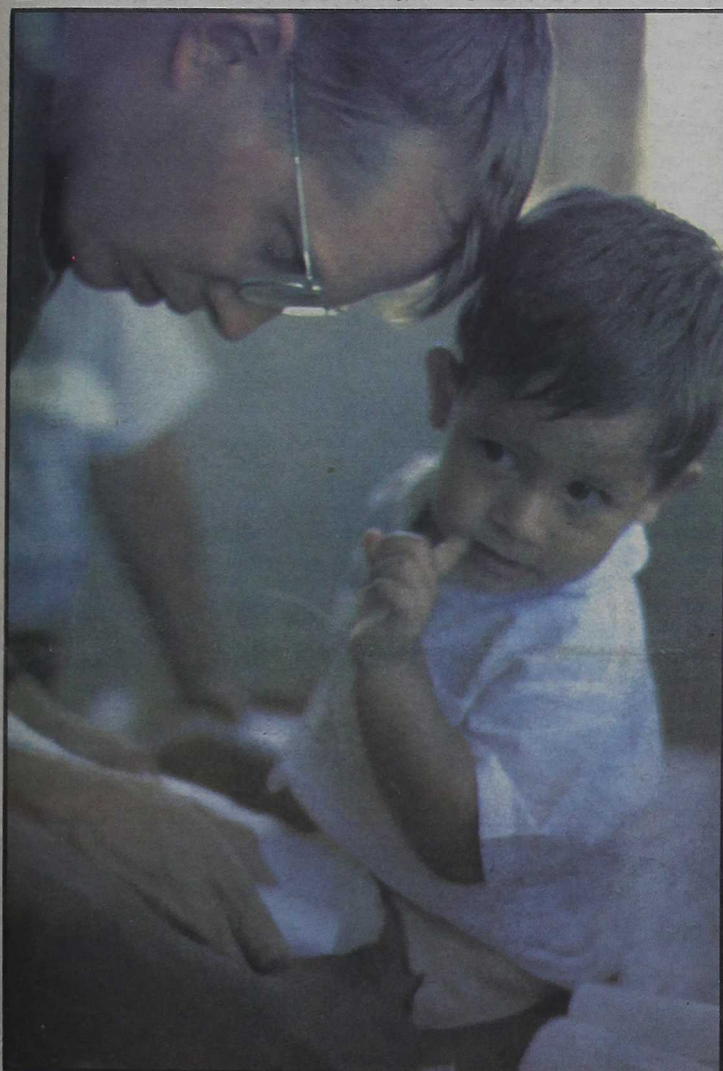

'Fighting Fourth' reunites to dedicate new memorial

Forty-five years after the deactivation of the 4th Marine Division, members of the unit returned to Camp Geiger April 20 for the unveiling of a memorial in their honor.

About 70 former Marines, from the 4th Marine Division Association, traveled from all over the United States for the occasion. For many of them, this was the first time they had returned to Camp Lejeune since the 1940s.

The association dedicated the monument to the many Marines who were part of the unit's short but proud history. Part of the inscription on the memorial reads, "Dedicated to the men who served their country, Corps and the 'Fighting Fourth' during World War II."

Following the dedication ceremony, the former Marines and their wives had a chance to tour several areas of Camp Johnson including the Food Service

Commanding general explains fund drive

Dear Marines and Sailors,

Navy Relief fund drive kicks off this Friday

This year's annual Navy Relief Society Fund Drive begins Friday and continues until June 6.

The fund drive is held to raise money for the Navy Relief Society, which is responsible for providing needed, emergency financial assistance for active duty and retired Marine and Navy personnel and their family members.

"I challenge each one of you to take this period and learn more about the great things that the Navy Relief Society does for people just like you, both here at Camp Lejeune and elsewhere. Give generously when asked..." MGen. Donald R. Gardner, CG, MCB, said.

Since there is no budget for relief services, a fund-raising drive is sponsored by the base commands to help replenish the money.

"The fund drive not only helps recoup the money given to the military, but it makes the military aware of the assistance available from the Navy Relief," according to Lynn Ritter, director of Human Services.

Other services provided by the society include financial counseling, layettes for newborns, visiting nurses program, widow assistance and a food locker.

"The Navy Relief Society gave \$1,386,000 worth of interest-free loans to those Marines and Sailors in need," Ritter said. Additionally, the society provided outright grants in excess of \$90,000.

Last year \$408,000 was collected during the fund drive, surpassing the goal of \$385,000. "We would hope to pass last year's monetary goal," she said. "We do not have a monetary goal this year, just 100 percent contact of personnel."

Contributions may be paid in cash or by allotment.

Eighty percent of the individuals contributing to Navy Relief in recent years chose the allotment system, which is a set amount of monies each payday, Ritter commented.

A Marine was convicted in federal magistrate's court in June 1987 of killing an alligator on base. He was fined \$2,000 and received a suspended jail sentence for killing the 440-pound, 11-foot-4-inch creature that state officials estimated at 30 years old.

A fisherman who saw the alligator regularly and was present when the Marine shot it, testified it wasn't threatening him or his son.

The alligator is a protected species in North Carolina and on base, which makes killing one against the law.

Recently people concerned for the well-being of the alligator at Ord Pond have reported cases of its harassment by others, according to Albert Henry, wildlife biologist, Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs, MCB.

"The people are fearful that others will hurt the alligator," he said. "They've reported people throwing rocks and bottles at it, and feeding chicken to it, which is against a base order."

The harassment of alligators stems from a general misconception by people, and a bad image perpetuated by Hollywood, according to Henry. Alligators are far from the "man-killer" image Hollywood films portray them to be. "They're shy, elusive and scared of people," Henry said.

Much of the alligator's image problem is because it's a big, ugly creature with large teeth, concedes Henry. Because gators aren't furry or cuddly, and make lousy house pets, they are easily exploited by Hollywood as bad, and the mythical "killer" image continues.

However, gators mind their own business — occupying a unique space in the natural scheme of things, according to Henry. "Alligators are beneficial to man," he explained. "They eat a lot of gar fish, which are especially tough on bass and other sport and commercial fish."

Young alligators will feed on bugs and insects, while older ones make meals from fish, frogs, birds and other small mammals like turtles, lizards and rattans.

Nevertheless, alligators aren't exclusively predators all of their lives. When they're young, birds of prey will pluck them from the water, and raccoons favor alligator eggs.

"Predators are the main reason why only 1 to 2 percent of alligators survive to adulthood," Henry continued.

Once alligators reach a few feet in length, they're no longer food for thought for hungry, would-be predators.

But that's where man comes into the picture. He doesn't have to be a detriment to the continued existence of this creature from another time.

North Carolina is the northern fringe of the alligator's habitat, which gives people a unique opportunity to see something they might otherwise never see, according to Henry.

Henry also advised using common sense when you do see an alligator in the wild, and to remember they are just that — "wild." "Leave them alone and they'll leave you alone," he said.

After all, something that's been around 160 million years deserves a little respect.

Statistics show: seatbelt law pays off

Seat belts are those nylon shackles that the highway patrol makes us wear. Everybody knows they're more hindrance than help, right?

Well, pluck the shards of glass out of your forehead and listen up.

When the state of North Carolina made the wearing of seat belts mandatory, they must have thought it would've been too much of a shock to some of the civil libertarians of the road.

So from Oct. 1, 1985 to Dec. 31, 1986, drivers in the state were issued warning tickets by police if they were found in non-compliance of the law.

On Jan. 1, 1987, the law in its full power went into effect. Violators are subject to a \$25 fine.

Twenty-five bucks is just a drop in the ocean compared to how much money and lives have been saved.

At the University of North Carolina's Highway

Safety Research Center in Chapel Hill, the statistics have been compiled concerning the effects of the seat belt law.

In the time period from Oct. 1, 1985 to June 30, 1988, it is estimated that 179 people's lives were saved because of the law, according to Dr. Donald Reinfurt.

In addition, 4,343 fewer serious injuries occurred in that time period, Reinfurt said.

Using data supplied by the Federal Highway Administration, the center estimates that \$500 million was saved in the state through a reduction in lost job productivity, hospital and physician costs and legal fees, according to Reinfurt.

So while it may seem to some the "Big Brother" is infringing on your right to be thrown about the inside of your car like a frog in a blender, the hard statistics show the law is paying off.

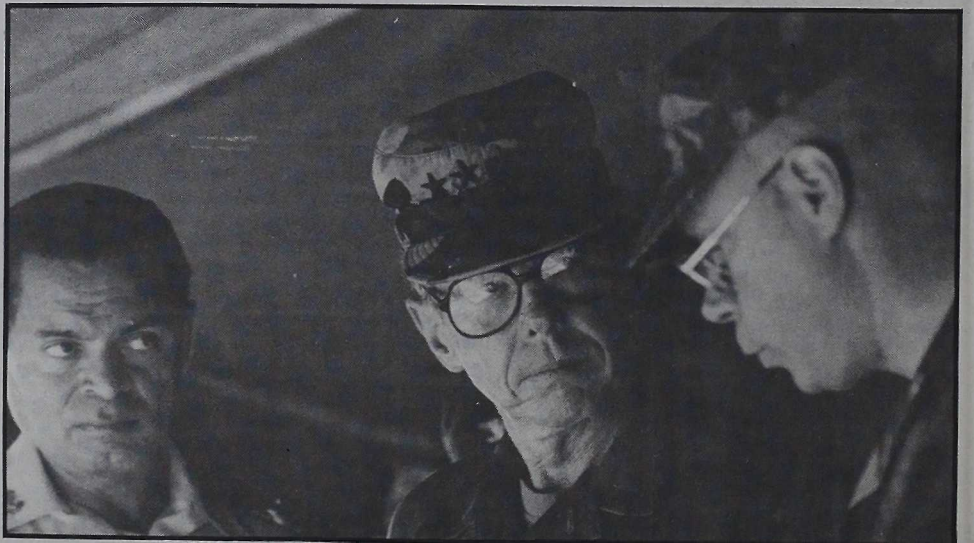

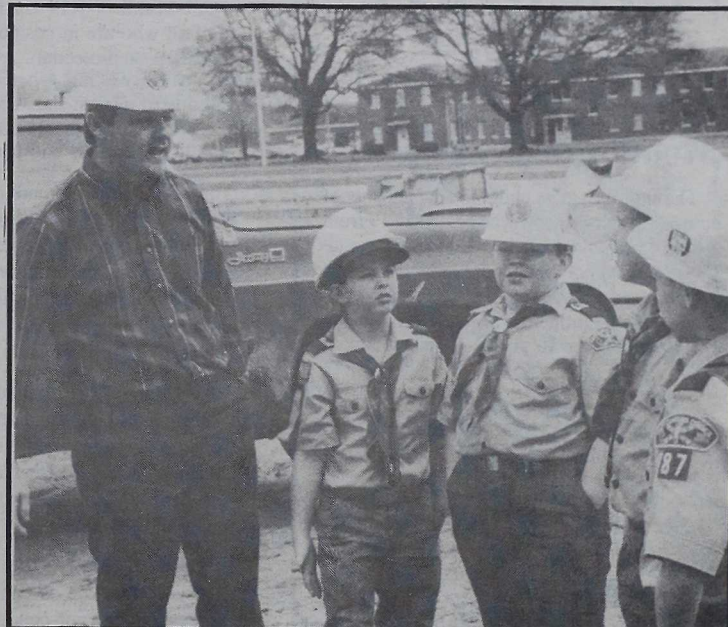

Fuel spill cleanup

The Installation Restoration Program here will receive \$100,000 in emergency Defense Environmental Restoration Account funds from the Department of the Navy. The money will be used to conduct a full site assessment at Camp Geiger and determine remedial actions necessary following the April 18 fuel discovery there.

Field work will commence in three weeks. It will consist of installation of monitoring wells to determine the presence/absence of selected contaminants in the ground water in the vicinity of suspected old underground diesel tanks at Geiger. In addition to ground water samples, soil, sediment and surface water samples will be analyzed as well.

A preliminary risk assessment and feasibility study will be prepared to determine the need, if any, for additional cleanup.

During an April 24 meeting between Stephanie Del Re, Lejeune's Installation Restoration manager, and the North Carolina Department of Environment, Health and Natural Resources, the state announced they were pleased with Camp Lejeune's quick actions to contain and clean up the site.

The Naval Hospital will hold a health fair in conjunction with Retiree Appreciation Day, May 12, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Marston Pavilion.

The health of your children is the responsibility of all who are in positions involving their care, education or protection. A large part of that responsibility is met when children are properly immunized against the vaccine-preventable diseases of polio, measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough).

In all our society there is no better or less costly way to preserve health than to prevent disease by immunizing with modern, safe vaccines. Yet, because of apathy or ignorance of these facts, many parents neglect having their children's shots until the youngsters are ready for kindergarten or first grade.

This is a very costly and dangerous practice which makes both child and parents the losers. Children are sometimes crippled, brain damaged, deafened or blinded for life. Parents may pay unnecessary medical fees and suffer the agony of their child's sickness.

We must work together — parents and health care workers. As a parent you are primarily responsible for your child's every need. Health is a most important need at any age, but especially for growing children. Get your child the necessary protection from disease. It costs so little; in fact, shots are free at the Naval Hospital Immunization Clinic. Let us help you help your child.

Immunization Clinic schedule:

Allergy shots: Monday and Thursday, 1-3:30 p.m.

Immunizations: Monday through Friday from 8-11:30 a.m., and Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday from 1-3:30 p.m.

Recommended schedule for initial immunizations of normal infants and children:

Age	Type of immunization
2 months	DPT 1, TOPV 1
4 months	DPT 2, TOPV 2
6 months	DPT 3
15 months	TB tine test, Measles, mumps, rubella (only one shot needed), DPT 4, TOPV 3
18 months	HIB
4-5 years	DPT 5, TOPV 4
Thereafter	Td every 10 years or following a dirty wound if a booster.

Abbreviations: TOPV: Trivalent Oral Polio Vaccine.

DPT: diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus Toxoid Vaccine.

HIB: Haemophilus Influenza type B Vaccine.

Td: Tetanus and Diphtheria Toxoids (adult type).

TB: Tuberculosis screening test.

Don't rip off Uncle Sam

A Marine staff sergeant has found out the hard way that trying to defraud CHAMPUS can be hazardous to your career.

A general court-martial convicted the NCO of obtaining a military ID card for an illegible person, who then filed fraudulent CHAMPUS claims for more than \$11,000 in benefits. The sergeant was sentenced to a year's confinement, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, reduction in grade to E-1 and a Bad Conduct discharge. He'll also have to repay the \$11,000.

In another recent case, a Georgia physician who admitted to filing false CHAMPUS claims will have to repay the government \$100,000, and won't be able to supervise the treatment of CHAMPUS patients or file CHAMPUS claims for three years.

Who can use CHAMPUS?

First of all, active-duty servicemembers are not eligible for CHAMPUS benefits. However, their husbands, wives and unmarried children (within age limits) are CHAMPUS-eligible.

Also eligible are:

- Military retirees, their husbands or wives and unmarried children.
- Unremarried spouses and unmarried children of active-duty or retired servicemembers who have died.
- Spouses and unmarried children of reservists who go on active duty for more than 30 consecutive days (families are covered only during the reservist's active-duty tour), or of reservists who die while on active duty.
- Certain family members of active-duty servicemembers who were court-martialed for spouse or child abuse.
- Spouses and children of North Atlantic Treaty Organization nation representatives who are in the United States on official business.
- Former spouses of active or retired military who served at least 20 years creditable toward retirement. A former spouse must have been married to a servicemember for at least 20 years, and must meet various other requirements as well.

Service hospitals save money

Always try to get your health care from a uniformed service hospital or clinic before using CHAMPUS. This can save both money and paperwork. Check with your Health Benefits Advisor to find out if the service hospital can care for you.

Even if you live far from a military hospital, it can still cost less to get care at one. This is especially true for expensive, major procedures. Transportation to the hospital could be less than your CHAMPUS cost-share. In some cases, the military may be able to help with transportation. Check with your HBA.

Outpatient care from a military hospital is free. For inpatient care, you pay only a small amount each day. This fee is much less than the daily costs in a civilian hospital.

Remember—if you live in certain zip codes around a military hospital, you must try to use that hospital for non-emergency inpatient care. If care is not available from the military hospital, you must get a nonavailability statement from them. Otherwise, CHAMPUS can't pay for any of your care. Check with the hospital's HBA if you aren't sure whether your home zip code falls within the zip code zone.

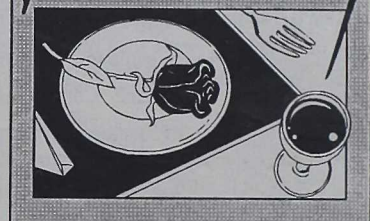

Marines leave mark during Ahuas Tara-90

HONDURAS — When the Marines and Sailors taking part in Exercise Ahuas Tara-90 left Honduras April 14, they left their mark in more ways than one.

One visible reminder was the two miles of roads built by Marine Combat Engineers and Navy Seabees around the shore-side community of Trujillo.

At the Puerto Castilla Naval Base, twelve miles away, the Seabees and engineers made another lasting impression by clearing a canal and six acres of dense, jungle vegetation for future use by the Honduran Navy.

Navy orthopedic surgeons, in conjunction with local surgeons, conducted more than 30 consults, performed two surgical operations and set four fractures at the Trujillo Hospital. "There hasn't been an orthopedic surgeon in Trujillo as long as anyone can remember," said Lt. Cmdr. Russel Oakley, Medical Det., BSSG-6.

Because of that deficiency, the Navy doctors found what would have been simple problems in the United States went untreated, thereby complicating the problem. They were also challenged to treat patients with diseases not commonly found in the United States.

"We treated children with fractures,

which would normally go untreated," Oakley explained. "Unfortunately, they didn't have the equipment to treat old fractures. As we approached the end of our tour here, we were somewhat more liberal in giving up some of our hospital supplies to treat those patients."

In addition to helping the patients, the Honduran doctors were helped as well.

"We instructed the doctors in how to follow up on the patients we cared for, and instructed them on how to care for those types of problems themselves after we left," Oakley added.

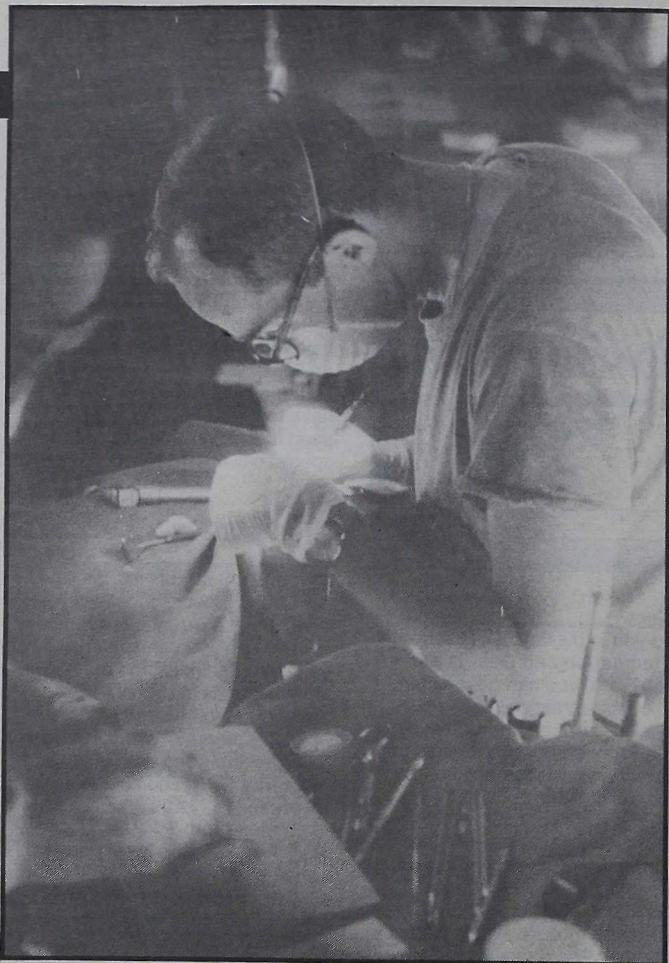
Besides the medical effort, Navy dental officers and assistants screened 178 Honduran Navy personnel and provided dental treatment for 22 Honduran soldiers, 58 Honduran sailors and 82 civilians.

The dental personnel not only helped the Hondurans; they received valuable training as well. Altogether, they pulled more than 200 teeth and performed 30 to 40 restorations, according to Lt. Cmdr. Adam Rutter, Dental Det., BSSG-6.

"We made a nice 'dent' in it, but there is still plenty to do," Rutter said.

Although the medical assistance was perhaps the most vital aid given by the Americans, the Marines and Sailors found time to help in several other areas.

Marines and Sailors made repairs and donated construction and school supplies

to nine area schools.

On a lighter note, the Seabees built a playground for the children of Trujillo at Fort St. Barbara with supplies donated by the Trujillo Womens Club.

American servicemembers always seem to leave their mark when they travel to foreign soil. These Marines and Sailors not only left their "brand" in the land, but in the hearts of their hosts.

'Crimes of the Heart' traces sisters' lives

People face emotional struggles in relationships, whether it be risking their heart in love, pursuing dreams others have for them or dealing with loss.

The pressure builds, seemingly unbearable as if they can't go on. Loneliness, depression and thoughts of self-destruction often take hold. Sometimes this tears a family apart; sometimes it brings its members closer together.

In "Crimes of the Heart," an on-stage drama, three sisters face the hardships of life and come to realize their love for each other is the most important thing in the world.

The Lejeune Playhouse will present "Crimes of the Heart," directed by Navy Chaplain, Lt. Chris Xenakis, 2nd Supt. Bn., 2nd FSSG, at 8 p.m. in the Midway Park Theater on May 10 through 12, and May 18 and 19.

The cast of characters include the three sisters,

Lenny played by Susan Doss; Meg played by Maggie Mudery; and Babe played by Tania Gonzalez. Other cast members are Chick, played by Deanna Patterson; Doc Porter, played by Sgt. John McKalip, H&S Co., 2nd LAI, 2nd MarDiv.; and Barnette Lloyd, played by LCpl. Ray Moser, H&S Co., 2nd LAI, 2nd MarDiv.

Each character is a unique individual carefully interwoven into the play. Together they paint a realistic picture of life for the audience.

Babe, the youngest sister, murders her husband because she doesn't like his looks. Distraught over this and her sister Meg coming back to town, she tries to commit suicide.

"I really like my character," Gonzalez said. "She's off-the-wall, a little over the edge and says a lot of things that don't make sense."

Meg, the middle sister, left home to pursue a singing career in Hollywood. She is considered the black sheep of the family. Free-spirited and wild, she is

despised by the older sister, Lenny, who is envious of Meg's ability to go after what she wants and get it.

"It's great fun to play such a juicy character," Mudery said.

Lenny, who has always been in the shadow of her two younger sisters, now faces the trauma of turning 30.

Rounding out the cast of characters is the first cousin, Chick, who is obnoxious and always involved in everyone's business; Doc, the "good ol' boy" in town who gave up his dream of becoming a doctor; and Barnette, the private investigator who helps Babe.

The three-act play revolves around the risks taken in relationships and the superficial crimes people commit against one another, even those they love. The love between three sisters and the problems they must solve to put their lives back together should provide an evening of entertainment to all who see "Crimes of the Heart."

McGruff House offers safe haven for children

If a child is lost, disoriented, hurt or in trouble and he needs help, there is somewhere he can run. It's called a McGruff Safe House.

"We have Safe Houses in staff noncommissioned officer and officer housing. These houses are marked with a McGruff (Roww! The Crime-Dog) sign or poster in the front window of each selected house," said Cpl. Daniel K. Kaiser, crime prevention, Provost Marshal's Office.

For all ages

According to Kaiser, the purpose of a "safe house" is to provide a place for children, from preschool age to high school, when they run into problems of any kind, such as the older kids harassing them, or if they get hurt.

"If a child runs to one of these houses and no one is home, his parents usually have told him where there's another safe place for him to go," said Kaiser.

One volunteer, Anna Igo, whose husband is a

career planner at Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron-461, said that she's been part of the McGruff program for almost three years.

"My house was always the one that the neighborhood kids would come to anyway," she said, "so I just went down to Delalio Elementary School and made it official."

She said there is a checklist of questions which the school asks, and another checklist which PMO representatives go over when they inspect the house for suitability.

Responsibilities

The responsibilities and duties of a McGruff Safe House volunteer or neighbor are to: Call for help in emergencies; monitor activities of the children during the hours they are going to or from school; report any suspicious circumstances to the proper authorities; record descriptions, license numbers, etc., for reference when reporting incidents to PMO; and offer medical assistance in emergencies.

The McGruff Safe House Program was

originally developed by the Utah Council of Crime Prevention. Now it's sponsored by the National Crime Prevention Council in Washington, D.C.

The Air Station Provost Marshal's Office has sponsored the program on station for three years.

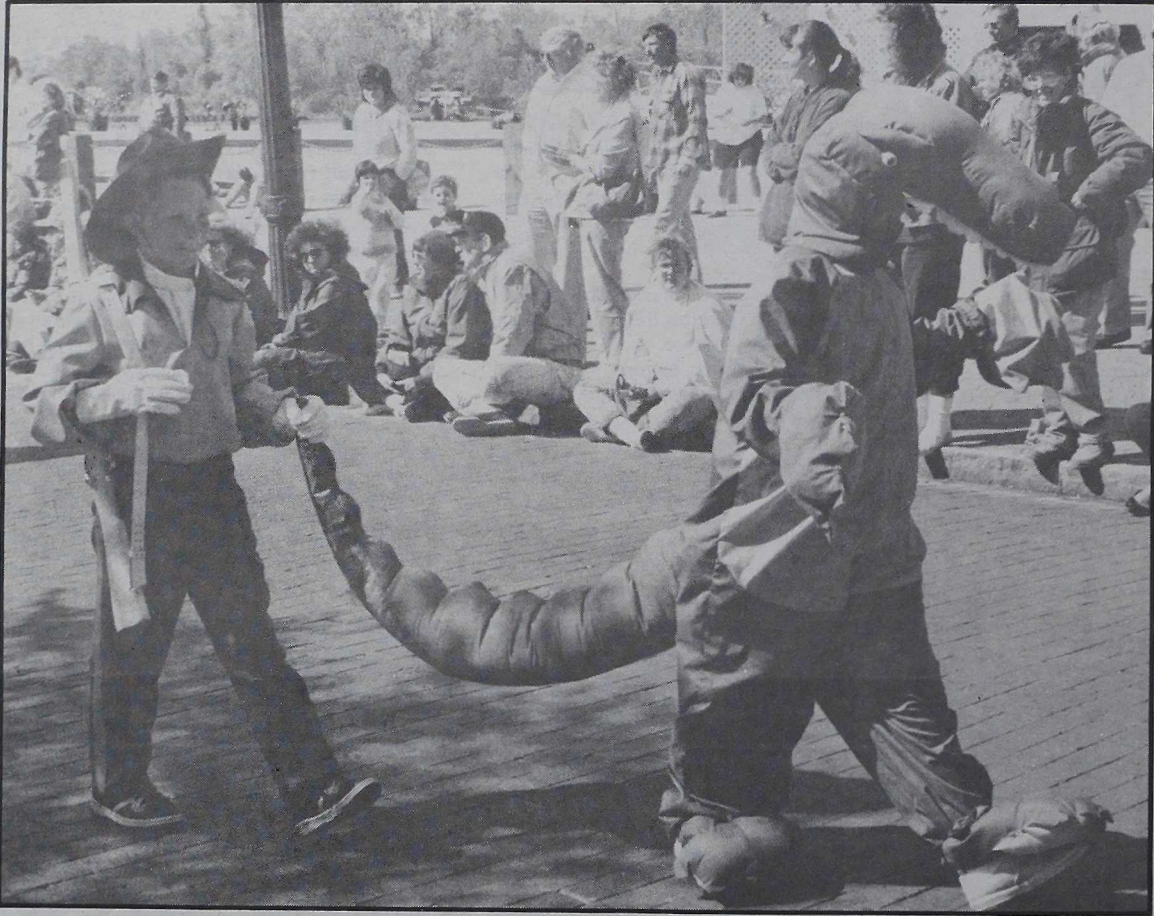
Challenging

"One of the challenges of keeping up with the program is the turnover rate of McGruff House volunteers, which is a lot because of permanent change of station orders.

To alleviate this situation, Kaiser said, PMO constantly has someone attend Boy Scout, Girl Scout, and parent-teacher meetings to request volunteers.

As a McGruff neighbor, the parents have no legal status other than as private citizens who have volunteered to act in a responsible manner in possible emergency situations involving children.

School, Finance Management School and Motor Transport School. Modern Marine Corps vehicles and weapons were also displayed.

The reason for the new monument stems from the division's proud history. According to the Division of Information, Washington, D.C., early elements of the 4th MarDiv. were formed in 1942 to help combat the overwhelming success of the Japanese in the Pacific. But it wasn't until Aug. 16, 1943 at Camp Pendleton, Calif., that the division was activated.

In January 1944, the division sailed from San Diego to the Roi-Namur Islands where it set three new records: the first division to go directly into combat from the United States, the first to capture a Japanese mandated territory in World

War II, and the first to capture its objective in less time than it took any other unit since the war began.

The division, which was committed four times in 13 months, received the Presidential Unit Citation for combat on Tinian and Saipan. Most of the division added a star to that ribbon for their performance at Iwo Jima.

The division deactivated at Camp Pendleton, November 28, 1945, two years and three months from the date it became a division.

It would seem that after 45 years, the division's short history would be easily forgotten. Those who were part of the unit's history hope the memorial stands as a reminder of the unit's pride for all soon-to-be division Marines who pass through the gates of the base for infantry training.

'D' Street post office offers shorter lines, faster service

It's payday. You finally have enough money to pay that overdue bill. You dash to the automatic teller; luckily no one is in line. Good, you have the money; all you need now is a money order and stamp. You hurry to the Main Post Office — you must get that money in the mail. Oh, no! There is a line — a long one. There's nothing you can do but wait.

Alternative

There is an alternative, though. The "D" Street Post Office offers almost all the services of the Main Post Office with virtually no wait.

"The only thing we can't do here is express mail," explained Cpl. Patrick Williams, a postal clerk at the "D" Street Post Office.

Just because it isn't as big as the Main Post Office doesn't mean that the service isn't as good.

"The post office is operated by Marine postal clerks with extensive training in providing postal services," explained Capt. M. E. Ferguson, postal officer, Camp Lejeune Consolidated Post Office.

The post office has been in existence for more than 20 years, but few people know of its existence.

One reason for its "secrecy" may be its location. The post office is located near the Julian C. Smith Drive end of "D" Street.

While the postal clerks keep busy delivering mail to 10 Camp Lejeune units, the postal clerks usually don't have anyone in utilizing the other services they offer.

The post office is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The next time you're in a hurry to get off that money order or package and don't have time to wait, the Marines at the "D" Street Post Office are waiting for you.

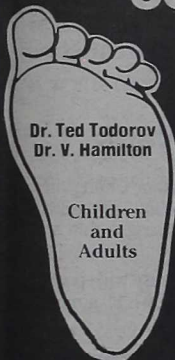

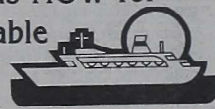

THOU SHALT NOT KILL

It's amazing what lessons, facts and figures can sometimes teach us. From October 1983, when terrorists bombed the Marine Barracks in Beirut, Lebanon, through October 1988, 323 American GI deaths were caused by "hostile actions." But in 1988 alone, 1,083 military persons were killed in accidents on or off duty, 778 of whom were motor vehicle accidents. About 20 percent of those killed in four-wheel accidents were legally intoxicated.

Against this carnage, we have the most basic of God's holy laws: THOU SHALT NOT KILL. This commandment tells us to nurture God's precious gift of human life — body and soul. It tells us not to destroy, maim, or in any way harm innocent life out of willful malice, carelessness or neglect. This precept covers both our life and our neighbor's life.

A POV is a wonderful instrument. It can serve us for work, travel and relaxation. But it can also be as deadly and lethal a weapon as a .50 Cal. or a MK-19. Would anyone in his right mind fire (or let someone else fire) these weapons while under the influence of alcohol or even in a careless, haphazard way? Yet, according to the statistics quoted above, many people in military service are doing exactly this.

Before you drive a car or ride a motorcycle, remember: Your life and everyone else's life is a precious gift from God and THOU SHALT NOT KILL IT because of foolishness, thoughtlessness or neglect.

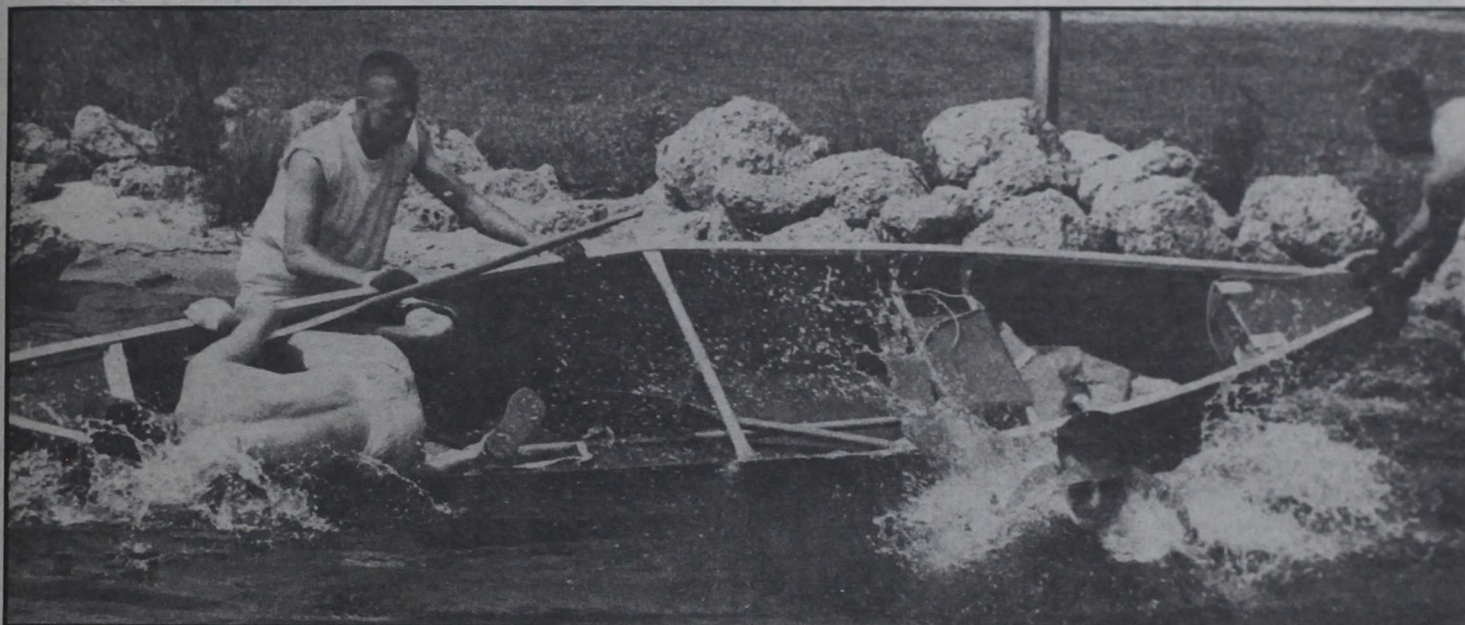
