It is a national holiday that is not a celebration. Memorial Day is a solemn occasion to honor and remember the hundreds of thousands of patriotic Americans that have been killed in battle.

The observance of Memorial Day—also referred to as Decoration Day—began shortly after the bitter Civil War, that wrenched our nation in two. Originally, Memorial Day honored soldiers slain in the Civil War, but is now the occasion for remembering and honoring lives lost in all military conflicts: the Spanish-American War, World Wars I and II, the Korean Conflict, the Vietnam Conflict, the Lebanon Peacekeeping Mission, and the most-recent Grenada rescue mission.

Several communities claim the origin of Memorial Day, but in May 1966, the U.S. government, by presidential proclamation named Waterloo, N.Y., as the holiday's official birth place. The residents of Waterloo first observed Memorial Day on May 5, 1866, when businesses were closed, soldiers' graves were decorated, and flags were flown at half-mast in honor of slain Civil War soldiers. Memorial Day became a federal holiday, by law, in 1971.

Prior to Waterloo's claim on the holiday's birthplace, the most-widely known and accepted story dates back to April 25, 1866, when a group of women gathered at the Friendship Cemetery, Columbus, Miss., to place flowers on the graves of soldiers that had lost their lives at the Battle of Shiloh. Fifteen hundred Confederate soldiers, and one hundred Union soldiers were buried at the cemetery, where the women placed flowers on the graves of Blue and Gray soldiers alike.

Their actions brought a moveme toward reconciliation, and prompted to New York Herald to print: "The wom of Columbus, Mississippi, have show themselves impartial in their offerings the memory of the dead. They strew flowers alike on the graves of the Cofederate and of the National soldiers

PMO steps up its war on drugs

The Provost Marshal Office is using an old eapon" for the new war on drugs.

It's not a pistol, rifle or missile. It's something little different.

In accordance with Title 21, United States Code Section 881, vehicles or property used to manufacture, transport or store illegal drugs may be seized by law enforcement officials

"If a vehicle is seized, it automatically becomes the property of the U.S. government," said Maj. Mark A. Nall, Deputy Provost Marshal. "The government can dispose of it in any way it sees fit."

If a vehicle is seized by PMO, the driver is given a receipt for all items confiscated to include everything from stereo systems to documents and film. From there, the driver is advised PMO will coordinate with the Staff Judge Advocate for determination on whether or not the vehicle will be returned.

The driver is notified within three to seven days on the fate of the vehicle.

Not only automobiles may be seized, Nall said. Boats, motorcycles and any other personal property may be impounded as well.

The law, in existence since 1970, is applicable to everyone, whether or not they actually own the vehicle or property impounded.

"A prime example would be a military dependent using their sponsor's vehicle or a civilian driving on base," Nall said. "It doesn't matter who owns it. If the vehicle was used in violation of the code, it may be seized, no questions

Nall added, the "weapon" has been in the arsenal for a while and PMO is ready to en-

When Marines and Sailors attend boot camp they receive a seabag of basic issue uniforms. At Camp Lejeune, newborn babies, like their military

mom or dad, receives their basic issue in the form of a layette. The volunteers of the Navy Relief Society program affectionately call the layette "baby's first sea bag."

Like the issue of military clothing, the layette provides infants with their basic needs in both clothing and a "rack." The layette contains diapers, booties, bonnets, trousers, blouses, an Afghan and a foam mattress.

The box all these goodies come in can also be used in coordination with the foam mattress and blanket as a "rack" for the little bundles of joy.

Most of the items in the layette are either hand-crocheted or knitted by Navy Relief volunteers.

"We have 40 extremely dedicated and caring in-dividuals who volunteer their time and energy to the Layette Program, said Don Larson, executive director of Navy Relief.

"Some are senior citizens, a few are



The list of goodies which were displayed included cookies, pies, puff pastry, yeast doughs, Danish pastry and decorated cakes.


The aroma of sweet baked goods filled the air, but the artistic arrangement of the delectable goods almost made the sense of sight overpower the sense

Seabees return to Lejeune for annual two-week training

It could be said Seabees really "dig" their job. They also "dig" Camp Lejeune.
A detachment of 27 Seabees from Reserve Naval Construction Force Sup-

port Unit-1 of Ebensburg, Pa., recently went through its annual two-week train-ing at Camp Lejeune. In addition to honconstruction skills, the Seabees underwent an intense military training package put together by Gunnery Sgt. Burdette Chapel of Tactics Section, 2nd MarDiv. Schools.

The Seabees were impressed.
"This is the best military training I've ever received," said Petty Officer 3rd Class Michael Ruffing. "Division Schools did quite a job with the training package. Seabees are basically a defensive unit, and we all learned a lot about small-unit tactics and defensive preparations. We learned things we'd never had the chance to work on before."

The combat training included weapons instruction, survival techniques and even included training with the Multiple Integrated Laser Engagement System (MILES).

"I learned a lot more about the military aspect of my job than I've ever learned at one time," said Petty Officer 3rd Class Bill Matoka. "And that MILES stuff was

The Seabees also spent some time doing what they do best - heavy construction.

The second week of their training focused on improvements to the Special Operations Training Group infiltration course at Stone Bay rifle range. Included in the construction were several types of assault walls, a narrow alley infiltration point, demolition walls and an indoor

point, demolition waits and an indoor shooting range.

"The indoor shooting range is impressive. There are only two others like it in the country," said Capt. Thomas R. Gross, CO of 8th Reserve Naval Construction Regiment. "We've been very impressed by the facilities and training available here. The whole package has been mutually beneficial for both the Marines and the Seabees." Marines and the Seabees.

The Seabees considered their two weeks at Camp Lejeune as time well

spent.



Marines, Sailors ready AAVs for ship to shore trij

"Set condition One Alpha for AAV operations," the voice on the speaker echoed throughout the ship. It's 7:50 a.m., May 13, 1989: D-Day for Exercise Solid Shield '89.

Activity in the tank deck accelerates as Marines and Sailors ready the 15 Amphibious Assault Vehicles from Delta Co., 2nd Assault Amphibian Bn. Infantrymen from India Co., 3rd Bn., 6th Marines appear on deck to load the AAVs The imposing look of their camouflage faces coupled with their weapons and equipment makes them look out of their element when contrasted against the gray ship.

While the Marines prepare themselves, the Tank Landing Ship, USS Harlin County, is approaching its release point. Her sisters, the USS Sumter and USS Saginaw, follow close behind carrying the second and third waves.

At 2:30 a.m., 15 minutes before splashing, a quick check outside a hatch reveals virtually no Marine life. The stern gate is open — ready to release its Marines into the sea for the push to the beach. The noise of the engines and

the diesel exhaust fills the tank deck of the ship.

Every hatch on the AAVs is closed and the engines are revved. Inside the dark monster there is a little relief from the exhaust and noise. The infantrymen are oblivious to what is going on outside; for this leg of the assault they are passengers.

At 8:30 a.m. the AAV roars forward. Everyone braces himself as the vehicle pitches down and is quickly slowed by the impact of hitting the ocean. Fourteen AAVs follow suit to form the first wave, and the 3,200-yard ride to the beach begins.

What seems like centuries later, the tracks bite sand and lift the vehicle out of the surf and over the beach. The AAVs and the infantry work quickly to secure the beach and then move on to cross the Intercoastal Waterway to seize other landing force objectives. The easy portion, movement to the beach, is over. Now the Marines have to react.

"The movement from ship to shore is basically set," explained Maj. Patrick H. Hannum, commanding officer of Delta Co., 2nd Amphibious Assault Bn. "Once on the beach though, the Battalion Landing Team commander will exercise the AAVs based on the tactical situation."

The Marines had to adjust the plans slightly when they

got to the beach as two AAVs broke down on the be and had to be left behind.





confronted with two water trucks and a HMMWV attempting the maneuver. The problem: two-lane traffic on a one way road and no place to turn around.

Smooth egress and regress from the water supply for Brigade Service Support Group 4 (BSSG-4) seemed impossible: until the engineers arrived with the solution.

A bridge, installed by Bridge Co. and Charlie Co., 8th Engineer Support Bn., provided crucial access to the potable vater supply at Tactical Landing Zone (TLZ) Jaybird on D-Day, Exercise Solid Shield '89. Construction of the bridge eliminated the traffic jam.

The new bridge replaced a dilapidated structure, according to 1st Lt. Jay Johnson, commanding officer, Charlie Co. "We restored the road to full trafficability: an access able to support 70 tons," said Johnson, a Marietta, Ohio native.

The Marines of 8th Engineering Support Bn. worked for three hours, under time and manpower constraints, to break down and respan the 67 foot gap, said Johnson.

The bridge site was classified as a restricted area, which meant that many unexpected problems arose because the troops were not used to working in tight, restrictive sites, said Sgt. Billy J. Inman, bridge construction foreman.

'It was good training for the men and the first time ever that they had come in and rebuilt a bridge that had been destroyed," said Inman, a Ft. Worth, Texas native. This operation was a

chance for the bridge commander to show the troops all aspects of bridge building, not simply ordering his men to haul this and move that," he said.

The entire operation went smoothly; any obstacles were dealt with quickly and efficiently," Johnson said. "I'm very pro-ud of these engineers," he added. A reassuring comment from an officer who greets most of his hard-chargin' Leathernecks with an affectionate, "Hey Crazy One ... " and a hearty slap on the

The bridge is a 60 class bridge, able to hold anything the Marine Corps owns according to Lance Cpl. Gerrick Gann, engineer from High Point, N.C.


'It was the first time Bridge and Charlie Companies had worked together and it was a good show of Marine Corps teamwork immediately put into action,' said Gann.

The medium girder bridge (MGB), made of steel, replaced a non-standard bridge that deteriorated to rotted, wooded beams. The MGB allows traffic to move over a small, clear-water stream which supplies the thousands of troops participating in Solid Shield '89 with drinking water.

'A primary avenue has been opened," Johnson stated proudly. The operation was just another example of Marine preparedness and their timely ability to surmount complex obstacles.

Adaptability key for helo pilots

A thunderous sound rose in the distance. The closer the sound, the bigger the specks became until finally they could be distinguished as helicopters—lots of them.

"Grumpy, this is Max, 10 minutes to push. Form up and take the lead."

up and take the lead."

"Roger, Max. Form up Warrior 1-1 and 2-1, get

ready everyone, we're going in."

These are the words that echoed through the InterCommunications System (ICS) aboard the many helicopters participating in the air assault during Solid Shield.89

SS-89 is designed to hone the skills of hte Marine Air-Ground Task Force, 4th Marine Expeditionary Brigade (MEB), in cooperation with the Commander Amphibious Group Two.

For SS-89, 4th MEB commanded by BGen. J.J. Sheehan and headquartered at Naval Amphibious Base Little Creek, Norfolk, Va., consists of Regimental Landing Team-8 and Brigade Service Support Group-4 both based at Camp Lejeune, N.C., and Marine Aircraft Group-31 based at MCAS Beaufort, S.C.

As the helos crossed over the beach, waves of Amphibious Assault Vehicles (AAVs) were on their way in to secure the beachhead for follow-on forces. The helos formed an echelon as they crossed over the beach and then broke the formation seconds later to head for their appointed destinations—Landing Zones Hawk and Dove.

As the pilots made their way to the zones the tactical situation changed and they were directed to a different zone—LZ Goose. Once again the pilots formed an echelon followed quickly by a line as they began their approach into Goose. The adaptability of the helo pilots was evidenced as the last minute change of plans didn't effect their performance.

change of plans didn't effect their performance.

"How big is Goose?" said a voice over the ICS.
"It doesn't matter how big it is," said another. "If that's where they want us to land, that's exactly where we're going to land."

The helos banked and began their descent. The lead helos soon were disgorging infantry on the run while the others continued to circle, awaiting their turn.

As one CH-53D circled, the pilot blurted out, "We got lock on, hang on." The Sea Stallion banked hard left then right, trying to shake a missile system target lock. "He's tight, he's tight—lock off," said the relieved pilot. "That was close. I thought we bought it on that turn," he said.

Once on the ground, leaders formed up members of their unit to start their advance.

Covering the landing, organization and advance of infantry were the Hunter-Killer teams from Marine Light Attack Helicopter Squadron-167 based at MCAS, New River, N.C. The UH-1N Huey serving as the hunter, would search for the enemy,

while two AH-1 Cobra gunships served up as the follow-up killers.

More sand scattered as four CH-46E Sea Knights touched down to unload more Marines for the assault. These were artillerymen tasked with setting up a gunsite at LZ Goose.

Their mission was accomplished when two CH-53Ds each carried a 105mm Howitzer under its belly into the zone.

The guns were unharnessed, hooked up to HMMWVs, also lifted by the Sea Stallions, and quickly positioned with barrels pointed west toward the action.

Setting up a defensive perimeter around LZ Goose were Marines from TOW Company, 2nd Tank Battalion. Tucked away under trees and bushes in camouflaged vehicles, they awaited for any threat to the Marines and responded at a moment's notice.

The helicopter's role was crucial to mission accomplishment during the first day's events. Every helo taking part in the landing, whether providing troop insertion, resupply, or fire support did their part to make D-Day successful.

Once the dust had settled, the troops had moved out, and helicopters were heard no more, LZ Goose was peaceful and looked virtually untouched. But if you were to look real close, you might have seen a Marine or two.

As a prepositioning force, 6th MEB and IPSRON-1 have made great strides since the MEB ook on the MPF mission in 1983 — from a pierside ff-load of two ships to this year's exercise which calls or in-stream off-loading of the two MPS ships.

Maritime prepositioning offers the ability to pro-xt a mobile/flexible concentration of forces with 30 ays wartime sustainability quickly into an objective

The main requirement for an MPF operation is ecure area which allows for the unopposed arrival, ff-load of ships and aircraft, and the assembly of pernnel and materiel.

This year's exercise, with the in-stream off-load of o ships, will show off even more flexibility for **1PF** operations

In addition to the in-stream off-load of the ships, nother gigantic step forward in the maritime preposioning operations came with establishing the MPF cision Support System which puts accountability f all the equipment and supplies at a fingertip.

"MDSS gives us realtime tracking and control of very piece of equipment from the ships," said Col. m Puckett, 6th MEB assistant chief-of-staff, gistics. "From the time a vehicle or container leaves e deck of the ship until the time it's put back onard, we can find out precisely where it is."

The MDSS is similar to the scanning systems usd in many super markets where a laser device scans bar code on the piece of equipment and reports the formation into a computer where it can be found the touch of a key.

In MPS operations 6th MEB works with a Navy apport Element to off-load the equipment from the nips and deliver it to the beach.

"We use the MDSS scanners to read the bar codes when the equipment leaves the ship, when it reaches shore, when it enters and again when it leaves the Movement Control Center and when it reaches the final destination," said 1st Lt. Bob McArthur, MDSS officer. "Once scanned, the information is sent via modem to the computer in the Arrival and Assembly Operations Group so we have realtime knowledge of where it is.

The whole system is important because it gives upto-the-minute information about the location of each piece of equipment.

When you have 2,200 closed containers full of viner you have 2,200 closed containers full of supplies sitting out in a lot, you have to know where to go to get the parts and equipment you need," Puckett said. "With the system we have now, we can punch into the computer and get the exact location of everything that comes off the ship — from a small bolt to an M-60 tank."



SOLID SHIELD'89 crisis action system allows

As a rapidly deployable, combined arms force, the Marine Air-Ground Task Force (MAGTF) can conduct a variety of operations in any geographic environment. II Marine Expeditionary Force, the largest of the East Coast MAGTFs, demonstrated its flexibility and tremendous combat power during Exercise Solid Shield '89 (SS-89).

SS-89 is a joint operation, sponsored every two years by U.S. Commander-in-Chief Atlantic. It allows participating commands an opportunity to work as a joint task force.

Previous Solid Shield exercises were scripted as far as who attacks who, when and where. SS-89, using the crisis action system approach, allowed for much more free-play and individual unit initiative. Although D-Day was planned, actions subsequent to H-Hour were a result of the tactical actions of the commanders engaged in the battle.

To most Marines, the type of exercise

they were participating in did not matter so much as the opportunity to continue a proud Marine tradition — projecting combat power ashore. The difference came in the form of an over-the-horizon assault on Air-Cushioned Landing Craft (LCAC) and helicopters from 25-35 miles off-shore which landed 1,300 Marines in 16 minutes.

The Marines and Sailors of the II MEF participated in SS-89 as members of the MEF's two expeditionary brigades — the 4th and the 6th.

The 6th MEB deployed from Camp Lejeune, N. C., to Fort Story, Va., to conduct selected offload of vehicles and supplies from two of the four Maritime Prepositioning Ships from MPSRON-1.

The 4th MEB command element embarked aboard the USS Saipan, LHA-2, at Norfolk and sailed with a nine-ship Amphibious Task Force to Morehead City to load men and equipment from: Regimental Landing Team-8 (RLT-8), the ground combat element; Brigade Service Support Group-4, the combat service

support element — both from Camp Lejeune; and Marine Aircraft Group-31, the aviation combat element, headquartered at MCAS, Beaufort, S.C.

A rehearsal normally precedes an amphibious assault and the rehearsal for SS-89 was conducted off the coast of Virginia Beach, Va. The rehearsal is designed to exercise command and control procedures and communication nets for the staffs as well as for the boat and wave team commanders.

Rehearsals give the staffs — Navy and Marine — an opportunity to review the plan, make adjustments as necessary and provide time to implement the changes.

A new wrinkle for the planners was the first MEB-level amphibious assault using LCACs on the East Coast. The three LCACs used in the assault wave brought nine Light Armored Vehicles (LAV) ashore only 10 minutes after the first wave of amphibious vehicles hit the beach.

Brig. Gen. J. J. Sheehan, commanding general, 4th MEB, was designated CG, II MEF (FWD) and assigned as Commander of the Landing Force (CLF). As CLF, he would exercise operational control of the XVIII Airborne Corps with the 82nd Airborne and 101st Airborne Assault Divisions.

The day began with a dawn airborne assault at Hell and Purgatory drop zone by the 82nd. Then the scene shifted to Onslow Beach as 4th MEB forces zeroed in on the 9 a.m. H-Hour when the first wave of infantry-loaded amphibious assault vehicles stormed the beach. Just prior to the assault, a joint air strike was conducted in support of the landing — complementing the Marine close-air support provided by AV-8Bs, F/A-18s and A-6s.

The distinguished vistors and media on Riseley Pier were also treated to the sight of 44 Marine aircraft in tactical formation enroute to their landing zones. The helicopters carried Echo and Fox Companies from 2nd Bn., 4th Marines to Landing Zone Goose as the heliborne portion of the assault encircled the enemy.

By the time the LCACs hovered onto the beach the spectators had seen quite a bit, but the sight of such a large craft moving rapidly over the water and across the shore brought them down to the beach to watch the LAVs assault off the LCACs.

The final D-Day event was the a assault conducted by the 101st at Can Davis and the seizure of another landing force objective — effectively closing the enemy's retreat.

The seizure of these objectives, couled with the naval gunfire support provided by the USS Spruance, the artille support which came ashore immediate after the initial waves and the close in fi support provided by the Huey and Cob Hunter-Killer teams, enabled the landiforce to expand the beachhead and i troduce more forces and supplies acre the beach.





BSSG-4 keeps supply problems 'contained'

One of the biggest problems associated with a beach landing is getting the follow-on supplies to the right place at the right time.

During exercise Solid Shield '89, Brigade Service Support Group-4 found a way to "contain" that problem.

"Virtually the only type of cargo ship left any more is the container ship," said Lt. Col. Charles S. Mill, CO, BSSG-4. "By using these containers instead of palletizing all our supplies, we were able to save a tremendous amount of handling time."

The large corrugated metal containers first saw use during exercise Cold Winter-89, when BSSG-4 deployed to Norway in support of the 4th Marine Expeditionary Brigade.

"In the past, we had run into problems when we found we needed something — like rations — that was buried way at the front of the hold," Mill said. "With the containers, you can prioritize your off-loading and get what needs to be offloaded to the beach faster."

Another advantage to the container system is that each container can serve as its own

"If the container contains something for organizational supply, for example, you can put a counter just inside and make it a warehouse without having to transfer everything," Mill said. The use of the containers was not the only new twist in BSSG-4's script.

Time to make the donuts

FORT STORY, Va .- Time to make the donuts-and everything else it takes to serve two hot meals a day to as many as 1,600 Marines and Sailors who participated in Exercise Solid Shield '89 here

Twenty-three cooks, six bakers and 28 messmen, from a variety of units and attached to H&S Co., 6th MEB for the exercise, were assigned this seemingly monumental task

In the rear, we only cook for 600 to 700 people," said Sgt. Robert Platt, chief baker. "There's a big difference in terms of pressure when you're cooking for twice that many. You don't want to sacrifice quality for saving time and that's hard.

Two kitchens in two separate buildings, as well as a field kitchen and two refrigerated trailers, were kept running 24 hours a day. Menus were drawn up on a 12-day cycle and some of the food ordered from Norfolk prior to the start of the exercise.

"As long as we can get the food out on time, we're to allowed work at our own pace and to experiment with recipes so the menu doesn't always have to be the same," said Lance Cpl. Anthony Shamy, a baker from HqBn., 6th Marines.

The responsibility for seeing the food reached the vat cans at the right time and place each day fell upon the four chief

"The hardest thing is making sure everyone gets fed because of the different hours and places each unit is working, said Staff Sgt. Gary Boggs, chief cook H&S Co. "And if you're five minutes late, vou hear about it

Serving breakfast from 10 p.m. to midnight, taking meals to units in the field and at the beach, and providing untold amounts of coffee and pastries to Marines and Sailors on red-eye shifts was just a small part of the cooks' accommodation of the exercise schedule

You have to be flexible," said Platt. "You must be able to adjust to everything from a kitchen you've never been in to working with cooks you have never worked with and training messmen who have no experience in food services. And you have very little time in which to do it all.

Security—Primary mission for Dragon teams

A puff of smoke, a flash of light followed by the echo of a Dragon blast, signals the dug-in Marines that their enemy won't be going home that night.

The primary mission for the three Dragon teams of Weapons Co., 2nd Bn., 4th Marines, is to provide security for Echo Co., 2/4 during exercise Solid Shield 89 (SS-89). Their weapon is the M-47 Medium-range, Anti-armor, Wire-guided Missile System.

Solid Shield is an exercise designed to hone the skill of the Marine Air-Ground Task Force, 4th Marine Expeditionary Brigade (MEB), and subordinate elements

For SS-89, 4th MEB, the Corps' oldest brigade, commanded by Brig. Gen. J.J. Sheehan and headquartered at Naval Amphibious Base, Little Creek, Norfolk, Va., consists of Regimental Landing Team 8 and Brigade Service Support Group 4, both based at Camp Lejeune, and Marine Aircraft Group 31 headquartered at MCAS, Beaufort, S.C.

"Basically we are going to provide antiarmor protection for the main avenue of approach to the company's objective," said Lance Cpl. Marco A. Maldonado, a Dragon Gunner attached to Echo Co.'s second platoon.

Maldonado added, that once the objec-

tive has been secured they would set up a defense, covering the possible avenues of approach the enemy might use to retake the objective.

A steady hand and an unwavering eye is needed by a Dragon gunner in order to hit his mark. "We must have a clear field of fire and vision in order to fire the missile," said Lance Cpl. Dennis W. Kozak. "Once the Dragon is fired we can almost guarantee a direct hit."

According to Maldonado, anything that can obstruct the gunner's view such as battlefield smoke or obstacles on the ground, shrubs and bushes that can tangle the missile's wire, may cause the missile to have an erratic flight.

A great disadvantage for Dragon Missile teams is the fact that they must track the missile until impact. If a target is at 1,000 meters, the Dragon's maximum range, the gunner has to brave whatever enemy fire is headed his way, for about 10 seconds.

Once the gunner tracks the missile to its target, the entire team must immediately leave that firing position and head for a predesignated alternate firing point.

In order to conceal their position, the assistant gunner sets up false signatures, which are explosive charges simulating a Dragon firing.

"We set Dragon simulators or anything else we can get our hands on to go off

before and after we launch the missile. This way, the enemy can't easily get a fix on us," explained Kozak.

"At this time, the Dragon missile system is the strongest anti-tank killer that an infantry company has on hand at all times," said Staff Sot. James A.



The CH-46 sped through the air at more than 120 ots at treetop level, its cargo area filled with a plant of Marines

In the cockpit of the helicopter, the pilot's keen s detected a bright red flashing light, alerting him an engine fire. Another series of lights engaged, naling the loss of both engines and compression. The pilot, copilot and crew chief scurried around bird, preparing for emergency preparations as the o began to fall to the ground.

Had this been an actual situation, the Marine rps would have lost the helicopter and the Marines ide it, but this time the pilot and crew walked away hout a scratch. They had not even left the ground. 'We can simulate any emergency the pilot may counter without risking any lives," said Eli Trott, rk leader at the MCAS New River Training and diovisual Support Center Simulator Center. "It's raluable asset to the Corps."

The Marine Corps, however, is not the only force nefiting from the simulators. A sign above the door ding into the simulator area reads, "Through this or walk the best combat pilots in the world." The S. Navy, British Royal Marines, Canadian forces d Israeli forces have used the simulator with vorable outcomes.

"We don't have anything like this," said Maj. Bob thill, aircraft commander, 413 Rescue Squadron, madian Forces. "It's very realistic."

The Simulation Center has two simulators. The F5 Operational Flight Trainer resembles the 1-46E and CH-53D, and the CH-53E is portrayed the CT-5A OFT.

The simulators are an enclosed cockpit with all stems functioning with the assistance of a computer



are accompanied by a simulator instructor who puts them to the test of successfully recovering from the different emergencies. All instructors have numerous flight hours in the helicopters and most are former military aviators.

The simulators have visual graphics similar to a video game, but the graphics are so impressive that it's hard to tell that it's not the real thing. Wether it be a refueling aircraft, an aircraft carrier in the ocean,

or terrain features and runways, the simulator displays some very convincing graphics.

"The visual displays are simply red, green and blue mixtures," said David Terry, a visual technician at the center. "The programs used to make the displays have years of work in them. The contractors used data pro-

vided to them to make the terrain features so realistic."
The computers can display the Camp Lejeune,
MCAS New River and MCAS Cherry Point areas

precisely under all weather conditions.

When a pilot enters the simulator, he is subjected to the sights, sound and feel the motion the aircraft would do if put under the conditions simulated. This is done by the visual displays, audio recordings and hydraulic rams used to resemble movement.

"It's cheaper for the government to operate the simulator instead of a helicopter, and no one gets hurt," said Richard T. Adams, a retired Marine Corps major who is an instructor at the center. "The only thing that pilots hurt sometimes is their egos," he said with a chuckle, remembering his days as a Marine aviator.

Although the simulators may seem like fun and games, they are an invaluable tool in preparing pilots for possible emergencies in the future that may endanger the lives of Marines traveling in the helicopters.

"The simulator training we've received here has already saved Canadian lives and helicopters," Cuthill said. "I've personally encountered some of the situations that were simulated here, and knew what to do when they really happened. The simulators take the guesswork out of flying."

Although the simulators seem like an arcade video game addict's dream, they are an essential, and valuable asset to aviation.



Stables offer equestrian fun

When you drive down Stone Street, has your sense of smell ever been assaulted by a musty barnyard odor?

More than likely it was Camp Le-jeune's own "Ponderosa," the base stables.

The stables offer Camp Lejeune residents an inexpensive way to enjoy equestrian activities. Trail and pony rides, lessons in both western and English styles are available.

Stalls for boarding privately owned horses are on the premises, as well as a tack shop for purchasing riding gear.

As herd animals, horses follow rules of the pack, Rochelle explained "If a group of three or four horses wants to sleep, one animal will remain awake to keep watch," she said. "They have the ability to lock their legs and actually sleep standing up."

The stables are open from 11 a.m. to dusk, Wednesday through Friday; and from 8 a.m. to dusk on weekends. They are closed Monday and Tuesday, so maintenance can be performed to the facility and the horses are allowed to rest.



Nisely was convicted on Jan. 20 of kidnapping at gunpoint his former wife, who was a Marine at the

time of the incident, aboard Camp Lejeune. At time of the kidnapping Nisely was on release for the Federal Court awaiting trial for a series of assau that had occurred aboard Base in 1986, also invoing his former wife. After a massive manhunt invoing State, local, and federal law enforcement agenc when Nisely failed to appear for his first trial the cafter the kidnapping, he was finally apprehended Mississippi for car theft.
