said Sgt. Stuart Bailey, a 27-year-old squad leader from Decatur, Ala.

"I was a little nervous coming in, not knowing whether we would be fired upon," said LCpl. Edward T. Nevglowski, 19, from Philadelphia. "I was confident about my ability to do my job. This is what we're all about. When the President needs us he makes the call and we do the job."

A Lighthouse

British chaplain guides Marines to safe waters

He appears to have an innate ability, much like a lighthouse which guides a ship to safe waters, to beckon people and lead them through their turmoil.

He doesn't look or sound imposing or strong. This 5-foot-4-inch man with balding brown hair, soothing, soft, Scottish accent, and friendly blue eyes, puts people at ease and allows them to open up.

Gordon Craig has had a lot of practice at counseling since becoming a Presbyterian minister in 1970. Perhaps he would still be preaching and working with the elderly in a church like his first one in St. Monane, a small fishing village on the east coast of Scotland, but, like it does to many men in Britain, the sea was calling him.

"I have a low threshold of boredom. When I was about 27 or 28 years old I looked at the other men in the clergy and thought, 'what can I do to avoid that?'" Craig explained. "Living by the sea, I had often thought of the naval chaplaincy."

After reading an article in a magazine about a Royal Navy chaplain who was serving with the Royal Marines, Craig knew what he wanted to do.

When he left his parish in 1974 to become a chaplain in the British Royal Navy (British chaplains do not have a rank) he wanted to serve with the Royal Marines. He couldn't have imagined at that time he would also become the first Royal Navy Chaplain to serve with the U. S. Marine Corps.

While attending the Royal Marines Commando Course at Lympstone, England, Craig first came in contact with the U.S. Marine Corps.

"There was a GySgt. Jerry Daniels, who ended up retiring as a sergeant major at a reconnaissance battalion, on the training team. He was part of a military exchange program. I was very impressed," Craig said.

After a few years Craig left the Royal Navy for three years to teach children with learning disabilities, but missing the comradeship, he returned to the service. "During the commando course we all worked together and shared everything — it became a habit to share. You don't see that outside the military," Craig said.

"In fact, Christians could learn a lesson from Marines in terms of helping each other," Craig opined. "God's spirit is found in people who



aren't regular church goers."

Reluctantly, in 1986 Craig had to leave the Royal Marines for a Royal Navy assignment. His next opportunity to serve with Marines was unexpected.

"I had a conversation with a senior chaplain in London about an exchange program with the U.S. Navy," Craig said. "Normally the change is with the Navy in Norfolk, Va., never with the Marines. Nobels was volunteering though so the senior chaplain said it might be possible to change it to the U.S. Marine I volunteered immediately."

Craig arrived in Jacksonville August 1989 and was assigned to 2 Recon. Bn.

"At first I thought it was a joke. I've run in seven marathons and he always stayed fit, but I knew Recon was tops," the 46-year-old said.

Craig had to wait over a week to meet the battalion because it was deployed to Camp Dawson, W.Va.

"My first introduction to the Marines was when they made an air drop and parachute jump return from West Virginia," Craig said. "That was the first time I met Lt. Col. M. E. Williams (then CO of 2 Recon. Bn.). He seemed like someone straight out of the movie."

After the introduction it didn't take long for Craig to get integrated into the battalion.

"I was worried that being a foreigner would be a problem. There is a big cultural difference between Europe and America," Craig said.

Any differences in the culture hasn't seemed to matter though. "I found Recon. very similar to working with the Royal Marines," he said.

One reason for his acceptance was his participation in the battalion's activities. He ran PT with the Marines every morning and went on hump.

When Recon. Indoctrination Platoon were conducting training exercises he spent a lot of time in the field giving more than church services.

After spending a year sharing the good and bad times with the Recon. Marines, Craig was recently transferred to the 1st Bn., 8th Marines, where he will finish his two-year exchange tour.

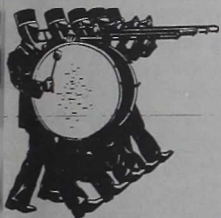

Base adopts measures to re-emphasize safe driving

BGen. Krulak takes steps to increase roadmaster patrols

"As commanding general of 2nd FSSG,

I take my job very seriously," BGen. Charles C. Krulak said during a press conference here, Aug. 10. "And safety — safety of Marines and the safety of civilians is part of my job and therefore I take that part of my job very seriously too."

The press conference was held to assure Onslow County residents that traffic

safety is a primary concern at Camp Lejeune. BGen. Krulak also emphasized his role as a citizen of Onslow county.

From Jan. 1 to July 31, 2nd FSSG vehicles have driven more than half a million miles, and have been involved in only two accidents. However, BGen. Krulak said that as far as he was concerned, one accident is too many. For this reason he has taken several steps to ensure all Marines are getting the word on driving safely.

Concerned

On the afternoon of Aug. 7, BGen. Krulak met with Group commanders to re-emphasize his concern on driver safety and what he expected of drivers. He asked them to re-examine all aspects of the military driver program and to ensure that each Marine was getting the fullest in safety instruction.

Steps toward safety

- He has also taken the following steps:
- Increase the number of roadmaster patrols to identify speeders.
 - Require that government vehicle drivers under 26 years of age must attend a defensive driving course.
 - Require drivers to take a semi-annual recertification course with emphasis on driving tactical vehicles in the civilian community.

He has also presented the civilian community with a **Vehicle Safety Telephone Hotline — 451-1366/1588**. Alleged unsafe driving reports involving a Marine Corps vehicle should include time and location of incident, descrip-

tion of vehicle and, if possible, number.

"You will see roadmaster and down the streets on ways 24 and 17," BGen. "These are the guys who to put the clamps on it."

Gunnery Sgt. Herb A. Sullivan, motor transport chief and roadmaster, said that the number of roadmaster patrols on the roads have increased.

"We are out here to ensure safety and maintenance standards are being adhered to," Sullivan, a policeman. We want to point out things that are doing wrong."

Although Sullivan's roadmaster patrol is not a tactical vehicle, it is not limited to 45 m.p.h., he said. "It's not so important to get going that you have to run it fast."

Group roadmaster's jurisdiction is limited to their unit's trucks and vehicles authorized to stop any government vehicle from any base.

The civilian community is also being patrolled by roadmasters. "The people seemed real pleased," Sullivan said. "They wave and pass by."

As far as people using the roadmaster hotline, it has been very slow, said to SSgt. Daniel Amos, transportation coordinator. Logistical Movement Control who receives the calls. He received two calls during the past week while the hotline was in service.

Although 2nd FSSG accounts for over 50 percent of total military vehicles on Camp Lejeune, BGen. Krulak said other commanding generals are also taking actions.

"I'm making darn sure our kids are well trained, and driving good equipment. They know the rules of the road, and, by golly, they know the rules of the road," Krulak said.

Lejeune commands provide an ideal opportunity to "suspend cone" system use because there is less traffic, thereby increasing traffic flow efficiency.

A normal traffic pattern will be clearer to motorists, be more convenient to a greater number of people, and allow military police to perform other law enforcement duties.

PMO has been studying traffic flow and areas that could still cause problems for motorists during rush hour.

Those areas include a half-mile distance between the main gate and the intersection of Holcomb and Brewster. Incoming traffic from Swansboro going to the Naval Hospital will have to move across two lanes of traffic to get into the right turn lane. At the same time, motorists from Jacksonville heading inbound will have to be aware of those drivers trying to get into the right turn lane at Brewster.

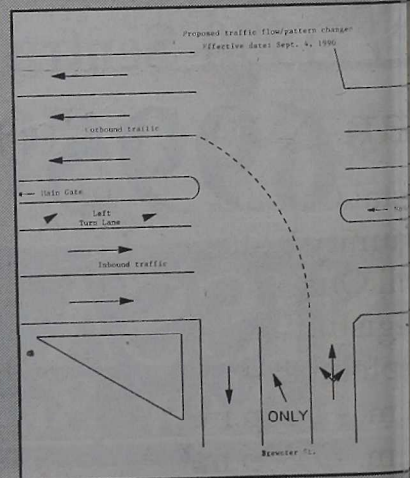
There will also be some other changes in the Brewster Street lanes at this same intersection (refer to the diagram). For traffic coming out from Brewster, the right

turn only lane will be altered so a left turn can also be made, or movement straight through the intersection will be possible. The left lane will remain for left turns only.

Signs will be posted along Highway 24 saying, "NO TRAFFIC CONE PATTERN ON CAMP LEJEUNE. PLEASE DRIVE SAFELY." Appropriate signs placed around the base will remind motorists of the new system.

PMO will closely monitor traffic conditions during the change; including the traffic light at Holcomb and Brewster, which if necessary, will be operated manually during heavy traffic periods. Appropriate adjustments will be made as necessary.

PMO encourages all motorists to follow traffic flow and general rules of the road. Base officials are confident that motorists will adjust easily to the new traffic pattern during the first week, or two. They believe the suspension of the "cone system" and testing of a regular traffic pattern will benefit most people who live and work at Camp Lejeune.
