# Oktoberfest frolic begins this weekend

## Volksfest

A brass band accompanies the procession to the Theresienwiese or fairgrounds. Once there, the burgermeister or mayor ceremoniously knocks the plug out of the first keg of lager to start the festivities.

"My last Oktoberfest was September 1988," said Brenda Hyland, a Special Services employee. "I grew up in Berlin, and Prussians celebrate



Oktoberfest just like Bavarians, although historically they didn't get along. Everyone likes a good party and if you have a tradition to base it on, it makes all the better."

This weekend, W.P.T. Hill Field will be transformed into a blue and white Bavarian village complete with authentic German bands, a dance floor, a free carnival, exhibits, games, crafters, hot air balloon rides, sky divers and, most importantly, Bavarian food and drink.

Festivities are scheduled for Friday from 5 p.m. until midnight, Saturday from noon until midnight and Sunday from noon to 6 p.m.

"We tried to incorporate something for everyone," said Nancy St. Charles, ITT director. Last year was good, but this year is even better."

# Willaford experiences a taste of Marine Corps life

It began with a letter to LtGen. Carl E. Mundy Jr., CG, FMFlant. All the letter asked was that the general be his friend and send him an autographed picture. But what James Christopher Willaford received was a personal invitation to be the commander's guest at Friday's capability exercise at Landing Zone Bluebird.

Willaford is a 28-year-old Richlands resident who collects signed photographs of military and political figures and a few movie stars. He has 3,000 to be exact. They range from President George Bush to actor Clint Eastwood, who signed his picture, "Make my day." But he says his favorite is LtCol. Oliver North. He has almost completed his collection of Marine Corps generals.

Willaford, who began his collection when he was 18 years old, says he would love to be a Marine but that a severe curvature of his spine prevents many activities.

"I would have like to have been a Marine Corps helicopter pilot," Willaford said. "The Corps has a lot of neat equipment."

Military figures are more interesting to Willaford because he sees them every day on television. He easily recalls the name of each Marine who has given the "Lejeune Report" on Channel 12 every Wednesday for the past few years.

Because of his physical limitations he spends a lot of time at home. When he's not sending letters, which is as often as twice

a day, he's playing his drum set that he keeps at his church.

"My set is exactly like the drummer's in the country band 'Alabama,'" Willaford said proudly. He also has the signature of every member of the group.

Willaford says he never expected to be invited to Camp Lejeune by LtGen. Mundy. Though he's lived in the area all of his life he has only been aboard the base to see "Alabama."

Although the general wasn't able to attend the exercise, Willaford says the visit was one of the best days of his life. He was warmly greeted by several high ranking officer and allowed to inspect some of the Corps' equipment that he has only seen on television.

The exercise, which presented weapons ranging from the M16 rifle to the M60 tank and most of the Corps' air assets, was a unique experience for Willaford. During a Dragon missile demonstration he exclaimed, "I'd hate to be Saddam Hussein."

After the display was over he was able to get a close look at a couple of the Corps' helicopters. If only he were able to fly it, he said. He also carefully climbed onto a tank. He said that if he had to choose between the amtrac, LAV and tank, he said the tank was his favorite because he sees it on television more than the others.

Once the busy day was over, Willaford headed home with a camouflage cover on his head and Marine Corps posters under his arms.

"I've gotten to see some things I thought I would never get to see. It's been great!"

seizure using four KC-130 aircraft. The mission was to be a night raid. The Marines had only six hours to plan and rehearse the raid.

For the Training in Urban Environment exercise, Hotel Co. would be reinforced by mortar and machine gun teams, a light sniper and dragon teams, a light defense section, fast attack (modified M-151 jeeps), and engineers.

However, within the six-hour rehearsal, all of these sections had to be choreographed into one plan. The rehearsal needed to work harmoniously. The success of the rehearsal and the success of the training would fall on the success of the training.

At the three-hour mark, before all planning had to be finalized, the Marines went to Lesko, and rehearsals were conducted. "There is repetition and redundancy built into the plan," he said, stressing the need for all sections to work in time with the success of the airfield seizure.

The confirmation brief began. From an airport the Marines had to be extracted. It became familiar to them with the help of diagrams and charts depicting the airfield seizure and extraction that would take place that night.

Afterward, the Marines were headed to their designated positions. There were four; FAVs were loaded onto the jeeps. Marines.

Quarters were tight. The Marines had to adjust themselves to a cramped quarters for the two-hour flight. Once the rear door was closed, the interior of the fuselage were illuminated by black-out lights.

Most of the men slept with their eyes closed and earplugs that softened the deceleration of the airplane. Those who

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adjusted and readjusted their equipment.  
 "Thirty minutes!" yelled a voice barely  
 audible above the engine's roar.  
 Sleeping Marines sat up from their  
 slumped positions. Eyes, glowing bright  
 against the darkness of the painted faces,  
 darted around the aircraft. Any rounds not  
 ready in magazines were quickly loaded.  
 The drivers of the FAVs checked their  
 night vision goggles and those with radios  
 checked their equipment.  
 "Five minutes!" a voice boomed.  
 The FAVs were unchained and engines  
 started. Each Marine knew what he must

The landing was almost unnoticable. The  
 back door opened and the vehicles were out  
 in a flash, with Marines running in two lines  
 down the back ramp behind them. The cool  
 night air blew in their faces as they stepped  
 onto the blackened tarmac. The moon lit  
 the Marines' way. "Get down!"  
 A group of Marines hit the ground next  
 to the runway with rifles pointed outboard,  
 as they had been instructed, while  
 others continued to their objective. The  
 Marines were not allowed to fire unless fired  
 on. From within the woods shots rang  
 out; the Marines returned fire. They had  
 been told there would be terrorists and  
 communist sympathizers at the airport.  
 A gut-pounding beating signaled the  
 arrival of an AH-1 attack helicopter and  
 several UH-1 helicopters. The reverberating  
 rotor blades cut through the silence like a knife.  
 As quickly as they had landed they were  
 gone.  
 Thirty minutes later, the Marines quietly and  
 efficiently, like a cat stalking a mouse,  
 retraced their steps back to the plane.  
 At this point they were halted before  
 the rear door was closed. For this was only a training ex  
 ercise.  
 The success of these Marines will provide  
 insight to the Corps' quality of training and  
 level of readiness.

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

# T-O-W spells terror for tankers

"I used to want to work in tanks until I saw what these missiles could do to one," said one Marine as he watched a downrange target suddenly burst into a blossom of flames and smoke.

The men of TOW Plt., HQ Co., 8th Marines, held a live fire exercise here Sept. 29; giving their gunners the chance to qualify with the weapon that could become a major factor if Saddam Hussein decides to send the large numbers of his Russian-made T-72 tanks into combat.

Formidable as Soviet armor is, the Marines aren't worried that their primary weapons system will do the job, said Cpl. George W. Stuckey, TOW tech.

"These missiles are heavy anti-tank weapons," he said, "but it'll take out any type of vehicle up to the best made tanks in the world, including a T-80 fitted with reactive armor."

Recent reports raise questions concerning the capability of certain anti-tank weapons that U.S. troops are carrying in Saudi Arabia. For example, the AT4, a small, portable rocket which must be brought to within 400 meters of a T-72 to have a reasonable chance of causing significant damage.

However, Stuckey points out the AT4 is not made for that kind of encounter.

"Those rockets are designed for taking out enemy bunkers, light vehicles and light armor like the BDRM-2, the Russian version of the LAV," he explained. "At most, it would disable the tank, but the tank might still be able to fire back. We don't have that problem."

The TOW (Tube-launched, Optically-

tracked, Wire-guided) missile can be launched from a ground mount or the back of a HMMWV, which gives it the high-speed mobility that its portable cousins don't have. Accurate from up to 2.25 miles, the missile can be fired, moved to another location quickly, and fired again before an enemy can return fire.

"Shoot and move, shoot and move; that's what we do," Stuckey said. "We would never shoot more than two missiles from the same position. We have time to move around enough, and we can pack seven missiles per vehicle, so we can take out whatever comes at us."

The annual qualification was also the first time that a few of the new TOW gunners had fired the weapon since graduating from the School of Infantry. The unit trained under the watchful eyes of Regimental Commander, Col. Larry S. Schmidt, who had come out to see his tank killers perform.

Vehicles moved up to the firing line in twos, their drivers maneuvering them into position. The gunners, some in gas masks, received instructions and carefully sighted in on the selected targets, and fired the tank-killing missiles.

The missiles screamed downrange. Their bright orange tailfins skirted over the terrain as they homed in on the attacking "enemy" armor. After an eerie moment of silence, the targets exploded.

Direct hit after direct hit was registered by the determined Marines, who more than accomplished the objectives of the mission, said Capt. Steven Baird, company commander.

The accuracy of the TOW system, in the hands of trained Marines, could be the key to surviving an armored attack in the desert.

# Terrorism: A real and present danger

At the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich, a group of Palestinian terrorists took several members of the Israeli athletic community hostage.

After several days the crisis took a bad turn when police stormed the plane holding the terrorists and athletes and several of the hostages were killed.

On Oct. 23, 1983, a fanatic terrorist driving a truck full of explosives, crashed into a building housing part of the American peacekeeping force in Beirut. The truck exploded, leveling the building and left 241 American servicemen dead.

In the mid-1980s, terrorists hijacked an Italian cruise liner sailing in the Mediterranean Sea. While waiting to see if their demands would be met, they shot a wheelchair-bound American and dumped his body over the side.

Terrorist acts like these and many others have made people realize that terrorism is a real and present danger in the world today.

In recent years, Americans have been placing more emphasis on training designed to combat the threat of terrorism.

The Marine Corps added a new section dedicated specifically to the subject in the Battle Skills/Essential Subjects Book, and initiated training at the recruit depots to emphasize individual self-protection measures for incoming Marines. A new course of study about

anti-terrorism and installation security was added to the syllabus at Camp Lejeune's Staff NCO Academy.

That training is designed to make individual Marines more aware of the threat of terrorism and to let them see just how simple it would be for a terrorist to act if left with an opportunity, according to GySgt. Edward T. Quigley Jr., academics chief at the Lejeune academy.

Quigley, who teaches the anti-terrorism course at the academy, places his emphasis on taking the threat seriously.

"When I go into the class, my first thought is to paint as grim a picture about terrorism as I can," Quigley said. "I try to show them how easy it would be for a terrorist to strike right here in our own back yard."

In the gunny's scenario he takes a plain black military issue briefcase and asks if anyone in the class knows how much explosives could be packed inside.

"Usually someone in the class is pretty familiar with explosives, and indicates the briefcase could hold more than enough to level a building the size of the Camp Lejeune Marine Corps

Exchange," Quigley said. "So my next step takes the students to the exchange. I put them there at between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. on a military payday."

Quigley figures that would be the perfect time for a terrorist to do the most damage. "By that time, this terrorist has already been to a surplus store in town, bought a set of cammies and some chevrons and probably gotten a haircut to complete the picture," Quigley said. "Then he drove on base in the early morning rush when security at the gate is minimal and base stickers aren't checked. He parked his car in the back parking lot of the exchange and waited."

During lunch, according to the scenario, the terrorist walked into the store with his briefcase and just walked around. Pretending to look at something, the impersonator set the briefcase down and walked around for a few minutes. Shortly after that he walked out of the store, leaving the case behind, got into his car and drove away. When the bomb went off 30 minutes later, the terrorist was already to Richlands, wearing different clothes and driving a different car.

"Do you think something like that is possible here?" the gunny asked. "I know it is, because we don't really take security seriously enough ... not as seriously as if we were in someplace like Saudi Arabia or Beirut. There we'd plan for that threat and security measures would be much stricter."

But even here at Camp Lejeune, Marines should be aware of what's going on around them. Awareness is the key to preventing terrorist acts.

"The threat of terrorism is constant and something every Marine must take seriously all the time," Quigley said. "Being aware of the threat is something that should be reinforced constantly, not turned on and off as the situation dictates."

In addition, the training Marines receive in boot camp and from Battle Skills Training has to be reinforced. Simple, common sense stuff like reporting suspicious acts, and not establishing a routine will reduce the threat, according to the gunny.

"Terrorism knows no bounds and terrorists have no timetable," Quigley said. "They can strike anywhere, anytime they want, IF they have the opportunity. We have to remove the opportunity."

When the threat is removed, every day can be a happy one.

## Center provides vital supplies, tests readiness in crisis situations

MARINE CORPS LOGISTICS BASE, Barstow, Calif. — It probably goes without saying that all servicemembers worth their salt would like to take an active part in Operation Desert Shield. Unfortunately, not all are given the chance, even when they volunteer.

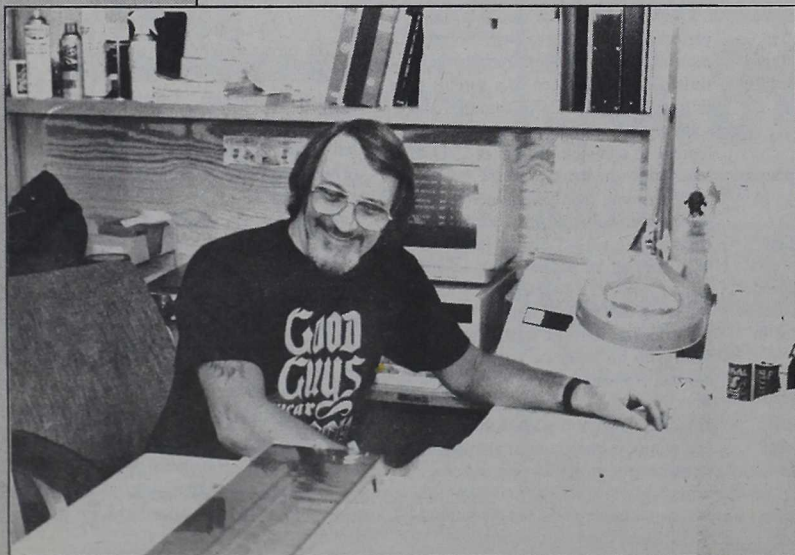
That wasn't the case, recently, here at the Supply Block Maintenance/Distribution Center. The "Crisis in the Gulf" put the readiness of this entire division and its integral crew to the test ... and they rose to the challenge and filled the bill as they have been trained to do since their establishment in February 1984, under the Mobile Medical Augmentation Readiness Team.

For those who don't have a clear understanding of what an SBMDC is or its function, you may be surprised to know how vital it is, not only in terms of crisis situations, but also in consistent, steadfast support, as they refurbish and distribute surgical and medical supply blocks to the Navy fleet, worldwide. And, they are particularly unique in that they are a one-of-a-kind.

A medical supply block consists of a number of pallets or containers of medical supplies used to augment established surgical/medical facilities. In simplistic terms, it's a large medical kit. The one most frequently used or requested is the surgical block. It extends the capabilities of an existing surgical facility, such as that of a hospital, a shipboard operating room, or a makeshift surgical unit in the field (much like the television M\*A\*S\*H series portrayed) to as many as 100 additional major surgeries.

Some of the items you might see in one

**In simplistic terms a medical supply block is a large medical kit.**

of these kits could range from medications and IVs to sterilized gowns, instruments and bandages. And the kits themselves range from Disaster Augment Blocks, which extend the capabilities of a surgical supply block to care for 250 noncombat casualties, to Trauma Triage Blocks, which provide trauma/triage stations for existing medical facilities during the influx of mass casualties. In total, eight different blocks are available through SBMDC.

When the military call for men and supplies for Operation Desert Shield hit the streets, Material Division's SBMDC worked around the clock to refit the required blocks and mobilize them.

They prepared five different kinds of blocks for immediate transport and now await any and all future material requirements for the Mideast operations.

Of course, their job doesn't stop just because they competed the short-fused requirements for Operation Desert Shield. They have routine commitments to 12 amphibious assault ships and three overseas hospitals.

"We keep a computer inventory of what each ship or hospital needs in their deployed blocks," said Dees. "Generally, we have to do a complete refit about every 18 months, although we are soon going to be able to extend the turnaround time to 24 months," he added.

When the personnel at SBMDC receive a block, or one which has come back to them to be refurbished, they follow a basic checklist to prepare it for redelivery back to its new deployed location.

After each step is accomplished, the block is returned to its new deployed location. This process usually takes about eight weeks.

There's a lot of time-consuming work involved for the corpsmen at SBMDC. I stress to all of my people how important the work we do here is; and they must feel that way too, because two of them recently requested an extension here," Dees concluded.

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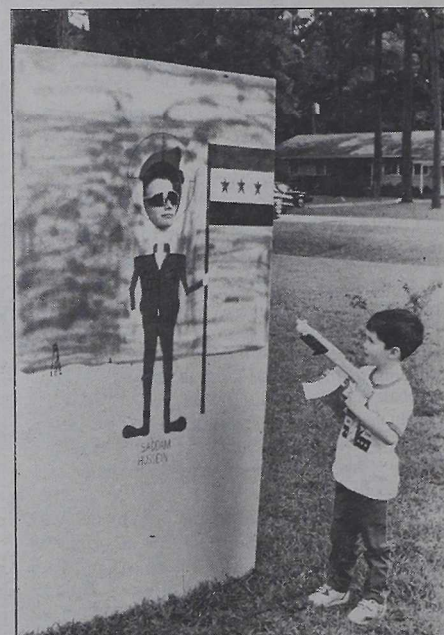

The league utilizes National Intramural Recreation Sports Association (or NIRSA) college rules, according to Bill Kuhns, this area's Commissioner of Football.

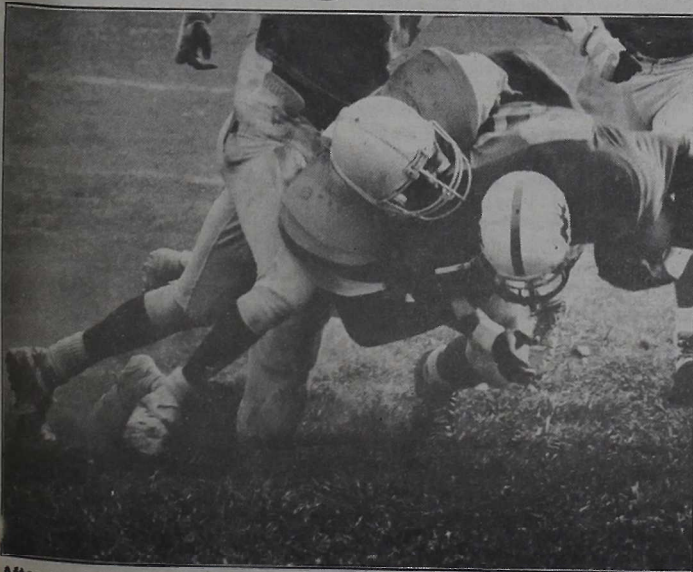
The rules detail the sport as that of a "completely non-contact" type, making the draw for women Marines reasonable.

**No appointment is necessary and there is no cost to patients for treatment and medication.**

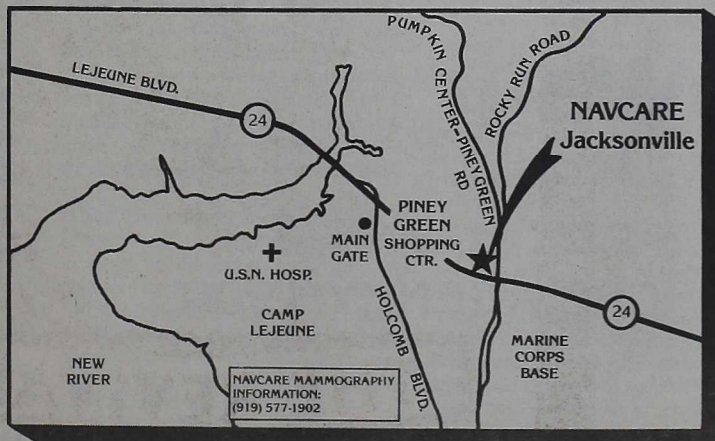

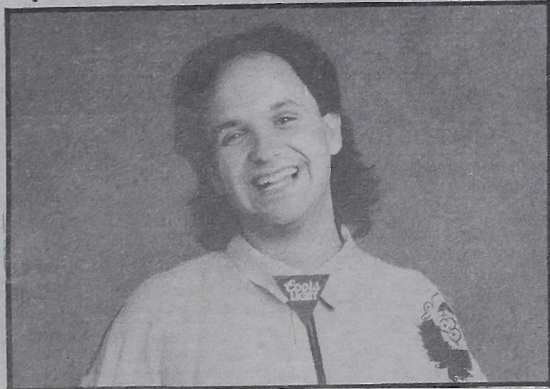
