1/10 celebrates 71 years

First Battalion, 10th Marines celebrated 71 years of existence Jan. 13 in front of regimental headquarters here.

In 1918, the mobile artillery force, 1st Battalion, was redesignated the 10th Marine Regiment and became the first separate artillery unit in the Marine Corps.

During World War II, 1/10, as part of 2nd Marine Brigade, sailed to the American island of Samoa.

Six days before the Marine Corps birthday in 1942, 1st Battalion arrived on Guadalcanal, beginning three months of fire support for the infantry.

Becoming part of the 11th Marines during the Korean conflict, the battalion saw action at Incheon, Wonju, Hongchun and the Chosin Reservoir.

Battery B landed in Beirut, Lebanon, unopposed in 1958. Twenty-five years later it was there again as part of a multi-national peacekeeping force. Battery C became the first unit to fire the M198 howitzer.

First Battalion carries seven battle streamers on its guidon including: Presidential Unit Citation with two bronze stars; Defense Service streamer; Asiatic Pacific Campaign streamer with one silver star; World War II victory streamer; Navy Occupation streamer; National Defense Service streamer with one bronze star; and the Armed Forces Expeditionary streamer.

Lt. Col. James C. Flynn, commanding officer of 1/10, said, "The Marines before you today will keep up with the proud tradition. You've done your job well...you've followed some very good Marines who were asked to do a difficult task."

Military pay: some taxed, some not

File Report

Because there are exemptions on certain military payments, there is confusion in the minds of some service members as to what is taxable and what is exempt. To set the record straight, here's the difference:

Taxable income includes:

- ☐ Active duty pay;
- ☐ Reserve training pay;
- ☐ Re-enlistment bonus;
- ☐ Service academy pay;
- ☐ Amounts received by retired personnel serving as instructors in Junior ROTC programs;
- ☐ Lump-sum payments upon separation or release to inactive duty; and
- ☐ Military retirement pay based on age or length of service

The following items are not taxable:

- ☐ Quarters allowance or variable housing allowance;
- ☐ Subsistence allowance;
- ☐ Clothing allowance
- ☐ Family separation allowance
- ☐ Station housing allowance
- ☐ Cost-of-living allowance
- ☐ Moving and storage expenses provided in kind or reimbursements for actual expenses for permanent-change-of-station moves;
- ☐ Benefits under Servicemen's Group Life Insurance
- ☐ Death gratuity benefits
- ☐ Forfeited pay, but not fines
- ☐ Certain disability retirement pensions; and
- ☐ Veterans Administration benefits, including VA insurance dividends.

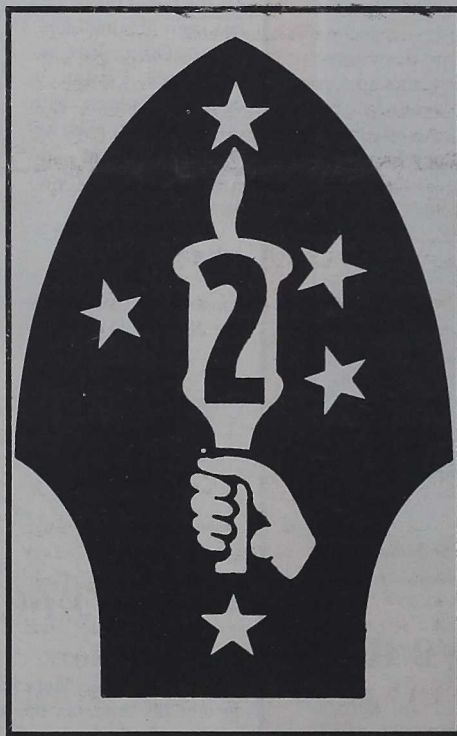

tax update

commanding general of Marine Corps Base, Lejeune, recently sent a letter to Onslow County officials requesting that the county delay enforcement of its vehicle personal property tax until February. However, the Onslow County Board of County Commissioners does not have the authority to delay or delay taxes, according to Crawford County Tax Administrator. He encouraged people to continue listing their vehicles for purposes until the Jan. 31 deadline.

There are a few common misconceptions that people have when they list their vehicles, he said. The first is that people have to pay the tax at the time they list, but this is not true. "Personal property taxes in January are not due by law until Sept. 1," Collins explained. "The taxes may be paid until May 1990, without penalty or interest."

Where active duty military members who are legal residents of Onslow County cannot list due to employment, there is a form available at the Onslow County Tax Office requesting relief of the recent late listing penalty for vehicles. There is a similar form for dependents.

Taylor had no idea at the time that he would run an obstacle course worthy of Parris Island.

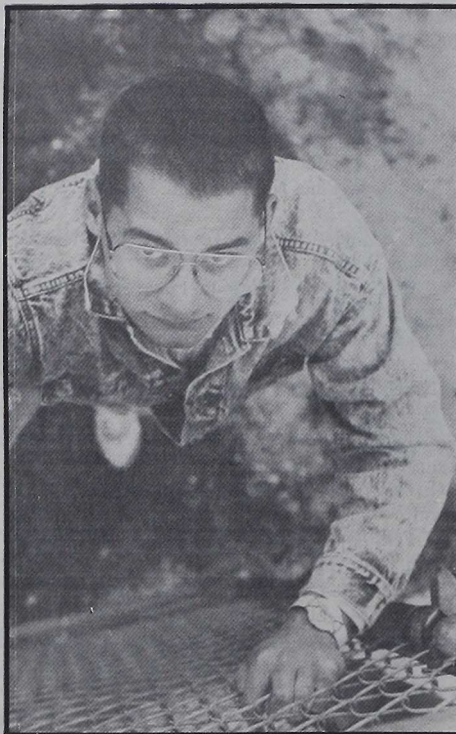
"The guy ran into a clothes rack and knocked it over," Taylor explained. "Then he went into the parking lot and tried to make a break for it. But I kept chasing him."

"I went home afterward and my mother asked me how my day was," Taylor said with a grin. "I told her that I got a free pair of jeans."

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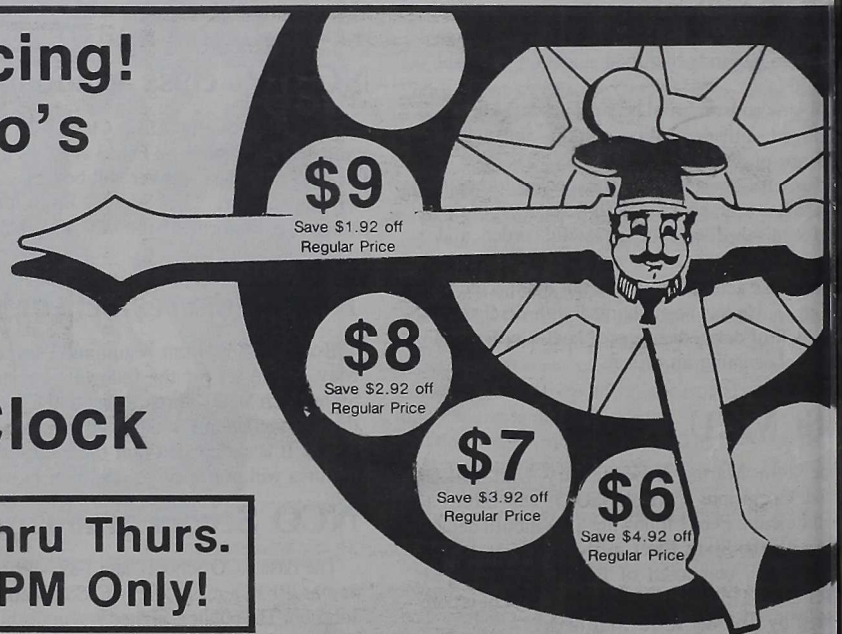
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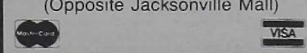

Tax tips...

PCS moves
may result in
lower taxes

File Report

If you had a permanent change of station move during 1988, you might be able to get back some out-of-pocket expenses Uncle Sam didn't cover, if you itemize deductions.

PCS expenses are considered as a miscellaneous itemized deduction that is not subject to the 2 percent of adjusted gross income limit. You must file IRS Form 3903, "Moving Expenses," and Form 1040.

PCS expenses that can be claimed include:

- Additional insurance coverage on household goods en route;
- The cost of shipping the family pet;
- Charges for renting trailers, roof racks and other moving items;
- Extra expenses resulting from shipping your car overseas;
- Added costs for exceeding your weight allowance.

All of the above may qualify as deductions, less any money the government paid you for your move.

There is no limit on the amount you can claim for moving household goods and traveling. But there is a limit on how much you can deduct for remove travel and temporary lodging. Pre-move lodging costs and expenses incurred in buying or selling a house cannot exceed \$3,000; not more than \$1,500 of that can be used for a house-hunting trip and temporary lodging.

Parents may earn tax
credits for day care

File Report

Parents who pay someone to care for a child or dependent while they work or look for work may qualify for a special tax credit, the Internal Revenue Service says. This Child and Dependent Care Credit may be taken not only for payments to babysitters and day-care centers but also to certain relatives paid for this service.

This credit is available to married couples who both work or are actively looking for work, and file a joint return.

The credit may also apply to a divorced or separated parent who has custody of a child who is under 15 or physically or mentally incapable of self-care, even though the parent may not be entitled to a dependency exemption for their child. The parent claiming the credit must, however, have custody for a longer period during the year than the other parent. A married person living apart from his or her spouse for the last six months of the taxable year, is eligible for the credit if a separate return is filed.

Expenses which can be used for the tax credit include only amounts paid for household services and care of the qualified person. Child support payments are not qualified expenses, nor are amounts paid for an overnight camp.

Percentage Varies

The credit is from 20 to 30 percent of eligible expenses, depending on the taxpayer's adjusted gross income. The maximum credit that may be taken is limited to \$720 for one qualifying person.

To qualify for the Child and Dependent Care Credit, a taxpayer (1) must have been gainfully employed or in active search of gainful employment when the expense for the child's or dependent's care was incurred, and (2) must have paid over half the cost of maintaining his or her household, which included one or more qualifying individuals. A qualifying individual is a dependent child under 15 years of age or a spouse or dependent who is mentally or physically incapable of self-care.

How to Claim

To claim the credit, taxpayers can file Form 1040A, using Schedule 1 (Form 1040A) to compute the amount of the credit. Taxpayers who file Form 1040 may also claim the credit, even if they do not itemize deductions. These taxpayers compute the credit on Form 2441, "Credit for Child and Dependent Care Expenses," and attach this form to the Form 1040.

Social Security
numbers require
for most children

File Report

Taxpayers claiming a dependent who is at least 5 years old must include the dependent's taxpayer identification number on their return. For most individuals, this number is their social security number.

If the dependent has a social security number, but the taxpayer does not know what it is, the taxpayer should contact local Social Security Administration office.

To get a social security number, a dependent must have evidence of: (1) date of birth, (2) U.S. citizenship or legal status, and (3) identity. A public, hospital or religious birth record is generally sufficient for the first two items. A school record and certain other documents may be used for proof of identity.

For more information, taxpayers may ask at any Social Security Administration office for the free leaflet, "Applying for Social Security Number."

Which form
should I use?

There are three tax returns for individuals: Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A, and Form 1040. You may use Form 1040 if you want to, but you will probably save time if you are able to

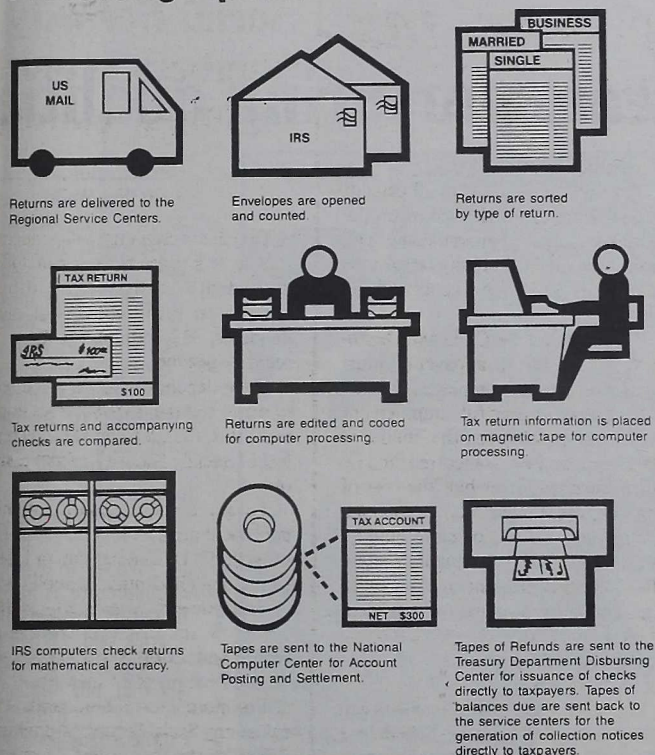

Recordkeeping important to new homeowners

File Report

New homeowners should begin record-keeping by saving a copy of the settlement or closing statement.

Recordkeeping will help them establish the basis in their home. The basis is usually the cost or purchase price of the home. Other items such as legal fees and transfer taxes may be added to their basis. They may deduct their share of the real estate taxes, mortgage interest, and "points" that are considered interest, in the year they buy the home if they itemize their deductions.

As taxpayers make improvements to their homes, they should keep copies of their receipts. Remodeling a bathroom or replacing a roof are examples of improvements.

The cost of improvements are added to the basis of their property and should not be confused with repairs.

If they use part of their home for business and deduct a portion of their household costs as a business expense, they will need to keep records of how much depreciation they claimed and

what portion of the home they used for business.

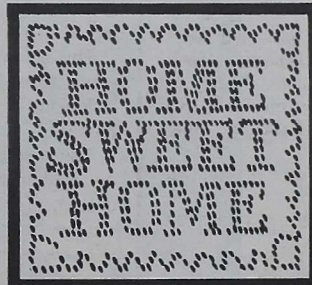
Records of selling expenses such as commissions, advertising and legal fees should also be saved. Loan charges such as loan placement fees or "points" paid by the seller are usually a selling expense.

It is important to keep records because each time taxpayers sell their home, they must file a Form 2119, "Sale of Your Home," with that year's tax return to report the gain on the sale. They may

be able to defer tax on the gain on the sale under certain circumstances and they may be eligible to exclude all or part of the gain if they sell their home when they are age 55 or older.

Normally, taxpayers only need to keep copies of their returns for three years. But records concerning their home, including previously filed Forms 2119, should be kept for as long as they own a home.

Home mortgage deduction rules change

File Report

Recent changes in the tax law have affected the rules for deducting home mortgage interest, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

For tax years beginning after December 31, 1987, the deductibility of home mortgage interest may be limited,

depending on when the loan was taken.

Any home mortgage loan secured by a taxpayer's main or second home, taken out before Oct. 14, 1987, is fully deductible and is not subject to any limit.

More detailed information is available in the free IRS Publication 545, "Interest Expense," which may be obtained by calling toll-free, 1-800-424-3676.

4-month extension to file available

File Report

Taxpayers who file Form 1040 or 1040A can request an automatic four-month extension of time to file their federal income tax returns, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

To obtain the four-month extension beyond April 17, 1989 (this year, taxpayers get a two-day break because April 15 falls on a Saturday), taxpayers must complete Form 4868, "Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Tax Return," and forward it by April 17, 1989 to the Internal Revenue service center processing returns for their area. Service center addresses are listed in the instructions to Form 1040 and 1040A.

The IRS stresses, however, that the Form 4868 does not extend the time to pay the income tax.

Taxpayers filing Form 1040EZ, or those requesting the IRS to compute their tax, are not eligible for automatic extensions. Also, taxpayers under a court order to file tax returns by the regular due date are not eligible for extensions.

Form 4868 may be obtained by using the order form in the tax package or by calling the IRS toll-free at 1-800-424-3676.

Your tax instruction package contains the information needed to complete the form. This **Signal Sheet** is simply an aid. Like a traffic signal, it does not tell you how or why you should do something. Rather, it alerts you to things you don't want to miss.

These families' nominations will be forwarded to HQMC for nationwide consideration to be recognized as the top Marine Corps family.

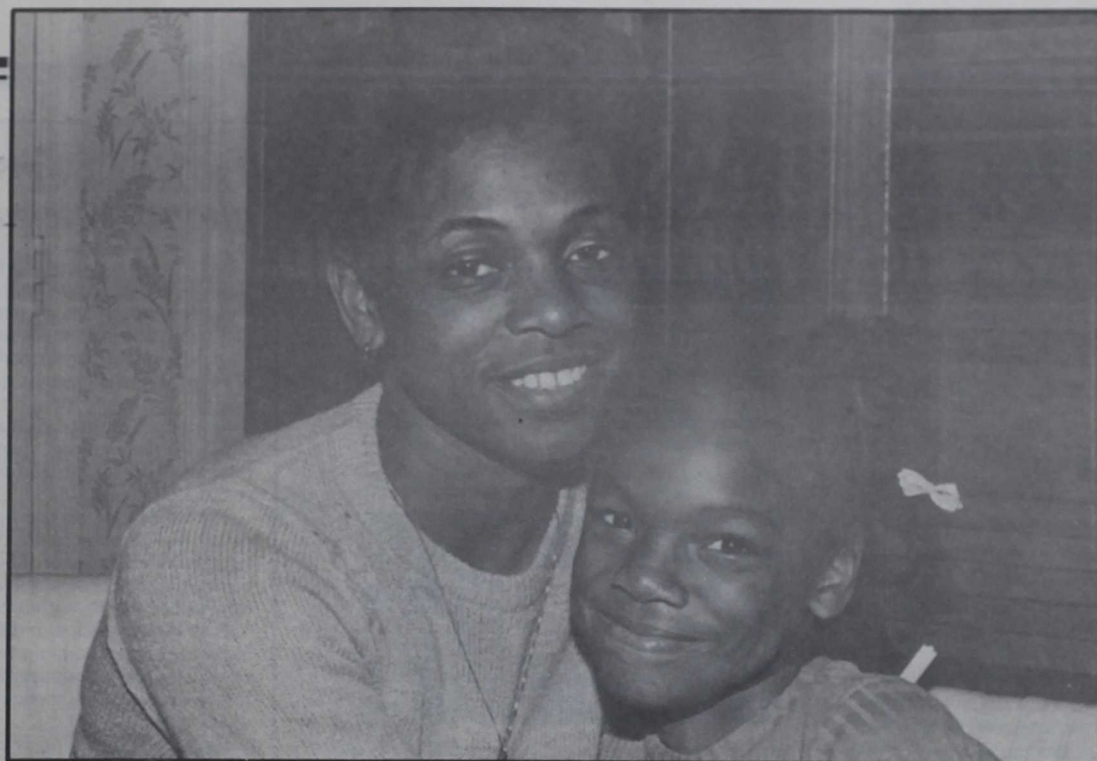
Once the family representatives of each service are chosen, they will have the honor of meeting the First Family at the White House.

overseas deployment.

"When I go overseas, Requaya stays with her grandmother in Georgia," Gould said. "I've spent two years on Okinawa and two years on the drill field at Parris Island, so she's come to consider that as her second home."

"My parents live in Maryland, and the girls would stay there in an emergency," Lestz said. "They'll spend some time there when I go to the Staff NCO Academy at Quantico next month."

Both single parents have found solutions to their most pressing concern — regular child care while they are at work.

"I have a regular sitter who stays with the girls all day," said Lestz. "The kids are well taken care of. They don't always understand that Daddy has to go to work and bring home the

bacon, but I always reassure them and they've gotten used to it."

"Requaya's school bus picks her up right in front of the house at about the same time I leave for work every day," Gould said. "She gets home around 3 p.m. and either stays at a friend's house or comes home and locks up. She's very responsible for her age."

"I actually had one of the other Marines in our office call my home one day to see what she would do," Gould said. "She was really polite but wouldn't give him any information, like where I was or when I would be in."

Both agreed that juggling single parenthood and a Marine Corps career has not been as rough as might be expected.

"I was afraid I would be forced to choose between my kids and the Corps," Lestz said, referring to his separation from his wife. "But the Marine Corps has been very helpful and supportive. I don't use the girls as a crutch."

"I was a single parent when I enlisted, so I had an idea what I would be facing," Gould said. "The military environment is not so bad for raising a child, and I know she's getting a good education."

Childhood "emergencies" that crop up — a child getting sick, for example — didn't seem to cause as many problems as might be expected, either.

"Every now and then, there's something I'll have to deal with at home, but I make sure it doesn't affect my job performance," Lestz said. "The only problem I've encountered was finding a sitter willing to come in early when I had to be on the rifle range by 4:45 a.m., but that worked out."

Although raising children alone is a rough job, both single parents agree they receive a lot of support.

"We see a family counselor on a regular basis," Lestz said. "The girls are a little confused sometimes about the separation and it helps me reassure them."

"My advice (to another single parent) would be to find out who your friends are," Gould said. "Find people you can trust, and talk constantly with your family."

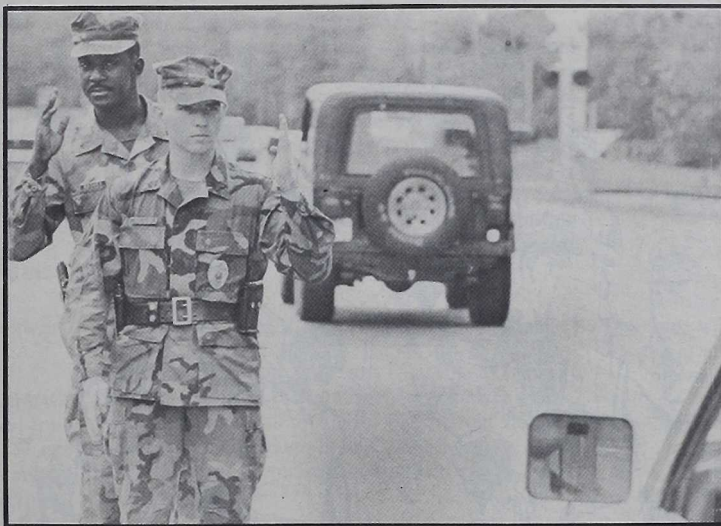

"There are three things that we look for when we're on duty," said Wilson. "There has to be a DoD decal and a valid state inspection sticker on the vehicle,

and the driver must be wearing a seat belt."

If for some reason the vehicle does not have a DoD decal on it, the operator will be directed to go to the Visitor's Information Center to obtain a visitor's pass, or to building 4000 for a temporary pass.

"If someone isn't wearing a seat belt, we just tell them it's a base order and state law," said Wilson. "That usually

makes them put it on."

The sentries at the gate do more than grant entrance to the base. They also assist people with directions, and prevent those under the influence of alcohol from driving on base.

Wilson and Brooks agreed that most of the people are friendly and eager to cooperate, and make their duty at the gate a lot easier.

"Gate duty is a great way to meet people," said Wilson.

NURSING ASSISTANT TRAINING

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'Away from Home' wives support during deployment

When the young woman's Marine husband came home and announced he was going on a deployment in May, she burst into tears. The woman didn't know how she would cope without her husband for six months, pay the bills and take care of the children.

Does this sound familiar? To many people, the word deployment means loneliness and isolation. But it does not have to be that way.

The "Away from Home" wives support group being offered by the Family Service Center can help wives to deal with the stresses and frustrations of daily life during a deployment. The program offers information, insight and references on a variety of subjects including single parenting, communication techniques, family finances and budgeting, and conflict and stress management. It meets once a week for two hours and is a chance for both military spouses and active duty wives whose husbands are deployed or soon to be deployed to learn, share and support each other.

However, "it is not a social group" stresses Cmdr. Paul Pyrch, Family Service Center chaplain and co-facilitator of the program. "We don't have all the answers," says Pyrch, "but the program dispels the rumor that the Marine Corps doesn't care because when your husband



is gone we care, Pyrch adds.

Wives gain insight into what their husbands are doing and how they are feeling from Chaplain Pyrch. Pyrch has been deployed several times and explains to the wives what the conditions are like aboard a ship and the types of problems and concerns typical of deployed Marines with families. This gives them a perspective of their husbands' daily lives and increases their own understanding of their

situation when they return. Participants learn not only how to prepare for an upcoming separation but how to prepare for their husbands' homecoming after six months of deployment.

This group gives women the chance to find out that they are not all alone, says Myra Kessel, Family Service Center counselor and co-founder of the two-year-old program. When a husband is deployed, the family experiences tremen-

dous upheaval because it is out of balance, Kessel adds. But by coming to the group and learning coping techniques and sharing problems or ideas, wives discover that "problems shared carry less weight," and so they feel more comfortable and thus more positive, Kessel says. Not a "down group," Kessel and her colleagues emphasize. A woman may come to the program in tears, but she won't leave in tears. She now knows she is not alone and has the support, acceptance and encouragement of those in the same situation. A wife who graduated from the program said, "I would recommend this program highly. I think it teaches us that we share in our frustrations and that we can experience difficulties. It's good to know someone else is in the same boat."

What skills does a wife learn in the program? She will have a better knowledge of her feelings during deployment and a better attitude about herself, Kessel says. She learns about communication, coping skills, stress management, listening and sharing. Above all, a wife realizes that she can make it on her own and she can survive a deployment, Kessel says.

The Away from Home wives support group meets every Wednesday week through April 12 at the Terrace Community Center from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. To register, call Family Service Center at 451-5417/5927/5997.

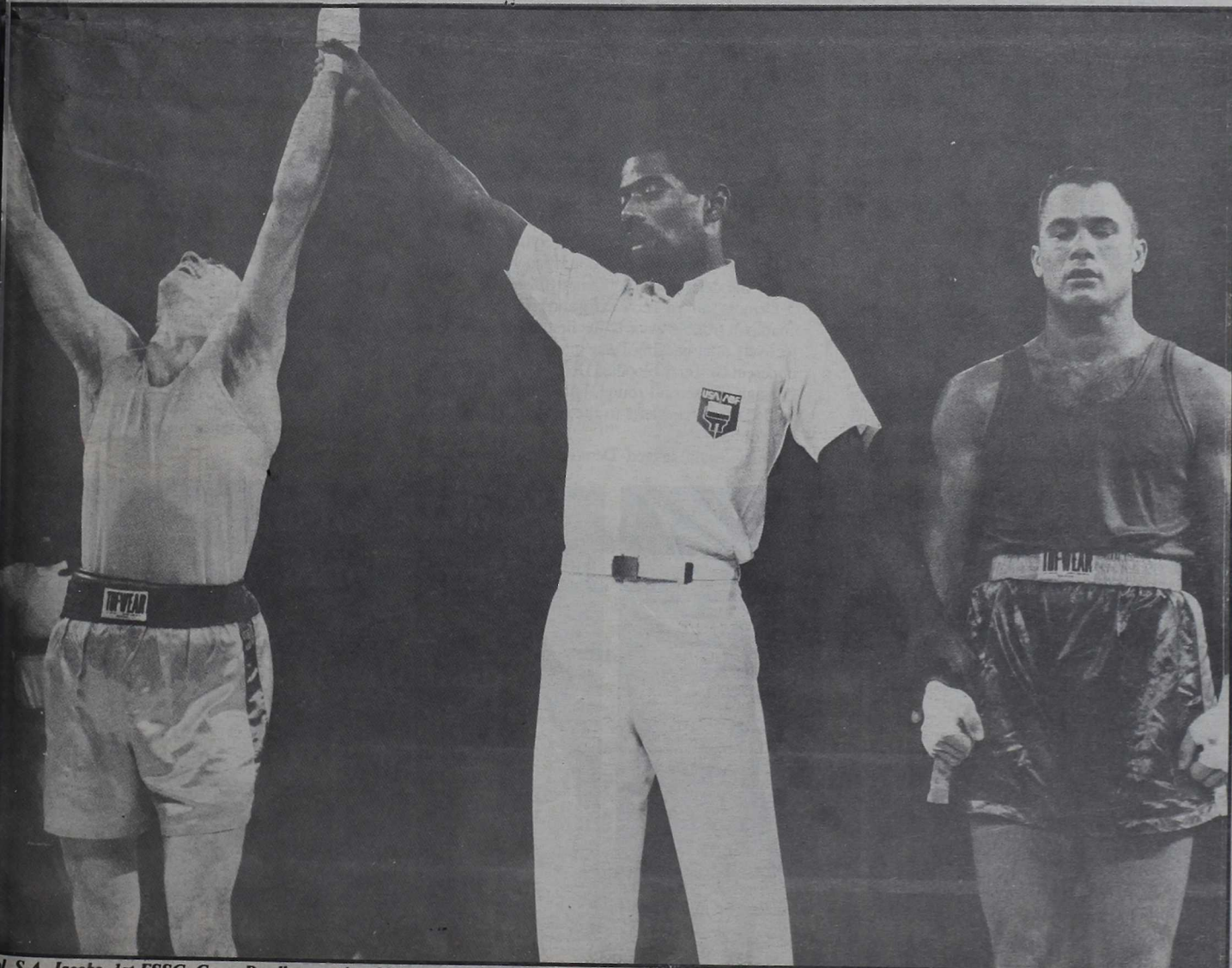
class.

Two other champs from the 1988 All-Marine team retained their titles in the

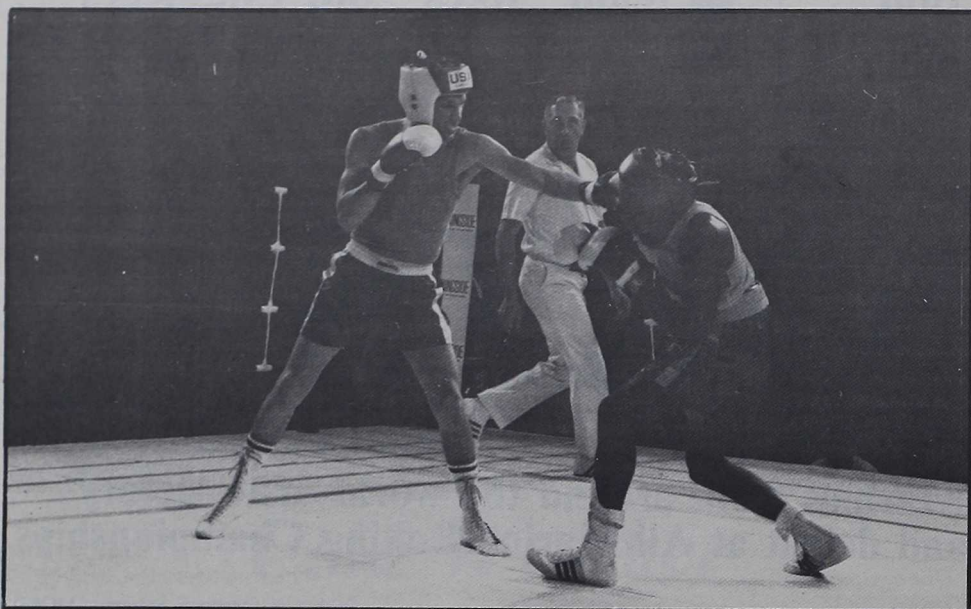

The other three weight-class champions were Cpl. V. L. Webber of MCAS Cherry Point, who outpointed 2nd MarDiv's Cpl. J. L. Miles for the 125-pound title; Cpl. S. A. Jacobs of 1st FSSG, Camp Pendleton, Calif., who outpointed 1st Lt. G. L. Lyon of 1st MarDiv, Camp Pendleton, for the title in the 156-pound class; and Lance Cpl. Gary Butler of 1st MarDiv, who outpointed Lance Cpl. W. D. Marino of 2nd MarDiv for the crown in the 178-pound class.

"I lost five pounds this morning and I felt really weak," said Stamps. "He (O'Shea) was on me early, but I was able to feel him out and land my punches."

Jacobs came out the victor in the night's wildest

affair, the 156-pound title bout.

"The lieutenant (Lyon) and I used to train and spar together, so we were used to each other," Jacobs said. "I knew he would be open for a hook every time he came in (close). It was still the toughest fight I've ever been in."

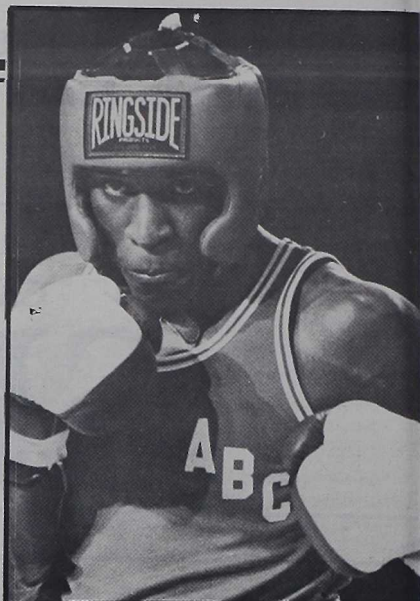
Both fighters came out like tornados, whirling and tossing punches, and the pace rarely slackened. After an even first round, Jacobs landed a series of right hooks that had Lyon in trouble midway through the second round, but Lyon punched his way out of trouble.

Jacobs continued to score with the hook and left jab, but Lyon doggedly shrugged off the punches to mix it up inside. A solid left to the head backed up Jacobs at the midway point of the third round, but he got out of trouble by again relying on the jab.

Demoss got inside the longer reach of Terry to upset the defending 165-pound titlist.

Demoss stalked Terry early and had the defending champ in trouble twice in the first round, scoring effectively after backing Terry into the corner. A good uppercut by Terry bloodied Demoss' mouth midway through the second round, but Demoss rallied and landed three hard lefts to the head of Terry late in the round.

Terry again tagged Demoss early in the final

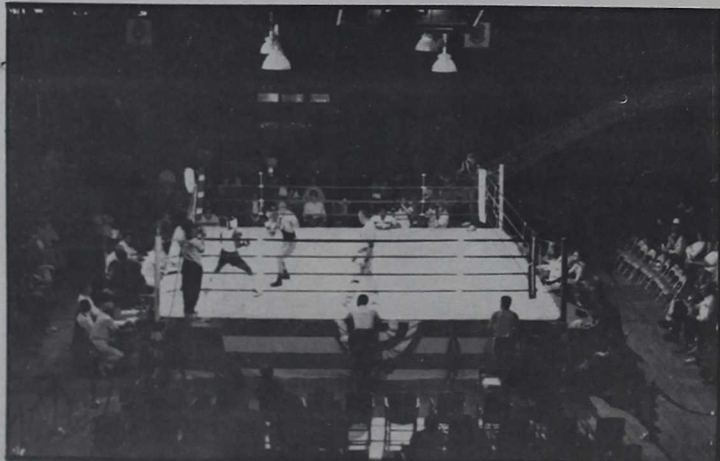


A boxer listens to advice between rounds before facing his opponent for another slug-fest.

2nd Maintenance kept the pressure on, passing and shooting with precision to keep the edge over the Engineers.

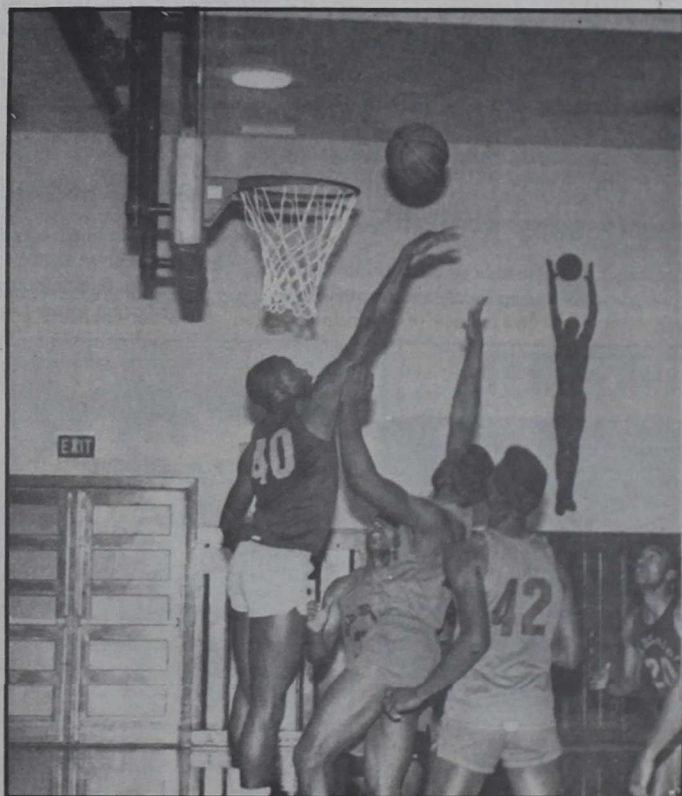
As the "fixers" game got tighter, the Engineers seemed to lose momentum, and their ball handling became careless in a futile attempt to recapture the lead.
