

On March 12th, 2021, a grand opening ceremony was held for the newlychristened Multi-Activity Facility building, now known as "El Patio", in NAVSTA Rota. The project, originally awarded under contract number N33191-16-C-1005 on November 20th, 2015, experienced numerous challenges during the design and construction phases, but through strong and relentless collaboration among the members of NAVFAC, MWR, and the contractor (SEMI), spearheaded by PWD Rota's construction manager Trevor Krajewski and engineering technician Vincent Williams (shown in photo above), the construction was finally completed early this year. Thanks to the efforts of all involved, members of NAVSTA Rota are able to enjoy the new Bombers eatery, Tower Pub, and state-of-the-art FLIX movie theaters. The ceremony kicked-off with the opening remarks from Ms. Megan Ryan (NAVSTA Rota Fleet Readiness Director), followed by CAPT David Baird (NAVSTA Rota Installation Commanding Officer). Personnel directly involved with the project, including those from PWD Rota, MWR, and SEMI (the construction contractor) were invited for the ribbon-cutting. 

These task orders are sub-divided into Job Order Contracts (JOCs), Indefinite Delivery-Indefinite Quantity (IDIQ) contracts, and Base Operations Support (BOS) contracts, depending on the complexity and nature of the project scopes.


CE1 Davis, BU2 Ed-



These generators are placed at different essential locations in case of an emergency power outages. These essential locations cannot afford to lose power due to the missions they support, so it is critical to continue keeping accountability in terms of where they are located, if they are labeled correctly and functioning properly. This month, CECN Edwards was tasked to perform checks on 10 different generators. Though to other people it may seem like a mundane task, in reality their jobs may be one of the most important jobs in the base.


