Editor's note:

The following article is Part 4 in a five-part series on the Marine Corps Base Consolidated Drug and Alcohol Center's Level II workshop. These articles examine the change in attitude and positive growth experience of 16 Marines who attended the week-long workshop in April. The names are fictitious, but the attitudes and situations are real.

Over the hump. Day Four. Big Mac sat defensively and scowled all day. Rasta B. opened up even more. His past - a dynamo of pain and confusion. His future, despite the cloud of brig time looming in the distance, seemed to be brightening. Albert E., once accepting what had happened to his family because of alcohol, now moved with a different constructive energy. Fred D. broke from denial.

"I was drunk," Fred D. said plainly. "I didn't want to admit it, but that's the way it is. I have to deal with it and go on. I know that alcohol abuse has probably been affecting me longer than I realized."

An attitude change was becoming visible to the 16.

All the students were asked to read one chapter in a book titled, "Search for Serenity," by Lewis B. Presnall, a simple, blue paperback with an unimpressive cover - just chapter titles like, "Joining the Human Race," "Parable of the Empty Mind" and "The World of Beginning Again."

One such passage seemed to fit the realization these Marines were having.

"A sunset is only beautiful to those

Ocean Venture exercise tests MEU Marines

VIEQUES ISLAND, Puerto Rico—The 28th Marine Expeditionary Unit, made up of elements from Camp Lejeune and MCAS New River, recently participated in the joint-service exercise Ocean Venture'90.

The biannual exercise is designed to demonstrate the capability of the U.S. to project military power and ability to protect U.S. national interests by supporting friendly countries in the Caribbean.

Ocean Venture is an exercise that tests the ability to command and control assigned forces and their rapid deployment and employment.

It included all aspects of a modern warfare scenario including joint USAF/USN/USMC air operations, Navy-Marine Corps amphibious operations, Army airborne, air assault and infantry ground operations, and special operations forces in support of conventional forces.

Fifteen thousand personnel were involved in the operation including the Army's 101st Airborne Division and selected reserve units.

The actual assault (amphibious and aerial) occurred May 5. The rest of the exercise centered around the Marines and Army chasing down the enemy. A Dutch Marine company also aided in the process.

Small arms fire, artillery assaults, air strikes and naval gunfire operations were all utilized during Ocean Venture.

A temperature in the mid 80's and 70 percent humidity was compounded by full battle dress

Local concern increases for environment

In the early 1940s, it was common practice for employees at Camp Lejeune to take what we now consider hazardous waste and just drive it to an arbitrary site, which was uncontrolled, and dump it. This was not necessarily a blatant disregard for our coastal environment on their part, rather it was simply not knowing what it could do.

Increased environmental awareness since then has blossomed into international concern for the future of the planet. Even right at Camp Lejeune, we have a task force conducting an ongoing pro-active campaign to ensure waste products made on base are properly disposed, while preserving what is naturally here for the future.

Within the Environmental Management Department, the Hazardous Waste and Pollution Control Division is the umbrella under which 30 civilians and Marines monitor, analyze and manage man-made/hazardous waste disposal.

According to Sandi Lane, a biological technician with the division, the HWPCD is responsible for installation restoration, hazardous waste management, monitoring and enforcement of Environmental Protection Agency standards, spill contingency response, technical assistance and training of tenant units, waste recycling and disposal and pollution control education.

"We used to be regarded as watchdogs, you know. when we'd show up in an area, people would make themselves scarce," Lane said. "The program has evolved to the point now though, where we're recognized as people who are here to provide technical assistance and education — not people who browbeat."

The majority of the HWPCD work involves monitoring and analyzing the waste water and drinking water treatment plants at seven locations, including the housing areas and the industrial area. A chemist at the main laboratory conducts bacterial analyses of the drinking water to make sure it's safe and within the guidelines of the Drinking Water Act, Lane said.

The primary HWPCD tasks are to provide long-term response planning to meet changing state environment regulations; manage hazardous waste disposal; conduct an installation restoration program (this program is designed to target old spill and dump sites and clean them up); provide environmental data and reports to agencies; and to supervise all hazardous waste disposal programs.

By focusing on the hazardous waste and water programs on base, the HWPCD hopes to identify potential problem areas, set up programs to monitor progress, then eventually lessen the environmental impact that area might have had, Lane said.

Enlisted monitors to visit

When the HQMC enlisted monitors stop here to set up shop at Marston Pavilion, June 5-7, they might also hang up a sign saying "Last Chance."

While every Marine is encouraged to talk to their monitor about reenlistments, lateral moves, reenlistment incentives and duty assignments, it's Marines with EAS's before Oct. 1 that this visit is most important.

"This will probably be the last opportunity for most Marines with an EAS before Oct. 1 to guarantee their reenlistment," said Capt. David Millush, OIC, 2nd MarDiv. career planning.

The reason for the deadline is the lack of reenlistment spaces for many MOSs coupled with the number of Marines due to get out before Oct. 1.

"Currently there are more than 1,000 Marines in division alone whose EAS is before Oct. 1 — and there isn't enough spaces for them," explained Millush. "All those Marines are competing with every other Marine in the Corps for the same school seats."

The career planner can give a Marine more information on what MOSs are open for reenlistments or lateral moves.

All Marines who want to reenlist/lateral move must see their career planner to complete their administrative requirements prior to seeing their monitor.

Marines are encouraged to bring their spouses with them when they go to see a monitor, so they have a better understanding of the options available, Millush explained.

"A Marine [with an EAS before Oct. 1] who doesn't take the initiative to see his career planner now will be unemployed," Millush said.

"It's like playing musical chairs, if the music stops and you're still standing, your out of the game," Millush said. "We are going to have a lot of people very quickly who will be standing when the music stops. It's best to find a chair now because you may not have one later."

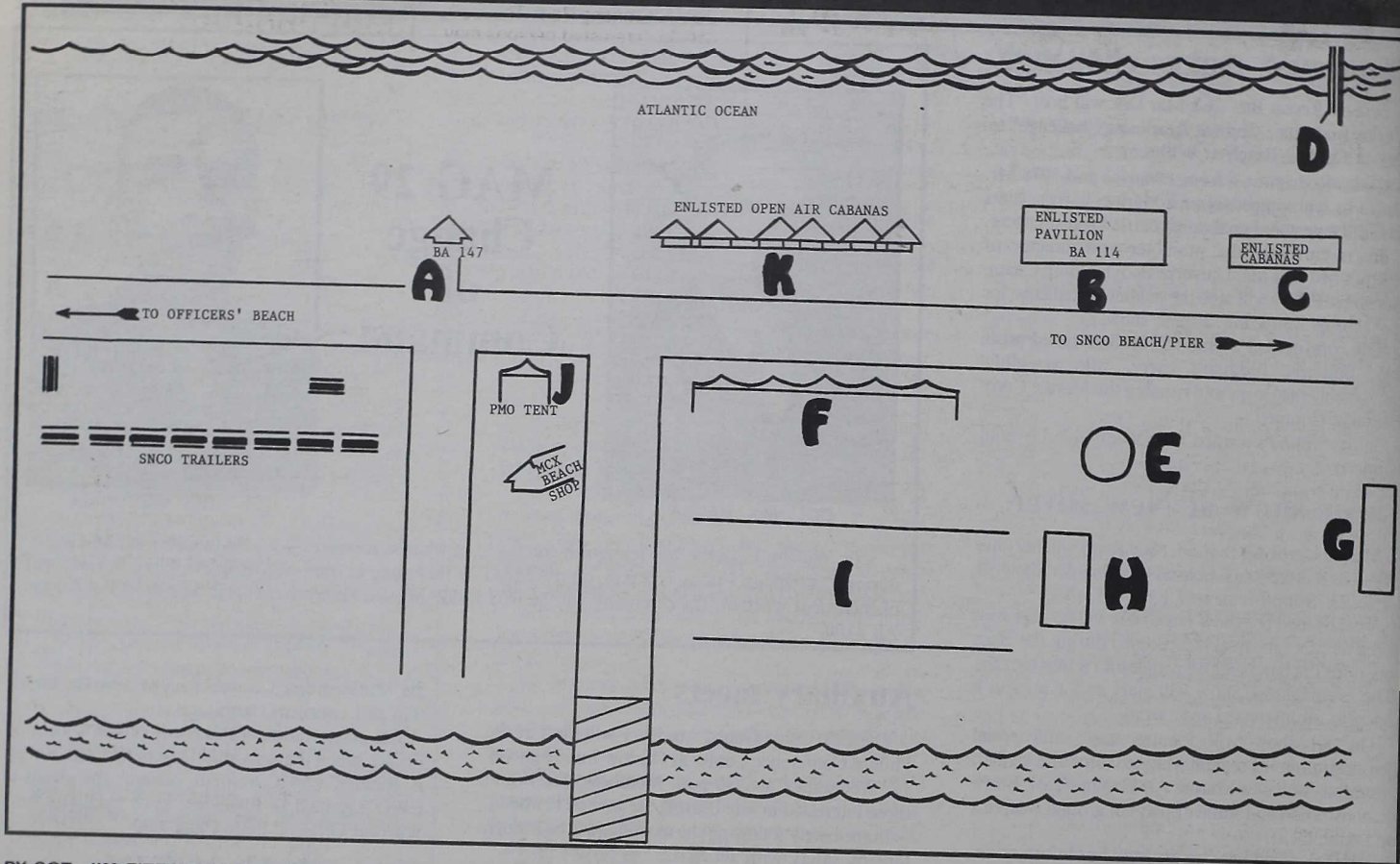

who take the trouble to really see it. Appreciation of life is only possible for those whose emotional vision is unclouded by the preoccupation of the problems of self."

Finally comfortable with the Group, the Marines and the counselor engaged in "real" discussion, the type that is only possible when one examines what the heart feels rather than what the mind says. The tough kind of talk.

The talk that is real. The feeling talk.

Some of the Marines in the Group were there for first offenses DWI/DUI, others for repeated alcohol-related incidents, four for cocaine. The degree of intensity they gave was directly proportional to the time each had spent inside the preoccupation with

the problems of self.

Enter the spiritual dimension.

The chaplain was met with turned-away eyes. It's hard to lie to a priest.

His thick Boston accent boomed off the dull walls.

"You're all here because you've got a problem with drugs or alcohol or someone thinks you do. Does it really matter? What matters is what you are to yourself. It's as simple as that, gentlemen. Face it.

"Not many people in this world ever get the education you're getting right now, so listen up.

"There are three parts to everyone.

The physical, the psychological and, yes, whether you like it or not, the spiritual. If you go through life not having each of

the three in a responsible balance you'll never be as whole as you possibly could be. This five-day workshop is not about alcohol or drugs. It's about dealing with emotion in a manageable way.

"How do you get through the day? At the end of each day, can you look in the mirror and say you're comfortable with yourself? If you can't, then you better change whatever it is that's affecting you.

"Get rid of the emotional garbage."

Overwhelmed by the priest's intensity, each Marine dared not check his eyelids for holes. His boisterousness made it nearly impossible, anyway.

"You're going to think, 'this guy's completely off his rocker,' but I'm not here to tell you anything but what you need to help fulfill that spiritual part. Take it

or leave it. It's up to you. No one else.

"I've got five of the simplest, yet most complex questions that you may ever have to ask yourself.

"Who am I?"

"Why am I here?"

"What is my purpose for human existence?"

"Where am I going?"

"How will I get there?"

"Now, you're probably saying to yourself, 'those are the dumbest questions I've ever heard.' Are they?"

"Think about it."

With that, the priest waved good luck and left.

Exhausted from Day Four, the 16 left speechless, absorbing the day and the week. One more day to go.

Tankers get ready for fall exercise

A squirrel pauses for a moment in the cool, crisp morning air and busily chews on nuts stuffed in his bulging cheeks. An unfamiliar noise causes him to stop and listen. Stretching as far as his hind legs will allow, his small, dark eyes peer through the fresh green surroundings in the direction of the disturbance.

Like an ancient dragon the M60A1 roars and rumbles down a muddy path. The squirrel scampers away and the chatter of the birds is replaced with the growl of the mechanical instrument of destruction. The stench of diesel fuel is blown from the tank in a black cloud of smoke like the simmering fire within a dragon's throat.

Training

Creating the loud commotion is Bravo Co., 2nd Tank Bn. The tankers made their way through serene woodlands to Onslow Beach early in the morning for a training exercise. Bravo Co., along with other 2nd MarDiv. units, gathered at the beach to practice amphibious operations in preparation for NATO exercise Bold Guard in the fall.

The cool, morning ride turned into a hot, sweltering day at the beach. Bravo Co. arrived at the beach at 10 a.m.

Thirty-six Marines from 2nd Landing Support Bn., here and 20 Sailors from Beachmaster Unit 2, Little Creek, Va.,

arrived earlier in the week to set up beach markers, ready supplies and equipment and keep vehicle traffic flowing on the beach.

The tankers passed Riseley Pier and continued southward about 1,000 meters and positioned their vehicles inland, facing the water. Soon, through a spray of water and a sandstorm, a Landing Craft Air Cushion hovered onto the beach and positioned itself next to the tanks.

LCAC

"Only a handful of us have done Landing Craft Unit and LCAC operations before," said tanker Sgt. James Alcorn. "I believe this is the first water operation this company has done since Team Spirit-1987."

Hine said the purpose of the exercise, in addition to preparation for Bold Guard, is to train drivers to properly load, position and unload tanks on LCACs.

Positioning a tank or cargo on an LCAC correctly is the most important factor in loading the craft, according to Chief Petty Officer J.M. Prince who "flies" it. Because a craft hover on air, the center of gravity must be at a certain point on the deck.

Each tanker received vital hands-on training loading and tying down the tanks. Their fire retardant coveralls combined with their flak jackets made the heat almost unbearable. Sweat dripped from their faces as they struggled with the tie-down cables that held the tanks securely on the LCAC.

Threefold

Meanwhile, about 100 Marines from HQ and Alpha Batteries, 1/10 were also practicing loading equipment onto an LCAC. According to Capt. Owen Englander, CO, Alpha Battery, the exercise has a threefold purpose: preparation for the NATO exercise;

familiarization with amphibious operations; and practice operations with Regimental Landing Team-2.

Completion

Once the tankers completed training for the day, they took advantage of the proximity of the ocean to take a swim and escape the sweltering heat.

The next three days were spent aboard the USS Whidbey Island — a Landing Ship Deck. Once the Marines became familiar with their new surroundings they were given classes by their platoon leaders.

The exercise ended with an amphibious landing. The tanks clampered off the LCACs, joined up with Assault Amphibious Vehicles from 2nd AA Bn. and headed to LZ Falcon for a mock attack, according to 2ndLt. Frank Ball, XO, Bravo Co. Afterwards, the steel dragons made their way back to their den called the tank park.

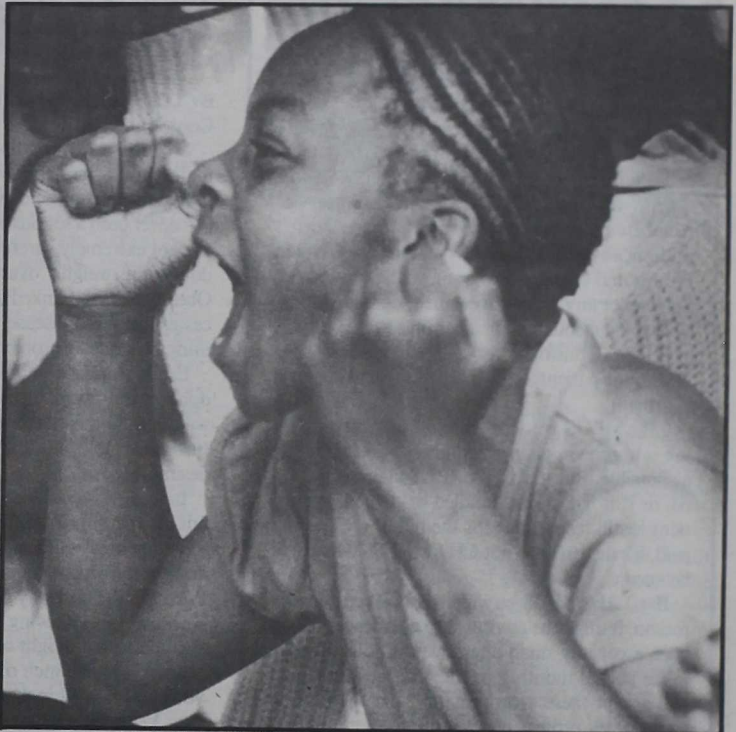
Slowly, fatigue (harder questions) began to take its toll. But none of the students went down without a fight; a lot of thoughts and educated guesses.

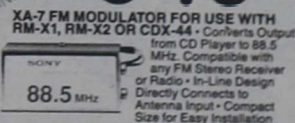

CHAMPUS: a cost-sharing medical plan

Some people mistakenly believe that the government is supposed to pay all medical bills of families of military members. This idea just won't go away, despite the fact that only active-duty service members are guaranteed free medical care. There's nothing anywhere in the law making the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services or any other government agency responsible for dependents' medical bills.

Legal responsibility for such charges rests solely with the patient (or the patient's parents or legal guardian).

CHAMPUS is a cost-sharing program whose job is to process claims as quickly and accurately as possible. But if a CHAMPUS claim is not filed, or if it is lost, mishandled or denied, the patient is still responsible for the bill. If a bill is not paid, it's the patient - not CHAMPUS - who could be sued.

If a CHAMPUS payment is delayed for any reason, it might be advisable to go ahead and pay bills, especially small ones, even if you can only make partial monthly payments. Most creditors will accept these arrangements, and the laws in some states protect people from collections and harassment in such cases.

Healthy heart Maintaining reasonable weight proves beneficial

To those of you who have struggled to lose or maintain a reasonable weight during your lifetime, take heart! To those of you for whom body weight has never been a serious consideration, beware! If you are not extremely careful, you may end up as many do — overweight, overfat, and worse yet, obese. Obesity has been linked to many chronic disease processes like heart disease, hypertension, diabetes and musculo-skeletal problems.

Establishing a desirable weight for yourself can be done in a number of different ways. Many people want to find their ideal weight in a Metropolitan Life Insurance table, but this method is probably the least desirable.

Indeed, it is possible to maintain an ideal weight, but be in an unfit, overfat condition, or conversely, to be in excess of ideal weight but be aerobically fit and demonstrate adequate strength and endurance. Probably the best way to establish your ideal weight is to use the following formula:

Males: Base weight of 106 at five feet and add six pounds for each inch over five feet. For example, if your height is 72 inches, your weight should be 106 plus 12 times six or 178 pounds. Add five pounds for heavy body frame, or subtract five pounds for a light body frame if needed.

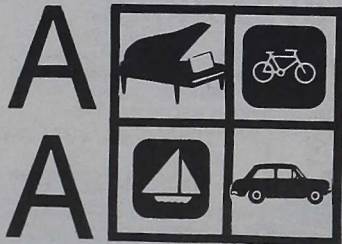
Females: Base weight of 100 pounds at five feet, and add five pounds for each inch over five feet. For example, if your height is 65 inches, your weight should be 100 plus five times five or 125 pounds. Add five pounds for a heavy body frame, or subtract five pounds for a light body frame if needed.

If one of your parents is overweight, you have a 40 percent chance of becoming overweight. If both parents are overweight, you have an 80 percent chance. Unfortunately, if you became overweight as a child, you probably have more fat cells than your normal-weight counterpart. Your fat cells are also probably larger than normal due to the tremendous amount of fat that has been stored within them. These factors make weight loss a difficult undertaking.

Fortunately, the majority of people affected by weight gain are not faced with those extremes; however, weight gain is an insidious process that occurs over time. Weight must continually be monitored, and measures taken to adjust eating behavior accordingly before it becomes a larger-than-life problem.

Remember, a gain of five pounds a year for 20 years will not disappear in two to three weeks. A reasonable expectation for weight loss is one to two pounds per week, and applied to an expected loss of 100 pounds would take a minimum of one year!

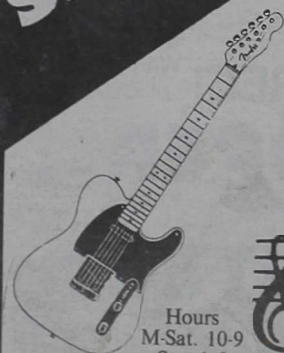

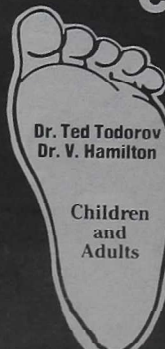

Cadets live military lifestyle

A 17-year-old gunnery sergeant? Is it possible? As far as the Marine Military Academy in Harlingen, Texas, is concerned, yes. The private school is filled with boys who rank from private to lieutenant colonel; however, they're not actually Marines.

They wear modified Marine Corps uniforms and live a military lifestyle. Most of the cadets will graduate from the academy and re-enter civilian life, while others will attend schools like West Point, the Naval Academy and the Air Force Academy.

Recently, 35 of these cadets made the drive from south Texas to visit Camp Lejeune for a week. During their stay they took part in a variety of activities that ranged from the infiltration course to AAV and helicopter rides.

The school, which has eighth through 12th grades and postgraduate courses, is divided into five companies: alpha through echo. These companies are formed like a regular Marine Corps company. They contain every billet from commanding officer to squad leaders, and they're all cadets.

In addition to these positions, there is also a drill instructor for each company. The DIs, who are retired Marines, live with their wives in the barracks. According to one DI, they provide continuous support and leadership.

When a boy enters the school he is a plebe and a private and must go through several weeks of training similar to military boot camp.

"The plebe system is really hard, but it helps a lot," Pfc. Dustin Tallichet, a ninth grader from Houston, said. "It taught me self-discipline and

the importance of teamwork."

Tallichet knew he wanted to be a Marine as early as third grade. "I'm going to the school to prepare for the Naval Academy so I can be a Marine," Tallichet said. At first he didn't like being away from home, but he said that he and the other students have become like brothers. "We have our differences, but they'll always stick up for you no matter what."

The school is headed by retired MGen. H. G. Glasgow and has a large staff of civilians and retired Marines. The academic's program has subjects that range from English to aerospace. The athletics program also has a wide variety of sports such as football, baseball, soccer, track, softball, tennis, golf, basketball and volleyball.

The students abide by a strict and rigorous routine. The day begins at 6 a.m. with physical training and ends at 10 p.m. after studies are completed. They aren't allowed to wear civilian clothes often. The students must wear their Marine uniforms on liberty unless they are visiting family and are not within 60 miles of the school.

Even though the students adhere to military standards, academic excellence is the primary objective, according to MGen. Glasgow. And like the Corps, the academy is known for its tremendous esprit de corps and is true to the ideals and customs of the Corps.

It was for this reason some of the cadets made the trip to Camp Lejeune. It gave the boys a chance to see what kind of military organization the founders of the school believed in enough to start the academy.

The boys arrived and spent the next five days seeing some of the most exciting things the Marine Corps has to offer. One morning was spent at the Marine Corps Engineer School at Courthouse Bay.

They climbed poles and watched an explosive's demonstration. The afternoon was spent at the gas chamber where the boys got to experience CS gas.

During the days that followed, the cadets observed live fire of several different weapons at Verona Loop ranges, took a land-and-water ride in the back of an assault amphibious vehicle, competed against each other for the quickest obstacle course time and took a ride in a helicopter.

"I loved Camp Lejeune," said Gunnery Sgt. Keith Taylor, an 11th grader. "I wasn't that sure what I wanted to do but now I'm certain that I want to go to the Naval Academy."

The boys had completed their visit of the base and prepared to head back to Texas. The Bravo Co. Commander, Capt. Moises Ramirez, a senior at the school, rounded them up into platoon formation as he had done all week and loaded the bus. The day-and-a-half ride will give them a chance to rest up before starting classes on Monday.

With weapons' ranges increasing and becoming more accurate, it's essential that heavy weapons' units, generic to infantry battalions, understand its effect when providing cover fire for grunts fighting in close quarters with the enemy.

Perhaps no more critical is this than during trench warfare.

In round robin training recently, the mortar men, dragon gunners and heavy gun Marines from Weapons Co., 3rd Bn., 2nd Marines, tackled the trenches of B-14 Range here to better understand trench warfare tactics. According to 1stLt. M.D. Lloyd, Wpns Co. XO, his Marines must appreciate what their ground-pounding buddies go through when they attack a well-defended trench network.

"While the line companies would be tasked with taking a trench objective, the weapon's company Marines would be responsible for keeping the enemy's heads down and providing supporting fire during the assault," said Lloyd.

The 3/2 Marines are gearing up for a combined arms exercise in the California desert this fall and according to Sgt. Tom Cameron, platoon sergeant, the trench range at B-14 is a good introduction for the Twentynine Palms package.

"When attacking a trench network," Lloyd said, "We always expect to lose a few of our Marines."

"The nature of this close quarters-type combat is extremely dangerous. Normally, the infantry will attack after air and artillery has softened the objective. Still, the enemy will probably hid in trench bunkers and a low attrition will result. Once Marines start the ground attack, the enemy can come out just as strong as before."

"Lob lots of grenades," said Cameron. "That's one of the only ways we can make progress when we're inside the trenches."

Cameron went on to explain the tactics of the trench attack: "We usually attack with two teams-

the assault team and the support team. A two- to three-man breach team is the first to cross the wire and drop into the trench. It is during this phase the Marines can expect the most resistance."

The breach team must clear a hole for the rest of the assault element to enter the trench. "In combat," Cameron said, "the Marines would probably fight tossing grenades and firing their weapons the entire way."

Once the assault and support teams are in the trenches fighting, a flag is used to mark the forward progress of the attack.

"Marking the forward progress has been argued back and forth between commanders," said Lloyd. "It is essential the the heavy guns be aware of where their buddies are in relation to the network so they can keep their firepower on the enemy and not on the Marines. We've knocked around some ideas, but the flag still seems to be the best way."

While the flag-carrying-Marine-system is taught for use during day assaults, Lloyd said, the problem arises because, while the supporting fire Marines know where the Marines are, so does the enemy. The enemy will try and eliminate the flag-carrying Marine first.

"During night assaults, we would use glowing infrared chemical sticks to mark the progress, so it is less dangerous," he said.

While weapons company Marines would not normally be tasked with making a ground assault on a trench network, their chance in the trenches at B-14 helps them better understand the importance of their supporting fire.

"If we ever have to support a trench attack, these Marines can now appreciate what the grunts on the line face. Taking trenches is tough. I think 3/2's heavy guns Marines will provide even more accurate cover fire because of this type of training," said Cameron.

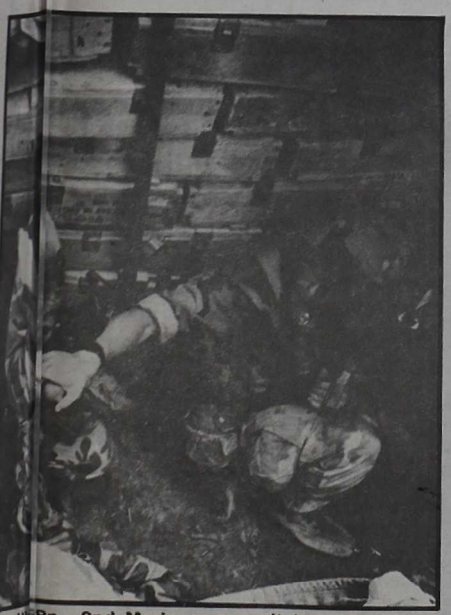

Food fight Messhall destined to win back patrons

Marine Corps food service officials at Camp Lejeune are at war. ... A war destined to win back Marines and Sailors from fast-food joints and improve the quality of life for anyone who eats in the chow hall.

They've spent more than \$20 million over the past couple of years to get patrons back in the chow halls and make mealtime a more pleasant experience for everyone who eats there.

Major renovations are either complete or underway at 14 of 19 dining facilities here. In addition to the renovations, one completely new facility will be constructed at Camp Johnson in the near future.

At an average cost of more than \$1.7 million each, the buildings are being modernized with kitchen and scullery equipment and furnishings to make serving and dining areas more comfortable and appealing.

As a result, patronage has already increased by 30 percent under the Messhall Facilities Renovation Program, according to 1st Lt. Bob Jarousse, operations officer, Base Food Services Division.

The plan calls for converting the facilities, most of which were built during World War II, into ultramodern, restaurant-style eateries.

To do that, Jarousse and other planners had to strip the buildings down to bare shells before adding new equipment and furnishings.

Jarousse, the project officer, and Fountain Taylor, resident designer, have put in more hours than they can count during the past two years while working with architects and planners to bring the project to life. They've been together so

much in fact, that it wasn't unusual for the two of them to be together at one or the other's house burning "the midnight oil" looking over plans and coming up with new ideas to improve food service here.

"No single aspect of life in the Corps affects Marines and Sailors as universally as the chow hall," Jarousse said. "Whether they just walk by or go in to sit down to eat, every Marine comes in contact with the chow hall almost every day."

Because Marines have so much contact with chow halls, the first step was to refurbish the entrances and make the interiors more attractive. Designers hung frames of stained glass and hanging plants while adding new tables and booths. The new seating plan offers added comfort and space.

Officials then analysed local eateries to see what food and services drew people away from the chow halls. From the analysis officials picked the best ideas and put those into the plans, according to Jarousse.

"That's where the fast-food concept came from," he said. "We wanted to give the young Marines something they can appreciate ... something they've grown up with."

In addition to fast-food fare, which can be eaten in or taken out (something unheard of in the past), the "new wave" chow halls offer a variety of service bars giving patrons more options to eat.

Chow hall users can still eat traditional meals, where they go through the food line and select from main entrees. They can also choose from the salad and baked potato bars, or the ice cream fountain and fitness bar (which offers items like fresh cut fruit and yogurt).

"I know we're giving the Marines what

they want," said Maj. Ron Pereira, base food service officer. "It shows in the increased number of people we're serving."

"Some people might think that spending so much money to redo the chow halls is a waste because Marines will just wreck the place in a matter of time," Jarousse said. "We think otherwise."

"I think Marines are pretty responsible people who, when given something nice, will work hard to keep it that way," Jarousse explained. "They appreciate

when they have something good. They're not scratching their names in the tables or sticking gum under the seats."

The money spent to remodel the buildings is saving the government money in a number of ways, according to Pereira.

First, by renovating instead of building new chow halls, the Corps is avoiding the big budget crunch for new construction funding. Additionally, the renovations make the buildings more energy efficient which will save about 25 percent of the operating costs. The renovations are expected to pay for themselves because of the operating-cost savings in about 10 years.

Civilian contracting of messing services has also helped to reduce operating costs during the past few years. More than 450 civilian workers staff the Camp Lejeune dining halls, eliminating the need to put Marines on mess duty.

Food service figures show that using civilian contract employees for mess services instead of Marines saves more than \$5,000 per month in operating-and-management expenses here.

Changing times and changing ideas have caused food service officials to change the way they fight the war for Marines' stomachs. The changes they're making seem to be working because talking to Marines these days, they'll admit they'd rather be called anything except late for supper.

Nation pays tribute to Asian Pacific Americans

The month of May was declared Asian Pacific American Heritage Month by President George Bush to honor the significant contributions, traditions and courage of Asian Pacific Americans.

As of September 1989, approximately 2.3 percent of the Armed Forces was of Asian Pacific ancestry and the number is growing.

One example of the contributions made by these Americans is Air Force Lt. Col. Ellison Onizuka. He became the first Asian American astronaut and flew on the first Department of Defense space shuttle mission in 1985. On January 28, 1986, he perished along with six others when the Space Shuttle Challenger exploded.

Hoang Nhu Tran, a former Vietnamese boat person, graduated first of 960 students at the Air Force Academy in 1987. He was also a Rhodes scholar and Time magazine's recipient of the 1986 College Achievement Award.

Closer to home is Petty Officer 1st Class Ramon C. Idio. He isn't famous or well-known but he is making contributions to the Navy and Marine Corps.

Idio was born in the Province of Pangasinan, Republic of the Philippines in a small bamboo hut. Not an unusual dwelling for the members of the small "out-of-the-way" community of 25 people.

"I was number seven child of eight," said Idio with a heavy accent. "My parents died when I was three or four. I stayed in school as long as I could and then began farming with my brothers." They grew sugar cane, rice and vegetables—anything to support the family.

Idio remembers nights when there was no food to cook, and sometimes when there was food, there was no match to start a fire.

Life improved at age 14 when he was adopted by an aunt living in Hawaii.

When Idio arrived in Hawaii, the only English he knew was "yes," "no" and "my name is." He missed his family and yearned for the "simple living" he was used to.

Upon graduation from high school, Idio became a naturalized citizen. "I was so scared and happy about being an American citizen. I thought that maybe I wouldn't be a good American and

would be sent back (to the Philippines)."

Shortly afterwards, Idio joined the Navy. "I thought this was a way to be on my own and the only way I could go to the Philippines again." He returned 10 years later, while stationed in California.

In 1985 Idio married Lilia who lived in his village in the Philippines. They have two daughters, Maria and Naomi, ages 3 years and 6 months.

Idio, who now works at the French Creek Clinic as the Leading Petty Officer of Quality Assurance, has been in the Navy for 16 years. He says he feels very fortunate and is thankful for what he has. He is helping send two nieces and a nephew through college in the Philippines.

"Sometimes when I have to pull extra duty or conduct field days, I don't complain," he said. "It's nothing when you've experienced what I have. I like to work hard, extra hard. I put on my uniform and work. If you work hard, the promotions will come. I tell my juniors, you can do better than that. It's not because I'm mean, it's just a piece of cake."

He says he's made progress but not enough. His medical records section at the clinic received high ratings on the last

two Commanding General's Inspection. "The Marine Corps is a challenge," Idio said, "they keep us on our toes."

Though the numbers of Asian Pacific Americans in the armed forces may be a small percent, their contributions are many. As their numbers grow, so will their representation in the armed forces. A better understanding of their heritage and potential will benefit those who serve with them.

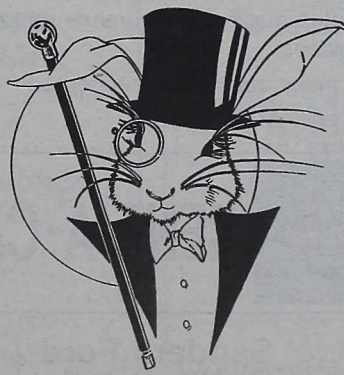

PANAMA

Arraijan, a temporary home for 3/6 Marines

ARRAIJAN, Panama —With its hills and sunny skies, Arraijan, Panama, could easily be nestled in Southern California. For a handful of Marines from Camp Lima Co., 3d Bn., 6th Mar., this small city seven miles west of Panama City is home, at least for the time being.

"The people are very friendly," said LCpl. Peter Ervolina of South Setauket, N.Y., "and they seem to welcome us."

"Marines are here only to assist local police," Ervolina said while looking at the sunshine bouncing off the gaily colored commuter buses and shops doing a slow-but-steady trade as morning reached full glory.

Supportive

"The people of Arraijan are supportive and they get along with Marines," he said. Nearby, junior high school students, neatly attired in simple uniforms, ambled down the hill for classes.

Life was returning to normalcy, four months after Operation Just Cause and the ousting of General Manuel Noriega.

Not long ago, U.S. Marines set up roadblocks near this resilient city, capturing scores of prisoners and patrolling the streets with mounted machine guns and other visible weapons of war.

Today, with the people's confidence in the growing Panamanian National Police, the leatherneck's role is rapidly decreasing.

"The PNP is taking on more and more responsibility," asserts Ervolina, who was here with Kilo Company during the combat operations.

Trust

Webster, N.Y., native, Sgt. Franklin Bauseman agreed.

"The Panamanian people trust their own police force," said the NCO. "We work together on foot and mobile patrols. We primarily provide transportation, until they (the police in Arraijan) can procure vehicles."

Atop the PNP headquarters, Panama's distinctive red-white-and-blue national ensign gently waves. Sgt. Jan Miller of Los Angeles and his combat engineer team were putting a roof over the second story of the freshly-painted building.

Like Ervolina, Miller was in Panama before, first as an embassy guard and later, as a student at Fort Sherman's Jungle Warfare Training School.

"This is the third time I've served overseas with U.S. Ambassador to Panama (Dean) Hinton," Miller said. "He was in charge when I was in Costa Rica and Pakistan, too."

Diplomat

Surveying his Marines' work, Miller was aware that his job description entailed being a diplomat as much as a warrior.

The Californian actively uses his four years of studying Spanish to interact with the townspeople. When he and his crew rejoin the 2d Combat Engineer Bn. in the U.S., they'll be remembered for the lasting improvements to their current construction site: "Fuerza Publica de Arraijan."

complete with MILES gear and the rugged terrain. Almost every unit lost men to heat casualties. This tested the corpsmen to the maximum. Because of the rain, they weren't able to medevac them immediately. In addition to caring for those casualties, they also had to deal with the mock "injuries" obtained in the "fighting."

At the end of the exercise, the Marines took some recuperation time at a beach on the small island before beginning a live-fire exercise.

When the dust settled and cleared, the work was not finished. For two days, Marines worked in shifts

around the clock to get all vehicles ready to pass a stringent inspection.

A team of a doctor and three corpsmen from the 2d Medical Bn. inspected to ensure insects and diseases didn't get inadvertently carried back to the states.

After spending three weeks on ship and in the field, most Marines were looking forward to returning home to friends and family. They returned early morning May 17 and squared away their gear before starting their next mission.

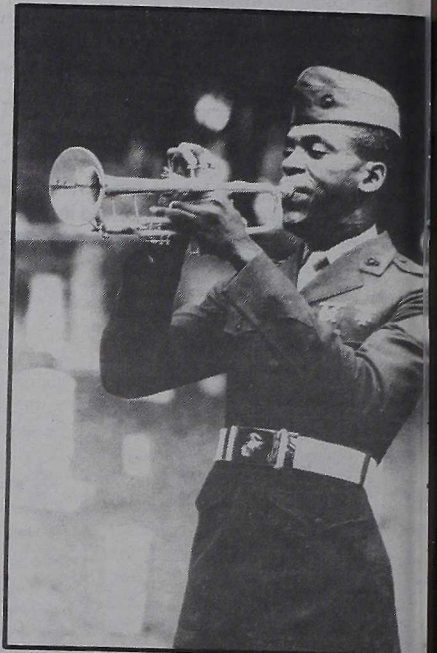

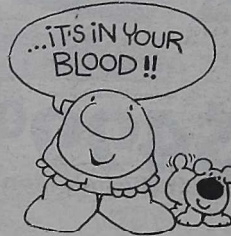

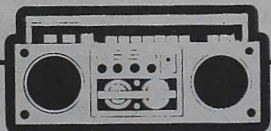

Excitement crackled through the air like a lightning storm as the racers filed into the track area for the White Oak River District Pinewood Derby.

Their uniforms sagged under the weight of ribbons, badges, medals, beads and pins. Crew chiefs made final adjustments to the cars, drilling holes in the overweight ones and sanding ends off the long ones.

Then the scouts separated into their different ranks: Tigers, Wolves, Bears, Webelos (first year) and Webelos (second year). Cars were placed two at a time on the sloping track, awaiting the starter to release them. Marine referees stood along the sidelines to assist the scouts in the

countdown, although the cubs needed little encouragement for a free opportunity to scream their heads off.

For some of the boys and parents, the derby was a new experience. Diana DeLuca, a den mother for Pack 94, and her son Zachary, 9, built their first car together. She said it's not unusual for the boys and their moms to work together since the fathers could be deployed or on duty. "This is our first time building a pinewood derby car so it was kind of a shock," DeLuca said. But the mother-son team got the car together and Zachary seemed proud of his work.

"I painted the car myself and had fun working with my mom," Zach said. "I'm here just to have fun."

It challenges the boys putting the cars together," said Bobby Barbee who's son Josh, 6, was another first-timer. "The derby not only teaches them to be good winners, but how to be good losers too."

"I think scouting is very worthwhile," DeLuca said. "It teaches the boys good morals and they learn a lot."

MacArthur runs down Coatimundi

NAVAL STATION, Panama Canal—When MacArthur said, "I shall return," he too, meant business.

Fairfield, Conn. native, 1stLt. John D. MacArthur III of the Lima Co., 3d Bn., 6th Mar. Reg., out-swam, ran and shot a field of 24 Marine Forces Panama athletes in the second "Coatimundi Challenge" here during mid-May.

In the first contest last month, he finished just behind former "Coatimundi" champion and fellow Lima Co. warrior, Cpl. Riad Frejji. MacArthur vowed to take the top spot this time.

Frejji, of Troy, Mich., placed second in this early morning gut-buster, which included timed stops for push-ups and sit-ups in addition to a 200-meter swim, five-mile run and M-16 target shoot.

The first non-Lima Marine to place — and the winner in his age group — was Marine Forces Operations Officer, LtCol. Bob Fawcett, 43, of the St. Louis area.

A pair of Navy Seals, Lts. Jeff

Bowman and Chris Maxey, both finished in the top ten.

Best marksman of the day and age group champion, was 38-year-old SSgt. Gary Stanton of Orlando (another Lima Co. Marine).

Named after the Marines' unofficial mascot here, the Coatimundi Challenge takes participants over the same thickly-vegetated trails which the furry, native mammal scampers aboard Naval Station, Panama Canal. The push-up station is positioned halfway up steep San Juan Hill, adding another wrinkle to the course which took the winner 41 minutes to negotiate.

Along with some pretty serious softball, the Coatimundi Challenge and other sporting events gave Marine Forces Commanding Officer (and pitcher) Col. Mike Hayes a healthy diversion to offer his men on rare off-duty time.

The event was organized by SgtMaj. J. C. Crozier, Marine Forces Panama sergeant major.

Comprised of a handful of Marines from FMF units based at Cherry Point, New River and Beaufort, S.C., as well as the vast majority from Camp Lejeune, Marine Forces Panama continues its post-Just Cause mission of security and nation-building.

Children's Aquatic Day Camp begins June 18

Camp Lejeune Special Services is sponsoring an Aquatic Day Camp for kids and teenagers ages 10-16 to teach water and boat safety. The first week-long camp will be held June 18-22, with registration from June 12-14.

The cost for the camp is \$30 and slots are awarded on a first come first serve basis.

The camp is designed to teach kids to enjoy water activities safely, and how to

react if an emergency does arise.

"Safety is our main concern," said Sam O'Leary, special services aquatic supervisor. "We want to help the kids get familiar with water safety and teach them not to panic in an emergency situation."

The camp will start at noon and last until 4 p.m., Monday-Friday.

Monday

The first class on Monday is Emergency Water Safety. During this course, the

kids will learn lifesaving techniques, spinal management (for diving accidents) and boating safety.

Next, the campers will be taught the safety rules for Gottschalk Marina.

The final class on Monday, Small Boat Demonstration and Practical Application, is designed to familiarize the kids with the different types of boats available at the marina.

Tuesday

On Tuesday, the kids go back to the pool for more instruction on emergency water safety. This will be followed by Small Boat Qualification. During this class, they will turn a canoe over in the pool, and learn to get it upright and bailed out while in the water.

Wednesday

On Wednesday, they will have another block of EWS and then take a canoe trip up Wallace Creek.

Joining them on this trip will be an environmentalist from the area who will teach the campers about environmental conservation.

Thursday

Thursday also begins with EWS, followed by another boat trip. On this trip, the kids will put their boat handling lessons to use by capsizing the canoes in Wallace Creek. Another wildlife expert will join them and teach the campers about different forms of aquatic and plant life in eastern N.C.

Friday

Friday begins with the final class on water safety followed by a fishing trip to the inlet.

The only prerequisite for the camp is an intermediate swimmer qualification or successful completion of a screening test. The test includes a 5-minute swim, in-

cluding the crawl and side strokes for 50 yards each, and jumping into deep water, swimming four body lengths underwater, surfacing and treading water for one minute.

Since safety is a theme for the entire camp, the classes have been limited to 20 campers. Six instructors will supervise.

"With the ratio of four swimmers per instructor, we can keep a close eye on every student," O'Leary said.

At the end of the camp the participants will receive a Red Cross Water Safety Certificate and a Small Boating Certificate from the marina.

The sign up fee covers all classes and field trips. For more details on Aquatic Day Camp, contact Sam O'Leary at 451-1441.

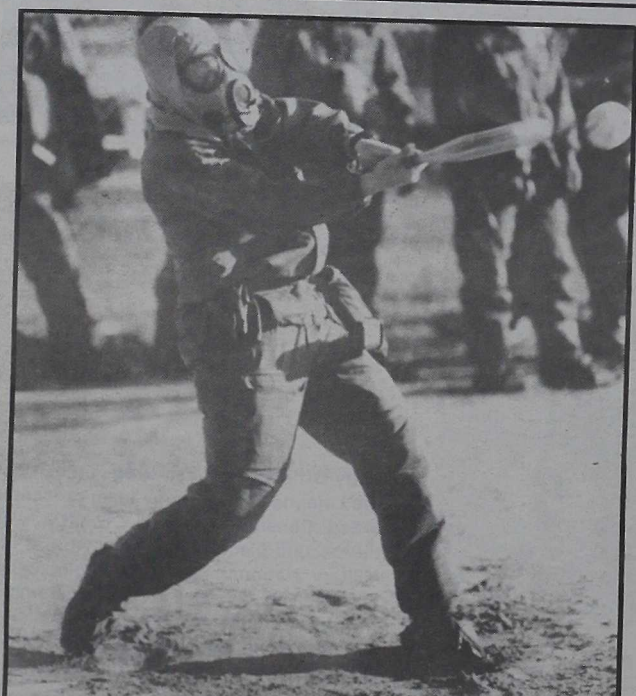
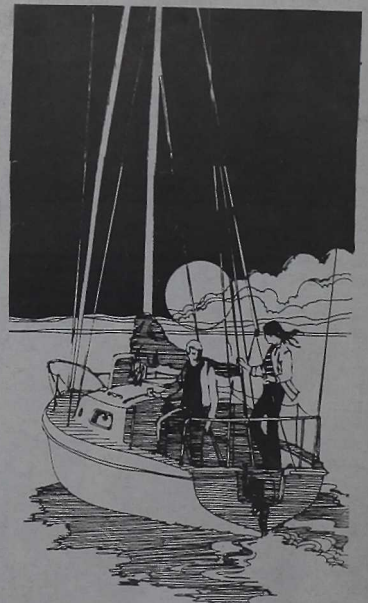
