## Commandant phases out self-propelled howitzers

### Highly upkeep and budget constraints lead to decision

The 3rd Bn., 10th Marines deactivated eight batteries and activated two on July 3, as a result of the Commandant's decision to phase out all self-propelled howitzers in the Corps. The 1st and 2nd Batteries, two self-propelled batteries that were deactivated, and the 5th Bn., were deactivated. The 1st Bn. was reactivated as the 1st Bn., which was deactivated. The 1109A3 155mm and M110A2 self-propelled howitzers were replaced by the M198 155mm towed. The reason for the change,

according to Maj. Larry Wolf, XO, is due to maintenance costs.

"There is a tremendous difference in maintenance costs between a self-propelled and towed howitzer," Wolf said. "As a result of the recent budgetary constraints, changes like this must be made."

The Commandant of the Marine Corps message that provided phase-out instructions writes that ultimately the M198 series will be replaced with an even lighter weight 155mm howitzer and describes the changes as a "cost-effective transition."

Not only is cost a factor, but also availability of parts. The Army is phasing out the 8-inch howitzer making the demand for parts less, Wolf said.

Not all self-propelled howitzers will be retired though. Adequate numbers will be maintained to ensure training compatibility with howitzers aboard maritime prepositioned ships, Wolf said.



## OUR ENVIRONMENT

Read this article, throw it away, and it just may out live you.

That's right. A recent archeological dig in a landfill found newspapers dating back 40 years. These were totally readable.

While newspapers are biodegradable over time, it doesn't deteriorate too well buried underneath 20 feet of trash and garbage. To make anything biodegradable requires sunlight and oxygen.

So if you want to get rid of this article and the paper it was printed on recycle it.

Everyone knows it's a good idea and good for the environment, but most would rather not bother with it. It's too much effort. It's too inconvenient. It's not worth it.

The list of excuses go on.

Recycling. Let someone else do it.

The public doesn't have to recycle — businesses do that. All people have to do is supply the raw material — the aluminum cans, the plastic bottles, the paper and cardboard, the glass jars they throw away daily.

Presently, the general volume breakdown of solid waste is: plastics, 18 percent; paper products, 38 percent; metals, 14 percent; glass, 2 percent; and other materials, 28 percent, according to a southern oil company.

In fact this oil company contends plastic is among the easiest material to recycle. Recycled plastics can be found in everything from fiberfill for ski parkas to carpet yarn. But in 1987, only 20 percent of all plastic soft drink bottles were recycled.

Even the loathsome Styrofoam cup, that will compete with the cockroach for world domination after we're dead and gone, can be recycled. It's being made into insulation board by enterprising companies.

While industries are being born because of recycling trash, getting it is a matter of establishing collecting points in communities.

On base, there are three collection points for newspapers. There is a bin on main side located at the fire department, across from the Hostess House. The other can be found at the Paradise Point fire department. The third is located at Tarawa Terrace's 7-day store.

However, Camp Lejeune does not have receptacles yet for plastic bottles, aluminum cans, or glass jars, according to Twylah Hardison, recycling specialist, Environmental Management Dept., MCB. "We are working toward getting these and finding haulers," she said. "Right now the nearest one is at the recycling center in downtown Jacksonville."

Before taking paper, glass, plastic and aluminum to a recycling center, or other collection points, separate each from the other. This can easily be done by having a bag for each material.

This ends the work for most people — except for taking it to a recycling center or collection point. At the recycling center, they will pay per pound for whatever it is you've brought.

So, before you throw this article away, think again. Would you really want to read this again in 40 years. Or make a profit from it.

The choice is yours.

## Military Safe-Sex order upheld in appeals court

The Armed Services so-called Safe-Sex order won another victory May 10 from the U.S. Court of Military Appeals, according to a HQMC news summary.

The court ruled that the services may require HIV-infected members to tell their prospective sexual partners, whether military or civilian, of their condition before having sexual intercourse and to take precautions when engaging in sexual activity.

"The court rejected a senior airman's argument that the order had no military purpose because his sex partner was a civilian," said Major Paul Capofari, a lawyer with the criminal division of the Army's Judge Advocate General's Staff at the Pentagon.

"An earlier case that had upheld the Safe-Sex order involved sex between two servicemembers. This decision makes it clear that preventing the spread of the disease is an important military objective, and hence, the order is valid."

### New \$140.1 million contract negotiated

The uniformed services, 3-year-old dependent dental plan will continue to be provided by Delta Dental Plan of California, under a new \$140.1 million contract awarded May 22.

The new \$140.1 million contract begins on July 1 and runs for one year, with four additional options.

The dental plan is a voluntary program in which sponsors of enrolled families pay a monthly premium by payroll deduction. Under the new contract, several benefits will be added or modified. All current benefits under the plan will be maintained.

upheld the government's position in each case that has come before it, Capofari said. Unprotected sexual intercourse may be allowed if it is a violation of Article 134, or as an aggravating factor in a case of homosexual intercourse.

Summarizing the court decision, Capofari said, "this and other recent rulings mean that members may be punished for disobeying the commander's Safe-Sex order if they don't warn their sexual partners of their condition — even if they take precautions during intercourse, when the partner is military or civilian."

The latest ruling answers the last open question in the AIDS prosecution area. The court held "it is the duty of the highest order" and is therefore enforceable under Article 90 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

**Turtle nests protected**


The advent of summer comes the arrival of a biologically significant event — the peak of the nesting season. The Loggerhead and Green Sea Turtle, both federally listed as endangered species, nest on Onslow Beach. Under certain conditions these turtles come ashore after laying their eggs near the base of the frontal dune above the high tide line. This can be an exciting and satisfying event to observe but several things must be kept in mind by prospective turtle watchers. These animals are protected under the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended. Section 9 of the Act prohibits any attempt to, or act intended to, harass, harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, capture, or collect" any listed species. This includes any activity that "significantly disrupts essential behavioral patterns." It is also illegal to collect, possess, or transport, in whole or in part, any species listed as threatened or endangered. Willful violation of the Act with regard to threatened and endangered species can be criminally punishable by a fine of up to one year and fines up to \$25,000 with additional civil penalties. Persons providing information leading to the criminal conviction of a violator can be awarded up to \$2,500. The law is further augmented by Base Order 1000. Any violation of the law or of the Base Order must be reported to the Assistant Chief of Staff for Training and Operations (phone number: 451-1690) or Assistant Chief of Staff, Environmental Management Department, Wildlife Division (phone number: 451-1690)/Base Game Warden (phone number 451-2196).

# Ticks: Potentially dangerous to humans

## Entomologist conducts two-year study of ticks

Just when we thought it was safe to enjoy the great outdoors this summer, newspaper, radio, and television reports tell us it may be hazardous to our health.

This time around it's not the hole in the ozone layer, or ultraviolet rays increasing risk of skin cancer. It's something more down to earth and very small in comparison.

No larger than a pin head, the tick is a pest that's gained national attention for its nasty habit of spreading germs that cause Rocky Mountain spotted fever, and/or Lyme disease.

Marine Corps Base officials concerned about this problem have called on Dr. Charles Apperson, doctor and professor of entomology, North Carolina State University, to conduct a two-year study of the tick here.

The study, according to Charles Peterson, director, Environmental Management Dept., will address such questions as, how Lyme disease is being transmitted, and the density of tick populations and bite occurrences.

"The study is aimed at making a healthier environment for the Marines to train in," Peterson said.

Lyme disease was recognized as a distinct disease in 1975 after several children, living close to each other in the town of Old Lyme, Conn., developed arthritis. In the northeastern United States, the deer tick, *Ixodes dammini*, is the transmitter of the Lyme spirochete, a spiral-shaped bacteria.

Though the deer tick has not been found in North Carolina, the spirochete has been found in some lone star and black-legged ticks, common to the coastal plains. But how the bacteria arrived in this state is a topic of speculation. It is also one question Apperson seeks to answer during the study.

At this point in the study, Apperson can only give an educated guess as to how the bacteria got here. "It could've been transmitted by migrating birds," he said. "Forty-three states now report the spirochete, and it is spreading south."

The extensive study will focus on sampling areas where people are likely to come in contact with ticks. Apperson's research assistants, Tim Evans, a research biologist, and John Ouellette, a student and temporary wildlife technician, will collect weekly samples from each location for the next two years.

The researchers will trap animals ranging from snakes to mice to black bear.

"This will determine what wildlife harbor the tick," Evans said.

Perhaps the easiest way of collecting ticks is walking through the brush. To collect more than what gets on his own clothes, Ouellette will use a drag made of a wooden handle with a trailing felt cloth.

Evans and Ouellette are not alone in this endeavor. "We've coordinated (the program) through the medical people at SOI, Engineers School and Field Medical School," Ouellette said.

The schools will play a key role in the study, contended Apperson. "They will help us quantify the attack rate and rate of infection on troops."

In the second year, the study becomes more intensive, sampling areas and sectors systematically.

Once a week the team will take the captured ticks to Raleigh. There they dissect, stain and scrutinize the ticks, looking for spirochetes.

Talking about ticks is not for the squeamish. They prefer feeding on blood. Each meal is taken from a different type of host: human, animal, reptile, etc.

However, ticks aren't too mobile, but are patient pests. They cluster on leaf litter, blades of grass, or shrubbery, then attach themselves to a passing animal.

Once a tick is on a host, it crawls upward in search of a place on the skin where it can attach to take a blood meal. The tick's mouth parts are barbed, making it difficult to remove the tick from the skin. Additionally, the tick manufactures a glue to hold its mouthparts in place. The female will usually feed for eight to 12 days until it is full.

The spirochete causing Lyme disease, is a similar one found in that of syphilis. The disease can easily be treated by antibiotics if diagnosed early.

However, clinical diagnosis in laboratories do not follow a standardized test, because of different Lyme testing serums in the marketplace, Apperson continued. "So lab tests may diagnosis a patient inaccurately."

The Center for Disease Control, Lyme disease branch, is taking steps to develop a standardized test for labs to follow.

Meanwhile Apperson and his research staff will continue their two-year study of ticks and Lyme disease here.

"Anything we learn from the study will be helpful in developing strategies (to deal with Lyme disease)," he concluded.

## Tick-borne diseases detectable, treatable

Ticks have long been pests of humans and animals in North Carolina. From the larval to the adult stages, ticks attach to a living host and feed on the host's blood. In doing so, they may transmit germs that cause Rocky Mountain spotted fever and/or Lyme disease.

Lyme disease can have serious consequences for humans if left untreated. But not all ticks carry organisms of the Rocky Mountain spotted fever and Lyme disease bacterium, called spirochete.

However, "some people do have a natural immunity to it," said Dr. Charles Apperson, doctor and professor of entomology, North Carolina State University, "Others develop more severe symptoms."




Lyme disease has three stages of progression.

**Stage I** involves a rash and flu-like symptoms. Within 30 days of infection, a rash (erythema migrans) occurs at the site of the tick bite. Twenty to 50 percent of Lyme disease patients do not exhibit the rash, which often delays diagnosis. The rash will look like an irregular-shaped red blotch, or a bright red ring around the blotch that gradually expands over several days and clears in the center to form a bull's eye pattern. The rash can vary from one to 18 inches.

Later, skin lesions may occur away from the site of the bite when the spirochete spreads. The rash is usually accompanied by fatigue, a headache, a stiff neck, muscle aches and pains, and a general feeling of discomfort.

**Stage II** occurs several weeks later and include cardiac and neurological symptoms. Neurological complications occur in about 15 percent of the patients and can involve inflammation of the brain, inflammation of the nerve roots, and Bell's palsy (transitory facial paralysis). In most instances these symptoms disappear after lasting several months. Cardiac abnormalities occur in about 8 percent of patients. Symptoms include dizziness, shortness of breath, and heartbeat irregularities. Within several weeks these symptoms disappear.

**Stage III** is distinguished by arthritic problems that may appear two years after the rash. Patients may also experience pain, swelling, and elevated temperature in one or more joints. Some patients may

# 22nd MEU enjoys 'painting the town'

CANNES, France—The picturesque coastline and majestic hills of this French Riviera resort city captivates the imagination of many who gaze upon it. The Marines and Sailors of the Mediterranean Amphibious Ready Group 2-90 were not immune to the appealing scenery from their ships anchored just off shore.

Visiting the beaches, shops, clubs and restaurants was foremost on the Marines' minds at liberty call, however, a group of 25 volunteers had other ideas for "painting the town."

In Cannes, the "needy" go to Marcel Vallat for food and shelter. He, in turn, sought help from the Navy and Marine team to paint his building.

Vallat contracted the United Service Organization about their community relations programs abroad in search of manpower for the fix-up job.

"The ladies from the USO came aboard the USS

*Saipan* for a port brief and informed us of Vallat's request," said Lt. Charles R. Kessler, 22nd MEU Chaplain. "We passed the word at worship service and through the unit's command chains that we needed 25 workers for the job. We got more than 70 Sailor and Marine volunteers."

Kessler, along with the *Saipans* chaplain, LtCmdr. Dennis E. Spangler, pared the crew to 25, most of them from the BLT's engineer platoon. On the last warm, sunny day in port, the group lent their helping hands.

"Javis faim mennis," meaning "I was hungry," is the slogan for Vallat's outreach program to care for the homeless and hungry of Cannes. "I wanted to help," was the common response by the volunteers including Navy Seaman Glenn E. Hebert.

"I like helping people," said LCpl. Vinnie Viviani, 22, of Bronx, N.Y. Viviani was one of the 13 Marine volunteers from H&S Co.

Another was LCpl. Phil Lamb, 20, of Pittsburgh.

"I wanted to see more than the usual... I wanted to experience the real France."

"We have the tools and the skills for the job and we like to help people when we can." Cpl. Jim W. Chapman, 21, of Marinette, Wis., had the men and equipment in place, the color left was determining which color paint to use. Vallat spoke no English and one Guy M. Billyou, Weapons Co., BLT 2-90, spoke broken French.

Once the initial confusion cleared and everyone broke into organized groups, everyone worked on assigned segments. They overcame snafus using American ingenuity; tearing garbage for drop cloths and using parts of a fire extinguisher for stirring sticks. It wasn't long before the drab gray walls were painted beige.

Having conquered the language barrier, the volunteers were able to get the job done, answering goodwill with goodwill.

# ECC teams responsible for smooth evacuation

WITH THE SIXTH FLEET, ABOARD THE USS SAIPAN (LHA-2) — More than 2,000 Camp Lejeune Marines and Sailors are on standby off the coast of Liberia prepared to evacuate American citizens from that war-torn country.

The 22nd MEU (SOC) is poised for a Noncombatant Evacuation Operation to keep American citizens out of cross-fires between rebel and government forces there.

For this mission, one group of Marines will be very busy. The MEU Service Support Group-22 Evacuation Control Center has organized teams that are responsible for the smooth evacuation of an estimated 1,400 Americans living there if the need arises.

### Quick and safe

The ECC teams are tasked with ensuring that those people who want to leave the country are evacuated in a quick and safe manner.

Setting up is the most time consuming part of an evacuation, according to MSgt. Carl Langwiser, NCOIC of the ECC teams. The teams must keep the evacuees calm and reassure them that they are there to help, so the teams can get to work.

When the ECC stations are established, the teams begin the evacuation process by separating and classifying people in evacuation order.

"Our primary responsibility is to get American citizens and their families out," Langwiser said. "We'll also evacuate diplomats and citizens of other countries, if we're asked."

Once prioritized, the evacuees are moved to a second station.

### Search station

"The search station is where the Marines' training and skill really show... where knowing their job is most

important," said Maj. William J. Berger, XO, MSSG-22. "The Marines must be able to interface with the evacuees because people display all kinds of emotions at a time like this. They are Americans, and they tend to get angry, nervous or distraught at the thought of being subjected to a search by American Marines."

The ECC Marines must explain the importance of the search — that it's for the safety of everyone concerned, according to Berger.

### Limited search

For an evacuation in Liberia, the search should be limited since there is little threat that any of the evacuees

might be a terrorist. Instead of a full-scale search, the ECC teams will pat-down some of the evacuees and use a metal detecting wand to see if anyone is carrying weapons. By using the wand, the time involved in evacuating everyone is reduced, according to Langwiser.

### Expedient processing

"We want to move people through the process as quickly as possible and reduce their frustration," Langwiser said. "In practice, before the MEU was deployed, the teams processed between 75 and 100 people per hour. I figure we'll be able to process between 250 and 300 people an hour during

this evacuation because we're required to search everyone as thoroughly."

From the search area, the evacuees are led to the manifest area, the ECC. Finally they are moved in groups of 10 to 15 people to the ship, the evacuees are transported to a friendly or neutral country.

### Hard work

If the evacuation becomes necessary, the ECC teams really have their work cut out for them. But, like all Marines, they are prepared to do whatever they are asked to do, according to Langwiser.



says he had several reasons for taking 140 Marines for the June 26 visit.

"I had an uncle who spent 13 years in a VA hospital. I noticed how much he and the other patients enjoyed visitors," Mayfield said. "Now I'm in a position to influence these lives by bringing my Marines to visit."

He also said he thought that talking with veterans would motivate the Marines and put them back in touch with the reason they joined the Corps.

Chris Chambers, head of the hospital's volunteer service, divided the group and sent each in different directions. A fragile man sat slumped in a wheelchair in the corner of the day room. His thin gray hair was freshly combed and he sat looking expressionless at his hands. One of the Marines knelt and took his hand. The old man looked up, his eyes began to sparkle. He couldn't speak, but a sudden tight grip told the Marine his visit was appreciated.

Lance Cpl. Durand Wilson, 2nd Plt., said he really liked the visit. "I especially liked the three men I talked to, they had so much to say and were so funny."



## Weather terms to know

**Tropical disturbance:** A moving area of thunderstorms in the tropics that maintains its identity for 24 hours or more.

**Tropical depression:** Rotary circulation at surface, highest constant wind speed is 38 mph.

**Tropical storm:** Distinct rotary circulation, constant wind speed ranges 39-73 mph.

**Hurricane:** Pronounced rotary circulation, constant wind speed of 74 mph or greater.

**Storm warnings:** May be issued when winds of 55-73 mph are expected.

**Hurricane watch:** Is issued for a coastal area when there is a threat of hurricane conditions within 24-36 hours.

**Hurricane warning:** Is issued when hurricane conditions are expected in a specified coastal area in 24 hours or less.

**Flash flood watch:** A flash flood is possible in area; stay alert.

**Flash flood warning:** A flash flood is imminent; take immediate action.

## Dangerous season calls for preparation

Hurricane Hugo was the most devastating storm in North Carolina's history, according to the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety. Two deaths, \$1 billion in damages, and hundreds were left homeless in this state after Hugo slammed into Charleston, S.C. What damages would occur to Camp Lejeune's coast if a hurricane of that intensity landed?

"As Marines, we are always prepared to attack our enemies," said GySgt. Denis P. Gagne, MCB Disaster Preparedness NCO. "But when it comes time to battle natural enemies, like hurricanes, we're not nearly as prepared as we should be."

Hurricane season is June through November. Camp Lejeune and much of the surrounding area is barely above sea level making hurricane disaster preparation essential, says Gagne.

Hurricanes are tropical cyclones that reach speeds of 74 mph or greater and blow in a large counterclockwise spiral around a relatively calm center. Near the center, or eye of the hurricane, speeds can reach 200 mph.

Hurricanes cause damage and injuries, but the majority of deaths are due to drowning. Hurricanes create storm surges capable of flooding low lying areas like Camp Lejeune.

Although maximum storm activity usually occurs during August, September and October, it is best to prepare now, Gagne said. He offers the following tips to help families equip themselves once a hurricane watch is issued:

Listen to the radio and television for storm updates.

Board windows, protect them with storm shutters or tape.

Secure outdoor objects that might blow away.

If you have a boat, call the marina for further instructions.

People who plan to move to a shelter

should make other arrangements for their pets. If there is time, he recommends moving inland to avoid the brunt of the storm.

Check your home for the following supplies:

- A radio with batteries.
- A three-day supply of non-perishable food.
- Candles, flashlights, lamps and matches.
- Diapers and formula if you have small children.
- Fill prescriptions.
- Fill your car's gas tank.
- Fill your sinks and bathtub with clean water for drinking.

If you're going to a shelter take an extra set of clothes, hygiene items, prescriptions and special foods.

Gagne recommends keeping home insurance policies updated and taking the policy to the shelter. Do not bring valuables, firearms, alcohol, pyrotechnics or flammable liquids.

Once a hurricane warning has been issued, don't panic. Listen to the radio or TV for further information and precautionary steps. Plot the hurricane's position on a tracking chart.

The average storm's diameter is 250 miles. The danger zone extends about 100 miles from the eye in all directions.

Locate the nearest shelter by listening to local radio and TV stations. People who may require special medical attention should call the Naval Hospital to see if they should report there. Families living off base can obtain more information by calling the Emergency Management Office at 347-4270. Those living on base can call the Disaster Preparedness NCO at 451-5276.

"Many people don't take hurricanes seriously," Gagne said. "If everyone prepares, it will save us a lot of headaches and we can concentrate on the more serious emergencies."

## How to track a hurricane

According to the Department of Commerce, advisories are numbered consecutively for each storm. Present location and intensity is described and expected movement is given. Tropical cyclone advisories are issued at six-hour intervals — at midnight, 6 a.m., noon,

and 6 p.m. EST. Each message gives the name, position of eye or center, intensity and forecast.

Hurricane center positions are given by latitude (for example, 13.5 degrees North) and longitude (for example, 55 degrees West).


"We're not here to make money," Yeddo said, "we're here to serve Marines and Sailors. The usage fees are for maintenance on the gear."



### Knowledge

It only takes a few hours for a unit to  
go through all four stations. But in that

"familiarize the Marines well enough so  
that they'll retain the knowledge in the  
field."

Private first class Michael Caine, a  
machine gunner from Wpns. Plt., Bravo  
Co. found the Soviet weapons to be ex-  
traordinarily simple in design. "You can't  
beat their reliability," he said. "But I don't  
know how accurate they are compared  
to the M16."

The Soviet weapons display is part of  
the Small Arms Weapons Instructor  
Course, which is also the formal school  
for the new MOS 8532.

Gunnery Sgt. Paul Wilson, operation's  
chief, H&S Co., 1/6, recently graduated  
from the course.

"The Marine Corps is placing more em-  
phasis on combat-related marksmanship,"  
Wilson said. "The course is designed to  
teach Marines techniques on target  
engagement and detection, and co-  
ordinating live-fire exercises."

When Marines like Wilson graduate  
from the six-week course, they return to  
their parent unit. It's there where they  
put the Marine Corps' newest MOS to  
work.

"The course also teaches us how to  
develop live field fire programs and  
ranges for the unit," Wilson said.  
"Whenever we deploy we'll put together  
different training packages for the bat-  
talion."

### Effectiveness

It may not appear at first glance that  
the effectiveness of Marines in combat  
will be enhanced by working with Soviet  
weapons. That is, until your usually  
reliable M16A2 goes down, according to  
Wilson. "Then you can pick up that  
Soviet weapon and continue to fight," he  
concluded.

## Defensive techniques

# Corpsmen receive training in hand-to-hand combat

The 2nd MarDiv. Schools Medical  
Training Department has taken life-  
saving one step further.

A hand-to-hand combat course for  
FMF corpsmen has been established  
by Master Chief Gary Thornhill, com-  
mand master chief, to help corps-  
men protect themselves in order to pro-  
tect and treat the wounded.

The style of hand-to-hand combat  
taught in the course differs from the  
hand-to-hand combat taught to Marines.  
It is a mixture of various systems of mar-  
tial arts such as karate, judo, jujitsu and  
boxing, according to Petty Officer 3rd  
Class Harold P. Henry, instructor of the  
course. Henry is a third degree black belt  
in karate and is a trainer for the U.S.  
jujitsu team in Winston, N.C.

Thornhill, who is a karate instructor  
and veteran of the Vietnam War, saw a  
need for corpsmen to know hand-to-hand  
combat and vowed to start a program.  
Henry was chosen to get the program  
going here.

"Corpsmen never receive hand-to-hand  
combat instruction, not even at the Field  
Medical Service School," Henry says, "so  
I took a look at Army and Marine Corps

programs and interviewed active-duty  
and retired combat veterans. I wanted to  
see what was needed for a program like  
this."

The product of Henry's preparation is  
a week-long instructor's course that  
covers upper and lower body basics, grap-  
pling, weapon defense and dis-  
arming, animal defensive measures and  
other techniques. Once a corps-  
man graduates, he returns to his unit and  
instructs his fellow corpsmen.

"We hope every corpsman in 2nd Mar-  
Div. will have a good basic knowledge of  
hand-to-hand combat," Henry said. Even  
though the course is primarily for divi-  
sion corpsmen, Henry reserves one  
opening for 2nd FSSG, MCAS New  
River and MCAS Cherry Point.

The course is tough. "I test them  
physically and mentally," Henry said. "By  
the third day they're numb." He tries to  
instill the meaning of the Japanese term,  
"mushin," which means to react without  
thinking.

Henry said he wants to keep the classes  
small, around 10 students, to ensure  
quality training. The first class to com-  
plete the course graduated March 2.  
"They left with more self-confidence and  
a positive attitude about themselves."

# Hot Chow: Simple pleas for field Mar

The hot North Carolina sun beat down on the platoon of Marines marching on a narrow dirt road. Perspiration trickled down their faces while the heavy pack on their backs dug into their sweaty skin.

Later, when they finally reached the bivouac area, night began to fall and the cool breeze blowing gently around them became cold. As darkness came, the breeze became even colder, which was unusual in the summer.

## Home cooking

A few of the Marines looked forward to an MRE dinner while others longed for a hot meal after being in the field for weeks.

Light from trucks in the distance fought through thick clouds of dust and dirt as they approached the bivouac area. A roaring cheer from the Marines erupted as the trucks came to a halt.

The field training, that NCOs attending the Advanced Food Service Course at Camp Johnson, receive is designed to prepare Marines to fill

their Fleet Marine Force responsibilities.

A typical meal for a company of Marines would normally take two hours to prepare. But preparation is only half the battle. These Marines must know the equipment, sanitation, logistics and environmental aspects of any such operation.

## Automation

The course also includes some computer awareness training as Capt. Donnel Humbert, academic officer of the food service schools, expects the MOS to be automated in the near future.

"With the new system, they will be able, for example to requisition food that needs to be removed from storage facility and prepared for a certain amount of Marines," Donnel said.

## Course phases

There are four phases of the course: administration phase, garrison preparation phase, field phase and bakery phase.

Some students said the advanced food service course, which lasts 54 days, is a challenging break in their routine.

But to the food service schools at Camp Johnson, the training is just another tool in making their mission more realistic and efficient.

But it's not the food that makes his dishes unique. Instead, his creativeness, eye for detail and desire for originality make his dishes all the more appealing to the eye and palate.


"I'm always trying to do something different," Britain said. Once approved, a cook can take a basic recipe, work with it and hopefully make it into a better meal.





Buying smart

Purchasing a new 'set of wheels'

You are walking alongside Holcomb Boulevard watching the cars go past and hoping that someone will see you and offer a ride.

Your friends were supposed to drop you off but they went to a party and a "share-a-ride" booth is miles away. Your now ex-date laughed when she found out you had no car and the awesome concert that you stood in line three hours to get tickets for is about to start. If only you had some wheels.

From that moment on you vowed to buy a car the very next chance you get.

But wait! Did you have a budget done to see if you can afford one? Will you buy a car and get ripped off while making payments on it for the rest of your life?

Fear not, there are ways to purchase a car without losing that green shirt off your back.

According to a Family Service Center pamphlet, here are some tips when purchasing a car.

☐ Determine how much you are willing to spend and for how many months? The brand new sports car with a super stereo system would probably be out of your price range while a small, used car might be the wiser choice.

☐ Choose a financial institution that will best suit your needs. Interest rates vary between credit unions, commercial banks, savings-and-loan institutions, auto-insurance companies and automobile dealers. Compare the annual percentage rates at several lending institutions and use the lowest.

☐ Visit several dealerships but do not discuss price or get talked into anything. Test drive a few cars that you like and gather information about what other charges are included in the total price of the car.

☐ Pick up a car-guide book at a library or bookstore and find out the cost of the car to the dealer and also how much every item on the car is valued at. When figuring the total cost of a car don't forget to include sales tax and maintenance costs.

☐ Do not get excited or overanxious when dealing with a car salesman. Acting calm and being a little indecisive will usually give you the edge.

☐ Make an offer on the car. By offering less than what you are willing to pay you will have some room to bargain or negotiate with the salesman.

☐ After checking all your figures and deciding that this is the car for you, sign the buyer's order. If the

dealer wants a deposit, tell him you will him after the deal is approved by the manager. If the dealer insists you buy insurance from him, you have already inquired at a regular insurance agent first, before agreeing. Regular insurance companies normally provide better coverage than the dealer's.

When applying for a loan remember the more you'll save and the less you'll have to borrow and pay interest on.

Keeping the term as brief as possible will save you money, although, monthly payments will be higher. Paying off a loan quickly also results in less total interest charged.

Using this approach to buy a car may save you money and at last, you have some wheels.

"I've been known to throw a club or two," deadpans GySgt. Thomas Dehn of MCES. He was selected the base's top male athlete for both his athletic achievements and leadership skills. "There's an art to throwing a club safely. It's such a heartbreaking sport."

Occasional headaches on the putting green aside, Dehn is shooting for a berth on this year's All-Marine golf team. That's in addition to competing in intramural softball and tennis, taking part in Camp Lejeune's first Super Team competition and playing an active role as organizer, judge and participant in many of the contests put on for the engineering school students at Courthouse Bay.

"You can't slough sports," Dehn says. "It's a motivator. Sports have helped a lot of these kids (at MCES) get through school. It serves as a release valve."

Dehn carries a 4-handicap on the golf course, and thinks he can lower that by two strokes a round.

"The most difficult sport for me is golf because it's so mentally demanding," he says. "But it's one I know I'm going to pursue for the rest of my life."

Although disappointed in the recent

Fifteen long minutes later, SSgt. Marcia McLaurin, administrative operations chief for Admin. School Co., MCSSS, hopped over to the radio and turned it off.

"Take your pulse," she ordered as she held on to her own wrist, looking at her watch.

Two minutes later, the class was going at it again, returning to the rhythmic movements.

Before McLaurin started teaching the aerobics classes several years ago, MCSSS had a problem.

"I had Marines coming in who were overweight," said LtCol. Merle Mackie, commanding officer for the company. Some of his incoming Marines had gained too much weight during

leave after boot camp.

McLaurin took charge and initiated an aerobics program to help the Marines lose weight.

Initially, the class was held from 11:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m., twice a week. Increased interest caused McLaurin to add

one more class a week.

"My aerobic program, which is an hour long, consists of cardiovascular and muscular endurance, muscular strength, flexibility and body com-


Snatching the first place title in the Senior match was retired Col. Keith Young with 150.

the All-Marine team.

"I qualified for the All-Marines in 1984 on the same course we're playing this year (Cherry Point). I'm confident," he says, but adds quickly: "You have to watch your temper. It'll beat you."

Softball is another sport Dehn enjoys as both player and coach.

"You get a lot of good feedback in team sports," he says. "It's where I definitely try to instill sportsmanship. I try to do that by example."

"I want to tell my team that it's not 'Hey, it's just a game, let's go out and have fun,' but if somebody makes mistakes in a team event I tell my team that nobody gets down on them," he said. The MCES crew made the All-Camp playoffs, and Dehn is anxiously awaiting the fall season.

"I'm looking forward to playing in the over-35 league," the 36-year-old says. "You find a lot of talent in that group. Maybe I've lost a little distance, but I still hit 'em hard up the middle."

His favorite experience of the last year involved the Super Team competition.

"I thought we had a pat team, but we fell down in bowling," he recalls. "But the canoe race was great. SSgt. (Vince) Odo and myself were on the second leg and we were watching the Motor 'T' team

100 yards ahead of us when they dumped their canoe.

"When we got into the canoe, we made up ground with every stroke," he adds. "When it was over, our whole team just went wild."

Dehn also faithfully follows the athletic exploits of 15-year-old daughter Bonnie ("She's a really good volleyball player") and son Matthew ("A typical 3-year-old; he carries around a plastic golf club and balls and hits 'em all over the place").

"That's one of my dreams: to caddy for my son on the (PGA) Tour," Dehn says mischievously.

He notes he has taught some youth golfing classes before and would like to get involved in working with young linksters in the future.

The 17-year veteran says he was surprised to win the Athlete of the Year award, but is quick to hand some of the credit to his unit commanders.

"In my opinion, any time you get a strong sports program in your unit, you're going to get a higher level of motivation," he states. "Commanders I've worked for have been very supportive. They're always there rooting us on."

"Commanders have to back you. If they don't, it's hard to excel."

Expect Dehn to continue being active, both on and off the field.

position exercises," she said.

Since Camp Johnson is a school environment, most of the Marines are here for a few weeks and don't have the time to get into sports or other exercise programs outside their normal routine of going to school, according to McLaurin.

"My goal is to provide the Marines with an exercise program that provides pleasure, enjoyment and avoidance of injury so they will view exercise as a priority throughout their lives," she said. McLaurin trains her class gradually, so there is a lower risk of injury.

"At first, most Marines are uncomfortable with the movements I use," she explained. "I structure my classes so all of the participants can get used to the series of steps so they'll know when a change in movement is going to occur."

Marines from Admin. School her only students in the aerobic classes. Because her classes are held at a convenient time, Marines from other units join.

In addition to the aerobic classes, McLaurin also leads physical training for officers on Camp Johnson.

"I held morning P.T. for the Transport School twice this week," she said.

"Most participants like me, they want to accomplish goals they previously thought impossible," she said.

These classes were originally for the Marines who had weight problems and couldn't pass a PFT, but, "After a few sessions, they didn't have any problems," she explained.

Although the award recognizing physical fitness and athletic ability, McLaurin remains low-key about the distinction.
